Looking Down from the Big House

Last Fall Willow Creek Association published a study that reported on a hard look the leadership took at the church. That study spoke to me.

I have followed

Willow Creek's story since I served as Pastor at a Church three miles away in Palatine Illinois. When I then went to First Presbyterian of Arlington Heights, a group of us pioneered a ministry for single adults, and we were competing for single adults with Willow Creek. That was 1976. When I left in 1980 to accept a new call, their worship services had surpassed our membership.

I found that some of our members were attending both churches. So I was interested when a member took me to their fund raising banquet when they rolled out their plans to buy Barrington property and build a huge auditorium. One of their founding members told me he and his wife took out a second mortgage on their property to be able to give a large gift for the building, and many others did as well.

I have followed Willow Creek because the church I served in Evanston, IL, one hour's drive from Willow Creek, sent many leaders for training, which they and I found valuable. Our church had their teaching

pastor, Dr. John Ortberg speak for a faith renewal weekend, and he gave the lectures which later became the book many of our POD churches have used, If You Want to Walk on Water, You Have to Get out of the Boat. Ortberg now is Teaching Pastor at Menlo Park Presbyterian Church, CA, a few blocks from Stanford U. He is one of my favorite speakers and preachers.

I have also followed the Willow Creek story, as depicted in Reveal: Where Are You? (Greg L. Hawkins and Cally Parkinson, because this huge monolithic cathedral of contemporary worship admitted publicly that they missed the mark. Not only did they ask the hard questions. They admitted that they blew it.

To use a local illustration, they realized their worship services were very much like a UM football game. 107,501 in the stands, buying hot dogs and soda, and reading the program, but after the game, just back to their normal routines.

Yes, Willow had 20k in the stands between Friday evening and Thursday evening worship services, but few were going any deeper on Monday morning. Few were going out of the stadium and into the trenches to share the good news of Christ "in word or in deed, giving thanks to God the Father through him." Yes, some were growing in small groups, and others were serving in downtown Chicago. Others were starting Satellite congregations. But few indicated they took their faith seriously. Yes, they were still in the stands, and not down

on the field.

This book would make a fine session study. They decided that to grow in depth, they had to make three changes. First, they would not ask how many attended, but rather, how many lives were changed by what part of a worship service. Now they offer a devotional for the week that will prepare worshipers for next week. They will push seekers to believe, not just to observe. Their second change was to stop asking how are you, and now they are asking how are you growing spiritually? Thirdly, they are evaluating every program, not on how many attended, but how did the program help someone go deeper into a walk with Christ?

Here is one more observation. They studied secular organizations like Starbucks and the Weather Channel. People who watch their show are looking for information about their lives, and how they can plan their week, and their travel and leisure and gardening, not just a weather report.

Folks, are we helping our parishioners plan for the catastrophes of their lives that will interrupt them? Like illness, tornado, or death? Or the loss of a child? Are we preparing our members for the hard work of leaving the sanctuary and demonstrating the gospel in our lives? Are our members demonstrating the love and justice of Jesus Christ as they change neighborhoods. Friends what does our church reveal about the nature and level of our commitments to Christ and our ministry for him?

Even after the ballgame ended, Katherine Russo was complaining about a play. She'd hit the ball beautifully, then rounded first base in hopes of a double -- but had been robbed, she said, by an overzealous competitor. "The guy laid right out in front of me!" Russo said. Monday morning -- complete with second-inning stretch -- to kick off the Detroit Tigers' Opening Day.

Barb Heikkila, the site supervisor, organized the indoor game as a way to get the seniors excited about the big day and to entice extra visitors to lunch. Most days, about 15-20 people stop in as the seniors' lunch guests. Monday, more than 40 did. "I didn't think they'd want to do it," Heikkila said. "I thought maybe it'd be too physical, but they got really excited."

The seniors played against volunteers such as Frank Alessi, 88, who called themselves the Tigers. The residents were the Peace Manors. The Tigers won 14-7.

Overall, it still looked like a baseball game, said Elizabeth Engeland, 90, who got decked out in an oversized Tigers shirt and baseball cap to cheer from the sidelines.

"I have to hightail it upstairs to see the pregame stuff on TV," Engeland said about 11 a.m., two hours before the Tigers' game began.

"I couldn't wait till today," said Mary Delgato, 74, Engeland's friend and fellow Tigers buff. She planned to watch the game on the big-screen TV in the manor's commons room, which was decorated in blue and orange.
