- 4. The Committee received the Church Register of Troy, First and Southwest but delayed examination until the presentation of their Session Minutes at the February meeting.
- 5. The Committee did not receive the Session Minutes of Northminster; Outer Drive; First, Royal Oak, and First, Troy, and requests they be presented at the February meeting.
- 6. The Committee did not receive the Church Register of Outer Drive; First, Royal Oak and First, Troy and asks they be presented at the February meeting.

THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. Mackay Trylor?

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery suspended the Structure and Bylaws for the balance of 1972 and expanded the Committee on National Missions to thirty (30) members to allow for the appointment of a six-member Subcommittee on Black Church Affairs.

2. At its December meeting the Presbytery approved the contract of The Rev. Philip Ferguson with the Committee on National Missions to be the Organizing Pastor of the Shelby New Church Development. The contract included a provision for housing. The Committee now reports that it has located a house at 53169 Villa Circle, Utica (Shelby Township) for purchase in the amount of \$45,000; has secured full financing; and will proceed to sell the house to Mr. Ferguson on land contract at that price.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

THE COMMITTEE ON CANDIDATES reported through the chairman, The Rev. Jeffrey S. Goldsmith.

- Donald M. Van Dyke, member of First Church, Pontiac, spoke concerning his Christian experience and motivation for entering the ministry, and was questioned by Presbytery.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery arrested and sustained the examination and received Mr. Van Dyke under care as a candidate for the Christian ministry. The Moderator conducted the service of recognition.

- 3. James G. E. Williams appeared for his ordination examination, spoke concerning his personal faith, and was questioned by Presbytery.
 <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery arrested and sustained the examination and approved Mr. Williams for ordination, pending the receipt of a call.
- 4. Edward Brown appeared for his ordination examination, spoke concerning his personal faith, and was questioned by Presbytery.
 <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery arrested and sustained the examination; approved the candidate for ordination; licensed him to preach the gospel as a probationer for the ministry, and dismissed him as a licentiate to the Presbytery of Wheeling.

Stryker to become associate pastor, effective February 1, 1972, under the following terms: salary \$11,500, manse, car allowance \$1,200, 15% pension, Synod hospitalization, one month vacation, two weeks study leave, annual review; heard Elder Desmond Rowan speak on behalf of the congregation; placed the call in Mr. Stryker's hands; approved the following administrative commission to install Mr. Stryker on Sunday, February 27, 1972 at 11 a.m. at Cherry Hill Church: Elder Mary Grace Adams (Moderator), The Rev. L. Wilson Kilgore, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland, The Rev. Samuel C. Weir, Elder Donald Knapp (Cherry Hill) and invited The Rev. Robert H. Yolton of the Presbytery of Lake Huron to be seated as a corresponding member.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery approved a call from the congregation of the Cherry Hill Church to The Rev. Frank C. - 3. Upon motion, Presbytery approved a request from The Rev. George Mehaffey and the congregation of the Evergreen Village Church to dissolve the pastoral relationship existing between them effective January 30, 1972 so that Mr. Mehaffey may be free to accept a call to the First Presbyterian Church, Poland, Ohio, Presbytery of Mahoning; heard Elders William Stokes and June Roddie speak on behalf of the congregation; approved the call of the First Presbyterian Church, Poland, Ohio; placed the call in Mr. Mehaffey's hands; and dismissed him to the Presbytery of Mahoning, effective January 30, 1972; and authorized the session to fill the pulpit.
- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery approved a request from The Rev. Benjamin Lane and the congregation of the Westminster Church to dissolve the associate pastoral relationship existing between them effective January 16, 1972 so that Mr. Lane may be free to accept a contract with the Board of Christian Education in Philadelphia to become Education Media Secretary; heard The Rev. - 5. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the Committee's recommendation that the Session of the Redford Church be granted permission to employ The Rev. Aelwyn Hughes as part-time minister of visitation for two days a week at a salary of \$100 per month and \$100 per month car allowance.
- 6. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery extended the appointment of The Rev. Raymon Bair as interim supply for the Ecorse Church to April 25, 1972.
- 7. Upon motion, Presbytery approved a request from The Rev. Robert Rives that Presbytery grant him the status of Honorable Retirement; heard Elder Paul Winslow speak on behalf of the congregation; dissolved the pastoral relationship existing between Mr. Rives and the Garden City Church effective April 30, 1972; granted Mr. Rives the status of Honorable Retirement, effective April 30, 1972; announced plans to present a certificate of retirement to Mr. Rives at a later meeting of Presbytery; and granted permission to the congregation to form a Pastor Nominating Committee.

Mr. Bushnell announced that suggestions for nomination as Youth Advisory Delegate to the 184th General Assembly (1972) must be in the hands of the Stated Clerk by February 15, 1972.

- k. The General Council approved the following instructions to the Central Receiving Agency concerning division of benevolence funds among General Assembly Mission and Synod and Presbytery Causes:
 - (1) The Central Receiving Agency shall honor the instruction of the donor.
 - (2) Where the remittance includes no instruction, the Central Receiving Agency shall advise the Treasurer of Presbytery of the amount, and the Treasurer shall secure from the local church treasurer instruction for the intended allocation of the benevolence monies.
- 1. The General Council adopted the following policies governing Validated Special Opportunities, and requested the Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship to include the policies and the list of Validated Special Opportunities with the self-allocation forms:
 - (1) The Presbytery, through its Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship and the committee responsible for the program, shall promote the Validated Special Opportunity, encouraging the recipient also to participate in the promotion of the program in order to insure the full support of each Validated Special Opportunity.
 - (2) Validated Special Opportunities shall be supported by specially designated contributions from individuals and churches. If churches are to receive Presbytery Causes "credit" contributions must be remitted to the Central Receiving Agency or directly to the Presbytery clearly designated for the particular Validated Special Opportunity.
 - (3) All contributions designated for Validated Special Opportunities shall be remitted on a regular schedule and as received, up to the total amount budgeted.

- (4) When the budgeted total has been received, the treasurer shall permit the donor to decide among three options:
 - (a) Redesignate the contribution to another Validated Special Opportunity;
 - (b) Remit the contribution directly to the particular Validated Special Opportunity without Presbytery Causes "Credit"; or
 - (c) Request that the contribution be returned.
- (5) All agencies receiving monies directly from donors for Validated Special Opportunities shall report to the presbytery treasurer, as of June 30 and December 31, the amounts received.
- m. The General Council requested the Committees on Church and Society and Religion and Race to present their proposed amendments to the 1972 Mission Budget to General Council before presentation.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery discharged the following Administrative Commissions:
 - a. Merger of Highland Park Church and Palmer Park Church into a new and continuing church, Park United, January 9, 1972;
- b. Installation of The Rev. T. Andrew Kim at Korean Church, January 9, 1972. Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.


PROGRAM REPORTS

THE COMMITTEE ON CANDIDATES reported through the chairman, The Rev. Jeffrey S. Goldsmith.

1. The Committee recommended that the required proficiency in the Hebrew language for ordination be waived for Roger DeNoyelles and William Calhoun, candidates under care of the Presbytery, for the reasons which were reported as follows:

ROGER DENOYELLES, a member of Westminster Church and under care of this Presbytery since December of 1968, is now a middler at McCormick Theological Seminary. He has completed the requirements for proficiency in the Greek language. However, he failed his first term of Hebrew. Although his attention and attendance in class were steady and it appeared that he was making progress, quizzes and the final examination did not bear that out. Rather than continue with failure work, Roger decided to continue class attendance and study but to audit Hebrew rather than taking credit for it. He was supported in that decision by the Committee on Candidates.

WILLIAM CALHOUN, a member of the Kirk in the Hills, and under care of this Presbytery since June of 1970, is now a senior at Union Theological Seminary in New York. He has also completed the necessary requirements in the Greek language. He requests the waiver of Hebrew because it is taught at Union only during the summer months. This past summer he was involved in clinical training at Columbia Presbyterian Hospital in New York and therefore was unable to take Hebrew. Thus, unless waived by Presbytery, Bill will need to take Hebrew after he has graduated from seminary.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery requested the Synod of Michigan to waive the required proficiency in the Hebrew language for ordination (49.022) under the provisions of the Form of Government (49.03).

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

 - b. The General Council referred to the Committee on Evangelism a communication from Mrs. O. R. Flora, asking for an endorsement of a proposed Billy Graham Crusade in 1974 or 1975.
 - c. The General Council received a communication announcing a City-Wide Brotherhood Rally, February 20, 1972.
 - d. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures an overture from the Presbytery of Platte to the 184th General Assembly.
 - e. The General Council received a communication from the Presbytery of Newark, endorsing Elder C. Willard Heckel for Moderator of the 184th General Assembly.
 - f. The General Council tabled a communication from Asian Presbyterians asking information about Asian Presbyterians within the Presbytery.
 - g. The General Council requested the Committee on Planning to recommend as soon as possible to the General Council priorities for the 1973 Mission Budget of Presbytery.

Anderson to become pastor, effective April 3, 1972, with the following terms: salary \$25,000, free use of manse, automobile and reimbursement of the expenses of its operation, utilities, including light heat, water and telephone, Blue Cross/Blue Shield, 15% pension, two months vacation including study leave, reimbursement of travel and other expenses incurred on behalf of the church, moving expenses and annual review; enrolled Mr. Anderson as a member of the Presbytery upon favorable examination by the Committee on Candidates or its authorized committee; and will place the call in his hands at the April meeting.

- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery approved a request from The Rev. Lewis Brown and the congregation of the Plymouth Church to dissolve the associate pastoral relationship existing between them effective June 1, 1972 so that Mr. Brown may be free to accept a call to the University Church, Buffalo, New York, Presbytery of Western New York; heard Elders Richard Rhinehart and Carl Catlett speak on behalf of the congregation; approved the call of the University Church, Buffalo, New York; and dismissed Mr. Brown to the Presbytery of Western New York with a request that it place the call in his hands, effective June 1, 1972.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery heard The Rev. Ray Kiely speak on behalf of the session of the Grosse Pointe Memorial Church; approved the invitation of the session of the Grosse Pointe Memorial Church to The Rev. John L. McCreight to become assistant pastor effective June 21, 1972 with the following terms: salary \$13,380, car allowance \$1,200, manse and utilities, 15% pension, health, car, life, disability and personal property insurance, one month vacation, two weeks study leave with \$250 allowance, moving expenses and annual review; forwarded the invitation of the Presbytery of Maumee with the request that the Presbytery place the invitation in his hands and dismiss him to the Presbytery of Detroit; and enrolled Mr. McCreight as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit upon receipt of his dismission.
- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery placed the call from the Kirk in the Hills in the hands of The Rev. 1. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to the First Protestant Society of Detroit (First Presbyterian Church) to place the house located at 662 Lincoln Road, Grosse Pointe, for sale on the open market.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHIRCH AND SOCIETY reported through the chairman, The Rev. David Swinehart.

- In response to the motion opposing any relationships on the part of the General Council of Synod with homosexual groups in Michigan which was referred to the Committee at the March 21, 1972 meeting of Presbytery, the Committee reported that it concurred with the action of the Synod General Council.
 - Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report and received for study a position paper concerning homosexuality which was prepared by the Synod Continuing Education Task Force. (Paper H)
- 2. The Committee proposed an overture to the General Assembly for an Indian Day of Prayer.

<u>Upon motion</u> from the floor, Presbytery approved the following substitute overture to General Assembly:

Whereas, God created the earth and found it good;

Whereas, man abuses the earth for which he was charged to care;

Whereas, the summer solstice, June 21, is a day on which North American Indians have for centuries gathered to mark annually the day on which the sun shines longest upon them;

Whereas, prayers of thanksgiving for the earth are then offered; and,

Whereas, supplications to heal wounds to the earth are also then made;

Therefor, the Presbytery of Detroit respectfully overtures the 184th General Assembly (1972) to designate June 21 as a Day of Prayer for the Earth, in which we join with our Indiana brothers in reaffirming our responsibility to the whole created order; and,

Request member churches to observe the Day of Prayer for the Earth on the Sunday nearest that date; and,

Furthermore, to instruct the Board of Christian Education to provide for the congregations each year appropriate suggestions for observing the Day of Prayer for the Earth and for greater understanding of Indian culture and values.

The report of the Committee on Church and Society was arrested until later in the docket.

THE COMMITTEE ON CANDIDATES reported through the chairman, The Rev. Jeffrey S. Goldsmith.

1. The Committee presented Stephen J. Gibson, a member of Jefferson Avenue Church, and Stephan Weinberger, a member of Ward United Church, Livonia, with the recommendation that they be taken under care.

The candidates spoke to Presbytery concerning their Christian experience and motivation for entering the ministry, and answered questions from the floor.

<u>Upon motion</u>, the examinations were arrested and sustained, and Mr. Gibson and Mr. Weinberger were received under care as candidates for the Christian ministry.

The Moderator conducted the service of recognition.

2. Upon motion, Presbytery recommended to the Synod of Michigan that the Hebrew language requirement for Craig Dykstra be waived for the following reasons:

Craig Dykstra, a member of Grosse Pointe Memorial Church and under the care of this Presbytery since June of 1969, is now a middler at Princeton Theological Seminary. He has completed the requirements for proficiency in the Greek language. Mr. Dykstra requests the waiver of the Hebrew language requirement due to the fact that he must work full-time this summer, in order to support his wife and two children. Until the birth of their second son, Mr. Dykstra had thoughthis wife would be able to work and that he could work part-time and also study Hebrew this summer.

The Hebrew language will also be offered next fall. However, if he were to take the language at that time it would not allow him to complete the required Greek sequence or to complete the necessary senior thesis.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

THE GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland.

- 1. The General Council reported for information the following actions:
 - a. The General Council received a communication from the General Council of the General Assembly, calling the attention of Presbytery to the special responsibilities of presbyteries and sessions in "The Design for Mission" as set forth in the Form of Government 41.06 and 42.07:

"The session is to lead the congregation in participation in the mission of the Church in the world. It may consult the presbytery through the appropriate committees or the presbytery through its committees may consult with the session."

"The presbytery shall assist and guide particular churches in their ministries and shall itself be a basic unit of mission with responsibilities for particular ministries."

- b. The General Council referred to the Special Nominating Committee a communication from the chairman of the Organizing Commission of the Synod of the Covenant, asking Presbytery to appoint one elder to serve on the Special Committee to Nominate the Synol Executive, as provided in the Book of Order 69.12.
- c. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures overtures to the 184th General Assembly (1972) from the Presbytery of Columbus, concerning a committee to study the Holy Spirit in the World Today, and from the Presbytery of New York City, concerning a national study of salary standards and benefits of the non-ordained staff of local congregations in order to recommend salary and benefit policies for those non-ordained staff members, particularly directors of religious education, secretaries, sextons and church musicians.
- d. The General Council referred to the Presbytery's Validating Committee a communication from the session of the Plymouth Church stating that its self-development fund would be sent to the General Assembly program because of the unavailability of information relative to Presbytery programs for 1972.
- e. The General Council accepted The Rev. Arthur Beumler's offer to carry greetings from the Presbytery of the church and its mission in Korea.
- f. The General Council accepted the resignation of Rey Phillips from the Committee on Ministerial Relations and referred the vacancy to the Committee on Nominations.

- g. The General Council received for report to Presbytery the Treasurer's financial reports for the Benevolence Fund and the Per Capita Administrative Fund for the quarter ending March 31, 1972, which are appended.
- h. The General Council requested the Secretary to write to all churches with per capita apportionments due for the years 1969-71, asking them to advise the General Council whether their intention is to make payment or to request exemption.
- i. The General Council received the 1971 audits of the Per Capita Administrative Fund and the Benevolence Fund made by Touche Ross and Co.
- j. The General Council moved its regular May meeting to May 2, 1972, 12:00 noon, with major time to be given to consideration of reports and consultations relative to the Synod of the Covenant.
- k. The General Council heard a report that the Committee on Church and Society is unable to draw up a position paper against pornographic activities as requested by the General Council (3/7/72). Two motions concerning support of Detroit ordinance 659-G, chapter 39, article 1 and of the Detroit News' policy for X-rated movie advertising were defeated.
- 1. The General Council did not approve a proposed overture from the Committee on Church and Society concerning an Indian Day of Prayer by a vote of 8 to 9.
- m. The General Council heard a report that the Committee on Candidates plans to contact those churches which have reported they have funds available to assist candidates under care, in order to supplement its Financial Aid Program (cf. Presbytery minutes 9/23/69) in the 1972-73 school year.
- Upon motion, Presbytery discharged the following administrative commissions:
 Installation of The Rev. Philip Magee at Plymouth Church, March 12, 1972;
 Ordination of James Williams at Royal Oak First United Church, April 9, 1972.
- 3. The Rev. William Whitledge, Vine Irman of the Special Nominating Committee, placed in nomination Elder George Bushnell, Jr. (Grosse Pointe Memorial) as Presbytery's representative on the Regional Synod's Special Committee to Nominate the Synod Executive.

 <u>Upon motion</u>, there being no nominations from the floor, Mr. Bushnell was elected.

The report of the General Council was arrested until later in the docket.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

- 1. A motion was defeated to limit remarks concerning departing and retiring ministers to those persons not representing local churches affected.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery commended the Detroit News for their stand on refusing to advertise X-rated movies.

POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

The report of the General Council continued.

4. The Rev. Richard Dempsey, chairman of the <u>Special Committee to Study COCU</u>, presented the recommendations of the Committee.

The Presbytery became confused in parliamentary procedures. The Moderator resolved the issues by consent ruling that motions and actions related to the recommendations would be dropped and actions on the recommendations would be renewed. No appeal of her ruling was made

Upon motion, Presbytery heard the report of the Special Committee to Study COCU, approved the report and forwarded it to the General Assembly's Committee on COCU, and discharged the Special Committee with thanks.

Upon motion, the report of the General Council as a whole was approved.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery expressed its full confidence in the Moderator, and its appreciation for her patience, her graciousness, and for her forbearance with Presbytery when parliamentary tangles arise.

PROGRAM REPORTS

THE COMMITTEE ON RELIGION AND RACE reported through the chairman, The Rev. Lawrence T. Glenn.

- 1. Elder Alan Henry (Littlefield Boulevard) spoke concerning a study group using "Toward Love and Justice."
- Mr. Glenn reported that the Seminars for Racial Understanding would be continuing for members of the committees of Presbytery.
 Upon motion, the report was received.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY continued its report.

3. The Rev. John Quick, a member of the Task Force on South Africa, and The Rev. Robert Yolton described the work of the Task Force and its relevance to Presbytery.

Upon motion from the floor, Presbytery directed the Trustees of Presbytery to vote their proxies in support of the full disclosure resolution (Item No. 10 in the G.M. Proxy Statement) at the General Motors annual meeting (5/19/72) and urged congregations to take similar actions.

Upon motion, the report was received.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery adjourned at 9:40 with prayer and benediction by the Moderator.

THE COMMITTEE ON RECORDS AND REPORTS reported through the chairman, The Rev. Hugh V. Stewart.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following report:

- 1. The Committee on Records and Reports recommends approval of the following records with the exceptions noted in the report to the Clerk of Session:
 - a. Session Minutes of Allen Park, Belleville, Cherry Hill, First, Dearborn, Ecorse, Grosse Ile, Lincoln Park, Southminster, Trenton Wyandotte and Kirk of Our Savior.
 - b. Church Registers of Allen Park, Cherry Hill, First, Dearborn, Trenton, Wyandotte, Garden City and Kirk of Our Savior.
- 2. The Committee did not receive the following records and requests they be presented at the June 27 meeting:
 - a. Session Minutes of Dearborn Woods and Riverview.
 - b. Church Register of Dearborn Woods.

THE GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland.

- The General Council reported for information the following:
 - a. The General Council heard, read and received a communication from the session of the First United Presbyterian Church, Royal Oak, expressing deep concern relative to the action of the General Council of Synod in responding to the Kalamazoo Gay Liberation Movement
 - b. The General Council received a communication from The Rev. Robert L. Kincheloe, Executive Director of the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches, reporting that the Council of Churches has asked The Rev. Carl Howie and George Bushnell, Jr. to serve on a representative planning committee to explore the formation of a more inclusive ecumenical organization than now exists.
 - c. The General Council referred to the Committee on National Missions a communication from Focus Hope, asking for financial support.
 - d. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures and the Committee on National Missions an overture to the 184th General Assembly from the Presbytery of San Fernando, on the subject of increased emphasis on new congregation development and congregation re-development.
 - e. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures and the Committee on Ministerial Relations an overture to the 184th General Assembly from the Presbytery of Genesee Valley, on recommending that a high priority for the Vocation Agency of the General Assembly be the creation on a regional basis of therapeutic Christian communities.
 - f. The General Council heard reports on the development of the Synod of the Covenant, on progress which its Committee on Planning is making toward a recommendation for the reorganization of the presbytery, and on the current plan for possible realignment of presbytery boundaries within the Synod of the Covenant. The Rev. Allan Zaun, one of Presbytery's representatives on the Presbytery Boundaries Task Force of the Synod of the Covenant reported the basic assumptions and factors being applied to the boundaries of presbyteries and reported that the Task Force may recommend the enlargement of the Presbytery of Detroit to include churches in the Port Huron, Howell and Ann Arbor and Monroe areas. The General Council approved the report of the Presbytery Boundaries Task Force as presently proposed.
- Upon mótion, Presbytery discharged the following administrative commission:
 a. Installation of The Rev. James Anderson at Kirk in the Hills,
 April 30, 1972.
- 3. For the <u>Special Nominating Committee</u>, The Rev. William Whitledge presented the following Guidelines for the <u>Selection of Nominees</u> for General Assembly Commissioners:

The General Council adopts the following procedures and guidelines in the selection of its nominees for General Assembly commissioners. Consideration will be given to a wide spectrum of type of church (e.g., urban-suburban), theology, age, sex and race in order to achieve a representative "mix" of commissioners. The Presbytery of Detroit has no strict seniority or "point" system for determining nominees, feeling that it is better to maintain some flexibility in this matter. Certain guidelines, however, will be employed to identify potential nominees.

Guidelines for Ministers: Consideration will be given--

- 1. Ministers who are engaged in an active ministry, who are serving as an interim or stated supply, or who are serving on Presbytery committees.
- 2. Ministers who have served in the Presbytery at least one year.

- 3. Ministers who were regularly present at or properly excused from stated meetings of Presbytery during the past year.
- 4. Ministers who expect to be active members of the Presbytery at the time of the General Assembly.

Guidelines for Churches: Consideration will be given--

- 1. Churches which have not had a ruling elder commissioner at the General Assembly within the past five years.
- 2. Churches which have been regularly represented by their complement of ruling elders unless properly excused at stated meetings of Presbytery during the past year.

The General Council will take into account the "one man - one vote" principle. With 77,775 members reported in our 100 churches, the average church is around 770 members. With 9 elder commissioners per year, this average church should be considered for a nomination every 11 years. Larger churches should receive consideration more frequently and smaller churches less often.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the Guidelines. Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. MacKay Taylor.

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to the First United Presbyterian Church of Plymouth to place the house located at 650 Simpson, Plymouth, Michigan for sale on the open market.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery authorized Park United Church to sell the building located at 642 W. McNichols, Detroit, Michigan to the Grace Christian Methodist Episcopal Church of Detroit for \$115,000, payable with \$24,000 down and the balance (\$91,000) to be paid within six months on a standard form land contract bearing interest at 6% per annum.
- 3. The Committee reported that the annual audit of its books for the year ending December 31, 1971 has been completed by Touche, Ross and Co., and that the financial records have been found in order. Commissioners interested in examining the auditcan do so by calling The Rev. Francis Nagy at the Presbytery Offices.

PROGRAM REPORTS

THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION reported through the chairman, Elder James Berry, who introduced Elder Charles Keber, chairman of the Synod Task Force on Continuing Education. Mr. Kleber and Katherine Doctor, Synod Associate for Continuing Education, presented an audiovisual report on continuing education for clergy and lay members. Upon motion, the report was received.

LEGAL ACTIONS continued.

The Stated Clerk announced that The Rev. Thomas Kirkman had filed a protest under Book of Order 91.02 on item 1.a. in the General Council report above. The Stated Clerk reported that Book of Order 91.02 provides for protests against actions of a judicatory, which "shall be entered at the particular session of the judicatory during which the action protested against is taken." As a result, Mr. Kirkman's protest appears to be against Presbytery's approval of the action of the General Council in hearing read and receiving a communication from the session of the First United Presbyterian Church of Royal Oak.

THE TRUSTEES OF PRESBYTERY reported through the President, Elder Marshall Massey, who outlined the activities of the Trustees for the year ending December 31, 1971 and reported the investment performance for the funds under the supervision of the Trustees.

Upon motion, the report was approved.

THE COMMITTEE ON CANDIDATES reported through the chairman, The Rev. Jeffrey S. Goldsmith.

- 1. The Committee reported the Middler Appearance (Book of Order 48.07) on June 6, 1972, of Craig Dykstra, who is a candidate under care.

 <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the second year consultation of Craig Dykstra.
- 2. Frank Allard, a member of South Lyon Church, spoke concerning his Christian experience and motivation for entering the ministry, and was questioned by Presbytery.
 Upon motion, Presbytery arrested and sustained the examinations and received Mr. Allard under care as a candidate for the Christian ministry. The Moderator conducted the service of recognition.
- 3. Paul Andress appeared for his ordination examination, spoke concerning his personal faith, and was questioned by Presbytery. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery arrested and sustained the examination and approved Mr. Andress for ordination.
- 4. William Calhoun appeared for his ordination, spoke concerning his personal faith, and was questioned by Presbytery.

 <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery arrested and sustained the examination and approved Mr. Calhoun for ordination.
- 5. The Committee reported procedures concerning candidates for the Christian ministry which were approved by the passage of Overture C.
- 6. The Committee reported concerning an overture approved by the 184th General Assembly (1972) in response to an overture sent by the Presbytery to the 183rd General Assembly (1971), concerning the study of Greek and Hebrew as tools for Biblical study and preaching. Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through The Rev. William F. Whitledge.

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery approved an invitation of the session of the First Presbyterian Church of Newton, New Jersey to Mr. Paul Andress, candidate under care of the Presbytery of Detroit, to become assistant pastor effective September 2, 1972, under the terms approved by the Presbytery of Newton and the Committee on Ministerial Relations of the Presbytery of Detroit; empowered the following administrative commission to ordain Mr. Andress and place the invitation in his hands on June 11, 1972, in the Calvin West Church: Moderator Mary Grace Adams, (Grosse Pointe Memorial), The Rev. Paul M. Gillis, The Rev. Deirn Geard, The Rev. Margaret Scabich, Elder Charles Goodenow (Calvin West), Elder Virginia Ramsey (Littlefield Blvd.), and invited The Rev. David Denison Cockcroft, Presbytery of New York Gity and The Rev. Warren E. Upon motion, the report was approved and recessed until later in the docket.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

- 1. The Rev. Thomas Kirkman reported that "The session of the First Church Royal Oak, respectfully requests the return of \$7,019.95 per capita apportionment so that it will not be used to assist pervert and aberrant forms of human sexual behavior."


 Mr. Kirkman moved that Presbytery grant the request.

THE COMMITTEE ON CANDIDATES reported through The Rev. Robert Kyser.

 Philip Bellappeared for his ordination examination, spoke concerning his personal faith, and was questioned by Presbytery.
 The Committee presented the following statement concerning Mr. Bell's examination by the Committee:

Mr. Bell has satisfactorily completed the Standard Examinations in Bible Exegesis and in Theology. He has wrriten the Standard Examinations in Polity and in Worship, but has not written them satisfactorily.

The Committee on Candidates has followed the "Suggested Guidelines for Presbyteries and Synods on Evaluation of Reasons for Exceptions" for waiving particular Standard Examinations as approved by the 182nd General Assembly (cf. pp. 377-380, Minutes, 1970). The following paragraph is applicable in this case:

"6. d. An exception is reponsible if the presbytery, through examination or evaluation of its own choosing, satisfies itself that the candidate is capable of making practical application of his knowledge in the area(s) of his failure in the Cooperative Examinations. Presbyteries should note in the referral the content and extent of presbytery's re-examination." (Minutes, 1970, p.379)

Your committee has spent many hours in consultation with Mr. Bell regarding failures in the above two examinations. We have arranged special tutoring in these areas. And finally we have re-examined Mr. Bell in these areas during a meeting of the committee. We are sorry that Mr. Bell has been unable to complete these exams satisfactorily. However, we are satisfied that his problem is with the written presentation of material on examinations, and not with his "practical knowledge" of the areas involved. We feel, as a committee, that Mr. Bell has adequate practical knowledge of the areas of Presbyterian Polity and Worship, as evidenced by oral examination by the committee.

In motion, Presbytery arrested and sustained the examination and requested

Upon motion, Presbytery authorized the sale of the Knox United Presbyterian Church located at 3952 Dickerson Avenue, Detroit to the Committee on National Missions of the Presbytery of Detroit for \$175,000; and further, authorized the Committee to borrow \$155,000 from the Board of National Missions and, if necessary, to borrow up to \$20,000 from the Bethany Church

2. Alvin Stallworth, chairman of the Subcommittee on Ethnic Church Affairs, introduced The Rev. William Moody, Director of Operation Help, who spoke about the purpose and activities of his organization.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

1. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Elder Mary Harrison speak on behalf of the session and approved a contract from the session of the Northbrook Presbyterian Church to The Rev. Ernest W. Dunn to become part-time assistant minister of parish visitation effective June 1, 1972 under the following terms: salary \$100 per month, housing allowance \$250 per month and car allowance \$150 per month.

2. Upon motion, Presbytery approved, pending action by the congregation on July 9, 1972, a request from The Rev. Jeffrey Goldsmith and the Northbrook Presbyterian Church to dissolve the pastoral relationship effective September 1, 1972, and heard The Rev. LeRoy Peterson speak on behalf of the

congregation.

Jeffrey Goldsmith to become organizing pastor of Canton New Church Development effective September 1, 1972, with the following terms: salary \$9,500, housing allowance \$3,600, car allowance \$1,800, health insurance \$320, continuing education \$200, 15% pension, one month vacation, two weeks study leave, moving expenses and annual review; and authorized the Committee to place the call in Mr. Goldsmith's hands.

- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery approved a request from The Rev. Cornelius B. Houk and the congregation of the Southfield United Presbyterian Church to dissolve the associate pastoral relationship existing between them effective August 15, 1972; heard Elder Robert Shew speak on behalf of the congregation; approved the contract of Carroll College to Mr. Houk to become Dean of the Chapel; and dismissed him to the Presbytery of Milwaukee effective August 15, 1972.
- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the invitation of the session of the Northville Church to Richard James Henderson, a candidate of the Presbytery of Pittsburgh, to become assistant pastor, effective July 3, 1972 with the following terms: salary \$7,500, housing allowance \$3,000, car allowance \$600, continuing education \$100, housing loan \$5,000 (interest free), moving expenses, Synod hospitalization, 15% pension, one month vacation, two weeks study leave and annual review; heard Elder Charlotte Meyer speak on behalf of the session; forwarded the invitation to the Presbytery of Pittsburgh with the request that it be placed in his hands and that he be dismissed to the Presbytery of Detroit upon his ordination; and enrolled Mr. Henderson as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit upon receipt of his dismission.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY reported through Elder Arthur G. Sherman, chairman of the Task Force on Corporate Social Responsibility, who presented Preliminary Guidelines and the report of the Task Force for approval.

A motion from the floor to receive the report and guidelines instead of approving them was defeated.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved "Preliminary Guidelines to Corporate Social Responsibility and Church Investments" and the committee report, and adopted the following recommendations:

Whereas

The General Assembly of 1971 has directed its boards and agencies to make funds available for socially responsible causes, and whereas,

The General Assembly has established the Presbyterian Economic Development Corporation and has provided funds therefor, and whereas,

The Presbytery of Detroit should implement the General Assembly directives, by directing that,

The Trustees of the funds of the Presbytery of Detroit shall invest, as available, up to 20% of its portfolio in socially progressive investments using such portfolio funds as are unrestricted by the donor, or such other funds as can have restrictions construed or changed to permit such investments. Such investments shall be chosen from enterprises which the General Assembly through its pronouncements or Presbytery, through its own action highlight as important economic areas for mission. Current examples include minority enterprise, low-cost housing projects, and corporations involved in pollution control technology.

It is further directed that Presbytery appoint a sub-committee of the Committee on Church and Society which would:

- Recommend to Presbytery when one or more of the options available to stockholders of a particular corporation should be exercised by Trustees and individual stockholders in fulfillment of responsible social ownership. Some suggested options are as follows:
 - a. Counsel with corporate management about particular social concerns.
 - b. Prepare a stockholder's resolution for consideration at the corporation annual meeting regarding particular social concerns.
 - c. Publicize particular social concerns and seek support from others in ameliorating the concern.
 - d. Initiate or join others in litigation about social concerns.
 - e. With considerable publicity, make known Presbytery's concern about a particular issue and Presbytery's decision to sell holdings in the securities of a particular corporation.
 - f. With considerable publicity, make known the Presbytery's concern about a particular issue and Presbytery's decision to recommend to its members consideration by them of boycott of the products or services of a particular corporation.
- 2. Become and continue to be informed in the matter of corporate social responsibility by studying published material, by questioning corporate officials, by using Preliminary Guidelines to Corporate Social Responsibility and Church Investments attached hereto, and by conducting educational programs to inform Presbyterian churches and members about particular corporate social action in the following areas:
 - a. Discrimination in initial and continuing employment.
 - b. Pollution of the environment.
 - Production and design of weapons of war which are used principally against civilian populations.

- d. Exploitation of Third World human and natural resources for the primary profit of citizens of the United States of America.
- e. Exploitation of consumers.
- 3. Carry out action programs authorized by Presbytery relating to corporate social responsibility.
- 4. Recommend to Presbytery how the Trustees should vote the shares they hold in the name of Presbytery on resolutions concerning corporate social responsibility and urge individual Presbyterians holding similar proxies to vote likewise.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

The report THE GENERAL COUNCIL was continued.

- 2. The General Council reported for information the following:
 - a. The Office of the General Assembly has reported the following ministers removed from office January 1 to March 31, 1972: C. Stuart Billing, James Edmundson, Rowland Folensbee, John A. Hoyt, Tabe J. Loats, Bruce D. McIntosh, Dwayne L. Merry, James P. Moon, James A. Pemble, Schafer Williams, David Gray.
 - b. General Council referred to the Committee on Christian Education, with power to nominate, a communication from McCormick Theological Seminary, inviting nominees to the 1972-73 Pastors-in-Residence Program.
 - c. General Council referred to the Committee on Nominations a communication from the Synod of the Covenant Organizing Commission, giving the formula for nominating representatives to the Synod Mission Council, Divisions and Departments of the Synod of the Covenant.
 - d. General Council received a communication from the Committee to Nominate the Executive of the Synod of the Covenant, soliciting candidates, and directed that it be included in the pre-Presbytery mailing.
 - e. General Council received a communication from Synod's Personnel Development Department announcing the resignation and retrement of The Rev. Robert H. Yolton as Synod Executive and recommending that the Presbytery of Detroit take appropriate action.
 - f. General Council authorized the Moderator to appoint special committees (1) to prepare an appropriate recognition for Dr. Yolton and (2) to make recommendations to the General Council and Presbytery on interim staff services.
 - g. General Council reports to Presbytery the resignation of George E. Bushnell, Jr., from the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches' Planning Committee for a New Ecumenical Organization.
 - h. General Council accepted with appreciation and regret the resignation of The Rev. Cornelius B. Houk as Recording Clerk, effective June 30, 1972, and referred the vacancy to the Committee on Nominations.
 - i. General Council empowered the Stated Clerk to fill vacancies among the commissioners to the Synod of Michigan.

- 5. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery received with deep regret and great appreciation for his services, the resignation of The Rev. Robert H. Yolton as Executive of the Presbytery of Detroit, effective December 31, 1972, November and December being vacation and accumulated study leave.
- 6. The Stated Clerk reported the General Council's recommendation on the referral from Presbytery (June 6, 1972) relative to the request of the First Presbyterian Church, Royal Oak, for the return of its 1972 per capita.
 - <u>Upon motion</u>, following two amendments from the floor, Presbytery denied the request of Royal Oak, First Church (6/6/72) that its \$7,019.95 per capita apportionment for 1972 be returned, and affirmed the policy that the per capita revenues shall be used solely for ecclesiastical and administrative expenses of the judicatories of our denomination.

- 8. THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON GOALS AND OBJECTIVES reported through the chairman, The Rev. Frank Marvin.

 Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report and adopted the following statement of priorities:

Believing that during 1973 the total work of the Presbytery will be advanced and relationships with the Presbytery will be strengthened by the Presbytery focusing upon the local congregation with the "support through resourcing" concept, we suggest the following priorities:

- 1. Identification and Resolution of Alienations
- 2. Resourcing for Local Churches and Presbytery Ministries*
 The following are specific areas in which resourcing should be provided in 1973:
 - a. Development of lay leadership: Intensified professional and para-professional assistance available to local churches for development of teachers, elders, etc., specifically inclusive of women, with attention to methods of dealing with conflict.
 - b. Develop innovative methods of evangelism.
 - c. Ministries in difficult situations resourced on application from sessions and presbytery committees with particular attention
 - (1) Apartment houses
 - (2) Young adult ministries
 - (3) Racism and justice
 - (4) Aged milieu
 - (5) Youth culture
 - d. Programs in governmental responsibility: Development of means to assist individuals and congregations to participate effectively in governmental process.

*As the local church discovers need then Presbytery assists in resourcing. Because needs and issues change rapidly, flexibility in funding is needed so there is a supply of money and/or energy when need arises.

- 3. Pastoral Support of Ministers
 This Presbytery role of pastor to pastors could be accomplished with little increase of money. Particular attention is directed toward addressing the alienations confronting the pastors.
 The way Presbytery operates (cluster, etc.), and the time of staff, could assist in this area.
- 4. Strengthen Connectionalism by Enabling Local Congregations to Participate in the Planning and Decision-Making Processes of Presbytery.
- 9. THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON BUDGET PROCESS reported through the chairman, Elder Leigh.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery suspended those portions of the Structure and Bylaws pertaining to the development of the Administrative, Presbytery Causes and National Missions Budgets and approved the budget process in the report of the General Council's Special Committee on Budget Process as follows:

Step 1: Collecting Information

By June 30, the Stated Clerk-Treasurer shall send to the chairmen of Presbytery committees:

- a. An announcement of the schedule and details of Step 1;
- b. Presbytery Mission Priorities approved by Presbytery;
- c. An initial income projection for 1973.

By September 15, the following information is to be in the hands of the Stated Clerk-Treasurer:

- a. Presbytery Mission Priorities, formally adopted by Presbytery.
- b. Income projections from the Budget Committee, including all sources.
- c. Budget requests from the program committees of Presbytery.
- d. Budget requests for new work from other sources.

 To encourage new approaches in fulfilling Presbytery priorities, the General Council will communicate in June to sessions, agency boards and other mission units that the Presbytery Budget Process is open to new proposals until September 15.

<u>Step 2: Validation and First-Round Negotiation</u> Three groups participate:

- a. A special <u>Priorities Analysis Team</u>, composed of six persons: five selected from the <u>Presbytery</u> by the General Council, upon nomination of the Council's Special Committee on Nominations; and Chairman of the General Council's Budget Committee, with the privilege of the floor, but without vote.
- b. A <u>Budget Committee</u> of the General Council, composed of <u>three members</u> of the Council who are not chairmen or members of program committees, upon appointment by the Moderator.

c. The Chairmen of the following eleven committees:

Christian Education

Church and Society

Ecumenical Relations

Evangelism

Interpretation and Stewardship

Ministerial Relations

National Missions

N.M. Subcommittee on Black Church Affairs

N.M. Subcommittee on Congregational Development

N.M. Subcommittee on Special Ministries

Religion and Race

d. The Executive Staff will serve ex-officio, with the privilege of the floor, but without vote.

Step 3: Preliminary Block Allocations

In light of priorities, projected income and the results of Step 2, the Budget Committee will make a preliminary dollar allocation in a lump sum to each committee for the validated proposals for which it is responsible and for operating expenses, within one week of the completion of Step 2. Each committee will receive a list of all allocations.

Step 4: Preliminary Budget

Each committee responsible for validated proposals shall develop a Preliminary Budget for both its programs and operating expenses. This step provides for a confrontation of each committee's own priorities with (a) Presbytery priorities represented in validated proposals; (b) income realities; (c) the Budget Committee's weighting of priorities through preliminary block allocations.

Each committee shall report to the Stated Clerk-Treasurer within two weeks of the receipt of the preliminary block allocation:

- a. A preliminary budget for its work and expenses
- b. A list of validated proposals <u>not</u> included in the preliminary budget, along with the committee's judgment of the appropriate cost of each
- c. Comments, or appeals, in light of priorities.

Step 5: Review of Preliminary Budget

- a. The <u>Priorities Analysis Team</u> shall review and comment upon the preliminary budget data collected from the committees in light of priorities.
- b. The <u>Budget Committee</u> shall review and comment upon the preliminary budget data collected from the committees in light of priorities and its view of financial realties.

The preliminary budget and the review comments shall be reported to members of the General Council for their information.

Step 6: Budget Negotiation (Second Round)

Those persons who participated in the Validation and First-Round Negotiation (Step 2) shall meet to negotiate a Presbytery Mission Budget for recommendation to the General Council using the information from Steps 4 and 5. It is anticipated that this will be detailed negotiation of programs.

This step may take two negotiating sessions.

The goal is a balanced budget.

Step 6: (optional)

If the participants in Step 5 are not able to concur in finalizing a balanced budget by a date set by the General Council, the Priorities Analysis
Team and the Budget Committee shall meet and develop a balanced budget for recommendation to the General Council.

Step 7: General Council Action

The General Council shall adopt to amend the proposed Presbytery Mission Budget for recommendations to the Presbytery.

Step 8: Presbytery Action

The Presbytery shall approve a Presbytery Mission Budget.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

The Moderator made the following appointments to the Special Committee on Interim Staff Services: The Rev. Ray Kiely, chairman, The Rev. James Cannon, The Rev. Richard Milford, Elder Paul Doerring (Church of Our Saviour) and Elder James Handley (Cherry Hill).

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

1. The Stated Clerk stated that the "reasons" for the Protest entered by The Rev. Thomas Kirkman, June 6, 1972, were received on June 16, 1972, and so were timely under Book of Order 91.02.
Upon motion, Presbytery referred the Protest and its "reasons" to the Committee on Bills and Overtures for its review and recommendation at the September meeting of Presbytery.

The Vice-Moderator took the chair.

PROGRAM REPORTS

1. THE COMMISSIONERS TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY spoke concerning special interests of presbyters about the meeting, such as evangelism, church unity, youth, Christian education, anxiety about Vietnam and baptism and the call.

Upon motion, the report was received.

The Moderator resumed the chair.

2. THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY reported through Elder Addie Merrill, who presented a survey of programs on drug abuse and the concerns of the Committee concerning the Detroit school millages.

Upon motion, Presbytery included in the minutes the following statement of the Committee relative to the school desegregation order:

The decision of Judge Stephen Roth to require the desegregation of schools over a wide section of the Detroit metropolitan area gives us pause as Presbyterians as we reflect on our long-standing but ineffectual affirmation of the goal of "an integrated church in an integrated society." Segregation is greater now than it was a generation ago when we began affirming this goal. Now we see a choice of either chaos or calm implementation of an order which would at least

desegregate children and their teachers, regardless of the living patterns of their parents. The Committee on Church and Society urges that Presbyterians choose calmness and a creative response in this situation. The Committee urges:

- 1. That congregations in the area defined by Judge Roth as the "desegregation area:
 - a. Explore methods of dealing with fear and conflict, of assessing educational priorities, and of demonstrating care to any child within its borders, using the many resources available within the metropolitan area.
 - b. Form groups to approach public officials during the summer asking for a firm commitment to the maintenance of order and the assurance of the safety of all.
 - c. Form groups to inform school boards of their support in fulfilling the requirements laid upon them to provide in-service human relations training for teachers and curriculum revision to eliminate racism from the classroom.
 - d. Organize clergy and lay people to monitor school properties and school buses, if necessary, during the first weeks of school.
- 2. That all congregations everywhere work to enhance the creative and positive developments which are possible because of the desegregation order, such as in-service training and revision of curricula to eliminate racism, and creating pressure for legislative action to revise the means of financing schools, a need which is long overdue in our state.

Upon motion, the report was received.

Upon motion, the minutes of the meeting of June 27, 1972 and of the pro re nata meeting of August 25, 1972 were approved.

Upon motion, the docket was approved as amended to permit the Committee on Ministerial Relations to report before the General Council.

The service of worship was led by the host paster, The Rev. LeRoy J. Peterson, assisted by The Rev. Ernest W. Dunn.

The Moderator then led the Presbytery in prayer.

LEGAL ACTIONS

THE COMMITTEE ON BILLS AND OVERTURES reported through the chairman, The Rev. Lloyd G. Brasure. Mr. Brasure reported that The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman, Jr. had written a letter withdrawing his protest entered June 6, 1972.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the recommendation that Mr. Kirkman's protest be withdrawn and the matter be concluded.

THE COMMITTEE ON RECORDS AND REPORTS reported through the chairman, The Rev. Hugh V. Stewart.

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following report:
 - a. The Committee on Records and Reports recommends approval of the following records with the exceptions noted in the report to the Clerk of Session.
 - (1) Session Minutes of Central Northwest, Church of Our Saviour, Farmington, Korean, Milford, Monteith, Northbrook, Orchard Lake, Southfield and Westminster.
 - (2) Church Registers of Farmington, Northbrook, Orchard Lake and Westminster.
 - b. The Committee excused the Session Minutes of Crossroads for presentation at the October meeting.
 - c. The Committee did not receive the Session Minutes and Church Register of Redford and requests they be presented at the October meeting.
 - d. The Committee has scheduled a pre-Presbytery Workshop for Clerks of Session at 4:30 p.m. prior to the October meeting.

THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. L. Wilson Kilgore, assisted by The Rev. William F. Whitledge.

- Upon motion, Presbytery approved plans for the installation of The Rev. George W. Woodcock as pastor of Knox Church on Sunday, October 1, 1972, at 7 p.m. and elected the following Administrative Commission: The Rev. William Lawrence (chairman), The Rev. Bartlett Hess, The Rev. Theodore Allebach, Elder Wilfred J. Brice (Christ Memorial), Elder Matthew C. Patterson, Sr., (Knox).
- The Rev. William Lawrence presented the following Memorial Minute for The Rev. Thomas B. Davis, who died on August 17, 1972:

The Rev. Mr. T. B. Davis was born June 20, 1886 in Saline County, Missouri. In his infancy, his parents moved to Moscow, Idaho, where he spent his childhood and his youth. On September 2, 1908 he married Mary Etta Van Buskirk. Before his formal preparation for the Gospel

ministry, he worked as a bookkeeper and display man for the Weyerhauser Merchantile Company. He took his theological training at the Moody Bible Institute from which he graduated in the year of 1916. Upon graduation, he worked at the Pacific Garden Mission in Chicago for about two years. His first pastorate was in Russell, Iowa. From there he was called to the First Presbyterian Church in Fort Dodge, Iowa, where he remained for about three years. Following this pastorate, he received a call to become the assistant at the Old Central Presbyterian Church in Detroit where he served under the late Dr. C. R. Scafe. In 1927 he responded to an invitation to serve as the minister of the Trenton Presbyterian Church where he pastored for ten years. In 1937, after leaving Trenton, he returned to Detroit as executive secretary of the Christian Business Men's Committee, serving in this capacity for approximately 21/2 years. He was then called to the Scofield Memorial Church in the latter part of 1939 and remained there until he retired in the year of 1952. During his retirement years he served briefly as pastor of both the Congregational Church in Highland, Michigan and the Hickory Ridge Community Church; this was a double charge. In 1964, it was necessary for him to give up all preaching responsibilities because of poor health. At this time, he and his wife moved to the co-op apartments in Wyandotte until her passing in the year of 1969. While visiting his daughter and son-in-law in Peoria, Illinois in the latter part of 1969, he suffered a stroke from which he never fully recovered. He lived the rest of his life in a nursing home in the Peoria area. He went to be with his Lord at the ripe age of 86.

- T. B. Davis was a man with a warm heart and a Christ-like spirit. He was one of the most dedicated and humble servants I have ever known. It was my privilege to minister to the Davis' while they lived in Wyandotte. Mrs. Davis had a stroke and was confined to a wheel chair for a number of years. But this handicap did not keep them from regularly attending church. As I watched this faithful and devoted husband minister so lovingly and so kindly to his invalid wife, my own life was wonderfully blessed and enriched. Then, as I witnessed the love of their children poured out upon their aged parents, I once again saw the Gospel in action. The three children, two daughters and one son, are walking in the footsteps of their godly mother and father. They have indeed a rich Christian heritage and are exceedingly grateful for this priceless blessing.
- T. B. Davis was a kindly man. He had found the secret of the Prophet Micah's words--"What doth Jehovah require of thee, but to do justly, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with thy God." He was constantly ministering to those in need. Night or day, whenever the call came, he responded. I think of what one of the ladies of the congregation said, "I remember this beloved servant of the Lord for his kindness and gentleness. He loved children and, like his Master, he took the little ones in his arms and blessed them."

HE WAS A GENEROUS MAN AND THOUGHTFUL OF OTHERS. He gave liberally to the cause of Christ of his means, time and strength. His giving was comparable to the poor widow. He continually sacrificed, depriving himself of his personal necessities that he might have a share in the propagation of the Gospel. He was a tireless worker in the Lord's vineyard, and never thought of how much time or strength he expended.

During his ministry, the Cherry Street building was remodeled. He worked along with the men, cleaning bricks, and helping in the construction. He gave himself fully and completely to his Lord and his people.

As I think of his life, there is a poem that I belive wonderfully describes his early pilgrimage.

Lord, help me to live from day to day-In such a self-forgetful way
That even when I kneel to pray-My prayer will be for others.
And when my work on earth is done-And my new work in heaven begun
May I forget the crown I've won-While thinking still of others.

HE WAS A MAN OF DEEP CONVICTION. He stood firm in his convictions of truth and righteousness. He believed the Bible to be the Word of God and refused to deviate from its inspired teachings. It was his Guide Book. It was his meat and drink. It was his delight. When I think of our brother's love for God's Book, I am reminded of the words of the psalmist--Psalm 1, verses 2 and 3--"But his delight is in the law of the Lord; and in his law doth he meditate day and night. And he shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither; and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper."

One of the key verses in his life was II Timothy 2:15--"Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not be a shamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." As a minister of the Gospel, he had the ability of rightly dividing the Word of truth. Those who sat in his congregation were blessed by his faithful ministry of the Word.

HE WAS A MAN OF HUMILITY. The apostle Paul says, "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus." The Lord Jesus was the perfect Man. His life blended all the virtues of perfection. Paul selects just one, the chief one, humility, as the keynote to them all. It was the chief adornment in our Lord's earth life; so was it the chief adornment of our brother's life. He was truly humble. Peter, speaking out of the experience of his heart, says--"God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble."

HE WAS A MAN OF FAITH. He could say with the apostle Paul--I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me."

We have enjoyed the companionship of our friend and brother, and then an unseen hand was laid on his shoulder. He slipped through the curtain that separates the seen from the unseen. He has gone and only the fragrance of his memory remains. As we read in Proverbs 10, verse 7--"The memory of the just is blessed."

Now, let us remember our beloved friend forwhat he was, but let us not forget that he owed all he was to another, to the greatest Friend there is. I know he would want to say this: "Thou, O Christ, art all I want, more than all in Thee I find."

3. Upon motion, Presbytery heard The Rev. James F. Anderson speak for the session and approved the invitation of the session of the Kirk in the Hills Church to Mr. Charles Randall Peyton to become assistant pastor effective October 1, 1972 with the following terms: salary \$8,400, housing allowance \$3,000, car allowance \$1,200, 15% pension, health insurance, one month vacation,

two weeks study leave, moving expenses and annual review; forwarded the invitation to the Presbytery of Connecticut Valley with the request that the Presbytery place the invitation in his hands upon ordination and dismiss him to the Presbytery of Detroit; and enrolled Mr. Peyton as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit upon receipt of his dismission.

- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the invitation of the session of the Kirk in the Hills Church to The Rev. Frank J. Irvine to become assistant minister effective October 1, 1972 with the following terms: salary \$13,500, housing allowance \$3,600, car allowance \$1,500, 15% pension, health insurance, one month vacation, two weeks study leave and annual review, after hearing from a representative of the session, Elder Gordon Robertson, and placed the invitation in Mr. Irvine's hands.
- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following Administrative Commission to install The Rev. Robert W. Richter, pastor of the Drayton Plains Church, on Sunday, October 1, 1972 at 7:30 p.m.: The Rev. William Whitledge (chairman), The Rev. John Mitchell, The Rev. John Olert, The Rev. Richard Dempsey, The Rev. Roy Lambert, Elder Daniel Williams (Drayton Plains) and Elder Mary Kathryn Oaks (Drayton Plains.)
- 6. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the request of the session of the First Presbyterian Church, Birmingham, that The Rev. Walter H. Eastwood be named interim pastor for a period of six months with a salary of \$1,375 per month, furnished house including utilities and fuel expenses, Blue Cross/Blue Shield and expense allowance of \$150 per month, effective October 22, 1972.
- 7. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the request of The Rev. L. Wilson Kilgore and the congregation of the Cherry Hill Church to dissolve the pastoral relationship, effective September 30, 1972, heard Elder Desmond Rowan speak for the congregation, approved the call of the Valley United Presbyterian Church, Scottsdale, Arizona, placed the call in his hands and dismissed him to the Presbytery of Phoenix effective September 30, 1972.
- Upon motion, The Rev. Cray R. Gruber was dismissed to the National Capital Union Presbytery.
- 9. <u>Upon motion</u>, The Rev. James P. Simmons was dismissed to the National Capital Union Presbytery.
- 10. Upon recommendation of the Committee, The Rev. Virgil Jones presented a certificate of honorable retirement to The Rev. Rudolph Garypie.
- 11. Upon motion, Presbytery rescinded the action taken on August 25, 1972, to ordain Mr. James M. McCall September 10, 1972, and approved the ordination on October 15, 1972, at 7:30 p.m., at the same place and with the Administrative Commission previously named.
- 12. Upon motion, The Rev. John Mitchell was appointed moderator of the Birmingham First Church, The Rev. Henry Stenner was appointed moderator of the Brighton Church, and The Rev. Harry Geissinger was appointed moderator of Cherry Hill Church.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

THE GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland.

- 1. The General Council reported for information the following:
 - a. The General Council reported to Presbytery a communication from the Office of the General Assembly, listing ministers removed from office, April 1 June 30, 1972, as follows: Robert Freidank, Joe O. Hawkins, William L. Hogan, Thomas Krenan, Merle W. Leak, Robert H. Loreaux, Jr., David L. Martin, Griffith C. Matthews, Charles E. Tyler, George N. Ward.
 - b. The General Council referred to the Committee on Nominations a letter from The Rev. Harry L. Geissinger, chairman of the Department of Personnel Development, recommending that all personnel now serving in the departments and committees of the Synod of Michigan continue until the Synod of the Covenant is organized but that all present and future vacancies remain unfilled.

- c. The General Council received a letter from Miss Eileen Luther, Youth Advisory Delegate to the 1972 General Assembly, thanking the Presbytery for the privilege of attending the General Assembly.
- d. The General Council referred to the Committee on Nominations the resignation of The Rev. Donald C. Flowers from the Committee on Ministerial Relations and directed the Secretary to write a letter of appreciation for his services.
- e. The General Council referred to the Committee on Nominations the resignation of The Rev. L. Wilson Kilgore as a member and chairman of the Committee on Ministerial Relations and directed the Secretary to write a letter of appreciation for his services.
- f. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures a draft of an overture to the 185th General Assembly suggested by The Rev. Carl G. Howie, with the instruction to report back at the next meeting of the General Council.
- g. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures a communication from The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman, Jr., withdrawing his protest. (see Presbytery Minutes 6/6/72 and 6/27/72).
- h. The General Council received financial statements for the Detroit Presbytery Benevolence Fund and the Per Capita Administration Fund for the period ending August 31, 1972, and directed that copies be made available to members of Presbytery upon request.
- i. The General Council authorized the Moderator to appoint a Task Force on Personnel Needs to augment the Committee on Planning and (1) to negotiate with the Synod of the Covenant regarding continuing staff services, and (2) to recommend to General Council a staffing pattern for the Presbytery of Detroit.
- j. General Council received from the Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship a "Statement of Church Giving" by the Central Receiving Agency as of August 31, 1972. (Copies will be available on the literature table at Presbytery.)
- k. The General Council heard the Moderator's appointments to the Special Administrative Commission on Presbytery Boundaries (Presbytery Minutes 8/25/72) as follows: The Rev. John Olert, Jr., chairman, The Rev. Philip R. Magee, The Rev. Richard C. Smith, Elder James Gorden (St. Paul's), Elder Mrs. Mary Lou Harrison (Northbrook).
- The General Council ratified the Moderator's appointment of the following Priorities Analysis Team to serve in the special budget process: The Rev. Richard Milford, The Rev. John Quick, The Rev. James Anderson, Elder Donald Hanson (Village), Elder Myra Krueger (Church of Our Saviour).
- m. The General Council elected a Budget Committee to serve in the special budget process as follows: Elder Eleanor Leigh, chairwoman, The Rev. LeRoy J. Peterson, Elder Gordon Robertson (Kirk in the Hills).
- n. The General Council approved a proposal that the minutes of the June meeting of Presbytery be sent with the first mailing to Presbytery after that meeting (where practical) but in no event later than three weeks after that meeting.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery discharged the following Administrative Commissions:
 a. The installation of Deirn Geard at Crossroads Church, June 25, 1972; and
 b. The ordination of James Russell at Redford Church, September 10, 1972.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, the Winchester Village Church was exempted from payment of its balance of \$150 due on the 1971 per capita apportionment.
- 4. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the report of the Task Force on Presbytery Boundaries of the Synod of the Covenant as approved/the Organizing Commission.
- 5. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery adopted the following recommendations of the Task Force on Boundaries:
 - a. That the changes in Presbytery boundaries proposed in this report of the Presbytery Boundaries Task Force be approved.

- b. That the timeline adopted in June 1972 by the three Synods be reaffirmed.
- c. That the following overture to the General Assembly Commission on Presbytery Boundaries be approved.
- d. That a resolution expressing approval of the overture be forwarded to the Chairman of the Presbytery Boundaries Task Force (Synod of the Covenant) not later than November 15, 1972.
- 6. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the report of the Special Committee on Interim Staff Services as follows:

The Interim Staff Services Committee recommends that the Presbytery invite Dr. Robert Yolton to serve as Interim Executive beginning January 1, 1973 for a three-month period (renewal if necessary). The terms of the contract would be as follows: salary \$1,550 per month, reimbursement for car used in Presbytery business at 10¢ per mile (or provide a leased car); full expense allowance for Presbytery business; the New York Life Medical/Hospital Plan and full pension contingent on the concurrence of the Synod of the Covenant. The Interim Staff Services Committee is willing to remain constituted to operate the office during November and December, 1972, and for consultation purposes, during the interim service of Dr. Yolton in 1973.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report as a whole.

THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. MacKay Taylor.

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery authorized the Eastminster United Presbyterian Church of Detroit to renew a leased granted to Standard Federal Savings and Loan Association on four lots of church property for the site of a branch office under the terms of the original lease.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted preliminary permission to St. Paul's United Presbyterian Church of Livonia to sell its lot located on Cavell Avenue.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery authorized the Committee on National Missions to extend for five years, the following Board of National Missions loans: \$10,000 Restoration Fund Grant #26 for \$10,000 and War Service Unit Grant #59 for \$10,000 on Church of the Master property.
- 4. The Committee reported that The Rev. Jeffrey Goldsmith has begun his work in Canton Township as the organizing pastor of the new church development there. The name for the new congregation is to be the Geneva United Presbyterian Church.
- 5. The Committee reported that the name for the new congregation to be developed at the former location of the Knox Congregation (Dickerson at Mack Avenue, Detroit) is to be the Church of the Open Door.
- 6. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to First Presbyterian Church, Pontiac, to place on the open market for sale the church's two manses, located at 30 Ogemaw, Pontiac, and 424 West Iroquois, Pontiac.
- 7. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted preliminary permission to the First Presbyterian Church, Pontiac, to purchase another manse.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report as a whole.

THE COMMITTEE ON INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP reported through the chairman, The Rev. Thomas D. Kennedy.

1. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery asked that each church spread on its session minutes its response to the new religious magazine A.D., and that a copy of that response be forwarded to the Stated Clerk of Presbytery.

THE COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS reported through The Rev. Robert Sawyer.

1. Upon motion, Presbytery elected The Rev. William F. Whitledge to serve as chairman of the Committee on Ministerial Relations for the remainder of 1972.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery received the report of the Committee on Aging, and approved individually its recommendations, as follows:
 - a. That the Commission on Aging be retained as a "Type I" agency, as in its present status.
 - b. That the Commission on Aging be given the responsibility for the Nutrition for the Elderly Program (Title VII).
 - c. That a copy of these recommendations be communicated to the Governor and the Chairman of the Subcommittee on Social Services of the House Appropriations Committee, Mr. Raymond Kehres.
- 2. The Stated Clerk reported that because of the number of applications on hand, Presbyterian Village will suspend the receiving of applications after October 31, 1972.

PROGRAM REPORTS

1. THE COMMITTEE ON INTERRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP reported further through the chairman, The Rev. Thomas D. Kennedy. He called attention to the several items covered in their printed report and also emphasized the significance of the Statement of Church Giving through August 31, 1972.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was received.



David Abbott to become associate pastor, effective November 1, 1972, with the following terms: salary \$8,250, car allowance \$1,000, housing allowance \$2,600, 15% pension, Synod hospitalization, one month vacation, two weeks study leave and fees and annual review; heard from a representative of the congregation, Elder Ben Hylkema; and placed the call in Mr. Abbott's hands.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the call of the Ecorse Church to The Rev. John D. Bartko to become pastor effective December 3, 1972, with the following terms: salary \$9,000, manse, paid utilities except private phone, car allowance \$1,000, 15% pension, four weeks vacation, two weeks study leave with partial expenses, hospitalization, time for General Assembly and Synod, moving expenses and annual review; forwarded the call to the Presbytery of Cincinnati with the request that the Presbytery place the call in his hands and dismiss him to the Presbytery of Detroit; and enrolled Mr. Bartko as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit upon receipt of his dismission.



THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. William F. Whitledge.

 A Memorial Minute for The Rev. Samuel Henry Forrer was presented by The Rev. Allan A. Zaun, his successor at Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian Church, Detroit.

The quality of a life is not to be measured merely by the number of years counted off on the calendar, but by personal character and achievement--kindness and compassion--by courage in standing for truth and justice--and by the way in which we offer hope and encouragement to those in need of it. .

The Rev. Dr. Samuel H. Forrer, my esteemed and distinguished predecessor in the pastorate of the Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian Church for 27 years, was such a man.

He was born September 21, 1874 in DeWitt, Arkansas, and died in Lakeland, Florida on November 18, 1972 at the age of 98, after suffering a hip fracture from a fall two weeks earlier. His wife, Louise, to whom he was married in 1904, died three years ago. They had no children.

He received the B.A. degree from the College of the Bible, Lexington, Kentucky in 1898, and did graduate work at Boston University and Princeton Theological Seminary. He received the B.D. degree from Princeton Seminary, the Ph.D. degree from Princeton University and the D.D. degree from Alma College.

He was ordained by the Presbytery of New Brunswick (New Jersey) on August 1, 1901, and was received into the Presbytery of Detroit in 1919. His pastorates were in the First Presbyterian Church of Norwalk, Ohio, from 1906 to 1908—and in the Park Presbyterian Church of Erie, Pa. from 1908 to 1918, before being called to the Jefferson Avenue Church in November 1918.

Rich in years, and rich in character, personality, and achievement, he notably exemplified the best qualities of a real man, a gentleman, a scholar, a devoted minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and a faithful servant of the Church for five decades.

He was, by temperament and training, a gentleman of the old school--tall, erect, and dignified in his personal bearing. Conservative in his instincts, wise in the ways of finance and responsible enterprise, he was liberal in his attacks on the injustices of unbridled, rugged capitalism in its worst excesses.

At the same time he did not hesitate to excoriate publicly what he felt were the selfish attitudes of some of the leaders of organized labor. He was for the workingman, for "the

work ethic" rather than "the welfare ethic," but opposed to those power-hungry labor politicians who used the workingman for their own selfish purposes.

Dr. Forrer cared very much about the city of Detroit. He agonized over its problems, and gave strong leadership to those religious, social, and cultural agencies which promoted the city's welfare. He was Moderator of the Detroit Presbytery, President of the Detroit Pastors' Union in 1934 and served as President of the Detroit Council of Churches from 1935 to 1938.

Known as an accomplished golfer, he was modest in his enviable achievements, even gaining the goal dear to the heart of every golfer-- a "hole in one." Golfing for him was a recreation, not a task to be pursued by grim, constant, anxious striving. He did not "press."

Some of his golfing companions have told me of the time when his ball landed in a particularly difficult and exasperating sand trap. Now, laymen golfers of even good character are usually well equipped with choice sulphurous and picturesque expletives for such harrowing occasions.

What would the good doctor say? They waited expectantly. He simply exclaimed, "Well, bless my soul!" That said it all, and they were at liberty to read into it anything they chose.

It was under his leadership that the splendid, beautiful and imposing Cothic structure of the Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian Church was erected in the years 1924 to 1926. Mrs. Horace Dodge, the Russell family, the Berry family, the Newberrys, George Fink and others, were generous benefactors, stimulated by his encouragement of their stewardship.

Due to his wise investments, and some inherited funds, he and Louise Forrer, his gracious wife, were able, after their retirement in 1945, to make gifts to three colleges, and to the Florida Presbyterian Homes in Laleland, in excess of one million dollars.

He was/scholarly and vigorous preacher. His command of the English language, both spoken and written, was unexcelled. He had collected a vast library, and he knew his books from the inside, not merely as impressive wall decorations.

Deeply interested in science in its relation to religion, he saw the vast universe in all its mystery, wonder, and complexity as a proof of the existence of a wise and benevolent Creator. To him it was "the garment of the living God." At the same time he asserted the primacy of man over technology, and insisted that the new discoveries be used for the enrichment of man's true life and of the natural environment.

He served on the Board of Directors of McCormick Theological Seminary of Chicago, of Grove City College in Pennsylvania, and as Chairman of the Board of Directors of Alma College during the especially difficult years of the economic depression of the late twenties and early thirties. As I have already indicated, his concern for the education of youth continued to be strong--in his generous benefactions, and in his constant interest and prayers.

He could be stern, and he could be gentle. He had a fine sense of humor-genial without being "cute," witty without being self-consciously clever. With deft surgical skill he could cut apart a fallacy, but he was always kind, and never descended to personal vituperation.

As a young Chaplain coming out of the Navy 27 years ago, after four years of service in World War II, I accepted the call of this church in December of 1945 with some trepidation. How could one hope to follow capably such a distinguised leader and devoted pastor, already something of a legend in his own time?

He had married young couples, baptized, confirmed, and married their children, and performed the marriages of their grandchildren. He was the strong, dependable leader, the benevolent and wise father-figure.

To his everlasting credit, and my fervent gratitude, as pastoremeritus he moved far enough away to let me do things my own way, albeit, though well-intentioned, those ways were often stumbling and ineffectual. He was not always hovering over my shoulder and interfering. He was not one who taumed us by "the ecclesiastical geriatric strip-tease," in which a clergyman never really retireshere a little, there a little. When he left, he left.

And yet he was always available for wise counsel, and I gladly sought it and benefitted by it. No minister every had a finer predecessor, and I pay hearty tribute to all that he meant to and did for me.

On a number of occasions he and Mrs. Forrer came back to Detroit at our invitation, and these were always times of rich blessing. During the past decade, because of the infirmities of advancing age, they were unable to be with us.

I have kept most of his letters through the years, and they are still a source of joy and encouragement. In conclusion, I quote from one of his last notes, written a year ago on November 24, 1971: "When I see the stack of beautiful birthday cards from you dear people of Jefferson Avenue and read the inspiring sentiments expressed therein, a heart-longing swells within me to grasp your hands and thank you personally. Ninety-eight years forbid the realization of that pleasure. As for me, I am feeling, as President 'Teddy' used to say, 'Bully!'--and I crave for you all 'the blessing of God that maketh rich and addeth no sorrow.'"

This quotation from Proverbs 10:22 was a characteristic phrase and benediction with him: "The blessing of God that maketh rich and addeth no sorrow."

That, in a real way, epitomizes his fine life. He made us "rich" by his generosity, encouragement, and example--both materially and spiritually.

He "added no sorrow." All our sorrows came from other sources. He, as a compassionate, healing minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, bound up our wounds and enabled us to be strong, to rise up, and to fight valiantly where the saints have trod.

He and his dear wife, Louise, are now reunited in heaven--and on the days when he is not playing golf across the verdant fields of Glory, I would be amazed if he were not in deep conversation with Socrates,

or Plato, or Aristotle--St. Paul, or Augustine, or Luther, or Calvin--while still beholding the radiant face of Jesus Christ, his Lord, whom He loved so deeply and served so well.

This, then is my affectionate tribute to a real man of God--Samuel Henry Forrer.

Kendall; forwarded the call to the Presbytery of Cleveland with the request that the Presbytery place the call in his hands and dismiss him to the Presbytery of Detroit; and enrolled Mr. Kettlewell as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit upon receipt of his dismission. Upon motion, Presbytery expressed its appreciation to The Rev. Fred Olert, who has served First Presbyterian Church, Detroit, as interim minister.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the call of the First Presbyterian Church, Farmington to The Rev. Homer Nye to become associate pastor under the following terms: salary \$8,200, manse and utilities, 15% pension, car allowance \$1,250, Synod insurance, one month vacation, two weeks study leave and annual review; heard from a representative of the congregation, Mrs. Ruth Alleban and The Rev. George W. Ramsey; placed the call in Mr. Nye's hands; and named the following special administrative commission to install Mr. Nye on February 4, 1973 at 11 a.m.: Elder Mary Grace Adams (Grosse Pointe Memorial), Elder Dale Johnson (Farmington), Elder Millie Knudsen (University), The Rev. George Ramsey, The Rev. Richard Henderson and The Rev. Alfred Davies.
- 4. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery heard from a representative of the session, Miss Aileen Wright, and The Rev. Edward D. Auchard, and dissolved the assistant pastoral relationship between The Rev. Michael Dunkelberger and the Orchard Lake Church, effective December 16, 1972.
- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the call of the Calvin West Church to The Rev. Michael Dunkelberger to become pastor, effective December 16, 1972 with the following terms: salary \$9,000, manse and utilities, car allowance \$1,200, 15% pension, hospital insurance, one month vacation, two weeks study leave, continuing education allowance \$100, moving expenses and annual review; heard from a representative of the congregation, Elder Lewis R. Rose; placed the call in Mr. Dunkelberger's hands and authorized the Committee on Ministerial Relations to appoint a special administrative commission to install Mr. Dunkelberger.

Richard Hanna to become pastor effective December 17, 1972, with the following terms: salary \$8,500, manse with heat, light and refuse pickup, local phone, car allowance \$1,000, 15% pension, one month vacation, two weeks study leave with \$150 allowance, health insurance \$270, moving expenses and annual review; heard a representative of the congregation, Elder John Scott; forwarded the call to the Presbytery of Newton with the request that the Presbytery place the call in his hands and dismiss him to the Presbytery of Detroit; and enrolled Mr. Hanna as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit upon receipt of his dismission.
- 8. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following administrative commission to install The Rev. John Bartko pastor of Ecorse United Presbyterian Church on December 17, 1972 at 3 p.m.: Elder Mary Grace Adams (Grosse Pointe Memorial), The Rev. Robert Nixon, The Rev. James D. Cole, The Rev. James Conley, Elder Leonard Corns (Ecorse); and enrolled as a corresponding member The Rev. David Lowry of the Presbytery of Cincinnati; and invited The Rev. Joseph Femminineo, St. Francis Xavier Roman Catholic Church, Ecorse, to take part in the service.
- 9. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following administrative commission to install The Rev. David Abbott associate pastor of Dearborn Littlefield Boulevard Church on December 17, 1972 at 10:30 a.m.: Elder Mary Grace Adams (Grosse Pointe Memorial), The Rev. Harry L. Geissinger, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland, The Rev. Samuel C. Weir, and Elder Alan Henry (Littlefield Boulevard Church).
- 10. Upon motion, Presbytery granted the request of the session of the Garden City Church that The Rev. Henry Jones be named Interim Supply on a part-time basis, preaching and two days a week for pastoral service, at a salary of \$175 per week, for three months effective December 1, 1972; and that he be appointed moderator of the session.
- 11. Upon motion, Presbytery granted the request of the session of the Cherry Hill Church, Dearborn, that The Rev. Paul Warren be named Interim Supply for the period December 7, 1972 through June 7, 1973 with a salary of \$1,200 per month, furnished manse and utilities, \$150 per month car allowance and moving expenses to and from Baltimore.
- 12. Upon motion, and by three-fourth vote required by Book of Order 57.041,
 Presbytery appointed The Rev. Richard Reynolds as Stated Supply for Church of
 the Master for a period January 1, 1973 through December 31, 1973 and appointed
 him moderator of the session during that time.
- 13. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the request of The Rev. James E. Kent to demit the ministry under provision of the Book of Order 87.05, contingent upon final action after one year.
- 14. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery dismissed The Rev. Dennis Duling to the Presbytery of Boston.
- 15. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the following Overture to the 185th General Assembly:

Whereas Presbyterian Law for the Presbytery has been changed, to wit:

- The 1970-71 edition states, "The service of installation is a function of the church and the date of installation should be determined by the session in consultation with the moderator of presbytery" (p. 100a);
- The 1971-72 edition states that the assistant pastoral relation in churches is instituted by "a service of installation by the presbytery" (p. 11a); and

Whereas the Form of Government appears not to be consistent, to wit:

- 1. XX, 12 includes assistant pastors with pastors and associate pastors to be installed, but
- 2. XX, 12 does not specifically state that the installation is by the presbytery; and
- 3. XX, 1 (paragraph 4) does not mention installation and
- 4. XX, 15 does not include assistant pastors among those greeted after the installation.

Therefore,

The Presbytery of Detroit, meeting November 28, 1972, at St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Livonia, Michigan, respectfully overtures the 185th General Assembly (1973):

- To direct that assistant pastors shall or shall not, be installed by presbyteries under the provisions of the Form of Government as they now stand, and
- To send down to the presbyteries for their affirmative or negative votes an overture which will bring into conformity with each other the above-cited sections of the Form of Government, and any others related to the installation of assistant pastors.
- 16. Compensation Guidelines (Paper H) for the Presbytery were emphasized, and it was noted that the \$7,500 minimum salary is now adjusted to \$7,800, reflecting a
 4% cost of living rise. (cf. Minutes, 9/28/71, p.4)
 Jpon motion, thereport as a whole was approved.

By common consent, Presbytery agreed to her proposal that the election be held on portions of the report as recorded below and that, where additional nominations were made to create a contest, the vote should be deferred for specific action.

Upon motion, Presbytery elected The Rev. William F. Whitledge as Moderator.

Upon motion, Presbytery elected The Rev. LeRoy J. Peterson as Vice-Moderator.

Upon motion, Presbytery elected the regular members of the General Council named above.

Upon motion, Presbytery elected The Rev. Ronald P. Miller as Assistant Recording

Clerk and all chairmen as recommended, with the exception of the Committee on

Chaplains and Service Personnel.

The Rev. Robert L Bowman was placed in nomination for the Commiffee on Chaplains and Service Personnel.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery voted by a show of hands and elected The Rev. Rondell B Shaw as chairman of that committee.

Upon motion, Presbytery elected the Committee members named above except those nominated to the Committee on Ministerial Relations and the Committee on Religion and Race. The name of The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman was placed in nomination for the Committee on Ministerial Relations, Class of 1975.

Upon motion, Presbytery voted by show of hands, with commissioners voting for two of the three minister candidates in the Class of 1975 of the Committee on Ministerial Kelations, excluding The Rev. Richard Milford who was earlier elected chairman. As a result of the vote the Moderator declared The Rev. Robert Sanders (183) votes) and The Rev. Richard Williams (168 votes) elected, The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman having received 69 votes.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery elected the other nominees to the Committee on Ministerial Relations.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery suspended the rules to permit an additional ruling elder in place of a minister, and elected the nominees named above to the Committee on Religion and Race.

THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. MacKay Taylor.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the First Presbyterian Church of Pontiac permission to purchase the house located at 4981 Shoreline Blvd. in Waterford Township, Oakland County for \$50,000 cash.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the legal section of the report.

GENERAL COUNCIL continued its report through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland.

- 1. The General Council reported for information the following:
 - a. The General Council reported to Presbytery a communication from the Office of the General Assembly, listing ministers removed from office, July 1-September 30, 1972, as follows: Richard A. Brown, C. Wesley Cannom, Andrew L. Hite, Donald Jackson, David John Keyser, William T. Lovick, John B. Maurer, John K. Mills, Randolph A. Benton.
 - b. The General Council reported to Presbytery that the Presbyterian Historical Society has announced a program to honor American Presbyterian/Reformed historical sites and has provided applications for interested parties, the information being on file in the Stated Clerk's office; the General Council will review the matter further in two months.

- c. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures an overture from the Presbytery of Saint Andrew dealing with the expenses of Youth Advisory Delegates, and an overture from the Presbytery of Kiskiminetas dealing with the location of national offices in New York City.
- d. The General Council referred to the Special Commission on Presbytery Boundaries and the Treasurer an invitation from the Synod of the Covenant's Task Force on Presbytery Boundaries and Reorganization bearing on the collection of 1973 per capita apportionments.
- e. The General Council referred to the Committee on Ecumenical Relations with power to act a communication from the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches asking that a representative be named to its Committee on Business Affairs.
- f. The General Council reported to Presbytery a communication from The Rev. Donald G. Lester, soliciting applicants for the position of Executive Presbytery in Presbytery "B".
- g. The General Council heard a report of the Special Administrative Commission on Presbytery Boundaries, reporting on progress made and on plans for a meeting November 20, 1972 with representatives of the three other presbyteries, to prepare for the transfer of churches and ministers January 1, 1973.
- h. The General Council elected as a third representative to the Synod of the Covenant's Consultation on Staff Needs The Rev. Richard J. Milford, completing the representation requested.
- i. The General Council heard the Moderator's report on progress in developing a committee to carry forward the candidacy of The Rev. Carl G. Howie for Moderator of the General Assembly; left it to the committee when constituted, to present budget requests, if necessary; expressed its enthusiasm for the candidacy of Dr. Howie and informed Presbytery of its intent to make every possible effort to carry it forward.
- j. The General Council participated in the Budget Development Process approved. by Presbytery June 27, 1972. The Rev. Richard J. Milford reported for the Priorities Analysis Team, outlining its progress and sharing a number of observations, and Elder Eleanor Leigh reported for the Special Budget Committee, setting forth its progress with comments.
- k. The General Council heard a preliminary report from the Committee on Planning on a proposed reorganization of Presbytery and approved a Pre-Presbytery Conference to solicit suggestions for the further development of the proposal.
 - The General Council heard the report of the Bills and Overtures Committee that it has taken "no action" on an overture referred to it relative to the location of the General Assembly Agencies.
- m. The General Council asked the Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship to distribute to Presbytery a report of church giving through the Central Receiving Agency, dated October 31, 1972.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the reorganization of the Presbytery Council of United Presbyterian Men by adopting the following resolution:

Whereas: All General Assembly agencies are being restructured in organization in accordance with Overture H (1970)

Whereas: United Presbyterian Men is being restructured at the National Council and Synod Council levels,

Whereas: A new program base of Mational Council of United Presbyterian Men was adopted at the 24th annual meeting held at St. Louis, Mo., March 17th to March 19th, 1972, and includes the following purposes:

- 1. Deepening the faith within the Christian community,
- 2. Developing communication among the laity,
- 3. Recruiting lay people for special tasks and volunteer services,
- 4. Training lay leadership,
- 5. Initiating programs and projects of special interest and value to laymen,
- 6. Interpreting and supporting the mission of the Church,
- 7. Making effective response to the urgent needs of society.

Be it therefore resolved:

That in order to comply with the new structural and organizational changes, the Presbytery of Detroit hereby appoints the following men to serve as a pro tem Organizing Council for the Detroit Council of United Presbyterian Men, authorizing them to reorganize the Presbytery Council of United Presbyterian Men and to contact each church within the Detroit Presbytery, to secure one representative, with such persons being appointed to meet together and elect an official committee to be known as the Detroit Presbytery Council of United Presbyterian Men: James Mirk, George Johns, James McIntyre, Richard Reese, Alvin Coleman, Robert Swirles, Robert McKenna, Gary Pride, H. Franklin Brown and Melvin Stockwell.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report as a whole.

The Presbytery in October instructed the Moderator to consult with Dr. Howie and to appoint a committee to carry forward his candidacy. For the information of Presbytery, the Moderator has named the following persons to that committee: The Rev. John K. Mitchell, chairman, The Rev. James Cannon, The Rev. Richard C. Dunkelberger, The Rev. James Russell, Mrs. Mary Grace Adams, Mr. George E. Bushnell, Jr., Mrs. Freida Greene, Mr. Mayford Roark

Lost was a motion to instruct the General Council to direct the Committee on Planning to cease in its activities to prepare a plan to reorganize this Presbytery.

POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

THE COMMITTEE ON ECUMENICAL RELATIONS presented its report through the chairman, The Rev. William Colwell. This dealt with the Study Draft of A Plan of Union with the Presbytery Church in the U.S.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery received the report and adopted its recommendations, a motion being lost to amend by deletion of Article 11 of the Covenants of Agreement, as follows:

The Committee on Ecumenical Relations recommends that:

- I. The Presbytery of Detroit recommends that each session provide occasions to use "A Guide" for "The Study Draft A Plan of Union" and urges a reply to the General Assembly.
- II. The Presbytery of Detroit responds to the request of the General Assembly for comments and recommendations on the study draft "A Plan of Union" as follows:

A. Comments that:

- 1. The Joint Committee consider seriously the return to the formal usage of the word "Reunion" instead of the word "Union" in its work.
- 2. The Presbytery is not sure of the wisdom of appointing a "general pastor" 20-1, par. 2 p. 67; requiring regular consultation with each minister 20-2(1) p. 67; and regular consultations with each session under the Chapter on Ministerial Relations.

B. Recommends that:

- 1. Article 14, p. 17 on congregations electing not to enter the new Church be rewritten to maintain our presbyterian-connectional system which recognizes that "The presbytery has power:...(8) to receive and dismiss churches. (9) to dissolve churches." If special attention needs to be called to these historic powers, the exercise of this power should be voluntary on the part of the presbyteries and subject to the whole review process of the Church.
- 2. Article 15 and 16, p. 19 on the division of presbytery and synod property to congregations leaving the Church be deleted from the Plan.
- 3. Article 17, p. 20 on ministers electing not to enter the new Church be rewritten to maintain the historic powers of the presbytery to "receive and dismiss" any minister at its discretion.
- 4. The definition of the Constitution on p. 29 be brought into conformity with the listing of p. 24 so that the new Church does not have three (3) Forms of Government and three (3) Directories for Worship.
- 5. Chapter 5-4, p. 34 on the purpose of the annual meeting of the congregation be rewritten deleting judicatory functions so as to recognize the session as the sole local judicatory as listed in Chapter 13-5, p. 46, Chapter 14-7 (9), p. 49, and Chapter 3 #103-2, p. 102.
- 6. Chapter 12-6, p. 44 regarding moderators be rewritten allowing higher judicatories to determine the terms of service of their moderators.
- 7. Chapter 12, pp. 44-5 or some other appropriate Chapter provide for the incorporation of higher judicatories under civil law.
- 8. The Joint Committee revise the Plan in the light of the work of reorganization currently underway in both Churches and include in the next Draft chapters on:
 - a. General Councils including the General Assembly Mission Council;
 - b. Committees on Nominations including all higher judicatories.
- 9. The Joint Committee revise the Plan replacing the current "The Rules of Discipline" taken over verbatim from the UPCUSA "Proposed Book of Discipline" with the new UPCUSA "Book of Church Discipline" as approved by the 184th (1972) General Assembly and currently before the presbyteries for overture consideration, with one major addition that the Chapter on General Administrative Review provide for the work review of all "councils" in the listing there.

PROGRAM REPORTS

THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM presented its report through The Rev. Harold H. McConnell, Jr. He in turn introduced The Rev. Douglas A. Patton to speak about the Key 73 program. Mr. McConnell concluded the report.

Jpon motion, the report was received.

THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. MacKay Taylor, who introduced Mrs. Erma Henderson, Executive Director of the Equal Justice Council. The report was continued by The Rev. James A. Cannon of the Subcommittee on Congregational Development, who introduced representatives of three new church development projects begun during the current year--St. Thomas, Geneva, and the Church of the Open Door.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was received.

Upon motion, Presbytery recorded its appreciation of Mrs. Erma Henderson's remarks and our gratification that she has been elected to the Detroit Common Council.



THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through its chairman, The Rev. MacKay Taylor.

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery granted the Calvin Presbyterian Church of 14221
 Southfield Road, Detroit, Michigan, permission to purchase the house located
 at 15330 Piedmont, Detroit, Michigan for \$30,000; and further, authorized
 the church to borrow \$24,000 by means of a twenty-year mortgage from a local
 bank to finance the purchase.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the final building and finance plans of the Broadstreet United Presbyterian Church of Detroit, Michigan; authorized the church to borrow a first-mortgage loan up to \$25,000 from the First Independence Bank of Detroit which is to be repaid over seven years at an 8% rate of interest; and further authorized the church to borrow a total of \$95,000 from the Board of National Missions of the United Presbyterian Church by means of (1) a \$20,000 loan which requires no interest or principal payments for the first five years but has 2% accruing interest and which permits renegotiation of terms at the end of the fifth year and (2) a \$75,000 loan which is to be repaid over 17 years as follows: 2% interest only during the first seven years and 4% interest plus principal during the final ten years.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery requested the General Council to develop policies regarding the Validated Special Opportunities portion of the budget.

- 1. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery dissolved The Rev. Richard W. Bauer's Associate Executive relationship with the Presbytery of Detroit and approved his invitation from the General Assembly Mission Council to become Associate Director, effective January 2, 1973.
 - Mr. Whitledge then addressed Mr. Bauer on behalf of the Presbytery and presented a token of the Presbytery's appreciation.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the following Administrative Commission to install The Rev. Michael Dunkelberger pastor of Calvin West Presbyterian Church on Sunday, January 14, 1973 at 7 p.m.: The Rev. William Whitledge, The Rev. Richard Dunkelberger, The Rev. Carl Howie; The Rev. Henry Jones, Elder Gene Smaltz (Orchard Lake), Elder Lewis Rose (Calvin West); and enrolled as a corresponding member The Rev. Richard Mitchell, member of the Presbytery of Southern Michigan.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the invitation of the session of the Rosedale Gardens Church to The Rev. Donald Robert Elly to become assistant pastor effective March 1, 1973 with the following terms: salary \$8,000, auto allowance \$1,000, manse, conference expenses \$400, Blue Cross/Blue Shield, pension plan 12% paid by the church and 3% by Mr. Elly, two weeks study leave, one month vacation, moving expenses and annual review, forwarded the invitation to the Presbytery of Holston with the request that the presbytery place the invitation in his hands and dismiss him to the Presbytery of Detroit; and enrolled Mr. Elly as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit upon receipt of his dismission.

GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland.

- 1. The General Council reported for information the following:
 - a. The General Council responded to a letter from the General Council of the General Assembly by reaffirming its present instruction to Central Receiving Agency, namely, that the Central Receiving Agency should handle funds according to instructions of the remitting treasurer.
 - b. The General Council received a communication from the session of the White Lake Church asking for relief of the \$371.95 due for the 1972 appportionment, deferred action thereon, and instructed the Secretary to notify the session that the precedent for such relief is not to grant relief within the current year and that it is hoped the session will find it possible ultimately to fulfill this obligation.
 - c. The 1973 Budget Committee was instructed to consider the problem of non-payment of per capita apportionments and to seek ways to deal with the problems related to such situations.
 - d. The General Council received a communication from the Synod of the Covenant's Division of Budget and Finance asking for response to a proposed "Funding Policies" for the Synod and authorized the Moderator to appoint a committee to respond on behalf of General Council by December 15, 1972.
 - e. The General Council directed the Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship to prepare by January 9, 1973 a definitive plan to promote the Validated Special Opportunities along with a basic budget for 1973.
 - f. The General Council asked the 1972 Negotiating Team, supplemented by new chairmen where elected, to evaluate the 1973 Budget Process and Priorities and to recommend revisions at the February 13, 1973 meeting of the General Council.
 - g. General Council expressed to its retiring Chairman, Mary Grace Adams, its appreciation for her leadership during the past two years.

- h. The General Council received from the Chairman, Mary Grace Adams, a statement of her own feelings concerning her experience and her appreciation to those who have worked with her, and three specific suggestions for future consideration:

 (1) That a newsletter or an inter-church communication of some form be projected;
 - (2) That the worship portion of the Presbytery be participated in by churches unable to entertain Presbytery;
 - (3) That additional consideration be given to the introduction of new clergy to the Presbytery.
 - 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery discharged the following Administrative Commissions:

 a. Installation of David Abbott at Littlefield Boulevard Church, December 17,

 1972:
 - b. Installation of John Bartko at Ecorse Church, December 17, 1972.
 - 3. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the first reading of the following amendment to the Structure and Bylaws of Presbytery:

 (Deletions are shown in parentheses; additions are underscored.)

Article X, Section 2:

- A. At the October meeting the General Council shall nominate (at least one and one-half) the number of ministers required by the General Assembly's quota of minister commissioners and two alternates.
- B. At the October meeting the General Council shall nominate (at least one and one-half) the number of ruling elders required by the General Assembly's quota of elder commissioners and two alternates.
- D. Any additional nominations for minister and ruling elder commissioners shall be made from the floor at the November meeting. Those nominated from the floor shall have previously given their consent to the nomination. Nominations may be closed at any time.
- E. Any additional nominations for minister and ruling elder alternates shall be made at the November meeting. Those nominated from the floor shall have previously given their consent to the nomination.

Article X, Section 4:

- B. (The remaining number of ministers and elders shall constitute the alternates in the order of votes received.) Alternates in the order of (their election) votes received shall fill any vacancy in their respective quotas.
- 4. By consensus, Presbytery accepted the resignation of The Rev. Richard W. Bauer as Associate Executive of the Presbytery, with appreciation for his service and regret at the loss of his leadership, his new position as Associate Director of the General Assembly Mission Council for Planning, Budgeting, and Evaluating, having been approved earlier.
- 5. The Rev. LeRoy J. Peterson presented on behalf of the General Council the Proposed 1973 Unified Budget and accompanying recommendations. (Paper H) The processes used in its development, including the function of the Priority Analysis Team, were interpreted by Mr. Petrson and The Rev. Richard Milford.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the recommendation that in the case of mission responsibilities transferred to the Presbytery of Detroit by the Presbyteries of Grand River and Southern Michigan transferred mission responsibilities will be supported in 1973 by mission reserves transferred from sending presbyteries and by presbytery causes contributions of the churches received, and that any deficit will be met from Presbytery of Detroit mission funds.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery direct that per capita monies received from churches being transferred to the Presbytery of Detroit be used at the rate established by the Presbytery of Detroit for 1973 and that any balance received be deposited in per capita reserves for future use.



- 1. The General Council reported for information the following:
 - a. The General Council referred to the Committee on Evangelism a communication from the Division of Evangelism, reporting on the Evangelism Associates' Program.

- b. The General Council referred to the Committee on Nominations a communication from the Synod of the Covenant relative to Presbytery representation on Synod Units for 1973.
- c. The General Council received as information a communication from the Presbytery of Solomon endorsing Dr. Henry W. Anderson for Moderator of the 1973 General Assembly.
- d. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures an overture to the 185th General Assembly from the Presbytery of Kiskiminetas, on the subject of centrally locating the meetings of the General Assembly, changing the time of the year and site, and reducing administrative expenses.
- e. The General Council referred to the Committee on Ecumenical Relations an overture to the 185th General Assembly from Pittsburgh Presbytery, upholding the action of the 184th General Assembly to withdraw from COCU; and requested the committee to make copies of the overture available to Detroit's commissioners to the General Assembly.
- f. The General Council postponed appointment of the General Council's Budget Committee, pending an evaluation report on the 1973 Budget Process.
- g. The General Council approved the Moderator's appointments to the Committee on Planning for 1973 as follows: The Rev. Donald Wright, Chairman, Elder Mrs. Mary Grace Adams, The Rev. Eldon Beery, Elder Mrs. Roberta Cottman, Elder Mr. Aarne Frobom, The Rev. Harry Geissinger, Elder Mrs. Eleanor Leigh, The Rev. George Ramsey, Elder Mr. Michael Rosenberger, and Mrs. Katherine Vernon.
- h. The General Council approved the Moderator's appointments to its Special Nominating Committee as follows: Elder Mrs. Mary Grace Adams, Chairwoman, The Rev. Jeffrey Goldsmith, The Rev. Lawrence Glenn, The Rev. Chase Hunt, The Rev. Frank Marvin.
- i. The General Council reaffirmed the need for reorganization of the Presbytery and authorized the Planning Committee to present its Proposed Plan for discussion at the January meeting of Presbytery, anticipating action at the February meetings of the General Council and the Presbytery.
- j. The General Council authorized the Task Force on Personnel Needs to negotiate with the Synod of the Covenant on the basis of the "Rationale for Staffing" and "Description of Executive Presbyter."
- k. The General Council authorized the Chairman of the General Council to appoint a Special Committee with authority to report direct to the Presbytery January 23, 1973, to nominate a Special Nominating Committee to Nominate an Executive Presbyter, as required by the Book of Order 69.02.
- 1. The General Council approved the plans of the Interpretation and Stewardship Committee for the promotion of Presbytery Causes and Validated Special Opportunities in 1973 as follows:
 - (1) Presentation of tape with turnover charts for local sessions and women's associations, ten minutes in length--made by clerk of session or visitor from Presbytery, including total needs of General Assembly, Synod, Presbytery, Presbytery Validated Opportunities, special offerings.
 - (2) Speakers.
 - (3) Every Presbytery meeting 5 minutes interpretation of mission report early on the docket and short.
 - (4) Use of other aids, such as:
 - Descriptive booklet, one page interpretation for each Presbytery project (already budgeted in 1973)
 - Written Presbytery "minutes for mission" each month or alternate months
 - Poster-picture distribution for church bulletin boards
 - Possible minute for mission cassettes.

- (5) Encourage clusters to focus on part of the Presbytery Causes package, not all of it.
- (6) Individual support of the Special Validated Opportunities and selected portions of the regular budget not to exceed the expected 10% deficit.
- m. The General Council granted ten minutes on the docket of the February meeting of Presbytery to hear The Rev. Frank Gillespie, representative of A.D. Magazine.
- n. The General Council allotted five minutes early in the docket of each meeting of the Presbytery during 1973 to the Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship for mission interpretation.
- o. The General Council continued its Special Task Force on Personnel Needs.
- p. The General Council heard a report that Fort Street Church plans to apply for the historical sites designation of the General Assembly's Department of History and instructed the Secretary to urge at least Detroit, First Church and Sashabaw Church to consider applying also.
- q. The General Council referred the formalizing of policies related to Validated Special Opportunities to the 1974 Budget Committee, when appointed.
- r. The General Council empowered the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit to convene its commissioners and to invite the commissioners of other Michigan presbyteries to participate in an orientation meeting preparatory to the 1973 General Assembly.
- s. The General Council authorized the Treasurer to make application for National Bank of Detroit Master Charge cards for Presbytery of Detroit staff.
- t. The General Council received a communication from the Session of the First Presbyterian Church of Royal Oak, protesting certain actions of Presbytery on November 28, 1972, and referred it to the Committee on Ministerial Relations.
- u. The General Council heard a report on the current occupancy, funding and development plans of Presbyterian Village, by The Rev. Thomas Kirkman, President.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery discharged the following Administrative Commissions:
 - Installation of Michael Dunkelberger at Calvin West Church, January 14, 1973;
 - b. Installation of Richard Hanna at Church of the Atonement, January 14, 1973.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the second reading of the following amendment to the Structure and Bylaws of Presbytery, which was declared adopted:

 (Deletions are shown in parentheses; additions are underscored.)

Article X, Section 2:

- A. At the October meeting the General Council shall nominate (at least one and one-half) the number of ministers required by the General Assembly's quota of minister commissioners and two alternates.
- B. At the October meeting the General Council shall nominate (at least one and one-half) the number of ruling elders required by the General Assembly's quota of elder commissioners and two alternates.
- D. Any additional nominations for minister and ruling elder commissioners shall be made from the floor at the November meeting. Those nominated from the floor shall have previously given their consent to the nomination. Nominations may be closed at any time.

E. Any additional nominations for minister and ruling elder alternates shall be made at the November meeting. Those nominated from the floor shall have previously given their consent to the nomination.

Article X, Section 4:

- B. (The remaining number of ministers and elders shall constitute the alternates in the order of votes received.) Alternates in the order of (their election) votes received shall fill any vacancy in their respective quotas.
- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the following resolutions:
 - (1) RESOLVED: That the Treasurer of Presbytery, as Controller, shall be authorized to consolidate unexpended balances in program funds at the end of each fiscal year, and normally such "salvage" shall accrue to the interest of the whole Presbytery and not be carried forward into the new year. Further, the Treasurer shall be given authority to make individual exceptions, as when a project expected to begin in one year is unavoidably delayed until the beginning of the following year.
 - (2) RESOLVED: That any two of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Stated Clerk, Treasurer and Executive Presbyter of The Presbytery of Detroit, The United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, be and they are authorized and empowered to sign on behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit all deeds, bonds, contracts, releases, acknowledgements, assignments, stock and bond powers and other instruments and legal papers and documents of every character, and all such instruments heretofore or hereafter executed on behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit shall in all respects be valid and effectual and binding on the Presbytery of Detroit for all purposes.
 - (3) RESOLVED: That the Personnel Committee of the Presbytery of Detroit, when requested, may assist Presbytery staff to purchase homes on the basis of the following:
 - (a) The total loan shall not exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), and shall be secured by a first or subordinated mortgage.
 - (b) Interest shall be charged at the rate of five percent (5%) per annum when the funds used for the loan are Presbytery (capital) funds or at the actual rate when the Presbytery must borrow the funds for the loan from commercial sources.
 - (c) The term of the loan shall be negotiated, but at least the interest shall be paid monthly; and
 - (d) The loan, or mortgage debt, shall automatically accelerate and become fully due and payable at the earliest of either event set forth hereunder. In the event that the mortgagor shall have severed his employment relations with the Presbytery of Detroit this indebtedness shall automatically become due within six (6) months from said date of termination of employment or alternatively, in the event that the mortgagor shall ever sell the property mortgaged, then, at the closing of said sale, the indebtedness hereby shall be automatically accelerated and become due and payable at the time of the closing of said sale.

- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery authorized the funding of the Special Committee on the Nomination of The Rev. Carl G. Howie for Moderator of the General Assembly in the amount of \$500, to be drawn from the Presbytery program reserves.
- 6. The Rev. Donald A. Wright, Chairman of the General Council's Committee on Planning, presented for information and discussion "A Proposal for the Reorganization of the Presbytery of Detroit."

Lost was a motion to instruct the Committee on Planning to return next month with two plans for the reorganization of the Presbytery, one with clusters and one without clusters.

Upon motion, Presbytery instructed the Committee to present approximate, estimated costs for staff at the time the proposal is recommended for adoption.

Upon motion, Presbytery extended the docket to hear The Rev. Henry Robinson, III, Coordinator of the Eastside Cluster.

Upon motion, Presbytery received the report of the Committee on Planning.

7. Elder Richard Fernstrum, Chairman, reported for the General Council Task Force on Presbytery Personnel Needs.

Upon motion, Presbytery, following debate and the defeat of amendments to return the "Rationale for Staffing" to the Committee and to strike all references to clusters from that paper, approved the "Rationale for Staffing" and the "Description of Executive Presbyter for the Presbytery of Detroit." (Paper G)



- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery authorized the Knox Presbyterian Church to purchase a 4.87 acre site at Metropolitan Parkway and Crocker Boulevard in Harrison Township, Macomb County for \$76,000 cash.
- 3. The Committee reported for information that the Kirk in the Hills has again made a grant to its Metropolitan Capital Gifts Fund which was established to provide funding for building expansion, capital improvement, repairs and equipment. \$22,324 is available for needy churches through the Committee on National Missions. Information regarding request procedures should be directed to The Rev. James A. Cannon or The Rev. Francis R. Nagy, Jr.

THE COMMITTEE ON RECORDS AND REPORTS reported through the chairman, The Rev. Frank C. Marvin

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following report:

- 1. The Committee on Records and Reports recommends approval of the following session records with the exceptions noted in the reports to the clerks of session:
 - a. Session Minutes of Trumbull Avenue, Woodward Avenue, Southwest Community, Fort Street, Leitch Memorial, Military Avenue.
 - b. Session Minutes and Church Registers of Drayton Avenue, St. John's and Calvary.
- 2. The First Presbyterian Church of Detroit requested and was granted permission to submit their Session Minutes and Church Register at the March meeting of Presbytery.

THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. Richard J. Milford.

1. Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS Detroit Presbytery in its record minutes on April 23, 1938 'found in order and approved the invitation of the National Committee for Industrial Mission to The Reverend Jesse E. Christman to become Associate Director" under terms stated including \$3,000 housing allowance; and

WHEREAS the Internal Revenue Service has challenged that housing allowance as allowable exclusion from taxable income; and

WHEREAS the Internal Revenue Service in disallowing this exclusion, has concluded that The Reverend Mr. Christman was not in fact "assigned or designated" to this post by a religious body constituting his church as required by Treasury regulations; and

WHEREAS this ruling implies that only hierarchical "assigning" or "designating" is valid church action and thus calls in question Presbyterian polity in "approving" the labors of its ministers; and

WHEREAS this ruling thus constitutes a questioning of the validity of Presbytery's action of April 23, 1968; and

WHEREAS this action of Internal Revenue Service places in jeopardy not only Mr. Christman but countless other ministers in this denomination who have been similarly approved for ministerial labor;

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Detroit asserts that where it approves ministerial labor, this approval does constitute an assignment under the laws of this church to a valid gospel ministry; and further

The Presbytery requests the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly to rule on the propriety of Presbytery's actions; and, if he rules affirmatively,

The Presbytery requests the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly to communicate with the Commissioner of Internal Revenue in Washington pressing the Church's position in this matter.

- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the call of the Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, to The Rev. John L. - to the Presbytery of Western Reserve with the request that the Presbytery place the call in his hands and dismiss him to the Presbytery of Detroit; and enrolled Mr. Pierson as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit upon receipt of his dismission certificate.
- 6. Upon motion, Presbytery heard The Rev. Galen E. Hershey speak on behalf of the Session of the Pontiac First Church; approved the invitation of the Pontiac First Church to Mr. David Rice to become assistant pastor effective June 1, 1973 with the following terms: salary \$7,800, housing allowance \$2,400, car allowance \$1,000, 15% pension, one month vacation, two weeks study leave, moving expenses and annual review; forwarded the invitation to the Presbytery of Eastminster with the request that the invitation be approved, that Mr. Rice be examined for ordination and that he be ordained by the Presbytery of Eastminster and that Mr. Rice be enrolled as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit upon receipt of his dismission certificate.
- 7. Upon motion, Presbytery concurred in the request of the Session of the Evergreen Village Church, and named The Rev. Paul M. Gillis interim pastor on a part-time basis, preaching and doing pastoral services at a salary of \$100 per month, utilities \$60 per month, car allowance \$125 per month, housing allowance \$300 per month and hospitalization \$40 per month effective February 4, 1973.
- 8. Upon motion, Presbytery continued The Rev. Henry Jones as interim supply on a part-time basis at the Garden City Church for an additional three months through May 31, 1973.
- 9. Upon motion, Fresbytery reappointed The Rev. John Stone to serve as stated supply of the Leitch Memorial Church for one year.
- 10. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the call of the Juniata United Presbyterian Church to The Rev. William S. Shirley, effective March 25, 1973; heard The Rev. Horace Thomas speak in appreciation of Mr. Shirley's ministry; and dismissed Mr. Shirley to the Presbytery of Huntingdon with a request that it place the call inhis hands.
- 11. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Elder Robert J. Robbins speak on behalf of the congregation, and The Rev. Eldon F. Beery and The Rev. William F. Whitledge; and approved the request from the congregation of the St. Timothy Church, Livonia, and The Rev. Carl A. Gundersen to dissolve the pastoral relationship existing between them effective April 29, 1973.
- 12. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Elder Herbert Maxwell speak on behalf of the congregation; approved the request from The Rev. George Bretz and the congregation of Outer Drive Church to dissolve the pastoral relationship existing between them effective February 27, 1973; with the Outer Drive Church continuing to pay one-half of Mr. Bretz' salary for two months.
- 13. Upon motion, Presbytery divested The Rev. Donald Drew of the office of ordained minister and erased his name from the roll according to the Book of Order, 87.022 effective February 27, 1973, having received a letter from Mr. Drew renouncing the jurisdiction of the Church.
- 14. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the installation of The Rev. Donald R. Elly as assistant minister at the Rosedale Gardens Church, on Sunday, March 4, 1973, at 11:00 a.m.; and directed that the Moderator of the Presbytery or his designate propound the constitutional questions.
- 15. Upon motion, Presbytery appointed the following Committee of Investigation to investigate the divorce of The Rev. Peter A. Lundell, under the Book of Order 86.02: The Rev. Harry Geissinger, chairman, Mrs. Melba Smith (Dearborn First), Mr. James LoPrete (Detroit, Westminster); and to report back to the Presbytery no later than the May meeting of Presbytery.
- 16. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following shared Welfare Grants with the Board of Pensions for 1973: The Rev. Francis J. Malzard, \$1,500; and The Rev. Arthur M. Boyd, \$2,000.

13617. Upon motion, Presbytery appointed The Rev. Horace L. Thomas, Moderator of the Park United Church, replacing The Rev. John Quick.

All churches that have not submitted Annual Salary Review of Terms of Calls and Contracts were urged to do so as soon as possible so that changes can be reported at the March meeting of Presbytery. Additional forms can be obtained from the Presbytery Office.

Upon motion, the report was approved.

THE GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland.

- 1. The General Council presented for information the following:
 - a. The General Council presents to Presbytery the following ministers removed from office October 1, 1972 December 31, 1972: James Akin, William Bowen, Lloyd Brown, Ann Cordray, Robert Hendrix, Roy Hess, Bobby Jones, William Keeney, William Kuhen, Barton Leach, Donald Metz, Willard Moser, Eugene Smith, Robert Stevenson, Willis Stoesz, Norman Taylor, M. A. Whelchel.
 - b. The General Council referred to the Committee on Nominations and the Organizing Council for the Detroit Council of United Presbyterian Men a notice from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly that the Presbytery of Detroit is to elect five laymen to membership on the National Council of United Presbyterian Men for a three-year term, beginning April 6, 1973.
 - c. The General Council referred to the Trustees and the Committee on Church and Society a communication from the General Assembly's Consulting Committee on Social Responsibility through Investment, asking that Presbytery request employment data of the corporations in which it owns stock.
 - d. The General Council reports to Presbytery that information is on file in the Stated Clerk's office from the Office of Financial Aid for Studies of the General Assembly's Vocation Agency detailing the church's Educational Assistance Program for 1973.
 - e. The General Council reported to Presbytery and filed in the Stated Clerk's office a communication from Synod's Division of Staff Services, submitting job descriptions and dossier supplements for all core positions in the Synod of the Covenant; and asking that the names of qualified persons be submitted to The Rev. David Cull (318 West Kentucky St., Louisville, Kentucky 40203), especially of minority persons and women.
 - f. The General Council reports to Presbytery an announcement from Synod's Division of Planning, announcing that an orientation for Commissioners to the General Assembly will be held on an area basis in late April or early May.
 - g. The General Council referred to the Committee on Planning a letter from The Rev. Ray H. Kiely, expressing concern that so much is included in the docket of Presbytery and the hope that there will be sufficient dialogue related to proposed restructuring; and directed the Committee on Planning to report back to General Council its plans to implement such dialogue. (see Item t)
 - h. The General Council received from the Session of the St. Clair Shores, Lake Shore Church, a letter expressing concern for the future ministry of The Rev. William Shirley.
 - i. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures, from the Presbytery of Philadelphia, overtures to the 185th General Assembly (1973) (1) retaining the intention of Overture C from the 184th General Assembly but including considerations other than the use of fair employment practices, (2) asking that the per capita apportionment not be increased and that a representative review committee consider ways to reduce these administrative costs, and (3) proposing a chapter for the Form of Government on "Of Compensation in the Church."

- j. The General Council reports that the Presbytery of Philadelphia has endorsed The Rev. Benjamin J. Anderson for Moderator of the 185th General Assembly.
- k. The General Council reports to Presbytery that the Presbytery of San Gabriel has endorsed The Rev. Eugene Carson Blake for Moderator of the 185th General Assembly.
- 1. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures from the Presbytery of Chippewa an overture to the 185th General Assembly, asking that a method of funding other than an assessment of membership count be devised.
- m. The General Council referred to the Committee on Planning "A Proposal Concerning the Reorganization of the Presbytery of Detroit," directed to All Ministers and Sessions of the Presbytery of Detroit by The Rev. LeRoy J. Peterson.
- n. The General Council referred to the Committee on Planning a communication from Mr. S. Sidney Newhouse, for the Executive Committee of the Eastside Presbyterian Cluster, requesting that final action on the reorganization of Presbytery not be scheduled for the February meeting of Presbytery.
- o. The General Council referred to the Committee on Church and Society a letter from The Rev. Allen B. Rice II, Director, Michigan IMPACT (Box 212, Lansing, Michigan 48902), a group organized to play an active role in the determining of public policy, offering to extend IMPACT services to interested churches in Presbytery for a six-week trial period without charge.
- p. The General Council reviewed the Stated Clerk's annual Statistical Summary of the Presbytery of Detroit for 1972 which is attached.
- q. The General Council reports that the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly has announced that representation at the 185th General Assembly will be based on the membership of the presbyteries as of December 31, 1972, (prior to the addition of new churches) and therefore the Fresbytery of Detroit will be represented by 9 minister and 9 ruling elder commissioners. The 10th minister and the 10th ruling elder in the November 28, 1972 ballotting will therefore become first alternates.
- r. The General Council, in accord with Presbytery action March 23, 1971, presents the attached revised listing for Equalization of Elder Commissioner Attendance at Presbytery for the period of March 1973 February 1974.
- s. The General Council presents the Treasurer's Tentative Report of the Benevolence Fund and the Per Capita Administration Fund as of December 31, 1972, which are attached.
- t. The General Council approved the recommendation of the Committee on Planning that action on the Plan for Reorganization presented at the January meeting of Presbytery be postponed until the committee can complete a revision; and granted permission to the committee to hold eight area meetings for the purpose of presenting the plan and hearing and receiving suggestions and recommendations from the presbyters, the meeting to be open to all members in the various areas, but minister and elder commissioners to Presbytery specifically invited.
- u. The General Council authorized the Committee on Christian Education to form a Task Force on United Ministries in Higher Education to do the following: (1) consider Presbytery's relationship to Synod's Committee on Synod Ministries; (2) relationship to Michigan Commission on UMHE; (3) relationship to local units we support; (4) other matters that would appropriately fall to such a task force; the Task Force to be under the Committee on Christian Education of the Presbytery of Detroit.

- v. The General Council referred to the Committee on Nominations two vacancies on the Committee on Religion and Race created by the resignation of The Rev. Henry Jones and The Rev. George Bretz.
- w. The General Council directed the Budget Committee, when appointed, to study the need for mileage reimbursement for attendance at committee meetings.
- x. The General Council heard a report from the Committee on Ministerial Relations on its consideration of the communication from the Session of the First Presbyterian Church, Royal Oak, referred the matter back to the Committee, instructed the Committee to initiate contact with the Session for dialogue on the Session's concerns, and instructed the Committee to report back to the General Council.
- y. The General Council adopted the following procedure to govern the seating of commissioners and visitors at the meetings of Presbytery:
 - (1) Commissioners shall be seated in a designated area at the front of the nave, and visitors shall be seated at the rear and/or in the balcony; and
 - (2) only commissioners seated in the designated area shall be recognized by the Moderator.
- z. The General Council by common agreement commended the work of the Interpretation and Stewardship and Evangelism Committees.
- aa. The General Council referred to the Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship for study and response to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly the proposed revision for reporting the membership and finances of each congregation published in the statistical volume of the Minutes of the General Assembly.

<u>Lost</u> was a motion to suspend and refer back the action of General Council (Item y above) governing the seating of commissioners and visitors at the meetings of Presbytery.

- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery discharged the following administrative commissions:
 a. Administrative Commission on Presbytery Boundaries;
 - b. Installation of Kenneth Kettlewell at Detroit First Church, January 28, 1973.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the following policy: That Presbytery remit Synod and General Assembly per capita apportionments in the same percentage as received from churches; and that General Assembly commissioners be assured that their per diem will be met in full by Presbytery, if reduced by the General Assembly.
- 4. THE SPECIAL NOMINATING COMMITTEE reported through the chairperson, Elder Mary Grace Adams, the following items:
 - a. Mrs. Adams described the guidelines of selection and placed in nomination as Youth Advisory Delegates to the 185th General Assembly (1973) the following:

Keith Lyden Lindsey (Ann Arbor First) Principal
David James Tyler (St. Clair Shores, Faith) First Alternate
Barbara Ann Jones (Allen Park United) Second Alternate
Upon motion, Presbytery elected those named by a unanimous ballot.

b. To correct an omission at the time of the election of chairman of committees for the current (1973) year at the November 1972 meeting of Presbytery, Mrs. Adams placed in nomination for Chairman of the Committee on Nominations, The Rev. Paul H. Sutton.

Lost by voice vote and division of the house was a Motion to allow

questions to be addressed to the nominee.

Upon motion, there being no nominations from the floor, nominations

<u>Upon motion</u>, there being no nominations from the floor, nominations were closed and the Clerk was instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for the candidate. (See also Miscellaneous Business, Item 1.)

The Rev. Thomas Kirkman entered a protest against the action of Presbytery under Book of Order 91.02 and requested that his negative vote on the above motion be recorded.

Upon motion, the report of the General Council as a whole was approved.

POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

The Vice-Moderator took the chair.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY reported through the chairman, The Rev.

David W. Abbott who stated the three basic responsibilities of the committee; encouraged subscription to IMPACT, a legislative information-action service available to churches and inviduals; and recommended for adoption the following Endorsement Statement Against the Cut-Off of Federal Housing Funds:

"That Presbytery endorses the statement of the Michigan Emergency Committee Against the Housing Cut-Off on the Cut-Off of Federal Funds for Low-and-Moderate Income Housing (Paper N); and encourages the Michigan Emergency Committee Against the Housing Cut-Off to work for the development of adequate housing programs at state and local levels; and supports the efforts of the Michigan Committee on Law and Housing in this field."

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery endorsed the above statement; and heard Mr. Harold Varner from the Detroit Housing Commission speak to the issue of housing needs in Detroit.

<u>Upon motion</u>, from the floor, Presbytery added a further paragraph to the Endorsement Statement Against the Cut-Off of Federal Housing Funds, as follows:

"In addition we call upon our elected officials to take the appropriate actions to release the necessary Federal Funds to provide for the construction and rehabilitation of housing for low income families to provide for the construction of public housing for senior citizens and for young families and to provide for rent supplements for families of limited incomes. We also request that these funds for subsidized housing be spent not only in the central cities but also in the suburban communities surrounding the central cities so as to insure an equitable distribution of housing types and income levels within each of the suburbs of the entire metropolitan area."

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

- 1. The Vice-Moderator was called upon from the floor to decide a question of order with regard to the propriety of a unanimous vote in the previous election of The Rev. Paul H. Sutton as Chairman of the Committee on Nominations when in fact negative votes were received.
 - The Moderator ruled that motion improperly put and therefore out of order.

 <u>Upon motion</u>, the ruling of the Moderator was sustained.

 The questions was recalled.
 - <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery elected The Rev. Paul H. Sutton as Chairman of the Committee on Nominations for 1973 by elective ballot, without jeopardy to the protest and negative vote of The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman recorded above.
- 2. THE COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS reporting through the Chairman, The Rev. Paul H. Sutton, placed in nomination from Presbytery Elder Richard Parks to Synod's Division of Budget and Finance.
 - <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery elected Mr. Parks, there being no nominations from the floor.

PROGRAM REPORTS

The Moderator resumed the chair.

- 1. THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS continued its report. The Rev. Paul E. Johnson introduced Mr. Joseph Sainz and Mr. Gerry Arango who spoke concerning the "W.H.I.P." project conducted in Southwest Detroit, aimed at training youth in the skills of community work as an expression of their commitment to Christ.
- 2. THE COMMITTEE ON INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP reported through the Chairman, The Rev. James O. Banks, who called attention to the One Great Hour of Sharing Mini-Theatre running in the chapel; encouraged the early return of self-allocation forms; announced the second Stewardship Conference for local congregations to be held at the Calvin East Church, Saturday, March 31, 1973, 10:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. ; and introduced The Rev. Franklin Gillespie national staff representative for A.D. magazine, who spoke concerning the magazine as a tool of the church and offered his personal services to the churches wishing consultation.
- THE COMMITTEE ON RADIO AND TELEVISION reported through the Chairman, The Rev. Chase Hunt who introduced The Rev. Edward Willingham of the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches Department of Radio and Television. Mr. Willingham reported on the work of the Department and showed a series of television spot announcements. Upon motion, Presbytery received the report.
- 4. By common consent Presbytery extended the docket to hear Elder James Mirk give a report of progress on the reactivation of the Detroit Council of Presbyterian Men, which calls for securing one communicator from each church, approved by Session. Mr. Mirk announced the 25th annual meeting of the National Council, to be held in St. Louis, Missouri, April 6,7,8, 1973, featuring the theme, "The Future Speaks".

Upon motion, the Presbytery confirmed the election from Presbytery to the National Council the following:



Upon motion, Presbytery granted the following requests to be excused: Ministers - Antonson, Bartko, Carter, Cater, Colman, Dempsey, Elly, Kerr, Kind, Kyser, Magee, McCall, Milford, Nagy, Riedesel, Robinson, Russell, Sanders, Sommers, Stenner, J. Stone, Thomas, Thompson, Vernon, R. Williams, T. Kennedy, Rieker. Elders -Christ Memorial (1), Church of the Master (1), Ecorse (1), Farmington (1), South Lyon (1); also M.G. Adams, Frobom (General Council). Upon motion, Presbytery seated as a corresponding member The Rev. John Forsyth, member of The United Church of Christ, and recognized The Rev. James Jagielski and The Rev. Daniel C. Aerts, St. John's Seminary. Upon motion, the minutes of the meeting of February 27, 1973 were approved with editorial corrections and the recording of attendance omissions. (Paper B) Upon motion, the docket was approved as amended to delete the report of the Committee on Evangelism and to permit the Committee on Nominations to report under Miscellaneous Business. (Paper A) The service of worship was led by the host pastor, The Rev. Harold H. McConnell, Jr., assisted by The Rev. Ronald P. Miller.

The Minutes for Mission was presented by The Rev. Virgil L. Jones, University Pastor at Wayne State University, Detroit, who spoke to the work of United Ministries in Higher Education.

THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through The Rev. Arthur K. Beumler, who introduced Dr. Arthur Riewald, Director of Psychological Studies and Consultation Program, Inc., Birmingham, Michigan, and ruling elder at Birmingham, First. Dr. Riewald reported on the work of the agency, which is supported by seven denominations, including the Presbytery of Detroit, and which functions as a multi-service center providing mental health consultation and continuing education for the professional development and care of clergy and their families.

LEGAL ACTIONS

THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON NOMINATION OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY MODERATOR reported through The Rev. John K. Mitchell progress in its work of putting forward the candidacy of The Rev. Carl G. Howie; and called the attention of the presbyters to a partial listing (Paper C) of commissioners to the 185th General Assembly, soliciting help in commending Dr. Howie for their consideration as Moderator of the next Assembly.

- The General Council presented for information the following:
 - a. The General Council authorized the Moderator to appoint a special committee to review with Synod representatives the current financial arrangements between the Presbytery of Detroit and Synod.
 - b. The General Council authorized the Moderator to appoint 4 representatives to a Presbytery-Synod Consultation on staffing and budgeting, April 1-3, in Columbus.
 - c. The General Council empowered the Moderator to solicit specific response from committees of Presbytery to the concerns of Synod's Division of Planning and asked the Committee on Planning to compile the responses and forward them to the Synod Planning Office by April 15, 1973.
 - d. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures, from the Presbytery of Shenango, an overture to the 185th General Assembly asking that General Assembly administrative costs not be increased.
 - e. The General Council referred to the Committee on Ecumenical Relations from the Presbytery of New York City, an overture to the 185th General Assembly asking that full participation in the Consultation on Church Union be reestablished.
 - f. The General Council referred to the Task Force on Personnel Needs, from the Mission Council of the Presbytery of Scioto Valley, a communication sharing concerns relative to staffing needs of the presbyteries and the Synod under the new structure.
 - g. The General Council declined to take action on a request from the Session of Military Avenue Church, asking to be excused from payment of per capita apportionment for 1973, until such payments are actually in arrears; and encouraged the Session to consult with the Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship.
 - h. The General Council received a letter from The Rev. Robert H. Crilley, suggesting that Presbytery meal tickets be purchased on an annual basis; and asked the Stated Clerk to explore alternate methods for facilitating the purchase of dinner tickets.
 - i. The General Council received a communication from The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman, stating that for the best interest of the Presbytery he will not pursue the protest entered at the last meeting of Presbytery.
 - j. The General Council received for information a communication from Dr. Clair B. King, announcing the 11th Annual Spiritual Healing Mission of Christ United Presbyterian Church, Canton, Ohio, to be held May 5-7, 1973.
 - k. The General Council reports to Presbytery that The Rev. Ray H. Kiely cannot attend the General Assembly and that The Rev. Wilson Wood will replace him as commissioner to the 185th General Assembly.
 - 1. The General Council requested the Committee on Structure of Presbytery to include the new plan of structure a process whereby Synod Council representatives may sit with Presbytery's Council and Departments, and to explore ways to make effective the interlock principle.
 - m. The General Council directed that reports from representatives serving on Synod Mission Council and/or cabinets, divisions and departments be docketed when deemed appropriate.
 - of its meeting with the Session of the First Presbyterian Church of Royal
 Oak, approved the following statement:
 The General Council draws to the attention of the Moderator and
 all members of the Presbytery Sections 55.02 and 98.44 of the Book of
 Order concerning language and behavior on the floor of Presbytery. The

The right to dissent and the right to differing opinions should always be under forbearance in love and common Christian conduct. Care should always be given that comments before the Presbytery should not contain statements or innuendoes that can be taken as person or demeaning. Where this has happened in the past we ask for forgiveness from God and our fellow presbyters. Further; the feelings of the Session of the Royal Oak First Church concerning lack of representation of First Church, Royal Oak in the life of the Presbytery is brought to the attention of the Committee on Nominations.

- o. Upon motion, the General Council urges all clerks of sessions and pastors of all churches to take seriously their responsibility in filling out the forms provided by the Skills Bank in order to increase the registration of names from their particular congregations for consideration by the Committee on Nominations.
- p. The General Council referred to the Committee on Ministerial Relations for study the matter of coordinating and expediting at the meeting of Presbytery details relating to ministerial changes.
- q. The General Council directed that the Ministerial Relations program report be docketed prior to Legal Actions.
- r. The General Council directed that the hour be designated beside each item on the docket.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery discharged the following Administrative Commissions:
 - a. Installation of Homer Nye at Farmington Church, February 4;
 - b. Installation of Eugene Locke at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, March 4;
 - c. Installation of John McCreight at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, March 4.
- 3. The Rev. Ray H. Kiely reported for the Special Committee on Interim Staff Services.

 <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery extended the contract with The Rev. Robert H. Yolton,

 <u>Interim Executive</u>, three months to June 30, 1973.
- 4. Elder Jack Callam reporting for the Budget Process Evaluation Team presented Recommendations for Revision of Budget Process and Concerns for 1974 (Paper E) upon which Presbytery took the following actions:
 - a. <u>Upon motion</u>, and by more than three-fourths vote of the members present, Presbytery continued to suspend those portions of the Standing Rules pertaining to the development of the Administrative, Presbytery and National Missions Budgets.
 - b. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery adopted the attached budget process for the 1974 Unified Presbytery Budget. (Paper E)
 - c. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized the General Council to appoint a committee to recommend a full planning process for developing concerns, goals, and objectives, with criteria for evaluation, for use in preparing the 1975 budget.

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Elder William Stokes and Elder Robert Swirles speak on behalf of the congregation of the Evergreen Village Church; approved the call of the church to The Rev. Larry Lewis to become pastor, effective April 16, 1973, with the following terms: salary \$10,000, manse, utilities, \$1,000 car allowance, 15% pension, hospitalization, one month vacation, two weeks study leave, moving expenses and annual review; forward the call to the Presbytery of Cincinnati with the request that the Presbytery place the call in his hands and dismiss him to the Presbytery of Detroit; and enrolled Mr. Lewis as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit upon receipt of his dismission certificate.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following Administrative Commission to install The Rev. Edward Pierson associate pastor of Orchard Lake Church, Sunday, April 8, 1973 at 11 a.m.: Elder Mary Grace Adams (Grosse Pointe Memorial), The Rev. Edward Auchard, The Rev. Margaret Scabich, The Rev. Ty Shin, Elder George E. Cavin (Orchard Lake) and Elder Jay J. VanZoeren (Northminster).
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery dissolved the assistant pastoral relationship existing between The Rev. Charles Hansen and the session of the Northminster Church effective March 1, 1973; heard Elder Charles Lewitt speak on behalf of the Session; and granted Mr. Hansen permission to labor outside the bounds until the next annual meeting.
- 4. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted The Rev. Thomas DeLawrence the status of Honorable Retirement effective March 1, 1973.
- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery received The Rev. C. Douglas Clyde of the Institute of Advanced Pastoral Studies from the Nebraska City Presbytery and granted him permission to labor outside the bounds until the next annual meeting.

Upon motion, Presbytery expressed prayerful concern for staff persons and families throughout the church and in our own Presbytery who are seeking reemployment or are faced with major career decisions due to the restructuring of the denomination and its agencies; and approved the report as a whole.

THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through the chairman, Elder Jack Callam. (Paper K)

- 1. By common consent Presbytery postponed consideration of the request of Southwest Community Church of Detroit for permission to sell property and begin plans to establish a new physical plant in the parish area.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the First Presbyterian Church of Warren permission to engage an architect contingent upon the concurrence of the Session to conduct a mission study.

Lost was a motion from the floor to instruct the Committee on National Missions not to suggest the employment of a pastor on the basis of race, sex or ethnic background.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery requested The Rev. Thomas Kirkman to communicate in writing to the Committee on National Mission the basis of rumors that churches are directed to fill vacant churches by ministers of particular races or ethnic origins.

<u>Upon motion</u>, the report as a whole was approved.

THE COMMITTEE ON BILLS AND OVERTURES reported through the chairman, The Rev. Lloyd G. Brasure, on Overtures E, F and H (Paper L) and the following action was taken: Upon motion, Presbytery responded in the negative to Overtures E and F and in the affirmative to Overture H from the 184th General Assembly (1972). Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR SPECIAL BUDGET PROCESS

FOR 1974 UNIFIED PRESBYTERY BUDGET

PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

March 14, 1973

On June 27, 1972, the Presbytery of Detroit heard a report of its Special Committee on Budget Process, set aside the Bylaws and Structure of the Presbytery, and adopted the Committee's recommendation. As a result, the 1973 Unified Budget of the Presbytery was developed by use of a Special Budget Process.

The General Council, meeting December 10, 1972, recommended the budget produced by the Special Budget Process and also asked the "Negotiating Team" which had worked on the budget, supplemented by new committee chairmen where elected, to review the process and to bring back to the General Council recommendations for its revision. Meetings were held for this purpose January 10 and February 20, 1973. The evaluation team agreed that the Special Budget Process used for the development of the 1973 Unified Budget was a significant improvement over the experience of prior years. It was further agreed that if the revised Special Budget Process were approved by March, the committees of Presbytery would have it in time to use in their program development for 1974.

The Evaluation Team identified a number of improvements which should be incorporated into the Process. Among these were:

1. The concerns of Presbytery need to be defined more exactly and developed in more detail, if the committees are to create programs designed to meet the concerns.

Lacking time to develop and implement a process for soliciting the concerns of the whole Presbytery, the Evaluation Team agreed to recast the "Goals and Objectives" approved by Presbytery in 1972 in terms of concerns, goals and objectives. The Evaluation Team expressed the hope that the Planning Committee of the General Council may be able to implement a full planning process, so that more adequate, and perhaps more representative concerns, may be available for developing the 1975 Budget.

- 2. There is need for an instrument(s) to help committees make a common application of concerns to programs as they are developed.
- Each budget request should contain a more explicit statement explaining how the program proposed will fulfill the concerns of Presbytery.
- 4. There should be common back-up data for each program, giving an historical perspective to the program and to Presbytery's support of the program. More detailed and comparable information is needed for each program request submitted.

PRINCIPLES

The Evaluation Team is of the judgment that the principles utilized in the process for the 1973 Budget are generally applicable, and with revisions recommends them as follows:

- That there should be one budget for the total mission and administration of the Presbytery, developed in a single process;
- That the process designed should clarify the authority of the program committees, the Budget Committee, the General Council and the Presbytery;
- 3. That a viable process requires the understanding and commitment of the participants before the process is undertaken, particularly in the final, most difficult steps;
- 4. That the process should insure a balanced budget by making it politically feasible;
- That concerns, goals, and objectives, officially approved and generally accepted, are essential prior to program design and budget requests;
- That the power of particular interest should be confronted by the mission interests of the whole Presbytery;
- 7. That the process should encourage new ideas and ministries in the face of changing receipts and should encourage the elimination of programs which have been ineffective or have fulfilled their purposes;
- That improved validation and evaluation are essential to the budget process;
- 9. That the process must provide for strong influence by persons who perceive themselves, and are seen by others, as having an overview of the mission of the Presbytery in light of priorities;
- 10. That the process must insure the participation of all ir erested parties, and provide for negotiation among them, so that all special interests are viewed openly for the sake of the total mission.

1974 BUDGET PROCESS

The Evaluation Team proposes the following process for developing the 1974 Unified Presbytery Budget. (See chart appended.)

Step 1: Collecting Information

By April 4, the Stated Clerk-Treasurer shall send to the chairmen of Presbytery committees:

- a. An announc ment of the schedule and details of Step 1;
- b. Presbytery Mission Concerns approved by Presbytery;
- c. An initial income projection for 1974.

By July 2, the following information is to be in the hands of the Stated Clerk-Treasurer:

- a. Income projections from the Budget Committee, including all Presbytery-wide sources and estimated program receipts from all committees.
- b. Budget requests from the Ecclesiastical and Program Committees of Presbytery.
- c. Budget requests for new work from other sources,
 To encourage new approaches in the fulfillment of
 Presbytery priorities, sessions, agencies, boards,
 and other mission units are to be informed that the
 Presbytery Budget Process is open to new proposals
 until July 2.

Step 2: Validation and Program Ranking

Prior to September 5, information concerning each program request shall be distributed to the participants in the 1974 Budget Process.

On September 5, the following groups will meet:

1. A special Priorities Analysis Team, composed of six persons: five selected from the Presbytery by the General Council, upon nomination of the Council's Special Committee on Nominations; and the Chairman of the General Council's Budget Committee, who shall have the privilege of the floor, but not of vote, in deliberations of the Priorities Analysis Team.

This team is to be chosen carefully from persons respected by the Presbytery, who have a comprehension of the totality of the Presbytery's priorities, mission and needs; and who are willing to participate fully in the difficult give-andtake of the budget development process.

- 2. The Budget Committee of the General Council, composed of three members of the Council who are not chairmen or members of program committees, upon appointment by the Moderator.
- 3. The Chairmen of the following Committees:

Candidates
Christian Education
Church and Society
Ecumenical Relations
Evangelism
Interpretation and Stewardship
Ministerial Relations

National Missions

N.M. Subcommittee on Ethnic Church Affairs

N.M. Subcommittee on Congregational Development

N.M. Subcommittee on Special Ministries

Religion and Race Status of Women

In order that the negotiating team may have full information, the chairmen of the committees may bring other members of their committees as advisors, who may provide information but not vote.

At this first-round meeting, the participants shall review the concerns of Presbytery, and all of the budget requests, in order to judge the adequacy of the individual programs to meet the concerns of Presbytery. The team shall then place all of the program requests in rank order, so that the proposals of each committee may be subjected to the common assessment by all of the participants.

Steps 3 and 4: Review of Ranking and Preliminary Committee Budgets

Each committee of Presbytery shall develop a preliminary budget for its operating expenses and for validated program proposals. Each committee should do so in the light of: (a) Presbytery concerns; (b) income realities; (c) the ranking of preliminary program requests by the total Budget Process Team.

The development of each committee's preliminary budget should provide for a confrontation of the committee's own judgments with the common judgments expressed by the total Budget Process Team.

By September 17, each committee shall report to the Stated Clerk-Treasurer:

- 1. A preliminary budget for its operating expenses and mission work;
- 2. Revised program requests, where the committee recommends changes for programs as originally submitted;
- 3. A list of original requests not included in the preliminary budget, along with the committee's reasons for exclusion;
- Comments, or appeals, in the light of concerns.

Step 5: Review of Preliminary Budget

 The Priorities Analysis Team shall review and comment upon the preliminary budget data collected from the committees, in the light of concerns. The Budget Committee shall review and comment upon the preliminary budget data collected from the committees in the light of concerns and its view of financial realities.

Step 6:

At a Pre-Presbytery meeting on September 25, the Priorities Analysis Team and the Budget Committee shall share with members of Presbytery their preliminary assessment of the preliminary budgets of the committees of Presbytery, and take into consideration the response and suggestions of the members of Presbytery present.

Step 7: Budget Negotiation

On September 27, the Priorities Analysis Team, the Budget Committee, and the committee chairmen named above shall meet to negotiate the Unified Presbytery Budget for recommendation to the General Council, using the information secured in Steps 4, 5, and 6.

A is expected that this will be a detailed negotiation of individual programs. The goal is a balanced budget.

Step 8: Committee Review

In order that the committees of Presbytery may feel that they are active participants in the budget development process, the results of the budget negotiation meeting shall be shared with the Presbytery committees who request it. It is anticipated that any committee reviewing the results of the budget negotiation will have to hold a special meeting in order to meet the budget process schedule.

Step 9: Budget Finalizing

The Priorities Analysis Team and the Budget Committee shall meet October 2 in order to consider any appeals or revisions from the committees of Presbytery and shall finalize the balanced budget for recommendation to the General Council.

Step 10: General Council Action

The General Council shall consider the proposed Unified Presbytery Budget for 1974, including the per capita apportionment required for that part of the unified budget, amend it if it is judged necessary, and recommend it to Presbytery.

Step 11: Presentation to Presbytery .

On October 23, the General Council shall present the recommended Unified Presbytery Budget for 1974 to Presbytery for explanation and discussion.


Step 12: Presbytery Action

On November 27, the Presbytery shall adopt a Unified Presbytery Budget for 1974.


Recommendations

CONCERNS FOR 1974

PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

In 1972 the Presbytery of Detroit authorized a special committee to recommend Goals and Objectives for 1973, to be used in the development of the 1973 Unified Budget of Presbytery. The report of this committee focused on the local congregation with a "support through resourcing" concept. In brief, four Concerns were approved.

The General Council in December 1972 asked the Budget Negotiating Team to evaluate these Concerns and recommend revisions for 1974. Two meetings have been held, with individual work between them.

The Evaluation Team reviewed its inability to use effectively the 1973 Concerns in building the 1974 Budget.

The Evaluation Team agrees that Presbytery needs to develop a full Planning-Budgeting--Evaluating System, with full participation by the committees and sessions of the Presbytery. Until this can be accomplished, the following Presbytery Concerns have been formulated, so that committees and sessions may seek to focus them in goals and objectives for mission programs within their areas of responsibility.

It was felt that the Concerns for 1974 should be an expression of the Presbytery's twofold responsibility to be an effective unit of mission itself and to resource as adequately as possible the sessions of the Presbytery. They serve as Concerns, but the Concerns which follow are not listed in order of priority.

The Evaluation Team recommends:

- 1. That the General Council appoint a committee to recommend a full planning process for developing concerns, goals, and objectives, with criteria for evaluation, for use in preparing the 1975 budget.
- 2. That the following Concerns and Goals for 1974 be approved.

CONCERNS FOR 1974

PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

PREFACE

The New Testament states:

"If any one is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has passed away, beyond, the new has come. All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation.

So we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We beseech you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God."

(II Corinthians 5:17-20)

The Confession of 1967 states:

"The church confesses its faith when it bears a present witness to God's grace in Jesus Christ."

"In every age the church has expressed its witness in words and deeds as the need of the time required..."

"God's reconciling work in Jesus Christ and the mission of reconciliation to which he has called his church are the heart of the gospel in any age..."

"In Jesus Christ God was reconciling the world to himself. Jesus Christ is God with man. He is the eternal Son of the Father, who became man and lived among us to fulfill the work of reconciliation. He is present in the church by the power of the Holy Spirit to continue and complete his mission. This work of God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, is the foundation of all confessional statements about God, man, and the world. Therefore the church calls men to be reconciled to God and to one another."

The Form of Government states:

"4. The great ends of the Church are the proclamation of the gospel for salvation of men; the shelter, nature, and spiritual fellowship of the children of God; the maintenance of divine worship; the preservation of the truth; the promotion of social righteousness; and the exhibition of the Kingdom of Heaven to the world."

- I. Priority Concerns for Presbytery's Own Mission:
 - A. *Identification and Resolution of Alienations
 - Goal: To make the Presbytery a community of mutual concern, expressing responsibility and loyalty to the Church and its mission.
 - B. Development of a Planning, Program Budgeting and Evaluating System
 - Goal: To develop a planning process which will document the specific concerns of the Presbytery and its sessions in order to fund the programs, and to uniformly evaluate performance against stated goals.
 - C. Negotiations with the Synod of the Covenant
 - Goal: To develop and execute cooperative efforts with synod based on mutual goals and available resources in terms of program, staff and finances and to define those particular areas of concern peculiar to each judicatory.
 - D. Reorganization of Presbytery
 - Goal: To initiate and refine the plans for the more meaningful and productive operation of Detroit Presbytery, overcoming alienation and fragmentation and providing increased participation at all levels of activity.
 - E. Staff of Presbytery

- II. Priority Concerns for Resourcing Presbytery's Sessions and Churches
 - A. *Strengthen Connectionalism
 - Goal: To create the means by which the vital concerns of sessions and church members are incorporated in the goals and objectives of Presbytery programs and to identify the appropriate role of each in their achievement.
 - B. Utilize the Church's Resources in and for Society
 - Goal: To assist sessions in developing people resources to relate to society's alienations and needs.
 - C. *Develop People Resources to Meet the Church's Needs
 - Goal: To help sessions to discover, enlist, challenge and train leadership of all age levels for the total life of the Church.
 - D. *Develop Teacher Education
 - Goal: To provide the best resources and skills possible for educational use, to publicize and encourage their use, and to furnish educational leadership expertise.
 - E. *Strengthen the Witness of the Church
 - Goal: To provide training so that sessions can lead their churches in visitation evangelism and other methods of witnessing.
 - F. *Encourage Innovative Ministries by Churches
 - Goal: To encourage sessions to propose and initiate innovative ministries, to cooperate in pilot programs, and to provide funding and special skills where necessary.

Thompson, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, responding to Presbytery's action on the payment of the per capita apportionment and setting forth the possible necessity of the General Assembly's having to borrow against future receipts and having to increase the per capita rate to cover interest costs if similar action were taken by many presbyteries, and voted not to recommend that Presbytery reconsider its action (2/27/72) to remit Synod and General Assembly per capita apportionments in the same percentage as received from churches; and that the per diem of General Assembly commissioners be met in full by Presbytery, if reduced by the General Assembly.
 - c. The General Council received notice that Presbytery minutes were scheduled for review by Synod's Department of Presbytery Development on April 12, 1973.
 - d. The General Council received notification from The Rev. LeRoy J. Peterson, Acting Stated Clerk of Synod, that the Presbytery of Detroit is eligible for 17 ministers and 17 ruling elder commissioners to the Synod of the Covenant meeting, June 28-30, 1973.
 - e. The General Council referred to the Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship a communication from The Rev. LeRoy J. Peterson, Acting Stated Clerk of Synod, notifying Presbytery of a fund development program which includes the cultivation and solicitation of individuals who are capable of giving over and above their local commitments and to a deferred gifts program for the Synod, which may also include Presbytery projects; authorized the committee to submit projects at its discretion; and requested it to report its action to General Council.
 - f. The General Council referred to committees as indicated the following overtures to the 185th General Assembly:
 - (1) To the Special Budget Committee, from the Presbytery of Albany, an overture on the matter of "recall" of mission funds.
 - (2) To the Committee on Bills and Overtures and the Task Force on Personnel Needs, from the Presbytery of Birmingham, an overture asking that the current salaries of executives, administrators and fraternal workers and National Mission pastors of agencies and councils at the General Assembly, synod and presbytery levels be abolished in favor of a common stipend.
 - (3) To the Committee on Ministerial Relations, from the Presbytery of Lackawanna, an overture asking that major medical coverage under the Pension Plan be extended for all ministers and their dependents.
 - (4) To the Committee on Ecumenical Relations, from the Presbytery of Lehigh, an overture encouraging the re-entry of the United Presbyterian Church into the Consultation on Church Union.

- (5) To the Committee on Christian Education, from the Presbytery of Saint Andrew, an overture dealing with the admission of children to the Lord's Table.
- (6) To the Committee on Ecumenical Relations, from the Presbytery of Seattle, an overture on sustaining the 184th General Assembly in withdrawing from the Consultation on Church Union.
 - (7) To the Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship, from the Presbytery of Seattle, an overture modifying the self-development of people's criteria and guidelines.
 - (8) To the Committee on Ministerial Relations, from the Presbytery of Wichita, an overture to include in major medical provisions of the Pension Plan "adoptive children for which members have full financial and medical responsibility."
 - (9) To the Committee on Bills and Overtures, from the Presbytery of Winnebago, overtures on reconciling provisions of the Book of Order with regard to representation, nomination and election of a Synod General Council and on a proposal to hold the General Assembly bienially.
- g. The General Council referred to the Committee on Audit, audits by Touche Ross & Co. of the Presbytery of Detroit Per Capita Administrative Fund and the Presbytery of Detroit Benevolence Fund.
- h. The General Council referred to the Committee on National Missions responsibility for matters related to Northside Associated Ministries, with instruction to consult with legal counsel before taking action and to keep the General Council informed.
- i. The General Council referred to the Committee on Nominations the resignations of Alma Love, from the Committee on Ministerial Relations, and The Rev. Donald A. Wright from the General Council.
- j. The General Council heard a report that the Convocation of Commissioners to General Assembly to be conducted by Synod of the Covenant will be held in three areas of the Synod, rotating leadership, May 9-11.
- k. The General Council received the Treasurer's Report of the 1973 Unified Budget through March 31, 1973.
- 1. The General Council directed its Executive Committee to arrange a system by which each committee of Presbytery is given opportunity to report program matters to Presbytery on a regular but time-limited basis.
- m. The General Council reviewed the Results of the Presbytery/Synod Consultation, April 1-3, and asked the Moderator and Stated Clerk to express the concerns arising from the discussion, namely, vagueness of budget data, inadequacy of the staff formula, confusion on accountability of staff, and concern over a possible increase in per capita apportionment.

Upon request from Elder Richard Fernstrum, Grosse Pointe Woods, Presbytery heard explanation of the General Council rationale behind Item 1b above, pertaining to the payment of per capita apportionments.

<u>Lost</u> was a motion from the floor asking General Council to study the nature of per capita apportionments and the manner of remitting payment to the higher judicatories and, if required, to bring a recommendation to Presbytery.

- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery discharged the following Special Administrative Commissions:
 - a. Installation of Edward Pierson at Orchard Lake, April 8, 1973;
 - b. Installation of William LeDuc at First Church, Mt. Clemens, April 8, 1973.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery named The Rev. James A. Mitcham, Jr., first alternate minister, and Elder Holden LeRoy, first alternate elder, elected June 27, 1972, to serve in the Class of 1973 as commissioners to the Synod of the Covenant meeting, June 28-30, 1973.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the General Council Report as a whole.

PROGRAM REPORTS

The Vice-Moderator took the chair.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY reported through the chairman, The Rev. David W. Abbott, who introduced Mr. Alan Houseman, Director of Michigan Legal Services, who spoke on the future of legal aid services in Michigan in the light of reduced Federal funding and changed policy.

THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM reported through the chairman, The Rev. Harold H. McConnell, Jr., who introduced The Rev. John McCreight. Mr. McCreight described a projected program to be initiated by the committee in the Fall of 1973, which will utilize the services of an Evangelism Associate for six months, supported and trained by the Division of Evangelism, to work with selected churches of the Presbytery wanting to enrich their present programs of evangelism or start new ones. Churches were encouraged to return preliminary applications, recommend the names of ministers for possible selection as the Evangelism Associate, and contribute gifts to the program. (Paper K)

THE COMMITTEE ON INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP reported through The Rev. Frank J. Irvine, who reviewed printed reports (Paper L) on Pay-Up and Self-Allocation and called attention to the continued availability of the Turnover Chart for Sessions, presenting the mission of the Presbyterian Church at the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly levels.

Upon motion, the report was received.

THE COMMITTEE ON RELIGION AND RACE reported through The Rev. Richard A. Dempsey who introduced Mr. James T. Roberts, Chief Federal Defender of the Federal Defenders Program of the Legal Aid Association of Detroit, to present his view of Justice and Law and Order.

The Moderator resumed the chair.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery adjourned at 9:34 p.m. with prayer and benediction by the Moderator.

THE GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland. (Paper F)

- 1. The General Council reported for information the following:
 - a. The General Council referred to the Committee on Church and Society and the Task Force on the Status of Women a communication from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, reporting action by the 184th General Assembly on the issue of abortion.
 - b. The General Council received a communication from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, responding to Presbytery's action 2/27/73 and sharing the opinion of George W. McKeag, Esq., solicitor of the General Assembly, regarding the claim of The Rev. Jesse E. Christman before the Internal Revenue Service; reaffirmed its support of Mr. Christman; and referred the matter to the Committee on Ministerial Relations with the request that the committee determine, in consultation with Mr. Christman, the appeal stages, estimated cost in stages for him to seek relief through the remedies which are open to him, and the estimated tax liability; and that it report such at the next meeting of the General Council.

- c. The General Council referred to the Committee on Budget a communication from the Stated Clerk of the Synod of the Covenant stating that Synod will share in the salary and support of Detroit's Executive Presbyter in the amount of 50% of major items of cost, or \$20,000 \$22,000.
- d. The General Council referred to the Task Force on Personnel Needs from Synod's Division of Staff Services resources for consideration in developing a staffing proposal for the Presbytery.
- e. The General Council received from the Presbytery of Pittsburgh, overtures to the 185th General Assembly on the deadline for annual reports and the addition of age in fair employment practices provisions of the Form of Government.
- f. The General Council asked the Committee on Christian Education to assume responsibility for Camperships in 1974.
- g. The General Council heard a report from the Task Force on Personnel Needs and approved in principle for purposes of Staffing Negotiations June 16, 1973, positions papers as follows:
 - (1) Statement of Mission Goals for the Presbytery,
 - (2) Presbytery Rationale for Total Staffing,
 - (3) Position and Person Descriptions for Particular Positions,
 - (4) Plan for Evaluation of Staff Performance
- h. The General Council authorized the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Stated Clerk and the Presbytery Executive to prepare plans to hold a Convocation of Commissioners to the next meeting of Synod.
- i. The General Council encouraged Cluster I and any other clusters to experiment with forms of cluster organization that will enhance the life of the churches together.
- j. The General Council commended the Moderator and the Committee on Candidates for the refreshingly meaningful reception of candidates at the April meeting of Presbytery.
- k. The General Council heard a report from the Committee on Ecumenical Relations that the following have been appointed:
 - The Rev. Allan A. Zaun and Elder Herschel Fry to the Committee on Restructure of the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches,
 - (2) The Rev. David B. Antonson to the Committee on Finance of the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches.
- 1. The General Council heard a report from the Committee on Christian Education that a Task Force on United Ministries in Higher Education has been organized, chaired by Dr. Bruce Nelson, Vice-President for Academic Affairs of Eastern Michigan University.
- m. The General Council instructed the Stated Clerk regularly to bill all churches not using dinner reservations at Presbytery and established a deadline of 5:45 p.m. for pick-up of tickets at Presbytery, after which tickets may be given to stand-bys.
- n. The General Council recorded a personal expression of gratitude from The Rev. Lloyd G. Brasure to The Rev. William Colwell, The Rev. Frank Irvine, and The Rev. Robert Moreland for preparing the report at the April meeting of Presbytery on the new Book of Church Discipline for the Committee on Bills and Overtures.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery discharged the Special Administrative Commission to install Larry Lewis at Evergreen Village Church, May 13, 1973.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized the Task Force on Personnel Needs to negotiate with other presbyteries and the Synod, June 16, 1973, for staff positions, shared or full-time, equalling a maximum of five full-time positions.

4. Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the following resolution:

Whereas the Synod of the Covenant is in the early stages of reorganization, and it is not known how and to what extent services may be provided the Presbytery;

Whereas staff services during the coming months may be uncertain and so make the initiation of any reorganization difficult;

Whereas ten per cent of the churches of Presbytery are new and should have opportunity to participate further in the development of any reorganization;

Therefore, consideration of the Proposed Plan of Reorganization shall be postponed thus providing for participation by new members and staff of Presbytery and allowing adequate time for revision and adoption by mid-1974.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the report as a whole and confirmed the following appointments by the Moderator:

- a. Elder Richard Fernstrum and The Rev. James A. Cannon to represent Presbytery at the meeting on Staffing Negotiations, June 16, 1973.
- b. Elder Jack Callam and The Rev. Carl G. Howie to represent Presbytery at the Budget Consultation, June 15, 1973.

<u>Upon motion</u>, from the floor, and by counted vote Presbytery instructed the General Council to devise adequate methods to protest the irresponsible and profligate dissipation of the financial reserves of the Synod and General Assembly and to report back to the Presbytery.

THE COMMITTEE ON AUDIT, reported through the chairman, Elder Richard F. Park, who announced that copies of the audits are available for inspection in the Presbytery Office

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the audit of the Detroit Presbytery Benevolence Fund and the Detroit Presbytery Per Capita Administration Fund for the year ending December 31, 1972.

THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through the chairman, Elder Jack Callam. (Paper G)

- 1. The committee reported that it has received and approved the audit of its accounts for 1972 by Touche Ross & Co., that the audit is on file in the Presbytery Office and is available for inspection by any member of Presbytery.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery voted to organize St. Thomas Community United Presbyterian Church of Shelby Township, Michigan on Sunday, June 10, 1973, at 5:30 p.m. by the following Organizing Commission: The Rev. William F. Whitledge, Moderator, The Rev. James Cannon, The Rev. Francis Nagy, The Rev. Alfred Davies, The Rev. Robert Kyser, Elder Jack Callam (Dearborn First), Elder George Mack (University), Elder Gerald Hansen (Utica) and Elder Jocelyn Glass (Birmingham First), with The Rev. Richard Bauer, The Rev. Robert H. Yolton, and The Rev. Lawrence W. McMaster, Jr., being invited to participate in the service of organization.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. Richard J. Milford. (Paper H)

1. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Elder Richard Newberg speak on behalf of the congregation of the Cherry Hill Church; approved the call of the church to The Rev. Frank C. Marvin to become pastor, effective June 1, 1973, with the following terms: salary \$16,500, manse allowance \$3,000, car allowance \$1,500, 15% pension, Synod hospitalization, one month vacation two weeks study leave and annual review; and placed the call in his hands.

- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Willis Jewett speak on behalf of the congregation of the Calvin East Church; approved the call of the church to The Rev. George L. VanLeuven to become pastor, effective August 15, 1973, with the following terms: salary \$10,000, housing allowance \$3,600, car allowance \$1,200, telephone expense, 15% pension, one month vacation, two weeks study leave, continuing education allowance \$200, health and accident insurance \$600, moving expenses and annual review; forwarded the call to the Presbytery of Beaver-Butler with the request that the Presbytery place the call in his hands and dismiss him to the Presbytery of Detroit, upon receipt of his certificate of dismission.



- 3. Daniel Seeley, member of Cherry Hill, was introduced by Elder Myrna Yinger, and spoke about the influences and motivations that led to his desire to enter the ministry.

 <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery arrested the examination.
- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery sustained the examinations of Charles Leslie Wood and Daniel Seeley and enrolled them as candidates for the Christian ministry. The Moderator and the Candidates Committee Chairman conducted the service of recognition, with pastors and members of the sessions of the candidates' churches standing with them.
- 5. Craig R. Dykstra, member of Grosse Pointe Memorial, appeared for his ordination examination, read his personal statement of faith, and was questioned by Presbytery.
 Upon motion, Presbytery arrested the examination.
 Upon motion, Presbytery sustained the examination and approved Mr. Craig R. Dykstra for ordination.

Upon motion, the Presbytery approved the report as a whole.

The TRUSTEES OF THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT reported through Elder Marshall Massey, President, who spoke to the report for 1972. (Paper A) Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report.

THE TELLERS FOR ELECTION OF EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER reported through Chase Hunt. Two hundred six ballots were cast, with 170 affirmative votes and 34 negative votes cast, 2 ballots being spoiled and not included in the final tally. The Rev. Donald G. Lester, having received more than the two-thirds vote required, was declared by the Moderator to have been elected the Executive Presbyter of the Presbytery of Detroit.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the contract (Paper B) to The Rev. Donald G. Lester to become its Executive Presbyter effective August 1, 1973 or no later than September 1, 1973, with the following terms: salary \$22,000 (including housing with up to 30% of this amount allowable as housing allowance); all travel expenses including a leased car; Synod health and hospitalization insurance; Synod accident insurance; two weeks study leave including \$500 for continuing education; 15% pension; one month vacation; annual review of salary and moving expenses.

THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through the chairman, Elder Jack Callam. (Paper C)

- 1. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the preliminary building and finance plans of First Presbyterian Church, Warren; said approval being contingent on the Church's successfully negotiating a \$75,000 twenty-year mortgage loan from the Board of National Missions.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the First Presbyterian Church of Birmingham permission to purchase a manse in Bloomfield Hills at a cost of \$73,000.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the Knox Presbyterian Church permission to engage an architect for the purpose of preparing a preliminary plan.
- 4. As a point of information regarding the status of the Church of the Open Door, the chairman reported that the Committee has requested the services of The Rev. Isaiah Pogue of the Synod Staff to undertake an independent study of the prospects and need for mission in this area. Updating reports regarding this matter will follow.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through committee member, The Rev. Arthur K. Beumler. (Paper D)

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Elders E. G. Klimeck and Paul Almburg, speak on behalf of the congregation of St. Paul's Livonia; dissolved the associate pastoral relationship with TheRev. Arnold Dalzell, effective June 30, 1973; and granted Mr. Dalzell permission to labor outside the bounds until the next annual meeting.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the call of the Presbytery of Mackinac to The Rev. Kenneth E. McCall to become its Executive Presbyter effective July 1, 1973; placed the call in his hands; and dismissed him to the Presbytery of Mackinac effective July 1, 1973.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Elder John Gagnon speak on behalf of the congregation of Lake Shore, St. Clair Shores; dissolved the associate pastoral relationship with The Rev. Ronald P. Miller, effective July 23, 1973; approved the call of the Slifers Presbyterian Church, Farmersville, Ohio; placed the call in his hands; and dismissed him to the Presbytery of Miami effective July 23, 1973.
- 4. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery voted to receive The Rev. Donald G. Lester as a member of Presbytery upon receipt of his dismission from Lake Michigan Presbytery.
- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following Administrative Commission to ordain and install Mr. Craig R. Dykstra as assistant pastor of Westminster Church Sunday, July 15, 1973 at 10 a.m.: The Rev. William Whitledge, The Rev. Carl G. Howie, The Rev. Ray Kiely, Elder William Swanson (Westminster), Elder Pauline Dykstra (Grosse Pointe Memorial), enrolled as a corresponding member The Rev. John M. Mulder, Presbytery of New Brunswick and invited Dr. D. Campbell Wyckoff, Presbytery of New Brunswick to take part in the service.
- 6. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following Administrative Commission to install Mr. David Rice as assistant of the Pontiac First Church, Sunday September 9, 1973 at 4 p.m.: The Rev. William Whitledge, The Rev. F. Morgan Roberts, The Rev. Galen E. Hershey, The Rev. Kenneth Kettlewell, Elder Donald Newman (Pontiac First) and Elder William Neff (Pontiac First), enrolled as corresponding members The Rev. John Wayne Payne, pastor of Douglass Boulevard Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), Louisville, Kentucky and invited Elder Michael G. Rice, Monroe U.P. Church, Akron, Ohio (Eastminster Presbytery) to participate in the service.

- 12. It was also reported that The Rev. Francis J. Malzard (H.R.) died in California June 22. A Memorial Minute is planned for the September meeting of Presbytery.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following report.

THE GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland. (Paper G)

- 1. The General Council reported for information the following:
 - a. The General Council reported to Presbytery a communication from the Office of the General Assembly, listing ministers removed from office, January 1, 1973 to March 31, 1973, as follows: Wayne Blake, C. Herbert Carey, Ralph Didier, Donald Drew, Robert Finertie, Andrew Gutierrez, Franklin Held, Frank Iske, Lowell Linden, Allan Mesko, Mark Mobley, Douglas Parks, Charles Sheppard, Richard Rice, Arthur Urie.
 - b. The General Council received from the Presbytery of Newark, a resolution in support of Mr. Henry Aaron and expressing concern over the racist expressions generated by the possibility of his breaking Babe Ruth's home run record.
 - c. The General Council received from the Jefferson Avenue Session a resolution supporting the STRESS program of the Detroit Police Department.
 - d. The General Council received from Synod of the Covenant a communication inviting Youth Advisory Delegates to the 185th General Assembly (1973) to serve as "at large" youth advisory delegates at the Synod of the Covenant; and forwarded the invitation to Keith Lindsey.
 - e. The General Council referred to the Committee on Planning a communication from the Synod of the Covenant, asking for 1974 concerns in preparation for 1975 planning.
 - f. The General Council concurred in the Moderator's recommendation that in the absence of materials, the limited availability of dates, and the fact that most commissioners to Synod have had previous Synod experience, the convocation of Synod commissioners should be cancelled.
 - g. The General Council heard a report on Negotiation with Synod relative to financial relations, at which Negotiation The Rev. Eldon F. Beery, Elder Jack Callam, and the Moderator represented the Presbytery of Detroit and approved staff and service adjustments due to Synod staff changes as follows:

- (1) That the Presbytery of Detroit stop reimbursing the Synod for the services of The Rev. Francis R. Nagy as of May 1, 1973.
- (2) That the Synod of the Covenant stop reimbursing the Presbytery for the services of The Rev. Robert L. Moreland as of May 1, 1973 as he assumes some of the responsibilities formerly carried by Mr. Nagy.
- (3) That the Synod of the Covenant stop buying bookkeeping services from the Presbytery of Detroit as of July 15, 1973, since most Synod accounts have been closed and transferred to the Synod office.
- h. The General Council authorized the Moderator to appoint a committee of three to study alternatives for negotiating with Synod on the continued use or disposal of the Synod's office building, in which the Presbytery has an investment, and to report back to General Council.

- j. The General Council, acting on the motion referred by Presbytery,

 Upon motion, Presbytery amended the size of the committee to five.

- m. The General Council requested each committee on Presbytery and General Council to submit to the Special Committee on Budget by September 15, 1973, sample vouchers showing the number of miles of actual travel by members attending one committee meeting, and an estimate of number of meetings annually, in order to provide data upon which mileage expense recommendations may be considered.
- n. The General Council received a report from the Special Budget Committee, setting forth the following schedule of meetings for the 1974 Budget Process:

The Committee on Ministerial Relations reported, regarding the Christman tax appeal, that on advice of legal counsel the matter is presently being pursued through normal tax channels, that the costs thus far incurred are not great, and that it would not be productive to obtain cost estimates of taking the matter to civil courts until appeals through the tax process have been exhausted.

- p. The General Council heard a report of the Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship on the Committee's concern and recommendation relating to staffing need, and the proposed creation of a subcommittee on Interpretation Through Travel to be related also to the Committee on Ecumenical Relations and National Missions; the Committee further announced that the General Assembly continued "Option 3" for designating benevolence gifts.
- q. The General Council directed the Moderator and Stated Clerk to address a letter to the Moderator and to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly expressing the concern of the General Council for the omission of The Rev. Carl G. Howie, nominee to the moderatorship of the General Assembly, from among the Moderator's appointments to a chairmanship of a General Assembly standing committee, a traditional practice and a practice followed this year with this one exception.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery discharged the following Administrative Commissions:
 - a. Ordination of Alan Bethea at Northbrook Church, May 30, 1973;
 - b. Installation of F. Morgan Roberts at Birmingham First Church, June 10, 1973;
 - c. Organization of Saint Thomas Community Church, Shelby Township, June 10, 1973;

- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery authorized the Presbyterial Association to celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper at Waldenwoods, September 22, 1973, the service to be conducted by The Rev. Margaret Scabich.
- 4. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized signatories on Presbytery banking accounts to be any one of: the Moderator, the Executive Presbyter, and the Stated Clerk and/or Treasurer; and approved the resolutions which the banking institutions may require for this purpose.
- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the following policy: Per capita apportionments established at the end of a calendar year are to support the ecclesiastical expenses of the ensuing year and are payable in lump sum at the beginning of that year or periodically if necessary. Unpaid apportionments will be carried on the books for one additional year before disposition.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report as a whole.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

The Stated Clerk presented a notice of reconsideration, as mailed to commissioners ten days prior to the meeting as provided by Book of Order 98.39.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery voted to reconsider (Paper H) its action on February 27, 1973 in a stated meeting of the Presbytery, approving item 2 (b) on the report of the General Council which reads as follows:

"That the Presbytery remit Synod and General Assembly per capita apportionments in the same percentage as received from the churches; and that General Assembly commissioners be assured that their per diem will be met in full by Presbytery, if reduced by the General Assembly."

Upon motion, the following resolution was introduced and considered:
WHEREAS the Presbytery of Detroit is in the process of negotiating for staff within the Planning, Programming, Budgeting, and Evaluation System of the Synod of the Covenant, the Presbytery needs to be in a position of strength which strength would be seriously weakened if the action of February 27, 1973 were to be sustained; WHEREAS the Presbytery of Detroit by its action of February 27, 1973 would seriously limit the administrative budgets of the Synod of the Covenant and of the Office of the General Assembly, particularly if this action should become a precedent for other judicatories;

WHEREAS the implications of the precedent being established by the Presbytery of Detroit if followed by local churches would be so complex as to be administratively impossible, and would seriously undermine the corporate and connectional qualities of the United Presbyterian Church;

HEREAS the action of the Presbytery of Detroit on February 27, 1973 would imply that eneral Assembly commissioners' per diem would be paid by the Presbytery of Detroit of reduced by the General Assembly, the churches which did remit their full General Assembly, Synod and Presbytery per capita apportionments would be required to fulfil obligations in a ratio of more than one for one:

THEREFORE, Be it resolved that:

- 1. The action of the Presbytery of Detroit on February 27, 1973, be rescinded, and
- 2. The treasurer of the Presbytery of Detroit be instructed to remit full per capita apportionments to the Synod of the Covenant and the General Assembly whether collected from the churches or not, and
- 3. The Bills and Overtures Committee of the Presbytery of Detroit be instructed to prepare an overture to the General Assembly for consideration at its 186th annual meeting (1974) which will clarify the system of apportionment and collecting General Assembly, Synod and Presbytery per capita apportionments.

<u>Upon motion</u>, the resolution was amended (Paper I) to provide that the Presbytery of Detroit express concern over the 45% proposed increase in Synod apportioment to be acted upon later this week (i.e., at the annual meeting of Synod).

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery divided the resolution into four parts, debating the parts independently.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved Resolution 1, rescinding of the action of the Presbytery on February 27, 1973.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery considered a motion to postpone until the September meeting of Presbytery the other paragraphs of the resolution.

The motion to postpone was divided.

<u>Ipon motion</u>, Presbytery postponed to the September meeting paragraph 2, namely, The treasurer of the Presbytery of Detroit be instructed to remit full per capita apportionments to the Synod of the Covenant and the General Assembly whether collected from the churches or not.

Upon motion, Presbytery postponed to the September meeting paragraph 3, namely,
The Bills and Overtures Committee of the Presbytery of Detroit be
instructed to prepare an overture to the General Assembly for
consideration at its 186th annual meeting (1974) which will
clarify the system of apportionment and collecting General
Assembly, Synod and Presbytery per capita apportionments.

The motion to postpone the amendment, paragraph 4, was defeated.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery voted to express its concern over the 45% proposed increase in Synod apportionment to be acted upon later this week (at the annual meeting of Synod).

Upon motion, the order of the day was voted.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery adjourned at 10:10 p.m. with prayer by the Moderator, giving thanks for the ministry of Interim Presbytery Executive, Dr. Robert H. Yolton.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery adopted the recommendation that the Presbytery of Detroit participate in the Evangelism Associate Program, in cooperation with the Synod of the Covenant and the unit of Evangelism of the Program Agency of the United Presbyterian Church.

The following recommendations were moved as a substitute for the Committee's second recommendation:

That the Committee on Evangelism, in cooperation with the Synod and the Program Agency, nominate to the Presbytery a person to serve as the Evangelism Associate for a period of six months; That the Committee on Evangelism supervise the work of the Evangelism Associate with ten selected churches to maximize their evangelistic efforts:

That the Committee on Evangelism present to the Presbytery for its action its recommendation of the ten churches, such action to take place prior to the contracting of the Evangelism Associate;

That the Committee on Evangelism present to the Presbytery for its action a proposed job description for the Evangelism Associate, including an explanation of the committee's understanding of the style of evangelism that is to be pursued, such action to take place prior to the contracting of the Evangelism Associate.

The substitute motion lost.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery adopted the Committee recommendation that the Presbytery of Detroit authorize its Committee on Evangelism to select and employ, in cooperation with the Synod and Program Agency, the Evangelism Associate for six months, and to supervise his work with ten selected churches to maximize their evangelistic efforts.

Upon motion, Presbytery adjourned at noon with prayer by The Rev. Ivan Smith.

DETROIT PRESBYTERY A RATIONALE FOR STAFFING

The Presbytery of Detroit, as a part of God's People, shares with the Church Universal, the United Presbyterian Church, and the Synod of the Covenant in particular, its commitment to Jesus Christ in His Mission. Through the power of the Holý Spirit under the authority of the Scripture and within the framework of the Constitution, the Presbytery expresses its life and work through celebration in the worship and work of its life together and through witness and servanthood in the world.

The fundamental role of the Presbytery Staff is to enable and to facilitate the Presbytery Mission as it is developed within the following framework of the basic presbytery responsibilities:

- 1. To develop and participate in the church-wide, synod-wide and presbytery-wide process of the United Presbyterian Church and to develop an awareness of being one in Christ.
- 2. To develop and order its own life as a community of God's People.
- 3. To develop and support its particular ministries.
- 4. To develop and enable its churches to fulfill their responsibilities as units of mission.

Affirming Staff as an integral part of this celebration and servanthood, the Presbytery of Detroit makes the following assumptions regarding Presbytery Staff:

- 1. For the first time, the United Presbyterian Constitution recognizes Staff as a legitimate part of the missionary structure of the United Presbyterian Church. The assumption that Staff are a vital and a necessary part of a total ministry of worship and work is essential to this Rationale for Staffing of the Presbytery of Detroit.
- 2. The Presbytery Staff consisting of an Executive Presbyter and Associate Executive Presbyters shall work under the Chairmanship and general supervision of the Synod Executive. Presbytery Executive Staff and any Synod Mission Council Staff and General Assembly Staff working within the Presbytery should complement one another as a part of a total system.

- 3. The number of Presbytery Staff positions is to be determined in light of the Mission Priorities of the Presbytery.
- 4. The future staffing patterns of the Presbytery will be developed in light of emerging staff at the Synod and General Assembly levels.
- 5. The Executive Presbyter is the key member of the Synod Staff with both Presbytery and Synod accountability. The position description reflects an understanding of the connectionalism and complimentary relationship between the Presbytery and the Synod as mandated by the Constitution of the United Presbyterian Church.
- 6. Additional presbytery staff will be validated in negotiation between the Synod and the presbyteries. The Executive Presbyter shall have responsibility for any such additional staff having primary relationship to the Presbytery.
- 7. The Synod Division of Staff Services will annually review the performance of the Executive Presbyter in consultation with the General Council of the Presbytery. (F.G. 69.04). The Presbytery will review annually the performance of any other staff related to it. (F.G. 69.08).
- 8. In its hiring and staffing patterns, the Presbytery of Detroit will provide equal opportunity and employment to prohibit discrimination because of race, color, national origin, sex or marital status, and will provide equal opportunity through a positive and continuing program of recruitment and training.

Relationship of proposed Presbytery Staff Structure to Mission Goals of the Presbytery.


In developing the descriptions of the positions of Executive Staff for the Presbytery of Detroit special care was taken to describe the positions almost exclusively in terms of the mission goals for 1974. That is to say, very little regard was given to the manner in which the traditional or "housekeeping" work of the Committees of the Presbytery might be continued. Although risks are attendant to such a preoccupation with prospective mission goals, certainly the accumulated and continuing activities of the Presbytery will be forced to come under careful scrutiny when we staff strictly for the future.

There is clear need for the Staff described. There may be clear need for additional Staff in terms of the traditional activities of the Presbytery.

With respect to the relationship of proposed staff to "ethnic populations and human need," and to "the nature of the location of our churches," we intend to pursue mission goals in these areas only through an Associate Executive for Presbytery Ministries. As we seek to reorganize and revtalize the United Presbyterian Church, the Presbytery of Detroit bases the need for this new life not on the Church's social action emphasis, but on the hunger we all have for the bread which perishes not. Most of our people have rejected us not because we have had too much to do with social action, but because we have had too little to do with sharing our understanding of God's love. No church, or her people can be a force for God until and unless we adequately understand our commitment to Him. From that stems everything else. Therefore, our focus will be on the Christian development of our individuals, sessions and local churches in order to be equipped for Christian action.

Proposed Structure

The staff structure for the Presbytery of Detroit will include one Executive Presbyter, one Associate Executive for Local Church Development (Enrichment), one Associate Executive for Local Church Development (Extension) and presbytery business affairs, one Associate Executive for Leadership Development (Education), and one Associate Executive for Presbytery Ministries shared one-half time with another presbytery or a church. This will be a total of four and one-half executives including the Executive Presbyter.



IN THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

A. DESCRIPTION OF THE POSITION

I. Definition of Office

The Associate for Local Church Development (Enrichment) is a member of the Administrative Staff of the Presbytery under the direct supervision of the Executive Presbyter. He/she will assist in implementation of the policies and programs of the Presbytery with local churches, Presbytery and Synod organizations, and General Assembly agencies as directed by the Executive Presbyter.

II. Purpose and Objectives

The Associate for Local Church Development (Enrichment) is the servant of the Presbytery and of the Church at large seeking to help the individual ministries of its members, corporate ministries of its Sessions, cooperative ministries of denominational, ecumenical and interfaith agencies to be faithful under the Lordship of Christ. The responsibilities of the position are as follows:

- 1. To develop and implement a Presbytery-wide strategy for churches.
- 2. To initiate a program of cooperation with all Sessions in undertaking periodic review of their Missions.
- 3. To assist Sessions in developing people resources to relate to society's alienations and needs.
- 4. To provide training so that Sessions can lead in visitation, evangelism and other methods of witnessing.
- 5. To relate administratively to the Presbytery Committees on Interpretation and Stewardship and Evangelism, and such other Departments or Committees of the Presbytery as may be assigned by the Executive Presbyter.

III. Accountability

The Associate for Local Church Development (Enrichment) shall be elected for an indefinite term. He/she is called and employed by the Presbytery in consultation with the Synod Division of Staff Services. He/she shall be accountable to the Presbytery through an appropriate committee and under the supervision of the Executive Presbyter.

IV. Evaluation and Review

This process shall conform with Plan for Evaluation of the Staff Performance, Presbytery of Detroit, dated 5-8-73.

B. DESCRIPTION OF THE PERSON

The person will be a clear, concise thinker who has the ability to communicate effectively. The person will be a good listener; an enabler, not a leader; tenacious, innovative, creative. The person will recognize mission as both being and doing. The person must appreciate and understand diversity. The person must understand Local Church Development is only one area in the total life of the Church.

The person will be wise, vigorous, politically sensitive, and open to all theological and social stances found within the Presbytery. The person will be smooth in conducting inter-personal relations and a successful negotiator. The person must have a good track record in parish ministry. The person must be an inspirational figure who is supportive of pastors. This is a full-time position and cannot be shared.

In addition, this should be a person whose commitment to Christ is visible and real, in both vocational and personal life. The person should have had practical experience in the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. or Presbyterian Church U.S. The person shall be a ruling or teaching elder. This should be a person who believes in the Church and who is open-minded toward the changes that may come about by orderly processes under the guidance of the Holy Spirit as the Church is responsive to changing conditions. While loyal to the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., the person should be of ecumenical spirit with commitment to the Universal Chruch of Jesus Christ.

This person's experience should include successful participation in the local church, the Presbytery, and the Synod, and should include knowledge of the structure and work of the General assemblies and their Agencies. The person should have experience in discharging executive responsibility, preferably in some area of the Church's life, and should have demonstrated leadership ability in some kind of staff relationships.

This should be a person who can work as a resourceful leader and can relate to staff in an inspirational way. The person should be thoughtful, imaginative, capable of proposing constructive innovation and supportive of recommendations proposed by others when adopted. The person should be able to organize his or her own time, recognize and accept priorities.

This should be a person with theological convictions within the confessions of the United Presbyerian Church in the U.S.A. and the Presbyterian Church U.S., whose theological convictions and attitudes permit the person to work harmoniously with people whose theological emphases are different. The person shall have a positive commitment to the special concerns of human values of all people regardless of race, ethnic origin, sex, age or marital status. The

person should be conversant with the issues that confront society and the Christian Church and should have a vigorous desire for the Church to minister to the people and to society. The person should be one who understands the values of conflict and controversy and participates for reconciliation and resolution of the issues.

This shall be a person with adequate knowledge and experience in interpersonal relation skills and group dynamics. Skill in communication is of high importance for this position. This applies to both oral and written, public and private communication. The person must be able to communicate with clarity through the letters, papers, documents, and literary tools used in doing the work of the Presbytery. The person must have skill as a writer and public speaker and also be able to evaluate and utilize the skills of others in specialized forms of communication.

This person must be an individual with personal characteristics that inspire confidence and respect. The person must also have a capacity for genuine relationships that last.

This person should have a reasonable understanding of his or her own strengths and weaknesses. He or she should possess freedom from the necessity of self-defense, confidence without arrogance, humility without self-depreciation, self-acceptance that leaves room for evaluation and personal growth.

This person must have a clear record in all regards as to finances, family, personal conduct, personal health and ecclesiastical status. The person must be positive and enthusiastic about his or her work, the Church and his or her own personal witness.

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DESCRIPTION OF ASSOCIATE EXECUTIVE FOR LOCAL CHURCH DEVELOPMENT (EXTENSION)

IN THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

A. DESCRIPTION OF THE POSITION

I. Definition of Office

The Associate for Local Church Development (Extension) is a member of the Administrative Staff of the Presbytery under the direct supervision of the Executive Presbyter. He/she will assist in implementation of the policies and programs of the Presbytery with local churches, Presbytery and Synod organizations, and General Assembly agencies as directed by the Executive Presbyter.

II. Purpose and Objectives

The Associate for Local Church Development (Extension) is the servant of the Presbytery and of the Church at large seeking to help the individual ministries of its members, corporate ministries of its Sessions, cooperative ministries of denominational, eccumenical and interfaith agencies to be faithful under the Lordship of Christ. The responsibilities of the position are as follows:

- 1. To encourage Sessions to propose and initiate innovative ministries.
- 2. To cooperate in pilot program, and to provide funding and special skills where necessary.
- 3. To be responsible for Church Extension and for financial aid to Sessions.
- 4. To serve as manager of business affairs for the Presbytery and manager of the business office of the Presbytery.
- 5. To relate administratively to the Trustees of the Presbytery, the Committee on National Missions and to such other departments or Committees of the Presbytery as may be assigned by the Executive Presbyter.

III. Accountability

The Associate for Local Church Development (Extension) shall be elected for an indefinite term. He/she is called and employed by Presbytery in consultation with the Synod Division of Staff Services. He/she shall be accountable to the Presbytery through an appropriate committee and under the supervision of the Executive Presbyter.

IV. Evaluation and Review

This process shall conform with Plan for Evaluation of the Staff Performance, Presbytery of Detroit, dated 5-8-73.

While loyal to the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., the person should be of ecumenical spirit with commitment to the Universal Chruch of Jesus Christ.



IV. Evaluation and Review

This process shall conform with Plan for Evaluation of the Staff Performance, Presbytery of Detroit, dated 5-8-73.



The responsibilities of the position are as follows:

- To identify and act in those specific areas of concern best suited to Presbytery action because of scope or cost and will engage in new and innovative mission programs.
- 2. To include ecumenical, non-parish, ethnic and other social concerns.
- 3. To identify, encourage and use national, state, and local government program funding opportunities for meeting human needs consistent with the concerns of the church.
- 4. To relate administratively to the Presbytery Committees on Candidates, Religion and Race, Church and Society, Ecumenical Relations, UMHE, DIM, and to such other departments or of the Presbytery as may be assigned by the Executive Presbyter.

III. Accountability

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The Associate Executive for Presbytery Ministries shall be elected for an indefinite term. He/she is called and employed by Presbytery in consultation with the Synod Division of Staff Services. He/she shall be accountable to the Presbytery through an appropriate committee and under the supervision of the Executive Presbyter.

IV. Evaluation and Review

This process shall conform with Plan for Evaluation of the Staff Performance, Presbytery of Detroit, dated 5-8-73.

B. DESCRIPTION OF THE PERSON

The person must be quick to identify needs, and knowledgeable concerning need for programs. The person must exercise sound judgment, particularly with respect to cost of programs. While loyal to the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., the person should be of ecumenical spirit with commitment to the Universal Chruch of Jesus Christ.



. CONCERNS FOR 1974

PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

In 1972 the Presbytery of Detroit authorized a special committee to recommend Goals and Objectives for 1973, to be used in the development of the 1973 Unified Budget of Presbytery. The report of this committee focused on the local congregation with a "support through resourcing" concept. In brief, four Concerns were approved.

The General Council in December 1972 asked the Budget Negotiating Team to evaluate these Concerns and recommend revisions for 1974. Two meetings have been held, with individual work between them.

The Evaluation Team reviewed its inability to use effectively the 1973 Concerns in building the 1974 Budget.

The Evaluation Team agrees that Presbytery needs to develop a full Planning-Budgeting--Evaluating System, with full participation by the committees and sessions of the Presbytery. Until this can be accomplished, the following Presbytery Concerns have been formulated, so that committees and sessions may seek to focus them in goals and objectives for mission programs within their areas of responsibility.

It was felt that the Concerns for 1974 should be an expression of the Presbytery's twofold responsibility to be an effective unit of mission itself and to resource as adequately as possible the sessions of the Presbytery. They serve as Concerns, but the Concerns which follow are not listed in order of priority.

The Evaluation Team recommends:

- 1. That the General Council appoint a committee to recommend a full planning process for developing concerns, goals, and objectives, with criteria for evaluation, for use in preparing the 1975 budget.
- That the following Concerns and Goals for 1974 be approved.

CONCERNS FOR 1974

PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

PREFACE

The New Testament states:

"If any one is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has passed away, beyond, the new has come. All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation.

So we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We beseech you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God."

(II Corinthians 5:17-20)

The Confession of 1967 states:

"The church confesses its faith when it bears a present witness to God's grace in Jesus Christ."

"In every age the church has expressed its witness in words and deeds as the need of the time required..."

"God's reconciling work in Jesus Christ and the mission of reconciliation to which he has called his church are the heart of the gospel in any age..."

"In Jesus Christ God was reconciling the world to himself. Jesus Christ is God with man. He is the eternal Son of the Father, who became man and lived among us to fulfill the work of reconciliation. He is present in the church by the power of the Holy Spirit to continue and complete his mission. This work of God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, is the foundation of all confessional statements about God, man, and the world. Therefore the church calls men to be reconciled to God and to one another."

The Form of Government states:

"4. The great ends of the Church are the proclamation of the gospel for salvation of men; the shelter, nature, and spiritual fellowship of the children of God; the maintenance of divine worship; the preservation of the truth; the promotion of social righteousness; and the exhibition of the Kingdom of Heaven to the world."

- I. Priority Concerns for Presbytery's Own Mission:

 - Goal: To develop and execute cooperative efforts with synod based on mutual goals and available resources in terms of program, staff and finances and to define those particular areas of concern peculiar to each judicatory.
 - D. Reorganization of Presbytery
 - Goal: To initiate and refine the plans for the more meaningful and productive operation of Detroit Presbytery, overcoming alienation and fragmentation and providing increased participation at all levels of activity.
 - E. Staff of Presbytery
 - Goal: To provide staffing as authorized by the Presbytery and concurred in by Synod, based on shared funding, Presbytery needs and financial capability.
 - F. Conduct of Presbytery-level Ministries
 - Goal: To identify and act in those specific areas of concern best suited to Presbytery action because of scope or cost and to engage in new and innovative mission programs.
 - G. Strategy and Development of Churches
 - Goal: To develop and implement a Presbytery-wide strategy for churches and to initiate a program of cooperation with all sessions in undertaking periodic review of their missions.
 - H. *Support of Ministers and Those in Church Occupations
 - Goal: To meet the various personal and vocational needs of those in church occupations, to provide opportunity for educational and special skill advancement and to support the improvement of the relocation process.
 - I. *Participation in Government Programs
 - Goal: To identify, encourage and use national, state and local government program funding opportunities for meeting human needs consistent with the concerns of the Church.

- II. Priority Concerns for Resourcing Presbytery's Sessions and Churches
 - A. *Strengthen Connectionalism
 - Goal: To create the means by which the vital concerns of sessions and church members are incorporated in the goals and objectives of Presbytery programs and to identify the appropriate role of each in their achievement.
 - B. Utilize the Church's Resources in and for Society
 - Goal: To assist sessions in developing people resources to relate to society's alienations and needs.
 - C. *Develop People Resources to Meet the Church's Needs
 - Goal: To help sessions to discover, enlist, challenge and train leadership of all age levels for the total life of the Church.
 - D. *Develop Teacher Education
 - Goal: To provide the best resources and skills possible for educational use, to publicize and encourage their use, and to furnish educational leadership expertise.
 - E. *Strengthen the Witness of the Church
 - Goal: To provide training so that sessions can lead their churches in visitation evangelism and other methods of witnessing.
 - F. *Encourage Innovative Ministries by Churches
 - Goal: To encourage sessions to propose and initiate innovative ministries, to cooperate in pilot programs, and to provide funding and special skills where necessary.

PLAN FOR EVALUATION OF STAFF PERFORMANCE

PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

The Presbytery of Detroit is presently employing a process by which it adopts specific mission Concerns for the ensuing program year (September through June) at its March meeting.

During April, May and June, income is projected and the budget requests developed in light of the Mission Concerns are received from the Ecclesiastical and Program Committees of the Presbytery.

In September and October, Priority Analysis and Budget Negotiation and Review occur involving a Priority Analysis Team, the General Council Budget Committee, the several committee chairpersons, and Presbyterywide hearings.

In November, the Presbytery adopts its budget, thereby validating the division of income for support of Mission Concerns on a priority basis.

Thus, this process of adoption of Mission Concerns by the Presbytery is equivalent to goal identification for purposes of evaluation of staff performance. We expect to allow our Executive Presbyter wide latitude in the detailed manner in which the presbytery staff is reviewed and evaluated. However, minimal requirements will include the following:

- 1. Interlock with the Synod of the Covenant review and evaluation process, particularly as it relates to Executive Presbyters.
- 2. Tripartite involvement in the process of goal identification, performance appraisal and response (Executive, Associate Executive, and Judicatory Committee).
- 3. An annual cycle consisting of:
 - April and May goal identification prior to beginning of program year.
 - November and December mid-year review and adjustment.
 - June program year-end review, evaluation, appraisal and response.
 - d. June summer goal identification.
 - e. September post-summer review.

Presbytery heard Elder Eleanor Leigh, Chairperson of the Special Committee on Budget, who named other members of the committee, and introduced The Rev. Eldon Beery, who reviewed the budget process. The committee heard and responded to questions on the budget, and suggested that concerns for specific changes be submitted to the appropriate committees for processing before final action November 27, 1973.

Upon motion, from the floor, Presbytery instructed the Committee on National Missions to study the support needs of Youth Island.

Upon motion, Presbytery received the report.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report of General Council as a whole.

THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. Richard J. Milford. (Paper I,J)

A Memorial Minute for The Rev. Arthur Boyd was presented by The Rev. Henry P. Stenner, his successor at Milford:

Arthur M. Boyd, servant of the Church of Jesus Christ, transferred his membership from the Presbytery of Detroit to the Church Triumphant on July 1st of this year at the age of 98.

Arthur Boyd, remembered by some of you as an active member of the Presbytery, retired from the pastorate before some of us had any inclination to the Gospel Ministry and before others were even born. Raised and educated in Toronto, Canada, he came to the United States to serve the church. Ordained in 1904 in Grove City, Pennsylvania, he soon became known as a men of letters. His earning of a Ph.D., and his scholarly approach to the Scriptures, identified him as a man of unusual and rare talent. His active life as a presbyter and teaching elder took the form of service as a pastor, president of a college and member of the staff of the Board of Christian Education where years of service put to use his scholarship and writing talent.

His last full-time pastorate was in the Milford Presbyterian Church during the years 1929 through 1936. His call stipulated \$2,500 and manse and according to those who remembered, it included the usual perquisites of butter, eggs, and an occasional chicken and vegetables from the surrounding farms.

Dr. Boyd's ministry, among Milford people, identified him as a scholarly, father type, well versed in the Scriptures--a good pastor with stately bearing, a Scotch-English accent and a good sense of humor. His wife was remembered as in every respect an English lady with charm and poise and an affection for her family and the community. His daughter, Frances, graduated from Milford High School and ultimately married and settled in Saginaw where Dr. and Mrs. Boyd also made their home during the last 35 years.

Dr. Boyd was preceded in death by his wife in 1969. Ministering during the depression of the early thirties during an era when Sunday baseball was criticized from many quarters, Dr. Boyd called one Sunday afternoon in 1935 upon a family who were very much caught up in the outcome of a particular game. The husband said quietly to his wife, "Do you suppose I dare try to listen to the radio?" After some hemming and hawing, the concern was laid before Dr. Boyd, who replied, "If that's going to sink us, let's go down together," and they cheered together as the Tigers went on to win the World Series.

Dr. Boyd was a faithful servant of Jesus Christ, a diligent worker in the Presbyterian Church, a presbytery and teaching elder whose influence lingers. The Chief Shepherd has appeared and given him a crown of glory that will never fade away.

This memorial moment is but a brief mention of a small part of what has been recorded in God's own record of one who labored in our midst and preached Christ crucified.

 A Memorial Minute for The Rev. Daniel Hughes was presented by The Rev. Aelwyn Hughes, his successor at Welsh Church:

The Rev. Daniel Hughes was born in Coed-poeth, North Wales in the year 1874. He received his ministerial training at the Brights Grove Baptist College Manchester, England. His first pastorate was in Darwin, Lancashire; he then served churches in Saltney, Cheshire, the Church of Christ, Liverpool, Calfaria, Llanelli, Crane Street, Pont-y-pool and Siloam, Machen, S. Wales. During the first World War he served as a chaplain to the Armed Forces.

In 1939, Rev. Hughes came to Toronto, Canada, to attend his daughter's wedding, the now Mrs. Daisy Heaton. On Labor Day weekend in 1939, Rev. Hughes attended the National Gymanfa Ganu (Festival of Song) held at Buffalo, New York. Whilst there he was invited to fill the pulpit of the

Welsh Church in Detroit, for two Sundays. During this Labor Day weekend, newscame that all transatlantic shipping was stopped--war had been declared.

The Rev. Daniel Hughes stayed with the Welsh Church in Detroit for fourteen years. He was received into the Presbytery of Detroit in May of 1946. He became pastor of the Welsh Church in June of 1946. Due to ill health he decided to return to Wales in 1954. His pastoral relation was dissolved January 1, 1954. He was Honorably Retired in 1964. During his time in Detroit, he served his people well, being noted as an accomplished preacher and orator. On the occasion of his 50 years in the ministry, the Music Committee of the Welsh Church dedicated the Hymnal--"Mawl a Chan," Praise and Song, as a tribute to him.

Rev. Hughes had composed 13 English hymns, 12 Welsh and had translated 71 from English to Welsh and 56 from the Welsh to English. He was a genius in this line of endeavor. He was well known in Wales as a composer and four times winner of the highest award--the Bardic Chair--given at the National Eisteddfod of Wales. He was a founder and guide of the National Welsh American Library, in Utah.

Rev. Hughes had a full life. His sympathies were with the workingman of his time; he did all in his power to fight against class distinctions, a man of justice for all. Someone has said of him---What he desired then is now in practice."

In 1954 he had returned to Wales and became the interim pastor of his previous charge at Siloam, Machen, South Wales. He continued to preach until his death, at the age of 97. He now rests with his parents at Coed-poeth--the place of his birth.

The Hymnal that is used each Sunday at the Welsh Church in Detroit is a lasting tribute to The Rev. Daniel Hughes.

3. A Memorial Minute for The Rev. Francis Malzard was presented by The Rev. Allan A. Zaun:

Our esteemed friend, The Rev. Francis James Malzard, was born on February 23, 1886 on the Island of Jersey, United Kingdom, and died on June 22, 1973 in La Puente, California, in the Los Angeles area, at the age of 87. In September of 1912 he was married to Miss Alice Mary Woodley. They had six children, only one of whom, Mrs. Elizabeth Boutwell, survives. His beloved wife entered into her Eternal Reward seventeen years ago.

He was ordained by the Congregational Council of the Grafton-Orange Association of Vermont in October of 1927, after completing his studies at Auburn Theological Seminary in the State of New York. He then became a Presbyterian minister and served in the Presbyteries of Genesee (Synod of New York), and Cleveland, Columbus, and Cincinnati in the Synod of Ohio. He held important committee chairmanships, was president of various ministerial associations, and moderator of county larger parishes.

His last pastorate was at Hillsboro, Ohio, where he served for twenty years, from 1937 to June of 1956 when he was Honorably Retired by the Cincinnati Presbytery. In September of 1956 he was received as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit. Although retired, he found that in an automobile town "re-tiring" could become "retreading," and as such he wore exceptionally well. For almost 15

years he continued to be active, supplying the pulpits of the Olivet, Redeemer and other churches.

He lived for about two years at Presbyterian Village until two years ago, when he moved to California, residing in the home of his daughter and her family. He was very proud of his grandchildren and their families.

It was my privilege to be his friend, and about every two months we would exchange visits. Bad weather never deterred him in his many bus rides. He was amazingly well read in theology, and knowledgeable in the world of books--especially in the field of English literature, and could quote the classic poets at length. As many of you remember, he always carried his briefcase with him, even to Presbytery, and the opinion that he caught up in his reading at Presbytery meetings is apocryphal and unsubstantiated.

A good presbyter, faithful in attendance, he usually sat well up in front, so that he could hear what was being said. Almost without fail, he was the one who made the motion for adjournment. When teased about it, he would admit that it was a dubious distinction, but he felt that he was performing a needed service.

He knew, of course, that other presbyters also looked forward to this terminating motion--not because of any flagging zeal for the concerns of the Kingdom--but because of the lateness, sometimes, of the evening, and he did not want any sleeping modern-day Eutychus to fall out of a window, as happened that memorable night when even such an eloquent preacher as the Apostle Paul preached overlong. This Presbytery is gifted with a few Apostle Pauls in terms of their abilities, and with many in terms of their prolixity.

Above all, he was a man of <u>character</u>. What John Watson (Ian Maclaren) said of Jesus' estimate of true happiness was eminently characteristic of Frank Malzard:

"Blessed," says Jesus, "is the man who thinks lowly of himself; who has passed through great trials; who gives in and endures; who longs for perfection; who carries a tender heart; who has a passion for holiness; who sweetens human life; who dares to be true to conscience."

Although firm in his conviction of everlasting life and the ultimate reunion with our loved ones in Christ, he sorely missed his wife Alice, his dear companion across the years. She was an accomplished poet, and wrote this poem which he deeply cherished and occasionally quoted. I share it with you with some hesitancy--my brothers and sisters, and his brothers and sisters--for it is personal, and yet speaks to each of us--and it gives us an insight into the richness of her mind and heart, and of the faith and devotion which they both shared.

It is entitled "Rendezvous" --

I have a rendezvous with love-Not on this earth,
But in some fair ethereal realm above,
Where interruped love shall weave again
Earth's colors, only brighter, truer;
And we shall smile when looking back
On, life's short day, and say,
"This is real life; the other was but shadow,
For there in tears our love was born,
But here in joy completed."

Come, happy day when I this tryst shall keep,
And that sweet love renew,
Hand in hand to wander through
The Elysian fields;
To know that death can come no more,
And all our parting o'er
And tears no more shall flow.
I shall come, dearest one, above;
Watch, wait for me, and we
Shall keep our rendezvous of love.

So here, then, is my glad and affectionate tribute to my friend, Francis Malzard, whose life and work for Christ and His Church have enriched us all.

James Russell to become assistant pastor, effective November 1, 1973, with the following terms: salary \$8,200, manse of \$3,000 housing allowance, car allowance \$1,500, utilities \$600, 15% pension, Synod insurance, one month vacation, two weeks study leave, \$325 study expense and annual review; and placed the invitation in Mr. Russell's hands.

Philip Ferguson to become pastor, effective November 4, 1973 with the following terms: salary \$10,000, housing allowance \$3,300, car allowance \$1,800, 15% pension, utility allowance \$900, health insurance, one month vacation, two weeks study leave, \$200 study expense and annual review; placed the call in Mr. Ferguson's hands; and approved the following Administrative Commission to install Mr. Ferguson on Sunday, November 4, 1973 at 10:00 a.m.: The Rev. Paul Johnson for the Moderator, The Rev. Donald Lester, The Rev. Charles Sommers, Elder Miss Sheryl Davis (Saint Thomas), Elder Leland Ferguson (Birmingham, First). (Paper J)

- 8. Upon motion, Presbytery concurred in the request of The Rev. Ralph C. Stribe and Church of Our Saviour, W. Bloomfield that the pastoral relationship be dissolved effective October 31, 1973; heard from Elder James E. Steele, a representative of the congregation; granted the Session permission to supply the pulpit; and continued the financial support and use of the manse for Mr. Stribe for six months or until he receives permanent employment, whichever comes first.
- 9. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following Administrative Commission to install The Rev. Bryce L. McGowan as pastor of East Detroit Covenant Church, Sunday, October 28, 1973 at 7:30 p.m.: The Rev. William Whitledge, The Rev. Richard Williams, The Rev. Lawrence Cater, Elder Joyce Flick (Covenant, East Detroit), and Elder Clifford Lockwood (Covenant, East Detroit).
- 10. Presbytery approved the following Administrative Commission to install The Rev. William Brown as pastor of First Church, Brighton, Sunday, November 18, 1973 at 7:30 p.m.: The Rev. William Whitledge, The Rev. Henry Stenner, The Rev. Norman Riedesel, Elder Fred Dettmer (Brighton), Elder Tessa Padley (Brighton); and enrolled as a corresponding member The Rev. Jeffrey S. O'Neill, Presbytery of Great Rivers.
- 11. Upon motion, Presbytery concurred in the request of The Rev. Hugh J.
 Leaming and the White Lake Church to dissolve the pastoral relationship
 existing between them, effective December 31, 1973; heard Elder Nelson W.
 Anderson of the congregation; and granted permission to Mr. Leaming to
 labor outside the bounds of Presbytery.
- 12. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the invitation of The Rev. Arnold Kuhl to become Associate and Vice-President for Tapp Associates, Philadelphia; and granted Mr. Kuhl permission to labor outside the bounds of Presbytery.
- 13. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery appointed The Rev. John K. Mitchell moderator of the Rosedale Gardens Church.

Sherman, who gave a progress report on the work of the Task Force on Corporate Social Responsibility, highlighted the interest of the committee in the problems of the independent gas dealer in the current energy crisis, and solicited the comment of interested presbyters. Upon motion, Presbytery received the report for information.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION reported through The Rev. James D. Cole, chairman, who described the service of Presbytery Aides for Christian Education who are available to all local churches. These are resource persons who have competence in a broad spectrum of the Christian Education task: administration, the work of the administration strategy in Christian education, teacher recruitment, training, and competence, learning objectives, writing objectives, discovery concepts, use of the Scriptures, teen teaching. (Paper L)

<u>Upon motion</u>, the report was received.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery adjourned at 8:55 p.m. with prayer by the Moderator, The Rev. William F. Whitledge.

Upon motion, Presbytery seated as a corresponding member The Rev. Robert L. Kincheloe, American Baptist Church, who is Executive Director, Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches. Presbytery also recognized Mr. Edward Koster, Presbytery of Norfolk, Presbyterian Church, U.S., and confirmation classes from Rosedale Gardens and Ann Arbor, First.

Upon motion, the minutes of the meeting of October 23, 1973 were approved. (Paper B) Upon motion, the docket was approved as amended to permit the Committee on Church and Society to report under Policy Considerations. (Paper A)

The Minute for Mission was presented through The Rev. Ty K. Shin, who introduced Elder Harry Whang, who gave a progress report on the ministry and growth of the Korean Community Church, Detroit. (Papers C,D)

LEGAL ACTIONS

THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through the chairman, Elder Jack Callam. (Paper E)

- Upon motion, Presbytery assigned the Certificates of Investment in Northside Associated Ministries received from the Presbytery of Southern Michigan to Northside Presbyterian Church of Ann Arbor and authorized the treasurer to execute said assignment.
- The committee reported for information the following: Because the Task Force on Camps and Conferences (now the Michigan Section of the Extended Experience Education (EEE) Task Force of the Synod of the Covenant), has had more experience in this, the Committee on National Missions has asked the EEE Task Force to study the possible use, insurance liability and the need for Youth Island as an educational resource, and to report its recommendations to the Committee on National Missions.

It is the judgment of the Committee on National Missions that, pending such a study, no action should be taken to make Youth Island a Validated Special Opportunity for 1974.

If the report warrants this action, Presbytery may later amend the 1974 Unified Budget to add Youth Island as a VSO. There appears to be ample time for this, since no 1973 contributions to Youth Island have been received as of October 31, 1973.

THE GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland. (Papers F,G,H,I,J,K,L)

1. THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS of the General Council was called on to reporthrough the chairperson, Elder Mary Grace Adams, who placed in nomination for commissioners to the 186th (1974) General Assembly those named in the October 23 report of the committee previously distributed, with biographical sketches of the nominees. (Paper G.H)

<u>Upon motion</u>, the report was received. The Rev. James M. McCall was nominated from the floor as a minister principal. (Paper I)

Upon motion, the nominations were closed.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery suspended the rules in order to elect all except principal minister commissioners by voice vote.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery elected all categories except principal minister commissioners, by voice vote.

The Moderator then announced the following Committee of Tellers to enable the Presbytery to proceed to vote by ballot on the principal minister commissioners. Elders - Peter A. Niemi (First U.P., Royal Oak, Robert Swirles (Evergreen Village), Richard Tucker (Rosedale Gardens), Harry Whang (Korean) Verne Koppin (Orchard Lake), Dale C. Johnson (Farmington), Suzanne Hogg (Ann Arbor, First), Janice Branyan (Grosse Ile).

Ministers - Robert W. Richter, Chairman, Robert L. Lindsey, Larry L. Lewis, Craig Dykstra, Douglas D. Carter, Thomas A. Bailey, Vern Campbell, Benjamin Helmke.

2. Mrs. Adams read the nominations of the Special Committee on Nominations to the Committee on Nominations. (Paper J)

<u>Upon motion</u>, the report was received. The following were placed in nomination:

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery elected the chairman, there being no nominations from the floor.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery elected the members named, there being no nominations from the floor.

- 3. THE SPECIAL BUDGET COMMITTEE of the General Council reported through the chairperson, Elder Eleanor Leigh, who presented the Proposed 1974 Unified Budget and accompanying recommendations. (Paper K)
 - a. Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the following policies regarding Validated Special Opportunities:
 - (1) The Presbytery, through its Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship and the committee responsible for the program, shall promote the Validated Special Opportunity, encouraging the recipient also to participate in the promotion of the program in order to insure the full support of each Validated Special Opportunity.
 - (2) Validated Special Opportunities shall be supported by specially designated contributions from individuals and churches. If churches are to receive Presbytery Causes "credit," contributions must be remitted to the Mission Treasury Services (formerly Central Receiving Agency) or directly to the Presbytery clearly designated for the particular Validated Special Opportunity.
 - (3) A program or agency supported as a Validated Special Ministry shall not be included within the basic budget of the Presbytery.

- (4) All contributions designated for Validated Special Opportunities shall be remitted as received, up to the total amount budgeted.
- (5) When the budgeted total has been received, the treasurer shall ask the donor to decide among three options:
 - (a) Redesignate the contribution to another Validated Special Opportunity;
 - (b) Remit the contribution directly to the particular Validated Special Opportunity without Presbytery Causes "Credit," or
 - (c) Request that the contribution be returned.
- b. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery established the 1974 per capita apportionment for the Presbytery of Detroit at 71¢, making the total apportionment thus:

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery extended the docket in order to allow continued consideration of the Proposed 1974 Unified Budget.

- c. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery amended the Proposed 1974 Unified budget by adding \$500 income from 1973 monies not spent by the Youth Ministry Task Force and increasing the 1974 Program #3006 \$500 for scholarships to the Donald Griggs Workshop, to be held February 12-15, 1974. (Paper F)
- d. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the 1974 Unified Budget as amended and as attached: (Paper K)
- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the following recommendations:
 - a. That the Per Capita and Benevolence Funds of Presbytery be consolidated effective 1/1/74, but with internal controls sufficient to assure that per capita funds are finally used for ecclesiastical purposes only.
 - b. That the Treasurer be authorized to use Per Capita and Benevolence Fund Reserves monies in order to expend the 1974 Unified Budget at the rate of 1/12th per month.
 - c. That the Committee on National Missions be asked, as a separate corporation, to use its reserve monies proportionately to help meet cash flow requirements of the total Presbytery operation.
- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery suspended the Structure and Bylaws of the Presbytery of Detroit (Article IV, Section 3, Paragraph A) to allow the dissolution of the Committee on Chaplains and Service Personnel, and to assign the functions of that Committee as follows:
 - (1) The Committee on Ministerial Relations to exercise oversight of Chaplain members of Presbytery on active duty, and to give all necessary assistance to the Presbyterian Council for Chaplains and Military Personnel; and (2) The Committee on Church and Society to promote programs for integrating returning servicemen into the life of the Church.
- 6. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery discharged the following Administrative Commissions:
 - a. Installation of Bryce McGowan at Covenant Church, October 28, 1973;
 - b. Installation of Philip Ferguson at Saint Thomas Church, November 4, 1973.
- 7. The General Council reported for information the following:
 - a. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures, from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, overtures sent down by the 185th General Assembly (1972).
 - b. The General Council referred to the Detroit Council of United Presbyterian Men a notice from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly that the Presbytery of Detroit is eligible to elect five laymen to membership on the National Council of United Presbyterian Men to be held March 22, 1974 in Chicago, Illinois; and referred to the Committee on Nominations the need to nominate an advisor to the Detroit Council of United Presbyterian Men.

- c. The General Council referred to the Detroit Council of United Presbyterian Men a communication from Archibald F. Pieper, Coordinator for Men's Program, soliciting participation in the Travel Equalization Fund of the National Council of United Presbyterian Men.
- d. The General Council received a communication from J. Oscar McCloud, General Director of The Program Agency, responding to Presbytery's action relative to Trends magazine.
- e. The General Council received communications from James A. Gittings,
 United Presbyterian Editor of A.D. magazine and J. Martin Bailey, Editor
 of A.D. magazine, responding to Presbytery's action protesting an article by
 the then editor of Trends.
- f. The General Council accepted the resignation of Elder Mary Grace Adams from the Committee on Nominations, Class of 1975, effective 12/31/73, expressed appreciation for her services; and referred the vacancy to the Special Committee on Nominations.
- g. The General Council received a communication from the Session of Detroit, Westminster, (Paper F-1) supporting Presbytery's actions regarding the July/August issue of <u>Trends</u>, and reaffirming heterosexuality as the only acceptable form of sexual relationship.
- h. The General Council received a communication from the Session and congregation of Detroit, Welsh Church, asking that the Welsh Church be terminated by June of 1974; and referred the matter to the Committee on National Missions.
- i. The General Council authorized the Special Committee on Nominations to report directly to the Presbytery its nominations to the Committee on Nominations.
- j. The General Council directed that consideration be given to locating the Christian Education Resource Center wherever the Presbytery Office is located in the future.
- k. The General Council directed the Executive Presbyter to secure from local churches a standing order for <u>Rejoice</u> for distribution on a regular basis.
- 1. The General Council authorized the Committee on Church and Society to conduct pre-Presbytery meetings, in December on the subject to Alcohol and Drugs, and in January on Conflict in the Middle East.
- m. The General Council approved appointments by the Moderator as follows:
 - (1) To Synod Task Force on Staff Evaluation, Elder Robert Jones, Livonia, St. Paul's.
 - (2) To Michigan Section of Extended Experience Education (EEE) Task Force meeting, 12/6/73, The Rev. William Jones, Howell, First.
 - (3) To the Special Committee on Use of the Office Building, The Rev. James W. Kesler, Fraser, Peace; Elder Andre Blay, St. Paul's; Elder John Ecclestone, Dearborn, First.
- n. The General Council authorized the Executive Committee of General Council to fill vacancies on the Self-Development Validating Committee. (Paper L)
- o. The General Council authorized the Executive Committee of General Council to appoint a Special Committee of seven on Reorganization of Presbytery.
- p. The General Council authorized the Executive Committee of General Council to recommend nominations to fill vacancies on the Planning Committee at the next meeting of General Council.
- q. The General Council received the Treasurer's report of the 1973 Unified Budget through October 31, 1973.
- r. The General Council authorized the Stated Clerk to hold two Presbyterywide workshops in December for Clerks of Sessions and Pastors on the new General Assembly Annual Report form.

- s. The General Council referred to the Executive Committee consideration of the implications of the energy crisis for Presbytery programs for study and the preparation of contingency plans of operation, to be reported to General Council at its December meeting.
- t. The General Council empowered the Moderator to appoint a Special Committee on Worship to consist of six to eight persons for the purpose of conducting the worship portion of the meetings of Presbytery during 1974 (cf. Structure and Bylaws II-2-B) and to conduct worship workshops if there is sufficient interest.
- u. The General Council received a report that the Special Committee to Nominate Staff had met and after exploration and negotiation with the appropriate Synod departments and Council on Administrative Services was able to combine the position of a part-time Stated Clerk with a part-time staff position within the proposed mission staffing pattern.

THE COMMITTEE ON RECORDS AND REPORTS reported through the chairman, The Rev. Frank C. Marvin, Jr. (Paper M)

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following report:

- The Committee on Records and Reports recommends approval of the following records and calls to the attention of the Clerks of Sessions any exceptions noted in the minute books:
 - a. Session Minutes of Welsh Church, Calvin (West), Grandale, Monteith Memorial, Church of the Master, Ward Memorial, St. Paul's, Broadstreet, Northbrook, St. Andrew's, and Ward United.
 - b. Also the Church Registers of St. Paul's, Northbrook and Ward United. The register of Broadstreet was incomplete and not approved.
- 2. Because of a committee error the Church Registers of St. Mark's, Hope and Evergreen Village were presented instead of the Session Minutes. We will request those churches to submit their minutes at the January meeting.

ELECTION OF COMMISSIONERS TO THE 186th GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Presbytery proceeded to the election of principal minister commissioners to the 186th (1974) General Assembly by secret ballot. (Paper N) The Committee on Tellers was excused from the floor of Presbytery to count the ballots.

THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. Richard J. Milford. (Paper O)

- A Memorial Minute for The Rev. William W. Townsend was presented by The Rev. Wanzer H. Brunelle:
 - I first knew Bill Townsend when he was a senior and I was a middler at McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago. He was handsome and posed. He loved to create a good time and to have a good time. Thinking of him now, I am reminded of a modern translation of one of Jesus' beatitudes, "How blest are the debonair."

Bill was born December 23, 1902, the son of Dr. and Mrs. Wesley W. Townsend, in Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan. After early schooling there, he finished high school at Northwestern in Detroit. He did his undergraduate work at Albion College, the University of Detroit, and Wayne State. He graduated from seminary in 1931 and was ordained in the Scovel Presbyterian Church. On May 11, one week after his ordination, Bill and Doretta Haisenleder joined each other in marriage. That was the normal sequence of events in those early days. Bill and Doretta brought Thomas William into the world in 1937 and Sally Doretta in 1940. Thomas is a doctor of medicine, specializing in obstetrics and gynecology. Sally is Mrs. William Bowen and is a director of the United Foundation. From his ordination until 1934, Bill was the pastor of the Garden City Church.

In 1934, Bill became the first regular minister of Grace (now Hope) Presbyterian Church. It has been meeting, and continued to meet in the Edgar Guest School since its organization in 1930. In the first year of Bill's pastorate, the first unit of the church building was constructed. There the congregation met for six years. It grew steadily. In 1940, the sanctuary was dedicated and ten years later another unit was built to accommodate the expanding educational program. On Easter, 1965, he resigned from the pastorate to which he dedicated thirty-one years. His entire ministry was spent in the presbytery which ordained him.

His ministry, of course, has its statistics: 1,172 baptisms, 421 weddings, 2,669 new members. The statistics are cold until we translate them into terms of Christian nurture, new lives in Christ, new ambassadors of reconciliation in the community, hours with agonizing families at deathbeds, new homes established and supported in Christian love. From your experience, you can fill in the rest. Throughout the years, Bill was first and foremost a preacher and pastor.

Bill, of course, had a ministry far beyond his congregation. To list a few of his works:

Board of Directors of Delray Community House

Board of Directors of Presbyterian Village and Administrative Chairman Originator of the Northwest Detroit Community Good Friday services

Chairman of Nankin Township Welfare Commission

Special addresses and sermons on radio and television--Fireside

Chats, The Detroit Pulpit, Church at the Crossroads

Writings in The Pulpit, Monday Morning and The Spiritual Diary

How many community and presbytery committees, who but God knows

Alma College bestowed on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity in 1949

To his debonair spirit, Bill added a real personal dignity, which complemented his graciousness, warmth and good humor. He had the heart of a pastor, and his flock loved him as he loved them. He was a dedicated golfer, and his skill matched his dedication. Allan Zaun said he had a sharp, acerbic wit which, however, was never unkind; a man of strong opinions, but never opinionated.

One cannot single out his greatest achievement, but among the greatest is surely this, that he so led his congregation, that when racial changes came to the neighborhood, they were met with wisdom and skill. He gave open, glad welcome to newcomers so that in smooth transition, a strong, black congregation could be built on Grace Church to which he gave the most creative years of his life.

- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the invitation of the First Church, Batavia, New York to Mr. John Dunham; approved the following Administrative Commission to ordain Mr. Dunham on Friday, December 28, 1973 at Joslyn Avenue Church, Pontiac at 7:30 p.m.: The Rev. L. J. Peterson, The Rev. Robert Gruber, or a minister appointed by the Moderator, The Rev. Jeffrey Goldsmith, Elder Virginia Ramsey (Littlefield Blvd.), Elder Mary Dunham (Joslyn Avenue), and enrolled as corresponding members The Rev. Fremont Chapman, Presbytery of Genesee Valley, The Rev. William Larkin, Presbytery of Chicago and The Rev. Edmond Watkins, Presbytery of Lake Michigan, to extend the invitation to Mr. Dunham, and to dismiss Mr. Dunham to the Presbytery of Genesee Valley
- 5. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the invitation of the General Assembly Program Agency to The Rev. Ty K. Shin to become associate for Social Welfare Ministries in the Health and Human Development Unit; and heard The Rev. Willis Tabor.
- 6. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the request of the Session of the Royal Oak
 First United Church, to employ The Rev. Henry D. Jones as interim assistant pastor
 on a part-time basis, at \$100 per week salary and \$75 per week car allowance,
 effective November 5, 1973, during the time that The Rev. Rodney Beal, pastor,
 is Evangelism Associate for Presbytery.
- Upon motion, Presbytery concurred in the request of The Rev. Robert N. Sawyer and the congregation of the Berkley, Greenfield Church, to dissolve the pastoral relationship between them effective December 31, 1973; heard from Elder Charles Ranspach, a representative of the church, and The Rev. James W. Kesler; authorized the session to fill the pulpit during the pastoral vacancy; and granted permission to Mr. Sawyer to labor outside the bounds of Presbytery until the next annual meeting.
- 8. Upon motion, Presbytery amended its action of 9/25/73 approving the invitation of Presbyterian Village to The Rev. Richard C. Dunkelberger to become Executive Director effective November 1, 1973, and declared the appointment of The Rev. Richard D. POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

THE COMMITTEE ON ECUMENICAL RELATIONS reported through its chairman, The Rev. David B. Antonson, who introduced The Rev. Robert L. Kincheloe, Executive Director, Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches, who spoke on the restructuring of the Council toward a more ecumenically inclusive agency.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY reported through the chairman, The Rev. David W. Abbott, who presented a resolution concerning the Equal Rights Amendment, (Paper Q) and recommended its adoption. Presbytery then heard Ms. Kathleen Slawson and Ms. Jean Wagner speak to the amendment.

Upon motion, Presbytery endorsed the Resolution Concerning Equal Rights Amendment as a policy statement of the Presbytery of Detroit as follows:

WHEREAS, in 1972 the Congress of the United States passed the following Amendment: "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex;" and

WHEREAS, the Equal Rights Amendment for women is encountering some difficulty because of some confusion in its interpretation, and

WHEREAS, we, as members of the Church of Jesus Christ, are committed to equal rights for all, and

WHEREAS, unbiased factual information can be obtained from local League of Women Voters so that responsible, informed decisions can be made, and

WHEREAS, a person's role, wherever possible, should be determined by the exercise of the right of free choice.

THEREFORE, we do endorse the passage of the Equal Opportunity Amendment, and we urge persons in the leadership in the Presbytery of Detroit of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. to disseminate accurate and complete information concerning the effects of enactment of the Amendment.

PROGRAM REPORTS

THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN reported through Ms. Katherine Vernon and Ms. Doris E. Campbell who reported on Committee accomplishments and relieved the change in attitudes and practices toward women in the church. (Paper R) Upon motion, the report was received.

THE COMMITTEE ON INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP reported through The Rev. James O. Banks, who introduced The Rev. James W. Kesler, who describted the 1973 Christmas Offering and the resources available to interpret it in the local church. Upon motion, the report was received.

The Moderator resumed the chair.

THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM reported through the chairman, The Rev. John McCreight, who presented the need for an additional \$3,000 to complete the funding of the Evangelism Associate program. The Rev. J. Rodney Beal reported progress in his experience as Evangelism Associate.

Upon motion, the report was received.

THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through the Chairman, The Rev. Richard J. Milford.

1. A Memorial Minute for The Rev. Thomas S. Higgins was presented by The Rev. Robert S. Williamson:

Will you join me in remembering with thanksgiving my good friend and colleague, my predecessor at the Central Northwest Presbyterian Church, The Rev. Thomas Struthers Higgins, who received his upward call on September 28, 1973?

At a ministers' seminar recently we were asked to write our own epitaph. Such an exercise probes one's values and motivations. It makes one ask, what is the significance or meaning I wished attached to my life" For Mr. Higgins, writing an epitaph would be no problem. The thrust of his life--its conviction, its passion--was clear. He was a servant of the gospel of Jesus Christ. His epitaph might well be expressed in the words of another: "I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ." (Romans 1:16)

Mr. Higgins was born in Glasgow, Scotland, the son of a ruling elder of the Church of Scotland. His father was known as a godly man, and I can easily believe it, for Tom Higgins was that kind of man as well.

Mr. Higgins received his education at the University of Glasgow. He emigrated to Canada where he became a missionary, riding from one preaching post to another by horseback. When World War I began, he enlisted in the Winnipeg Grenadiers, and was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant.

1927 was an important year in his life, for this was the year he was ordained to the Gospel Ministry in the Presbyterian Church. It was also the year of his marriage to Augusta whom he lovingly called Gussie.

Mr. Higgins served as pastor to several Presbyterian churches in Washington State. For one year he was field representative for the Moody Bible Institute. Then he was called to the pastorate of the Stuart Memorial Presbyterian Church, Minneapolis, where he stayed for thirteen years. In 1947 he was called to be pastor of the old Central Presbyterian Church in Detroit, and when old Central merged with its daughter church, Northwest Presbyterian Church, in 1951, he became the pastor of Central Northwest Presbyterian Church until his retirement in 1963.

As a servant of the gospel of Jesus Christ, Mr. Higgins reflected 7 its message of love in his companionship with his wife, Augusta. From the first day of their marriage until his retirement they were truly partners in the gospel of Jesus Christ.

When Mr. Higgins would return home from a difficult session meeting, tired and flushed, Mrs. Higgins knew how to comfort him with love. When she was tempted to grow bitter because of actions of some members of the church, he knew how to exhort her to love. Together they always greeted the departing worshippers in the narthex of the church and expressed a warm and loving Christian welcome.

Mrs. Higgins often said, "I love every hair on his head." He returned that love as they journeyed through their life and ministry together.

As a servant of the gospel of Jesus Christ, Mr. Higgins expressed its message of grace. The word grace and gracious are related. Mr. Higgins was a gracious man.

He knew how to be a retired minister. In the ten years he and Mrs. Higgins attended Central Northwest Presbyterian Church in his retirement, there was never a shadow of a problem that fell between him and the pastor. Seldom if ever would he take a wedding, baptism, or funeral, but when he did, it was only with the expressed consent of the pastor. He was a Christian gentleman.

After every morning worship service I always looked forward to greeting Mr. Higgins, for he almost always had a word of commendation for the sermon. He never failed to lift my spirits by the sincere words of appreciation he uttered. Considering the quality of some of those sermons, that must have been pure grace! Occasionally the theology expressed in the sermon and the theology of Mr. Higgins would part company. He would greet me with a smile, a twinkle in his eye, and remain diplomatically silent!

As a servant of the gospel of Jesus Christ, Mr. Higgins' greatest concern was that the truth of the gospel should be proclaimed. The word truth was often on his lips--in the pulpit and in private conversation. It was spoken with a distinct Scottish burr. For him the gospel and the truth were synonymous. His great passion was that the truth should be heard, understood, believed and obeyed.

Why was the gospel truth? Because he saw it as a divinely revealed message--"made in heaven." Therefore it was not to be tampered with, adjusted, or changed; it was simply to be proclaimed. For Mr. Higgins, the gospel was the only truth that mattered.

I think it was Andrew Blackwood of Princeton who said that after the resurrection account, there isn't a pessimistic note in the New Testament. There wasn't a pessimistic note in Mr. Higgins' gospel either. It was a gospel of hope. He lived by this hope. In this hope he died. And because it is a certain hope, he still lives.

Praise the Lord!

Grants are to be made by the Committee on National Missions upon written requests by churches with capital needs. Request forms may be secured from the Presbytery office (attention, Mr. Moreland) and must be submitted no later than May 1, 1974.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report as a whole.

THE TELLERS FOR ELECTION OF ASSOCIATE EXECUTIVE reported through the Moderator. Two hundred and fifty-nine ballots were cast, three were void, seven were negative, and 249 were affirmative. The Rev. Donald R. MacPherson, having received more than the two-thirds affirmative votes required, was declared Associate Executive for Leadership Development of the Presbytery of Detroit and the call was placed in his hands. Mr. MacPherson addressed the Presbytery briefly and introduced his wife, Ruth Ann.

THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. Richard J. Milford.

- 1. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery received The Rev. Howard F. Gebhart, honorably retired, from the Presbytery of Great Rivers.
- 2. Elder Ronald Anderson, member of the committee, introduced The Rev. Gerald T. Krohn, Central District Representative of the Board of Pensions who addressed the Presbytery on the United Presbyterian Pension Plan and related matters, drawing attention to forthcoming recommendations affecting policy and benefits of the Plan from the Consultative Committee established by the 185th General Assembly.  - a. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures from the Presbytery of Western Colorado, an overture to the 186th General Assembly (1974) proposing a Chapter of Grievances to the Form of Government.
 - b. The General Council received from the Presbytery of Great Rivers of communication endorsing The Rev. Malcolm F. Stewart, Professor of Religion and Philosophy at Illinois College, for Moderator of the 186th General Assembly (1974).
 - c. The General Council referred to the Committee on Nominations a communication from the Synod of the Covenant, reporting a vacancy in Detroit's representation in the Presbytery Development Department due to the election of The Rev. W. F. Whitledge as chairman.
 - d. The General Council referred to the Committee on Nominations vacancies on the Committee on Christian Education created by the resignations of Daniel Murray (class of 1975) and Janice Branyan (Class of 1976).
 - e. The General Council refereed to the Presbytery's Task Force on Extended Experience Education a communication from Mrs. Katherine Doctor, for Synod of the Covenant, responding to Presbytery's action December 27, 1973, and relating to the 1974 Camp and Conference program.
 - f. The General Council received a communication from The Rev. William LeDuc, Mt. Clemens, First, expressing concern that adequate lead time be given to the announcement of Presbytery activities prior to their occurrence, and urging that staff be considered part of mission in the thinking of Presbytery.
 - g. The General Council instructed the Executive and the Stated Clerk to disseminate information of Presbytery activities through the Presbytery newsletter and pre-Presbytery mailing only if scheduled early prior to the date of occurrence, except under exceptional circumstances.
 - h. The General Council approved the use of the 1974 Budget Process in the development of the 1975 Unified Presbytery Budget, with the substitution of the General Council's Committee on Planning for the Priorities Analysis Team.
 - i. The General Council concurred with the recommendation of the Committee on Ecumenical Relations concerning "A Proposal for a New Ecumenical Agency."
 - j. The General Council approved the action of the Committee on Ministerial Relations, after hearing a report that the appeal before the courts of the claim of The Rev. Jesse E. Christman before the Internal Revenue Service will cost an estimated \$1,500, that the Committee, in keeping with Presbytery action February 27, 1973, to support Mr. Christman in his claim, has authorized \$750 from the Committee's budget for emergency grants, and that the Committee will seek a like amount from the appropriate General Assembly Agency.
 - k. The General Council approved the action of the Committee on Christian Education in appointing Elder Jane Bielowski (Park United) to the Board of Directors, Eastern Michigan United Ministries in Higher Education, representing the Presbytery of Detroit.

- 1. The General Council was informed that the Synod of the Covenant Review and Interpretation and Information Team will visit the General Council at a special meeting, March 19, 1974 at 1:30 p.m.
- m. The General Council heard a report that a dinner and orientation for new ministers and their spouses who were received into membership of Presbytery in 1973, would be held Friday, February 15, 1974, at Northbrook Church.
- n. The General Council instructed the Moderator and the Stated Clerk to send an appropriate expression of concern and sympathy to the family of The Rev. Lawrence W. McMaster, Jr., Executive of the Synod of the Covenant, who died unexpectedly February 2, 1974.
- o. The General Council received the information that The Rev. Harvey M. Luce had been named Acting Executive of the Synod of the Covenant.
- p. The General Council granted the Special Committee on Worship up to twenty minutes of docket time per Presbytery meeting for worship through the June 1974 meeting.
- q. The General Council approved the report of the Special Committee on Expenditure of General Assembly and Synod Reserves (attached), directed that the report with its overtures be reported to the February 26, 1974 meeting of Presbytery for information, and directed that action be docketed at the March 26, 1974 meeting of Presbytery.

- 3. The Secretary, for the Committee on Reorganization of Presbytery, invited and urged all Presbyters with an interest in the reorganization of Presbytery to make known their desires and ideas in writing to the chairman of the committee, The Rev. Eldon F. Beery.

Upon motion, the General Council report was approved as a whole.

THE COMMITTEE ON CANDIDATES reported through The Rev. William H. Stryker, chairman.

- Robert C. McConnell, a member of Lake Shore Church, St. Clair Shores, and a first-year student at Garrett Theological Seminary was introduced by Elder David Drake and spoke about the influences and motivations that led to his desire to prepare for the ministry. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery arrested the examination.
 - Upon motion, Presbytery sustained the examination; waived the three-month waiting period; and enrolled Robert C. McConnell as a candidate for the

professional ministry.

 Richard D. Raum, a member of First Presbyterian Church, Dearborn, and a middler at Princeton Theological Seminary was introduced by Elder Jack Callam and spoke about the influences and motivations that led to his desire to prepare for the ministry.

Upon motion, Presbytery arrested the examination.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery sustained the examination; and enrolled Richard D. Raum as a candidate for the professional ministry.

The Moderator conducted the service receiving the candidates under the care of Presbytery, with pastors, parents and members of the session of the candidates' churches standing with them.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report as a whole.

THE COMMITTEE ON BILLS AND OVERTURES reported through the chairman, The Rev. Lloyd G. Brasure.

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery responded in the affirmative to Overtures A, B, C, F, G, H, I, J, and K, and in the negative to Overtures D and E from the 185th General Assembly (1973).
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved and submitted to the 186th General Assembly (1974) the following Overture; and authorized the Stated Clerk to circularize it to other Presbyteries:

An overture to the 186th General Assembly (1974) on payment of the per capita apportionment.

WHEREAS the per capita apportionment is only a method of dividing certain budgets among the judicatories on a basis relating to membership of the churches; and

WHEREAS the Presbytery has no power to tax and so collect the per capita apportionment; and

WHEREAS the increasing size of the per capita apportionment and the financial needs of the particular churches have resulted in more and more churches being unable to pay the total apportioned to them or finding it necessary to pay the total in installments throughout the year; and

WHEREAS the practice of the General Assembly has been to hold the presbyteries responsible for the total apportioned for synod and General Assembly, whether collected or not; and

WHEREAS the General Assembly has expected payment of the total apportioned in one lump sum, even before the total has been received from the churches;

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Detroit, meeting in regular session at Drayton Avenue Presbyterian Church, Ferndale, Michigan on the 26th day of February 1974, respectfully overtures the 186th General Assembly (1974):

- 1. To declare its willingness to share not only the proceeds but also the problems of the system of per capita apportionment.
- 2. To permit presbyteries to remit the per capita apportionment when and as received from the churches; and
- 3. To instruct the Stated Clerk to revise the Manual of the General Assembly to conform to this action (e.g. Manual of the General Assembly, 1973, page B-26).

A motion failed which would have instructed the Committee on Bills and Overtures to prepare an overture that would enable presbyteries to ordain elders in special instances.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report as a whole.

THE COMMITTEE ON ECUMENICAL RELATIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. David B. Antonson, chairman, the committee's response to the final draft of a proposal for a new ecumenical agency which would replace the present Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery adopted the following response to "A Proposal for a New Ecumenical Agency" as amended as follows:

That the Presbytery of Detroit desires and seeks full ecumenical cooperation with all Christian groups and joint activities with faith groups, among them the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches.

That the Presbytery of Detroit sees the need for a new ecumenical agency which would be more inclusive and flexible to the needs of Metropolitan Detroit.

That the Presbytery of Detroit recommends, that the new changes included in "A Proposal for a New Ecumenical Agency" be made in the present Constitution and Bylaws of the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches. It is the opinion of this Presbytery, that the proposed plan for a new agency does not adequately answer the needs for a new agency.

That the Presbytery of Detroit sees as essential the full participation of the Roman Catholic Church (Archdiocese of Detroit) in any new agency.

The Vice-Moderator took the chair.

PROGRAM REPORTS

THE COMMITTEE ON RADIO AND TELEVISION reported through the chairman, The Rev. Chase S. Hunt, who introduced The Rev. Ed Willingham, who described the activities of the Department of Radio and Television of the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches, highlighting current programming and announcing reception of the Gabriel Award, for the program "For What It's Worth," judged the Best Youth Oriented Show in the nation. Upon motion, the report was received.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY reported through The Rev. David W. Abbott, chairman, who reported work in progress on accountability in government and urged use of the optional check-off contribution for support of political parties on the Federal Income Tax form.

Upon motion, the report was received.

THE COMMITTEE ON INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP reported through The Rev. James O. Banks, chairman, who announced that 1973 mission pay-up reached 96.21% of the amount pledged, or \$809,436 in benevolence giving to General Assembly, Synod and Presbytery. He urged the return of 1974 Mission Commitments, pledges having been received to date from 72 churches for a total of \$625,960. He urged the use of the February General Mission Remittance form.

The Moderator resumed the chair.

Upon motion, Presbytery adjourned at 9:44 p.m. with prayer and the benediction by the Moderator, The Rev. L. J. Peterson.

The General Council referred to the Executive Committee of the General Council with power to act, a communication from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly (1973) requesting all presbyteries to establish personnel committees for the oversight of personnel practices relating to all persons, other than clergy, whether employed by local churches or by the presbytery, with a report to be returned to the Vocation Agency by May 1.
 - b. The General Council reported to Presbytery and referred to the Special Committee on Nominations, from the Stated Clerk of Synod, a communication stating that the 1974 Annual Meeting of the Synod of the Covenant will be held at Alma College, May 30 June 1, and that the Presbytery of Detroit will be eligible to have 32 commissioners.
 - c. The General Council received a communication from the Stated Clerk of Synod, stating that the 1974 apportionment of \$65,224.80 (81,531 members @ 80¢) is due in full by March 15, 1974; and authorized the Treasurer to pay in full both General Assembly and Synod per capita apportionments.

Sutton, Chairman of Synod's Nominating Committee, suggesting that Presbytery consider as nominees to Synod's departments, daysions, and cabinets members from corresponding Presbytery groups in order to enhance representation.
- f. The General Council received a request from The Rev. Paul H. Sutton, Chairman of the Nominating Committee of Synod, for suggestions of persons for possible nomination to General Assembly's Program, Vocation, and Support Agencies, with expertise in the following:

 - Installation of E. Dickson Forsyth at St. Timothy Church, March 3, 1974;

 - d. Ordination of Robert R. vonOeyen, Jr., at First Church, Port Huron, March 10, 1974.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery adopted the attached report on Elder Equalization, for the period ending February, 1975.
- 4. The Rev. Carl G. Howie, Chairman, gave the report of the Special Committee to Gather Information on Expenditure of General Assembly and Synod Reserves. Adoption of the Report was moved and seconded.
 - Lost, was an amendment to delete three proposed overtures to the General Assembly and two overtures to the Synod of the Covenant; and to direct only the concerns expressed in the report to the stated clerks of the General Assembly and the Synod of the Covenant in an appropriate manner.
 - <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery extended the docket 15 minutes and heard further debate. The Moderator ruled the order of the day and was sustained by the house. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery adopted the attached report of the Special Committee to Gather Information on Expenditures of General Assembly and Synod Reserves, by a counted vote of 150 for and 91 against. (Paper N)
- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery voted to suspend the rules and remove one minister and ruling elder from the list of principal commissioners who would then become first alternates to the 186th General Assembly (1974) on the following basis:

- 7. The Special Committee on Reorganization reported through The Rev. Eldon F. Beery, Chairman (Paper S), who reviewed the charge of the committee to examine the structural needs of the Presbytery and who shared the working rationale and reorganization objectives of the committee.
- pon motion, Presbytery approved the report of General Council as a whole.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Social

1. The Subcommittee on Corporate/Responsibility of the Committee on Church and Society reported through Elder Arthur G. Sherman. (Paper X)

Upon motion, Presbytery voted to table until the next meeting of Presbytery a resolution regarding how the Trustees of Presbytery should vote shares they hold in the name of Presbytery in matters concerning corporate social responsibility and directed the Stated Clerk to distribute the resolution in the next pre-Presbytery mailing.

PROGRAM REPORTS

THE COMMITTEE ON INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP reported through The Rev. James O. Banks, Chairman, who reported as follows:

- 1. That 83 of 110 churches of Presbytery have returned 1974 mission pledges of \$207,000 for Presbytery, \$23,000 for Special Validated Opportunities, \$196,000 for Synod, and \$348,000 for General Assembly Causes, for a grand total of \$776,000.
- 2. That if the remaining 27 churches were to pay at the 1973 level, an additional \$91,000 would be given.
- 3. That Interpretation and Stewardship Training for local churches will be held as follows:
 - April 20 Redford Presbyterian Church
 - April 27 Calvin East United Presbyterian Church.
- 4. The Rev. Henry D. Jones spoke regarding the Midwest Conference on Christian World Mission, an ecumenical conference designed around the study of the mission theme for 1975, "Education for Global Consciousness," and focusing on the Middle East. The dates are July 29--August 2, Naperville, Illinois.
- THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM reported through The Rev. John McCreight, Chairman.

 1. The Rev. Rodney J. Beal, Evangelism Associate for the Presbytery of Detroit,

spoke concerning the projects of the 10 churches involved in the pilot program.

2. Mr. McCreight announced a Workshop on Evangelism, May 18th, St. John Seminary, Plymouth, at 10 a.m. featuring Dr. William Barker of Allentown, Pennsylvania, key speaker. Two clinics will be conducted in the afternoon.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY reported through The Rev. David W. Abbott, Chairman, who introduced as panel members to speak on the topic of capital punishment Mr. Frank Angelo, Managing Editor and columnist of the Detroit Free Press; The Rev. Michael L. Dunkelberger, Pastor, Calvin West Presbyterian Church, and The Honorable Erma Henderson, Detroit City Councilperson and Executive Director of the Equal Justic Council.

Upon motion, Presbytery adjourned at 9:55 p.m. with prayer, remembering Vice Moderato Walter Greene on the death of his 91-year old mother, and the benediction by the Moderator, The Rev. L. J. Peterson.

Book of Order 42.03

Annually, on the first day of January, the stated clerk of each presbytery shall ascertain the number of resident ministers who are members of the judicatory and the number of elders which the churches are entitled to send as commissioners to presbytery meetings. When the number of ministers is larger, the stated clerk shall bring the imbalance to the attention of the presbytery at its next meeting. The presbytery shall redress the imbalance by inviting particular churches to elect additional elder commissioners on the basis of specified numbers of communicant members, or on some other basis acceptable to presbytery.

Presbytery of Detroit Plan:

Upon motion, Presbytery adopted March 23, 1971 the following recommendation:

- That Presbytery adopt the "Chicago Plan" as follows: "On February 1 of each year, the Stated Clerk, having completed the calculation required by Section 42.03 of the Form of Government and having found that additional elder commissioners are needed, shall proceed as follows: He shall calculate for each particular church a numerical rating by dividing the number of communicant by the number of elder commissioners as authorized by Section 42.03 or Section 42.04 of the Form of Government. He shall then prepare a list of the churches by numerical rating in descending order. He shall designate the church on the top of the list to elect an additional elder commissioner, shall calculate for that church a revised numerical rating taking into consideration that additional commissioner, and shall drop that church to the appropriate place on the list according to its revised numerical rating. This process shall be repeated until the required additional designations have been made."
- b. That in computing the numerical rating the Stated Clerk use the membership reported on December 31 of the year immediately past.
- c. That annually the revised elder representation take effect at the March meeting of Presbytery.

Report of Special Committee to Gather Information on Expenditures of General Assembly and Synod Reserves

to

The General Council of The Presbytery of Detroit
February 12, 1974

On May 29, 1973, The Presbytery of Detroit passed the following resolution:

That Presbytery instruct the General Council to devise adequate methods to protest the irresponsible and proflicate dissipation of the financial reserves of the Synod and General Assembly and to report back to Presbytery.

Pursuant to that resolution the General Council appointed and announced at the June 26, 1973, meeting of Presbytery an Ad Hoc Committee consisting of The Reverend Carl G. Howie, chairman; The Reverend John K. Mitchell; The Reverend Morgan Roberts; The Reverend Thomas W. Kirkman; and Elder Harry Kirk. Mr. Kirk's resignation from the Committee was reported and accepted at the December 27, 1973, meeting of Presbytery.

Due to vacations and schedule difficulties, the Committee did not meet until September. After the first meeting, the chairman wrote the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly on September 27, 1973, asking for specific financial information. A reply was dated October 15, 1973, stating that the letter and request had been turned over to The Reverend Daniel Little, Administrator of the Budgeting Section of the General Assembly Mission Council. A response from Mr. Little was dated November 9, 1973. The Committee met and decided to request further detailed information for clarification. That letter was sent November 28, 1973, but to date no reply or acknowledgment has been received. Through the good offices of the Presbyterian Foundation we were able to get an apology, second hand, but very little solid information.

Similar correspondence was initiated with the Synod Office, with the first request being made in a letter dated September 27, 1973. A response came on October 12, 1973, assuring the chairman that the information would be forthcoming. Some question as to the authorization of the Committee by the Presbytery was raised in that communication. The chairman of the Committee, in a letter dated October 16, 1973, quoted the language of Presbytery's resolution and assured the Synod Office that ours was indeed a legitimate committee. Since that date we had no response from the Synod to our inquiry until the receipt on January 30, 1974, of a letter from Harvey Luce, the Associate Synod Executive. In that latter communication Mr. Luce responded to our inquiries as best he could, assuring us that the budget for 1974 would not be in deficit, and that per capita tax was a matter for local judicatories. Although the letter was three months in coming, it was responsive to the Committee's requests.

The members of the Committee wish to express three concerns:

1. We are concerned about the slow response to our requests from General Assembly and from Synod. And we report our inability to get clear and concise answers to questions raised.

- 2. We are concerned about the expenditure of almost \$28,000,000 of capital reserves by General Assembly agencies within the last five years and the expenditure of more than \$400,000 in reserves by the Synod of the Covenant during 1973, because this policy restricts future program flexibility in the face of changing opportunities and reflects, in our opinion, poor management.
- We are concerned that there is no stated policy at the General Assembly level on whether capital funds should be accumulated as reserve and encomment or, when unrestricted, used for current budget needs. Some clear policy should be stated for guidance in the future.

We therefore propose three overtures to the General Assembly as follows:

- 1. The Presbytery of Detroit overtures the 186th General Assembly of The United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America to instruct the General Mission Council and agencies to budget and operate within the limits of current income available each year.
- 2. The Presbytery of Detroit overtures the 186th General Assembly of The United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America to require the General Mission Council to present an orderly plan for the repayment of the \$5,000,000 loan (authorized by the 185th General Assembly) and that such a plan be devised and presented during the meeting of the 186th General Assembly in Louisville, Kentucky.
- 3. The Presbytery of Detroit overtures the 186th General Assembly of The United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, in view of escalating costs, to freeze the General Assembly portion of the per capita assessment and seek other methods of underwriting rising costs of administration.

We also suggest that two overtures go to the Synod of the Covenant as follows:

- 1. The Presbytery of Detroit overtures the Synod of the Covenant, The United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, to instruct all its departments to budget and operate within the limits of current annual income.
- 2. The Presbytery of Detroit overtures the Synod of the Covenant, The United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, to freeze the Synod portion of the per capita assessment at its present level and seek other methods of underwriting rising costs of administration.

Jones, Kesler, Keyser, Lampe, Lindsey, Magee, McCall, McConnell, Milford, Palmer, Riedesel, Roberts, Sefcik, Sutton, Van Leuven, Waser, Whitledge, R. Williams, Williamson. Elders - Calvin East (2), Broadstreet, Peace, Mt. Clemens. The confirmation class of Westminster Church, Detroit, was welcomed. Upon motion, the minutes of March 26, 1974 were approved with two editorial corrections.

Upon motion, the docket was approved as amended to allow The Rev. James O. Banks time immediately following the Minute for Mission, for the Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship; to allow the showing of slides on tornado damage in Xenia, Ohio, after dark: and to take up action on the report of the Subcommittee on Corporate Social Responsibility, postponed from the previous meeting, at the time of Miscellaneous Business.

The Minute for Mission was presented by The Rev. Edward Craxton, and The Rev, S. David Swinehart, who spoke concerning plans and programs for 1974 Camps and Conferences available to the Presbytery of Detroit through The Task Force on Extended Experience Education. (E³)

The Rev. James O. Banks, for the Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship, reminded Presbytery of the Stewardship Training Conference to be held Saturday, April 27, 1974 at Calvin East Church and requested an indication of churches planning to send representatives.

LEGAL ACTIONS.

THE GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L.

- The General Council reported for <u>information</u> the following:
 - a. The General Council received from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly a communication reporting plans by the Local Committee on Arrangements for the 186th General

Assembly (1974) to open the Joint Service of Holy Communion with the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. by a procession with banners from the presbyteries and asking each to cooperate; voted to participate; and accepted the offer of The Rev. William F. Whitledge, past Moderator, to prange for the making of such a banner for the Presbytery

of Det. it.

- b. The General Council referred to the Executive Committee of General Council a communication from the Stated Clerk of the Synod of the Covenant, asking the Presbytery of Detroit to select one minister to the Committee to Nominate a Synod Executive.
- c. The General Council names the following persons as negotiators for the 1974 Budget-Staff negociation for 1975 of the Synod of the Covenant: Elder Eleanor Leigh, The Rev. Carl G. Howie, The Rev. James O. Banks, The Rev. Donald G. Lester, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland.
- d. The General Council referred to the Committee on Church and Society a communication from the Synod Mission Council, urging Presbyteries to consider the matter of Abortion Legislation in the light of the position of the General Assembly.
- e. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures from the Presbytery of Twin Cities, an overture to the 186th General Assembly (1974) on the problem of drunken driving.
- f. The General Council received from The Rev. James A. Mitcham, Jr. a letter withdrawing as a commissioner to the 186th General Assembly (1974).
- g. The General Council received the following letter from Mrs. Frances McMaster, expressing thanks for Presbytery's concern and sympathy in the death of her husband, The Rev. Lawrence W. McMaster, Jr., Synod of the Covenant Executive:
 - "Please express to the Presbytery of Detroit my heartfelt thanks for expressing its concern and sympathy to us through you. It has meant a great deal to hear from many presbyteries and sessions, as well as individuals, across the Synod. We have felt a great network of support and caring, as all of you have responded to our need.
 - May God go with you in your work for Him--and thank you for being a very special part of the community of faith that we have been experiencing."
- h. The General Council approved the request from The Rev. Eldon F. Beery asking that the Executive Presbyter prepare and distribute to the Presbytery a list of persons from the Presbytery who are serving on the committees, departments, etc. of the Synod and General Assembly and that the information be included in the Presbytery Directory.
- i. The General Council approved the action of the Executive Committee referring to the Special Committee on Reorganization a request of the 1973 General Assembly that Presbytery establish personnel committees for the oversight of personnel practices relating to persons other than clergy, employed by local churches and presbyteries.
- j. The General Council referred to the Committee on Nominations the vacancy in the General Council created by the move of The Rev. John Olert, Jr.
- k. The General Council appointed to the Task Force on Extended Experience Education the following persons: The Rev. Edward Craxton, The Rev. S. David Swinehart, Mrs. Midge Mack (Rochester, University), The Rev. Henry P. Stenner; and authorized the Moderator and the Chairman of the Committee on Christian Education to fill remaining vacancies.

- The General Council directed the Special Committee on Reorganization to present its plan of reorganization to the General Council Diagram study and approval before presenting it to Presbytery.
- The General Council discharged the Special Committee to Gather Information on Expenditure of General Assembly and Synod Reserves.
- The General Council voted to include time on its docket each month to hear reports from Presbytery representatives on Synod Mission Council and/or cabinets, divisions and departments of Synod.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery discharge the following Special Administrative Commission:
- Installation of Edward Craxton at First Church, Birmingham, March 24, 1974 3. Upon motion, Presbytery endorsed the following recommendations of the Michigan Area Extended Experience Education (E3) Tast. Force regarding campsites now owned by the Synod of the Covenant and located within the boundaries of the State of Michigan:
 - (1) That the ownership of the property known as Howell Center be transferred from the Synod of the Covenant to the Presbytery of Detroit:
 - (2) That the ownership of the property known as Bear Lake be transferred from the Synod of the Covenant to the Presbytery of Lake Huron;
 - (3) That the ownership of the property known as Camp Greenwood be transferred from the Synod of the Covenant to the Presbytery of Lake Michigan;

and affirmed that such transfers should be without restriction. Lost, was a motion to delete the words "without restriction" and to substitute the words "made in negotiation with the Synod of the Covenant."

These resolutions cover one or more of the companies and concerns operations in South Africa, equal employment opportunity, the energy crisis, political contributions and actions in Chile.
- AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Trustees be directed to vote in favor of the resolution to Exxon requesting it cease perations in the Republic of Guinea-Bissan under purported concessions obtained from Portuguese government.

 - 15. Response to Cultural and Social Concerns
 - Goal: To bring the Gospel to bear as a prophetic witness on issues such as alienation, justice and poverty.
- 20. Resourcing Presbytery's Sessions and Churches
 - 21. Strengthen the Witness of the Local Church
 - Goal: To assist sessions to develop an effective witness in word and deed within their local communities.

22. Encourage Innovative Ministries by Churches

Goal: To encourage sessions to propose and initiate innovative ministries, to cooperate in pilot programs, and to provide funding and special skills where necessary.

23. Develop Resources to Meet the Church's Needs

Goal: To help sessions to discover, enlist, challenge and trair leadership of all ages and to secure funds for the total life of the Church.

24. Strengthen Connectionalism

Goal: To create the means by which the vital concerns of sessions and church members are incorporated in the goals and objectives of Presbytery programs and to identify the appropriate role of each in their achievement.

THE GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland. (Paper H)

- 1. The General Council reported for information the following:

 - (1) From the Presbytery of Birmingham, on procedures for consideration of the report of the Council on Church and Society;
 - From the Presbytery of Pittsburgh, to establish the office of "auxiliary pastor" so that ministers serving validated ministries other than that of local parish pastor may be related to a particular church;

- i. The General Council heard a report on the Synod meeting of United Presbyterian Men held recently at Findlay, Ohio.
- j. The General Council approved the report of the Committee on Ecumenical Relations, responding to the reference of a communication from The Rev. George Van Leuven regarding the distribution of Reformed World as follows:

The Committee on Ecumenical Relations expresses its opinion that the publication, Reformed World, is important in that it ties together the reformed churches in 80 countries of the world, two-thirds of whom are in the third world. Further, it is produced at low cost in Geneva. In addition a Bulletin is issued four times a year in French and German. The bulk subscription rate paid by the UPUSA (\$8,500 in 1974) makes it possible for ministers in Asia, Africa and Latin America to receive it free.

The committee, however, will communicate through the General Council to our General Assembly Office and the WARC that we generally find that pastors receiving this publication often do not read nor depend on it for information. We will suggest to the WARC that the format be changed to make the publication Reformed World more informational and provocative for the reformed churches throughout the world.

- k. The General Council accepted the resignation of The Rev. David W. Abbott as chairman of the Committee on Church and Society and named The Rev. William Baker as temporary convenor.
- 1. The General Council heard a report that the reorganization of the Presbytery Office filing system has been largely completed and directed that a letter of appreciation be sent to the volunteers who have done the work, Mrs. Jean Howie, Mrs. Mary Sweet, Mrs. Peggy Beal, Mrs. Maurine Jones.
- m. The General Council heard reports and recommendations from the Christian Education Committee's Task Force on United Ministries in Higher Education and Extended Experience Education (E3); urged the Task Forces to enter into 1975 budget negotiations; and advised presbytery representatives on negotiating teams to Synod to consider future fund distributions in the light of programming at the Presbytery level.
- n. The General Council approved a design for a Presbytery of Detroit banner to be used at the 186th General Assembly (1974).
- o. The General Council received from the Treasurer a statement of financial condition of the Presbytery of Detroit as of April 30, 1974.
- p. The General Council instructed the Secretary to write letters of appreciation to R-W Service System, Inc. (Russell Wagstaff of Livonia, St. Paul's) for delivering 15,180 lbs. of clothing for Tornado Relief to Louisville, Kentucky, where it will be processed by Volunteers of America for distribution by the American Red Cross; and the Presbyterial volunteers who helped process the clothing for shipment.

Frank Marvin, Chairman of the Special Committee on Planning of General Council, directed attention to a paper entitled "Personal Response Instrument," a survey tool designed to enable presbyters to share their concerns and influence the direction of Synod's mission for the year 1976. He encouraged attendance at the area information meetings and communication to the committee of both verbal and written suggestions for improvement of the plan. He then gave a detailed overview of the proposed Plan for Mission and the Reorganization Schedule (Paper J) and called upon The Rev. William F. Whitledge and The Rev. L. J. Peterson to speak to specific sections of the plan.

- 1. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted permission to Redford Presbyterian Church to list for sale on the open market the manse located at 16600 Burgess, Detroit.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted permission to Littlefield Boulevard United Presbyterian Church to list for sale on the open market the manse located at 7559 E. Morrow Circle, Dearborn.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted permission to Committee on National Missions for Peace Church, Fraser, to grant a water main easement along the western edge of the church property.
- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the final finance and building plans of the Orchard Lake Community Church and granted permission to the church to seek a mortgage not to exceed \$250,000 at an interest rate not to exceed 10%.
- 5. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted Knox Presbyterian Church the right to obtain one acre of property in return for an easement of one-half acre of its property.
- 6. It so proceeded to the matter and heard Elder Edward W. Owen testify that the request for dissolution was by action of the congregation, in meeting on October 14, 1973, with one vote dissenting. The Rev. G. John Richards spoke to the historic and significant contribution of the Welsh Presbyterian Church to the life of the Presbytery and the community of Detroit and the Church of Jesus Christ at large for fifty years and commended The Rev. Aelwyn Hughes, pastor of the congregation, to the particular concern of Presbytery in the matter of relocating. Upon motion, Presbytery expressed appreciation to the Welsh Church for its contribution over many years to the moral, spiritual and cultural life of the Detroit area; dissolved the Welsh Presbyterian Church pursuant to Form of Government XXXII - 11 (62.11) on Sunday, June 30, 1974, and further directed (1) that the Welsh Church turn over to the treasurer of Presbytery any financial assets remaining after June 30, 1974, to be distributed in the following priority: (a) any obligation to the pastor as determined by the Committee on Ministerial Relations in consultation with the session, (b) any outstanding, current bills, and (c) the balance to the Detroit Welsh Society; (2) that the Clerk of Session be directed to turn over to the Stated Clerk of Presbytery the official church records; (3) that the Moderator and the pastor be asked to arrange a service of dissolution on June 30, 1974, at the conclusion of which the church shall be declared dissolved; and (4) that the Trustees of the Welsh Presbyterian Church be directed to dissolve the ecclesiastical corporation following the dissolution of the church.


Upon motion, the minutes of May 28, 1974, were approved as circulated. (Paper C) Upon motion, the docket was approved as amended to allow the report of the Special Committee to Nominate Staff to precede the report of the General Council.


The Minute for Mission was presented by The Rev. George D. Colman, United Presbyterian staff member of the Detroit Industrial Mission. He illustrated the work of the mission by referring to specific work now taking place inside the Detroit Edison Company, where, upon invitation DIM is now working with 400-500 first-line supervisors and managers as they attempt to translate into affirmative action federal laws requiring improved race relations. This is done with a consciousness that DIM in mission is a representative of the church and that this mission is one part of the translation of the Christian Gospel into the hard reality of the business-industrial world. (Paper F)

LEGAL ACTIONS

THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO NOMINATE STAFF reported through The Rev. Jeffrey S. Goldsmith, (Papers G, H) who reviewed the charge to the committee, highlighted the background and experience, and placed in nomination the name of The Rev. Harry H. Maghakian, to become Associate for Parish Development of the Presbytery of Detroit, effective September 1, 1974, with the following terms: \$18,000 salary (up to 30% to be used as manse allowance), leased car and business expenses, Synod hospitalization, full pension, one month vacation, two weeks' study leave, \$300 study leave allowance, and moving expenses.

Upon motion, the nomination was received. The Moderator appointed Elders Richard Fernstrum, Holden Leroy, Carolyn Walker, and The Rev. David B. Antonson (chairman), The Rev. Bryce McGowan, and The Rev. Margaret A. Scabich to serve as Tellers.





Presbytery proceeded to the election by secret ballot, conforming to Book of Order 69.07, and the tellers were then excused to tally the ballots.

THE GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland. (Paper I)

- 1. The General Council reported for information the following:
 - a. The General Council referred to the Special Committee on Reorganization a request from General Assembly's Department of History (Presbyterian Historical Society), asking that a Presbytery History Committee be formed to cooperate with the Department.
 - b. The General Council, in response to a communication from The Rev. Harvey Luce, Acting Executive of the Synod of the Covenant, asking if the Presbytery of Detroit will occupy 10600 Puritan after September 1, 1974,
 (a) informed Synod that Presbytery will continue to occupy 10600 Puritan under the present terms until the property is leased or sold, and (b) requested from Synod Mission Council permission to list the property for lease or sale.
 - c. The General Council referred to the Special Committee on Nominations a communication from Lauren Beale, Youth Advisory Delegate to Synod, asking that 1974 Youth Advisory Delegates to Synod be given an option to return to the 1975 Synod meeting.
 - d. The General Council heard a report from the Executive Committee that staff evaluations have begun under the guidance of the Division of Staff Services of the Synod of the Covenant.
 - e. The General Council heard a report that the Synod of the Covenant has taken action to transfer camp and conference properties to the presbyteries, as of January 1, 1975. This means that the title for the Howell Retreat Center will be transferred to Presbytery of Detroit.
 - f. The General Council, pending approval of Presbytery to the recommendation below, named the present members of Presbytery's Extended Experience Task Force as representatives to the proposed inter-presbytery E³ agency.
 - g. The General Council heard a report that Presbyterial has communicated to the members of General Council individually action taken by the Executive Board of the Detroit Presbyterial Association regarding future representation of Presbyterial on General Council as full voting members; and further, that Synodical at its annual meeting at Alma, May 29-31, adopted the recommendation that starting in 1975 Presbyterials in the Synod of the Covenant may give up to 10% of their pledged ongoing giving to mission at the Presbytery level, up to 10% at the Synod level, and the remaining percentage to mission at the national level, with the percentages to be reviewed annually.
 - h. The General Council instructed the Secretary to write letters of congratulations to: (1) Detroit, Broadstreet, on the dedication of its building addition; (2) Port Huron, First and The Rev. Alton Cressman, on Mr. Cressman's 25-year pastorate there; and (3) Orchard Lake on its Centennial celebration.
 - i. The General Council heard a report that a group of Japanese social workers who spent time in Detroit on a previous visit to America, are eager to make a return visit to the city, about August 8-12. An itinerary co-ordinator and a host church are being sought. Inquiries may be addressed to The Rev. Donald MacPherson at the Presbytery Office.
 - j. The General Council received and approved the Treasurer's reports of the 1974 Unified Budget for the period ending May 31, 1974, and the Presbytery of Detroit Statement of Financial Condition, period ending May 31, 1974.

- k. The General Council authorized the Treasurer, subject to concurrence of the Committee on National Missions, to combine cash reserves available in Presbytery accounts and in National Missions accounts for short-term investments, in order to meet the minimum amount required to invest in Certificates of Deposit, the interest income to be pro-rated according to the amounts invested from the various funds.
- 1. The General Council authorized the Treasurer to secure a Safe Deposit Box at the bank of present use; approved the required bank resolutions; and authorized the Treasurer, the Executive Presbyter and the Presbytery Bookkeeper to become signatories.
- m. The General Council instructed the Secretary to write a letter expressing the appreciation of General Council to the members of St. Paul's Church, Livonia, who prepared the Presbytery banner which will be carried in the procession opening the joint Communion Service to be held by our 186th General Assembly (1974) and the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, June 17, 1974, in Louisville.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery discharged the following Special Administrative Commissions:
 - a. Ordination of James B. Snyder at Farmington, First Church, May 19, 1974;
 - b. Ordination of Harold H. McConnell, III at St. Clair Shores, Lake Shore Church, June 9, 1974;
 - c. Installation of Donald R. Elly at Rosedale Gardens Church, June 9, 1974.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery acted to join in forming an inter-presbytery agency in order to program, manage facilities, staff and budget cooperatively in implementing Extended Experience Education (E³) policy.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report as a whole.

By common consent, the docket was amended to hear the report of the Committee on National Missions preceding the report of the Special Committee on Reorganization.

THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through The Rev. Carl G. Howie, Chairman. (Papers N, O)

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to the First Presbyterian Church of Brighton (1) to purchase a 4½ acre site (legal description on file) adjacent to its present property, on a land contract for \$175,000 at 8% interest, subject to a confirming certified appraisal of the worth of the property; and (2) to engage an architect to design a site plan for the total property.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to the Drayton Plains Community Church, Drayton Plains, to list for sale on the open market its manse at 2470 West Walton Boulevard, described as Lots 182 and 183 of Waterford Lakes Estates Subdivision.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to Orchard Lake Community Church, Presbyterian, to list for sale on the open market the manse located at 7175 Henry Drive, Orchard Lake.
- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to University Presbyterian Church, Rochester, to engage an architect in order to prepare preliminary plans and financial plans for building expansion.
- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to Saint Thomas Community Church, United Presbyterian, Shelby Township, and/or the Committee on National Missions, to engage an architect in order to develop preliminary building and financial plans for the church's first unit.
- 6. Upon motion, Presbytery granted to the First United Presbyterian Church, Warren, (1) final approval of its building and financial plans and (2) permission to borrow \$75,000 from the Board of National Missions (Program Agency) and up to \$67,000 from members of the church.

7. Upon motion, Presbytery authorized the First Presbyterian Church, Plymouth, Michigan, to list for sale on the open real estate market a parcel of property consisting of 25.923 acres located on Beck Road near North Territorial Road, with the proviso that \$25,000 or 25% whichever is greater from the receipt of such sale be given to the Presbyterian Village to fulfill a stipulation in the letter of instruction by which the property was conveyed to the First Presbyterian Church, Plymouth, Michigam.

Upon motion, the report was approved as a whole.

THE TELLERS FOR ELECTION OF ASSOCIATE EXECUTIVE reported through the Moderator. Two hundred and forty-four ballots were cast: 233 were affirmative, nine were negative, and two were abstentions. The Rev. Harry H. Maghakian, having received more than the two-thirds affirmative votes required, was declared elected Associate for Parish Development of the Presbytery of Detroit and welcomed to the Presbytery. Mr. Maghakian was introduced to the Presbytery by Elder Harry Kirk and addressed the Presbytery briefly.

THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON REORGANIZATION reported through The Rev. Eldon F. Beery, Chairman, who presented for Presbytery's consideration and action the plan for reorganization of Presbytery, called the Plan for Mission. (Papers J, K, L, M) Mr. Beery proceeded to review a summary of some of the final adjustments made in the Plan at the suggestion of Presbyters and then called on Elder Jack Callam, The Rev. Chase Hunt, and The Rev. John B. Quick, who spoke to specific aspects of the Plan. Mr. Beery further spoke to the comprehensive motion of the Reorganization Schedule and to the goal of having the Plan in effect January 1, 1975. Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the "Plan for Mission" until December 31, 1976, with the amendment that one of the At-Large members of General Council shall be a representative from the Detroit Council of United Presbyterian Men. Lost, was a motion that the report be placed on file, that the committee be dismissed with thanks and that a new committee be appointed to study and propose an evolutionary plan of reorganization if necessary. Upon motion, Presbyteryby a vote of 194 to 35 suspended conflicting bylaws until Dec. 31, 1976. Lost, was a motion to postpone suspension of the Bylaws until a specific list was prepared and presented to the next meeting of Presbytery. The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman entered a protest and stated that he would file a complaint against the action of Presbytery in suspending the Bylaws of Presbytery

without publishing the specific Bylaws suspended. (Paper S)

- e. Nominate or cause to be nominated officers and other personnel necessary to implement the "Plan for Mission"
- f. After "Plan for Mission" is in operation, serve as advisory committee to Presbytery Council during the life of the "Plan for Mission"
- g. After the "Plan for Mission" is in operation, shall recommend an administrative commission for election by the Presbytery with power to effect the merger of the Committee on National Missions, a Michigan Corporation (formerly Presbyterian Board of Church Extension of Detroit), and the Trustees of the Presbytery of Detroit, a Michigan Corporation.

Lost were motions to amend the foregoing motion (1) to elect the commission at the next stated meeting of Presbytery; (2) to elect the commission at a <u>pro re nata</u> meeting in August, and (3) to direct that no members now serving on the General Council should serve on the Special Administrative Commission.

Upon motion, Presbytery declared that as of the effective date of the "Plan for Mission", and until the merger of the corporations is effected and their successors are qualified, the officers of the present two corporations shall continue to act upon the direction of the Presbytery; and authorized the September 1976 election of a special committee to re-evaluate the Presbytery structure and propose future direction for the organization of the Presbytery.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery commended The Rev. Eldon F. Beery for his service as Chairman of the Special Committee on Reorganization and gave him a round of applause. The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman requested that his negative votes on actions relating to the Plan for Mission be recorded.

THE TRUSTEES OF PRESBYTERY reported through Elder Thomas Turner, Chairman, who spoke to the report for 1973. (Paper P)
Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report.

THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through The Rev. Richard J. Milford, Chairman. (Paper Q)

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the contract between Grosse Pointe Woods
 Presbyterian Church and The Rev. Stuart Paterson to become stated supply for
 the period beginning July 21, 1974, for six months under the following terms:
 \$13,500 annual salary, housing, utilities, \$1,800 annual car allowance, full
 pension, full hospitalization and moving expenses from Kansas to Grosse Pointe
 Woods and return.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery elected the following special administrative commission to ordain, on behalf of the Presbytery of Winnebago, Mr. Michael L. Lindvall and to install him as assistant pastor of the Drayton Avenue Presbyterian Church, Ferndale, on Sunday, July 14, 1974, at 10 a.m.: The Rev. John McCreight, chairman, The Rev. Chase S. Moody (Presbytery of Whitewater Valley) invited to participate as corresponding member.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery approved to August 31, 1974, the part-time temporary supply contract between the session of the Utica Presbyterian Church, Sterling Heights, and The Rev. J. Kenneth Brand, with the following terms: \$35 Sunday worship, \$5 per hour, up to 30 hours per week, and 15¢ per mile car allowance.
- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery extended the part-time temporary supply contract between The Rev. Robert B. Johnson and the session of Greenfield Presbyterian Church, Berkley, under present terms, until September 30, 1974.
- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery heard The Rev. Harold H. McConnell, Jr., and approved the invitation of the Lake Shore Presbyterian Church, St. Clair Shores, to The Rev. A. Dale Ihrie, an ordained minister of the American Baptist Churches of Michigan Southeastern Area, to become assistant pastor, effective July 1, 1974, with the following terms: \$8,500 salary, manse, full pension, \$1,000 car allowance, two weeks' study leave, \$200 study allowance, \$400 personal allowance, one month vacation, and annual review of the terms; and that in accord with the Form of Government, Chapters 12, 18, 19, The Rev. A. Dale Ihrie be enrolled as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit upon receipt of his certificate of dismission from the American Baptist Church. (Paper Q1)

POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY reported through The Rev. William S. Baker, who presented a statement opposing the restoration of capital punishment in Michigan and previously circulated to Presbytery in April. (Paper T)

Upon motion, Presbytery endorsed the Statement by The Michigan Catholic Conference Board of Directors Opposing Restoration of the Death Penalty in Michigan. The statement will be included in the Permanent Record.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to the Detroit Presbyterial Association for The Rev. Margaret A. Scabich to serve communion at the Presbyterial Fall Retreat at Walden Woods, September 21, 1974.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery referred to General Council for consideration a paper on the Scriptures written by Mr. George Kind.
- 3. The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman entered a "protest that the Moderator has expressed his opinion as to how the Presbytery shall vote. It is inappropriate for the Moderator to direct the Presbytery in how it should vote. The Moderator admitted taking this action." (Paper U)
- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery referred to the appropriate committee of Presbytery a request to study the issues of national health concerns and to recommend to Presbytery a set of guidelines that each congregation can use to evaluate the various national health insurance bills before the Houses of Congress.

 (Paper V)
- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery instructed the Trustees of Presbytery to prepare and distribute to Presbytery a report over the past 10 years on the assets of Presbytery under their care.
- 6. An objection was made to the use of ethnic jokes on the floor of Presbytery and the Moderator was urged to call speakers to order in that regard.
- 7. A concern was expressed regarding decorum, objecting to language exceeding the bounds of propriety and casting aspersions upon the character and motive of members of Presbytery.

PROGRAM REPORTS

REPORTS ON SYNOD AND GENERAL ASSEMBLY

1. Presbytery heard Youth Advisory Delegates to Synod, Miss Lauren E. Beale (Grosse Ile) and Miss Laurey E. Mack (University Church, Rochester), who reported their impressions and experiences both to the pre-orientation session and the Synod meeting; their request to return again to the 1975 meeting of

Synod; and their action in caucus to set up a Synod level Task Force to meet August 2 and 3 to determine what the needs are for youth ministry, how to deal with them, what programs are already in existence, and how to make use of them.

2. The Moderator directed attention to the written report on the meeting of Synod

as distributed to Presbytery. (Paper W)

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report of the commissioners to Synod.

The Moderator called the commissioners to General Assembly forward and introduced Youth Advisory Delegate, Miss Jill Mills, who reported her impressions and spoke to the action of the General Assembly regarding amnesty. The Moderator further expressed his own feeling that the meeting of the General Assembly is breaking down because it tries to do too much, with the result that it does very little of it well and much of it poorly. He stated that the time has come for the church to think through the adequacy of the present system of General Assembly to deal with all of the problems of organization and structure and operation of the church, while at the same time speaking on matters of faith and doctrine and addressing the world and its problems. Opportunity was given for Presbytery to direct questions to the commissioners to General Assembly.

Upon motion, the Presbytery approved the report of the commissioners to the General Assembly.

THE COMMITTEE ON RECORDS AND REPORTS, through its chairman, The Rev. Frank C. Marvin, Jr., presented Mrs. JoAnna Vicklund, Chairman, to give the annual report of the Greater Detroit Chapter of the Presbyterian Lay Committee. Mrs. Vicklund reviewed the formation and activities of the Chapter since its beginning and stated the Committee's objectives and goals as it works within the church. (Paper X) Upon motion, the report was received and approved.

PRESBYTERIAN VILLAGE OF DETROIT reported through The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman, Jr., President of the Board, who urged completion and return of a survey questionnaire mailed to each pastor, designed to gather information essential to making decisions on expansion needs.

THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM reported through The Rev. John McCreight, who called attention to the continued down-trend in membership in the United Presbyterian Church, with 1973 showing a loss of almost 100,000 members, or 3.5% of the gross membership, suggesting that the matter raises questions of the spiritual health of the church; directed the concern of the Presbytery to the final report on the Evangelism Associate Program with its recommendations (Paper Y); and introduced The Rev. Loren M. Scribner, who reported the experience of the Kirk of Our Saviour as one of the pilot churches in the Evangelism Associate Program.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report which contained the following recommen-

- The still to be filled full-time Presbytery Staff Associate for Presbytery
 Ministries with special responsibilities to work with Sessions of local churches
 in the area of Evangelism and Interpretation and Stewardship needs to be filled
 immediately.
- 2. The churches of the Presbytery should avail themselves of the experiences of the ten churches, their pastors and members or their Committees on Evangelism, and use them as resource persons in setting up programs in Evangelism in their own churches.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery expressed gratitude to The Rev. Henry D. Jones and Maureen for their years of dedicated and devoted service to the cause of Christ in the Presbytery of Detroit.

Upon motion, Presbytery adjourned at 10:38 p.m. with prayer and the benediction by the Moderator, The Rev. L. J. Peterson.

The General Council, upon notice from Elder Paul Napier, Stated Clerk of Synod, reporting that he has referred to the Permanent Judicial Commission the papers submitted in the Complaint of The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman vs Presbytery of Detroit, authorized the Executive Committee to nominate to Presbytery a Special Committee to Represent the Presbytery as required by Book of Order 86.06; and directed the Executive Committee to report directly to Presbytery, in order to meet the date of the hearing, October 3, 1974.
 - d. The General Council responded to a communication from The Rev. Tom M. Castlen, Synod of the Covenant, on a Synod-Wide Consultation on the Planning, Programming, Budgeting, Evaluating System to be held September 27-28, 1974, by authorizing the Executive Committee to secure up to two representatives.
 - e. The General Council received a communication from The First United Presbyterian Church of Royal Oak expressing concern that the mid-morning time of the Special Meeting of Presbytery of August 11, 1974, precluded the attendance of lay members from that church.
 - The General Council approved the report of its Executive Committee as follows:
 - (1) The Performance Review of professional staff will take place during the anniversary month of their employment.
 - (2) Professional staff salary adjustments will be on a calendar basis for ease of budget planning.
 - (3) Professional staff salary increases between 5% and 7%, depending on beginning date of employment, will be recommended.
 - (4) For non-professional staff a budget has been projected which will allow salary increases up to 10%.

- g. The General Council reports to Presbytery that it anticipates that the 1975 per capita will be established at a rate not to exceed 74¢.
- h. The General Council responded to a report by the Committee on Interpretation and Stewardship by recommending that Presbytery call the 1974 Emergency Appeal for General Assembly General Missions to the attention of the local churches but place emphasis on Mission Advance in 1975.
- i. The General Council received the resignation of The Rev. Richard H. Williams from the Committee on Ministerial Relations, Class of 1975, and referred the vacancy to the Committee on Nominations.
- j. The General Council granted the Committee on Ministerial Relations pre-Presbytery time at the October meeting of Presbytery to report on revision of the United Presbyterian Pension Plan.
- k. The General Council heard a report of the Executive Presbyter that negotiations are currently being carried on with one of the present tenants of 10600 Puritan to occupy up to one half of the building by November 1 and fully in one year, with option to buy.
- 1. The General Council referred to the Executive Committee the formation of a committee to work with the staff on the location of a new office, with the power to appoint.
- m. The General Council received from the Treasurer financial reports for the period ending August 31, 1974.
- n. The General Council referred to the Special Committee on Worship inspirational material written by The Rev. George Kind.
- o. The General Council directed the Executive Committee to explore an invitation to the General Assembly to meet in the City of Detroit and, if possible, concurrently with a meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in Windsor.
- p. The General Council heard a report from The Rev. Carl G. Howie, that the Special Synod Committee to Nominate a Synod Executive solicits suggestions for the position, the deadline being November 1, 1974.
- q. The General Council as authorized by the Presbytery June 27, 1974, has elected a Special Administrative Commission on Reorganization as follows:

Whereas, the Employer is willing to make such program available to any employee by purchasing and paying premiums on any annuity policy for such employee to the extent such employee is willing to accept a reduction in salary; NOW THEREFORE, Be It Resolved that it is hereby declared to be the policy of Employer that this Tax Deferred Annuity Program be made available to all employees of the Employer at the election of each employee; and

Be It Further Resolved that the Treasurer is hereby authorized to prepare a form agreement to be executed by the Employer and by each employee desiring to participate in this Tax Deferred Annuity Program under the terms of which agreement the Employer shall agree to pay the premiums in the amount of such reduction of an annuity policy owned by the employee and Be It Further Resolved that the Treasurer is hereby authorized to adopt such administrative rules and procedures as may be necessary and proper to implement this Tax Deferred Annuity Program and employer's appropriate officers are hereby authorized to execute such applications and other forms as may be necessary to effectuate the purchase of annuity policies for individual employees pursuant to this program.

Upon motion, Presbytery accepted the invitation to join an Inter-Presbytery EEE Agency among the following presbyteries (Lake Huron, Lake Michigan, Detroit, Maumee and Mackinac), which will offer the following: site management, publicity-registration, staffing of summer program, E3 facility and site strategy, and EEE program strategy. Each presbytery will share in any or all of the above at the

discretion of that presbytery or its designated committee. Each presbytery will share in representation (2 people), and each budgeting (in accordance with the services subscribed

to).

- c. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery accepted the following as the purpose of the Inter-Presbytery EEE Agency:
 - (1) to develop a system of inter-presbytery wide relationships capable of identifying Extended Experience Education program needs of the judicatories within its bounds;
 - (2) to recognize and encourage the complementary and mutually responsible roles of sessions, presbyteries and synod in these educational ministries, in contrast to present independent modes of operation;
 - (3) to take initiative in developing an inter-presbytery wide resource system for Extended Experience Education which will enhance the effectiveness and achieve a responsible stewardship of the facilities, funds and personnel of the judicatories;
 - (4) to provide leadership in innovative Extended Experience Education programming by responding to identified, unmet needs of sessions and presbyteries, and by developing experimental models;
 - (5) to commit its present and future Extended Experience Education capital and program resources for allocation within the inter-presbytery wide resource system.
- 6. Presbytery recognized The Rev. Donald G. Lester, Executive Presbyter, who shared personal observations and concerns pertaining to the life of Presbytery and issued challenges. He is impressed by the openness of all to new leadership and the acceptance of staff both as staff and as persons. The potential of the church in its impact on the communities it serves, however, is less than adequately realized. It is his concern that attitudes and expectations reflect the understanding that it is people not plans that fail or succeed; that it is people who hurt and need ministry, and ministers are among the most hurting people; and, therefore, it is essential that the whole church set and focus on the highest priorities and resist majoring in minors. He challenged Presbytery to extensive mission advance: to revitalize present mission units at a rate of one per year; to initiate at least one new congregation per year; to reach the unreached; to set a course and keep at it.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report of the General Council as a whole.

SPECIAL ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSION ON REORGANIZATION The Rev. Chase S. Hunt, for the Special Administrative Commission on Reorganization, reported that commission members had been elected and are actively engaged in the task assigned. The first area organizing meetings have been set for the purpose of electing (1) a chairman and a secretary for each Area Assembly and (2) an Area Committee to nominate representatives to Departments of Presbytery, Presbytery Council, and Council Divisions. The Area Assemblies will meet on the following schedule:

Local churches have been individually notified.
Clergy not serving local churches are free to participate in either the Area where they work or the Area of their residence if the two are not the same.

The Commission seeks a smooth, efficient transition and is asking the present committees of Presbytery to continue to serve until their successors have been elected and the plan goes into effect and to see that steps are taken to assure the comtinuity of supervision of current Presbytery projects and programs. The present Nominating Committee of Presbytery will be co-opted to assist in the nominating process. Mr. Hunt called attention to the printed report (Paper J) identifying those 1963 By-Laws found to be in conflict with the new Plan for Mission and reported further as follows:

"The Commission has recognized that the pressures and limitation of time last spring in preparing and revising the proposed Plan for presentation and consideration at the June meeting of Presbytery made it impossible for the Committee on Reorganization to identify at that meeting those by-laws that would seem to be in conflict with the Plan. This situation is now being addressed by the Administrative Commission on Reorganization, as a part of its interpretative function, through the report now in your hands. It not only lists the conflicting by-laws suspended by the action of Presbytery in June and the place in the Plan for Mission where the parallel adjustments are to be found, but also contains a print-out of the Structure and By-Laws of the Presbytery of Detroit adopted January 23, 1963 and indicates on this print out precisely where the conflicts occur. No attempt has been made, however, to correct terminology that necessarily and automatically changes as a result of the prior reorganization of our denomination at the General Assembly and Synod levels. "This listing of conflicting by-laws represents the Commission's present perception of just where those conflicts occur. An examination of them will reveal that the changes required by the Plan for Mission are essentially structural in nature, and that the substance of the mission responsibilities contained in the 1963 document is affected very little if at all. It is the Commission's interpretation that for all practical purposes, the 1963 by-laws which are considered in conflict will continue in force until the Plan for Mission is implemented in January of next year, except where there would be a deterrent to the smooth transition from our present to the new structure. It appears to us now that the only instance where the conflicting by-laws should be put aside immediately is with regard to the nominating procedures called for by the new Plan. We are, therefore, considering those by-laws suspended and are following the process outlined in the Plan for Mission where nominations are concerned. We believe that this is proper from a procedural standpoint, and clearly in the spirit of your action when you voted in June to implement the Plan and cause this Administrative Commission to be formed. If it develops that other conflicting by-laws should be put aside before January 1, this will be done by the Commission and reported to you at the subsequent Presbytery meeting. And if, after the Plan becomes effective other by-laws

come to light as being in conflict, they will

likewise be considered suspended and reported to you as promptly as possible."

<u>Upon motion</u>, the report of the Special Administrative Commission on Reorganization was approved.

 Margaret Scabich to become pastor effective September 15, 1974 with the following terms: \$8,550 salary, \$3,550 housing allowance, 15% pension, health insurance, \$1,200 car allowance, two weeks study leave, \$250 conference/study allowance, one month's vacation, annual review; elected the following special administrative commission: The Rev. THE COMMITTEE ON CANDIDATES reported through The Rev. William H. Stryker. (Paper M)

1. LINDA CHASE, a member of Lake Shore Church, St. Clair Shores, a graduate of Syracuse University and a student at Louisville Seminary, was introduced by Elder Paul Mallwitz, and spoke concerning the influences and motivations that led her desire to prepare for the ministry.

Upon motion, Presbytery arrested the examination.

Upon motion, Presbytery sustained the examination; unanimously waved the three-month application period, for reason of extended

previous contact and knowledge of the candidate by the Committee on Candidates; and enrolled Linda Chase as a candidate for the

professional ministry.

2. JEFFREY DOANE, a member of First Church, Ann Arbor, who has completed two years of study at the University of Chicago, Divinity School, was introduced by Elder Helen Timmons, and spoke concerning the influences and motivations that led to his desire to prepare for the ministry.

Upon motion, Presbytery arrested the examination.

Upon motion, Presbytery sustained the examination and enrolled Jeffrey Doane as a candidate for the professional ministry.

3. WILLIAM POLKOWSKI, a member of First Church, Ann Arbor, and a graduate of Purdue University and Princeton Seminary, was introduced by Elder Virginia Donahey. He spoke concerning the influences and motivations leading to his desire to be ordained.

Upon motion, Presbytery arrested the examination.

Upon motion, Presbytery sustained the examination; unanimously waived the three-month application period, for reason of extended prior contact and knowledge of the candidate by the Committee on Candidates; and enrolled William Polkowski as a candidate for the

professional ministry.

The Vice-Moderator conducted the service receiving the candidates under the care of Presbytery, with pastors, families and members of the sessions and congregations of the candidates participating. Candidate Linda Chase

closed the service with prayer, followed by The Lord's Prayer.
4. MARY GALARRITA, a member of Littlefield Church, Dearborn, and a graduate of Louisville Seminary was introduced by The Rev. William H. Stryker. She read her statement of faith and stood examination for licensure.

Upon motion, Presbytery sustained the examination and approved Mary Galarrita for licensure.

The Presbytery through the Vice-Moderator proceeded immediately to license Mary Galarrita.

- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery requested the Leadership Development Department of the Synod of the Covenant to waive the required proficiency in the Hebrew language (49.022) for CHARLES HOLM, a candidate under the care of this Presbytery, for the following reasons, as given by the candidate:
 - a. Due to a misunderstanding in schedule planning, elective courses were taken during the first year, leaving me with the necessity of completing a number of seminary requirements in both Middler and Senior years, rather than having all requirements completed by the end of the Middler year.
 - b. I had originally planned on taking Greek during the summer of 1973, but because of financial reasons I was required to work instead. This left me with the necessity of fulfilling my Greek grammar and exegisis requirements by May of 1974.
 - c. I had planned on taking Hebrew during the summer of 1974 in a concentrated course. Due to my field education arrangements for the fall, I am required to work full-time during the summer in my field position so that I might continue in the same during 1974-5. Beginning in June, 1974, I will be serving full-time at the First Presbyterian Church of Metuchen, New Jersey for the entire summer. In September I will be kept on the staff part-time through May, 1975. Following ordination in May, the church would like to call me its Assistant Minister. For this sequence to come

about, I am unable to take Hebrew during the summer. Class meeting hours do not permit it, nor would my work-load over the summer.

- 6. Upon motion, Presbytery requested the Leadership Development Department of the Synod of the Covenant to waive the required proficiency in the Greek and Hebrew languages (49.022) for TOMAS CHAVEZ, a candidate under the care of this Presbytery for reasons as follows:
 - Tom Chavez served the Presbytery of Detroit in the Southwest Spanish Ministry as a licensed lay preacher. Following some course work at the University of Windsor, Tom was received under the care of the Presbytery for the ministry on December 29, 1971. He entered McCormick Seminary in September of 1972. Because of his early educational background, he was never taught English grammar correctly. He therefore experienced great difficulty with the Biblical languages and was counseled by the Candidates Committee to take one semester of each language without credit. Tom has indicated an ability to read and translate, although slowly, the Biblical languages.
- 7. Presbytery's attention was directed to a paper on the standard Ordination Examinations for Candidates for information. (Paper N) Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report as a whole.

THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through The Rev. Carl G. Howie, Chairman. (Paper O)

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to the Littlefield Boulevard Church, Dearborn, to sell its manse at 7559 East Morrow Circle, Dearborn, under the following terms: price \$39,900 with \$10,000 down payment on a land contract for not more than one year, with monthly payments of \$250 plus 9% interest on the remaining balance; also taxes and insurance to be paid by purchaser. Purchaser may terminate land contract at any time by paying balance in full.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to Northminster Presbyterian Church, Troy, to sell its manse at 1452 Wrenwood,
 - Troy, to The Rev. and Mrs. MacKay Taylor on a land contract for 40,000 at $7\frac{1}{2}$ %.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to the Garden City Church to list for sale commercial property as follows: Lots 100 and 101 on Bock Street and Lots 97a and 98a on Middlebelt Road.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report as a whole.

THE COMMITTEE ON RECORDS AND REPORTS reported through The Rev. Frank C. Marvin as follows: (Paper P)

- 1. The Records and Reports Committee recommends approval of the following Session Minutes, with exceptions noted in the report to the Clerks of Session:
 - a. Plymouth, First; Wayne, First; Cherry Hill; Ann Arbor, First; Kirk of Our Saviour; Ann Arbor, North Side; Ann Arbor, Calvary; Ann Arbor, Westminster; Ypsilanti, First; Milan, People's Church.
- The First Church of Saline, Michigan did not present their Session Minutes. The Committee asks that the Session Minutes and the Church Register from Saline, First be presented at the next meeting of Presbytery, October 22, 1974.
- 3. The Northville Church requested permission to present their Session Minutes and Church Register to the November meeting of Presbytery and the Committee granted their request.

Upon motion, the report was approved.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

1. Upon motion from the floor from Elder Robert Guymer, Presbytery directed that the Special Committee on Nominations take under consideration that one-half of the Elder Commissioners to the 1975 General Assembly be nominated also to serve as Commissioners to the 1976 General Assembly; that each year one-half of the Commissioners be nominated for two-year terms; and that the Chairman of the Committee report back to the October meeting of the Presbytery. (Paper Q)

THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM reported through The Rev. John McCreight (Paper R), who introduced Mrs. Mary Younkin, Grandale, Detroit, and Mr. Denton Craley, First Church, Detroit, who reported on their local church activity and programs resulting from their participation in the Evangelism Associates Program.

Upon motion, the report was received.

The Minute for Mission was presented by The Rev. James W. Kesler, who reported on the ministary of the Presbyterian Council for Chaplains and Military Personnel, an ecumenical agency of four Presbyterian denominations supported through General Assembly General Mission giving. (Paper F)

LEGAL ACTIONS

THE SPECIAL ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSION ON REORGANIZATION reported through The Rev. Chase S. Hunt (Paper G) that the Nominating Committees elected at the Area Assembly meetings have been working to prepare slates of thirty-two nominees for presentation at the Area Assembly meetings to be held during the recess of this Presbytery meeting; the Commission has been engaged in developing a slate of forty-eight at-large nominees to be presented to the Presbytery at the November meeting; and, with respect to the nominating process, the Commission has taken the position that nominations, except where specifically prohibited in the Plan, will be made in three classes, and that the service in classes of individuals in the present structure will not be considered a limiting factor in making nominations or assigning classes for the new structure. Upon motion, the report was approved.

Presbytery recessed for meetings of Area Assemblies at 7:08 p.m. and reconvened at 7:40 p.m. (Papers N, O, P, Q, R, S)

THE COMMITTEE ON RECORDS AND REPORTS reported through The Rev. Robert Duggan as follows: (Paper H)

The Records and Reports Committee recommends approval of the following records, with exceptions noted in the report to the Clerks of Session:

- 1. Session Minutes of Pontiac, First; Church of the Atonement; Pontiac, Oakland Avenue; Sashabaw; Joslyn Avenue; St. Thomas; Drayton Plains; University; Auburn Heights; Lakeland; Saline; White Lake; Kirk in the Hills.
- 2. Church Registers of Pontiac, First; Sashabaw; Saline; White Lake; Kirk in the Hills.

Upon motion, the report was approved and the recommendations adopted.

THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through The Rev. Charles Gensheimer. (Paper I)

- 1. Upon motion, Presbytery granted the First Presbyterian Church, Royal Oak, permission to purchase the residence at 502 Pleasant Street, Royal Oak, for \$18,000 cash.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the recommendation that a Consultant on Strategy in New Church Development be employed by the Presbytery of Detroit and supervised by the Executive Presbyter for a fee of \$1,200 per month (\$300 weekly) plus travel and meals, to be paid out of salary monies unspent by the Presbytery and the Synod of the Covenant, in view of staff vacancies during the present year, such employment to be on a month to month basis, up to a maximum of three months.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the recommendation that the Presbytery offer a contract for services to The Rev. Hugh Stewart for the position of Consultant on Strategy in New Church Development, on the recommendation of the Executive Presbyter, if the way be clear, effective October 14, 1974.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through The Rev. Richard J. Milford, Chairman. (Paper K)

1. A Memorial Minute for The Rev. Alfred Holman was presented by Elder R. Stewart Fleming of Knox Church: (Paper K)
"It is one of the signal privileges of my experience to join with you in tribute to the Lord of Glory by the remembrance of Alfred Holman.

"Reverend Holman, that was the way that all of us at Knox knew him, had an unusual gift of personal ministry. The reserve of a thorough gentleman with the warmest smile and firmest handshake allowed him to be a long time friend and counselor. Some of my reflection will seem personal but it speaks for a host of others who knew and loved him and who share the same memories.

"The fruit of his labor is seen in the lives of pastors, missionaries, college students, and hundreds of his flock. We stand firmly rooted in the faith, confident in the reliability, accuracy, and authority of the scripture, trusting in the finished work of Christ as sufficient for all our needs.

"Reverend Holman was God's special catylst suited to us.

"What were the qualities that gave him this unique witness?

"He was not an orator, disdaining any emotional appeal, eschewing any artifice, he preached the word.

"He had no ambition to be an executive preferring that others manage and organize.

"Unpretentious in every way - you couldn't get behind him in line, reluctant to express his opinion, appreciative of any talent in others, but unaware of his own; never seeking credit but confident in his labor knowing its reward. He would dislike my doing this unless you and I change it to God's glory and profit by it.

"He prayed for us! Bringing to bear the spiritual power available to those who are spirit filled.

"Reverend Holman was a doer. A skilled mechanic, equally at home with a welding torch, metal lathe, or mitre saw. When as a teenager I assembled my first phonograph amplifier, he built a beautiful wood and leather cabinet for the turntable and amplifier. He grew up in western Canada and loved the land, for a hobby he raised garden vegetables and soybeans on a ten acre plot. On retreats he cut and split the firewood. A fisherman, and photographer, some of his films are still among the best I have ever seen amateur or professional alike. When we were young he knew how to be along and yet never assumed the lead, we had no generation gap. I remember our group bowling while he set the pins. How we were blessed - being with someone, so much one with us, and so much one with the Lord. He loved a game - Mrs. Holman watching countless nights while the ping-pong games went past mid-night in the church basement and he played with the enthusiasm and energy of a boy.

"He was a teacher. He knew the scripture as most of us can list our prized possessions. When in college I evinced an interest in bible study, he gave me a "strong's concordance", as an inducement. Somehow we all developed a desire to know and understand God's word.

"He was utterly faithful to visit the sick and elderly. His presence meant strength and cheer.

"He was thrilled at our successes no matter how modest and we knew his joy to be real.

"He never made much money, even by the standards of his calling. When the subject was advanced he usually found another on the staff who really needed a raise. When his money gave out he frequently took the last twenty or fifty dollars and gave it to the most pressing need. But he boasted of the Lord's provision for him. And we knew it to be true.

"We never thought of him as having integrity that word doesn't do the job. He was without dissemblance preferring silence to the shadow of a mere half truth. Unable to flatter falsely, his praise was pure gold.

"Grateful for any favor, a good cup of tea, the slightest hospitality, any effort of service to his Lord. Patient in trial; this last year while his body was consumed, he endured all, maintaining his joy in obedience. At the very last when even a whisper was a miracle telling his partner thanks for her unremitting care that allowed him to live out his final year at home, he died simply and victoriously.

"Weeks before when I last saw him Mrs. Holman and I were to spend some time out of doors. She opened the window and told him, smiling, to "holler if he needed anything". He gave that great smile and said "I'm not good at hollering", he never was. To God be the Glory!"

2. The Rev. Arthur K. Beumler introduced The Rev. William E. Saum, a new pastor of Church of Our Saviour, West Bloomfield, enrolled since the last meeting of Presbytery.

- 3. Elder Ronald Anderson, Chairperson, Sub-committee on Pensions and Salary, introduced The Rev. Edgar Prasse, new Area Representative of the Board of Pensions, who spoke briefly on the purpose of his office and announced his availability for consultation during the meeting of Presbytery.
- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Elder Henry G. Bowden as a representative of the church; approved the call of Kirk in the Hills, Bloomfield Hills to The Rev. Frank J. Irvine to become associate pastor effective November 1, 1974, with the following terms: \$15,000 salary, \$3,600 housing allowance, full pension, health insurance, \$1,500 car allowance, two weeks study leave, \$250 conference/study allowance, one month's vacation, annual review; placed the call in Mr. Irvine's hands; elected the following special administrative commission: The Rev. L. J. Peterson, chairman, The Rev. Charles J. Gensheimer, The Rev. Donald G. Lester, The Rev. James F. Anderson, Elder Henry G. Bowden (Kirk in the Hills), Elder John A. Swayze (Kirk in the Hills) with The Rev. Robert Swanson (Presbytery of Lake Huron) invited to be a corresponding member; and empowered said commission to install Mr. Irvine at 4:00 o'clock, November 10, 1974.
- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Elder Richard Braun as a representative of the church; approved the call of the Geneva United Presbyterian Church to The Rev. Jeffrey S. Goldsmith to become pastor effective October 1, 1974, with the following terms: \$10,000 salary, \$3,600 housing allowance, full pension, two weeks study leave, \$560 conference/study allowance, one month's vacation, annual review, \$600 insurance, \$1,800 car allowance; placed the call in Mr. Goldsmith's hands; elected the following special administrative commission: The Rev. Harry Maghakian, chairman, The Rev. Hugh V. Stewart, The Rev. Theodore Taylor, Elder Glen Ponte (Geneva Church), Elder Nancy Kaufman (Plymouth, First Church); and empowered said commission to install Mr. Goldsmith October 27, 1974.
- 6. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Elder Jimmie B. Harvin as a representative of the church; dissolved the pastoral relation between The Rev. John B. Quick and the St. John's Presbyterian Church, Detroit; approved the call of the Presbytery of Lake Huron to The Rev. John B. Quick; placed the call in Mr. Quick's hands; dismissed Mr. Quick to the Presbytery of Lake Huron, effective October 31, 1974; appointed The Rev. Kenneth Kettlewell moderator of the session; and authorized the session, in consultation with the Committee on Ministerial Relations to fill the pulpit during the pastoral vacancy. The Rev. Virgil L. Jones, The Rev. Richard J. Milford, and The Rev. L. J. Peterson spoke in appreciation and commendation of Mr. Quick.
- 7. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Elder C. S. Wixom, a representative of the church; dissolved the assistant pastoral relation between The Rev. David M. Rice and the session of First Presbyterian Church, Pontiac; heard a representative of the church; approved the call of the Colerain United Presbyterian Church, Colerain, Ohio, to The Rev. David M. Rice; placed the call in Mr. Rice's hands; and dismissed Mr. Rice to the Presbytery of Upper Ohio Valley, effective October 31, 1974.
- 8. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Elder Warren Hill, a representative of the church; approved the call of the Crossroads United Presbyterian Church, Walled Lake, to The Rev. Richard I. Peters effective December 1, 1974, with the following terms: \$10,800 salary, \$3,600 housing allowance or manse, full utilities, full pension, \$1,300 car allowance, two weeks study leave, \$300 conference/study allowance, one month's vacation, annual review; forwarded the call to the Presbytery of Redstone, with the request that it be placed in Mr. Peters' hands and that he be dismissed to the Presbytery of Detroit; enrolled Mr. Peters upon receipt of his dismission.
- 9. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to First Presbyterian Church, Saline, to employ The Rev. Richard Campbell as part time Temporary Supply, effective November 1, 1974, with the following terms: \$125 per week for 20 hours which includes worship and worship preparation.

- 10. Upon motion, Presbytery changed the terms of call between The Rev. Ivan G. Smith and Dearborn, St. Mark's Church from manse and utilities to a housing allowance of \$3,600 per year.
- 11. Presbytery, on September 24, 1974, having dissolved the associate pastor relation between The Rev. John R. Waser and First Presbyterian Church, Ann Arbor, effective November 15, 1974, and having granted the church permission to elect Mr. Waser Associate Pastor Emeritus, now recognized the Honorable Retirement of The Rev. John R. Waser by hearing The Rev. Charles Gensheimer and The Rev. Robert Sanders, Pastor of Ann Arbor, First, and by presenting Mr. Waser with a certificate of retirement.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report as a whole.

THE GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland. (Paper L)

- 1. The General Council reported for information the following:
 - a. The General Council referred to Presbytery Council of United Presbyterian Men a communication from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, requesting a correct list of representatives to the National Council of United Presbyterian Men; received from the Detroit Chapter the nomination of Ole Sarto, Northville, to fill the vacancy of Alvin Coleman, to the National Council; and recommended his election to Presbytery.
 - b. The General Council referred to Presbytery Council of United Presbyterian Men a communication from A. F. Pieper, Coordinator of Office for Men's Program of the Program Agency, requesting participation in the Annual Meeting Travel Equalization Fund of the National Council of United Presbyterian Men.
 - c. The General Council, in response to a communication from Paul Napier, Stated Clerk of Synod of the Covenant, announcing a proposed synod medical and health insurance plan for non-professional employees and asking that information be obtained either by Presbytery or directly by Synod, granted permission to "Insured Plans Administrators" to send any information about the proposed medical and health insurance for non-professional employees within the Synod directly to the churches within the Presbytery.
 - d. The General Council, in response to a communication from the Welsh Detroit Society, stating that it has been chartered by the Michigan Department of Commerce, and requesting that the remaining balance from the Welsh Presbyterian Church be turned over to the Welsh Detroit Society in conformity with Presbytery action, May 28, 1974, authorized disbursement of the balance (\$3,396.37).
 - e. The General Council accepted the resignation of Betty Brunelle from the Committee on National Missions (Class of 1975) and referred the vacancy to the Committee on Nominations.
 - f. The General Council referred to the Committee on Ministerial Relations a communication from Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary, announcing that Dr. C. Ellis Nelson has taken office as President and asking that he be invited to speak to Presbytery, primarily about how Louisville can provide continuing education opportunities; and requested the Secretary to provide Dr. Ellis with information on the meeting schedule of Presbytery.
 - g. The General Council approved the Treasurer's Statement of Financial Condition and 1974 Unified Budget for the period ending September 30, 1974.
 - h. The General Council authorized the Stated Clerk to make available at Presbytery the book "John Montieth and Detroit Presbyterianism" by Harold Fredsell with a suggested contribution of \$1.00.
 - i. The General Council, in light of a scheduled \$100 price increase effective October 9, 1974, authorized immediate purchase for the Presbytery of Detroit of a new Pitney-Bowes Model 5600 Automatic Mailing Machine, using Presbytery reserve money pending negotiation of Equipment Reserve with Synod.

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THE COMMITTEE ON RELIGION AND RACE reported through The Rev. Richard A. Dempsey, who introduced Mrs. Viola Walker, of Family Neighborhood Services of River Rouge, who reported on a summer youth program conducted jointly between Family Neighborhood Services and Presbytery's Committee on Religion and Race. Partly funded by Presbytery, the program was directed to junior high school students who had been in a monoracial school situation in River Rouge through the seventh grade and were moving into an integrated high school for grades eight through twelve. The program was designed to reach both the youth and their parents and involved a total of fifty families.


Upon motion, Presbytery adjourned at 9:06 p.m. with prayer and the benediction by the Moderator, The Rev. L. J. Peterson.



The moderator shall ask the candidate to answer the following questions:

- 1. Do you trust in Jesus Christ your Savior, acknowledge him Lord of the world and Head of the Church, and through him believe in one God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit?
- 2. Do you accept the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be, by the Holy Spirit, the unique and authoritative witness to Jesus Christ in the Church universal, and God's word to you?
- 3. Will you be instructed by the Confessions of our Church, and led by them as you lead the people of God?
- 4. Will you be a minister of the word in obedience to Jesus Christ, under the authority of Scripture, and continually guided by our Confessions?
- 5. Do you endorse our Church's government, and will you honor its discipline? Will you be a friend among your comrades in ministry, working with them, subject to the ordering of God's word and Spirit?
- 6. Will you govern the way you live, by following the Lord Jesus Christ, loving neighbors, and working for the reconciliation of the world?
- 7. Will you seek to serve the people with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love?
- 8. Will you be a faithful minister, proclaiming the Good News in word and sacrament, teaching faith, and caring for people? Will you be active in government and discipline, serving in courts of the Church, and in your ministry, will you try to show the love and justice of Jesus Christ?

ORDINATION OBLIGATIONS

The presbytery shall cause to be transcribed, at some convenient place in its records, the obligations required of ministers at their ordination, in the following form, namely: "I do sincerely receive and subscribe to the above obligation as a just and true exhibition of my faith and principles, and do resolve and promise to exercise my ministry in conformity thereunto."

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ORDINATION OBLIGATION

In this ordination The United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America. as an act of the holy catholic Church and worshiping the one God who is Father. Son, and Holy Spirit, affirms its belief in the gospel of the sovereign grace and love of God. Through Jesus Christ, his only Son our Lord. incarnate. crucified, and risen, God freely offers to all men forgiveness of sins, renewal by the Holy Spirit, and eternal life. He calls them to labor and to witness and to pray in the fellowship of faith for the coming of his Kingdom throughout the world. In response to his call the Church now confesses that Jesus Christ, the Word of God, as the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments witness to him, is the source and norm of faith and life.

This Church, under the authority of the Scriptures, and in the tradition of the one catholic and apostolic Church, is guided especially by the Nicene and Apostles' Creeds, the Scots Confession, the Heidelberg Catechism, the Second Helvetic Confession, the Westminster Confession and Shorter Catechism, the Theological Declaration of Barmen, and the Confession of 1967, and makes such other confessions as are from time to time required by the Holy Spirit.

This Church orders its life according to the Directory of Worship, Form of Government, and Book of Discipline under the Scriptures interpreted in the Church by the guidance of the Holy Spirit. It administers Baptism and the Lord's Supper in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

Knowing these things, and coming of your own commitment to be ordained to the office of the gospel ministry, you will now answer the following questions, namely:

- (1) Do you believe in one God--Father, Son, and Holy Spirit--and do you confess anew the Lord Jesus Christ as your Savior and Lord, and acknowledge him Head over all things to the Church, which is his body?
- (2) Do you accept the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the unique and authoritative witness to Jesus Christ in the Church catholic, and by the Holy Spirit God's word to you?
- (3) Will you perform the duties of a minister of the gospel in obedience to Jesus Christ, under the authority of the Scriptures, and under the continuing instruction and guidance of the confessions of this Church?
- (4) Do you approve the government and discipline of The United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America?
- (5) Do you promise subjection to your brethren in the Lord?
- (6) Have you been induced, as far as you know your own heart, to seek the office of the holy ministry from love of God and a sincere desire to promote his glory in the gospel of his Son?
- (7) Do you promise to be zealous and faithful in studying the Scriptures, the Book of Confessions, and the Book of Order, in maintaining the truths of the gospel, and in furthering the peace, unity, and purity of the Church, whatever persecution or opposition may arise unto you on that account?
- (8) Do you engage to be faithful and diligent in the exercise of all your duties as a Christian and a minister of the gospel, whether personal or relative, private or public; and to endeavor by the grace of God to adorn the profession of the gospel in your manner of life, and to walk with exemplary piety before the flock of which God shall make you overseer? (When installation is held in connection with the service of the ordination, continue with Form of Government, Chapter XX, Sections 12, 13, 14 and 15.)

(9) Do you now undertake the work of a minister without pastoral charge (evangelist, teacher, editor, etc.), and do you promise, in reliance upon God for strength, to be faithful in the discharge of all the duties incumbent upon you as a minister of the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ?

Additional Questions at Installation

In the installation of a minister, candidate, or licentiate, the following questions are to be addressed to him namely:

(1) Are you now willing to take charge of this church as its pastor (to accept the responsibility of associate pastor in this church), agreeably to your declaration in accepting its call?

(2) Do you conscientiously believe and declare, as far as you know your own heart, that, in taking upon you this charge, you are influenced by a sincere desire to promote the glory of God and the good of the Church?

(3) Do you solemnly promise that, by the assistance of the grace of God, you will endeavor faithfully to discharge all the duties of a pastor to this church, and will be careful to maintain a deportment in all respects becoming a minister of the gospel of Christ, agreeably to your ordination engagements?
