The Committee on Bills and Overtures has decided not to recommend early action on Overture A (the property overture) which has been sent down by the 1980 General Assembly. Instead, it plans to present the overture for action by Presbytery at its April meeting. Between now and April the Committee believes that opportunity should be given to Presbytery to study the overture and its background, historical significance and the present issues which surround it. Therefore, the Committee proposed to Council and Council is recommending to Presbytery the following two motions.

1. Upon motion, Presbytery authorized the Moderator to appoint a taskforce to plan and present to the Presbytery a study opportunity which affirms the fundamental and basic principles of United Presbyterian government and discipline as provided by the Book of Order, Chapter V ("Of Church Government").

2. Upon motion, Presbytery approved that when the study opportunity has been scheduled, the Moderator send a pastoral letter to the particular churches, interpreting the actions of the General Assembly with regard to the property issue, encouraging the participation of churches in the study opportunity and recommending to their special attention Blue Book, Part I of the 192nd General Assembly (1980).

Detroit, St. James: Exception--signature of clerk missing p.286. Very good records.

Detroit, St. John's: No exceptions. Excellent records.

East Detroit, Covenant: No exceptions. Excellent records.

Fraser, Peace: No exceptions. Good records, complete, neatly typed.

Grosse Pointe Memorial: No exceptions. Very good minutes and records.

Grosse Pointe Woods: Exceptions -- No annual statistical report. Good records.

Mt. Clemens, First: Exceptions--Time and attendance not recorded at some meetings. No audit report. Very good minutes.

Mt. Clemens, Knox: Exception--Record and Review committee not permitted to review Session

Minutes and Church Register by church. Refusal was communicated to Administrative
Commission on Knox.

Port Huron, First: Exception--Removal of an old house not approved by the Presbytery. (See 62.08, 62.12 Book of Order) Very good minutes.

Port Huron, Lakeshore: No exceptions. Good minutes and records.

Port Huron, Westminster: Exceptions--Church Register being done in pencil; Session minutes unsigned; attendance, prayer at Session meeting p.18 not recorded.

St. Clair Shores, Faith: No exceptions. Very good minutes.

St. Clair Shores, Lake Shore: Exceptions--p.417 no moderator noted; Jefferson house sold and removed from property without permission of Presbytery noted in the Session minutes. (See Book of Order 62.08, 62.12)

Roseville, Erin: Exception--signature of clerk missing 2/13/80. Good records.

Utica, Sterling Heights: No exceptions. Excellent records.

Warren, Celtic Cross: No exceptions. Excellent records.

- Detroit, Westminster: Exceptions--Number receiving Lord's Supper not indicated p.1268; dismissions not noted in Church Register p.1271; adult baptisms not in Church Register p.1279; Session minutes not signed p.1281. Session minutes are well written.
- <u>Detroit, Woodward Avenue</u>: Exceptions--marriage not in Church Register p.317; elders excused and absent omitted p.334,335; number receiving Lord's Supper omitted; elder commissioner not always reported; annual statistical report not included.
- Ferndale, Drayton Avenue: No exceptions. Excellent minutes.
- <u>Highland Park, Park United</u>: Exceptions--Baptisms not placed in Church Register p.277,292.

  Excellent minutes.
- Royal Oak, First: No exceptions. Delightful set of books to review.
- Royal Oak, First United: No exceptions. Excellent.
- Royal Oak, Christ Memorial: Exceptions--Baptism #710 is in Church Register but not in Session minutes; public receptions of new member should be noted in Session minutes; some Session minutes not signed by clerk. Much improved records.
- Session minutes. Most concise and complete set of records.
- Southfield, Korean: Exceptions--No record of Administration of Lord's Supper, pastor's salary review not indicated. The same exceptions were true in 1979. No Church Register was made available for review.
- Warren, First: Excellent records. No exceptions.

- Dearborn, First: No exceptions. Records excellent.
- Dearborn, Dearborn Woods: Exceptions--Church Register roll of deaths not maintained since 9/20/78. Dismissions not recorded in Church Register p.170,173,181,183,205.

- Dearborn, Littlefield Boulevard: No exceptions. Records very well done.
- Detroit, Calvin West: No exceptions. Records well kept.



### OMNIBUS MOTION (Faper B-1)

- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery adopted all items under the Omnibus Motion as follows:

- 1. Meeting on November 17, 1980, the Judicial Commission found the complaint of Jerome Forster, a member of the First United Presbyterian Church of Royal Oak, Michigan, against action of the Session of the First United Presoyterian Church of Royal Oak, Michigan, to be in order according to The Book of Church Discipline, 86.05 paragraph a. and timely according to The Book of Church Discipline, 86.08, Remedial Cases.

Both Complainant and Respondent were given opportunity to file briefs and declined to do so.

Both Complainant and Respondent were given opportunity to appear before the Judicial Commission and declined to do so.

The Judicial Commission met on January 28, 1981 at Westminster Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan and found the action of the Session of the First United Presbyterian Church, Royal Oak, Michigan, of May 12, 1980, to be irregular and contrary to the Directory For Worship, Chapter V, Sec. 20.02 and Chapter VI, Sec. 21.04 and the Form of Government, Chapter XI, Sec. 41.06, and therefore sustains the complaint of Jerome Forster of June 5, 1980. The Judicial Commission, in its reading of The Directory For Worship, 21.04, second paragraph, is convinced that an invitation to the Lord's Supper shall include "all who confess their faith in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior and shall include baptized children who are being nurtured and instructed" and that there is no exclusion provided because of age. This was the unanimous decision of the members of the Judicial Commission present on that evening.

The Judicial Commission further directs the Session of the First United Presbyterian Church of Royal Oak, Michigan to rescind its action of May 12, 1980, that children seeking admittance to the Lord's Supper should be in the sixth grade.

Absent and not voting in the decision of the Judicial Commission of the Presbytery of Detroit were the Rev. Ralph C. Stribe, Jr. and the Rev. E. Dickson Forsyth.

THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSION ON THE LIVOMIA, WARD UNITED PRESENTERIAN CHURCH reported through The Rev. Faul H. Sutton, chairperson (Paper E-1) Upon motion, Presbytery took the following actions:

- A. Dissolve the Ward United Presbyterian Church effective February 24, 1981 per 42:08 of the Book of Order.
  - B. Receive the properties and assets of the Ward United Presbyterian Church and direct the Trustees of the Presbytery of Detroit to arrange for their transfer to the Ward Presbyterian Church of Livonia, Michigan (check correct title) subject to the conditions described in Section C immediately below.
  - C. That the Presbytery of Detroit agree to receive on behalf of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. the sum of \$550,000 payable during years 1981, 1982, 1983, 1984 and 1985 in accordance with the agreement at the end of this report.
  - D. That the Presbytery instruct its legal counsel to arrange for the removal of the Presbytery of Detroit, Inc. from any contingent liability for unpaid mortgages or other financial obligations of either the Ward United Presbyterian Church, the Ward Presbyterian Church of Livonia, or the Trinity Presbyterian Church, Superior Township, Washtenaw County.
  - E. That the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detreit be instructed to notify the membership of the Ward United Presbyterian Church that the congregation has been formally dissolved by the Presbytery effective February 24, 1981 and that the rolls are technically under the oversight of the Presbytery.
  - F. That the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit be empewered to grant letters of transfer for the former members of the Ward United Presbyterian Church to other United Presbyterian congregations or bodies in correspondence with this Church, and that at a point twelve months from the dissolution of the Ward United Presbyterian Church the Clerk delete from Presbytery's roll the names of persons who have notso acted.

- G. That during years 3 and 5 of the life of this proposal, Presbytery's Council initiate conversations with Ward about the possibility of the church petitioning the judicatory to once again become a United Presbyterian congregation.
- H. That Presbytery's Council, through the office of the Treasurer, monitor the payments from Ward to the Presbytery and other United Presbyterian Judicatories, and take appropriate action in the event of default.

This administrative commission was formed by the Presbytery of Detroit at its meeting of January 27, 1981, for the purpose of determining if Central Northwest Church is "affected with disorder", and to determine if its Session is able to "manage wisely the affairs of its church".

To these ends, this commission has met three times, one of which was designed to meet with the Session of Central Northwest Church. The Session did not appear at the meeting convened for them.

To date, there has been no face to face meeting with any representative of Central Northwest Church. In various phone conversations with the Clerk of Session, Mr. Charles Talbot, the only agenda that was open for discussion is the withdrawal from the denomination.

This Commission therefore finds that:

Central Northwest United Presbyterian Church is "affected with disorder" in that:

- 1. At a meeting of its corporation on January 19, 1981, it voted to "withdraw its affiliation with the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, effective immediately".
- 2. This action of the corporation is in violation of the principles of this denomination and our Constitution, which make no provision for withdrawing from affiliation in this way.
- 3. The Session of Central Northwest Church is meeting without the presence of the Moderator appointed by the Presbytery of Detroit.

The Session of Central Northwest United Presbyterian Church has not "managed wisely the affairs of its church" in that:

- 1. It has not made adequate use of the procedures and rescurces available to them to assist in resolution of problems they have with various positions and actions of this denomination and this presbytery.
- It has refused to make provision for the discussion of these problems with this Commission.

Therefore this Commission makes the following motions:

- 1. That the Presbytery of Detroit remove the Session of Central Northwest United Presbyterian Church.
- 2. That the Presbytery of Detroit replace the Session of Central Northwest United Presbyterian Church with a Commission.
- 3. That this commission have the following powers:
  - (1) To dissolve the Congregation of Central Northwest United Presbyterian Church if it demonstrates itself to have become extinct.
  - (2) If this Commission chooses to dissolve the Congregation of Central Northwest United Presbyterian Church, to make provision for the continuing pastoral care of those who remain loyal to the United Presbyterian Church.
  - (3) To negotiate a property settlement with the members of the extinct congregation at that location, or any other party, in accordance with the guidelines set forth by the General Assembly, which will be submitted to the Presbytery for final approval.
  - (4) To supply the pulpit.
  - (5) If deemed necessary, to seek legal counsel and institute legal proceedings in support of the powers given by this Presbytery.
  - (6) To incur expenses for carrying out the responsibilities of this Commission.
  - (7) Any other powers as may be essential for this Commission to carry out Responsibilities.
- 4. That the current Administrative Commission be dissolved, and that another Administrative Commission be established to carry out the responsibilities outlined above. We recommend that the following people be appointed as members of this Commission with a quorum of 5:

## I. Background

On June 23, 1980 the congregation of Ward United Presbyterian Church was convened by its Session to vote on a proposal to "Dissociate itself from the United Presbyterian Church U.S.A.". The proposal, which bore the endorsement of the 4 pastors, was approved by a vote of 2,133 to 5. It was an act both unilateral and decisive.

On June 24th, Presbytery elected an administrative commission to investigate the matter and make recommendations to the presbytery regarding the session's ability and willingness to manage wisely the affairs of the church, and the future status of the pastors. On June 30th, 1980 that commission reported to the presbytery. It was recommended that the session be replaced by a commission of the presbytery empowered to administer the affairs of the church. The 4 pastors of Ward United renounced the jurisdiction of the Denomination at that time, and were erased from presbytery's rolls. Presbytery had found the church to be "affected with disorder".

The present administrative commission, vested with the powers of the session, was elected by the Presbytery of Detroit and began its work immediately. The Rev. Richard Milford resigned as of January 1, 1981 because he became Chairperson of Ministerial Relations. The Commission has concluded its work, therefore, with 7 members.

## II. Process

The Commission chose to establish positive rapport and communication with the leadership of the church "attempting to withdraw". The Commission, acted to grant the former session of Ward Church permission to administer the church's affairs on the commission's behalf for 90 days. This permission was later renewed.

The Commission established a "cooling off period" during which conversation between the two groups could take place. The Commission requested the rolls, records and minutes of the church. The Commission requested a joint meeting with the former session. These requests were denied. The Commission attempted to contact the membership of the congregation to determine whether there was a loyal remnant interested in a future life in the United Presbyterian Church. Using the newspaper to invite the congregation, the Commission held a consultation at Village United Presbyterian Church on September 29th. No loyal remnant appeared.

In consort with 3 other administrative commissions of the Presbytery, this commission developed and adopted a strategy paper which it used in its dealings with Ward Church. This paper was presented to the Presbytery for information on September 23, 1980. This commission adopted it and has functioned within the areas it describes. The Commission has functioned in the following manner:

(1) The Commission attempted to affect reconciliation between Ward Church and the Presbytery. The Commission consulted with Ward's leaders to determine the changes needed in the Denomination to effect reconciliation. Papers were shared, and joint meetings were held to explore the possibility of reconciliation. At the close of 1980 the prospects of reconciliation seemed distant. It was recognized that the changes would require actions by General Assembly over several years, and that the thought of keeping the church's future unresolved was not acceptable. It was agreed that reconciliation is still to be pursued. The proposal not presented to the Presbytery provides for a re-examination of Ward's status at least twice in the next 5 years.

- (2) The Commission suggested the Ward Church reconsider its June 23, 1980 action and instead, petition the Presbytery of Detroit to transfer to another denomination in correspondence with the United Presbyteryian General Assembly. The Commission failed to achieve this objective.
  - (3) Beginning on January 9, 1981, the Commission and representatives of Ward Church began to discuss ways in which Presbytery could deal with the issue of property enabling the members of Ward to withdraw from the United Presbyterian Church. This proposal presented to the Presbytery of Detroit on January 27, 1981 is the result of those deliberations.

# III. Objectives

In presenting its final recommendations to the Presbytery of Detroit, the Commission maintained and worked within the following goals and objectives.

- (A) <u>Compassion and a continued commitment to reconciliation</u> beyond the point of legal termination of presbytery's relationship with Ward United Church.
  - The Commission's objective was to complete the process without a public expose
    of intra-United Presbyterian conflict. We planned a process and achieved an
    outcome designed to avoid charges and counter-charges in the public media.
  - 2. It was the Commission's objective to avoid any effort to move the matter into civil court. To that end we worked to avoid the involvement of our attorney, George Bushnell, in direct dealings with Ward. We did have Mr. Bushnell review our work periodically.
- (B) <u>Legality and a solution within both the letter and spirit of the constitution</u> of the United Presbyterian Church U.S.A.
  - 1. It was our goal obligation to exercise the presbytery's powers as the session of Ward Church, and provide shelter and pastoral care for the church's members. Our attempts to do so, particularly through the consultation of September 29, 1980 have led us to conclude that there is no constituency in the membership of Ward United Church interesting in availing itself of that shelter and oversight. At Ward we perceive there is no visible "loyal remnant".
  - 2. It was our obligation to safeguard the assets of Ward United Presbyterian Church for the future use of United Presbyterian judicatories. The Commission worked to secure "adequate compensation" for the transfer of the Ward United Presbyterian Church properties to the continuing group. In this proposal presented to the Presbytery for first reading January 27, 1981, the Commission is convinced that Presbytery is receiving as much of a "fair market value" settlement as it could possibly expect.
  - 3. It is our objective to present a solution that is legally binding upon the subject parties. To this end the settlement will be accomplished through the preparation and execution of legal documents accoptable to the legal counsel of the Commission, which provide for:
    - (a) An orderly transfer of the properties to the new congregation no longer related to the Presbytery of Detroit.
    - (b) A legally binding document which assures the Presbytery proper access to the funds agreed to in the financial settlement.

(c) A legal agreement with the lending institutions which provided mortgage funding for the construction of the Ward Church which releases the Presbytery of Detroit from any contingent liability for their payment.

- B. Receive the properties and assets of the Ward United Presbyterian Church and direct the Trustees of the Presbytery of Detroit to arrange for their transfer to the Ward Presbyterian Church of Livonia, Michigan (check correct title) subject to the conditions described in Section C immediately below.
- C. That the Presbytery of Detroit agree to receive on behalf of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. the sum of \$550,000 payable during years 1981, 1982, 1983, 1984 and 1985 in accordance with the agreement at the end of this report.
- D. That the Presbytery instruct its legal counsel to arrange for the removal of the Presbytery of Detroit, Inc. from any contingent liability for unpaid mortgages or other financial obligations of either the Ward United Presbyterian Church, the Ward Presbyterian Church of Livonia, or the Trinity Presbyterian Church, Superior Township, Washtenaw County.
- E. That the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit be instructed to notify the membership of the Ward United Presbyterian Church that the congregation has been formally dissolved by the Presbytery effective February 24, 1981 and that the rolls are technically under the oversight of the Presbytery.
- F. That the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit be empowered to grant letters of transfer for the former members of the Ward United Presbyterian Church to other United Presbyterian congregations or bodies in correspondence with this Church, and that at a point twelve months from the dissolution of the Ward United Presbyterian Church the Clerk delete from Presbytery's roll the names of persons who have notso acted.
- G. That during years 3 and 5 of the life of this proposal, Presbytery's Council initiate conversations with Ward about the possibility of the church petitioning the judicatory to once again become a United Presbyterian congregation.
- H. That Presbytery's Council, through the office of the Treasurer, monitor the payments from Ward to the Presbytery and other United Presbyterian Judicatories, and take appropriate action in the event of default.



THIS AGREEMENT, Made and entered into on this \_\_\_\_\_ day of January, 1981, by and between PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT, UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, whose address is 17575 Hubbell, Detroit, Michigan 48235, sometimes hereinafter referred to as "Presbytery", and WARD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF LIVONIA, A MICHIGAN ECCLESIASTICAL CORPORATION, whose address is 17000 Farmington Road, Livonia, Michigan 48154, sometimes hereinafter referred to as "Ward".

WHEREAS, WARD has by a vote of its membership withdrawn its affiliation with the UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF .

AMERICA, and

WHEREAS, the PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT has asserted that the assets of WARD are by implication held by WARD in trust for the use and purposes of the UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, and

WHEREAS, the parties wish by this instrument to resolve all claims which either party hereto may have against the opposing party, now, therefore,

In consideration of the mutual promises and covenants herein contained, it is agreed by and between the parties as follows:

1. PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT, UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, hereby relinquishes, releases and disclaims any interest which it may have or which it may ever have had, in and to the assets, both real and personal, of WARD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF LIVONIA, a Michigan Ecclesiastical Corporation, and of TRINITY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, a Michigan Ecclesiastical Corporation, including, but not by way of limitation:

A parcel of land which is part of the northwest ½ of the northwest ½ of Section 15, T1S, R9E, City of Livonia, Wayne County, Michigan, described as: Commencing at the northwest corner of Section 15 (iron pipe sunk in pavement), thence running easterly along northline of Section 15 (centerline of Six Mile Road), north 89°53'55" east 580.40 feet (crosscut in pavement), thence running southerly on a line parallel with the westline of Section 15, south 0°11'33" east 751.0 feet (iron stake set), thence running westerly on a line parallel with the northline of Section 15, south 89°

53'55" west, 580.40 feet to the westline of Section 15 (crosscut in pavement), thence running northerly along the westline of Section 15 (centerline of Farmington Road), north 0'11'33" west, 751.0 feet to the place of beginning, excepting the southerly 30 feet of said parcel and excepting therefrom other lands heretofore taken or conveyed for highway purposes.

Situated in the Township of Superior, Washtenaw County, Michigan, beginning at the northwest corner of Section, thence 89°34'30" east 630.61 feet in northline of Section, thence south 1°03'53" west 2440.39 feet to point in northerly R.O.W. line of Highway M-14, thence southerly in northerly R.O.W. line of Highway M-14, to a point in westline of section, thence northerly in westline of Section to place of beginning, being part of the west ½ of Section 1, T2S, R7E, containing 39.77 acres.

2. That WARD shall pay the following benevolences in accordance with the following schedule:

- A. WARD may in any year designate additional monies to

  GENERAL ASSEMBLY BUDGETED PROJECTS, but if so, such monies shall be subtracted

  from the amounts designated for UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CAUSES. In no event shall
  the amounts as shown for the PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT or the GENERAL ASSEMBLY

  BUDGET be less than as shown on the above schedule.
- B. The particular persons and/or projects designated by WARD within the GENERAL ASSEMBLY MISSION BUDGET and UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CAUSES accounts shall be the same persons and/or projects designated by WARD in year 1980, although the amounts may differ.
- C. Any changes in designations by WARD Church from one project to another within the designated missionaries and projects within the GENERAL ASSEMBLY BUDGET or designated UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CAUSES during the five (5)

year period, shall be done through a consultation process with the PRESBYTERY in determing the validity of the new project to which funds are designated.

- D. The monies above designated for the PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT shall be used by PRESBYTERY for new church development and for church redevelopment in accordance with its mission priorities.
- 3. Upon payment of all monies set forth in Paragraph 2 above, WARD may, but shall not in any manner be required to, pay any further benevolences to or for the use of the PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT or the UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.
- 4. Payments of benevolences shall be made by WARD in each year in approximately three (3) equal installments in accordance with its current benevolence practice.
- 5. WARD shall provide receipts or evidence of payment for all benevolences under this agreement which are not paid directly to PRESBYTERY. PRESBYTERY or its agents may inspect the books and records of WARD at any reasonable time to verify the compliance of WARD with this agreement.
- 6. WARD (add additional titles as desired) warrants that it has made no representations in connection with any real estate or personal property transactions of any kind, whether in cash, credit or both, that the PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT is a party to any such transaction, or stands behind WARD's part in any such transaction as a guarantor, indemnifier, secondarily liable party or in any way formally or informally obliged or willing to satisfy WARD'S obligation in any such transaction. In the event of breach of this warranty, WARD shall fully indemnify the PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT for all liabilities, costs, expenses and legal fees incurred thereby.
- 7. This agreement is intended to be a full and final settlement and release of all claims whatsoever between the parties hereto. This agreement is being executed in recordable form and it is understood by both parties that WARD may at its option record this agreement.

Appendix 4: Property appraisal. The Commission authorized an appraisal to be made by Mr. Richard Messier of Real Estate One. Mr. Messier works with commercial real estate, specializes in churches, and has handled a number of property dispositions and acquisitions on behalf of the Presbytery.

## I. Types of Appraisals:

There are several types of appraisals.

- A. Replacement Value: An appraiser can examine the square footage of a particular building and the type of construction, and can determine what the structure would cost if it were built now. This is the kind of appraisal used in determining how much fire insurance to carry.
- B. <u>Depreciated Replacement Value</u>: From the replacement value of the building, a method is used to calculate the effect of wear and tear and time upon the value of the property.
  - 1. A professional appraisal to determine depreciated replacement value is an extensive and costly proposition. For example, a careful study is made of the heating plant to compare it to modern units, to determine how efficient it is, and how long it is likely to last without major repair or replacement. The results of such an appraisal would be needed in the event the title to a property were contested and "fair market value" had to be determined through arbitration or in court.
  - 2. A professional appraisal estimate will determine the approximate depreciated fair market value of a property. It is less extensive, and therefore less costly. It is useful in determining the price at which a property should be listed for sale, or in the process of negotiation in other than a court setting.

Comparable Sales: An appraiser can study real estate transactions and determine how similar properties in similar locations have sold in recent months. This is particularly useful with residential properties, in neighborhoods where a large number of houses have sold recently. The expected sale price can be estimated on the basis of what has actually happened recently with similar properties. This kind of appriasal is valuable to a party who wants to know what can actually be expected from the sale of a property. It answers the question: "What are we likely to get it for?"

# II. The Ward Appraisal

The Administrative Commission authorized the conducting of an informal appraisal that would determine depreciated replacement value. (B-2 above) In conducting the appraisal, Mr. Messier also presented an estimate of what the property would bring if listed on the open market, an analysis of comparable sales (C above).

Results of the appraisals are as follows:

Ward property at 6 Mile and Farmington Road contains 7.89 acres. As it is currently zoned it is worth \$25,000 per acre or approximately \$200,000. If it were re-zoned for a shopping center (a likely possibility in that area, the land with no buildings on it would be worth \$50,000 per acre, with a total land value of \$400,000).

The buildings total 82,000 Sq. Ft. depreciated replacement value was estimated at \$55.00 per square foot, with a value for the buildings at \$4,510,000.

Thus it is estimated that in a legal arbitration the value of the Farmington Road Ward properites would be set at \$4,710,000.

On the basis of comparable sales, it is estimated that on the open market in 1981 the Ward properties would bring approximately \$1,500,000. Mr. Messier is in commercial real estate and he specializes in the purchase and sale of church properties. He is currently the broker for Bushnell Congregational Church on the Southfield Expressway which is currently for sale. His estimate is made on the basis of knowledge of who the potential church buyers in the Detroit area are, the economic capacity of those buyers to purchase a church, and the saleability of Ward Livonia as a church.

## III. The Washtenaw County Property

On September 26, 1978 the Presbytery of Detroit authorized the purchase of approximately 40 acres of property on the Northeast corner of Plymouth-Ann Arbor Road and Gotfredson Road in Superior Township, Washtenaw County. The purchase price was \$300,000. It can be conservatively estimated that it is worth now what it was when purchased.

On or about June 29, 1980 there were two corporations formed, one called Trinity Presbyterian Church. It was organized as an independent church entity. It had been a new church development staffed by Ward United on behalf of the Local Church Development Department of the Presbytery. The second corporation, called Christian Communication, Inc. was also created at the same time. Ward United deeded approximately 5 acres of the subject property to Trinity, 35 acres to Christian Communications, Inc.

The administrative commission, in considering the value of Ward Church properties, has taken the Washtenaw County real estate into account. It was purchased with the permission of the Presbytery as a part of a collaborative strategy, and it was owned by Ward United at the time their congregation voted to withdraw from the United Presbyterian Church.

## Conclusion:

There are two ways in which "fair market value" can be estimated for Ward United Presbyterian Church.

1. Depreciated Fair Market Value:

At present there are outstanding loans on the Livonia property of approximately \$1,100,000.

The Administrative Commission has no information about indebtedness on the Washtenaw County property.

4. Minimum Fair Market Value was calculated by subtracting the \$1,100,000 indebtedness from the \$1,800,000 above.



Motion to ask Paul Sutton to invite Mr. Bushnell to the November 24 luncheon for Commission chairpersons.

Proposed Goals for Administrative Commissions, Presbytery of Detroit dealing with churches "attempting to withdraw".

#### Introduction

In dealing with the churches of the Presbytery of Detroit which have attempted to withdraw, the Administrative Commissions are challenged to look at the following goals proposed by a consultation of the chairpersons of the four commissions.

An over-arching goal of all commissions shall be to carry out their responsibilities in such a way that "re-union" with the Presbytery could be accomplished in the future without rancor, unnecessary hurt, and with graciousness. It is entirely possible that changes within the United Presbyterian Church could precipitate a move back on the part of one, or all of the congregations. We should hold the door open to this possibility in whatever way is possible, within the framework of the constitution of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.

The continuing assumption during all negotiations shall be the sharing of concrete evidence of good faith on all sides.

The basic aim of the Presbytery in the negotiation process is to function, within the Book of Order of the United Presbyterian Church. It is Presbytery's responsibility to assure that the denomination can face its future with adequate resources to do its task.

#### I. Reconciliation

The first priority of the Administrative Commissions would be to pursue the course of reconciliation with the Presbytery and the denomination.

- a) The Commissions shall determine if the action of the church is considered revocable.
- b) The Commissions shall determine what changes either in the Presbytery or actions of the General Assembly would be helpful. What assurances would be needed in order for reconciliation to be considered.
- c) To determine what time frame would be acceptable to the congregation or session of congregation attempting to withdraw in order to pursue the goal of reconciliation.

#### II. Transfer to another Denomination

The second priority for each congregation would be to pursue with them the possibilities of transfer to another denomination within the reformed tradition and in correspondence with U.P.C. U.S.A. General Assembly. This could be accomplished with an orderly transfer of property, credentials, etc. Alternatives for consideration:

- 1. Presbyterian Church, U.S.
- 2. Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church
- 3. Reformed Church in America

It should be noted that all congregation have appointed committees to study the question of alternative affiliation. The commissions should encourage this and seek to facilitate in whatever ways seem appropriate.

## III. Dealing with Total Withdrawal

In the event that the first two goals are not achieved, the third alternative involves the congregation's total withdrawal from the Denomination. In such an event there are two issues with which the presbytery must contend:

a) The loyal remnant. Persons who wish to remain in the United Presbyterian Church should be helped to do so. The congregation as a whole should be made aware of the Presbytery's interest in them, its willingness to provide shelter, nurture and effective congregational life, and its commitment to listen to them in developing a strategy.

From the ranks of the total group, the remnant would be consulted and helped to make a choice from among options like the following:

- 1. continuing as the original congregation
- 2. becoming a new church development of the Presbytery
- 3. joining another congregation in the Presbytery en masse
- b) The property. Following a process of securing appraisals and determining the fair market value of properties, the parties involved should reach an agreement.
- 1. to sell the property to a new congregational entity (the dissident group)
- 2. to lease the property to the same group
- 3. to use those resources toward expansion of United Presbyterian Ministry in the wider community.

In dealing with such a matter the presbytery should consider the amount of debt outstanding on the property, the time the congregation has been in the Presbytery, and the congregation's ability to purchase the property.

- c) Presbytery will need the approval of the next General Assembly for any transfer of property for less than real value, however, this does not imply that G.A. expects Presbytery to negotiate real value.
- IV. When bargaining in good faith has failed.

In the event that leaders of the church in question fail to meet with Presbytery's administrative commission or fail to resolve the issues outlined in III above, the commission shall institute proceedings within the civil legal system.

- a) the commission shall retain legal counsel to secure records, rolls and books.
- b) the commission shall retain legal counsel to attain operational access and legal title to the buildings and properties of the subject church.
- c) the commission shall consult appropriate agencies of the presbytery in determining what disposition or use should be made of the buildings and properties.
- Presbytery's council
- 2. The Division of Business Affairs
- 3. The Department of Local Church Development
- 4. Session of U.P. congregations in the vicinity of the church in question.

#### REFLECTION PAPER

What did we learn from our meeting with Ward people on October 7th? They described three "precipitating factors" which arose from their observations of the 1980 General Assembly. These are the immediate matters about which they would seek change in pursuing reconciliation:

- 1. They seek change in <u>Book of Order 47:01</u> which would turn the "fair representation of women and minorities" provision from mandatory to permissive language. Rather than to say there <u>shall</u> be fair representation they seek a word like "ought" or "should".
- 2. They want safeguards which tighten the creedal subscription process eliminating the possibility of an action like that taken by National Capital Union Presbytery in enrolling Mansfield Kaseman. Perhaps we are talking about an overture which changes 47:071, the paragraph containing the ordination/installation question on the Lordship of Christ.

In this connection they would also probably seek a change in the behavior and attitudes of the Stated Clerk of General Assembly. They object to Dr. Thompson's ruling on the Kaseman issue, accusing General Assembly (Thompson) of being unkind or unfeeling toward conservatives.

3. They seek the defeat of Overture A (1980) on the conservation of church property. They do not want clarification of the property issue which states more explicitly that Presbytery assumes ownership of the properties of extinct or disaffected congregations.

They also said there are predisposing factors behind the immediate events of 1980. These are matters of longstanding and broader scope. In affecting reconciliation these "background issues" may be more difficult to resolve.

1. Behind the 47:01 "fair representation" issue is the matter of <u>freedom</u>. The same freedom issue is behind their problem with Overture A (1980). They seem to consider themselves more of a congregational church than most congregations within the Presbyterian tradition. To them Presbytery may really be a federation of congregations. They seek a Presbytery which has minimum powers to intervene in the lives of its churches.

Thus 47:01 is seen as interfering in the election process, and Overture A (1980) is seen as interfering in the church's decisions to purchase, use and dispose of property. Ward's process of starting "Trinity Chapel", their new church development in Washtenaw County, is illustrative of this independent style. Most congregations would call Presbytery's attention to new church possibilities, and would pledge financial support as a project developed. Ward, on the other hand, started such a project through their own research, with their own staff and financial resources, seeking Presbytery's concurrence in their strategy.

2. Behind the National Capital Union Presbytery/Mansfield Kaseman issue is the matter of <u>style</u>. Style refers to what Church people do, how they do it, and the language people use in expressing their faith. Style refers to the ethos or personality of a congregation or judicatory. On October 7th there were several expressions from Ward people expressing displeasure over the style of ministry they see elsewhere in the United Presbyterian Church. They claim that the diversity of the church has spread more among liberals than among conservatives. As they see it there has been a broadening of the "left" and a constriction of the "right".

Their problem with Kaseman is more with style than content. Their difficulty with him stems from his use of language, for he does not speak in traditional terms. He does not repeat the traditional formula about Jesus. His referral to Jesus as "the God-man" is not a denial of the lordship of Jesus. It is a contemporary way of describing the Christological paradox that Jesus is fully both God and human. It is the way he said it that constitutes the problem.

The Ward style is traditional, and in some instances moralistic. For example, a poster advertising a program at their singles' group indicates the ultimate objective for the formerly married is to have them safely remarried. In other United Presbyterian churches the agenda for singles might be to help them enjoy being single.

The style problem came out in the October 7th conversation when they said they have been quick to point out to interested parties that they are not a "typical Presbyterian Church".

In the Ward phenomenon the freedom and style issues clash. While they seek freedom for themselves, they find other people's freedom embarrassing. They do not use freedom as a universal principle. They want "liberal" causes disavowed in the United Presbyterian Church, or at least carefully analyzed, while free to pursue their brand of conservative Christianity as they see fit. The Constitution should, for example, protect the freedom of a congregation to elect persons to its boards, even though the church discriminates against women in the process, yet the Constitution should not serve to protect the rights of women themselves to make certain decisions with respect to their own lives.

Thus, the issues of freedom and style are in tension. Freedom is called for to protect a particular style of ministry, but it is not universally applied in respect for other styles.

3. Finally, there is the issue of <u>change</u>. Ward people did not mention it as obviously, but it is the principle that unifies the inconsistency above. In Toffler's <u>Future Shock</u> the term "island of stability" is used to describe a part of life that stays the same while we cope with change in other areas. To Ward people the church is seen as an island of stability, a place which does not change. The church is a link with the past, a place of familiarity amid rapid changes elsewhere. Thus the Church is "the same, yesterday, today and forever".

To many others in the Denomination the Faith leads people to be agents of change. The call to follow Christ is seen, among other things, as a call to change the world to embody more compassion, more justice, less violence. Thus many United Presbyterians have been involved over the last several decades in the civil rights movement, the peace movement, and the women's liberation movement.

The issue that seems to separate Ward from the rest of the Church is change itself, change in general. It does not matter what is being changed. Change is seen as a problem because of the basic role the Church is seen to play. If the Faith is a source of stability, change is wrong. If the Faith is viewed as a model for a society, change is necessary. This appears to be the heart of the clash between Ward and the rest of the Church. Thus freedom is called for in maintaining stability while controls are sought to deal with change.


What, then, does the Presbytery of Detroit do to affect reconciliation? With regard to the precipitating factors there are several immediate things that could be done over 2-3 years:

- 1. An overture could be written to change the text of <u>Book of Order</u> 47:01. Presbytery could confer with the Committee on Women and those of the Ward pursuasion to arrive at a new 47:01 text which protects freedom on the one hand, rights of women in the church on the other. The objective would be to write 47:01 in permissive language without retrenchment on womens' issues and their empowerment in the functioning of the Church.
- 2. Change could be affected through an overture modifying 47:071, the ordination and installation question that deals with the Church's faith in Jesus. A new 47:071 could be drafted which satisfies conservatives on the Christological question within the confessional standards of the Denomination.
- 3. Presbytery could both campaign to defeat the present Overture A (1980) and at the same time propose a new overture dealing with the same issue. Implications are far-reaching enough that wide-spread collaboration would need to occur on the text of a new overture, for we ARE a Presbyterian Church. We are obligated to safeguard our future with sufficient resources to do mission. Giving churches away does not help us achieve that objective. A product is needed, therefore, which assures the continuation of a connectional Denomination on the one hand, freedom to develop a particular program and style in each congregation on the other.

It may be more difficult to handle the underlying issues.

- 1. Freedom is a two-way street and at present Ward seems to only want freedom selectively applied. Our good faith negotiating should involve a commitment that freedom be a universal principle. Our denominational "umbrella" would have to broaden, with an affirmation of diversity more credible than what we now have. In exchange for freedom on what it wants, Ward would have to express greater tolerance for the freedom of others in the Church.
- 2. Up until the present, the "style" issue has taken care of itself. Ward has been free to be Ward. The congregation would have to be satisfied that resolution of the precipitating factors would assure them the freedom to develop and amintain their style of ministry within the diverse unity of the United Presbyterian Church. They could tell prospective members they are different, and indeed be different. Presbytery would have to assure them an appropriate role in judicatory decision-making, inclusion of ministers and elders on judicatory committees, and judicatory resourcing to help them be what their planning process indicated is valid. They would be assured a "place in the sun" provided they recognize others with their "place in the sun".

3. The change issue is both the most basic, and the most difficult to manage. The Church-wide process of setting mission priorities, under the guidance of the General Assembly Mission Council, would have to be the arena for assessing the Denomination's attitude toward change, and its role as a change agent. We would collaborate in developing new methods for appraising the effect of change, being constructively critical about change, and planning for coordination of changes within the confessional stance of the Denomination. In bringing this to issue the Presbytery and Ward would have to develop a "Theology of Change".



## POSITION PAPER

The congregation of Ward Presbyterian Church has been concerned for some time regarding the kind of pluralism found within the United Presbyterian denomination (UPCUSA). We believe it is good and indeed healthy to have and exchange a variety of ideas found within an historic biblical framework. Our concern has grown with an apparent and increasing socio-cultural perspective at the expense of the propositional truths found in the authoritative written Word of God. These concerns also grow at the realization that the Confessions of the Church are not binding but rather the Book of Order is binding.

Our concerns revolve around the issues of the authority of the Scriptures, the Deity of Jesus of Nazareth, and the freedoms of the local congregation in regard to electing its own leadership and possessing its own property.

Specifically, the UPCUSA must affirm without question or apology the full deity and humanity of Jesus Christ. We believe this basic tenet of the Christian faith should be stated explicitly in the Book of Order.

Secondly, we want to be assured that the UPCUSA has a written affirmation found within its constitution that acknowledges the Holy Scripture to be the infallible written Word of God. In matters of preaching, teaching and practical Christian living, the Bible is the ultimate authority in human language and experience.

Thirdly, the right of God's people to elect their own officers is inalienable. The mandate for compliance of Overture "L" or rather, coercing the local congregation must be stopped. It appears the UPCUSA is forcing organizational unity at the expense of spiritual unity. Overture "L" must not be found within the Book of Order.

Finally, we believe it is the right of the particular church to hold its own property unfettered by civil action of a higher judicatory. The popular understanding of all local church property held "in trust" for the denomination is a falsehood. This cannot be substantiated historically from the beginnings of the UPCUSA. We believe an overture similar to that reported to the Presbytery of Boston on March 24, 1980 be adopted and included within the Book of Order.

#### REFLECTION PAPER II

Possible Overtures to be written as an act of reconciliation.

I. With regard to the "freedom of conscience" issue and women in ordained positions:

What we now have:

B.O. 47:01 "Every congregation shall elect men and women from among its active members, giving fair representation of all ages and of all ethnic minorities of that congregation...in the mode most approved in use and in that congregation..."

B.O. 47:012 "Nominations shall be made by a representative nominating committee of active members of the church, which shall itself include both men and women... nominations by any eligible voter."

## Analysis of what we now have:

In the election process there are five components:

- 1. There shall be men and women elected to the offices of elder, deacon, etc.
- 2. There shall be fair representation of ages and minorities.
- The election process shall be in the mode most approved in the congregation.
- 4. Nominations shall be by a representative nominating committee, itself composed of both men and women.
- 5. There shall be opportunity for nominations from the floor, and in effect the congregation itself makes the choice of its officers at a duly called congregational meeting.

The Denomination has been accused of instituting a "quota system". Examining the text itself, one discovers no quota system exists. The term "fair representation" is not defined in specific terms, and the sentence where "fair representation" appears does not mention women: it mentions age and ethnic minorities. The sentence concludes that electing is to be done in the mode most approved in the congregation; i.e., the congregation is to define "fair representation: in its own terms. They are empowered to exercise freedom of conscience, that is to freely function in defining fair representation and achieving it.

One can question whether anything but a loose interpretation of 47:01 is consistent with 47:012 and 47:013. These latter paragraphs describe the nominating committee, the congregational meeting and the opportunity for nominations from the floor. B.O. 47:01 if interpreted to refer to a "quota system" would be unconstitutional when attempt is made to deal with it in the light of 47:012 and 47:013. A quota system would be inconsistent with the use of the "mode most approved", the task of the nominating committee to nominate, and the safeguard that there can be nominations from the floor.

The problem with 47:01, therefore, is not related to a quota system. There is no quota system, and if anyone asserted that there were, the matter could be resolved and the quota system idea dismissed through a judicial case.

The problem does reside in the first sentence of 47:01 itself, where the word "shall" is used regarding the election of men and women. In order to function with-in the Book of Order, therefore, a church would have to have at least one man and one woman on each of its boards. An all male session, or an all female session for that matter, would be unconstitutional. For most of the churches with which we are dealing this is itself a problem because they believe categorically that women should not assume these offices.

Therefore the disagreement centers about the word "shall". Alternatives available in resolving the impasse:

- 1. Change "shall" to "should" through an overture submitted to the 1981 General Assembly. The remainder of 47:01 ff. need not change.
  - The Women's movement in the Denomination should be consulted about this to determine the kind of effect the change would have elsewhere in the church. Though it is only one word, it is a significant word for many loyal members of United Presbyterian congregations.
- 2. Establish a procedural precedent where a session and a presbytery agree that the congregation establishes an open process its members choose not to use. Thus men and women are considered, nominated, but not elected because of unwillingness to serve. The unwillingness to serve is in effect the "mode most approved" because custom heritage lead women to refuse the office.
  - The minister and session in question would be taking a risk because they would be establishing an "open" system. They are placing the issue in the hands of women who could violate male "conscience" by accepting office. If indeed women accept the idea that it is Un-Biblical to be ordained, the risk would be minimal.
- 3. Institute a juducial process with the aim of having the first clause of 47:01 declared unconstitutional. The session would agree to implement the first clause of 47:01 and instruct the nominating committee to prepare a bi-sexual slate of nominees. (The word "instruct" is purposely chosen here). The nominating committee and/or congregation would receive the session's instructions, responding that it is unable to follow the instructions because it is inconsistent with the "mode most approved and in use in that congregation" and that it violated 47:012 and 47:013 and the provisions for nominating committees and nominations from the floor. (Marlene could be nominated annually, defeated by Herman, nominated from the floor, and the event could recur for at least 20 years). The session would thus communicate with the Presbytery that it refuses to effectually implement 47:01 because of the clash between 47:01 and 47:012 and 47:013. Collaborating with the permanent judicial commission of the Synod, the Presbytery could act to concur in the act of the session not to implement 47:01, with a minority in the Presbytery appealing Presbytery's decision to the Synod. A subsequent appeal of that Synod decision would result in a hearing and decision by the permanent judicial commission of General Assembly.
- II. With regard to the Deity of Jesus and the reception of Mansfield Kaseman et al:

One point of leverage is the ordination/installation question #1 (B.O. 50:121) which currently reads "Do you trust in Jesus Christ your Savior, acknowledging him Lord of the world and Head of the Church, and through him believe in one God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit?" Those with the problem should suggest the new wording. If adopted, such an overture would resolve the issue, as candidates for all ordained offices would have to give affirmative answers to the question.

Another point of entry could be the writing of a new creed. When the <u>Book of Confessions</u> was adopted, and the Confession of 1967 written, part of the rationale was our existence as an emergent church. The date was part of "C-67"'s title partly in order to remind the church of the passing of time and the need in a future generation to write a new creed. Also the concept of a "book of confessions" was to affirm the developmental nature of the Church's creed building. Each generation builds on the insights of previous generations. In adopting the <u>Book of Confessions</u> we were affirming that insights did not cut off in 1640. Therefore it would be legitimate to write the "Confession of 1982" or some appropriately pious title which would be the product of the thinking of persons with-in and departed from the United Presbyterian Church.

Not only could such a document deal with the "Deity/Kaseman" issue but the whole matter of the church facing change, relating to various empowerment and liberation movements, and the authority of Scripture. In effect the Denomination would be saying to its dissidents, "If you dislike what we have become, help us to develop something different".

#### III. With regard to the "Property issue":

What we now have:

B.O. 62:11 and 62:12 state clearly the following:

- A. "When a congregation is dissolved or has become 'extinct'...the property ...shall be held, used and applied for such uses...as the Presbytery may direct..."
- B. "A particular church shall not sell, mortgage or otherwise encumber... property...without the written permission of the Presbytery..."
- C. A church shall likewise not lease its property used for worship purposes, etc. without similar written permission of the Presbytery.

The current <u>Book of Order</u> clearly states that the Presbytery takes over the property if the congregation ceases to function. This is not implied, but quite explicit.

#### What is proposed:

Overture A, 1980 calls for a new chapter on property which takes the above 3 Sections exactly as they are, and inserts them. Added to them is a declaration of principle, and two substantive new paragraphs:

- 1. The first paragraph says that which-ever judicatory technically owns a piece of property, it is held in trust for the "use and benefit of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America".
- 2. The second says that when a "particular church ceases to be used by that church as a particular church of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America...such property shall be held, used, applied, transferred or sold...by the Presbytery".

This last paragraph covers the period between organization and dissolution, the kind of case where a group acts to cease being a "particular church" in our Denomination and decides to become something else.

In our conversations with Ward Church and others we hear the main objections to be:

1. The Presbytery will be able to tell us what to teach. Whomever controls the property controls the theology.

2. Dissident's position will be weakened in any contest with a Presbytery over property if Overture A passes. There is the feeling they are currently free to leave, congregational churches in the practical sense, while they would become connectional and heirarchical in the practical sense if Overture A becomes the law of the Church.


#### Strategy:

The Presbytery can settle the first issue easily, if dissident congregations will listen. The proposed 72:02 and 72:03 must be understood in the light of Chapter XI "Of the Session", particularly 41:06, 41:08, 41:11 and 41:16. These paragraphs explicitly describe the authority of the session in matters of process, style, content and policy in all the affairs of the particular church.

If 41:06ff describes the rights of the Session to run the church, the new 72:02, 03 must be understood in the light of those session powers. If needed a new paragraph could be added to 72:02, 03 explicitly stating that the reversion of property to the judicatory is limited to extinction of the congregation or the previous assumption by a Presbytery of the powers described in 41:15 when a session is "unwilling or unable to manage wisely the affairs of its church".

Overture "A" 1980 can be amended through a new overture which would separate the programmatic aspects of Presbytery oversight from Presbytery's interventions in extreme cases.

The remainder of "Overture A 1980" should remain as written if we wish to remain a connectional church. Of the surface issues brought up by the dissident congregations, the proposed 72:03 is the crux of the matter. It gives the Presbytery the power to perform its task in precisely the kind of situation the churches created in July, 1980 when the sessions proposed to the congregations that they with-draw. The proposed 72:03, therefore, should be considered the central bargaining point in negotiations aimed at reconciliation. The The dissident congregations must consider all of their proposed changes on the premise that 72:03,4, and 5 will be the law of the Church. The Presbyteries, on the other hand, should consider hwether abandonment of 72:03ff is a proper price to pay for reconciliation.

Upon motion, the docket for the meeting was approved with the following changes: deletion of the report of the Committee on Candidates; the report of the Committee on Ministerial Relations was made the order of the day at 7:30. Upon motion, Virginia Marvin was given the privilege of the floor to speak during the report of the Committee on Ministerial Relations.

The Moderator appointed Helen Krynen, ruling elder of the host church, to serve as assistant to the Stated Clerk.

#### Omnibus Motion

Upon motion, the recommendations listed in the Omnibus Motion were adopted as follows:

- 1) It is recommended that Presbytery approve the sale of the manse of the Eastminster Church to Isaac Lawler for \$20,000.00 cash.
- 2) It is recommended that Presbytery grant permission to the First Church, Ypsilanti, to sell a building or to raze it. The circumstances are that the church does not have a need for the building, that it is a liability to the church in terms of cost of taxes, insurance and maintenance, that it is an historic

structure which should be preserved by sale to an interested party, that if such a sale is not possible the church is requesting permission to raze the building. It should be clear that the church is seeking to sell only the building, and that a buyer would agree to remove the building from the land on which it is presently situated.

- 3) It is recommended that a site loan, number 121008, in the amount of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) from the Office of Capital Resources, made to the Geneva Church of Canton, be considered as a grant mortgage, that the Presbytery repay the loan, and that when the present mortgage has been discharged a grant mortgage in the amount of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) be placed on the property of the Geneva Church. The circumstances are that the Division of Business Affairs recommended this action in April, 1978, but that for some reason the recommendation did not come to the floor of Presbytery for action. Further, it is understood that a grant mortgage is one on which there are no payments on principal and there is no interest; and the principal becomes due and payable only when the church ceases to function as a member church of the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.
- 4) It is recommended that the Presbytery approve the consolidation of loans made to the Faith Community Church of Novi, as follows: the consolidation of swing loans in the following amounts: \$19,625.00, \$7,221.00; \$3,260.00, plus accrued interest on the swing loans, plus a new loan in the amount of \$1,875.00, for a total loan of \$31,981.00, plus the accrued interest, this loan to be repaid within eight months from the date of this meeting of Presbytery, at 9% interest. The circumstances are that the construction of the Faith Community Church was completed several months ahead of schedule, requiring swing loans to meet construction costs; the church anticipates being able to repay the consolidated loan from receipts from its building fund and from gifts from the Major Mission Fund.

A motion carried to approve the following recommendation, which was in the Omnibus Motion but which had been removed for discussion: It is recommended that approval be given to the sale of the manse of the Rosedale Gardens Church to the pastor, Gerald Cobleigh, with the following terms: price \$72,000.00; no down payment; balance financed on a land contract, with monthly payments of \$650.00, including principal and annual interest of 7%; if Mr. Cobleigh ceases to be pastor of the Rosedale Gardens Church the balance owing on the land contract shall be due within 30 days and the church shall have the first option of purchasing the manse.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures reported through its chairperson, William Colwell. A motion carried to limit debate to three minutes per speaker.

A motion carried to concur with the recommendation for an affirmative vote on the following Overtures: A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, J, K, L, M, N, O and Q. There were 20 negative votes for Overture A. Dean Baker requested that the record show his negative vote on Overture A.

A motion carried to concur with the recommendation for a negative vote on the following Overtures: P, R, S, T and V.

A motion carried not to concur with the recommendation for an affirmative vote on the Overture from the Presbytery of Southern New England concerning the doubling of minimum representation at General Assembly, providing that it meets biennially.

A motion carried to concur in the Overture from the Presbytery of Wyoming, allowing general councils of presbyteries to be granted authority to approve property transactions.

A motion carried to concur in the Overture from the Presbytery of Wyoming allowing interim pastors laboring within the bounds of another presbytery to moderate the sessions of the churches which they are serving.

A motion carried to take no action on Overtures from the Presbyteries of Eastern Oklahoma and Indian Nations on legal aid; from the Presbytery of Cayuga-Syracuse on the celebration of women in ministry; from the Presbytery of Northern New York on candidates being able to serve communion; and from the Presbytery of Indian Nations on God's claims.

A motion carried to commend the Committee on Bills and Overtures for its diligent work.

The Trenton Administrative Commission reported through its chairperson, William Whitledge. A motion carried to approve the recommendations of the Commission, as follows (Thomas Kirkman requested that the record show his negative vote):

The Trenton Administrative Commission followed a pattern similar to that described by other Administrative Commissions of the Presbytery functioning between June 1980 and the present to manage the interface between the judicatory and congregations attempting to withdraw from the United Presbyterian Church. The Commission attempted to affect reconciliation between the Presbytery and the Trenton Church. When that attempt failed, and it became apparent that the congregation was not interested in transferring to a denomination in correspondence with the General Assembly, the Commission and representatives of the former Session of the Trenton Church began negotiating on the matter of adequate compensation to the Presbytery for the orderly dissolution of the church and the release of the Trenton Church properties.

The following proposal, having been voted by the Commission on March 5, 1981. is hereby presented to the Presbytery of Detroit for a first reading, to be voted at the Stated Meeting April 28, 1981.

## PROPOSAL

- 1. That the Presbytery dissolve the Trenton Presbyterian Church effective April 28, 1981 (Book of Order 42:08).
- That the Presbytery receive the properties of the Trenton Presbyterian Church and arrange for their transfer to the ecclesiastical entity which succeeds the Trenton Presbyterian Church, also known as the Trenton Presbyterian Church, subject to the following conditions:
- That the Presbytery of Detroit agree to receive on behalf of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. the sum of \$77,500.00, to be paid to the Presbytery in a lump sum subsequent to all parties ratification of this agreement.
- That the Presbytery instruct its legal counsel to arrange for the removal of the Presbytery of Detroit, Inc. and the United Presbyterian Church U.S.A., a corporation, from any contingent liability for any unpaid mortgages, Declarations of Trust or other financial obligations of the Trenton Presbyterian Church.
- That the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit be instructed to notify the membership of the Trenton Presbyterian Church that the congregation has been formally dissolved by the Presbytery, effective April 28, 1981, and that the rolls are technically under the oversight of the Presbytery.
- That the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit be empowered to grant letters of transfer for the former members of the Trenton Church to other United Presbyterian congregations, or bodies in correspondence with the General Assembly, and that at a point twelve months from the ratification of this agreement the Clerk delete from the rolls of the Presbytery the names of all persons who have not so acted.
- That the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit communicate with the Stated Clerk of General Assembly that this agreement in effect sells the Trenton Church to a non-Presbyterian body for less than its fair market value, and that General Assembly is asked to concur in the ratification of this proposal.

#### Legal Agreement:

WHEREAS, TRENTON CHURCH, has by a vote of its membership withdrawn its affiliation with the UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA,

and

WHEREAS, the PRESBYTERY has asserted that the assets of TRENTON CHURCH are by implication held by TRENTON CHURCH in trust for the use and purpose of the UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, and

WHEREAS, the parties wish by this instrument to resolve all claims which either party hereto may have against the opposing party, now, therefore,

In consideration of the mutual promises and covenants herein contained, it is agreed by and between the parties as follows:

- A. PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT, UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, hereby relinquishes, releases and disclaims any interest which it may have or which it may ever have had, in and to the assets, both real and personal, of TRENTON PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF TRENTON, a Michigan Ecclesiastical Corporation.
- B. \$77,500.00 to be paid by the TRENTON PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH in a lump sum following ratification of this agreement, with up to \$12,500.00 to be allocated by the Presbytery of Detroit to United Presbyterian causes previously supported by the TRENTON PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH in their 1979 mission budget.
- C. TRENTON CHURCH warrants that it has made no representations in connection with any real estate or personal property transaction of any kind, whether in cash, credit or both, that the PRESBYTERY is a party to any such transaction, or stands behind TRENTON CHURCH'S part in any such transaction as a guarantor, indemnifier, secondarily liable party or in any way formally or informally obliged or willing to satisfy TRENTON CHURCH'S obligation in any such transaction. In the event of breach of this warrantee, TRENTON CHURCH shall fully indemnify the PRESBYTERY for all liabilities, costs, expenses and legal fees incurred thereby.
- D. This agreement is intended to be a full and final settlement and release of all claims whatsoever between the parties hereto. This agreement is being executed in recordable form and it is understood by both parties that TRENTON CHURCH may at its option record this agreement.

The Oakland Avenue Administrative Commission reported through its chairperson, Harry Geissinger. A motion carried to approve the recommendations of the Commission, as follows:

The Session of the Oakland Avenue United Presbyterian Church of Pontiac, Michigan, meeting on July 2, 1980 with 14 elders present unanimously resolved to recommend to the congregation that it withdraw from the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America.

At a special Congregational and Corporate Meeting on July 28, 1980 the recommendation to withdraw was approved (YES - 293; NO - 10) and enabling resolutions passed.

The Presbytery of Detroit was notified by the Clerk of Session of these actions by letter dated July 29, 1980.

The Presbytery of Detroit met on August 8, 1980 and elected an Administrative Commission of: Ruling Elders Ruth Allaben, Wilma Dellinger, Verna Dill, and Thomas Prince; and Ministers David Antonson, LeRoy Haynes, Kenneth Gruebel, and Harry Geissinger who was named Chairperson to "visit the Oakland Avenue United Presbyterian Church, reported to be affected with disorder (Book of Order 60.04)" and to make specific recommendations to the Presbytery of Detroit on August 15, 1980 relating to the willingness and ability of the Session to "manage wisely the affairs of its church (Book of Order, 41:15)".

The Commission met on August 13th, first by itself, then with 16 Elders and the minister of the Oakland Avenue Church. The Commission reported its recommendations to Presbytery on August 15th. The Presbytery adopted the recommendations of the Commission that the Oakland Avenue Church was "affected with disorder" and granted the Commission broad administrative powers. The Rev. Paul Moon renounced the jurisdiction of the United Presbyterian Church and his name was removed from the roll of the Presbytery on September 23, 1980.

The Commission proceeded to follow faithfully the Presbytery's "Goals for Commissions" to work toward reconciliation, transfer to another denomination, or withdraw from the United Presbyterian Church. To this end, position papers were exchanged and discussed at length. In addition, the Commission remained in continuing conversation with the chairmen of the other Commissions, the executive staff of the Presbytery and the attorney for the Presbytery.

To the credit of both parties an excellent rapport was developed which continued throughout all discussions and negotiations. Permission was granted to the Session of the Oakland Avenue Church to administer the affairs of the church on behalf of the Commission for 90 days. This permission was later extended to April 28, 1981.

When it became apparent that the only resolution of the matter was withdrawal from the denomination, the membership of the Oakland Avenue Church was invited by letter to meet with the Commission to ascertain if there was any "faithful remnant" who wished to continue in the United Presbyterian denomination. On March 19, 1981 two women, plus an elder representing the Session, appeared and consulted with the Commission.

The Commission then worked to secure "adequate compensation" for the transfer of the Dakland Avenue property to the continuing congregation. After intense but congenial negotiations, the following schedule of compensation was endorsed for presentation to the Presbytery of Detroit and the Oakland Avenue congregation.

- 1. \$47,500.00 of undesignated monies to be paid to the Presbytery by December 31, 1985.
- 2. Oakland Avenue Church shall pay the sum of its per capita apportionments for the years 1980 and 1981 by December 31, 1982, the amount of which will be credited as payment toward settlement of the total \$47,500.00.
- 3. No interest is payable on any unpaid portion of the agreement through December 31, 1982. On January 1, 1983, January 1, 1984 and January 1, 1985 a ten percent (10%) interest charge will be added to the unpaid balance of this agreement. The total accrued amount (principal and interest) is due and payable in full no later than December 31, 1985.

#### **PROPOSAL**

It is proposed that the Presbytery of Detroit receive the following motion for first reading at its Pro re nata Meeting of April 7, 1981, and that action be taken at the Stated Meeting of the Presbytery to be held at the First Presbyterian Church of Dearborn on April 28, 1981, at 6:00 P.M.

#### MOVED that the Presbytery of Detroit:

- A. Dissolve the Oakland Avenue United Presbyterian Church effective April 28, 1981, (Book of Order, 42:08).
- B. Receive the properties and assets of the Oakland Avenue United Presbyterian Church and direct the Trustees of the Presbytery of Detroit to arrange for their transfer to the Oakland Avenue Church of Pontiac, Michigan subject to the conditions in the following statements.
- C. That the Presbytery of Detroit agree to receive on behalf of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America the sum of \$47,500.00 payable during the years of 1981 through 1985 in accordance with the attached agreement.
- D. That the Presbytery instruct its legal counsel to arrange for the removal of the "Presbytery of Detroit, Inc." and the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America from any contingent liability for unpaid mortgages, Declarations of Trust, or other financial obligations of the Oakland Avenue United Presbyterian Church upon payment in full of this agreement.
- E. That the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit be instructed to notify the membership of the Oakland Avenue United Presbyterian Church that the congregation has been formally dissolved by the Presbytery, effective April 28, 1981, and that the rolls are technically under the oversight of the Presbytery.
- F. That the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit be empowered to grant letters of transfer for the former members of the Oakland Avenue United Presbyterian Church to other United Presbyterian congregations, or bodies in correspondence with the General Assembly, and that at a point twelve months from the dissolution of the Oakland Avenue United Presbyterian Church the Stated Clerk delete from the rolls of Presbytery the names of all persons who have not so acted.
- G. That during years three and five of the life of this proposal, Presbytery's Council shall initiate conversations with the Oakland Avenue Church about the possibility of the church petitioning the judicatory to become once again a United Presbyterian congregation.

- H. That Presbytery's Council, through the office of the Treasurer, monitor the payments from the Oakland Avenue Church to the Presbytery and take appropriate action in the event of default.
- I. That the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit communicate with the Stated Clerk of General Assembly that this agreement in effect sells the Oakland Avenue Church to a non-Presbyterian body for less than its fair market value, and that General Assembly is asked to concur in the ratification of this proposal.

No interest is payable on any unpaid portion of the agreement through December 31, 1982. On January 1, 1983, January 1, 1984 and January 1, 1985 a ten percent (10%) interest charge will be added to the unpaid balance of this agreement. The total accrued amount (principal and interest) is due and payable in full no later than December 31, 1985.

- C. OAKLAND AVENUE warrants that it has made no representations in connection with any real estate or personal property transaction of any kind, whether in cash, credit or both, that the PRESBYTERY is a party to any such transaction, or stands behind OAKLAND AVENUE'S part in any such transaction as a guarantor, indemnifier, secondarily liable party or in any way formally or informally obliged or willing to satisfy OAKLAND AVENUE'S obligation in any such transaction. In the event of breach of this warrantee, OAKLAND AVENUE shall fully indemnify the PRESBYTERY for all liabilities, costs, expenses and legal fees incurred thereby.
- D. This agreement is intended to be a full and final settlement and release of all claims whatsoever between the parties hereto. This agreement is being executed in recordable form and it is understood by both parties that OAKLAND AVENUE may at its option record this agreement.

A motion carried to extend the docket by five minutes.

The Knox Administrative Commission reported through its chairperson, James Kesler. A motion carried to receive the report as a first reading and to agree to act upon the report at an adjourned meeting of Presbytery, to be held on May 12, 1981.

A motion carried to extend the docket by five minutes.

The report of the Central Northwest Administrative Commission was presented by its chairperson, Edward Koster.

The report of the Ward Memorial Administrative Commission was presented by Larry Glenn. A motion carried to grant the following powers to the Commission:

- 1. To remove the Session and assume the powers thereof.
- 2. To dissolve the Pastoral relationship.
- 3. To dissolve the congregation after having taken sufficient time to allow individual members an opportunity to indicate whether they desire to remain in the United Presbyterian Church family and having offered the alternative opportunity to continue this membership in the UPCUSA.
- 4. To assume responsibility for the property located at 12850 Plymouth Rd., Detroit, Michigan 48227.
- 5. To negotiate disposition of that property in any of the following manners:
  - A. To negotiate transfer to the continuing body or fellowship of individuals who were formally members of Ward Memorial Church.
  - B. To sell on the open market.
  - C. To lease property to any group desiring to use it.
- To secure the records and inventory of records, all financial and Sessional records and to make an inventory of the assets.
- 7. To negotiate the use of an alternate facility with a portion of the assets from the sale of the property in good faith to assist the continuing body of Christians to carry out their desired witness.

- 8. To determine whether it is possible for the continuing body of Christians of the Ward Memorial Church to engage in experimental ministry for a period of several years without formal organization within the United Presbyterian Church, with the permission of the Presbytery given to such experimentation and whatever facilitating actions were needed to assist in this exploration.
- 9. To have such additional powers as necessary to complete our task.

A motion carried to grant also to the Commission the authority to refer to the Committee on Ministerial Relations the name of the pastor of the church, David Dresser, for study and recommendation as to whether it is appropriate to call for the establishment of a Judicial Committee of Inquiry to consider his future relationship with the United Presbyterian Church.

A motion carried to adjourn the meeting of Presbytery until May 12; 1981, at 4:00 p.m. at Westminster Church, Detroit. The meeting was closed at 10:55 p.m. by the Moderator, with prayer and the Apostolic Benediction.

ADJOURNED MEETING OF PRESBYTERY, May 12, 1981

The meeting of Presbytery was resumed at 4:00 p.m. on May 12, 1981 at Westminster Church, Detroit. The meeting was convened with prayer by the Moderator, Paul Sutton. The Stated Clerk, Stanley M. Taylor announced that a quorum was present. A motion carried to approve the following docket: 1) Report of the Knox Administrative Commission; 2) report of the Division of Business Affairs; 3) a request from James LeDuc to present an item under Miscellaneous Business.

The Knox Administrative Commission reported through its chairperson, James Kesler. A motion carried to grant George Woodcock, pastor of Knox Church, the privilege of the floor. A motion carried to adopt Recommendation A of the Commission's report. A motion carried to adopt Recommendation B of the report.

#### I. Background

On July 14, 1980, the congregation of the Knox United Presbyterian Church, Mt. Clemens, voted 201 to 7 "to sever its affiliation with the Presbytery of Detroit, and the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America" effective July 21, 1980. The Presbytery was informed of this unilateral action in a letter dated July 22, 1980 to which was attached a copy of the resolutions made by the congregation and a one page statement "The Particulars of Knox United Presbyterian Church's Difference with the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America", subsequently distributed at the August 8, 1980 meeting of Presbytery.

On July 31, 1980, Presbytery elected an Administrative Commission "to visit the Mt. Clemens, Knox Church, reported to be affected with disorder". Disorder was found. The pastor of the church, the Rev. George Woodcock, renounced his membership in the Presbytery by letter, August 4.

On August 8, the present Administrative Commission was elected by the Presbytery of Detroit: Jean Lennox, Arthur Sherman Jr., Mary Scott, Alvin Stallworth, and four ministers: David Swinehart, Morgan Roberts, Robert Linthicum and James Kesler, who was named Chairperson. The Presbytery voted to the Commission the following powers over the Knox Church and its assets:

- A. To remove the Session and assume the duties and powers thereof.
- B. To dissolve the pastoral relationship between George W. Woodcock and the Knox Church.
- C. If necessary, to dissolve the congregation after having given the individual members an opportunity to continue membership in the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.
- D. To have additional powers necessary to complete the task.

#### II. Frocess

The Commission retained legal counsel immediately, and then spent considerable time discussing goals and strategy to accomplish its goals. In cooperation with three other Administrative Commissions of Presbytery, this Commission developed and adopted a strategy paper for dealing with the disaffected churches, presented to the Presbytery for information on September 23, 1980.

A. <u>Reconciliation</u> between the Knox Church and the United Presbyterian Church was seriously pursued by the Commission. They acted to grant the Session of the Knox Church permission to administer the church's affairs on the Commission's behalf for 90 days, and later renewed that permission.

October through December was spent exploring first the root issues of discontent in the Knox Church as expressed in the "Particulars Paper", and then exploring what possible changes might be necessary in Presbytery or General Assembly to make reconciliation possible. The Commission and Knox leaders discussed scriptural authority, pluralism in the church, and several possible overtures to General Assembly. A Committee of Six was appointed - three from the Knox Church, three from Presbytery's Commission - to develop proposals which might be acceptable and have a sense of ownership for both the Knox leaders and the Commission.

Of two possible overtures to General Assembly, one - on permissive withdrawal by dissident churches from the denomination - found no favor with the Commission. The other, a grandfather clause permitting some temporary exemption from newly added portions of the Constitution, found some favor with both Knox leaders and the Commission. It was dropped, however, when Knox leaders refused to assist as advocates for its passage.

- B. Transfer to another denomination was seriously pursued by the Commission. Knox Church has a committee studying alternative affiliation. Several avenues have been explored and continue to be explored. However, Knox leadership is not prepared at this time or in the near future to affect transfer to another denomination.
- C. <u>Dealing with Total Withdrawal</u> has been the primary subject of discussion and negotiation since late January, 1981, although the door to reconciliation is still open.

To contact the congregation, a letter was written and signed by both the Commission chairperson and the Knox pastor George Woodcock, inviting any members of Knox Church who wanted to remain United Presbyterian to meet with our representatives at Peace United Presbyterian Church, Fraser, February 10. No loyal remnant appeared. Only one Knox member made contact with the Commission chairperson. We perceive no loyal remnant at Knox Church.

Knox property appraisal was made by a Presbytery representative which set a fair market value for buildings and land at \$450,000.00.

Knox financial records and statements were studied showing an indebtedness of \$390,000 to Standard Federal Savings and Loan, the Program Agency of the United Presbyterian Church, and local bond holders. Ordinarily, the Program Agency loan #1-11-129909 for \$125,000 made to Knox Church in 1976 would be called due when they left the United Presbyterian Church.

In preparing a proposal to the Program Agency, re: loan #1-11-129909, the Administrative Commission is taking into account the fact that Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly agencies permitted the Knox congregation to borrow more than they should have in 1975-76. Their indebtedness exceeds General Assembly guidelines significantly. If we were to make the \$125,000.00 payable immediately in full and secure adequate compensation to the Presbytery in addition, we would "break the church's back". Therefore, we are proposing new loan terms with Presbytery guaranteeing their payment, as Knox no longer expresses any accountability to the United Presbyterian system. Our legal counsel, Mr. Bushnell, is working to assure us an uncontested, second mortgage position and providing for foreclosure should the church default.

Since the property was appraised at approximately \$450,000.00, with approximately \$390,000.00 in outstanding mortgages and bonds, the settlement of \$51,000.00 can be considered a "fair market value" price the same as the amount that would have been received by Presbytery had the property been listed on the open market. General Assembly, therefore, need not be a party to this agreement.

The Commission has attempted to safeguard the interests of any possible remnant of loyal United Presbyterians at Knox Church, as well as the interests of the Presbytery and the General Assembly. The Commission feels all these interests would be frustrated should the \$125,000.00 loan be called and the Knox Church property foreclosed upon.

The Commission has discussed the use of the name "Presbyterian" with Knox leaders and has asked them voluntarily to delete the name "Presbyterian" from their title until or unless they affiliate with another Presbyterian body. The Knox leaders feel this is unfair to ask of them, since it was not insisted upon by other negotiated settlements. The Commission feels it is an important principle that "Presbyterian" means connectional in church government and would be properly used only when a local congregation has some higher judicatory to whom it is responsible. At the request of the Knox Session, the Commission concurs in separating out the recommendation "To delete the word Presbyterian" from the rest of the negotiated agreement so that the approval or disapproval of this negotiated settlement does not rise or fall on this issue alone.

Prayerfully and carefully the Knox Commission has discussed, listened, and negotiated with the leaders from Knox Church. For their part, the Knox leaders demonstrated a continuing willingness to expend their time and energy in clarifying possibilities and positions in a friendly, positive spirit. We prayed together; we disagreed in love. We part amicably in the hope that reconciliation together as United Presbyterians may be possible at some future time. In the meantime, we are together as part of the larger Body of Christ.

#### III. Proposal

That this agreement presented to Presbytery for first reading April 28, 1981, be received for information with Presbytery to adjourn to vote the proposal at second reading on Tuesday, May 12, 1981, at 4:00 P.M.

Α.

1. That the Knox Church pay the Presbytery \$51,000.00 an adequate compensation for the transfer of assets from the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. on the following cash flow schedule:

1984	\$6,500

1988	\$7,000

- 2. That the Knox Church agree to renegotiate its \$125,000.00 loan with the Program Agency of General Assembly on the following terms:
  - a. Interest rate: 12% per year, instead of the previous 7% per year
  - b. Amortization schedule: 15 year amortization <u>schedule</u>, as before. Payback period of 8 years with a balloon payment at the end of the 8th year.

This recommendation is contingent upon written confirmation by the Program Agency of General Assembly.

- 3. That legal counsel assure the Presbytery that the \$125,000.00 Program Agency Loan is adequately secured, and that the Presbytery can if necessary foreclose on the property. Presbytery is to be assured an uncontested second mortgage position, with priority over the bond account.
- 4. That legal counsel be asked to draft agreements binding the congregation to the provisions of #1 of this agreement, releasing the Presbytery from contingent liability on the First Mortgage held by Standard Federal, the bond account, and any other of the congregation's obligations.

В.

1. That Knox Church agrees it will not use the word "Presbyterian" to identify itself or any of its programs, activities, books, records, personal or property unless and until it unites with another Presbyterian denomination.

The report of the Division of Business Affairs was presented by its chairperson, Dale Ihrie. A motion carried to adopt the following recommendations of the Division:

- 1) It is recommended that the IBM Copier II be purchased for the price of \$6,000.00, less purchase accruals of \$3,000.00, for a net price of \$3,000.00.
- 2) It is recommended that a loan not to exceed \$17,000.00 be made to Robert M. Barnes, pastor of the Greenfield Church of Berkley, the loan to be made from the Capital Fund, under the following terms: the loan is to be repaid within six months from May 18, 1981, with interest at 10% per annum. The purpose of the loan is to enable Mr. Barnes to purchase a house.

3) It is recommended that approval be given to the Drayton Avenue Church for the sale of a piece of land to John S. Hodge and Julie C. Hodge, his wife for \$4,500.00 in cash.

A motion carried to receive for first reading a report from a Small Church Caucus, to refer it to the Department of Local Church Development and to the Department of Program and Resource Development for presentation and recommendation at the June meeting of Presbytery. A motion carried to distribute the report to commissioners in advance of the June meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:25 p.m. with prayer and the Apostolic Benediction, by the Vice-moderator, William Colwell.

#### MINUTES OF MEETING, JUNE 25, 1980

The meeting of the Administrative Commission was called to order and opened with prayer by Chairperson William Whitledge, June 25, 1980 at 8:45 p.m. in Westminster Church of Detroit.

Regular Members Present: Whitledge, Allen, Woodard, Beardmore, White and Howie.

Staff: Lester

The minutes of the Commission Meeting for June 24, 1980 were approved with one editorial correction.

Discussion of the contact with the Reverend Calvin Gray by Allen and Whitledge was informally held and the following transcript of conversation held June 25, 1980 was submitted for the record by common consent:

Notes of conversations on 6/25/80

9:00 AM Bill Whitledge and I met at the Rosedale Gardens Presbyterian Church. We reviewed the three points we were to cover in our phone call.

9:04 AM We called the Trenton Church.

Secretary: Hello, Trenton Presbyterian Church.

Bill: Mr. Gray, please

Secretary: Just one minute please. Who shall I say is calling?

Bill: Bill Whitledge, St. Paul's Presbyterian Church.

She was away several seconds.

Secretary: He'll be with you in a minute, sir.

Bill: Thank you very much.

Several seconds later Calvin Gray picked up the phone. Sounded to me like there was a clicking sound?

Bill explained that both of us were on the phone and members of the Administrative Commission elected by the Presbytery the night before. Cal responded that he was aware of that action. I said hello to acknowledge my presence.

Cal: I'll have to find out whether the Session want to do that or not. I would - I still consider myself a United Presbyterian Minister. I'll have to check with the clerk.

The Session as of the action on Monday night no longer recognizes the authority of the United Presbyterian Church. I think this says something significant about the congregation's position regarding their desire to have an official meeting.

Bill: We are an administrative commission of inquiry.

Cal: Yes, but let me out of courtesy explain what response you are likely to get from them - a desire only to send representatives for an informal meeting. Can you go along with that?

Bill: We would prefer to meet with the whole Session but would settle for a meeting with representatives rather than having no contact at all.

Cal: Where would this take place? Bill: We would come to your church.

Cal: What would be a convenient time for you?

Bill: In thinking about lay people's availability, what would you think about Saturday morning?

Cal: Sounds like that would work.

Cal and Bill agreed on a tentative time of 10:00 AM.

Cal: Now, this will be either with the whole Session, as you prefer, or an informal meeting with Session representatives?

Bill: Yes.

Cal: I'll call your office around 11 today and confirm this.

Bill: Fine, thank you. We want to discuss two more items with you. Will the Session and Corporation minutes for 1979 to 80 be available to the Commission, the documents recording recent actions?

Cal: I'll check.

Bill: Do you have one set or two? One board or . . . ?

Cal: One, I think. No, I'm sorry. We have two boards - dual minutes.

Bill: We want to remind you of the adjourned meeting of Presbytery scheduled for Monday, June 30 at 4 PM at Westminster Church in Detroit. You and the Session are invited to attend and to speak if you desire.

Cal responded that he was aware of this.

Bill then asked me whether we had forgotten anything.

Carol: No, you've covered the items we wanted to share.

Cal then restated accurately the three reasons for our call, and said goodbye to each of us using our first names. We each said goodbye and thank you in turn.

Bill and I reviewed my notes for their accuracy, and he left immediately.

It had been a calm and cooperative phone conversation.

A the beginning of the meeting, a telephone call to Calvin Gray was made by Whitledge who was told that an informal meeting of the Session of First Presbyterian Church, Trenton, Michigan, had been set for June 28, 1980 at 10:00 AM at the church in Trenton. No determination about the availability of Sessional and Corporate records was given by the Reverend Mr. Gray. General considerations on the approach to the Session and Pastor led to the following conclusions by common consent:

- 1. Ask if Sessional and Corporate records are available.
- Inform the Session members and Pastor that under Presbyterian polity a congregation cannot withdraw from the denomination, hence First Presbyterian Church, Trenton, Michigan is still technically a Presbyterian Church despite any action taken.
- 3. Ask the question: Why are you attempting to withdraw from UPUSA?
- 4. Talk to the Pastor alone after being with the Session.
- 5. Possibly talk to Session members separately.


Concern was expressed by members of the Commission about preserving the integrity of the church.

### MINUTES OF MEETING JUNE 28, 1980

The meeting was convened and opened with prayer at 10:08 A.M. by Chairperson William F. Whitledge at the First Presbyterian Church, Trenton, Michigan.

Regular members present: Whitledge, Allen, White, Beardmore, Woodard and Howie.

Elders and others present from First Presbyterian Church, Trenton, Michigan: Goodyear, Ritter, Kingdon, Orner, Rishaw, Siemers and the Reverend Calvin Gray.

Mr. Gray, the Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Trenton, Michigan, indicated that the Session was meeting informally because the Session does not recognize jurisdiction of the Detroit Presbytery.

- A. Whitledge asked what action had been taken by First Presbyterian Church, Trenton. The elders and Pastor answered that they had acted to:
  - 1. Withdraw from UPUSA and not recognize jurisdiction of the Detroit Presbytery. (Vote 436-5)
  - 2. Change By-Laws deleting any reference to UPUSA.
    - Reaffirm call of Pastor, reelected elders and deacons. Agreed to adhere to Westminster Confession of Faith.
    - 4. Elect a Study Committee of 6 persons together with the Pastor, to investigate establishing relationship to another denomination.
    - 5. Empowered the Session to take any necessary actions relating to the above actions.
- B. Whitledge: Why did you take this action? Elders answered:
  - 1. The congregation is out of step with liberal views of the denomination. The three critical issues in 192nd Assembly made the leadership feel that the Trenton Church should withdraw. (i.e. Overture I, property issue, Diety of Christ.)
    Overemphasis on social and political areas suggested that the Trenton congregation was no longer a conservative witness with UPUSA. It was felt that the time had come to "shake the dust from their feet" and get out. Gray added that the property issue revealed a lack of any confidence in the local congregation. He added that no position was taken by the Session on women as such, but he felt that the mandate took away freedom.

One elder quoted Dr. William Thompson, Stated Clerk, as saying that whoever controls the property, controls what is to be taught on that

Goodyear:

property. So the Trenton Church thought it should have control of the property so as to follow conservative teaching.

Allen asked about how the Session and congregation saw the property issue prior to the vote by the congregation. She also asked what they meant by conservative?

Gray said that the historical issue of property use was an open question. When the Supreme Court reopened the question, Dr. William Thompson and the General Assembly moved to make the implicit view explicit, as suggested by the Court, and so to close the exits. Gray said he was active at the meeting of the 192nd General Assembly and noticed that three major issues were all referred to Bills and Overtures (i.e. Overture L, the Property issue and Bi-Annual Assembly question). He thought that, as a result, they were not given adequate discussion. Gray further said that the people in the pew feel that they own the property. The process, with respect to property, according to Gray, "infuriated many of us."

An elder felt that our Board of Trustees holds the property.

Gray explained that his view of conservative did not agree with the elder's view. He likes the word "evangelical" better than conservative meaning acceptance of fully inspired Scriptures, affirmation of the Deity of Christ, recognition of man's lostness, need to spread the Gospel and the Second Coming of Christ. Elder Goodyear said that conservative accepts absolute Scriptural authority and believes the present church should be a reflection of the early church.

Allen: Is there no support in the UPUSA for your position?

Goodyear: A matter of degree so far as the conservative position is concerned. He thought that despite the ecclesiastical judicatory action the church should have stood up to reaffirm the deity of Christ.

Allen: What are you trying to influence in the church?

It was Overture L that was the final factor in the whole authority issue. The people of Trenton see this as beginning development of a major authoritarian church where the higher judicatories impose their will on lower judicatories. The question arises: "Will the local church be tied down by General Assembly?" There ought to be freedom to follow a congregation's own desires.

Whitledge: How do you see this affecting the denomination?

Orner: Gives us a new freedom to make our witness. The division will call for a broader and freer witness as evangelicals across the church.

Gray: Dr. William Thompson, having heard of the Ward Presbyterian Church movement called evangelicals together. Out of that meeting a decision was reached to schedule moderatorial meetings across the country. The trauma has prompted some action in

New York Headquarters.

. White:

What are the outrageous issues?

Orner:

The leftist social issues are the problem. Denominational monies supported the Rhodesian leftist political movement, the Angela Davis case, the Oklahoma defense of a man convicted of killing Girl Scouts, identification with the World Council of Churches, etc.

Woodard:

If all these things are leftist, what about our relationship

to the Christ who dealt with all these issues?

Orner:

Church should not be involved in these issues.

Goodyear:

We should reach all God's children with the Gospel, not through politics. The General Assembly is using too much energy and money on social and political issues. That is just the opposite of what we should be doing.

Beardmore:

In reference to another Presbyterian group, is there any present

direction?

Goodyear:

We are at ground zero on that.

Gray:

We are not at a point of picking a denomination.

Whitledge:

We find ourselves in a bind in dealing with you, guided by a polity that you no longer recognize. Individual clergy may resign and individual members may do so. A congregation may not withdraw. So the Commission and Trenton Church have a gulf between them. Give me any light that you see at this moment.

Gray:

As a Session, we looked at the alternatives available. We were not a maverick group. This seemed to us the only viable alternative available to us. We are in a dilemma but we are hopeful that it can be solved.

Whitledge:

Did you consider going to Presbytery and asking for dismissal?

Gray:

That was considered, but was not approved. The Presbytery is concerned with other churches that may go out. We feel badly that the Commission had to be involved. Denver and Lake Huron Presbyteries, as examples, left little hope that any other approach would have been accepted.

Allen:

Raised the question of trust on the part of the First Presbyterian Church, Trenton, Michigan, in the light of the precipitous action taken.

Gray:

What would have been the results?

Allen:

No way to answer that. We believe that the results could have

been different.

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Whitledge:

It would have been helpful if the dismissal approach had

been taken.

Gray:

The actions of Presbyteries around the country did not give us reason for hope. The Commission is bound by the action of Presbyter and General Assembly. You do not have power to act freely. We were facing a time factor. It was necessary to make up our minds on getting a dismissal. We felt that a positive action on that was not promising.

Denominations we are considering are not in correspondence with

the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. He called this

a reality factor in asking for dismissal to such denominations.

Whitledge:

There would have been a good chance for witness by you.

Howie:

Have you, Mr. Gray, resigned from the ministry of the United

Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.?

Gray:

He does not see it as such.

Howie:

Having been elected by the congregation separately, is that

not de facto a resignation?

Orner:

What were the chances in Presbytery of positive action?

White:

Would you be willing to bring the question de novo of approaching

Presbytery in a dismissal?

Orner:

(He equivocated) What options have we really?

White:

We have heard your unrest, why not come and talk to us despite

history?

Orner:

History goes against its being useful.

whitledge:

I would think there would have been hope had you followed that line. We do not want to get into bind of civil and ecclesiastical

courts. This could have been done in better order.

Gray:

You are reflecting Detroit Presbytery.

Whitledge:

That is the only judicatory that can act.

Gray:

Consider what happened at General Assembly!

Whitledge:

Detroit Presbytery is loving and pastoral and open.

Gray:

Balance that against the attitude and stance of the General Assembly on property. The action makes it difficult for any church to

leave. The 10 to 1 vote in General Assembly indicated that no

negotiation in Presbytery could take place.

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Illen:

I see that.

Gray:

The overwhelming vote against the minority report at General

Assembly Meeting was discouraging to us.

Woodard:

Reviewed the historic schisms in the past all of which were over so-called liberal issues. Brought up church union movement. All do not agree on the same thing. With respect to the Oklahoma case, after the trial the accused was declared innocent. On the matter of how the Bible speaks, there are vast differences.

Goodyear:

This is an action we took as a Session. It was not Calvin

Gray's leadership.

Beardmore:

The question of availability of the Sessional and Corporate

records was raised.

Grav:

They are available to you. There is nothing therein that would reflect the action. We feel that if you took them off the premises we will be saying something we do not want to say.

Whitledge:

Would they be available later?

Gray:

They could be available.

his part of the meeting was recessed by common consent, with prayer by Carol Allen.

The meeting continued with the Reverend Calvin Gray, without elders present, at 11:40 A.M.

Gray:

Surprised at attitude of colleagues. He was hopeful that he might be transferred to another Presbyterian body. He wanted to be given the privilege of being a continuing member of Detroit Presbytery. It is his desire to speak in the adjourned Presbytery meeting. Church must act on discipline, and he will respond. Every person must bear the consequence of his or her decision.

To what body would you like to be transferred?

Gray:

Howie:

Presbyterian Church of America, Reformed Presbyterian Church, or

Reformed Evangelical Synod.

Whitledge:

I am not sure about the Civil Courts' position. For example, it

is not clear what power you have to perform marriages.

Gray:

I am following a different tact than Ward Presbyterian Church. There was no collusion in the timing. Ward did not start a

general movement outside its membership.

nite:

How long have you been here?

Gray:

Since 1979.

White:

Was this idea of withdrawal here when you arrived?

Gray:

This is the most conservative church in the Presbytery.

There is little knowledge of Presbyterian Church polity in this

congregation.

In response to Howie, Gray made it clear that he wants out of UPUSA. He also indicated that Session and congregation would not even hear a reconsideration. Leadership that he has provided has not been toward reconciliation with UPSA, especially since the meeting of the General Assembly of UPUSA.

Whitledge:

Surprised at action of both Hess and Gray.

Gray:

We sometimes surprise ourselves. We now pay the price.

Lester thinks no good can come out of this.

White:

Do you feel secure here?

Gray:

Yes. I feel also that this is a stepping away from a secure

umbrella of the UPUSA.

Woodard:

This pains me deeply. I have sympathy for you and the congregation.

What pains me is that some of the issues on social justice and

human rights about which you disagree.

Gray:

The dynamics at General Assembly were interesting. Reference to New York Pastor in Long Island Presbytery where a homosexual was elected to serve on Session and was elected Clerk of Session. Gray was not happy. Moderator of Long Island Presbytery, Thomas Phillips, is an avowed homosexual, although not active. Gray asked Phillips if this situation was true about the elder. Explanation was that the elder was ordained before the San Diego meeting of General Assembly. Phillips was willing to provide Gray with other examples of a avowed homosexuals. Gays, according to Phillips, need to go the judicial route. This was the catalytic agent that caused Gray to act.

He has ordained women. He thinks that the New Testament is 60-40 on ordaining women. He wonders if the church was going in the right direction. The UPUSA is still doing things that would have made headlines in the 1960's. He does not feel that church is moving to the right. The General Assembly is moving into the local church and churches with more of a congregational spirit are moving out (e.g. Overture L and the Property Issue). This is not the end of schism.

How does this work out?

Gray:

White:

Negotiation is a possibility. This is a <u>fait accompli</u> in the Trenton Church even though the Commission does not see that. We must try to negotiate for settlement. Following the General

Assembly directive there may have to be civil action.

White:

Will you come to the meeting on June 30, 1980 with an open spirit?

Gray:

Despite the fait accompli we do not want any civil litigation.

Whitledge:

Will your elders be there?

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Gray:

Some will be there. There is a difference as to how we should go with this property. The church took the position that it owns the property. How we come down ultimately I do not know.

White:

I do not agree that property is primary. We are more concerned with the people. Most important is the people.

The meeting was recessed at 11:55 with prayer by Chairperson Whitledge.



Voted in the light of the above, to request an immediate meeting with the former session and the former pastor to negotiate a resolution of the issues affecting the future ministry of the Trenton Church.

In this connection the chairperson is to inform the former clerk and pastor of the Commission's actions, and schedule a consultation on Friday July 18 at 7:30 p.m. or Saturday July 19 at 10:00 a.m.

A QUORUM NOT PRESENT

- Representatives from the Trenton Church included: Pastor Calvin Gray, Elders James Couch, Ed Rishaw, Gary Siemers
- Chairman Whitledge announced that the Commission did not have a quorum present, but since we were present, we could use the time in discussion. He led in prayer.
- The following are a list of items discussed. The list is not exhaustive nor does it reflect repetition of subject matter.
  - The action of the Commission dissolving the Session and the pastoral relations of the pastor became effective July 10, 1980.
  - It is necessary to use the terms "former pastor" and "former Session members".
  - Current membership of the congregation is 776.
  - The Commission must have access to the church's records and membership listing with addresses so the Commission can contact the membership to acertain if any members wish to remain in the United Presbyterian Church.
  - A request was made that a letter be sent to the total membership of the Trenton Church so the Commission may personally know the feelings of the entire membership.
  - Pastor Gray objected to the Pastoral Letter sent to all the churches of the Presbytery which included the sentence "It is considered "unethical" and a violation of the ordination vows for a minister to lead a congregation in a withdrawal movement." He felt this sentence and feeling might prejudice the members of the Trenton congregation against meeting with Presbytery's Commission members.
  - The Trenton representatives felt that their relationship with the Presbytery had always been good and helpful.
  - Pastor Gray commented that Presbytery is not aware of the number of churches in the Presbytery who are "toddering" and "fomenting" at this time.
  - It was agreed that the Trenton Church could address the envelopes for the letter from the Commission to its membership.
  - It was pointed out that the Book of Order does provide for an orderly procedure of a congregation to another denomination which is in correspondence with our General Assembly.
  - It was agreed that articles in the Detroit newspapers and some of the T.V. comments were not the truth and created some misunderstanding and difficulty in trust relationships.
  - It was agreed that we must rise above pettiness.

July 19, 1980 Page 2.

The representatives of the Trenton Church requested that they have a letter from the Commission requesting access to the church records and a listing of the membership and their addresses for sending a letter to the members of the congregation ascertaining what members if any desire to continue membership in the United Presbyterian Church to present to the former Session for action. The Chairman said that such a letter would be sent.

The meeting adjourned at 11:15 A.M. with prayer by Rod Beal.

After the representatives of the Trenton Church left, the members of the Commission remained. James Woodard arrived after having gone to Trenton for this meeting.

There was general discussion and impressions of the meeting.

- The Commission reaffirmed the necessity of getting the church's membership and address listing to contact the membership to determine how many members are interested in continuing a United Presbyterian Church in Trenton.
- The Commission felt that the mailing should be sent out by the Presbytery from its headquarters rather than being mailed by the church. There was no objection to the church providing the addressed envelopes.
- This letter will be sent to the membership of the congregation in September.

  The Commission had no objections to the representatives of the church seeing the letter before it was mailed.
- Members of the Commission were concerned of some comments that included the "threat" to contact other churches and the reference to other churches "toddering" and 'Tomenting". The inference was that the Presbytery was not aware of how many congregations were in this state and which churches.



<u>Voted</u> to meet with former Session representatives on October 22, 1980 (7:30 p.m.) to discuss recongiliation and related issues.

<u>Voted</u> to request "Trenton leadership" to write a position paper on issues relevant to reconciliation and a proposal for resolving those issues.\*

<u>Voted</u> to reconvene with the "Trenton leadership" after the paper is in hand, four to six weeks hence.

<u>Voted</u> to grant until November 19, 1980 for receipt of the Trenton Position Paper.

Voted to adjourn.

\*Summary of the consultation with former elders and former pastor of the Trenton Church: (This was obviously an extended conversation, highlights of which are given here).

Gray: Reconciliation is probably not a fruitful topic. I would like to move beyond item one of the strategy paper to a consideration of issues beyond reconciliation. We are disturbed by communications we receive from Presbytery. Sometimes we are called the "former Session" and sometimes we have "status." We want to be on record as a group not "attempting to withdraw" but we have in fact withdrawn. We are speaking as a congregation that is not of the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.. We are not under your oversight.

Borchardt: Did you all resign from Trenton United Presbyterian Church? Answer: No.

Whitledge: So back to reconciliation. What disturbs you about UPCUSA? Gray: We left for two major reasons:

- 1. A long period of pronouncements and positions we consider out of context with the Gospel as we see it.
- 2. Actions of General Assembly 1980:
  - a. Mandating election of women to Sessions.
  - b. Failure to declare itself clearly regarding the Deity of Christ and insure Kaseman does not become United Presbyterian minister.
  - c. Position of the Denomination regarding church property.

In effect there are the three issues at the 1980 General Assembly, plus a whole alien history proceeding it. We really have a different slant on the whole Faith.

Therefore, our main argument is with UPCUSA, not this Presbytery (although it is hard to separate Presbytery from the rest of the Denomination). I am sorry we have argued. Presbytery and Don Lester we respect. We had to be heavy with the Presbytery in order to get at General Assembly. We have doubts about reconciliation because we doubt the power of the Presbytery of Detroit to change General Assembly. Conservative overtures have failed up until now and probably will in the future.

White: We want the opportunity to try. You left without giving us much of a chance.

Elder: Didn't you hear us complaining all these years?

White and Whitledge: We didn't hear you complaining. Cal was even on

Elder: You have not bothered us. You are good people, but we are really angry at the heirarchy.

Whitledge: What must be done?

Elder: Many things.

Gray: We left unilaterally because of experiences churches were having in other presbyteries, particularly Denver. They told us how they were disenfranchised by their presbytery, therefore we acted in secret to avoid the possibility of Presbytery behaving that way.

Borchardt: What changes in UPCUSA do you need in order to come back in?

Change 47.01 of the Book of Order to let us elect elders our own way. No more requirements laid on us about women. We may elect some some day, but don't force us.

- 2. Departure from proper view of Scripture seems to be coming—what the Bible is and how it speaks to us. There is a General Assembly committee studying biblical authority. We want to know how they come out. If it departs from infallible Scripture, we would want it changed back.

  We don't like UPCUSA because it has moved from a confessional church to a constitutional church. Want to change it back.

  (Parenthetical note: we have always been the same. You have changed to make us outlaws with the new 47:01. Makes us mavericks who have to come to you asking exemption from rules that didn't
- 3. Clear statement needed by General Assembly on deity of Christ. We want people out of the church who are soft on deity of Christ. Ordination is a clouded issue now. We want ministers with a clean christology. Church has to speak and put teeth into deity of Christ and get tough with people like Kaseman. We want discipline and purity and we want to get on Kaseman's case.
- 4. If I come back, you will chain me and keep me here. (Their impression). We want an assurance that if we voluntarily come back into the Presbytery we will at a future time be able voluntarily to leave. The property issue chains us. We place principle over property and will leave the property behind us if we have to. Why did Thompson want a special meeting of General Assembly? To lock us into the church. You are holding us legally rather than through love. Therefore, there has to be a substitute to the existing Bills and Overtures' provisions on property as well as the defeat of Overture A 1980. We want a "due process" spelled out for leaving if a group wants to leave--to become in the practical sense a congregational church. (Among various Presbyterian groups the UPCUSA is hardest on the property issue).

(The conversation went on between Trenton former elders and commission members at this point debating the fine points of 47:01 in the book of Confessions. Beauchamp stated a strong position on women's rights in the church, was challenged, reasserted herself, etc.)

Trenton Minutes October 22, 1980 Page 3

Whitledge: If these are the four points around which reconciliation must center, what do we do next to make it happen? Will you write a proposal, specifically stating desired texts of all of this?

Gray: We are not entertaining the thought of re-entry. But if all our conditions are met it would be different.

Whitledge: Reconciliation is still our agenda.

Gray: We prayed on the way over here not to act in anger. Reconciliation is listening. We haven't been heard. We have deep seated concerns and Presbytery hasn't taken us scriously. In my debate with Carol Allen we didn't really talk to each other.

Whitledge: If you write a "white paper," adopt it, and get back to us, can we use that as a process?

<u>Gray:</u> Can we speak to number two in the strategy paper--transferring to another denomination? Does Cumberland Church belong on list in correspondence with General Assembly?

Borchardt: Yes.

(

Whitledge: Tell us what denomination you want to transfer to and we will react.

Gray: In pursuing things like this we would not admit any ownership by the Presbytery.


Whitledge: We are still on the reconciliation topic, and are talking about other things hypothetically. Can we have a Trenton paper to react to?

Denniston: Can you consider an "out" on some of these things, a win-win compromise? We can work something out on women, Christ and Scripture.

Property may be the thing that hangs us up.

Whitledge: Can we get together in four to six weeks to read a paper? Gray: Yes. We will put something together.

(Near the end of the meeting Gray and Borchardt got into a conversation about the "non-recognition of ownership by Presbytery." Borchardt says position paper cannot just say we don't have any claim to ownership, and have it get us anywhere. Need them to pick an option either to reconcile, transfer, or make us an offer).

Commission members Whitledge and Denniston met with Calvin Gray and Al Kingham from Trenton, and staff persons Borchardt and Lester.

Topic was a settlement on property so the issues between the Trenton Church and the Presbytery of Detroit would be cleared up. Mr. Gray has been apprised of a concept presented to the Ward Commission by Bartlett Hess based on a settlement proposed by a Peoria Church to the Presbytery of Great Rivers.

The Peoria idea involves a payment to the Presbytery over a period of time (in their case five years) based upon what their per capita apportionment would have been, what a completed MMF pledge would be, and a continuation of their self-allocation to United Presbyterian judicatory mission, plus a figure compensating the Presbytery for its wasted time and inconvenience in dealing with the matter.

The above mentioned persons, meeting in the Presbytery office on January 19, arrived at a proposal which all parties have agreed to advocate. The commission will discuss it on January 29, the Trenton "Session" on February 3. Following these two meetings Mr. Gray and Mr. Whitledge will be in communication to share the conclusions of their respective groups.


### Proposal:

- 1. That the Trenton Church pay the Presbytery of Detroit \$125,000 in annual installments of \$25,000 per year for a period of five years as compensation for subject church property.
- 2. That the Presbytery of Detroit agree to dissolve the Trenton United Presbyterian Church following Presbytery's positive action on a settlement proposal, and deed the property over to the group currently known as the "Trenton Presbyterian Church."
- 3. That the Trenton Presbyterian Church agree to instruct its officers to sign a promissory note for the amounts payable to the Presbytery following the initial payment.

- 4. That the Trenton Presbyterian Church agree to send a mailing to its membership with the oversight of the Presbytery commission in which they offer alternative possibilities to church members who wish to stay in the United Presbyterian Denomination.
- 5. That the Presbytery of Detroit furnish the Trenton Presbyterian Church with interpretive information regarding the kinds of projects facilitated through the funds accruing to the Presbytery in the settlement described in #1 above.
- 6. That the commission consider what amount it might propose as a <u>one-time</u> settlement, as an alternate to the five year plan.

That the Presbytery of Detroit agree to dissolve the First Presbyterian Church of Trenton, Michigan following Presbyterys positive action on a settlement proposal, and deed the property to the group currently known as the "Trenton Presbyterian Church", a congregation whose membership constitutes a successor to the First Presbyterian Church of Trenton.
- 3. That the Trenton Presbyterian Church agree to instruct its officers to enter into a legally binding agreement with the Presbytery of Detroit for the payment of the amounts described in #l above, and Presbyterys agreement to release the property from further claims when the terms have been satisfied.
- 4. That the Trenton Presbyterian Church agree to send a mailing to its membership with the oversight of Presbytery's Commission in which they offer alternative possibilities to church members who wish to stay in the United Presbyterian Denomination.
- 5. That the Presbytery of Detroit furnish the Trenton Presbyterian Church with interpretive information regarding the kinds of projects facilitated through the funds accruing to the Presbytery in the settlement described in #1 above.
- 6. That the Presbytery and the congregation instruct legal counsel to prepare an agreement to assure both parties the fulfillment of item #3 above.

The Commission <u>voted</u> to instruct Dr. Whitledge to write Calvin Gray, former pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Trenton, informing them of our actions 1/29/81, asking for a response by February 9, 1981, and a joint meeting on Monday, February 16, 1981, 7:00 P.M. at the Presbytery of Detroit offices, to discuss the next steps involved in implementing the plan.



We asked the Oakland Avenue Committee to tell us their hurts and concerns and we would be their advocates in Presbytery and General Assembly to make known hopefully with a loud voice just what and where they are hurt.

We will wait for them to notify us when they have a paper ready.

Ken Gruebel will prepare our paper for negotiation with them. We'll raise with them the possibility of exchanging worshipping persons at services.

Meeting closed at 4:45 P.M. with prayer by Ken Gruebel.

The Commission met at 5:30 P.M. for dinner at the Beefcarver Restaurant and was convened with prayer by Haynes.

The Commission discussed the "Position Paper" which had been presented by the session of the Oakland Avenue Church. Attached.

I' was agreed that we would ask the session for clarification of the statements; for any areas of possible further negotiation; and, contigent upon the answers, outlined further steps leading to withdrawal from the United Presbyterian denomination.

The Commission moved to grant the former session and the pastor the privilege of conducting worship services and providing pastoral care to the members of the church, and that the Commission requested that the former session be responsible for the care and upkeep of the facilities until April 30, 1981. The motion passed unanimously.

The Commission recessed to continue its meeting at 7:30 P.M. with the session of the Oakland Avenue Church which was opened with prayer by Gruebel.

The discussion centered on the statements in the "Position Paper". It was revealed that there was no room for negotiation and that the Oakland Avenue Church was not, at this time, interested in being dismissed to another denomination.

We moved to Stop #III in the directive from Presbytery and outlined general conditions and obligations necessary for withdrawal.

It was proposed by the former minister, Paul Moon, that three people be appointed from the session and three from the Commission to negotiate terms of withdrawal to be approved by the session and the Commission and to be presented to the Presbytery of Detroit at its regular meeting on April 28, 1981. This was agreed to by the session and the Commission.

The meeting with the former session was adjourned with prayer by several elders and ministers.

The Commission continued to meet. Lester agreed to consult with Attorney Bushnell to prepare a statement to the effect that the Commission would negotiate accepting the fact that the Oakland Avenue session no longer recognizes the authority of the General Assembly.

The Commission adjourned to meet at four o'clock on January 27, 1981 in Lester's Office.

# POSITION PAPER ON RECONCILIATION OAKLAND AVENUE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH ADOPTED DECEMBER 21, 1980

We believe the United Presbyterian Church of the United States of America, like our Federal Government, has become top heavy, exercising greater jurisdiction than the historic Presbyterian form of government will allow. We believe with its mandates, pronouncements and support (financial and otherwise) of radical revolutionary groups it has caused great embarrassment to the evangelical wing of the church as well as to many who are far more moderate.

We desire to be an integral part of a denomination wherein:

- 1. We can have a positive approach to our denomination and do not feel we must be apologetic, defending our Christian beliefs, in light of the actions, rulings and pronouncements of that denomination.
- 2. We can participate in the total program and agencies of the denomination, such as the youth activities, women's work, etc.
- 3. We can be strong in our evangelical approach and free to follow our conscience as it is instructed by the Holy Spirit speaking through the scriptures on matters of worship and government.

Therefore, for the Oakland Avenue Presbyterian Church to consider re-affiliation with the United Presbyterian Church U.S.A. the denomination would need to take the following actions:

- 1. Deity: Affirm without question or apology the deity of Jesus Christ and provide safeguards that the historic understanding of the deity of Jesus would never be called into question, and since the U.P.C.U.S.A. is a connectional church with each local church being under the authority and leadership of all ordained porsons in the demonination, all ordained personnel within the denomination must offirm that historic understanding of His deity.
- 2. Scriptures: Affirm the authority of the scriptures as the infallible and inerrant Word of God as the only rule for our faith and life. All ordained personnel in the U.P.G.U.S.A. must also make this affirmation as with #1 shove.
- 3. Government: Guarantee in the Book of order the might and freedom of the local congregation to worship and govern themselves in keeping with historic Presbyterianism as they are led by the teachings of scriptures, interpreted by the Holy Spirit. We find overture "L" an infringement on our fundamental rights as a part of the Church of Jeous Christ to hold to the increancy of the scriptures and to elect our sem officers; and thus we feel this overture must not be included in the Book of Order.
- 4. Withdrawal: Make provisions in the Book of Order allowing for a formal, equitable withdrawal from the denomination, including the right of the local congregation to retain all its real and personal property, when the church has unreconciable grieveness against the denomination.


Memorandum of Understanding:

Oakland Avenue Commission of the Presbytery of Detroit
Pastor and members of the present Oakland Avenue Church Session

The above parties have agreed to enter into negotiations on the property presently occupied by the Oakland Avenue Church.

It is agreed that for either party to enter into such negotiations is not to be construed as a legally binding commitment acknowledging the correctness of either's position. The members of the session and pastor at Oakland Avenue are not acknowledging the position of the Presbytery that all property is held "in trust" by the individual congregation for the entire denomination. The members of the Commission are likewise not acknowledging the position of the session that the property is exclusively that of the congregation, and no other.

The spirit of these negotiations is to avoid the expense, the inconvenience, and the adversary position that entering into a local process to resolve the differences suggested above, would bring about.



### Dear Oakland Avenue Presbyterian Church Member:

As you are no doubt aware, the leadership of the Oakland Avenue Church has been pursuing an orderly separation from the denomination of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. At this time, the Session and an Administrative Commission of the Presbytery of Detroit are formulating an agreement which will complete the congregation's actions of July 28, 1980, in a manner agreeable to both the church and the Presbytery of Detroit.

The Session and the Commission agree that members of Oakland Avenue should be offered the option to remain within the United Presbyterian Church of the U.S.A. if that is their desire. A consultation is planned where such members will be free to express their interest and ask questions regarding remaining within the denomination. If you are interested in such a consultation, a meeting is being held at the First Presbyterian Church of Pontiac, March 19, 1981 starting at 7:30 P.M.

Presbytery of Detroit Commission on Oakland Avenue Church, Pontiac Mich. Minutes August 13, 1980

Commission was convened with prayer by chairperson Geissinger at 7:05 P.M. at First Presbyterian Church, Pontiac.

Commission reviewed papers which had been referred to it indicating the Session had convened a congregation to entertain proposals attempting to with-draw from the United Presbyterian Church.

Commission discussed the kinds of questions relevant to a consultation with the Oakland  $A_{\rm V}e$ . Session later the same evening.

Commission voted to elect Wilma Dellinger clerk.

Commission voted to recess at 7:50 P.M. to reconvene at 8:00 at Oakland Ave. Church Commission conducted a consultation at Oakland Ave. Church with 16 elders and the pastor, Paul Moon.

#### Conclusions:

- 1. The session is unwilling to reconsider its actions.
- 2. Differences exist between Oakland Ave. Church and the Denomination that go back for better than 20 years.
- 3. The session has neither the energy nor the motivation to attempt instituting change within the Denomination to cause it to become acceptable to them.
- 4. Out of a communicant membership of approximately 670 there were 305 persons present at the congregation, 293 of whom voted to attempt with-drawal from the United Presbyterian Church, 10 of whom voted in the negative, with one abstention.
- 5. Mr Moon has renounced the jourisdiction of the United Presbyterian Church and seeks to have his name removed from the rolls of the Presbytery.

Commission voted the following recommendations to the Presbytery of Detroit meeting in Pro Renata session at Westminster Church on August 15,1980:

- 1. That the Oakland Avenue United Presbyterian Church be found to be "affected with disorder."
- That an administrative commission composed of 4 ministers and 4 elders with a quorum of 5 be elected by the Presbytery of Detroit with the following powers;
  - A.To remove the Session and assume the powers thereof.
  - B.To dissolve the congregation, if deemed necessary, after having given the individual mebers an opportunity to resign from membership and having offered them the alternative opportunity to continue membership in the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.
  - C.To have additional powers necessary to complete its task. The commission shall make a full report to the Presbytery, including efforts made toward reconciliation.
- 3. That the following persons be elected to the above named commission Harry Geissinger, chairperson

### Report of the Administrative Commission on Oakland Avenue Church

August 15, 1980

The Cormission met on August 13, first by itself, then with 16 elders and Paul Moon, the pastor from Oakland Avenue, then by itself again, to formulate its recommendations. The Commission's recommendations are based on the following information:

- 1. The Church furnished Presbytery with written confirmation that the Session called a congregational meeting to propose that the church disassociate itself from the United Presbyterian Church. That the meeting was held, and the congregation adopted the Session's proposal. Of 670 communicant members on the roll, 304 were present. The vote was 293 to 10 with one abstentation. It was a written, secret ballot which persons were not asked to sign.
- 2. Mr. Moon has communicated to the Presbytery his desire that his name be deleted from the rolls of the Presbytery of Detroit. He renounces the jurisdiction of this Church.
  - 3. In conversations with the Commission, elders stated that Cakland Avenue has never been heavily involved in the life of the Presbytery. Since the merger between the United Presbyterian Church of North America (of which they were a part) with the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. in 1958, they have been displeased with the judicatory system under which they have functioned.
- 4. Elders stated that conversations about leaving the Denomination have been going on for several years, and that up until June, 1980, Paul Moon has been advising them to stay and participate in the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.
- 5. Although there are several irritants, the major difference between the people at Oakland Avenue and the Denomination is Paragraph 47:01 of the <u>Book of Order</u>, specifically the need for fair representation of women "on sessions. They categorically believe that women should not so serve.
- 6. Conversations with Oakland Avenue Elders and the pastor indicate that their decision is irrevocable, and that they cannot reconsider the matter. At the same time, they express willingness to work with the administrative commission to empower the loyal minority to set fair market value on the property and determine its disposition, and in exploring entry into another denomination.

Based on its consideration of the above, the Administrative Commission on Oakland Avenue Church recommends the following to the Presbytery of Detroit:

- 1. That the Oakland Avenue United Presbyterian Church be found to be "affected with disorder."
- 2. That an Administrative Commission composed of four ministers and four ruling elders, with a quorum of five, be elected by the Presbytery of Detroit with the following powers:

- a. To remove the Session and assume the power thereof.
- b. If deemed necessary to dissolve the congregation, after having given the individual members an opportunity to resign from membership individually and having offered them the alternative opportunity to continue membership in the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.
- c. To have additional powers necessary to complete its task. The Administrative Commission shall make a full report to Presbytery, including efforts made toward reconciliation.
- 3. That the following persons be elected to the above named commission:

It was moved and seconded that the Commission grant the former session and the pastor the privilege of conducting worship services and providing pastoral care to the members of the church, and that the Commission requested that the former session be responsible for the care and upkeep of the facilities until December 31, 1980. This motion passed unanimously.
- 6. The Commission discussed at length the steps that it would take in dealing with the Oakland Avenue Church.
- 7. It was moved and seconded to convene the Commission again on Thursday evening, October 23 at 6:00 P.M., at a place to be announced later.
- 8. There being no further business, the Commission was adjourned with prayer at 5:39 P.M. by Commissioner Gruebel.

Minutes of meeting of September 23, 1980

The meeting of this Commission was convened as part of a joint meeting with the other three Commissions and opened with prayer by Kesler.

The actions of the September 18th meeting were reviewed by Haynes, Dill and Geissinger in the absence of the minutes.

The Commission reviewed the revision of the "Proposed Goals for Administrative Commissions" and endorsed, along with the other Commissions, the presenting of them to Prosbytery for information.

The Commission was reminded that it had instructed the chairman to recommend to Presbytery the "taking from the table" the motion to delete the name of the Rev. Paul Moon from the rolls of Presbytery at his own request; and further to recommend that Presbytery act favorably on this request.

The Chairman was instructed to request from the Rev. Wm. Colvell and the Rev. Carol Allen copies of papers presented to the Presbytery at recent meetings. The Commission will review these documents and, perhaps, use some of their insights when dealing with the session of the Oakland Avenue Church.

The Chairman requested other members of the Commission to volunteer to meet with him and Mr. Moon for lunch early in October. Dellinger and Haynes volunteered and the date was set for Tuesday, October 7th, at noon. Mr. Moon to select the restaurant.

The date of October 23rd (Thursday) at six o'clock was confirmed for the Commission to have dinner together at a restaurant to be named by Dellinger and to meet with the session of the Oakland Avenue Church at 7:30. (It was noted that Dill will be out-of-town).

The meeting was adjourned at 4:50.

- 1. A letter dated July 22, 1980 to Presbytery Council, Presbytery of Detroit, from the Knox United Presbyterian Church signed by Charles A. Blackstock Clerk of Session regarding withdrawal.
- 2. An enclosure with the above letter entitled "The Particulars of Knox United Presbyterian Church's Differences with the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America.
- 3. Resolutions presented to the congregation at a special meeting held July 14, 1980.

Kesler advised that the Commission was charged with the responsibility of verifying whether disorder exists and reporting thereon at a pro re nata meeting of the Presbytery of Detroit called for 2:00 p.m. Friday August 8, 1980. To that end a meeting of Commission members, the minister and members of Knox Church is to be arranged by Mr. Kesler.

Subject to further verification of disorder, the commission voted the finding that disorder does exist and recommends that the Presbytery of Detroit at its pro re nata meeting of August 8, 1980:

- 1. Elect an Administrative Commission for the Knox United Presbyterian Church composed of 4 ministers and 4 ruling elders with 5 members constituting a quorum in accordance with the <u>Book of Order</u>.
- 2. That the commission be voted the following powers:
  - a. to remove the session and assume the duties and powers thereof.
  - b. to dissolve the pastoral relationship between George W. Woodcock and the Knox United Presbyterian Church.
  - c. if necessary, to dissolve the congregation after having given the individual members an opportunity to resign from membership and having offered them the alternative opportunity to continue membership in the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America.
  - d. to have additional powers necessary to complete its task.
- 3. Elect the following members to the Administrative Commission described in 1 and 2 above. Ministers James Kesler, Morgan Roberts, David Swinehart, and Robert Linthicum; Ruling Elders Jean Lennox, Mary Scott, Arthur Sherman, Alvin Stallworth.

Following discussion it was duly voted that at the pro re nata meeting on August 8, 1980 a Judicial Commission of Inquiry be elected with the following tasks:

- a. To make a thorough inquiry into the facts and circumstances of alleged said to have been committed by The Rev. George Woodcock in connection with the attempted withdrawal of the Knox United Presbyterian Church of Mt. Clemens, Michigan from the United Presbyterian denomination.
- b. To examine all relevant papers, documents and records available to it.
- c. To ascertain all relevant witnesses and to inquire of them.
- d. To determine whether there are probable grounds or cause to believe that offenses have been committed by the alleged offender.
- e. To decide whether charges filed on the basis of the papers, documents, records, testimony or other evidence can reasonably be proved, having do regard for the character availability and credability of the witnesses and evidence available.
- f. To report to the Presbytery its determination as to whether charges are to be filed.

and if charges are to be filed

- g. To prepare and file the same charges in accordance with the provisions of the Book of Church Discipline Chapter VII Sections 11 and 12 and
- h. To prosecute the case.

That the following six persons be elected members of the Judical Commission of Inquiry: Ministers - Robert Crilley, Chairperson, Ralph Hawley, Vice-Chairperson, and Theodore Taylor; Ruling Elders - Sally Rankin(Ferndale, Drayton Ave.), Jo Ann Higgins (Detroit, Hope), and William Standing (Detroit, Calvin West)

Mr. Kesler agreed to arrange a meeting of commission members with George Woodcock and members of Knox Church.

Discussion ensued as to ultimate desires of the Commission with regard to the members of Knox United Presbyterian Church who do not desire to transfer membership to the new Knox Presbyterian Church, the real and personal property of Knox United Presbyterian Church and unchurched residents of the area around Knox United Presbyterian Church. Following discussion a concensus formed that barring fundamental change in future actions by the General Assembly there is little likelihood of reconciliation.

- 2. George Bushnell be advised to take all necessary actions, insofar as practical, to safeguard the real and personal property rights of The Presbytery of Detroit in Knox United Presbyterian Church as such existed prior to July 21, 1980. These actions to be taken with all due urgency.
- 3. Henry Borchardt to be authorized to advise Bushnell of these actions and to assist in their implementation.

The meeting adjourned with prayer at 5:30 p.m. to reconvene from  $\underline{11:00 \text{ A.M.}}$  to 2:00 P.M. on Friday, August 15, 1980.

August 15,1980

The meeting was convened with prayer.

Minutes of the August 8,1980 meeting were approved as presented. On motion Arthur Sherman was unanimously elected secretary of the commission. Chairperson Kesler presented the actions of the Presbytery which give the commission its charge.

Sherman reported on the meeting he and Mary Scott attended with members of the other administrative commissions and legal counsel George Bushnell. Minutes

October 6, 1980

The meeting convened with prayer at 12:22 p.m.

Present: Kesler, Swinehart, Linthicum, Scott, Sherman, Roberts.

Staff: Borchardt, Lester.

Excused: Stallworth, Lennox.

<u>Kesler</u>: Report on meeting of Linthicum and Kesler with George Woodcock where emphasis continues on their original complaint which is very broadly based. They are willing to discuss these problems and have appointed elders to meet with the committee.

Borchardt: At Ward an appraisal of the building has been made and a public meeting called at which no members turned up. Trenton Church is close behind Ward in process. At Ward some Session members are meeting with the Ward Administrative Commission tonight.

<u>Lester</u>: Twenty churches met in St. Louis, Missouri, as an association of Evangelical conservative churches. Trenton and Ward were represented. Knox and Oakland Ave. were not.

Roberts: Issue is whether pluralism of scriptural interpretation is allowed or not.

Borchardt: We should consider position of women in the church and basis for support or abandonment.

<u>Roberts</u>: Perhaps a new Overture L could be written allowing pluralism emphasizing no compulsion to membership, but encouraging place for women and minorities.

Borchardt: There are no recommendations by Bushnell for action to be taken by this commission at this time.

<u>Lester</u>: There is a church which may be willing to be challenged on non-compliance with Overture L to start the judicial process. In another matter, in Lake Huron Presbytery, there is direct conflict on the property issue in the courts. The court decision will affect all future church property decisions.

Borchardt: There is submitted to the commission a broad spread sheet of past and future considerations on the connectional church which is attached to these minutes.

Lester: Reported on concern that the members of the administrative commissions maintain unbiased view on the matters under consideration and give careful thought to any publication of view or public statement.

Kesler; Concerns include:

- a. Stewardship for the future horizontal and vertical.
- b.) Women in churches (elders and non-elders).
- c. The frustration of the fundamentalist church members in reading Scriptures and modern church law.

Swinehart: We can only support the right of the fundamentalist churches to press their views regardless of whether we personally agree with those views.

The commission agreed to use the Knox Particulars as a basis for discussion with the Session of the ex Knox Church at a meeting Monday, October 13 at 4:00 p.m. at Grosse Pointe Woods Memorial Church (if it can be arranged).

Swinehart: We must recognize plurality of views as the commission and the right to our views and right to speak positions.

Minutes of last meeting approved.

Adjourned at 2:10 p.m.

. . .

Present: Kesler, Linthicum, Lennox, Scott, Swinehart. Staff: Borchardt.

Guests from Knox: Fleming, Heenan, Woodcock.

The meeting opened with prayer.

Introduction of three papers submitted by joint task force group of six.

- 1. Linthicum preface paper.
- 2. Overture draft.
- 3. Covenant and description of process and time-line.

The group spent considerable time discussing the preface paper, suggesting some editorial and syntactical changes that would make it clearer.

The group discussed the overtures:

(Overture "A" is the grandfather clause providing for procedures to secure exemption from newly added or changed sections of the Constitution).

(Overture "B" is a procedure through which a congregation would be permitted to leave the Denomination).

### General agreements:

- 1. Overture "A" would be much easier to pass in the United Presbyterian Church than would Overture "B". Presbytery people were more critical of "B" than "A" with members occasionally suggesting to the Knox people that there might be advocacy on the commission for the passage of "A" but more difficulty with "B".
- 2. Knox people were saying they would have difficulty with passage of either overture in the congregation because mentally they have "left" with the bridge "burned behind them." But if re-entry in the Presbytery is to be achieved it would have to be in response to advocacy on both overtures. "A" alone will not result in a change of strategy at Knox.

The group discussed the covenant and time-line:

General agreement that if the overtures are acceptable, the covenant and the time-line would almost automatically follow.

Commission adjourned to reconvene Tuesday, November 23 at 3:00 p.m. at the First Presbyterian Church, Birmingham.

The meeting was held at the First Presbyterian Church, Birmingham, Michigan.

Present: Kesler, Linthicum, Swinehart, Roberts, Scott, and Sherman.

Stoff. Borchardt.

Excused: Lennox, and Stallworth.

Kesler: The meeting was called to order at 3:05 p.m. A report was made on status of reconciliation efforts by the other three commissions and the alternative actions under consideration. Port Huron Presbytery court action on the property, issue has now been postponed to May 1980. He distributed material propared by the committee meeting with Knox. Overtures have been prepared, which if approved by the General Assembly would provide basis for their decision to rejoin UPCUSA.

The committee then reviewed the overtures and their implications not only to the Presbytery of Detroit but the UPCUSA. The commission concluded that Kesler should advise the Knox committee that Overture "A" might be acceptable to the commission if revised to provide for a period of time, such as three years, during which Knox would be exempted from new constitutional changes effective January 1, 1980 or later. In part the commission needs interpretation of the width of the legal impact of such an overture before approving Overture "A".

The commission concluded that Overture "B" could not be supported.

The commission is to meet next at 12:00 noon on December 9, 1980 at the Presbytery office. (Bring your own lunch).

Jan. 13, 1981

The meeting was held at the Celtic Cross Church, Warren, Michigan.

Present: Jim Kesler, Bob Linthicum, Mary Scott, David Swinehart, Arthur Sherman, Hank Borchardt.

Absent/excused: Stallworth, Lennox, Roberts.

Kesler reported on current developments and contact with a member who voted against separation and with The Rev. George Woodcock urging resolution of the problems prior to the General Assembly meeting May 17, 1981.

Borchardt reports Knox starts payment of 7% interest and principal February 1981 of \$729.16 per month over probably 15 years.

Borchardt also reported a church settlement in Illinois for 5 years:

- 1) Per capita
- 2) Benevolence
- 3) Major Mission
- (4) Wear and tear

Swinehart and the commission expressed concern for future of George Woodcock and that Kesler would discuss this personally with Woodcock.

Borchardt reports that if the Presbytery determines that the Presbytery has received "adequate compensation" for the Knox Church, then the General Assembly does not have to ratify the Presbytery action.

Question was raised as to values of Knox assets, and the names of loyal remnant and other members.

Meeting of January 20, 1981 was moved to the Presbytery of Detroit in Westminster Church. It will be held from 12:00 noon to 1:30 p.m. Bring your own lunch.

Meeting adjourned at 11:20 a.m.

Minutes

January 13, 1981

The Commission meeting on January 20 at the Presbytery Headquarters decided to resubmit the following minutes of January 13 because there were certain items the Commission wished to have included.

The meeting was held at the Celtic Cross Church, Warren, Michigan.

Present: Jim Kesler, Bob Linthicum, Mary Scott, David Swinehart, Arthur Sherman, Hank Borchardt.

Excused: Stallworth, Lennox, Roberts.

Kesler reported on current developments - especially about a contact with a member of Knox who voted against separation and a contact with The Rev. George Woodcock urging resolution of the problems prior to the General Assembly meeting May 17, 1981.

Borchardt reports that Knox Church starts payment of principal as well as interest in February 1981. This is for the \$125,000 loan from the UPUSA. The payments will be \$729.16 per month if paid over a 15 year period.

Borchardt reported a settlement made with a church in Illinois which would take place over a five year period. He offered this as an example about what might be acceptable to both Knox and Presbytery:

- 1) Per capita payments continued
- 2) Benevolence payments continued
- 3) Major Mission payments continued
- 4) Wear and tear includes, among other things, expenses incurred on the part of Presbytery by church's withdrawal

Swinehart and the Commission expressed concern for the future of George Woodcock and it was decided that Kesler would, in behalf of the Commission, personally contact Woodcock.

Borchardt reported that if the Presbytery determines that it has received "adequate compensation" for Knox Church, then the General Assembly does not have to ratify the Presbytery action. (This observation was made for the benefit of George Woodcock, Cal Fleming, Stuart Fleming and Palmer Heenan who joined the meeting and stayed for most of the rest of the meeting.) George, especially, had high anxiety about drawing our Commission's work to a close and a settlement reached as soon as possible - certain-ly before the General Assembly meets in May, 1981.

The question war raised about Knox's assets, records of membership, the privilege of contacting the "loyal remnant", etc. The Commission was assured that there would be no problem in securing all required information and records and that the Knox people would be glad to send a joint letter with the Commission to all of the members of Knox Church.

We will meet again on January 20, 1981, at Westminster Church, at 12:00 through 1:30 p.m. Meeting adjourned at approximately 2:00 p.m.

Minutes

January 20, 1981

The meeting was held at the Presbytery Offices, Westminster Church, Detroit, Winbigan, and was called to order at 12:00 noon.

The meeting was convened with prayer by James Kesler, chairperson.

Present: Kesler, Lennox, Scott, Swinehart, and, by phone, Linthicum and Roberts. Absent/excused: Sherman, Stallworth. Staff: Lester, Borchardt.

We heard a synopsis of the work of the other three commissions from Don Lester.

Hank Borchardt made a report of the obligations of the Knox Church so far as the building was concerned:

\$125,000	Program Agency Loan - UPUSA  Terms: 5 years of interest only at 7%, followed by 15 years of principle and 7% interest payments commoncing in February, 1981
175,000	Standard Federal of Detroit (20 years at $9_P^g$ )
115,000	In bonds held by members (8.5%) sold in 1975 $(?)$
\$415,000 -20,000 \$395,000	Tctal indebtedness Recent payments to Standard Federal

The payment schedules are such that present payments amount to \$42,000 annually and they will peak in a few years to \$57,000.

Serious questions were raised about what the Presbytery's obligations are in relation to the Standard Federal Loan and, should the church collapse or abandon building, what would the Presbytery do? Counsel will be contacted in give advice and Don Lester, as Executive Presbyter, will contact Standard Federal.

It was further announced, for the benefit of the Commission, that \$6,625 was Knox's per capita and General Mission giving in 1979.

Hank Borchardt called the Program Agency to see: nder what conditions Knox Church could retain its denominational loan. He came back to the meeting to report that the Loan could be kept if the interest rate went to 12% from the present 7%, if it would be repaid in 10 years, and if Presbytery held title to the property. Further, if Knox Xhurch defaulted on any payment, it would result in immediate foreclosure.

With this information and the benefit of all foregoing discussion, four plans were devised to offer to knox Church:

PLAN A: Knox Church go along with Program Agency - 10 years for repayment of \$125,000 loan at 12%

1. The Knox Church building title be held by the Presbytery of Detroit

2. Any default on payments would result in immediate foreclosure
That Knox Church pay the Presbytery \$100,000 over a 5 year period to cover 1) benevolence
obligations, 2) per capita assessment, 3) wear and tear, and 4) to meet other obligations
Knox has failed to meet over past many years.

That Knox Church no longer use "Presbyterian" as part of its name.

# PLAN B:

That Knox Church immediately refinance its \$125,000 denominational loan. That Knox Church pay \$10,000 per year over a 10 year period to the Presbytery. That Knox Church not use the name "Presbyterian."

#### PLAN C:

That Knox Church refinance \$125,000 owed to Program Agency immediately. That Knox Church pay \$125,000 over a 15 year period to the Presbytery. That Knox Church not use the name "Presbyterian."

#### PLAN D:

That Knox Church make a one-time payment of \$200,000 immediately. That Knox Church not use the name "Presbyterian."

A motion was made that negotiators press for either PLAN A or PLAN D.

Negotiators for the Commission will be Kesler, Scott and Swinehart. Further, we will request that any negotiators for Knox Church be approved by the Session of the church so they have some official standing.

Motion to adjourn was made at 2:00. Committee of 6 will meet on January 27 at 2:30 p.m. at Westminster Church, Detroit.

Meeting was closed with prayer.

Minutes

February 24, 1981

The meeting convened with prayer at 5:30 p.m. at Westminster Church, Detroit.

Present: Kesler, Swinehart, Sherman, Lennox, Scott, Roberts. Present by invitation: Donald Lester, George Bushnell.

Excused: Stallworth, Linthicum.

Kesler reported on the meeting of the committee of six which had reached agreement tentatively restricting use of "Presbyterian" in a new Knox name unless part of a recognized Presbyterian assembly. Other positions were clarified.

Sherman reported the present value computations of various aspects of proposed financial arrangements between Knox and the Presbytery. He stressed need to get \$125,000 Program Agency loan to a higher conventional interest and to structure so that higher interest would not be required by Standard Federal or the bond holders. The additional payment and the \$125,000 mortgage to be jointly and severally guaranteed by Palmer Heenan, with Stewart and Cal Fleming.

Bushnell pointed out title and guarantee problems of the Program Agency and that church withdrawal may be an act of default triggering \$125,000 becoming due immediately. Bushnell is to explore with the Program Agency title/default questions and to study the mortgage terms.

Sherman reported descrepancies in the 1980/81 budget figures of Knox. The correct increase in budget is \$6801. He also reported that Richard Messier of Real Estate One advised the Knox property may have a market value of \$425,000 to \$475,000 to another church. Replacement cost of the building was estimated to be \$850,000 and the land worth \$150,000.

It was agreed Kesler would contact Woodcock and advise the present view that title problems and mortgage language may force foreclosure on the mortgage by Presbytery and the view that the bond holders might not receive 100 cents on the dollar settlement.

Kesler reported that he had heard from only one Knox Church member who wanted to meet with the Knox Commission, as a result of an invitation sent to all Knox members.

The next meeting of the committee of six is scheduled for March 11, 1981. The Knox Commission adjourned, subject to call, at 7:00 p.m. with prayer by Kesler.

Knox Administrative Commission --- Minutes Up-date---- March 3, 1981

# Kesler reports as follows:

- 1) Bushnell contacted Black and Shangler of the Program Agency and was told:
  - a) Withdrawal of Knox can be considered act of default.
  - b) Presently they feel title must be in Presbytery for any refinancing/lease program.
  - c) Policy of financing dissident churches will be discussed at General Assembly Mission Council in mid-March. "Financing" needs definition.
  - d) Black and Shangler would like to believe New York City inflated land values apply to Knox property.
  - e) Shangler recounted the three times the Knox loan request was rejected and the plea made by Lester, at Knox prompting, that ultimately got the loan approved.
- 2) Kesler and Lester have scheduled a meeting with George Woodcock on March 5, 1981 regarding above information.
- 3) The meeting of the committee of six scheduled for March 11, 1981 may be postponed until after GAMC meets.

#### MINUTES

The negotiating teams agree to the following proposal for the dissolution of the Knox United Presbyterian Church and the orderly transfer of its assets to the Knox Presbyterian Church, an entity not related to the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., voted by the Commission as follows:

 That the Knox Church pay the Presbytery \$51,000 as adequate compensation for the transfer of assets from the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. on the following cash flow schedule:

1984	\$6,500
1985	\$7,000
1986	\$7,000
1987	\$7,000
1988	\$7,000


- 2. That the Knox Church agree to renegotiate its \$125,000 loan with the Program Agency of General Assembly on the following terms:
  - A. Interest rate: 12% per year
  - B. Amortization schedule:
    15 year amortization schedule.
    Payback period of 8 years with a balloon payment at the end of the 8th year.
- 3. That Presbytery's legal counsel be given information by the Knox Church for review and recommendations to the Commission prior to presenting the agreement to the Presbytery, as follows:
  - A. A sample bond from the bond account.
  - B. A copy of actions taken by Knox to alter the arrangements of the bonding program in 1980.
  - C. A copy of the mortgages held by Standard Federal and the Program Agency.

Legal counsel is to assure the Presbytery that the \$125,000 Program Agency Loan is adequately secured, and that the Presbytery can if necessary foreclose on the property. Presbytery is to be assured an uncontested second mortgage position, with priority over the bond account.

- 4. That legal counsel be asked to draft agreements binding the congregation to the provisions of #1 of this agreement, releasing the Presbytery from contingent liability on the First Mortgage held by Standard Federal, the bond account, and any other of the congregation's obligations.
- 5. That Knox Church agrees it will not use the word "Presbyterian" to identify itself or any of its programs, activities, books, records, personal or property unless and until it unites with another Presbyterian denomination.

That the agreement be presented to Presbytery for first reading April 28, 1981 with Presbytery to adjourn to vote the proposal for second reading on Tuesday, May 12, 1981 at 4:00 P.M.

Since the property was appraised at approximately \$450,000, with approximately \$390,000 in outstanding mortgages and bonds, the settlement of \$51,000 can be considered a "fair market value" price the same as the amount that would have been received by Presbytery had the property been listed on the open market. General Assembly, therefore, need not be a party to this agreement.

Upon motion, the minutes of the Stated Meeting of April 28, 1981 and the Adjourned Meeting of May 12, 1981 were approved. A typographical error was noted and corrected on page seven to read that the record show the negative vote of Deane Baker on Overture A.

Upon motion, the docket for the meeting was approved.

Upon motion, the privilege of the floor was given to Ruling Elder William Standing to speak during the report of the Department of Local Church Development.

The Moderator appointed Earl Miner, a ruling elder of the host church, to serve as assistant to the Stated Clerk.

#### Omnibus Motion

Upon motion, the recommendations listed in the Omnibus Motion were adopted as follows:

- 1) It is recommended that the Milford Church be given approval to borrow not more than \$67,000.00 from its members and friends, through the issuance of promissory notes at 9% interest, with a maximum payoff period of ten years. The purpose of the loan is to enable the Milford Church to have its building re-roofed.
- 2) It is recommended that the Presbytery loan the Department of Program and Resource Development the amount of \$8,000.00, for the purpose of purchasing a van. The terms of the loan are: a promissory note for \$8,000.00, payble in four years at 9.75% annual interest.

The van would be purchased through the Presbytery fleet plan, at a cost of \$12,125.00. The Department has cash on hand of \$4,200.00 available for the purchase.

A motion carried to receive Paper B-4 "Policy Regarding the Presbytery's Role in the Housing of Pastors" for a first reading at this time, with action to be taken at the September meeting of Presbytery.

A motion carried to concur with the recommendation of Business Affairs to grant a loan to the Grandale Church on a promissory note in the amount of \$8,000 for the purpose of enabling its pastor, Clanton Dawson, to purchase a home. The terms of the loan are 9% annual interest, interest only payable the first year, in monthly payments, during the next five years the loan is to be paid in full, with terms to be negotiated at the beginning of the five-year period.

A motion carried to receive the reports of Council from meetings of November 11, 1980, December 9, 1980, January 13, 1981, March 10, 1981, April 14, 1981, June 2, 1981 and June 9, 1981.

The report of the Department of Presbytery Ministries was presented by James Mitcham. A motion carried to proclaim Sunday, September 27, 1981 as a Peace Sabbath among the churches of the Presbytery of Detroit; that through sermons, prayers, hymns, and other means the concern of peacemaking be lifted up in the congregations of the Presbytery; and that the Committee on Peace Education be charged with offering resources, support, advice, and encouragement to the churches in their observance of this Sunday.

Upon motion, the docket was extended by four minutes.

The report of the Department of Program and Resource Development was presented by John Jeffrey. A motion carried to commend to each church the consideration of a Resource Notebook for church officers (Paper C-1).

The report of the Division of Mission Support was presented by Mary Younkin.

The report of the Committee on Structure was presented by Kenneth Kettlewell. Upon motion, the docket was extended by five minutes: A motion carried to delete "and December" from page one, lines 45 and 46 of the By-Laws of the Presbytery of Detroit, so that Chaper III, Section 1, Paragraph A will read: "The Presbytery will meet regularly as a judicatory on the fourth Tuesday of January, February, April, June, September, October and November, and/or as arranged by Presbytery Council."

Upon motion, the report was received.

The report of the Department of Local Church Development was presented by Wilma Dellinger. Upon motion, the recommendations listed were adopted as follows:

- 1) It is recommended that permission be granted to the Grandale Presbyterian Church and the Presbyterian Church of the Master to merge into one surviving congregation, contingent upon a formal plan of merger to be approved by the Presbytery, with a proposed effective date of September 20, 1981. Assets of the merged church to be used at the discretion of the Session of the merged church.
- 2) It is recommended that the Church of the Master be given permission to sell its church property to the Kendall Gospel Church of God in Christ for \$160,000.00, \$60,000.00 of which shall be a downpayment, the remainder to be financed on a land contract for five years at 11% interest, with payments of not less than \$1,000.00 per month, with a balloon payment of not less than \$10,000.00 at the end of each year, the remaining balance payment in full at the end of five years, and that the proceeds of the sale be placed at the discretion of the merged Grandale-Church of the Master session.

William Standing, of the Department of Local Church Development, Clanton Dawson, pastor, and David King, ruling elder, of the Grandale Church, and Sam Hunt, ruling elder of the Church of the Master all spoke to the above two motions.

Upon motion, the Presbytery recessed for dinner.

At 7:00 p.m. the Moderator reconvened the Presbytery with prayer. Mr. Robert Linthicum lead the Presbytery in worship, along with a sacred dance group.

The report of the Candidates' Committee was presented by Richard Todd. The following actions were taken:

- 1) Mr. Barry Sweet read his statement of faith to the Presbytery. A motion carried to sustain the examination of Mr. Sweet, and that he be approved for ordination.
- 2) Mr. Jeffrey Brinks read his statement of influence and motivation to the Presbytery. A motion carried to sustain the examination of Mr. Brinks, and that he be enrolled as a candidate for the Gospel ministry to be taken under care of the Presbytery.
- 3) Mr. Peter Gabel read his statement of influence and motivation to the Presbytery. A motion carried to sustain the examination of Mr. Gabel, and that he be enrolled as a candidate for the Gospel ministry to be taken under care of the Presbytery.

4) Miss Julie Sandling read her statement of influence and motivation to the Presbytery. A motion carried to sustain the examination of Miss Sandling, and that she be enrolled as a candidate for the Gospel ministry to be taken under care of the Presbytery.

The report of the Committee on Ministerial Relations was presented by Richard Milford. Clanton Dawson, Jr., and William McIvor were introduced to the Presbytery.

- 1) A motion carried to concur with the congregation of the First Church, Northville in calling Lawrence A. Chamberlain to be its pastor, with the following terms: \$19,500 salary, \$10,500 housing allowance, \$3,000 car allowance, \$500 hospitalization, \$800 study allowance, two weeks' study leave, one month's vacation, full pension, annual review, and moving expenses; the call to become effective June 15, 1981, and to be forwarded to the Presbytery of Eastminster, with the request that he be dismissed to the Presbytery of Detroit; enroll Mr. Chamberlain upon receipt of his dismission, elect the following special administrative commission: Rev. Lawrence McMellen, chairperson, Rev. John Mishler, Rev. Lloyd Brasure, Ruling Elders James Richardson, Janice Dyke, and Irving McLeod (Northville), and empower said commission to install Mr. Chamberlain at 10:00 a.m. on July 5, 1981 at First Church, Northville. Assets of the merged congregation will be used at the discretion of the session of the merged church.
- 4) It is recommended that permission be granted to list the Covenant Church of Detroit property for sale with Real Estate One for an asking price of \$200,000. This motion is subject to the merger of Church of the Covenant and Woodward Avenue Church.

William Standing, of the Department of Local Church Development, Gary Douglas, pastor, and Mary Brown, ruling elder of the Church of the Covenant, and Mrs. Earl Wagner, ruling elder of the Woodward Avenue Church all spoke to the above two motions.

Upon motion, the docket was extended by five minutes.

Upon motion, the Presbytery concured to express its thanks to Mr. Benjamin Wu, departing pastor of the organizing Taiwanese congregation of Livonia.

The report of the Central Northwest Administrative Commission was presented by its chairperson, Ed Koster.

The report of the Ward Memorial Administrative Commission was presented by its chairperson, Gareth Baker.

The report of the Eastminster Administrative Commission was presented by its chairperson, Joseph MacDonald. A motion carried to approve the following recommendations of the Commission.

- 1. That the membership roll of the Eastminster Presbyterian Church be turned over to the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit immediately following the stated meeting of Presbytery on June 23, 1981, and that the clerk inform the members that they have until August 1, 1981 to request of him transfers to other churches. Members are to be informed they will become communicant members of the Grosse Pointe Woods United Presbyterian Church on August 1, 1981, if they have not communicated with him, and that the Eastminster Church will cease to function effective that date. This is in keeping with the desire of Eastminster congregation to have its members assimilated into the membership of Grosse Pointe Woods and the expressed desire of Grosse Pointe Woods Church to receive and care for them.
- 2. That the proceeds of the sale of the Eastminster manse and the cash assets of the Eastminster Church be held in escrow by the Division of Business Affairs of the Presbytery pending receipt of a plan adopted by both the Session of the Grosse Pointe Woods Church and the Department of Local Church Development of the Presbytery for community ministries in the Jefferson Chalmers community under the jurisdiction of the Woods Church Session, which will have until December 1, 1981 to present a proposal. If such a proposal is not presented, the funds will be used in the manner described in point three of this proposal. (The manse sale and cash assets amount to approximately \$40,000).
- 3. That Presbytery accept an offer from the Original Primitive Baptist Church to purchase the property of the Eastminster Church for the price of \$100,000.00, with the following terms: a down payment of at least \$25,000.00, the balance to be financed on a land contract, payable in five years, at 10% annual interest on the unpaid balance, with monthly payment of principal and interest of at least \$750.00

  The proceeds from the sale are to be invested with the Division of Business Affairs of the Presbytery of Detroit, income to be used for congregational renewal in the eastern portion of the City of Detroit, preferably Bethany, St. James, and Calvin East, under the supervision of the Department of Local Church Development, this arrangement to be negotiable after 10 years. Details of the sale arrangements for the Eastminster Church are presented to the June 23, 1981 meeting of the Presbytery of Detroit by the Division of Business Affairs.
- 4. That the Division of Business Affairs receive title to a property adjacent to the Eastminster Church on which Standard Federal Savings and Loan pays a ground rent, and apply the receipts from the ground rent to the congregational redevelopment ministries described in point three of this proposal.
- 5. That the distribution of memorial and articles not permanently attached to the Eastminster Church building be handled by this administrative commission in collaboration with Louise Scott of the Eastminster Church in a manner consistent with the Guidelines for the Dissolution of a Church.
- 6. That the Presbytery of Detroit declare the existence of the Eastminster Church to be terminated effective August 1, 1981, following a service of witness and celebration by the Presbytery on July 26, 1981.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:00 p.m. with prayer and the Apostolic Benediction by the Moderator, Paul H. Sutton.

The motion carried.

The report of the Division of Business Affairs was presented by its chairman, Dale Ihrie. He presented the following resolution: "That permission be given to the Presbyterian Church of the Covenant to sell its property at 740 East Grand Boulevard, Detroit, Michigan, to the Abyssinia Baptist Church on a land contract with the following terms: sale price \$150,000.00, down payment \$25,000.00, the balance of \$125,000.00 to be paid in monthly installments of \$12,00.00 or more, including principal and interest of 11% annually, with an additional payment of principal of \$25,000.00 to be made within six months from the date of closing." The report of the Ward Memorial Administrative Commission was presented by its chairperson, Gareth Baker. (Paper E-5) A motion was made that the following recommendations of the Administrative Commission be approved:

(Paper C-7) A motion carried to approve the recommendation that the Presbytery of Detroit expect no payment of the per capita apportionment for 1979 and 1980 from the Woodward Avenue Church. In the discussion of the report of the Small Church Caucus an amendment carried to change the phrase "on a priority basis" in recommendation #4 to read "in concert with other needs of the presbytery on a merit basis." A motion carried to approve the recommendations of the Small Church Caucus as follows:

- 1) That Presbytery, through the Department of Local Church Development, serve as advocate for proposals from the sessions of churches of fewer than 400 members when they request moratoriums onrepayment of capital loans, applications to be prepared by the churches and treated on an individual basis when received.
- 2) That the Department of Local Church Development serve as advocate for churches of fewer than 400 members seeking energy incentive loans from the General Assembly and that such churches be encouraged by the Presbytery to develop proposals and apply for these loans.
- 3) That the Department of Local Church Development publicly offer to meet with any church with fewer than 400 members which is experiencing financial difficulty, collaborating with them in dealing with the problems involved.
- 4) That Presbytery, when the 1982 budget is adopted, assure the availability of the "new project contingency" funding under the oversight of Presbytery Council, in concert with other needs of the Presbytery on a merit basis, to redevelopment proposals from churches with fewer than 400 members, providing that those churches have numerical growth goals, objectives and programs adopted by the session and in effect.
- 5) That the Department of Local Church Development develop and present strategies for the staffing of small churches which provide alternatives to the one church/one pastor type of arrangement (e.g. yoked field, area cooperative ministries, use of lay preachers, employment of seminary and post-seminary interns).

The report of the Department of Presbytery Ministries was presented by Christopher Torrey.

A motion carried to refer the following resolution to the Committee on Bills and Overtures:

Be it resolved, that the Presbytery of Detroit overture the 1982 General Assembly meeting in Hartford, Connecticut, to establish a blue ribbon committee to study our denomination's position in regard to public education in light of the realities of public education in our day.

Be it resolved, that this committee be composed of educators, laypeople and clergy and that this committee be instructed to collect data, assess our historic positions and to recommend future positions and strategies regarding public education.

Be it further resolved, that this committee be instructed to report to the General Assembly meeting in 1983.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:08 with prayer and the Apostolic Benediction by the Vice-Moderator, William Colwell.

Upon motion, the minutes of the Stated Meeting of September 22, 1981 were approved.

Upon motion, the docket for the meeting was approved with the following change: the Nominating Committee will not report at this meeting, but in its place there will be a report of the Committee on Structure.

The Moderator appointed Ruth McKenzie, clerk of session of the host church, to serve as assistant to the Stated Clerk.

# Omnibus Motion (Paper B-1)

Upon motion, the first item in the omnibus motion was laid on the table until later in the meeting.

Upon motion, the following recommendations listed in the omnibus motion were adopted:

- 1) It is recommended that the Presbytery Bylaw setting the dates for scheduled meetings be suspended with respect to the June, 1982 meeting, and that Presbytery meet on June 15, 1982 instead of on June 22.
- 2) It is recommended that the Northville Church be granted exemption from the requirement that church property be listed for sale on the open market, and that it be given permission to sell its manse to the pastor, Lawrence Chamberlain, for \$80,000. cash.
- 3) It is recommended that Fort Street Church be given permission to place its Clear Lake Camp property for sale on the open market for an asking price of \$300,000.

A motion carried to approve the report of Presbytery Council including its recommendation that the per capita apportionment for 1982 be \$1.55. (Paper B-2)

The Stated Clerk reported that he had received an opinion from the law firm of Miller, Canfield, Paddock, and Stone, stating that a review of pertinent IRS rulings and acts of Congress indicated that Presbyterian ministers are self-employed for tax purposes. A motion carried to refer the matter to Council for report and recommendation.

The report of the Division of Mission Support was presented by Mary Younkin.

The report of the 1982 Budget Committee was presented by David Sherwin. A motion carried to extend the docket until the conclusion of his report. A motion carried to receive the proposed budget for action at the November Presbytery meeting.

A motion carried to recess until 7:35p.m.for the purpose of holding Area meetings.

The report of the Department of Program and Resource Development was presented by John Jeffrey.

The report of the Committee on Candidates was presented by Richard Todd. (Paper C-3) A motion carried to revise the wording of 5.3 section 3e. by adding the words "with the presbytery's approval". A further motion carried to adopt all the proposed revisions to the Committee's Handbook as follows:

p.5 2.1(2) will now read:

"You will be required to draft a "Statement of Influence and Motivation" concerning your desire to pursue a ministerial career. In writing this statement you should consider the following questions:

-When and under what circumstances did you decide to enter the ministry?

-What persons and religious experiences motivated and reenforced this decision?

-What has been your history in the church?

-What is your current relationship with God?

This statement is neither a formal, theological statement of faith nor an exact description of what your ministry will be. The statement should be approximately two double-spaced pages in length and should be forwarded to the Presbytery office, so that it might be duplicated for use by the Committee.

p.5 2.1(4) will now read:

"A member (or members) of the Candidates' Committee will be appointed to meet informally with you prior to your appearance before the Committee, in order to answer your questions and to discuss with you your interest in a career in ministry. At this time the Committee member(s) will also discuss with you the overall process leading to ordination, especially your future relations with the Committee and your plans for education including seminary selection. (B.O. 48.051, 48.053 & 54).

- p.6 3.2 will be deleted
  - 3.3 is renumbered 3.2
  - 3.4 is renumbered 3.3

on in the interim.

The following will be added as a new 3.4:

At this time the committee will also discuss with you your future relations with the committee and your educational plans. If you have already selected a seminary, you will present a concise paper describing your seminary selection (See Step V below).

- p.8 The first sections of Step V will now read as follows:
  5.1 The two most important phases of your candidacy to the ordained ministry are the time at which you come under the care of the Presbytery and the time during which you are examined for ordination. Despite the focal importance of these two events, there are some very important things going
  - 5.2 First of all there are some educational requirements that you need to meet throughout your seminary career. Ordination requires that you, as a candidate, complete a prescribed course of study in a recognized United Presbyterian theological seminary, or that you offer an educational equivalent previously approved by Presbytery (49.01). Because of this requirement we would like to work with you and your pastor as you go about the process of selecting a seminary.

- 5.3 In any case we will require the following:
  - 1. Before the beginning of each semester you must have your courses approved by the presbytery's Candidates' Committee. If there are any changes they must be approved before being finalized.
  - 2. We will require a brief statement from you describing the rationale by which you selected a seminary. If you have not yet selected a seminary we will receive the paper when you do.
  - 3. The following is the presbytery's approved Seminary Selection Policy:

The Candidates' Committee affirms its belief that preparation for the gospel ministry in the UPCUSA can best be achieved by attending a seminary in the United Presbyterian Church.

- a. Attending an approved A.A.T.S. school is the directive given to the Candidates Committee in the Book of Order (48.053 & 49.01).
- b. All Candidates must submit a seminary selection paper to the committee prior to attending any theological school, or at the time of the under care interview with the committee.
- c. If the school selected is a UPCUSA institution, the paper should state why the Candidate chose that particular theological school.
- d. If the school selected is a non-UPCUSA seminary, the paper should include:
  - (1) The following rationale for selection when appropriate:
    - -financial
    - -theological
    - -geographical
    - -familial
    - -home church/pastor influence
  - (2) A proposal stating the candidate's expectation for receiving an equivalent education which should include but not be limited to:
    - -field education expectations
    - -UPCUSA polity and program
    - -Reformed theology
    - -Reformed worship, including sacraments
- e. The committee may exercise its right (with the presbytery's approval) to require any candidate to attend a UPCUSA seminary for one or more years.
- 4. You must have your field work assignments approved by the Presbytery's committee each year or before you engage in them.
- 5.4 (as in current handbook)
- 5.5 delete
- 5.6 will be renumbered to 5.5
- 5.7 will be renumbered to 5.6 and read

Please note: You must be under the care of the Presbytery no less than 2 years prior to your ordination. There is no provision for exception. (B.O. 49.01).

A motion carried to appoint Ruth Kirkman as reader of the ordination exams from this Presbytery in March, 1982, with Robert Armstrong and William Saum serving as alternates.

The report of the Committee on Ministerial Relations was presented by Richard Milford. Lawrence Chamberlain and John Yingling were introduced to the presbytery.

Upon motion, Presbytery set aside the six-month time lapse in calling a stated supply to become pastor, per Book of Order 57.041 and 57.042. This exception is made in the interest of supporting this church through what is hoped to be a period of reaching out to the community and redeveloping its strategy. A motion carried to hear Mr. McSwain, a representative of the congregation, and to approve in the call of James A. Mitcham, Jr. to become the pastor of the Calvary Church, Detroit effective November 1, 1981 with the following terms: \$14,700 salary, \$4,200 housing allowance, full pension, \$600 hospitalization, \$1,500 car allowance, \$200 study allowance, \$200 book allowance, two weeks' study leave, one month vacation, annual review; place the call in Mr. Mitcham's hands; elect the following special administrative commission:
Ministers - the Moderator or his designee, chairperson, James Cannon, Lawrence Glenn; Elders - Esther Benjamin (Calvary, Detroit), Willa Nicoll (Hope), Robert Lewis (Broadstreet), and empower said commission to install Mr. Mitcham at 7:00 p:m. November 15, 1981 at Calvary Church, Detroit.

A motion carried to extend the interim pastor contract, up to three months, between Trinity Church and Robert Craghead with the following terms: \$4,450 salary. \$1.125 housing allowance, \$390 utilities allowance, full pension, one week study leave, \$100 study allowance and one week vacation.

A motion carried to hear Rodney Beal, a representative of the congregation, and to approve the call of Licentiate Catherine McCloskey-Turner to become half-time assistant pastor upon ordination with the following terms: \$7,000 salary, \$1,750 housing allowance, \$600 car allowance, full pension, 2% deductible hospitalization, one week study leave, two weeks' vacation, \$100 study allowance. The following persons were elected to a special administrative commission to ordain Mrs. McCloskey-Turner at Rosedale Gardens Church at 3:00 p.m. on November 8, 1981: Ministers - Paul Sutton, chairperson, Philip Magee, Carol Allen; Elders - Peter Niemi (Royal Oak, First United), Barbara Birmingham (Rosedale Gardens), Franklin Heath (South Lyon). The following persons were elected to a special administrative commission to install Mr. McCloskey-Turner at the First United Presbyterian Church, Royal Oak, at 7:00 p.m. on November 22, 1981: Ministers - Donald Lester, chairperson, Rodney Beal, Charles McCloskey; Elders - Karen Bondy (Royal Oak, First United), William Trisch (Rosedale Gardens), Mary Spear (Plymouth).

A motion carried to elect the following special administrative commission to install John P. Yingling as pastor of the Evergreen Village Church: Ministers - Paul Sutton, chairperson, William Schram, Richard Peters; Elders - William Stokes (Plymouth), Darlene Delezene (Wyandotte), Richard Shaffner (Evergreen Village), and empower said commission to install Mr. Yingling at 6:30 p.m. on November 1, 1981 at the Evergreen Village Church.

A motion carried to confer the status of Pastor Emeritus of the Jefferson Avenue Church on Allan A. Zaun, effective October 27, 1981. Lois Billings, a representative of the congregation, spoke.

A motion carried to grant permission to David Dresser to labor outside the bounds of the Presbytery of Detroit for a period of six months.

A motion carried to approve the changes in the terms of call for the following persons: Antonson - \$1,260 salary increase; Harmon - \$165 salary increase, \$590 housing allowance increase.

The report of the Local Church Personnel Practices Committee was presented by Beach Hall (Paper C-5).

The report of the Department of Local Church Development was presented by William Standing. A motion carried to approve the application currently in process between the Synod of the Covenant and the Program Agency of the General Assembly for their funding of transitional ministries at the Woodward Avenue Church of the Covenant, and the Grandale Church of the Master for the years 1982-1986.

The report of the Department of Presbytery Ministries was presented by James Mitcham.

The report of the Committee on Presbytery Structure was presented by Kenneth Kettlewell. A motion carried to receive the report of recommended revisions in the Presbytery Bylaws for a first reading, with action to be taken at the November meeting of the Presbytery.

The report of the Executive Presbyter was presented by Donald Lester.

The Ward Memorial Administrative Commission reported through its chairperson, Gareth Baker. Mr. Baker reported that the members of the Administrative Commission have replaced the session of that church; the keys to the building and the financial assets have been turned over to the Presbytery. The Presbytery has assumed financial management and has placed Lloyd Brasure as interim pastor to that congregation. A motion carried to reconvene at the close of this meeting at an adjourned meeting of the Presbytery on November 3, 1981 at 5:00 p.m. at Westminster Church, Detroit to hear the recommendations of the Administrative Commission.

The Ward United Administrative Commission reported through its chairperson, Paul Sutton. Upon motion, the following recommendations were adopted:

- 1) It is recommended that the responsibility of monitoring the financial terms of the settlement with the Ward Church be lodged with the Division of Business Affairs.
- 2) It is recommended that Presbytery Council assume the responsibility for meeting with representatives of the Ward Church in 1983 and 1985 to explore the possibility of reconciliation and reunion as arranged in the settlement agreement.
- 3) It is recommended that the Commission be discharged.

Upon motion, the first item of the omnibus motion was removed from the table. A motion carried to adopt the following motion: It is recommended that the Presbytery Bylaw which requires the Areas to consider overtures at their March meetings be suspended with respect to overtures coming down from the 1981 General Assembly in order that Presbytery be able to consider and act on overtures at its November, January, and February meetings.

A motion carried to instruct the Stated Clerk to include a listing of which overtures will be considered at a particular meeting with the call of that meeting.

A motion carried to adjourn the meeting of Presbytery until November 3, 1981 at 5:00 p.m. at Westminster Church, Detroit. The meeting was closed at 9:15 p.m. by the Moderator with prayer and the Apostolic Benediction.

ADJOURNED MEETING OF PRESBYTERY, November 3, 1981

The meeting of Presbytery was resumed at 5:00 p.m. on November 3, 1981 at Westminster Church, Detroit. The meeting was convened with prayer by the Moderator, Paul Sutton. The Stated Clerk, Stanley M. Taylor, announced that a quorum was present.

The report of the Ward Memorial Administrative Commission was presented by its chairperson. Gareth Baker. Upon motion, the following recommendations were adopted:

- 1) It is recommended that the Presbytery of Detroit authorize the sale of the Ward Memorial Church building and adjacent grounds to the Greater Faith Cathedral with the following terms: sale price, \$450,000.00; down payment, \$100,000.00; balanced to be financed on a land contract at 11% annual interest, with monthly payments on principal and interest of \$3,500.00, with additional payments of \$50,000.00 on March 15, 1982 and March 15, 1983, with the entire balance of principal on land contract to be paid within five years from the date of closing.
- 2) It is recommended that the funds of the Ward Memorial Church be placed in escrow under the management of the Division of Business Affairs pending future recommendations of the Ward Memorial Administrative Commission, with the exception of expenses incurred and vouchered by the Commission in the process of administering the affairs of the Church.

The Stated Clerk presented a report on behalf of the Division of Business Affairs. A motion carried to recommend that the title to the property of the former Outer Drive Presbyterian Church be transferred to the corporation of the Trinity Community Presbyterian Church in a manner which is consistent with the provisions in the Form of Government of the United Presbyterian Church. U.S.A.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer and the Apostolic Benediction by the Moderator, Paul H. Sutton, at 5:10 p.m.

A motion carried to amend the minutes of the Adjourned Meeting of November 3, 1981 as follows: "Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission for the Trustees of the Presbytery to sell the house located at 16631 Princeton Street, Detroit, Michigan, and formerly occupied by the Reverend Frank duCille, to Leonardo and Joann Foustina for \$35,000.00 cash." A motion carried to approve the minutes of the meetings of October 27 and November 3 with the following correction: on page four, the special administrative commission to install John Yingling should include the name of William Saum in the place of William Schram.

A motion carried to approve the docket for this meeting with the following changes: the Division of Business Affairs will make a report, and the Department of Local Church Development will not be reporting at this meeting.

The Moderator appointed Betty Mullas, an elder of the host church, to serve as assistant to the Stated Clerk.

# Omnibus Motion (Paper B-1)

Upon motion, the following recommendations listed in the omnibus motion were adopted:

- 1) It is recommended that approval be given to an application from Kirk of Our Savior of Westland to the Program Agency of General Assembly for an energy-efficient loan of \$6,345.00 for 10 years at 3% annual interest.
- 2) It is recommended that Presbytery approve the revision of the land contract on the Shelby Township property with Peter Caruso and Norman Radebaugh, by adding the condition that, in addition to a principal payment of \$6,500.00 if a lot is sold, that there also be a payment of interest on that amount, and that the land contract be extended for 18 months.
- 3) It is recommended that a promissory note of \$12,000.00 made to Trinity Church, Detroit be cancelled, and that the Division of Business Affairs assume the obligation of paying the note from proceeds of the sale of the former St. Andrew's Church. These proceeds would have been available to the session of Trinity Church for the repayment of the loan, but the session is requesting that it be relieved entirely of responsibility for repayment.

The report of the Division of Business Affairs was presented by Dale Ihrie. A motion carried to approve the recommendation of the sale of the Covenant Church and property (with the exception of the pipe organ) to the Trinity Deliverance Church for the purchase price of \$115,000.00 with the following terms of sale: \$10,000.00 down payment at the closing, monthly payments on a land contract basis of at least \$1,000.00 including 10% interest over a ten-year period, and a balloon payment of the balanced owed on the principal after ten years.

A motion carried to approve the report of the Presbytery Council with the following changes: item eight was deleted; item nine should include the discharge of the special administrative commission to install Catherine McCloskey-Turner at Royal Oak, First United Church on November 22, 1981.

The report of the Division of Mission Support was presented by Robert Arnold.

The report of the 1982 Budget Committee was presented by David Sherwin. A motion carried to approve the budget as presented.

The report of the Division of Staff Services was presented by David Swinehart. A motion carried to approve the following financial terms for Presbytery Staff for 1982: Donald G. Lester - \$20,580 salary; \$13,700 housing; Edward M. Miller - \$16,742 salary, \$11,500 housing; Donald R. MacPherson - \$17,342 salary, \$10,900 housing; Henry C. Borchardt - \$19,770 salary, \$8,472 housing; Stanley M. Taylor - \$2,200 salary, \$2,200 housing.

The report of the Department of Program and Resource Development was presented by John Jeffrey.

The report of the Committee on Candidates was presented by Edward Pierson. Jennifer McLaren was introduced to the Presbytery, and she read her statement of motivation and influence. A motion carried to arrest her examination. Ruling elders Kathi Jerome and Ralph Spigerelli of the Northville Church spoke in support of Jennifer McLaren. A motion carried to sustain the examination and enroll Jennifer McLaren as a candidate of the Presbytery of Detroit.

The report of the Committee on Ministerial Relations was presented by Richard Milford.

- 1) A motion carried to concur with the congregation of the Jefferson Avenue Church in calling Peter Smith to be its pastor, effective January 15, 1982, with the following terms: \$22,000 salary, \$5,000 housing allowance, \$1,850 utilities, full pension, 2% medical escrow, \$3,600 car allowance, two weeks study leave, \$250 study allowance, one month vacation, \$375 pastor's fund, annual review, and moving expenses; forward the call to the Presbytery of Chicago, with the request that it be placed in Mr. Smith's hands and that he be dismissed to the Presbytery of Detroit; and enroll Mr. Smith upon receipt of his dismission. The Commission presented a motion containing a blank, as follows: That the Presbytery of Detroit settle with Central Northwest United Presbyterian Church by \_\_\_\_\_. The purpose of the blank was to allow the Presbytery to consider two options presented by the Comission and any additional options which might be presented from the floor. There were an additional two options to fill the blank. The first option prevailed, with a majority of 94 votes out of a total of 174 possible votes. Therefore, the motion carried that the Presbytery of Detroit dissolve the Central Northwest United Presbyterian Church, in accordance with Chapter XII, Section 8 (42.08) of The Form of Government and institute legal proceedings to retrieve control of the property and records of Central Northwest United Presbyterian Church, now controlled by the congregation calling itself "Central Northwest Presbyterian Church" or "Scotch Presbyterian Church".

The report of the Ward Memorial Administrative Commission was presented by its chairperson Gareth Baker.

The report of the Oakland Avenue Administrative Commission was presented by its chairperson Harry Geissinger. A motion carried to approve the following:

1) It is recommended that the responsibility of monitoring the financial terms

- of the settlement with the Oakland Avenue Church be lodged with the Division of Business Affairs.
- 2) It is recommended that Presbytery Council assume the responsibility for meeting with representatives of the Oakland Avenue Church in 1984 and 1986 to explore the possibility of reconciliation and reunion as arranged in the settlement agreement.
- 3) It is recommended that the Commission be discharged.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:35 with prayer and the Apostolic Benediction by the Moderator.

A motion carried to approve the minutes of the meeting of November 24, 1981. A motion carried to approve the docket for this meeting with the deletion of the reports of the Committee on Bills and Overtures and the Central Northwest Administrative Commission.

The Moderator appointed Donald White, an elder of the host church, to serve as assistant to the Stated Clerk.

The report of the Department of Program and Resource Development was presented by John Jeffrey.

The report of the Committee on Ministerial Relations was presented by Richard Milford. Catherine McCloskey-Turner was introduced to the Presbytery. A motion carried to adopt the report and approve the following recommendations:

- 1) It is recommended to concur with the congregation of the Wyandotte Church in calling Myron J. Kaufman, Jr. to be its pastor, effective May 2, 1982, with the following terms: \$20,000 salary, manse, \$1600 utilities, full pension, \$512 hospitalization, \$2400 car allowance, two weeks study leave, \$300 study allowance, one month vacation, annual review, moving expenses; forward the call to the Presbytery of Genesee Valley with the request that it be place in Mr. Kaufman's hands and that he be dismissed to the Presbytery of Detroit; and enroll Mr. Kaufman upon receipt of his dismission. Ruling elder Gretchen Nelson spoke in support of Mr. Kaufman. The Committee on Ministerial Relations reported that the provisions of the Form of Government, 40.01, 57.044, 57.046, and the provisions of the Presbytery's affirmative action and equal employment opportunity program have been fulfilled.
- 2) It is recommended to concur with the session of the First Church, Howell in calling Margaret G. Zedan to be its assistant pastor, effective March 1, 1982, with the following terms: \$14,100 salary, \$4800 housing allowance, full pension, 2% deductible medical, \$1350 car allowance, two weeks study leave, \$200 study allowance, one month vacation, annual review, moving expenses; forward the call

- to the Presbytery of Great Rivers with the request that it be placed in Miss Zedan's hands and that she be dismissed to the Presbytery of Detroit; and enroll Miss Zedan upon receipt of her dismission. Ruling elder Robert McBride spoke in support of Miss Zedan. The Committee on Ministerial Relations reported that the provisions of the Form of Government, 40.01, 57.044, 57.046, and the provisions of Presbytery's affirmative action and equal employment opportunity program have been fulfilled.
- 3) It is recommended to concur with the congregation of the Allen Park Church in calling Charles Harwood Shook, Jr. to become its associate pastor, effective January 1, 1982, with the following terms: \$15,300 salary, manse, utilities, including phone allowance of \$10 per month, full pension, Blue Cross/Blue Shield, \$1200 car allowance, two weeks study leave, \$200 study allowance, one month vacation, annual review; place the call in Mr. Shook's hands; elect the following special administrative commission: Ministers William Colwell, chairperson, William Schram, Charles Sommers, David Swinehart; Elders Joanne Higgins (Hope), Teddy Hinkamp (Birmingham, First), Gail Vos (Allen Park); and empower said commission to install Mr. Shook at the Allen Park Church on March 14, 1982 at 9 and 11 A.M. Ruling elder Stella Migliore spoke in support of Mr. Shook.
- 4) It is recommended to concur with the session of the Lakeshore Church, Port Huron in the establishment of a part-time interim pastoral relationship with Lloyd G. Brasure, effective January 10, 1982, for a period of three months with the following monthly terms: \$400 salary, \$400 housing allowance, \$400 car allowance; that Mr. Brasure be appointed moderator of the session.
- 5) It is recommended that Presbytery approve an extension of part-time interim contracts to April 30, 1982 for the following: David Abbott Covenant, East Detroit, Robert Craghead Trinity, Detroit, and James Conley Dearborn Woods.

A motion carried to release \$12,000 from the sale of the Eastminster manse and liquid assets available at the time of the dissolution of that church to the session of the Grosse Pointe Woods Church for a youth ministry to be conducted at Faith Lutheran Church in the Jefferson Chalmers Community as specified in the session's proposal dated December 1, 1981. A motion carried to approve the report of the Record and Review Committee with the exception of Lakeland, Waterford, which is being checked for accuracy. (See Pages 212-215)

The report of the Department of Presbytery Ministries was presented by Susan Carlson.

#### Omnibus Motion

Upon motion, the following recommendations were adopted:

- 1) It is recommended that the First Presbyterian Church of Dearborn be given permission to sell the property known as Les Cheneaux Park Cottages, located at Cedarville, Michigan to Paul E. Nelson and Associates, for the following terms: sale price \$150,000; down payment \$20,000; balance to be financed on a land contract at 9% interest; with annual payments of \$13,000; entire balance to be paid within ten years from date of sale, and that this permission be retroactive to September 15, 1979.
- 2) It is recommended that approval be given to an amendment to the lease with Westminster Church for the rental of Presbytery office space, in which the monthly rent from May 1, 1981 to May 1, 1982 will be \$1,647.
- 3) It is recommended that the Sashabaw Church be given permission to offer for sale on the open market two lots for a total asking price of \$31,000.

With an amendment changing "six months" to "twenty-four months," the following motion carried: It is recommended that the Geneva Church of Canton be granted a moratorium on the payment of principal on its loans from Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly for a period of twenty-four months, beginning November, 1981.

A motion carried to correct the minutes of the meeting of October 27, 1981 with the inclusion of the following two actions taken during that meeting but inadvertantly omitted from the record:

- 1) It is recommended to concur with the session of the Port Huron, Westminster Church to establish a part-time interim pastoral relationship with Ernest W. Dunn, effective October 27, 1981 for a period of six months with the following terms: \$150 per week for two days per week, with additional days as necessary at the rate of \$75 per day, 20 cents per mile travel allowance, motel and meal expenses in Port Huron; further that Mr. Dunn be appointed moderator of the session.
- 2) It is recommended that the status of Honorable Retirement be granted to William McLeister, effective October 27, 1981.

The report of the Division of Business Affairs was presented by Stated Clerk, Stanley M. Taylor. A motion carried to concur in the purchase of the house at 4965 Lakeshore Rd., Fort Gratiot Township, St. Clair County, Michigan from Paul Andress for the amount of \$52,333.33.

A motion carried to adopt the report of Presbytery Council (see Paper B-2) and to approve the following recommendations:

- That the per capita apportionment be defined as follows: The per capita apportionment of The Presbytery of Detroit is for administrative expenses of the Presbytery and for ecclesiastical expenses for responsibilities of the Presbytery as they are defined in the Form of Government.
- 2) That the Structure Committee prepare amendments to the Bylaws of Presbytery to establish a special Budget Committee.
- 3) That Council appoint a special 1983 Budget Committee to begin immediately the budget process which has been approved by the Council and adopted by Presbytery in this report.

A motion to limit the legal costs of the Central Northwest Administrative Commission to \$2.50 was referred to that Administrative Commission.

A report of the Division of Mission Support was presented by Mary Younkin.

The report of the Ward Memorial Administrative Commission was presented by Gareth Baker. A motion carried to receive its report and to adopt its recommendations as follows:

- 1) It is recommended to approve the following terms of settlement mutually-agreed upon with the Community Fellowship Church as of January 26, 1982:
  - a) That the Presbytery of Detroit deed to the Community Fellowship a residence at 22526 Kendall Avenue, Detroit, Michigan, appraised at Real Estate One at a fair market value of \$32,000.
  - b) That the Presbytery of Detroit give to the Community Fellowship a number of items of furniture, and equipment including a 1973 Ford van, all of which were physically in the possession of the members of the Community Fellowship on December 15, 1981.
  - c) That the Presbytery of Detroit underwrite the expense of retiring a mortgage in the amount of \$6,000 on the property known as 22526 Kendall Avenue, Detroit, Michigan.
  - d) That the Presbytery of Detroit pay the incorporated group known as the Community Fellowship a sum of \$39,000, payable annually on the date of this proposal according to the following schedule: Year 1 \$9,000; Year 2 \$15,000; Year 3 10,000; Year 4 \$5,000.
- 2) It is recommended to monitor and implement the agreement with the Community Fellowship Church and all other assets of the Ward Memorial Church through the Division of Business Affairs.
- 3) It is recommended to approve that all expenses of the Ward Memorial Administrative Commission be paid out of the funds of the proceeds and assets from the dissolution of the Ward Memorial Church.
- 4) It is recommended that after expenses of the Ward Memorial Administrative Commission have been paid, and any other expenses relative to the dissolution of the Ward Memorial Church have been paid, that all other funds and assets be placed in the Presbytery reserves to be used for a revolving loan fund to assist all churches or clergy in the presbytery as needed at low interest rates.
- 5) It is recommended to keep on file for a period of two years the names of any members of the Ward Memorial Church who have not yet been transferred to another church until such time as they are transferred by the Presbytery, or two years are up. It is further recommended that the Presbytery of Detroit contact any persons who are still valid members of the Ward Memorial Church and urge them to transfer to another congregation. This should be done again for any who have not transferred after one year, and again after two years.

- 6) It is recommended to dissolve the Ward Memorial Church as of January 26, 1982.
- 7) It is recommended to dismiss the Ward Memorial Administrative Commission. A motion carried to extend the docket by fifteen minutes, and again by ten minutes. A motion carried to record the thanks of the Presbytery to the members of the Ward Memorial Administrative Commission for their hard, conscientious work.

The report of the Executive Presbyter was presented by Donald Lester.

The report of the Detroit Presbyterial Association was presented by Lois Poston.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:00 with prayer and the Apostolic Benediction by the Moderator.

A motion carried to approve the minutes of the meeting of January 26, 1982, with an addition to the report of the Session Records Review Committee by noting that the minutes of Christ Memorial Church, Royal Oak are approved without exception A motion carried to approve the docket for this meeting with the deletion of the reports of the Division of Staff Services and the Department of Local Church Development.

The Moderator appointed Donald White, an elder of the host church, to serve as assistant to the Stated Clerk.

A motion carried to excuse the members of the Administrative Commission for the Central Northwest Church for twenty minutes.

#### Omnibus Motion

Upon motion, the following recommendations were adopted:

- 2) It is recommended that the Presbytery approve the following plan of the Celtic Cross Church to erect an addition to its present church building and to remodel its present structure: total cost of the project is \$200,000, which is to be financed as follows:

\$20,000. loan from Synod for 5 years at 9% interest

50,000. loan from Presbytery

65,000. loan from a commercial bank for 5 years, which includes a request to the Program Agency of the General Assembly for an interest support loan 65,000. cash on hand, or as needed, or already spent

It is recommended that Presbytery loan to the Celtic Cross Church from its capital fund the amount of \$50,000 as it is vouchered by the church, that the loan be for four years at 9% interest (annual), that no payments be made on principal or interest during the first year, that at least one-third of the annual amount of interest be paid during the second year, that at least twothirds of the annual amount of interest be paid during the third year, that all of the amount of annual interest be paid during the fourth year, that the principal amount and accrued interest be due at the end of the fourth year, or upon the proposed sale of adjacent land, whichever comes first, and that an extension of this loan be negotiable at the end of the four-year period.

3) It is recommended that the communicant membership of the Port Huron, Westminster Church as of December 31, 1980 be adjusted from 210 to 189, and that the per capita apportionment in the amount of \$892.08 be received by the Presbytery on the basis of the adjusted figure.

A motion carried to commend the staff of <u>Communique</u>, especially for the issues on peacemaking and on alcohol abuse. A further motion carried to extend to Dennis Shoemaker and the other <u>Communique</u> and synod staff our sympathy at the recent death of Mary Shoemaker

#### PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

#### Treasurer's Report for Fiscal Year 1980

## June 23, 1981

The Treasurer of the Presbytery is herewith presenting a narrative summary of the auditors' report for the fiscal year 1980. The Trustees of the Presbytery engaged a new firm of auditors: McEndarffer, Hoke and Bernhard. The auditors presented their report to the Trustees on March 20, 1981, and have certified that the statements in their report present accurately the financial transactions of the Presbytery for the year 1980 and the financial position of the various funds of the Presbytery as of December 31, 1980.

The report consists of 1) the balance sheet, 2) the statement of income and disbursements, 3) the statement of changes in fund balances, and 4) the statement of changes in financial position.

The accounting system of the Presbytery is set up in four funds: the Program Fund, the Capital Fund, the Special Fund and the Trustees Fund.


The income for the Program Fund is primarily from the General Mission giving of our churches (\$286,732, up \$33,563 from 1979); from the Per Capita Apportionment (86,672, up \$24,679 from 1979); grants from Synod and General Assembly (\$164,531, up \$13,921 from 1979). Expenses of the Program Fund are essentially for Presbytery staff and supporting services (\$305,630), for the Council and its Divisions (\$47,288) and for the Departments of the Presbytery (\$454,106). Total income for the Program Fund was \$1,012,397; total expenses were \$1,173,197, leaving a deficit for the year of \$160,800. Offsetting this deficit the Program Fund had transfers of \$46,817 from the Major Mission Fund and \$133,071 from the Trustees Fund, for a total of \$179,888. The Fund balance on December 31, 1980 was \$94,934, up \$19,088 from 1979.

The Capital Fund consists entirely of income and disbursements used for capital purposes. The Fund does not have income in the ordinary sense. Revenues in 1980 were received from interest income (\$112,865) and income from the sale of property (\$172,299). Several loans were made to churches during 1980 from the Capital Fund and appear in the Balance Sheet under Notes Receivable. The balance in the Fund on December 31, 1980 was \$1,415,201. The Fund had assets of \$4,580,834 and liabilities of \$3,165,633. The assets were up \$341,821 from 1979 and the liabilities were up \$103,268. The Fund balance was up \$238,553. The actual cash in the Capital Fund, in terms of checking and savings accounts, on December 31, 1980 was \$6,157, down \$120,769. Most of the balance in the Fund consists of Notes Receivable from churches.

The Special Fund has a few designated items (for example, income from the sale of St. Andrew's Church, which is designated for use of capital projects at Trinity Community Church) and is the Fund in which accounting is kept of the Major Mission Fund. The balance in the Special Fund on December 31, 1980 was \$204,626, down \$26,377 from 1979.

The Trustees Fund consists entirely of investments of funds which are specially designated in bequests: the James Joy Fund, the Ranney-Balch Fund, the Connor Fund and the McKay Fund. For some of these funds the Trustees act as a fiduciary agent for entities other than the Presbytery. For example, the Trustees disburse funds regularly to Fort Street Church, to the YMCA and the YWCA and to the other presbyteries in Michigan. As of December 31, 1980 the Trustees had cash investments of \$166,397 and stocks and bonds with a value of \$3,854,302. The auditors value stocks at their cash price or at market value, whichever is lower. The Trustees had liabilities of \$70,958, for a fund balance of \$4,083,656, down \$17,738 from 1979.

A motion carried to approve the minutes of the meeting of February 23, 1982, as distributed. A motion carried to approve the docket for this meeting with the addition of a five minute report by Kenneth Kettlewell on his recent visit to the White House and the deletion of the report of the Department of Local Church Development.

The Moderator appointed Alvin Holden, an elder of the host church, to serve as assistant to the Stated Clerk.

## Omnibus Motion

Upon motion, the following recommendations were adopted:

1) It is recommended that approval be given to the application of the Geneva Church of Canton for an Energy/Handicap Loan from the Program Agency of \$15,000 for ten years at 7% interest, and that the Geneva Church be given permission to borrow from a commercial source an amount not to exceed \$10,000 at 13% interest.

- 2) It is recommended that Presbytery concur in the request of the Southminster Church of Taylor for a three year moratorium of the payment of principal and interest on Program Agency Loan No. 1375. Balance due on the loan is \$46,175.00 with accrued interest of \$4,868.00 and past due principal of \$4,758.00
- 3) It is recommended that Presbytery concur in the request of the Lakeshore Church of Port Huron for a one year moratorium on the payment of principal on Program Agency Loans Nos. 1-11-085105, 1-11-086703 and 1-25-004502. The balances on these loans are, respectively, \$8,815.00, \$19,093.00 and \$25,000.00.
- 4) It is recommended that the Presbytery concur in the request of the Crossroads Church of Walled Lake for a three year moratorium on the payment of principal on Program Agency Loan No. 1-11-122, on which the balance is \$24,784.00
- 5) It is recommended that the Presbytery seek an agreement with the Synod of the Covenant concerning a 50 Million Fund loan made to the Crossroads Church, as follows: it is agreed that the amount of the loan is \$25,000.00; it is agreed that the intent of the First Church of Pontiac to contribute \$5,000.00 toward payment of the loan be honored; it is agreed that there be a three year moratorium on payment of principal of the loan; it is agreed that during the three years the church will pay 3% interest on the loan; it is agreed that at the end of the three year period an amortization schedule for repayment of the loan will be negotiated.
- 6) It is recommended that the Presbytery loan to the Lincoln Park Church from its Capital Fund, the amount of \$8,000.00 for five years at 9% interest. The purpose of the loan is for major roof repair and for some miscellaneous improvements.
- 7) It is recommended that the Westminster Church of Detroit be given permission to sell a piece of property located in the Township of Bois Blanc in Mackinaw County to Patricia Egan for \$20,000.00, and that this permission be retroactive to October 19, 1981.
- 8) It is recommended that the Drayton Plains Church be given permission to sell or raze a building adjacent to the church, formerly used as a manse, it being understood that no land is being sold and that the purchaser will move the house to another site or dismantle it.
- 9) It is recommended that the Redford Church be given permission to sell 100 burial spaces at White Chapel Cemetery in Troy.
- 10) It is recommended that the Presbytery attest to the Building Fund Committee of the Program Agency the following grant mortgages, as of December 31, 1981: Ann Arbor, Calvary 6,000 St. John's .5,000 8,000 12,500 Dearborn Woods East Detroit, Covenant 29,050 495 Calvin West Garden City 10,000 Evergreen Village 6,500 Winchester Village Grandale Church of the Master 30,000 Livonia, St. Paul's 10,000 Monteith 9,000 Royal Oak, Christ Memorial 10,000 Upon motion, the Erin Church of Roseville was removed from the list.

A motion carried to adopt the report of the Presbytery Council as follows: At its meeting on April 13, 1982, the Council of the Presbytery of Detroit took the following actions:

- 1) Coopted Gordon Irvine and Theodore Taylor as members of the Council.
- 2) Approved publication of the Bylaws of Presbytery in the 1983 edition of the Presbytery Directory.
- 3) Approved the appointment of Jean Lennox to fill the vacancy on the Synod Mission Council caused by the resignation of Robert McCreight.
- 4) Dissolved the associate pastoral relationship between Howard Warren and the First Church of Pontiac and dismissed Mr. Warren to the Presbytery of Whitewater Valley, effective May 1, 1982.
- 5) Elected the following administrative commission to install Peter Smith as pastor of the Jefferson Avenue Church: ministers--William Colwell, Gordon Irvine, Drew Nagle; elders--Edward Rosella (Jefferson Avenue), Barbara Madarasz (Grosse Pointe Memorial), Peggy Lee (St. John's); and Herbert Anderson (Presbytery of New York City) and John Bellingham (Presbytery of Chicago) as corresponding members of the commission.

- 6) Authorized the Division of Business Affairs to make its April report directly to the Presbytery.
- 7) Dissolved the Administrative Commission to install Charles Shook, Jr. as associate pastor of the Allen Park Church.
- 8) Changed the date of the June meeting of Council from June 8 to June 1, 1982.
- 9) Dissolved the Administrative Commission to install Peter Smith as pastor of the Jefferson Avenue Church, Detroit.

The report of the Division of Mission Support was presented by Theodore Taylor.

The report of the Committee on the Plan of Reunion was presented by Stanley M. Taylor.

The Annual Report of the Stated Clerk was presented in written form by Stanley M. Taylor (see Paper F-1 attached).

A motion carried to adopt the Equalization of Elder Commissioners as set forth on Paper F-1 (attached).

The report of the Department of Program and Resource Development was presented by John Jeffrey.

The report of the Committee on Candidates was presented by Ruth Kirkman. Lee Pruett was introduced to the Presbytery and she read her statement of motivation and influence. A motion carried to arrest her examination. A motion carried to sustain the examination and to enroll Lee Pruett as a candidate for the gospel ministry of the Presbytery of Detroit. Craig Jonathan Lindsey was introduced to the Presbytery, and he read his statement of motivation and influence. A motion carried to arrest his examination. A motion carried to sustain the examination and enroll Craig Lidsey as a candidate for the gospel ministry of the Presbytery of Detroit. The Moderator proceeded to receive Lee Pruett and Craig Lindsey as candidates under the care of the Presbytery.

The report of the Committee on Ministerial Relations was presented by Richard Milford. Margaret Zedan was introduced to the Presbytery by Jean Lennox. A motion carried to receive the report and to adopt the following recommendations:

- 1) It is recommended to concur with the congregation of the Faith Church, St. Clair Shores to dissolve the pastoral relationship with Richard C. Smith; approve the call of the First Presbyterian Church, Marion, Indiana to Richard C. Smith; dismiss Mr. Smith to the Presbytery of Whitewater Valley, effective May 1, 1982; appoint Joseph MacDonald as moderator of the Session; and authorize the Session with the aid, advice and consent of the Committee on Ministerial Relations to secure temporary supplies for its pulpit. Ruling elders Donald Preston and Frances Morris spoke in appreciation of Mr. Smith, and the call was placed in his hands.
- 2) It is recommended to concur with the congregation of the First Church, Northville in calling John L. Mishler to become its associate pastor, effective May 1, 1982, with the following terms: \$13,800 salary, \$5,535 housing allowance, full pension, \$386.70 hospitalization, \$2,200 car allowance, two weeks' study leave, \$200 study allowance, one month's vacation, annual review; elect the following special administrative commission: Ministers Lawrence Chamberlain, chairperson, George Jerome, Lawrence McMellen; Elders Linda Crawford (Novi, Faith), Peggy Meyer (Northville), Mary Sawyer (Plymouth), and empower said commission to install Mr. Mishler, May 2, 1982, 11 a.m. at First Church, Northville. Ruling elder Peggy Meyer spoke in support of Mr. Mishler, and the call was placed in his hands.
- 3) It is recommended to concur with the congregation of the First Church, Plymouth in calling Thomas H. It was noted that the names of the Rev. Stanton Wilson and Elder Norman Parkins have been removed from the list of elected commissioners of the Presbytery of Detroit to the 194th General Assembly. After a call for nominations from the floor, a motion carried to elect Elder Ruth Allaben as Recording Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit.

The report of the Committee on Bills and Overtures was presented by Henry Stenner. A motion carried to adopt the recommendations of the Bills and Overtures Committee and vote affirmatively on Overtures F, H, K, and P, and to cast a negative vote on Overture M. The voting was on each overture seriatim. A motion carried to overture the 194th General Assembly to adopt a position that all United Presbyterian pastors, associate pastors and assistant pastors are considered to be self-employed for the purpose of filing Federal income tax reports and to urge its agencies and boards to observe that position. A motion carried to overture the 194th General Assembly to establish a special committee of the Mission Council or of an agency of the General Assembly to study our denomination's position regarding public education in light of the realities of our day; that this committee be composed of educators, laypeople and clergy and that this committee be instructed to collect data, to assess our historic positions and to recommend future positions regarding elementary and secondary education; and further, that this committee be instructed to report to the General Assembly meeting in 1983. A motion carried to overture the 194th General Assembly to direct that presbyteries in high areas of employemnt shall establish committees on relocation composed of knowledgeable persons to publish basic resource information about economic opportunities and relocation information and to encourage and organize host churches or host families to provide Christian care and support for families or single adults seeking relocation; and presbyteries in high areas of unemployment shall establish similar corresponding committees to assist individuals or families considering relocation, this committee to maintain resource information and provide appropriate vocational and supportive counseling in order to enable those who wish to relocate, opportunity to make a smooth transition; and further, the Program Agency of the General Assembly be instructed to put into motion the aforementioned program for relocation and to assist presbyteries in their development of it (see Paper C-12 attached).

The report of the Executive Presbyter was presented by Donald G. Lester.

A report recognizing the 300th anniversary of the ordination of Francis Makemie was presented by Frank Marvin.

A report on the April 13, 1982 White House luncheon for church and community leaders was presented by Kenneth Kettlewell.

The report of the Central Northwest Administrative Commission was presented by Edward Koster. Upon it recommendation, the Moderator ruled out of order the motion of January 26, 1982, limiting the legal costs of the Central Northwest Administrative Commission to \$2.50.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:40 with prayer and the Apostolic Benedication by the Moderator.

## Annual Report of the Stated Clerk

# Based on the Statistical Report to General Assembly

# April 27, 1982

The following statistical summary of the annual report of the Presbytery of Detroit to the General Assembly is presented in fulfillment of the requirement that the Stated Clerk report annually on the spiritual health of the Presbytery. The only objective diagnosis of presbyterian health is contained in the statistics which the churches present.

Statistics, of course, do not tell the human story of a congregation, the quality of lay leadership, the devotion of volunteers, the joys, successes, traumas and disappointments that are the flesh and spirit which clothe the figures. But no one person knows the full living-color story of all our congregations; perhaps no one really knows the whole story of even one church.

Therefore, the safest and most reliable approach to an annual assessment of our spiritual health is to analyze the statistical report, which has been submitted to the Office of the General Assembly, to be published with the reports of all the other presbyteries of our great denomination. That wonderful volume, labelled "General Assembly Minutes, Part II," contains a record of our pulse, our heart beat, our blood count. What follows is an attempt to make sense of the laboratory report for the year ending December 31, 1981.

I have isolated seven elements of our spiritual health. The first is gains and losses in membership. We are declining, becoming weaker year by year. Our loss was 7,402 members. A significant part of this loss was due to our withdrawing churches. These accounted for a total of 5,221 persons. Of our 97 churches, 57 had a net loss and only 40 had a net gain. The largest recorded loss was that of the Jefferson Avenue Church--509 members--and the largest gain was made by the Grosse Pointe Woods Church--61 members. Ann Arbor, First and Warren, First each gained 57 members. The Jefferson Avenue loss was due to a "cleaning of the rolls." This indication of ill health is dealt with under element no. 3. The obvious conclusion is that unless we can convert the Presbytery net loss into a net gain we will diminish into extinction. We need to give the highest priority to church growth. We need to resolve that our Lord is not honored by these losses to his Body. Efforts are now under way in our Presbytery to seek from our sessions commitments to church growth. But the illness is acute and the remedy is not easily ingested.

Gains in membership by profession of faith is an important measure of spiritual health. Receiving members by letters of transfer is not unimportant, but it does not add to the total strength of the Church. Only conversion can add new members to the Body of Christ. In this second test of health or illness, I have shown for each congregation the per centage of gains in profession of faith to the total membership of the church. The congregations with the best lab report in this area are St. Timothy's in Livonia, 13.3%, First Church of Warren, 11.6%

and White Lake Church, 11%. The following churches received no one into membership by profession of faith: Northside, Ann Arbor; Broadstreet, Trumbull Avenue; Westminster, Port Huron; and the First Church of Wayne.

The third measure is losses in membership other than by transfer of membership or by death. These "other" losses are usually a "cleaning of the rolls." Unfortunately, this needs to be done on a more or less regular basis. When large numbers are removed it can be an indication that not very good care has been taken of the church roll for some period of time. Most losses by "others" are comparable to losses by death. The persons who have been removed from the roll have "died to Christ." They are an absolute loss, a sort of surgical removal. The Jefferson Avenue Church reported the largest number --478. Redford lost 311. The congregations which reported no losses in this column are the Sashabaw Church, Broadstreet, Calvary, Trinity, Woodward Avenue Church of the Covenant, Lincoln Park, Northville, Atonement, Pontiac, First and Lakeshore in Port Huron, Christ Memorial in Royal Oak, Faith in St. Clair Shores and Church of our Savior in West Bloomfield.

Adult baptisms are an important measure of spiritual health. They are professions of faith. An adult conversion is the conscious winning of a new person to the Body. The First Church of Ann Arbor and the Southfield Korean Church both reported 20 adult baptisms. First Church of Detroit reported 15 and First Church of Royal Oak had 14. Thirty-one congregations recorded no adult baptisms.

The fifth measure of spiritual health is an accounting of stewardship. It is a lab report on how well the session of that church did in encouraging its members to give of their substance to the Lord. Column 5 in this report shows giving from living sources (column 16 in the General Assembly Minutes) on a per capita basis for each church. The churches which reported the healthiest records are Trumbull Avenue, 534.91; Northside of Ann Arbor, 498.73; Belleville, 441.36; Leitch Memorial, 416.31; First of Wayne, 413.63; and Calvin East, 401.27. Congregations which reported giving from living donors at less than 150.00 per member per year are: Ypsilanti, First--146.54, Lincoln Park--132.21 and Erin of Roseville--104.40. The Presbytery per capita was 237.46.

There is an important index of spiritual health which measures the commitment of a congregation to mission. What is the strength of support for the mission program carried on by the Church at large? The most effective way to measure this health statistic is to take the total giving to mission of the congregation as a proportion of its regular contributions. What per centage of its income did the church give to mission: These figures are shown in column 6 of this report. It adds the data in the General Assembly Statistics in columns 26, 27, 28, 29 and 30 and divides the total by the amount in column 16. The highest per centages are reported by Southfield United-31.0, First Church of Detroit-28.9 and Drayton Plains-26.4. Less than 3% was reported by these congregations: Kirk of our Savior, Westland-2.9, Church of our Saviour, West Bloomfield-2.1, Erin of Roseville-2.1, St. Johns and Southminster of Taylor--1.6, Dearborn Woods--1.5, Lakeshore of Port Huron--1.3, Leitch Memorial--.4 and Woodward/Covenant--0. The per centage for the Presbytery was 14.1.

The seventh, and last, measure of spiritual health is the one which is likely to call out the stoutest defense. It is the amount which a congregation gives to non-Presbyterian mission as compared with Presbyterian mission. Let us grant two things: that giving to any Christian mission program is meritorious and that mission giving is voluntary. But do we not have the right to assume that a session should

give serious consideration to the mission program of its own United Presbyterian Church? Should not Presbyterians give first priority to Presbyterian mission? Sessions may favor programs other than those which are sponsored by Presbytery, Synod or General Assembly, but should they not give attention to the fact that Presbyterian programs are planned and approved and monitored and reported upon by Presbyterians? The Presbytery mission budget is adopted by commissioners representing all of our congregations; the Synod and General Assembly budgets are approved by persons elected by the presbyteries. It seems reasonable to consider the ratio of non-Presbyterian giving to Presbyerian giving as a measure of the health of our whole Church Body. Column 7 in our report is the amount in column 30 (non-related UPCUSA mission giving) divided by the total of columns 26, 27, 28 and 29 (UPCUSA mission giving). First, there are thirty-nine of our congregations which give only to Presbyterian mission. There are four churches which give more to non-Presbyterian mission than to Presbyterian mission: Westminster Church of Port Huron gives almost eight times as much to non-Presbyterian mission. Westminster of Ann Arbor gives 109.7%, Sterling Heights gives 145.5% and First Church of Troy gives 126.8%. The Presbytery as a whole gives about one-fourth of its mission funds to non-Presbyerian programs.

This overview of the spiritual health of the Presbytery will have value to the extent that it leads us to seek prescriptions and actions which will strengthen our tissues and organs at their weak points and increase our health at our strong points, and to the extent that it leads us to make full use of the means for growth which are already at hand.

On page 7, add the following new Section 5: Department of Mission Support [the new section will actually appear on page 8, beginning with line 1]: "Section 5: Department of Mission Support

A. The Department of Mission Support shall be composed of the following persons elected by Presbytery:

Chairperson, nominated by Presbytery	1
At-large members nominated by Presbytery	21
Area members (six from each area) nominated	
by the Areas	30
Total number of members of the Department	<u>52</u>

- B. The Department of Mission Support shall be responsible for interpretation and support of the total mission of the Church and for its promotion to the churches in the Presbytery.
- C. The Department of Mission Support shall be responsible for the following specific duties: (1) to coordinate efforts of communication about all mission; (2) to interpret and promote study of mission materials and resources; (3) to coordinate mission funding efforts; (4) to work with the United Presbyterian Foundation; promote deferred giving; (5) to assign, coordinate and promote mission speakers and mission support events."

On page 8, Chapter VI - Presbytery Council; <u>Section 1: Composition</u>; change line 19 - "Department Chairpersons (with vote" from 4 to 5; change line 20 - "Division Chairpersons (with vote)" from 4 to 3.

On page 10, Chapter VII - Divisions of Presbytery Council Delete: "Section 3: Division of Mission Support"; lines 35 to 49 and renumber two succeeding sections on "Division of Staff Services" and "Division of Business Affairs" from 4 and 5 to 3 and 4.

On page 16, Chapter XIV - Nominating Procedure, Section 2, paragraph E, on offices and positions to be elected by Presbytery, on Line 43, "The chairpersons of each of the four Presbytery Departments," change "four" to "five." Line 48 - Division chairpersons: delete "Mission Support."

On page 17, Section F - nomination of persons by Area Assemblies: Add new line 30: "Mission Support Department" and renumber succeeding lines.

Proposed amendment of Bylaws to implement proposal for a new Budget Committee:

Chapter IX - Delete present title and substitute the following title: "Special Committees"

Line 8 - Amend as follows: "Section 1 - Committee on Presbytery Bylaws and Structure"

Lines 10 and 14: Delete "Special Committee on Presbytery Structure" and substitute the following: "A Committee on Presbytery Bylaws and Structure"

Lines 16 and 18: Delete "and/or" and substitute "or"

Add a new Section 2, as follows:

"Section 2 - Budget Committee

"There shall be a Budget Committee consisting of six persons, who shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected annually for three year terms by the Presbytery, in such a way that there shall be three classes of two persons each, with one class to be elected each year, except that in the first year six persons shall be elected, two for one year, two for two years and two for three years. No person may serve on the Budget Committee for more than six consecutive years.

"The chairperson of the Budget Committee shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by Presbytery annually and may not serve as chairperson for more than three consecutive years.

- "A. The Budget Committee shall be responsible for implementing a complete budget process, which has been approved by Council and which shall continue in effect until and unless amended by action of the Council. The budget process shall be presented for information at each January meeting of the Presbytery.
- "B. The Budget Committee shall report regularly to Council and directly to Presbytery, either for purposes of information or for recommendations for action."

Amend Chapter XIV - Nominating Procedure, Section 2, paragraph E, subsection (10), as follows: "(10) A Committee on Presbytery Bylaws and Structure consisting of five persons."

Insert a new subsection (11), as follows:
"(11) Members and chairperson of Budget Committee, as provided in Chapter IX."

Renumber present subsection (11) and subsection (12).


Whereas property taxes are used in part to support the public educational system and that taxation is often the last opportunity many communities have to voice disapproval of the increase in taxes; and

Whereas the quality of education has suffered markedly and drastically in recent years:

Be it resolved that the Presbytery of Detroit respectfully overtures the 194th General Assembly to establish a special committee of the Mission Council or of an agency of the General Assembly to study our denomination sposition regarding public education in light of the realities of our day.

Be it further resolved, that this committee be composed of educators, laypeople and clergy and that this committee be instructed to collect data, to assess our historic positions and to recommend future positions regarding elementary and secondary education;

Be it further resolved, that this committee be instructed to report to the General Assembly meeting in 1983.



THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT MEETING AT CALVIN UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, DETROIT, MICHIGAN ON APRIL 27, 1982 RESPECTFULLY OVERTURES THE 194TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY (1982), OF THE UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, MEETING IN HARTFORD, CONNECTICUT.

Whereas the Internal Revenue Service has issued a ruling, referred to as Revenue Ruling 80-110, which has caused a great deal of confusion among ministers and tax consultants as to whether ministers are considered to be employed or are self-employed for the purpose of filing Federal income tax reports; and

Whereas the Internal Revenue Service's ruling is ambiguous, and, we think, intentionally so, since it can be read in two different ways: 1) that all ministers are employees of their churches and not self-employed, 2) that some ministers are employed and some are self-employed; and

Whereas The Presbytery of Detroit has made considerable effort to determine the meaning and effect of Revenue Ruling 80-110, including recourse to the following persons or companies: a lawyer who specializes in income taxes for a highly respected Detroit legal firm, the firm which audits the financial records of The Presbytery of Detroit, and the firm of Price Waterhouse & Co.; and

Whereas all of these sources agree that Revenue Ruling 80-110 should be interpreted to mean that some ministers may be employed by their churches and others may be self-employed, and

Whereas the Internal Revenue Service does not have the authority to define "employment" and "self-employment", only Congress has that authority; and

Whereas "employment" and "self-employment" are defined in the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, Section 31.3401 (c) - 1 (b) and Internal Revenue Ruling 80-110 does not in any way change those definitions; and

Whereas The Presbytery of Detroit, after careful deliberation, has adopted a position that all of its pastors, associate pastors and assistant pastors are considered to be self-employed persons and are urged to file their federal income tax reports as such; and

Whereas, since all United Presbyterian pastors, associate pastors and assistant pastors are called and serve under the same conditions, and it is important to have a consistent Church-wide position in such an important matter,

Therefore The Presbytery of Detroit overtures the 194th General Assembly to adopt a position that all United Presbyterian pastors, associate pastors and assistant pastors are considered to be self-employed for the purpose of filing Federal income tax reports and to urge its agencies and boards to observe that position.

Whereas we have been explicitly taught to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, visit those in prison, etc.; and

Whereas our own worshipbook includes a prayer for the unemployed with the words "May we never neglect the unemployed" and "May we shape a world in which no child goes hungry, and every man contributes to the good of all."; and

Whereas the unemployment rate is approximately twice that of the national average in some states, such as Michigan, and very low in other states; and

Whereas workers in states with high unemployment are facing or have already faced layoffs, expiration of unemployment compensation, forced early retirement and lack of work opportunities at their present locations; and

Whereas The United Presbyterian Church is a connectional church and already has a communication system that is nation wide in scope; and

Whereas The United Presbyterian Church has the means with which to assist unemployed people in the relocation process; and

Whereas there is a need to utilize the skills of those who are knowledgeable about employment opportunities and economics in high employment areas; and

Whereas Presbyterian congregations reflect a constituancy that includes representatives of business and industry, local institutions of higher learning, government workers involved with state employment security commissions and vocational rehabilitation, social workers, etc

Whereas the United Presbyterian Church has experienced a process of relocation in the placing of refugees throughout the country (i.e. "boat people") through which has been provided Christian care and support, assisting families in the location of employment, housing and church support:

Be it resolved that the Presbytery of Detroit respectfully overtures the General Assembly to direct that

Presbyteries in high areas of employment shall establish committees on relocation composed of knowledgeable persons to publish basic resource information about economic opportunities and relocation information and to encourage and organize host churches and/or host families to provide Christian care and support for families or single adults seeking relocation;

and

Presbyteries in high areas of unemployment shall establish similar corresponding committees to assist individuals and or families considering relocation. This committee to maintain resource information and provide appropriate vocational and supportive counseling in order to enable those who wish to relocate, opportunity to make a smooth transition;

and

The Program Agency of the General Assembly be instructed to put into motion the aforementioned program for relocation and to assist Presbyteries in their development of it.

A motion carried to approve the docket for this meeting with the following changes: addition of the Audit Report to the Report of the Council; addition of five minutes to the report of the Executive Presbyter; and deletion of the reports of the Budget Committee, the Structure Committee, and the Central Northwest Administrative Commission.

The Moderator appointed Barbara Madarasz, an elder of the host church, to serve as assistant to the Stated Clerk.

The report of the Department of Presbytery Ministries was presented by Susan Carlson. The annual report of the Presbyterian Village, Inc. was presented by Leroy J. Peterson.

The report of the Department of Program and Resource Development was presented by John Jeffrey. A motion carried to receive the "Manual for Church Treasurers."

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The report of the Ministerial Relations Committee was presented by Richard Milford. Myron Kaufman was introduced to the Presbytery by Richard Peters. Motions carried to adopt the following recommendations:

- 1) It is recommended to concur with the congregation of the Trinity Community Church in calling DeWitt McIntyre as pastor, effective August 1, 1982, with the following terms: \$13,320 salary, \$5,670 housing allowance, \$1,716 utilities, full pension, 2% deductible hospitalization, \$2,240 car allowance, two weeks' study leave, \$300 study allowance, one month's vacation, annual review, moving expenses; to forward the call to the Presbytery of Northeast Florida with the request that it be placed in Mr. McIntyre's hands and that he be dismissed to the Presbytery of Detroit; and to enroll Mr. McIntyre upon receipt of his dismission. A motion carried to sustain the examination and to enroll Lois Colon as a candidate for the gospel ministry under care of the Presbytery of Detroit. Jan E. Amaimo was introduced to the Presbytery and read her statement of motivation and influence. A motion carried to arrest her examination. A motion carried to sustain the examination and to enroll Jan Amaimo as a candidate for the gospel ministry under care of the Presbytery of Detroit. The Moderator proceeded to receive Carol Gregg, Lois Colon, and Jan Amaimo as candidates for the ordained ministry under the care of the Presbytery.

#### Omnibus Motion

Upon motion, the following recommendations were adopted:

- 1) It is recommended that twelve acres of the property on Drahner Road, Oxford, be rented to Vernon Scott for the balance of the year for the sum of \$60.00, for the purpose of raising a crop.
- 2) It is recommended that the house on the Drahner Road property be rented to Fred MacDonald, under the following terms: rental at \$150.00 per month, with Mr. MacDonald to be responsible for maintenance of the property and the payment of utilities; the Presbytery to be responsible for insurance on the property and the payment of taxes.
- 3) It is recommended that the Presbytery loan to the Peace Church of Fraser the amount of \$6,000.00 at 9% interest for 18 months, the purpose of the loan to enable the church to provide an addition to its parking lot.
- 4) It is recommended that the name of the corporation of the Presbytery be The Presbytery of Detroit, and that incorporation papers be amended accordingly.
- 5) There is a Synod loan on the property of the former St. Luke's Church of Warren of \$20,000.00. The accrued interest on the loan is \$6,450.00. It is recommended that the Presbytery make quarterly payments of \$500.00 on the loan and accrued interest and pay the full balance, plus interest, when the buyer has completed payment on his land contract, which may occur before the end of this year.
- 6) It is recommended that the Presbytery loan the Geneva Church of Canton the sum of \$5,000.00 at 9% interest, with monthly payments of \$100.00 on principal and a final balloon payment on the balance of principal and interest not later than December 31, 1983. The purpose of the loan is to enable the church to make improvements to its educational building.
- 7) It is recommended that the Presbytery loan Christ Memorial Church of Royal Oak the sum of \$14,000.00 for five years at 9% interest. The purpose of the loan is to enable the church to make major repairs to its roof. Monthly payments on principal and interest will be \$290.62.
- 8) It is recommended that the First United Church of Royal Oak be given permission

- to borrow \$20,000 from the Program Agency of General Assembly for 10 years at 9% interest and to borrow \$5,000.00 from a commercial source for 15 years at 16% interest. The purpose of the loan is to enable the church to install an elevator and a ramp for the handicapped.
- 9) A lot in Florida was left jointly to the former Ward Memorial Church and to the Masonic Home of Michigan. The lot is valued at between \$1,000.00 and \$2,000.00. The Masonic Home has offered to purchase the Presbytery's interest in the lot. It is recommended that the Presbytery sell to the Masonic Home of Michigan its interest in Lot 11 in Orange Blossom Estates, located in Highlands County, Florida for the sum of \$500.00 less expenses.
- 10) It is recommended that full payment of all pension dues for all persons in the Presbytery who are members of the pension plan be guaranteed (see attached resolution).
- 11) It is recommended that the report be received from the Synod Presbytery Development Department, which reviewed the minutes of Presbytery for the period from February 24, 1981 through February 23, 1982. The minutes were approved with the following exceptions: 1) absences of ministers were not recorded; 2) action on session records was not recorded; 3) financial reports and the auditor's report were not recorded.

A motion carried to approve the reports of Council as follows:

At its meeting on March 9, 1982, the Council of the Presbytery took the following action:

- 1) Agreed to have the Synod biennial review of Presbytery at its regular May meeting and appointed Robert Battles and Jean Lennox to assist Synod staff in the review.
- 2) Accepted, with regret, the resignation of Robert McCreight from the Council, the Committee on Bills and Overtures and the position of Recording Clerk.
- 3) Referred to the Structure Committee the suggestion that the Bylaws be amended so that the immediate past moderator would serve as chairperson of the Council.
- 4) Adopted a motion to recommend to Presbytery that the invitations of the Drayton Plains Church to meet there in October, 1983 and of Fort Street Church to meet there in April, 1984 be accepted.
- 5) Received the report of the Treasurer for the period ending December 31, 1981.
- 6) Approved a recommendation of the Department of Presbytery Ministries to refer to the Budget Committee the inclusion of a Validated Special Opportunity for three new community college ministries in the metropolitan area.
- 7) Approved a recommendation of the Department of Local Church Development that \$1,000.00 be allocated from the Contingency Fund for the purpose of making computer data on the 1980 census available to churches.
- 8) Accepted the resignation of Gene Link from the Department of Program and Resource Development.

- 6) Authorized a Crisis Response Committee and designated Donald Lester as the Crisis Response Coordinator; approved a special offering to be taken in June in churches where affirmative action has been taken by sessions, for the purpose of providing funds to meet human needs, disbursement of the funds to be under the authority of the Crisis Response Committee.

- 6) Granted ten minutes on the October docket of Presbytery to Alex Nemeth, regional representative of the Board of Pensions and permitted him to conduct a pre-Presbytery seminar on that day for members of the Pension Plan.
- 7) Received a report from the Administrative Commission to install John Mishler as associate pastor of the First Church of Northville on May 2, 1982 and dismissed the Commission.
- 8) Adopted a motion to recommend to Presbytery that full payment of all pension dues for all persons in the Presbytery who are members of the pension plan be guaranteed (see attached resolution).
- 9) Adopted a motion to recommend to Presbytery that the report be received from the Synod Presbytery Development Department, which reviewed the minutes of Presbytery for the period from February 24, 1981 through February 23, 1982. The minutes were approved with the following exceptions: 1) absences of ministers were not recorded, 2) action on session records was not recorded, 3) financial reports and the auditor's report were not recorded. A motion carried to recommend that the Stated Clerk be authorized to make suitable corrections.
- 10) The Treasurer's report for the period ending April 30, 1982 was received.

The Presbytery of Detroit of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America held a pro re nata meeting on August 17, 1982, at the Westminster Church of Detroit, 17575 Hubbell, Detroit.

The meeting was called to order and constituted with prayer by the Vice-moderator, William P. Saum, at 1:00 p.m.

The Stated Clerk read the call for the meeting as follows:

- 1) To act upon the following recommendations from the Division of Business Affairs:
  - a) That the sum of \$13,500.00 be loaned to the Session of Trinity Community
  - b) That the First Church Plymouth be given permission to sell an old manse to Mr. and Mrs. Greg Ash for one dollar.
  - c) That the Presbytery enter upon a Second Renewal Lease with Standard Federal Savings and Loan Association on land formerly owned by the Eastminster Church.

"In light of the continuing cycle of violence in the Middle East, bringing with it untold human suffering, the creation of hundreds of thousands of new refugees in Lebanon and the destruction of that country's autonomy, we are sobered by our ineffectiveness to bring about peace in that part of the world. Peace between Israel and her Arab neighbors, including addressing the question of full rights for the Palestinian people, is of major interest to the United States.

"In this context the Presbytery of Detroit calls upon its member churches:

- 1) To join in sponsoring acts of confession for the continued responsibility we share in the suffering of all those caught up in this recent round of hostilities; and in intercessory prayer for those who have lost family members, or those otherwise affected by the continuing tragedy.
- 2) To support all negotiated efforts on the part of the United States to bring about a quick and permanent withdrawal of all armed groups in Lebanon, together with efforts to secure a permanent home for the Palestinians, to enable Lebanon once again to become a sovereign state.
- 3) To bring influence to bear upon all those in national leadership not to resort to the use of military means in resolving the very complex issues besetting Lebanon and the whole of the Middle East.
- 4) To exercise understanding, support and concern for Arab Americans of all faiths, living in neighborhoods where member churches are located."

  A motion carried to amend the resolution by substituting the word "Lebanese" for the word "Arab" in 4). A motion carried to approve the resolution as amended.

It was moved that the Presbytery adopt the following resolution:

- "Whereas the United Presbyterian Church U.S.A. has historically affirmed the importance of education as a means of combating ignorance and superstition and as an essential ingredient for a free society; and
- "Whereas the Presbytery of Detroit recognizes the serious and conflicting interest in the Detroit school strike between the school board's concern to operate a system that has suffered serious cutbacks in state funding and the Detroit Federation of Teachers' concern for adequate teacher salaries and benefits; and

"Whereas it is therefore recognized by the Presbytery of Detroit that the real losers in this conflict are the 200,000 school-age children of Detroit;

"Be it therefore resolved that the Presbytery of Detroit urge an immediate settlement to the Detroit School District strike.

"Be it therefore further resolved that the Presbytery encourage its leaders and personnel to provide a reconciling voice on our behalf where appropriate and do all they can to bring about a fair resolution of the Detroit School District strike.

"Be it therefore further resolved that the Presbytery commend the creative leadership of those churches which have taken the initiative to provide interim tutoring and educational opportunities for the school children in their areas."

A motion carried to amend the resolution by substituting the phrase "resumption of school while a new contract is being negotiated" for the phrase "settlement to the Detroit School District strike" in the fourth paragraph. A metion carried to adopt the resolution as amended.

James LeDuc, Henry Borchardt, Carl Howie, Harry Geissinger; Elders - Evelyn Scott (Dearborn Woods), Richard Smith (Dearborn, First), Jean Lennox (Littlefield Boulevard); and empower said commission to install Mr. Wilde on November 28, 1982 at 4 p.m. at Dearborn Woods Church.

Upon motion, the docket was extended for 15 minutes.

Memorial Minutes were presented by Ray Kiely for Frank Fitt and MacKay Taylor for James M. Campbell.

Upon motion, the change in terms of call for Ben Lane, \$2,450 salary increase, was approved.

Upon motion, David Dresser's continued participation in UPCUSA Pension Plan on an unemployed basis to December 31, 1982 was approved, that by December 31, 1982, Mr. Dresser will submit certification as to his ability to subscribe to the standards of the UPCUSA: further that failing such certification, validation of his participation in the Pension Plan will be terminated.

Upon motion, the report was received.

MacKay Taylor presented the report of the Committee on Nominations. Upon motion, the following were elected as commissioners to the Synod Assembly: Ministers - David Antonson, Virgil Jones, James Kesler, Jenny Schram, James LeDuc (Alternate); Elders - H.Franklin Brown (St. John's), Doris Campbell (Peoples), Jean Lennox (Littlefield Boulevard), Donald White (Westminster, Detroit), Wilma Dellinger (Northbrook) (Alternate).

John Jeffrey presented the report of the Department of Program and Resource Development. Reports were heard from John Mather on the Evangelism Workshop, Dick Grant on the activities of the camps, Scott Simons reporting on the Alma College Youth Mix.

Upon motion, the following recommendations were approved in the Omnibus Motion:

- 1. Requests be made to the Synod of the Covenant and to the Office of the General Assembly that the per capita apportionment for 1983 be paid in four equal installments on March 15, June 15, September 15 and December.
- 2. That a loan be made from the Capital Fund of \$20,000 to Park United Church, contingent upon the following: (a) that funds are available, (b) that the Session successfully complete a building fund campaign which will raise at least \$20,000 in three years. The terms of the loan shall be 9% annual interest, the loan to be fully paid within five years.
- 3. That Broadstreet Church be loaned up to \$8,000 at 9% annual interest for six months, the loan to be made from the Capital Fund.

Upon motion, the Report of Council was approved as follows. The Presbytery Council adopted the following recommendations:

1. To recommend that the Presbytery approve the "Resolution on Proposed Standing Rules and Equitable Representation," which would amend the Standing Rules of Synod to provide for a required representation of women and members of ethnic groups in the election of commissioners to Synod.

2. To recommend that the per capita apportionment for Presbytery be \$1.80.

The Presbytery approved the Report of the Council as follows:

- To urge sessions to provide for the attendance at the pre-Presbytery meeting in January of those persons who will be commissioners at the February meeting.
- 2. Authorized the carryover from the 1982 Program Budget to 1983 of the amount of \$7,800 which had been allocated to the Woodward Avenue Church of the Covenant.

Chris Torrey presented the report of the Committee on Budget. The 1983 Budget was presented for first reading, to be acted upon in November. Upon motion, the report was received for first reading.

James Cole reported for the Committee on Bylaws and Structure. Upon motion, the docket was extended five minutes. William Whitledge moved that the Committee on Bylaws be instructed to present for first reading at the next meeting of Presbytery, amendments to the Bylaws of the Presbytery which would abolish the Areas. A motion carried to table the motion until the next meeting of Presbytery.

The meeting was adjourned at  $9:35~\mathrm{p.m.}$  with prayer and the Apostolic Benediction by the Moderator.

#### Omnibus Motion

Upon motion, the following recommendations from the Division of Business Affairs were adopted:

- 1) It is recommended that approval be given to the First Church of Birmingham to sell a manse to its pastor and his wife for \$110,070.00, with \$11,070.00 down payment, the balance to be financed on a land contract at 4½ percent annual interest and monthly payments on principal and interest of \$800.00.
- 2) It is recommended that approval be given to St. Timothy's Church of Livonia to amend payments on its mortgages in the following manner: that it continue regular payments on the General Assembly loan incurred in 1980, that it pay interest on three loans incurred in 1968 and make payments on principals of these loans as funds are available, particularly payment of the balance of \$1,613.00 of one of the loans, and that this arrangement be reviewed in October, 1983.

The report of the Presbytery Council was presented by Stanley M. Taylor. A motion carried to approve the recommendation that the Bylaws be suspended so that the immediate past moderator may serve as chairman of the Council for the calendar year 1983.

A motion carried to approve the report of Council as follows:

At its regular meeting on Tuesday, November 9, 1982 the Council took the following actions:

- 1) Approved the report of the Division of Business Affairs and its recommendations to Presbytery.
- 2) Heard a report from Dr. Oscar Remick, President of Alma College, of long-range strategy and plans for the celebration of its centennial in 1986.
- 3) Approved the report of the Department of Local Church Development and adopted its recommendation that a 1982 budget adjustment of up to \$6,000.00 be made from proceeds from the sale of Eastminster Church for the continuation of an internship at Jefferson Avenue Church for the final quarter of 1982.
- 4) Approved the report of the Department of Program and Resource Development and adopted its recommendations that a) \$1,500.00 from undisbursed funds be carried over to 1983 for purchase of the New Media Bible; b) \$1,500.00 from undisbursed funds be carried over to 1983 for the Youth Triennium.
- 5) Approved the report of the Executive Committee and adopted its recommendations, as follows:
  - a) that departments, divisions and committees be reminded to use sexually inclusive language wherever possible;
  - b) that Council affirm the traditional Presbyterian understanding of the freedom of the pulpit, recognizing that speakers at Presbytery meeting speak to and not for the Presbytery;
  - c) that Alex Nemeth, representative of the Board of Pensions, be invited to the October, 1983 meeting of Presbytery;
  - d) that a survey dealing with the scheduling of Presbytery meetings be distributed at the November meeting of Presbytery;
  - e) that the Worship Unit of the Department of Program and Resource Development be requested to plan the worship services of Presbytery for the calendar year 1983, with the exception of the January meeting, at which time the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be observed and the service will be planned and led by the officers of Presbytery.
  - 6) Received the Treasurer's report for the period ending September 30, 1982.

Thomas Kirkman requested that the record note his objection to the response of Council relative to his communication concerning speakers at Presbytery meetings (see item 5b of Council report).

The report of the Committee on the Plan for Reunion was presented by David Antonson

A motion carried approving the following salaries and housing allowances for the Presbytery staff for 1983:

Upon motion, the minutes of the November, 1982 Presbytery meeting were corrected by substituting the figure of \$11,500 rather than the \$10,500 listed for the housing allowance of Edward Miller, page 8 of the minutes. Upon motion, the minutes of the November, 1982, meeting of Presbytery were approved as corrected.

Upon motion the docket was approved with the following change: no report from the Committee on Candidates.

The Moderator appointed Donald White as Assistant to the Stated Clerk.

Upon motion, the following were enrolled as corresponding members of the Presbytery of Detroit: Antonio Welty, Presbytery of National Capital Union, Dr. Lois Wilson, Former Moderator of the United Church of Canada and Robert W. Tull, Presbytery of Eastern Oklahoma.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper and the installation of William Saum as the Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit for the calendar year, 1983, were led by members of the Presbytery.

The new Moderator expressed the appreciation of the Presbytery for the energy, commitment, fairness, dispatch in leading the meetings and the words of wisdom of the outgoing Moderator, William Colwell.

The outgoing Moderator presented his report for 1982. The report was approved.

Stanley Taylor presented the report of the meetings of Council on December 14, 1982 and January 11, 1983. Upon motion, the reports of Council were received.

Upon motion, the proposed Mission Directions, 1983-84, as listed below, were approved as presented:

The Presbytery of Detroit is called to function as a judicatory of the United Presbyterian Church. It is to fulfill the provisions of the Book of Order of the Denomination, particularly Chapter XII, "Of the Presbytery". The Presbytery serves the geographical area of Southeastern Michigan. In order to achieve and maintain an effective Christian witness as a Presbytery in the middle 1980's, and to reach out to all of God's people, the judicatory affirms the following Mission Directions.

... <u>Partnership in Mission:</u> To bring about a Partnership in Mission with a commitment to increase interdependence, sharing, and mutual learning among the congregations of the Presbytery of Detroit, other judicatories, and the church around the world.

Rationale: Although the Presbytery carries out mission in its own right it is called to enable congregations to communicate with each other, help each other, learn from each other, and find ways to become effective partners in mission with the Presbytery, the Synod, the General Assembly and churches throughout the world.

. . . Churches in Urban Areas: To strengthen urban churches in order that they might provide an effective and vital witness, reach the disadvantaged, disenchanted, and unchurched persons with the good news of the gospel.

Rationale: Urban areas of the Presbytery of Detroit have neighborhoods in need of revitalization. There are significant numbers of people who live in these areas who need to be reached by the church.

... <u>Growing Churches:</u> To encourage and assist the churches of the Presbytery to grow numerically, provide relevant ministries to the unchurched, formerly churched, the disenfranchised, and to develop an attitude of openness to church growth in the congregation.

Rationale: The Presbytery of Detroit contains communities where population growth has stopped or has reversed. In spite of this, there are a large number of persons surrounding each of our congregations who are without the gospel, including those who have drifted away from the fellowship of the church who were once a part of its life.

. . . <u>Human Need</u>: To challenge and assist churches of the Presbytery to meet the needs of the unemployed, the poor, the elderly, the disadvantaged, and other deprived persons. The Presbytery shall engage in a mission of compassion and service not neglecting concern for the root causes of our hurt and hunger.

Rationale: Southeast Michigan is in a recession of unusual proportions, and with government policies changing, human hurt, heartache and disruption are on the increase. The Presbytery is called to a mission of compassion and service of unusual proportions.

... <u>Skilled Leadership Development</u>: To help the people of the churches of the Presbytery to increase their skills in leadership and improve their effectiveness in ministry.

Rationale: It is the role of the Presbytery to assist in the accomplishment of the great mission of the church through its congregations. To accomplish this we need committed and skilled people moving into positions of leadership in every area.

Donald White, chairperson of Staff Services, reported for the Division. Upon motion, Donald Lester was nominated to the office of Executive Presbyter of the Presbytery of Detroit for an indefinite period, in accord with Section 69.054 of the Form of Government, effective September 1, 1983. Voting was by secret ballot. Dr. Lester was elected by a vote of 246 to 16.

Lois Poston, outgoing Presbyterial President, presented the annual report of the Detroit Presbyterial Association. The report was received.

Donald Lester, Presbytery Executive, reported and his report was received.

John Jeffrey reported for the Department of Program and Resource Development. The report was received.

Jean Perkins reported for the Committee on Ministerial Relations.

Upon motion, the call of the Reverend Kurt W. Freund to the Belleville Church was received, a representative of the Belleville Church was heard and the call forwarded to the Presbytery of Eastminster with the request that Mr. Freund be dismissed from that Presbytery and enrolled in the Presbytery of Detroit upon receipt of that dismissal with the following terms of call: \$16,000 salary, manse, utilities, full pension, 2% hospitilization deductible, \$2,000 car allowance, two weeks' study leave, \$300 study allowance, one month's vacation, annual review, moving expenses.

Upon motion, the call of Robert W. Tull was received to become the pastor of the Westminster Church, Port Huron, effective January 15, 1983; a representative of the church was heard; the call was approved with the following terms: \$20,000 salary (includes housing and utility allowance), full pension, \$400 hospitalization deductible, \$2,400 car allowance, two weeks' study leave, \$200 study allowance, one month's vacation, annual review, moving expenses; forward the call to the Presbytery of Eastern Oklahoma enroll Mr. Tull upon receipt of his dismission; elect the following special administrative commission: Ministers - Donald G. Lester, chp., Ernest Dunn, Ronald Naylor; Elders - Thomas Andison (Port Huron, First), Allen Carlisle (Port Huron, Lakeshore), Ross Faulkner (Port Huron, Westminster); empower said commission to install Mr. Tull at 7:00 p.m., January 30, 1983 at Westminster Church.

Upon motion, the contract between First Church, Northville and David Byers for Mr. Byers to become part-time minister of visitation, effective October 1, 1982, was approved with the following terms: \$666.66/month salary, housing and car, 20 hours per week.

Upon motion, the contract between Covenant Church, East Detroit and Lawrence Cater to become part-time interim, effective January 9, 1983, for a period of three months was approved with the following terms: \$160/Sunday; and further Mr. Cater was appointed moderator of the Session of Covenant Church.

Upon motion, the Presbytery approved the reappointment of Joan Stary as part-time stated supply at Leitch Memorial Church, Detroit, for the calendar year, 1983.

Upon motion, the Presbytery approved the extension of interim contracts for John Musgrave (First, Dearborn) to March 31, 1983 and Laurel Loveless (Calvin West) to May 31, 1983.

Upon motion, the Presbytery approved the dissolution of the associate pastoral relation between Craig Davies and First Church, Royal Oak, heard a representative of First Church, Royal Oak, approved the call of First Church, Littleton, Colorado, to become its pastor, and placed the call in Mr. Davies' hands and dismissed Mr. Davies to the Presbytery of Denver, effective February 1, 1983.

Upon motion, the request of Dennis Barger to dissolve his assistant pastoral relation with First Church, Birmingham, was approved.

Upon motion, the request of John Kuckuk for dismissal to the Presbytery of Scioto Valley was approved.

Upon motion, the request of Benjamin Wu for dismissal to the Presbytery of San Francisco was approved.

Upon motion, the action concerning James Whitehead was removed from the table. Upon motion, the Presbytery removed James Whitehead from the Inactive Roll and released him from the exercise of the ordained office of Minister of the Word.

Area I

Fraser, Peace:

Exceptions -- February, 1982, person restored and

transferred was not in roll of communicants.

Area II

Detroit, First:

Exceptions -- two blank sheets inserted; two persons dismissed are not recorded (p. 434); annual statistical report to G. A. not recorded; Church register still is woefully incomplete, but new actions are being recorded; roll numbers would help; action on Pastor's salary review should be in minutes: pages should be numbered, blank areas on sheets should have line drawn through them.

Detroit, Broadstreet: Exceptions -- elders absent, present and excused should be noted for each meeting; annual statistical report to G.A. not recorded; some items in church register need correction; quorum for Corporate meeting can be found in Religious Corporation Law or Bylaws; Quorum for a Congregation meeting can be found in Book of Order or by-laws; Meeting with less than quorum is illegal.

Detroit, Monteith -- Exceptions -- pages should not be inserted; applicants and dismissions of church members should have date of Session action in both the Session minutes and church register; a few corrections need to be made in the church register.

Detroit, Westminster: Exceptions -- Elders absent, present and excused should be noted for each meeting; audit and review of pastor's salary should be indicated in Session minutes. Records are in exceptionally good order.

Detroit, Woodward/Church of the Covenant: Exceptions -- Elders absent, present and excused should be noted for all meetings; minutes of 12/22/80 are missing; clerk's signature missing from some minutes; annual statistical report to G.A. should be recorded after December Session minutes; church register is acceptable, but would be an easier tool to use by the clerk if there were a new book: number each side of a sheet; Woodward Avenue original books need to be returned to the Presbytery.

Upon motion, the Structure Committee was instructed to report back to Presbytery at its next meeting, in regard to the motion made at the January, 1983, Presbytery meeting, with regard to the dissolution of the Areas.

William Colwell reported for Presbytery Council. Upon motion, the following actions were approved.

1. The Session of Leitch Memorial Church be given permission to sell a house for \$1,200 in cash, with the provision that the buyer agrees to purchase the house as it.

- 2. That the Property Committee rent 12 acres of land on Drahner Road, for one year, for agricultural purposes, to Vernon Scott, for a price of \$10 an acre.
- 3. That the Department of Program and Resource Development be given authority to negotiate with the proper persons for the construction of a manager's residence at Camp Howell, that the cost not exceed \$80,000 and that the matter of financing the construction be referred to a special committee.
- 4. Adopted a motion to extend its gratitude to the young people who participated in the fast to aid United Presbyterian hunger programs.
- 5. Adopted recommendations of the Executive Committee as follows:
  - a. That if there is more than one pre-Presbytery meeting, they be scheduled in such a way that interested persons can attend both.
  - b. That the Committee on Bills and Overtures be requested to make recommendations on all of the remaining overtures at the April meeting of Presbytery.
  - c. That the report of Council to Presbytery at the January meeting be amended by deleting the following wording in item 16(a):

    "That the Stated Clark reply to a letter from Thomas Kirkman, in opposition to the sermon preached by David Buttrick at the November meeting of Presbytery" and substituting the following wording: "That the Stated Clerk reply to a letter from Thomas Kirkman, in which he objected to remarks in David Buttrick's sermon which he felt reflected negatively on suburban churches."
  - d. That "Policies and Procedures of the Presbytery of Detroit", as amended, be presented to the Presbytery as a report of policies and procedures which have been approved by Council or Presbytery.
  - e. That Council schedule an all-day retreat at Camp Howell on March 29.
  - f. That the invitation of the Drayton Avenue Church, Ferndale, to Presbytery to hold the October, 1984 meeting at Drayton Avenue Church be accepted.
- 6. Agreed to commend the Stated Clerk of General Assembly for his response to the articles in Reader's Digest concerning the World Council of Churches and the National Council of Churches.
- 7. Adopted a motion to request Donald Lester to draft a brief reply to the "60 Minutes" program concerning the National Council of Churches and to compile a list of material available to pastors concerning this issue.

 Upon the request of William Colwell, adopted a motion to withdraw his paper on the Plan for Reunion from consideration by the Committee on Bills and Overtures.

Dale Johnson reported for the Committee on Bylaws and Structure. Upon motion, all provisions in the Bylaws of the Presbytery of Detroit related to Areas are suspended, effective April 26, 1983, pending the revision of the Bylaws to conform to the Plan for Reunion, with the understanding that it is the intention of the Bylaws and Structure Committee to recommend at the October, 1983 meeting of Presbytery to abolish the current Area structure. THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT, MEETING AT THE FORT STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, DETROIT, MICHIGAN, ON APRIL 26, 1983, RESPECTFULLY OVERTURES THE 195TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY (1983) OF THE UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, MEETING IN ATLANTA, GEORGIA.

Whereas the Evangelical Presbyterian Church was formed in part by local churches which withdrew from the UPC USA; and

Whereas there is no correspondence between the UPC USA and the Evangelical Presbyterian Church; and

Whereas the ordinary rule to govern Sessions is to receive or transfer members by letter only to churches in "correspondence" with our denomination; and

Whereas Sessions should not therefore ordinarily transfer or receive members from the EPC without violating the UPC USA covenant; and

Whereas the Lord God reached out in loving forgiveness to bridge the separation of humanity and himself; and

Whereas in the light of this grace of God, there is no reason why this denomination should not be willing to extend the hand of fellowship to the Evangelical Presbyterian Church,

Therefore, be it resolved that the Stated Clerk of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, enter into negotiations with the Stated Clerk of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church to determine whether the two denominations can and should enter into correspondence with one another.

Upon motion, the following overture will be sent to the 195th General Assembly to meet in Atlanta, Georgia:

Whereas, the 194th General Assembly (1982) took action to enable the United Presbyterian Church to respond in a positive way to the economic crisis currently facing our nation; and

Whereas the response mandated by the 194th General Assembly was planned and funded only through 1983, and

Whereas, the current economic crisis involves systemic issues in the U.S. economy which indicate that the crisis will last well beyond 1983; and

Whereas, the Gospel imperative for justice calls for a sustained ministry in the face of persistent problems; and

Whereas, good stewardship of economic crisis response efforts begun in 1982 and 1983 demands that these efforts not be aborted prematurely;

THEREFORE THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT, MEETING AT FORT STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, DETROIT, MICHIGAN ON APRIL 26, 1983, OVERTURES THE 195th GENERAL ASSEMBLY (1983):

- 1. To continue the economic crisis response program through 1985.
- 2. To continue the Economic Crisis Fund in 1984 and 1985 at appropriate levels not less than the 1983 fund, with funding coming from the One Great Hour of Sharing or other appropriate source(s);
- To assure that the Presbyterian economic crisis response gives attention to the root cause and public policy issues involved, while affirming commitment to the safety net issues and to ecumenical and regional approaches;

4. To charge the Program Agency to report to the 197th General Assembly (1985) its recommendations regarding continuation of the economic crisis response and Economic Crisis Fund beyond 1985.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures requested that its report be recessed to be continued following dinner.

William Colwell, chairperson of Council, reported for Council. Upon motion, the following items from the March 8, 1983 Council meeting were approved:

- 1. Approved the invitation of the Session of First Church, Ypsilanti to Anne Fuhrmeister to become assistant pastor, effective April 15, 1983, with the following terms: \$14,100 salary, \$4,800 housing, full pension, 20¢ per mile car allowance, 2% hospitalization deductible, two weeks' study leave, \$200 study allowance, one month vacation, moving expenses, annual review of the terms of the call. Upon receipt of her dismission from the Presbytery of Maumee Valley she will be enrolled as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit. The Committee on Ministerial Relations reported that the provisions of Presbytery's affirmative action and equal employment opportunity program have been fulfilled.
- 2. Approved the establishment of a part-time interim pastor relationship between Hope Church and James H. Conley, effective March 1, 1983, for a period of three months, with the following terms: \$600 salary, \$200 housing allowance, \$200 car allowance.
- 3. Approved the establishment of a part-time contract between the Wyandotte Church and Robert B. Johnson, effective March 1, 1983, with the following monthly terms: \$416 salary, \$84 car allowance, four weeks unpaid vacation, semi-annual review of the terms of the contract, 12 hours of work per week plus Sunday worship.
- 4. Dissolved the assistant pastor relationship between Joan Stary and the Southwest Church and the stated supply relationship between Joan and Leitch Memorial Church, approved the call to her from the First Federated Church of Clayton, Illinois, and dismissed her to the Presbytery of Great Rivers, effective April 1, 1983.
- 5. Approved the call of the First Church, Escanaba, to Dennis Barger, and dismissed him to the Presbytery of Mackinac, effective March 27, 1983.
- 6. Agreed to update at least annually the Policies and Procedures of the Presbytery.
- 7. Designated William Saum to be the convenor of the commissioners to General Assembly. Designated Donald White to be the convenor of the commissioners to Synod for the balance of this year and requested the Nominating Committee to designate in future years, the convenor of Synod commissioners.
- 8. Referred to Ministerial Relations Committee, with instructions to report directly to ministers, a recommendation concerning a recent IRS ruling that ministers can no longer claim a deduction and exclusion for mortgage payments.

Upon motion, the following items from the April 12, 1983, Council meeting were approved by Presbytery:

- 1. Recommended to Presbytery the approval of a loan, not to exceed \$80,000.00, to the Program and Resource Development Department, for the purpose of constructing a residence for the manager of the Howell Center, that the terms of the loan are an annual interest of 8%, that interest payments be guaranteed, and that the total amount of the loan be repaid within 21 years.
- 2. Recommended to Presbytery that permission be granted to the Session of First Church, Birmingham, to purchase the home of Dennis Barger for \$75,000 and to place the house for sale on the open market for the same price.
- 3. Approved the study of computers, for the purpose of advising sessions on their purchase and their compatibility with the computer owned by Presbytery.
- 4. Dissolved the associate pastor relationship between John Mishler and the First Church of Northville, effective April 24, 1983, approved the invitation of the Session of Covenant Church, East Detroit, to Mr. Mishler to become Stated Supply, from April 24, 1983 to December 31, 1983, under the following terms: \$15,000 salary, \$5,000 housing allowance, full pension, \$400 hospitalization, \$2,400 car allowance, \$200 study allowance, two weeks' study leave and one month vacation.
- 5. Referred to the Bylaws and Structure Committee a request from Presbyterians for Lesbian and Gay Concerns to have a representative on Council.
- 6. Requested the Committee on the Plan for Reunion to act as a consultant to the Stated Clerk in the preparation for sessions of changes in the Form of Government due to reunion, and to plan for a celebration of reunion at the June meeting of Presbytery.
- 7. Concurred with and referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures a proposed overture to be sent to General Assembly, concerning a study of synods.
- 8. Granted permission to United Presbyterian Men to observe the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper at its annual meeting in April, 1984.
- Agreed that an overture from the Presbytery of Huntingdon, concerning the location of national headquarters, should be made available to Presbytery's commissioners to General Assembly.
- 10. Concurred in the appointment of Jeffrey Nolte to be chairperson of the Division of Planning.
- 11. Received the resignation of James Cole from the Bylaws and Structure Committee and referred the vacancy to the Nominating Committee.

- 12. Received, amended and recommended to Presbytery a report from the Bylaws and Structure Committee concerning the Area structure of Presbytery.
- 13. Received reports from and dissolved the following Administrative Commissions: the Commission to install Robert Tull at Westminster Church, Port Huron; the Commission to install David Good at Rosedale Gardens, and the Commission to install Kurt Freund at Belleville.

Upon motion, the report of Council was approved and the recommendations adopted.

The meeting was recessed for dinner.

The worship service with the theme "Ministry with Ethnic Persons" was led by Paul Dotson, Anne Deason Dayanandan and P. Dayanandan.

The meeting of Presbytery was reconvened at 6:05 p.m.

Susan Carlson reported for the Department of Presbytery Ministries. A slide presentation was presented highlighting the Presbytery Hunger Outlets.

The Middle East Committee of the Department of Presbytery Ministries reported. Upon motion, the Presbytery of Detroit expresses its continued concern and offers its prayers for all in Lebanon who have suffered and continue to suffer the results of the violence in 1982 and continuing to this time:

Also upon motion, the Presbytery expresses great appreciation to all who have responded to the suffering and the immense needs for relief, reconstruction and renewed efforts at reconciliation. And that in particular, Presbytery expresses great appreciation to those individuals and those churches who have contributed to healing ministry in Lebanon, and specifically to the National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA, the World Council of Churches and the Middle East Council of Churches for their splendid efforts to express the love of the people of the churches of the USA through their coordinated efforts to relieve the suffering, rebuild schools, hospitals, and homes and to assist the rebuilding of the structures that will make a life of peace more possible in that nation. And that Presbytery will send copies of this affirmation of concern and appreciation to all appropriate persons in churches and the National, World and Middle East Councils of Churches who, on our behalf, are engaged in this ministry of compassion and reconciliation.

John Jeffrey reported for the Department of Program and Resource Development.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures continued its report, presented by Robert Jansen. Upon motion, the Presbytery Overtures the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church (1983) on the following matter:

Whereas, in many cases the work of synods represents a duplication of effort that is being made by a presbytery;

Whereas, presbyteries vary greatly in their need of help and support from a synod;

Whereas, funds expended at the synod level could be more efficiently disbursed at the presbytery level;

Whereas the anticipated reunion with the Presbyterian Church, U.S., confronts us with some concepts of synod which are different from our own;

Whereas, our synods vary considerably in structure and program;

Whereas, no one presbytery or synod can solve problems which belong to the whole;

Therefore, the Presbytery of Detroit, meeting at the Fort Street Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan, on April 26, 1983, overtures the 195th General Assembly (1983) to undertake a study of the role and work of synods, leading to such steps as may be needed to provide for the wisest use of time and resources, avoiding duplication of effort and establishing a pattern of uniformity across the new Church.

Also upon motion, the Presbytery requests that the 195th General Assembly take no action on the policy paper entitled "The Demoncratic Peoples Republic of Korea (North Korea) and Christians in the United States of America: The Meaning of the Present Realities for the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A." on the ground of the need to have further documentation of universally acceptable evidences of new realities in the Democratic Peoples Republic of Korea (North Korea) in relation to Christian faith, furthermore the 195th General Assembly is requested to refer this vital matter to Korean-American congregations and the National Korean Presbyterian Caucus (NKPC).

Rhew, Royal Oak Korean and William Standing, Calvin West.

Ann Robertson presented her statement of influence and motivation. The examination was arrested, Carol Erhart of the First Church, Birmingham was heard, the examination was sustained and the Presbytery received Ann Robertson as a candidate under the care of the Presbytery.

William Robertson presented his statement of influence and motivation. The examination was arrested. Carol Erhart of First Church, Birmingham was heard, the examination was sustained. The Presbytery received William Robertson as a candidate for the professional ministry under the care of the Presbytery of Detroit.

Alfred Nead reported for the Mission Support Department.

Jean Perkins reported for the Ministerial Relations Committee.

## Presbytery Council April 12, 1983

#### MINUTES

The Presbytery Council met on Tuesday, April 12, 1983, at the office of the Presbytery of Detroit. The meeting was called to order by the chairperson, Past Moderator William Colwell, at 1:30.

Upon motion, the following changes were made in the minutes of the March meeting: include in the motion concerning Joan Stary the following: to approve the call of First Federated Church of Clayton, Illinois to become pastor and dismiss Ms. Stary to the Presbytery of Great Rivers, effective April 1, 1983. To refer to the Ministerial Relations Committee the action relating to the Wyandotte Church and Robert B. Johnson approving a "staff relationship" between the two parties. The Form of Government does not provide for that kind of category. Ministerial Relations is asked to reword the action and report to the next meeting of Council as to how the motion is to be amended. Upon motion, the minutes of the March 8, 1983, meeting were approved as amended.

Upon motion, the agenda for the Council meeting was approved as presented.

Eleanor Leigh reported for the Division of Business Affairs. Upon motion, the Council will recommend to Presbytery the approval of a loan to EEE Unit of the Program and Resource Development Department, not to exceed \$80,000, including \$12,000 site improvement and allowances from the Capital Fund for the purpose of constructing a residence on the Howell Center property for the Property Site Manager and that a Trustee of the Presbytery be authorized to sign the building contract with Gordon ReBresh Builders of Brighton now, and that we pay \$2,500 for the drawing, permit, etc., pending final approval of the entire process by the Presbytery on April 26, 1983. The maximum period for repayment will be just over 20 years. It is understood that any designated capital gifts received in the interim will be used to reduce the principal.

Also upon motion the Council will recommend to Presbytery that permission be granted to the Session of First Church, Birmingham to purchase the home of the Reverend Dennis Barger, former Assistant Pastor of that Church for the figure of \$75,000 and to place the same for sale on the open market immediately for the same price.

Jeff Nolte was introduced to the Council, new chairperson of Planning.

The reports of the Council Divisions were approved.

Alfred Nead reported for the Mission Support Department.

Susan Carlson reported for the Presbytery Ministries Department.

Henry Borchardt reported for the Local Church Development Department.

Dale Hunter reported for the Evangelism Coordinating Council.

John Jeffrey reported for the Program and Resource Development Department. Upon motion, the Council directs that a study be undertaken of computers so that helps, direction, suggestions, can be given to local churches in their purchase of a computer and its compatibility with the Presbytery computer.

Larry Glenn reported for the Ministerial Relations Committee. Upon motion, the request of the First Presbyterian Church, Northville and John L. Mishler to dissolve the associate pastoral relation between them was approved, effective April 24, 1983, pending congregational action. Also upon motion, the Council approves the invitation of the Session of the Covenant Church, East Detroit, to John L. Mishler to become stated supply, effective April 24, 1983, through December 31, 1983, renewable annually, pending Session and M.R. action, with the following terms: \$15,000 salary, \$5,000 housing allowance, full pension, \$400 hospitalization, \$2,400 car allowance, \$200 study allowance, two weeks study leave and one month vacation.

The reports of the Council Departments were approved.

Upon motion, the docket for the April Presbytery meeting was approved to begin at 4:00, with the Stated Clerk making the necessary adjustments in the docket.

The Council reflected on the state of the Presbytery.

Reactions were solicited from the Council on the Retreat of the Council.

Stanley Taylor reported for the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee recommends that:

The request of the Presbyterians for Lesbian and Gay Concerns to have a representative on Council was referred to Bylaws and Structure,

The Committee on the Plan for Reunion shall continue and that it will serve as a consultant to the Stated Clerk in preparation for changes in the Plan for Reunion as they affect sessions and Presbytery, and that the Committee be requested to prepare, in consultation with General Assembly Commissioners and the Worship Committee, a service of recognition of Reunion at the June meeting of Presbytery and following that meeting it be discharged.

That the Council concurs with the following recommendation from the Special Committee to Study Synods:

Because no one presbytery or synod can solve these problems unilaterally, we recommend that the Presbytery of Detroit overture the General Assembly to undertake a study of the role and work of synods, leading to such steps as may be needed to provide for the wisest use of time and resources, avoinding all duplication of effort and establishing some pattern of uniformity across the new Church.

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and refers the overture to the Committee on Bills and Overtures for recommendation at the April meeting of Presbytery. And the Council also receives the balance of the Report of the Special Committee to Study Synods for first reading with action to be taken at the May meeting of Council.

That the report of the Synod review of the Presbytery be received and referred to Departments for feedback.

That the United Presbyterian Men be granted permission to observe the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper at its national conference to be held at the West Ann Arbor Holiday Inn in April, 1984.

That Donald Lester be the resource person for the Presbytery at General Assembly.

That an overture from the Presbytery of Huntingdon to the General Assembly on the location of the national headquarters of the church be made available to Presbytery's commissioners to General Assembly.

That the trilevel negotiations of March, 1983, be received for first reading and that Jean Lennox be requested to make recommendations to Council concerning the agreements.

The Council concurs in the appointment by the Moderator of Jeff Nolte as the Chairman of the Division of Planning.

Upon motion, the resignation of James Cole from the Bylaws and Structure Committee was received and referred to the Nominating Committee.

Upon motion, an omnibus motion was approved to concur with the above mentioned items in the Executive Committee report.

Upon motion, the following amended report of the Bylaws and Structure Committee was approved.

That all provisions in the Bylaws of the Presbytery of Detroit related to Areas be suspended, effective April 26, 1983, pending revision of the Bylaws to conform to the Plan for Reunion, with the understanding that it is the intention of the Bylaws and Structure Committee to recommend at the October, 1983 meeting of that the current Area structure be abolished.

That the Bylaws and Structure Committee be directed to propose to Presbytery, not later than the October, 1983 meeting, an interim revision of the Bylaws of the Presbytery which will consider a more effective functioning of the Departments and Council.

That persons who are presently representing the Areas in any part of the structure of Presbytery shall retain their positions, pending future action by Presbytery.

Upon motion, the Nominating Committee will be alerted to the implications involved in the report of the Bylaws and Structure Committee in its task for nomination for 1984.

Upon motion, the report of the Bylaws and Structure Committee, as amended by Council, will be presented to Presbytery at the April meeting.

The report of the Executive Committee was approved as presented.

The motions presented to Council by Gareth Baker were referred, upon motion, to a special committee of Council, appointed by the Moderator. The motion as follows:

- 1. The meeting shall begin at 4:00 p.m. and shall recess for dinner promptly at 6:00 p.m.; reconvening again at 7:00 p.m. (Unless of course, the meeting has already adjourned due to its being completed before dinner).
- 2. The docket shall be so arragned that no vote on what may be deemed as a controversial or crucial issue shall be scheduled until the evening portion of the meeting. In fact, it may well be advisable for such matters to have the discussion begin before dinner so that commissioners may have the opportunity around the tables to continue that discussion in an informal way so that in the long run those voting may be better prepared for such a vote when the time comes.
- 3. The meetings shall be held around tables in a similar manner to that of many of the past meetings of the General Assembly. Commissioners need space to place the working papers and to write upon them. For example, the meetings could be held in the Fellowship Hall at the Westminster Church, Detroit. Everything for dinner can be picked up cafeteria style beginning at 6:00 p.m. Tables can be cleared prior to the evening session.

Upon motion, the minutes of the April 26, 1983 Presbytery meeting were approved as distributed.

The docket was approved with the following amendments:

- 1) addition of the report of the Committee on Nominations;
- 2) deletion of the report of the Department of Local Church Development; and
- 3) deletion of the report of the Bylaws and Structure Committee.

Elder Roger VanDyke of the host church was appointed Assistant to the Stated Clerk.

Elder Ruth Allaben was elected to act as Recording Clerk in the absence of Linda Crawford.

Upon motion, it was resolved that the provisions of the Bylaws of the Presbytery of Detroit, dated December 27, 1979, together with subsequent amendments, continue to be observed as the Bylaws of the Presbytery, except for any provisions which may be contrary to the Form of Government of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), and until the Presbytery has adopted further amendments or a new set of bylaws.

The income for this fund in 1982 was \$946,114, and total program budgeted expenses were \$800,738. This compares with a 1981 income of \$802,149 and budgeted expenses of \$773,754. A motion carried to approve the report.

Upon motion, the Presbytery approved the following resolution:

- Whereas God has commanded us to care for the earth and its people, and pray for their continued safety and welfare; and
- Whereas the Presbytery of Detroit has endorsed the Nuclear Arms
  Freeze and recommends it to congregations for prayer and study;
  and
- Whereas August 6th, 1983 will be the thirty-eighth anniversary of the detonation of the first nuclear device in warfare, as a result of which 92,000 people lost their lives;
- Be it therefore resolved that the Presbytery declare August 6th, 1983 as a day of prayer for peace; and
- Be it further resolved that the Presbytery of Detroit urge all its member congregations to toll the bells of the churches 38 times at noon on August 6th, to proclaim our concern for peace; and
- Be it further resolved that this resolution be communicated to the appropriate local news media so this witness and concern may be understood by the community.

The report of the Division of Staff Services was presented by Donald White. Upon motion, the Presbytery concurred with the wish of Henry C. Borchardt, Associate

Executive for Parish Development, to sever his relationship with the Presbytery of Detroit, effective July 15, 1983; and dismissed Dr. Borchardt to the Presbytery of Lake Erie so that he may accept a call as Executive Presbyter of the Presbytery of Lake Erie.

Upon motion, the Presbytery approved the request of the First United Presbyterian Church, Royal Oak, to change its name to the Starr Presbyterian Church.

Donald G. Lester presented the report of the Executive Presbyter.

The Moderator, William Saum, reported on his recent visit to Russia.

Upon motion, the Presbytery was recessed at 9:45 p.m., to meet again on Thursday, August 4, 1983, at 4 p.m. at the Westminster Church, Detroit.

Mrs. Schaefer presented her statement of faith. floor was opened to questions. Upon motion, the examination was arrested. Mrs. Kirkman reported that Mrs. Schaefer had been declared a fit candidate for the ministry and had met the requirements for ordination set forth by the Form of Government. Upon motion, the examination was sustained and the ordination of Anne N. Schaefer was approved. Upon motion, the Presbytery approved the starting date of August 7, 1983 for Mrs. Schaefer's work at White Lake and granted permission for Mrs. Schaefer to moderate the Session meeting of August 15 at the White Lake Church. The call was placed in Mrs. Schaefer's hands.

The report of the Committee on Candidates was approved.

The report of the Committee on Ministry was resumed. Upon motion, the interim pastor relationship between First Church, Pontiac and Lloyd G. Upon motion, the establishment of an interim pastor relationship between Grosse Pointe Memorial Church and William R. Phillippee (Presbytery of Pittsburgh) was approved, effective September 1, 1983, for a period of six months with the following terms: (to be prorated for services rendered if the terms of the relationship should be less than one year): \$32,000 salary, manse, utilities, full pension, \$2,000 car allowance, two weeks' study leave, \$250 study allowance, one month's vacation, car/personal property/disability insurance, \$200 conference expense, \$500 expense allowance, moving expenses. Copies of the report will be made available to the Presbytery's Synod commissioners. The communication to the Synod will make clear that Council is neither approving or disapproving the report.

The Council received the "Changes in the Form of Government" and directed that the paper be sent to pastors and churches by the Stated Clerk.

The Executive Committee recommends that the Worship Committee be instructed to be in communication with sessions of local churches where Presbytery meetings are to be held, six weeks before the scheduled meeting of Presbytery to assertain the items needed for the conduction of the worship service.

Upon motion the resolution that follows was approved by Council, to be sent to Presbytery for approval. The resolution will be sent to the Peace Education Committee for consideration, to churches and to the Christian Communication Council.

The Session of St. Paul's United Presbyterian Church, Livonia, Michigan respectfully overtures the Council of the Presbytery of Detroit, to recommend to the Presbytery the adoption of the following resolution:

Whereas the threat of nuclear war imperils all of God's Creation; and

Whereas God has commanded us to care for the earth and its people, and pray for their continued safety and welfare; and

Whereas the Presbytery of Detroit has endorsed the Nuclear Arms Freeze and recommends it to congregation for prayer and study; and

Whereas August 6th, 1983 will be the thirty-eighth anniversary of the detonation of the first nuclear device in warfare, as a result of which 92,000 people lost their lives.

Be it therefore resolved that the Presbytery declares August 6th, 1983, as a day of prayer for peace; and

Be it further resolved that the Presbytery of Detroit urge all its member congregations to toll the bells of the churches 38 times at noon on August 6th, to proclaim our concern for peace; and

Be it further resolved that this resolution be communicated to the appropriate local news media so this witness and concern may be understood by the community.

The Council received with appreciation, a check in the amount of \$2,500 for Economic Disaster Assistance from the Presbytery of Palo Duro and directed the Stated Clerk to communicate the appreciation of the Presbytery to the Presbytery of Palo Duro.

Upon motion, Ministerial Relations' plans for a pre-Presbytery meeting in September centering around Social Security, taxes and financial planning for pastors was approved.

Upon motion, the Presbytery will assume responsibility for one-half of the cost of the per person expense of the August 29-30 Council Retreat, and each individual person will assume responsibility for the other half. - 11. Concurred with the session of the Community United Presbyterian Church of Drayton Plains and recommends to Presbytery that the church be given permission to change its name to Community Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) of Drayton Plains.
- 12. Received a communication from the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of San Francisco stating that the name of Willis Tabor had been removed from its list of ordained ministers.
- 13. Directed the Moderator to appoint a Reception Committee to host the Moderator of General Assembly upon his visit to this Presbytery on January 24, 1984.
- 15. Expressed to Lillian MacLean its appreciation for her services to Council and to the Presbytery as a whole and wished her God's richest blessings in her retirement which will begin on October 1, 1983.
- 16. Concurred with the Division of Business Affairs in requesting Presbytery to give permission to the First Church, Birmingham to sell a house at 2071 Daintree, West Bloomfield, to Gary and Jennifer Rigby for \$64,000.00 cash.
- 17. Concurred with the Division of Business Affairs to request Presbytery to give the Orchard Lake Church permission to borrow \$18,000 on a 20 year, 8% mortgage from West Bloomfield Township, and \$20,000 on a 5 year 12 or 13% mortgage from the Michigan National Bank, the purpose of the mortgages to provide funds for a sewer connection.

18. Received reports from administrative commissions to install Margaret Zedan, Anne Fuhrmeister, John Musgrave and Anne Schaefer and to ordain Anne Schaefer and dissolved the commissions.

## Report of Council - August 16, 1983

- 1. Received a progress report from William Whitledge, Chairman of the Bylaws Committee, on the revision of the Bylaws of Presbytery, for the purpose of bringing them into conformity with the new Form of Government.
- 2. Approved final plans for the Council Retreat.
- 3. Approved the appointment of David Sherwin as Chairman of the Budget Committee.
- 4. Approved a plan for funding the "Be a Barnabas" television documentary, in the amount of \$10,500.
- 5. Elected an Administrative Commission to install Darryl Baker and Stuart Broberg as assistant pastors of the First Church, Birmingham.
- 6. Received news of the death of Charles Gensheimer, pastor of Westminster Church, Ann Arbor, and elected John Mecouch moderator of the Session of that church.
- 7. Approved an allotment of 40 minutes for the worship services at the September meeting of Presbytery with the understanding that the service will include reports from commissioners to General Assembly.
- 8. Welcomed Helen Morrison, Interim Associate Executive for Parish Development.

Upon motion, the Presbytery condemns the barbaric action of the Soviet Union in the destruction of Korean Airlines 007 and protests this action as immoral and foreign to Christian morality. The division of the house resulted in a vote of: 114 yes and 74 no. Richard Milford requested that his no vote be recorded in the minutes of the Presbytery.

Upon motion, the Presbytery directed the Peace Committee to come back to the Presbytery with a recommendation on the action sent to it from Council at its September 13, 1983 neeting regarding the shooting down of the Korean Airlines plane.

A motion was made to communicate to the World Council of Churches the action of Presbytery condemning the destruction of the Korean plane and to request the World Council to take an appropriate and similar action.

A motion carried to table the above motion, pending a further recommendation from the Peace Committee.

Donald White reported for the Division of Staff Services. The Presbytery recognized the years of service of Lillian MacLean and expressed its gratitude for all that she has meant to the members of the Presbytery in the time she has served as the Executive Secretary.

Upon motion, Item 14 from the Council Report of September 27 concerning salary recommendations for office staff and executive staff was referred to the Committee on Ministry and the Division of Staff Services.

The vote on the preceeding motion was 114 for and 51 against.

William Whitledge reported for the Committee on Bylaws. The report was received.

The meeting was adjourned with the apostolic benediction by the Moderator, William Saum.

Ruth Kirkman, chairperson, reported for the Committee on Candidates. Upon motion, the credentials of Mark Engstrom, Candidate under care of the Presbytery of Detroit, were transferred to the Great Rivers Presbytery.

Anna Marie Austin presented her statement of intent. Questions of Mrs. Austin were requested from the floor. Upon motion the examination was arrested. Upon motion, Anna Marie Austin was taken under care of the Presbytery as a candidate for the professional ministry. Mrs. Austin's proposed course of study was also approved. The Moderator, William Saum, proceded with the service of reception of the candidate.

Committee on Ministry chairperson, Jean Perkins reported for the committee. Upon motion, the Presbytery approved the extension of the contract between Ernest W. Dunn and the Session of Jefferson Avenue Church, Detroit, for part time pastor of visitation from October 1, 1983 through December 31, 1983 with the following monthly terms: \$500 salary, 20 cents per mile car allowance.

Michael Dunkelberger, in brief presentations, recognized the ministries of Roy Lambert and Rodney Beal, both of whom have been members of the Presbytery of Detroit for nearly thirty years.

Harry L. Geissinger presented a memorial minute for Rudolph S. Garypie and Gene Stone presented a memorial minute for Walter L. Jenkins.

Susan Carlson, chairperson, reported for the Committee on Ministries.

Vern Campbell reported for the Peace Education Committee. Upon motion, the following resolution was adopted, by a unanamous vote.

#### WHEREAS:

- 1. Our reponses to world situations must be guided by our Christian morality
- 2. Our task as Christians is sharing the reconciling work of God in Christ and being peacemakers
- 3. There is more mercy in God than there is sin in people
- 4. Accepting God's mercy requires honesty by each side about its own sinfulness
- 5. The difficulty of following Jesus' call to love our enemies in today's world makes the effort more imperitive
- 6. The life of the world's nations has become so interdependent that loving one's enemies can no longer be seen as an unrealistic ideal
- 7. As long as the superpowers are engulfed in an escalating arms spiral, innocent victims will continue to suffer
- 8. There will always be responses that are emotionally satisfying and spiritually devastating
- 9. The most consistent Christian response and most fruitful world response would lead to breaking down the barriers of tension, fear and paranoia that make such events possible Legitimate questions remain such as why the plane was 300 miles off course, why it did not respond to warnings, who authorized

the Soviet action

11. The Presbytery of Detroit has gone on record decrying the tragic loss of life in the Korean Airlines 007 incident

## BE IT RESOLVED THAT

- 1. The Presbytery of Detroit reaffirms its sorrow at the loss of innocent life in the destruction of KAL 007 and shares the grief of those who had family and friends aboard the flight.
- 2. The Presbytery decries the unwillingness of the Soviet leadership either to apologize for the incident or to express regrets about the loss of life
- 3. The Presbytery commends the U.S. administration for continuing arms control talks as one way of reducing tensions that lead to such tragedies but laments the use of this incident to promote increased weapons production and deployment
- 4. The Presbytery maintains that emotional and inflammatory responses (typified by the immediate accusations that KAL 007 was a spy plane or that the Soviets knowingly shot down a civilian plane) compound the tragedy and run counter to the goal of promoting international peace by reducing international tension.
- The Presbytery calls upon its members to be guided by the Holy Spirit into the practice of Christian belief in the redeemability of all people as they respond to the incident
- 6. The Presbytery encourages all Christians around the world to do likewise
- 7. The Presbytery calls upon the leaders of the Soviet Union and the United States to let this tragedy move them from dependency on military solutions to paths of diplomacy, leading to greater stability, improved communication and reduction of tension around the world
- 8. The Presbytery communicates this to appropriate bodies including the White House, the Soviet Embassy, the Office of the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly and the World Council of Churches.

Upon motion, the following motion, made and tabled at the September 27, 1983 Presbytery meeting was removed from the table and placed on the floor: "To communicate to the World Council of Churches the action of Presbytery condemning the destruction of the Korean plane and to request the World Council to take an appropriate and similar action." (The action of Presbytery referred to is the motion made on that same evening and passed that evening as follows: "The Presbytery condemns the barbaric action of the Soviet Union in the destruction of Korean Airlines 007 and protests this action as immoral and foreign to Christian morality.")

Upon motion, the previous question was called. The motion was defeated.

John Jeffrey reported for the Department of Program and Resource Development. As a part of that report, the delegates to the Youth Forum and Youth Triennium reported.

William Colwell, past moderator, reported for Presbytery Council. Upon motion, the actions of the Council on October 11 (attached) were approved.

The meeting was adjourned with the apostolic benediction by the Moderator, William Saum.

The minutes of the September 13, 1983, meeting of Council were approved as presented.

The agenda for the Council meeting was approved as amended.

The Council offered feedback and suggestions arising from the two Council Retreats that took place during 1983. The Executive Committee will look at the information derived from the discussion and come back to the Council with recommendations.

The Treasurer's report dated August 31, 1983, was accepted as presented.

The Presbytery docket for the October 25, 1983 meeting was approved as amended.

Jeff Nolte reported for the Division of Planning.

Donald White reported for the Division of Staff Services. He reported that Mary Ann Standing is acting Executive Secretary during the time that that position is being analyzed.

Eleanor Leigh reported for the Division of Business Affairs. Upon motion, the Council approved the recommendation that all units institute immediate cut backs for the balance of 1983 and all restraints be under the direction of the Executive Presbyter.

Upon motion, the Mission Support Department was directed to give urgent attention to the diminished rate of income of general mission funds for 1983.

Upon motion, the approval of the request of the Redford Church for a General Assembly Energy Conservation loan from the Program Agency for \$10,000, 8% interest, for up to 10 years, contingent upon the approval of the Local Church Development Department was granted.

Upon motion, the reports of the Divisions were approved.

Donald Lester, Helen Morrison, Donald MacPherson and Edward Miller gave staff reports.

Alfred Nead reported for the Mission Support Department.

Donald MacPherson reported for the Program and Resource Development Department.

Larry Glenn reported for the Personnel Department. Upon motion, the Council recommends that Presbytery approve the invitation of the Session of Westminster Church, Ann Arbor to Richard A. Alex Nemeth, representative from the Board of Pensions, reported to Presbytery.

Donald Lester, Presbytery Executive, reported to Presbytery.

John Jeffrey, Chairperson, Program and Resource Development Department, reported. The report included a report from the Summer Service Plus program.

David Eshleman reported for the Local Church Development Department.

Upon motion, the report of the Session Records Review Committee was approved. The report is attached.

Ruth Kirkman reported as chairperson, for the Committee on Candidates. Mrs. Kirkman presented David Weber, requesting to be taken under care of the Presbytery. Mr. Weber stated his reasons for the request. The floor was opened to questions. There being none, the exam was arrested and Steve Weber an elder of First Presbyterian Church, Royal Oak, spoke for the church. Upon motion, the examination was sustained and David Weber was received as a candidate under care for the professional ministry.

David Devries presented his reasons for desiring to be taken under care of the Presbytery. The floor was opened to questions. There being none, the exam was arrested and Al Holder, elder from Calvin (West) spoke for the church. Upon motion, the examination was sustained and David Devries was received as a candidate under care for the professional ministry.

Moderator William Saum proceeded with the service taking Mr. Weber and Mr. Devries under care of the Presbytery of Detroit.

Alfred Nead reported for the Mission Support Department.

Jean Perkins reported for the Committee on Ministry. Upon motion, the pastoral relationship between Kurt W. Freund and the Belleville Church was dissolved with the following terms of separation:

Upon motion, the Presbytery approved the call of the First Church, Farmington, to Larry Austin as Assistant Pastor effective December 1, 1983, heard Dale Johnson, representative from the church and approved the following terms: \$12,000 salary, \$9,000 housing, one month vacation, full pension, \$2,500 car allowance, \$500 study leave, books, expenses.

Upon motion, the Presbytery approved the call of the First Presbyterian Church (Walkerton, Indiana) to Richard J. Reynolds to become pastor, placed the call in Mr. Reynolds' hands and dismissed Mr. Reynolds to the Presbytery of Wabash Valley, effective November 15, 1983.

Upon motion, the contracts of Peter Boeve (Ann Arbor, Northside), Hubert Sunderman, (Detroit, Gratiot Avenue), John Mischler (East Detroit, Covenant) and Raphael Francis (Park United, Highland Park) as stated supplies were extended to December 31, 1984.

Upon motion, temporary supply relationships between Kenneth Eimer (Northville), James Conley (Hope, Detroit) and Jennifer McLaren-Saad (Port Huron, Lakeshore) were extended to March 31, 1984.

Mike Dunkelberger continued with the introductions of the ministers who have been in the Presbytery the longest number of years. Introduced at this meeting were: MacKay Taylor, Thomas Kirkman and Larry Glenn.

Upon motion, the Presbytery established the policy of publishing the new totals involved each time changes in terms of call are presented to the Presbytery for approval.

MacKay Taylor reported for the Committee on Nominations. Upon motion, Jean Lennox was elected Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit for 1984, by a unanimous ballot. Upon motion, Robert Crilley was elected Vice Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit for 1984, by a unanimous ballot.

Upon motion, the remainder of the report of the Committee on Nominations (report attached) was approved with the following exceptions:

- 1. Those persons who are considered inactive members of the Presbytery shall be excluded from election.
- 2. The Committee on Nominations section of the report was deleted.

Susan Carlson reported for the Department of Presbytery Ministries.

William Gepford reported for the Middle East Committee. Upon motion, the Presbytery of Detroit, in response to the continuing conflict in the Middle East involving directly the occupied nation of Lebanon and also the Nations of Syria and Israel, both of which are occupying parts of Lebanon, and the multinational peacekeeping forces from the U.S.A., France, Italy and England, vote the following:

- 1. Presbytery recommends that all Presbyters share the materials provided tonight from the Middle East Committee with their parishioners,
- 2. Presbytery recommends that each church alone or in concert with other churches hold at least one major session to discuss the conflicts in the Middle East with particular attention to the possible role of churches in a ministry of justice and peace and to learn specifically about the ministry of churches to which the Presbyterian Church is related in Lebanon, Syria and Israel, and

3. All clergy be urged to include prayers in regular services of worship for all persons and people suffering from the continued conflict including specifically Lebanese, Palestinians, Israelis, Syrians and members of the multinational peace keeping forces from England, France, Italy and the U.S.A.

Upon motion, the Presbytery of Detroit enthusiastically endorsed the nomination of Presbytery Executive Donald Lester as a candidate for the Moderator of the General Assembly. Moderator William Saum in consultation with Dr. Lester will appoint a committee to begin plans for the election process.

The meeting was adjourned with the apostolic benediction by the Moderator, William Saum.

#### BYLAWS OF THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

## (Presented for Adoption, November 22, 1983)

#### Chapter I - Authority of These Bylaws

The Bylaws of the Presbytery of Detroit shall be in accordance with the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Meetings of the Presbytery shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised. Procedures of the Presbytery are set forth in the Manual of Operations, which accompanies these Bylaws and is required by the Form of Government, G-9.0405.

#### Chapter II - Membership

<u>Section 1</u>: Membership in the Presbytery of Detroit shall be determined in accordance with provisions in the Form of Government, G-11.0101; G-11.0401-.0416.

<u>Section 2</u>: If chairpersons of departments, committees, divisions or of Council, are not members of Presbytery, they shall be granted the privilege of the floor for the purpose of presenting reports of their units.

<u>Section 3</u>: Privilege of the floor may be granted to anyone, at any time, at the discretion of the Presbytery.

#### Chapter III - Meetings

#### Section 1: Stated meetings

- A. The Presbytery shall meet regularly as a governing body on the fourth Tuesday of January, February, March, April, May, June, September, October and November.
- B. The January meeting shall be the annual meeting.
- C. Places and times of meeting shall be determined by the Council.
- Section 2: Special meetings may be called in accordance with the Form of Government, G-11:0201.
- <u>Section 3</u>: The quorum at a meeting of Presbytery shall be any three ministers, and elders from at least three churches.

#### Section 4: Worship

- A. Each meeting of Presbytery shall have a devotional service under the direction of the Council.
- B. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper shall be observed at least annually.
- <u>Section 5</u>: Ministers without pastoral charge shall make an annual report to Presbytery, on a form provided by the Stated Clerk.

## Chapter IV - Officers

## Section 1: Moderator and Vicemoderator

- A. A Moderator and Vicemoderator shall be elected in November for oneyear terms and installed at the next January meeting.
- B. The duties of the Moderator shall be those prescribed in G-9.0202 and G-9.0301. It shall be the duty of the Vicemoderator to preside at the request of or in the absence of the Moderator.

## Section 2: Stated Clerk

- A. The Stated Clerk shall be elected at a November meeting of Presbytery for a term of three years, and may be re-elected for an indefinite number of terms. The Stated Clerk shall take office at the January meeting following his or her election. Presbytery may fill a vacancy in the office at any stated meeting. The person elected shall become Acting Stated Clerk and shall serve until a regularly elected Stated Clerk has taken office.
- B. The duties of the Stated Clerk shall be those prescribed in G-9.0203.
- C. The Stated Clerk shall receive an annual salary to be determined by the Presbytery and shall be reimbursed for all expenses incurred in the proper discharge of duties.

#### Section 3: Treasurer

- A. The Treasurer shall be elected at a November meeting of the Presbytery for a three year term and may be re-elected for an indefinite number of terms. The Treasurer shall take office at the January meeting following his or her election. Presbytery may fill a vacancy in the office at any stated meeting. The person elected shall become Acting Treasurer and shall serve until a regularly elected Treasurer has taken office.
- B. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer:
  - to receive all funds belonging to the Presbytery, to deposit them under the direction of the Trustees, and to disburse them according to its orders;
  - (2) to keep proper books of account of all receipts and disbursements, together with supporting vouchers.

## Section 4: Recording Clerk

A. The Recording Clerk shall be elected at the November meeting of Presbytery for a term of one year, and may be re-elected for an indefinite number of terms, and shall take office at the next succeeding January meeting following election.

- B. It shall be the duty of the Recording Clerk:
  - (1) to keep minutes of all proceedings of Presbytery and to deliver them promptly to the Stated Clerk, together with all papers and documents upon which action has been taken or is pending;
  - (2) to render such assistance to the Stated Clerk as may be determined by the Council.
- C. The Recording Clerk shall receive an annual salary to be determined by the Presbytery and shall be reimbursed for all expenses incurred in the proper discharge of duties.
- D. The Stated Clerk shall nominate at each meeting of Presbytery a person to be appointed by the Moderator as Assistant Clerk. The duties of the Assistant Clerk are to render assistance to the Stated Clerk and Recording Clerk during meetings.

## Chapter V - Departments

Section 1: The Presbytery shall have the following departments: a Department of Local Church Development (thirty members), a Department of Program and Resource Development (thirty members), a Department of Presbytery Ministries (thirty members) and a Department of Mission Support (thirty members). The members of the departments shall be elected by the Presbytery. The chairperson of each department shall be elected by the Presbytery for a one-year term. A chairperson shall not serve for more than three consecutive terms.

## Section 2: The Department of Local Church Development

- A. The Department of Local Church Development shall focus on the development of the churches of the Presbytery and shall bring the concerns of the Presbytery to the churches. It shall help make the resources of the Presbytery available to its churches.
- B. It shall be responsible for the following specific duties:
  - (1) to review session records;
  - (2) to review and share mission concerns with both new and existing churches;
  - (3) to assist churches in strategy;
  - (4) to assist churches in development;
  - (5) to plan and develop new churches.

## Section 3: Department of Program and Resource Development

A. The Department of Program and Resource Development shall focus on the leadership and program resource needs of local churches and of the Pres-

bytery. It shall be responsible for drawing together and distributing the material and personnel resources for traditional and new programming by and in the churches of the Presbytery.

- B. It shall be responsible for the following specific duties:
  - (1) to coordinate programs and resources for leadership development;
  - (2) to coordinate programs and resources for worship;
  - (3) to coordinate programs and resources for extended experience education;
  - (4) to coordinate programs and resources for evangelism.

#### Section 4: Department of Presbytery Ministries

- A. The Department of Presbytery Ministries shall focus on that mission of the Church which is best expressed by the Presbytery as a whole.
- B. It shall be responsible for the following specific duties:
  - to develop and support ministries to meet the needs of people served by the churches of Presbytery;
  - (2) to encourage ecumenical and interchurch auxiliary organizations, and to develop communications among the Presbytery and these organizations;
  - (3) to be a liaison between Presbytery and community organizations which minister to human needs;
  - (4) to maintain a standing advisory committee on human concerns, which shall advise, through the Department, the Council and the Presbytery regarding human concerns.

## Section 5: Department of Mission Support

- A. The Department of Mission Support shall focus on the interpretation and support of the total mission of the Church and its promotion to the churches in the Presbytery.
- B. It shall be responsible for the following specific duties:
  - (1) to coordinate efforts of communication about all missions;
  - (2) to interpret and promote study of mission materials and resources;
  - (3) to coordinate mission funding efforts;
  - (4) to work with the United Presbyterian Foundation; promote deferred giving;
  - (5) to assign, coordinate and promote mission speakers and mission

#### support events.

#### Chapter VI - Committees

Section 1: The Presbytery shall have the following committees: a Committee on Ministry (twenty-four members), a Committee on Candidates (eighteen members), a Committee on Representation (ten members), a Committee on Nominations (twelve members), a Committee on Bills and Overtures (six members), and a Committee on Bylaws (six members). The members of the committees shall be elected by the Presbytery. The chairperson of each committee shall be elected by the Presbytery for a one year term and shall be a person who is a member of the committee. A chairperson shall not serve for more than three consecutive terms.

#### Section 2: Committee on Ministry

- A. The Committee on Ministry shall be elected in accordance with G-11.0501.
- B. Its duties shall be those listed in G-11.0502.
- C. A quorum shall be two-thirds of its membership.

#### Section 3: Committee on Candidates

A. The Committee on Candidates shall be responsible for implementing the provisions of G-14.0302 (paragraphs a-c) and G-14.0402 (paragraph d).

#### Section 4: Committee on Representation

- A. The Committee on Representation shall include in its membership persons enumerated in G-9.0105. Nominations shall be made through the Council.
- B. Its responsibilities shall be those listed in G-9.0105.

#### Section 5: Committee on Nominations

- A. One third of the Committee on Nominations shall be ministers, one third shall be male elders and one third shall be female elders.
- B. It shall nominate persons to fill all vacancies requiring election by Presbytery (with the exception of the executive staff).
- C. It shall observe the provisions listed in G-9.0801.

#### Section 6: Committee on Bills and Overtures

- A. The Committee on Bills and Overtures shall be elected in such a way that the terms of members shall run from June first to May 31st.
- B. It shall receive all bills and overtures from other governing bodies, including sessions.
- C. It shall make recommendations to Presbytery concerning all matters referred to it.

## Section 7: Committee on Bylaws

- A. The Committee on Bylaws shall have the following specific duties:
  - (1) to receive requests, recommendations and proposals for changes in the structure of Presbytery or its Bylaws;
  - (2) to evaluate said requests, recommendations and proposals and to make recommendations to Presbytery concerning them;
  - (3) to be able to initiate its own proposals for amending the Bylaws.

## Chapter VII - Council

Section 1: The Council shall be composed of seventeen members, as follows: the Moderator of Presbytery, the Vicemoderator, the immediate past Moderator, the Stated Clerk, the chairpersons of the Committees on Ministry, Candidates, and Nominations, the President of the Detroit Presbyterial Association and nine members elected at large for three-year terms. The chairperson of the Council shall be the immediate past Moderator. The secretary of the Council shall be the Stated Clerk. The Presbytery Executive shall be a member ex officio, without vote.

Section 2: Members-at-large shall be appointed by the chairperson to serve as liaison to the departments and divisions.

<u>Section 3</u>: The Council shall focus on 1) the coordination of the programs of the Presbytery, its administrative services and the work of its departments and committees; 2) and on how effectively these various programs and services undergird the mission of its member churches.

<u>Section 4</u>: It shall be responsible for proposing any matters which it considers to be for the welfare of the Presbytery.

Section 5: It shall have the following specific duties:

- A. to receive from the Stated Clerk, and approve or amend, the docket for a meeting of Presbytery;
- B. to direct the work of administrative personnel;
- C. to review the work of Presbytery and to recommend appropriate actions for program and mission;
- D. to receive reports of the departments.

Section 6: It shall have the following divisions: a Division of Planning (ten members), a Division of Staff Services (ten members), a Division of Business Affairs (ten members), and a Budget Division (ten members). The members of the divisions shall be elected by the Presbytery. The chairperson of each division shall be elected by the Presbytery for a one-year term and may be a person who is a member of the division or is from outside the membership.

- A. The Division of Planning shall:
  - (1) focus on the planning process for the Presbytery as a whole;
  - (2) prepare annually the Mission Directions, to be adopted by the Presbytery;
  - (3) coordinate the session visitation program.
- B. The Division of Staff Services shall:
  - (1) nominate to Presbytery persons to be elected to the executive staff;
  - (2) formulate and review personnel policies for the employees of Presbytery;
  - (3) carry out performance reviews of the Presbytery staff.
- C. The Division of Business Affairs shall be the Trustees of the Presbytery of Detroit, Inc. It shall elect the following officers, who shall also be the officers of the Presbytery of Detroit, Inc.: President, Vicepresident, Secretary, Treasurer. The Division of Business Affairs shall:
  - (1) manage the property of the Presbytery, its insurance program, its investment portfolio, its funds, and shall monitor its budget.
  - (2) be responsible for seeing that all loans and property encumbrances of the Presbytery and its member churches are in accord with sound business practices and with the mission program of the Presbytery;
  - (3) supervise the operation of the Presbytery office.
- D. The Budget Division shall:
  - be responsible for implementing a complete budget process, which has been approved by Council, and which shall continue in effect until and unless amended by action of the Council; the budget process shall be presented for information at each January meeting of the Presbytery;
  - (2) report regularly to Council and directly to Presbytery, either for purposes of information or for recommendations for action;
  - (3) present to Presbytery, not later than the September meeting a Program Budget for the following year.

Chapter VIII - Permanent Judicial Commission

<u>Section 1:</u> A Permanent Judicial Commission shall be elected by the Presbytery, in accordance with provisions in the Rules of Discipline, D-4.0100, consisting of seven persons, four ministers and three elders or three ministers and four elders.

Section 2: It shall have the powers and duties described in D-4.0200, and shall conduct its business in accordance with the relevant provisions of The Rules of

Discipline.

#### Chapter IX - Agencies

#### Section 1: Agencies of Presbytery

- A. The Presbytery may establish agencies to carry out its work, and in doing so may establish and elect boards of directors.
- B. Such agencies may incorporate, subject to approval by the Presbytery.
- C. If an agency obtains property it shall do so under the provisions of Chapter VIII of the Form of Government of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

## Section 2: Ecumenical and Community Agencies

- A. Presbytery may initiate or take part in community and ecumenical agencies.
- B. If an agency in which the Presbytery is a member obtains property and, later is dissolved, a portion of the property, determined by the Presbytery's share in the operation of the agency, shall revert to the Presbytery, in accordance with Chapter VIII of the Form of Government.
- C. Ecumenical relations shall be governed by the provisions of G-15.0100-.0105.

#### Chapter X - Amendments

<u>Section 1</u>: These Bylaws may be amended at any stated meeting of the Presbytery, by a two-thirds vote, provided that written notice of the proposed amendment has been presented at a previous stated meeting. The vote, unless it is unanimous, must be counted and reported in the minutes of Presbytery.

Section 2: These Bylaws may be suspended by a three-fourths vote, except that Chapter X, Section 1, cannot be suspended. The vote, unless it is unanimous, must be counted and reported in the minutes of Presbytery.
