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MINUTES OF JANUARY 28, 1992, STATED MEETING PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT ALLEN PARK PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ALLEN PARK

THE GATHERING A quorum being present, the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was convened in stated session on Tuesday, January 28, 1992 at 5:30 p.m. at the Allen Park Presbyterian Church, Allen Park. The meeting was opened with prayer by the Moderator, Carol Hylkema.

absentions.

Mr. Oxtoby presented the committee's recommendation on sending an Overture to the General Assembly regarding Amending G-14.0501g Regarding Calling a Designated Pastor to the Position of Pastor. The recommendation was sustained. (Appendix D)

Moderator-Elect William Rumsey assumed moderating the meeting.

William Schram reported for the Committee on Ministry. Motions were

sustained that Presbytery:

Approve the Interim Pastor contract between the Rev. Charles Davidson and First Presbyterian Church, South Lyon, for twelve months, effective January 5, 1992, with the following terms: Salary \$19,885; Housing/Utilities \$10,000; Full pension; Medical \$870; Travel \$2,400; Study Leave \$428; Annual vacation of one month including four Sundays and study leave of two weeks per year, both pro-rated over the life of the contract. Contract may be terminated by the session or the Presbytery with 30 days notification. Mr. Davidson may terminate the contract with 30 days notification. This is a full time position. Appoint Mr. Davidson Moderator of the Session.

Extend the Supply Contract between the session of the Lakeland Church, Waterford, and the Rev. Douglas Carter to January 31, 1992.

Transfer the Rev. Donald Coleman to the Presbytery of Chicago per request of that Presbytery.

\$20,000; Housing: \$8,462. 10. Change the date of installation of Jennifer McLaren-Saad, at Rosedale Gardens, Livonia, to March 22, 1992 with same commission as approved in November 91.

Dissolved the pastoral relationship existing between Westminster Church of Detroit and the Rev. Diane Smalley at the request of Diane Smalley and the congregation meeting on December 8, 1992, effective January 28, 1992. Extended contract of the Rev. Larry Austin at First Church, Troy,

to May 12, 1992.

Corrected the salary for the Rev. Louis Thompson, part-time Parish Associate at Grosse Pointe Woods Church. Salary should be \$9,500, annualized.

COMMITTEE ON CHURCH STRATEGY Tom Hartley introduced William Fuerstenau, moderator of First Presbyterian Church, Detroit. Mr. Fuerstenau spoke briefly on the task force report on First Church which the presbytery adopted in May 1990 and he shared what has happened since that report was adopted.

> REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSION FOR THE TRUMBULL AVENUE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

John Sefcik reported for the Administrative Commission for the Trumbull Avenue Presbyterian Church and presented the Commission's recommendation that the commission be allowed to sell the bank building the church owns at fair market price.

The report was interrupted for the ORDER OF DAY, 7 pm - Worship.

<u>IV. WORSHIP</u> Worship including the Celebration of the Lord's Supper and the Installation of the Moderator and Vice-Moderator was led by Moderator Hylkema and the Rev. Edward Gehres, Jr. The theme of the Worship Service was "Partners." The scripture lessons were taken from Isaiah 61:1-11 and Philippians 1:3-11; 2:14-15. William Rumsey, First Presbyterian Church, Royal Oak was installed as Moderator and Elder Lawrence VanTil, Grosse Pointe Memorial was installed as Vice-Moderator.

V. BUSINESS TO BE ADOPTED BY MOTION AND DEBATE (PART II) A. ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSION, FOR TRUMBULL AVENUE CHURCH (CONT.)

Debate continued on the commission's request to sell the bank building. Motion was sustained to refer the sale of the bank building and the respective housing of the Barnabas Project of presbytery to the Committee on Metropolitan Mission to work in consultation with the Administrative Commission on future options for Barnabas Project and report to presbytery in February.

Question was asked concerning the report the presbytery directed the commission to bring to the presbytery in January concerning specific future plans for the church. The commission was not ready to make such a report.

Motion was sustained to instruct the commission to report specific plans for the future of the church at the February meeting of presbytery.

VI. SHARING OUR LIFE: EXPERIENCES, JOYS, CONCERNS

A. MODERATOR RUMSEY

Moderator Rumsey thanked the members of the Presbytery for the confidence placed in him by electing him to serve as moderator of the Presbytery.

B. JOYS AND CONCERNS

Members of the Presbytery shared concerns and joys in the life of the Presbytery and asked for continued support of those with special needs.

C. PEACEMAKING COMMITMENT RECOGNITION

Stated Clerk Schram presented a certificate of commendation awarded by the General Assembly PC (USA) to Tim Moran, peace enabler for the presbytery. Edward Gehres (Executive Presbyter), Peter Moore (chair Metropolitan Mission), Peter Boeve (chair peacemaking committee), and Warren Dennis (Associate for Metropolitan Mission) were with Mr. Moran as he received the certificate. The certificate recognizes that more than 50% of the congregations of the Presbytery have adopted a Commitment to Peacemaking. Members of churches who have adopted such a commitment were asked to stand and be recognized.

Executive Presbyter Gehres Informed the members of the Presbytery that the mother and grandparents of Cynthia Jones, who was recently abducted, are members of the Milford Presbyterian Church. He solicted the prayers and support of the Presbytery for Cynthia, her family and the members of Milford Presbyterian Church.

Mr. Gehres updated the Presbytery concerning the call of an avowed lesbian woman as pastor to a congregation in Rochester, NY. The call is going through the judical process of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Presently, it is being reviewed by the Permanent Judical Commission of the Synod of the Northeast.

Mr. Gehres called for a reaffirmation of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s concept of the beloved community. In the concept of the beloved community, there is a major difference between desegregation and integration. Integration goes beyond accepting people into the community, it includes care for one another across boundary lines, to aid people and congregations in distress. Mr. Gehres challenged the presbytery to envision ourselves as the beloved community, a community going beyond the boundaries that divide us, the Kingdom of God where

all human beings are seen as God's children. He challenged us to go beyond that which divides us and to move toward the greater good in our community.

REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRY OF THE PRESBYTERY

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE Α. Francile Anderson, introduced Louise Curlin, who reported on a Mission Interpretation Committee retreat to be held February 15, 1992

with Marg Carpenter as guest speaker.

Ms. Anderson reported that the Presbytery has 40 copies of the 1992 Mission Yearbook for Prayer and Study for sale at \$2.50 each. This issue is the 100th issue of the MYOP. She reported that there

are no copies left at headquarters in Louisville, KY.

She introduced Robert Arnold, who is a member of the Stewardship and Communications Mission Unit PC(USA) and a member of the Presbytery Stewardship Committee. Mr. Arnold reported that four churches have requested to be a part of the Y.E.S. program this year and encourged presbyters to keep mission pledges current.

EDUCATION AND NURTURE COMMITTEE Scott Simons reported for the Education and Nurture Committee. He called on Anna Marie Austin who highlighted the March 12 conference on "Enriching Your Pastoral Care" with Ross MacKenzie. Susan Frazier highlighted the Vacation Church School workshop on March 7, 1992. Scott announced that there will be a meeting March 9 to decide how best to use the Domestic Violence Project Monies (Bicentennial Fund).

ALMA COLLEGE Jan Holmes reported for Alma College. She reported that in December, scholarship funds were short and that after writing a letter to the churches enough money was received to honor all scholarship committments fully through June 1992. She reported that the Bicentennial Fund monies will finance the Alma-Stillman College Exchange. Ms. Holmes reported that there is a Religious Leadership Award for entering freshmen. The deadline for application is Feb. 1.

BICENTENNIAL FUND Richard Milford reported for the Bicentennial Fund Committee. reported that pledgeds have exceeded the goal of 2.5 million dollars, that the committee is still working, and that \$212,000 has been disbursed among the Bicentennial Fund Projects. He stated that an accountibility Committee has been formed and is working.

VIII. ADJOURNMENT
There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned by Moderator William Rumsey at 9:24 with prayer which incorporated the joys and concerns which had been shared.

The next stated meeting of the Presbytery will convene Tuesday, February 25, 1992 at the Redford Presbyterian Church, Detroit, at 5:30 p.m.

Following discussion and presentation of background information and history on the property, Council voted to refer to the Committee on Church Strategy the recommendation that "Any net profits be channeled into a mission project to benefit the community in which the bank building is located" with instructions that they consult with the Committee on Metropolitan Mission and bring back to Council recommendations on the use of the net profits.

Council then approved the request to lease the bank building located at 14628 E. Jefferson, Detroit, Michigan to Financial Exchange Company, a subsidary of Monetary Management Corporation whose corporate offices are in Philadelphia. The terms of the lease are as follows:

FIRST OPTION:

1/1/92 thru 10/31/94 base rate of \$1,250.00 per month.

SECOND OPTION:

11/1/94 thru 10/31/99 base rate of \$1,500.00 per month.

ADDENDUMS:

Lessee to contract for parking lot sealing within six months of occupying building. Lessor will pay one-half of the cost. Lessor to pay their one half payment thru rent reduction in six equal payments following completion. Lessor's maximum contribution to be \$2,000.00.

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- B) Lessor states that the roof, furnace and air conditioning are in good working order. If not, Lessor will bring roof, furnace and air conditioner into good working order prior to Lessee occupying building. Any repairs to furnace, air conditioner, or roof within first six months of lease, Lessor agrees to pay one half of the cost.
- C) It is mutually agreed that in connection with lessee's operations of distributing, issuing or delivering of food stamps, should Lessee (1) loss it's contract to conduct any such operation or (2) be instructed by the government agency having jurisdiction to relocate any such operations to a location other than the premises herein demised, Lessee shall have the right to terminate this lease upon ninety days written notice to Lessor with no further obligation on the part of Lessee.
- D) Lessee agrees to pay all property taxes and to maintain adequate insurance on the premises naming the Lessor as an additionally insured.
- E) Lessee agrees to maintain the premises and make all repairs to the building except for structural repairs.

If proposal is accepted Lessee has fourteen days to have building professionally inspected and meet its approval. Based on the results of said inspection, Lessee may cancel lease at that time.

Neil Cowling requested the minutes reflect his negative vote on this recommendation.

Overture on Amending G-14.0501g Regarding Calling a Designated Pastor to the Position of Pastor

Whereas, the Book of Order allows the calling of a designated pastor as pastor at the end of the designated term; and

Whereas, G-14.0502 appears to require a search process before the position of pastor can be filled; and

Whereas, the designated pastor has played a vital role in the implementation of the goals of the church during the designated term; and

Whereas, the congregation's goals for the designated term may not be fully realized at the end of the designated term, and the skills of the designated pastor may be appropriate to the future pastoral needs of the church; and

Whereas, for reasons of continuity and appropriateness to their ministry, the church may want to consider the designated pastor to be the pastor of the church; and

Whereas, the length of the search process and/or the appointment of an interim might be disruptive to the church and the continued progress on the goals of the designated term; therefore, be it

Whereas, the continuation of this situation could soon leave little or no effective Presbyterian presence in many inner cities; and Whereas, if one of our city churches suffers in membership decline and struggles to minister to a changing neighborhood, then the whole

presbytery suffers, and the denomination suffers; and
Whereas, almost all of us depend in many ways on the livelihood of
the city; and

Whereas, the city is the site of tremendous power and affluence in proximity to tremendous poverty, powerlessness, and pain; and

Whereas, we are instructed by the Gospels to provide a ministry of presence and reconciliation to men, women, and children, and to peoples of all economic, educational, and social stations, and to people of diverse and alternative life-styles; and

Whereas, we must come to see ourselves in partnership with Jesus of Nazareth in ministry and mission in the city and in the world, continuing to support ministries of city churches as a body as a part of our ministry to the whole world; and

Whereas, we are a people with a vision for the future and an awareness of the past, who choose to remain in our cities -regardless of racial, cultural, and economic differences -- to be participants in the reconstruction of urban life, in accordance with our faith, our baptism, and our experience of Jesus Christ; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Presbytery of Detroit respectfully overture the 204th General Assembly (1992) to act as follows:

Dr. Kim has been the pastor of the church for 21 years. During that time the attendance has has grown to 1000 persons, with 350 attending church school. Dr. Kim has been a leader, teacher and outstanding preacher during his tenure as pastor. Elder Kim Lee also spoke of the work of Dr. Kim. Moderator Rumsey recognized the Honorable Retirement of Pastor Kim and presented him with a certificate commemorating his retirement.

- B. ECUMENCIAL DECADE OF CHURCHES IN SOLIDARITY WITH WOMEN Nancy Draves reported for the Special Committee on the Ecumenical Decade of Churches in Solidarity with women. She presented the history and background of the Ecumenical decade and spoke of the role and work of the Presbytery of Detroit Special Committee.

C. STEWARDSHIP

Robert Arnold reported for the Stewardship Committee. He stated that two reports reflecting the giving patterns of the churches in the Presbytery were distributed with the papers for the meeting.

Fran Anderson reported for the Mission sub-committee on the Global Mission Conference that she attended at Montreat and requested that congregations consider sending persons to the 1992 conference. She reminded the presbyters to order the 1993 Mission Yearbook for Prayer & Study by June 15, 1992 to receive it for \$2.50 per copy. The Mission Interpretation Committee needs an editor for the New Mission Advocate publication.

D. ALMA COLLEGE

Jan Holmes thanked the Presbytery for all of the referrals that were sent to Alma. Alma has more applications and commitments that it has received in the past five years. She introduced Jesse Perry, Chaplain atr Alma College. He reported that beginning in the fall 1993, the 7.2 million dollar Performing Arts Center will be completed and that there are 352 students enrolled for the fall term.

- 3. Grant permission to the <u>Grosse Pointe Memorial Presbyterian Church</u> to accept as a gift and then sell at fair market value a building lot (parcel #511-52-0680) located in Pinal County, Casa Grande, Arizona. The acceptance of this gift will be contingent upon the receipt of an approved environmental test and proof of clear title.

Vice-Moderator Larry Van Til abstained from voting on the two items concerning Grosse Pointe Memorial Church since he is member of that congregation.

The following information was shared with the council:

- a. The Property and Investments Committee has retained the services of a Realtor to handle the search for a possible site for a New Church Development in the Heartland area. The Committee believes the interests of the Presbytery would best be served by having such professional assistance.

E. STAFF STUDY

Ed Gehres reported for the special committee to study the staff. The concerns about the slow start of the committee have been heard, but he urged patience and the continuance of the study. He hopes that the Bank Building may be converted into another mission center that will minister to the people in that community.

REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY ALCOHOL AND DRUG ABUSE TASK FORCE Norma Wilson reported for the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Task Force of Presbytery. She related the history of the "Is There An Elephant in

Your Sanctuary" project of the Presbyterian Network on Alcohol & Other Drug Abuse. A meditative skit on the effects of alcoholism on the family was presented.

- 2-CENTS PER MEAL PROGRAM В. Kathy Smith reported on the 2-cents a meal program of the task force on hunger. She reminded the Presbytery that next month we will be voting on whether or not to approve the program. She mentioned several other programs that the task force on hunger is in the process of developing.
- SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE ECUMENICAL DECADE Christine Freeman and Don Hill reported for the Special Committee on the Ecumenical Decade of Churches in Solidarity with Women. will be two workshops sponsored by the committee at Super Saturday, Sept. 19: 1) Ecumencial Decade Overview and 2) Inclusive Language. In June, the committee will be presenting the Issue of Concern during the presbytery meeting. Don Hill told of the accomplishments and plans of the Women's Ministry Unit in support of the Ecumenical Decade of Churches in Solidarity with Women of Churches in Solidarity with Women.
- COMMITTEE ON OUTDOOR MINISTRIES D. Michael Fonfara introduced Pamela Aue who highlighted the Summer Camping program of the Committee On Outdoor Ministries.
- E. COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP Fran Anderson reported for the mission interpretation committee. reminded the presbytery that October is Month-of-Mission and that now is the time to schedule a mission co-worker or mission interpreter from the PC(USA) to speak at churches in October. Fram introduced Charles McCloskey, Wills Emphasis Chair, who asked the presbyters to encourage their church members to remember the church as part of their estate plan.

ISSUE OF CONCERN VII. Lawrence Glenn, Valerie Giles-Reynolds, and Mardred Smith reported some experiences that they received as part of the Interracial Cross Cultural Experiences IV travel seminar to Costa Rica and Guatemala. The seminar was sponsored by the Regional Ministries Unit and Cabinet on Ethnic Church Affairs of the Synod of the Covenant.

SHARING OUR LIFE VIII. RECOGNITION OF PHILIP MAGEE

The life and work of the Rev. Philip Magee, Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Plymouth, was recognized by moving statements from members of the presbytery and First Church. Moderator Rumsey presented a certificate in recognition of the retirement of Rev. Magee.

JOYS AND CONCERNS OF PRESBYTERY Members of the Presbytery shared joys and concerns for members, their families and friends. Several members expressed gratitude for the prayers of the presbytery during their times of need.

IX. ADJOURNMENT There being no further business to come before the presbytery, the meeting was adjourned by moderator Rumsey at 8:45 with prayer which incorporated the joys and concerns which had been shared with the presbytery.

COMMITTEES OF COUNCIL THEOLOGY AND WORSHIP COMMITTEE

Peter Bower reported for the committee. He detailed the two services referred to in chapter three of the Directory for Worship: The Service for the Lord's Day and the Daily Prayer Service. He shared the history of each and why they are ordered the way they are ordered. The committee will be using a variety of expressions in preparing the worship for the presbytery meetings.

Chairperson Hylkema assumed chairing the meeting.

B. PLANNING AND STRUCTURE COMMITTEE

Mardred Smith reported for the committee. She shared information that the following units will be reviewed in 1992: Theology and Worship Committee, Committee on Church Strategy, Committee on Evangelism, Committee on Education and Nurture, Committee on Stewardship. She also shared with the council the ways in which the committees of presbytery and council have structured themselves.

C. STAFF SERVICES COMMITTEE

Dick Milford was unable to attend the meeting and at his request the policies which were presented for reading in April will not be acted upon until the June meeting.

D. BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Jerome Seaton presented the report of the committee. Motion was susatained to recommend to presbytery that the 1993 presbytery portion of the per capita be \$5.38.

E. PROPERTY AND INVESTMENTS COMMITTEE

Stan King presented the report of the committee. Following debate, discussion and some amendment motions were sustained that council:

- 1. Approve the acceptance of the annual contract with Compudata Incorporated with the following terms: Hardware support \$464.75 per month, Software maintenance (Xenix/unix version) of Brother John \$420 annually, and Software maintenance agreement for real world etc. \$480 annually.
- 2. a. Recommend that presbytery appoint an Administrative Commission comprised of Property and Investments Committee members Rev. David Sherwin, Rev. Roland Keebler, Rev. Tom Eggebeen, Elder Stan King (Ann Arbor, First), Bernard Walker (Detroit, Hope), Ron Wallis (Dearborn, First), Sandy Welch (Orchard Lake, Community), and authorize them to negotiate on behalf of presbytery an offer to purchase property in the Hartland, MI area near US-23 and M-59 at the best possible price, not to exceed fair market value.
 - b. Authorize Stan King, Ron Wallis and Sandy Welch to continue negotiation on an offer to purchase land in the Hartland, MI area and if possible to bring terms directly to the presbytery at its May meeting.
- 3. Grant permission to the Farmington First Presbyterian Church to borrow from a commercial lender up to \$1,100,000 at the best available interest rate, with details of the loan to be reported to the Administrator for Business Affairs at the time of closing.
- 4. Recommend presbytery approve the "Policy Regarding the Presbytery's Role in Housing Pastors and Other Ministers." (Appendix A)

F. STEERING COMMITTEE

Larry Van Til reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that council:

- Change the June council meeting to June 16, 1992, so as to avoid a conflict with the meeting of the General Assembly.
- Approved the docket for the May 26, 1992 stated meeting of presbytery as amended.

III. ANNUAL STAFF REPORT

Artheillia Thompson, Hunger Action Enabler, presented her annual staff report. She shared with the council the dire statistics of the situations with which she works and shared where the presbytery is and is not involved. She related how poverty, hunger and racism are all intertwined. She focuses on education, to help people better their lives, while trying to find pantries and outlets to help thier immediate needs for living. She challenged the council with a question: What are we willing to commit the presbytery to doing and being?

IV. ADJUNCT UNITS A. PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

Ruth McKinnon reported on an upcoming leadership retreat.

B. SYNOD

George Irwin reported on the synod assembly and shared his impressions from a video on paradigms. He commended this video to be considered by the steering committee in planning the next council retreat.

V. STANDING COMMITTEES A. EDUCATION AND NURTURE

Susan Frazier reported on a June 2 program for those involved in adult programs and ministries, to be held at Birmingham, First Church.

B. NOMINATIONS

Ken Lister reported the committee on nominations is recommending to the planning and structure committee that a change be made in the bylaws to combine the committee on racial ethnic concerns and the committee on representation into one committee.

VI. EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported a concern from the office involving decisions of whether or not to approve mailing labels for fund-raising activities.

He shared information concerning the organ at the prior Calvary Church (Detroit) site. The organ had been donated to the church from Orchestra Hall. They did not wish to have the organ back. it has been donated to Music House (a museum) in Traverse City and will be used by Interlochen once it is retored.

VII. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business the council was adjourned with prayer by Carol Hylkema at 5:25 p.m.

POLICY REGARDING THE PRESBYTERY'S ROLE IN HOUSING PASTORS AND OTHER MINISTERS

I - GENERAL PRINCIPLES:

A - RESPONSIBILITY:

- It is the responsibility of the particular church or calling agency to provide adequate housing for pastors and ministers. Churches are advised to consider the long-range implications of this responsibility. Churches which sell a manse will be expected to use the net proceeds from the sale to meet future housing needs of pastors.
- The Presbytery takes no position regarding the means of providing such housing (e.g. manse, housing allowance, etc.).
- 3. The Presbytery has the responsibility of reviewing the adequacy of housing provisions when it considers calls and changes in calls. The Committee on Ministry will be responsible for overseeing this review.
- 4. The Presbytery may provide financial assistance to churches and ministers in securing housing, subject to the consideration of need and the availability of resources.

B - FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE:

- Financial assistance from the Presbytery will be in the form of loans.
- The Presbytery's interest in such loans will be secured. Agreements related to such security interest will be recorded.
- Except in the case of loans to assist churches in purchasing a manse, the loan ordinarily will be made to the minister.

II - IMPLEMENTATION OF FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE:

A - GENERAL

- Matters pertaining to financial assistance for housing will be administered by the Trustees of the Presbytery (Presbytery Council through its Property & Finance Committee).
- 2. A bank-approved appraisal of the property being purchased shall be provided to the Presbytery.
- The purchase price ordinarily will not exceed the fair market value price as established by a qualified neutral party.
- 4. Title insurance shall be obtained.

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- Ordinarily no more than 20% of the appraised value will be loaned by the Presbytery.
- Term of loan repayment ordinarily will not exceed seven (7) years.

B - CHURCHES PURCHASING MANSES

All regular procedures and conditions for church loans will apply.

C - MINISTERS PURCHASING HOMES

- Application for loan will be made by minister to the Property & Investments Committee which will notify the session of the church.
- 2. A financial statement will be submitted by the minister.
- 3. Personal appearance by the minister before representatives of the Trustees may be required.
- 4. When a primary loan, secured by a first mortgage, is being obtained by the minister, the Presbytery's interest will be secured by a duly recorded seconded mortgage.
- 5. When the property is being purchased by a land contract:
 - a. The contract will be reviewed by Presbytery's Legal Counsel.
 - b. The Presbytery's interest will be protected by an appropriate means, (e.g. contingent assignment to Presbytery of the purchaser's interest; or the Presbytery being named in the contract as co-purchaser with the minister; etc)
 - c. The minister will guarantee in writing to the Trustees that he/she assumes primary responsibility for all obligations related to the purchase of the property.
- 6. Loans to ministers will be recorded with the Presbytery's Stated Clerk and Committee on Ministry.
- 7. Loans shall be due and payable when the minister ceases to be a continuing member of the Presbytery of Detroit. Ministers having a loan with the Presbytery shall make satisfactory provision for fulfilling the obligation as a condition for the release of credentials to another presbytery.

- 4. To design and implement, in consultation with the Evangelism and Church Development Ministry Unit and the synod, a ten-year church development plan, with specific five-year goals for new church development and redevelopment.
- 5. To assess and pursue opportunities for evangelism through ministries of the presbytery and through other ministries within the bounds of the presbytery.
- 6. To help congregations and other ministries carry out their evangelism plans by:
 - a. making Evangelism Opportunity Assessments and other evangelism materials available:
 - b. holding evangelism training events dealing with witnessing and faith sharing for ministers and lay leaders; and
 - c. aiding churches and other ministries in setting growth goals, and celebrating annually those that reach their goals.
- 7. To seek out and invite persons gifted for evangelism to consider whether they are called to the ministry of Word and Sacrament or other church vocations.
- 8. To evaluate annually our progress on these commitments, to recommit to evangelism and to make adjustments as needed.

A THEOLOGICAL BASIS FOR FAITHFULNESS

God calls the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to be the body of Christ in this world and to make Christ known. Jesus Christ is the vine and we are the branches; apart from him we can do nothing (John 15:5). Therefore health and growth in the Presbyterian body begin with calling people to life in Christ, through the work of the Holy Spirit.

Human sinfulness severed the relationship with God for which humankind was created, resulting in a separation beyond repair apart from Divine initiative. Thus the urgency of the good news: God took the initiative in sending Jesus Christ to this earth "to seek and save those who are lost" (Luke 19:10). Jesus Christ came to call all peoples to repent and become his disciples, for "there is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among mortals by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12).

This good news of God's reconciling love in Jesus Christ calls for an active response of faith, which includes a personal commitment to Jesus as Savior and Lord expressed in corporate involvement in the church, his body, and obedient service in the world. Without this response the work of restoration remains unfulfilled; the branch still remains apart from the vine. Through faith, relationship with the living God is restored, for "by grace you are saved through faith..." (Ephesians 2:8).

The restored relationship with the living God accomplished in Jesus Christ provides the one ultimate source of joy, healing, wholeness and life. Thus the urgent calling of God upon the whole church is to proclaim in word and deed "the gospel for the salvation of humankind" (Book of Order, G-1.0200) as the only source of abundant life and eternal hope.

The theological basis of this report is faithfulness to Jesus Christ, expressed by calling people into life-commitment to:

The Person of Christ: "In affirming with the earliest Christians that Jesus is Lord, the church confesses that he is its hope and that the church, as Christ's body, is bound to his authority and thus free to live in the lively, joyous reality of the grace of God." (Book of Order, G-1.0100)

The Body of Christ: "The church is a fellowship of believers which seeks the enlargement of the circle of faith to include all people and is never content to enjoy the benefits of Christian community for itself alone." (Book of Order, G-4.0200)

The Work of Christ: "The church is called to present the claims of Jesus Christ, leading persons to repentance, acceptance of him as Savior and Lord, and new life as his disciples...participating in God's activity in the world...ministering to the needs of the poor, the sick, the lonely, and the powerless." (Book of Order, G-3.0300)

DOCKET. Adopt the docket as presented. A motion to amend the docket to adjourn the meeting at 9:00 pm with unfinished business to be taken up at a subsequent meeting was defeated.

C. WELCOME BY HOST PASTOR

The Rev. Paul Bousquette, Pastor, Village Presbyterian Church welcomed the members of Presbytery.

EVENING PRAISE AND PRAYER SERVICE II. An Evening Praise and Prayer Service was led by the Theology & Worship Committee of the Presbytery Council. The Scripture lesson was taken from I Kings 19:15-21. The reflection, titled "Burning the Yoke," was brought by Nancy Draves. Special music was furnished by the Chancel Choir of Village Presbyterian Church of Redford, Carolyn Thibideaux, Organist-Choir Director.

III. BUSINESS TO BE ADOPTED BY MOTION AND DEBATE Moderator Rumsey offered a prayer for illumination in preparation for the business of the Presbytery.

A. STATED CLERK Stated Clerk Schram presented part II of her report.

B. TREASURER Treasurer Wilma Dellinger presented the treasurer's report and pointed out that as of May 31, 1992, the Office of the Presbytery has received 36.42% of the pledges and that 41.67% of the year has passed.

Carol Hylkema reported for Council. Motions were sustained that Presbytery:

Receive the June 16, 1992, minutes as the record of all actions

taken during that meeting. (Appendix A) Approve a VSO in the amount of \$40,000 for the Hartland Area New Church Development.

Enroll Mary Ann Standing and Richard Grant as members of Presbytery, in accordance with G-11.0101c, for the duration of their service on the staff of the Presbytery.

Jerome Seaton, Chair, Budget and Finance Committee of Council reported that as of May 31, 1992, 42% of the year has gone by and only 23% of General Mission money has been received. He requested that elders and pastors report the situation to their sessions for

positive action.

James Conley, Chair, Special Committee to Study Staff reported for the committee. He reported that the committee has interviewed staff and has contacted other presbyteries that are in similar situations. The committee will be contacting the presbyters during the next two months of their opinions as to the direction that the Presbytery should take in this matter.

E. COMMITTEE ON PREPARATION FOR MINISTRY

Steve Melde reported for Committee on Preparation for Ministry.

1. Mr. Melde introduced Inquirer Elaine Olmstead, A member of the First Presbyterian Church, Birmingham, who has fulfilled all requirements to become a candidate. After hearing her statement of faith, and opportunity being given for questions from the floor, Presbytery voted to arrest and sustain the examination, and to enroll Ms. Olmstead as a candidate.

Mr. Melde introduced Inquirer Rufus Hatcher, A member of Gratiot Avenue Presbyterian Church, Detroit, who has fulfilled all requirements to become a candidate. After hearing his statement of faith, and opportunity being given fro questions from the

floor, Presbytery voted to arrest and sustain the examination, and to enroll Mr. Hatcher as a candidate.
Mr. Melde presented Deborah Smith-Powell, A member of the Garden City Church and a candidate under the care of the Presbytery of Detroit to be examined for ordination. After hearing her statement of faith, and opportunity being given for questions from the floor, Presbytery voted to arrest the examination, and to proceed with the ordination of Deborah Smith-Powell and to transfer her credentials to Lake Michigan Presbytery as requested. Mr. Melde presented John Caster, a candidate under-care of the Presbytery of Western new York to be examined for ordination.

After hearing his statement of faith and opportunity being given

After hearing his statement of faith, and opportunity being given for questions from the floor, Presbytery voted to arrest the examination, and to proceed to the ordination of Mr. Caster, should the way be clear.

Moderator Rumsey asked the constitutional questions of Ms. Olmstead and Mr. Hatcher. They answered in the affirmative. Moderator Rumsey offered a prayer for guidance for the candidates and the Presbytery.

William Schram reported for the Committee on Ministry. Upon recommendation of the committee, motions were sustained that Presbytery:

Approve the call of Brian Hamilton as Associate Pastor at Jefferson Avenue Church, Detroit, effective July 6, 1992, and enroll him as a member of Presbytery upon ordination. Terms of call are: Salary and Housing \$25,620; Auto allowance \$1,800; Study allowance \$300; Full pension; 1 1/2% Medical; 7.65% FICA; Moving costs; One month vacation, including 4 Sundays; Two weeks study leave. AA/EEO guidelines of the denomination have been

followed during the search process.

Approve the call of the Rev. Paul Irwin as pastor at White Lake Church, effective August 1, 1992. Terms of call are: Salary \$18,785; Housing \$12,000; Auto allowance \$2,750; FICA \$2,904; Business expense \$180; Book allowance \$300; Study allowance \$500; Full pension and medical; One month vacation, including 4 Sundays; Two weeks study leave. AA/EEO guidelines of the denomination have

been followed during the search process.
Dissolve the pastoral relationship between the Rev. Roland Keebler and Christ Memorial Church, Royal Oak, effective October 1, 1992, and grant Mr. Keebler the status of Honorably Retired, effective

October 1, 1992.
Enroll the Rev. Robert Bonds, United Church of Christ minister working with singles group at First Church, Ann Arbor, as a corresponding member for 1992.

Recommend that sessions and congregations consider an increase of

4% pastor's salary and housing for 1993.

7. Increase the salary and housing minimum terms of call by 4% for

1993. (Appendix B)
Appoint the Committee on Ministry an Administrative Commission with authority to appoint moderators to vacant churches between the June and September Stated Meetings of Presbytery.

Concur with the request of the Joslyn Avenue Church, Pontiac, to

name the Rev. Edmond I. Watkins Pastor Emeritus.

10. Appoint the following persons as the Administrative Commission to install the Rev. In Soon Choi as Co-Pastor of the Korean Presbyterian Church of Metro Detroit on June 28, 1992 at 3 P.M., and that they be seated as corresponding members where appropriate: Ministers: Jenny Schram, Moderator's Designee; T. Andrew Kim; Dong Won Park, Presbytery of Lake Huron; Duk Ci Ahn, Presbytery of Lake Huron. Elders: Katherine Vernon (Fort Street, Detroit); Ben H. Rhiew (Korean Presbyterian Church); Young Mo Lee (Korean Presbyterian Church); Tai P. Yoo (Korean Presbyterian Church)

11. Appoint the Rev. Katherine McIntosh-Smith moderator of Southwest

Church, Detroit.

Salary and Housing \$32,171; Travel \$.24/mile up to \$2,000; Study allowance \$300; Full pension and medical deductible as specified by the Board of Pensions; one month vacation, including 4 Sundays per year; Two weeks study leave per year.

Rev. Schram welcomed new pastors to the Presbytery.

COMMITTEE ON RACIAL ETHNIC CONCERNS Sammie Solomon reported for the Committee on Racial Ethnic Upon recommendation of the committee, a motion was sustained to adopt A Resolution on the 500th Anniversary of Christopher Columbus in the Mid-West. (Appendix C)

COMMITTEE ON METROPOLITAN MISSION Peter Moore reported for Metropolitan Mission. Upon recommendation of the committee motions were sustained to:

Endorse the Hunger Action Enabler's position Adopt a resolution establishing a "2 Cents Per Meal" Program . Kathy White reported that the committee will sponsor a "2 Cents Per Meal" workshop on Saturday, September 19, 1992 at the Super Saturday Event and that individual churches will be given opportunity to participate in the plan.

I. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH STRATEGY

Tom Hartley reported for the Committee on Church Strategy. Tom
Hartley recommended a "Proposed Strategy For The Presbytery of
Detroit" for adoption. (Appendix D). A motion to amend the document
by retiring it "Guidelines For The Work of the Committee on Church Strategy" was defeated. A motion to amend the title of the document to read "Provisional Strategy For The Presbytery of Detroit's Ministry with Congregations," was accepted as a friendly motion thereby changing the title of the document to "Provisional Strategy For The Presbytery of Detroit's Ministry with Congregations."

A motion to refer the document to the Committee on Church Strategy for fine tuning of the document was proposed. An amendment to the motion to refer the document to the Planning and Structure Committee of Presbytery Council for use in dialogue with all units of presbytery and that they prepare the final draft and that Planning and Structure bring it back to Presbytery was sustained. An amendment to the motion to refer to add with Planning and Structure reporting back to Presbytery by the October meeting of Presbytery was sustained.

Tom Hartley introduced Rev. Chambers and members of the New Grace New Church Development and stated that the committee had reviewed

their work at the six month point and renewed the New Church
Development for the six months remaining in 1992.

He also introduced members of Faith, Brandon Township New Church
Development and pastor Laura Sias-lee. A motion to adopt the mission directions of Faith, Brandon Township NCD was sustained. (Appendix E).

Mr. Hartley reported that the Committee on Church Strategy is in the process of site acquisition for Hartland New Church Development and encouraged those who are able to commit to partnership in creating a new church with Hartland.

OTHER BUSINESS - TRUMBULL AVENUE COMMISSION Lawrence Glenn reported that the Administrative Commission for Trumbull Avenue will have a report at the September meeting of Presbytery.

IV. MEETING OF THE CORPORATION The presbytery recessed for a meeting of the Corporation during which the annual audit report was received.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER Executive Presbyter Gehres reported that the General Assembly Council has called a convocation to take place in October entitled "Discern The Spirit - Envision Our Future." The purpose of the convocation is to provide an opportunity for the entire church to look at and plan for its mission for the year 1999. Our Presbytery will be asked to provide twelve lay people that are from congregations of

200-600 members; ages to be over 40 in the metropolitan urban/surburan area to meet with representatives of GAC as part of a local listening Mr. Gehres would like to have suggestions of persons to be a part of this group.

VI. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY A. YOUTH TRIENNIUM

John Richie reported on the Youth-Triennium. 52 Youth and 9 leaders from the Presbytery of Detroit will be attending the Youth Triennium at Purdue University in July.

B. GENERAL ASSEMBLY COMMISSIONERS Each of the eleven General Assembly Commissioners reported on a particular phase of the GA in which they were personally involved. Youth Advisory Delegate Rebecca Romanski was elected co-moderator of the YAD's and was asked to open the Saturday morning Plenary Session with prayer. The Presbytery of Detroit received a Peace Dove commemorating the fact that more than 50% of our congregations have signed the Commitment for Peacemaking. Peter Moore presented the dove to Tim Moran, Presbytery Peace Enabler. The Commissioners expressed their appreciation for being elected to serve as GA Commissioners. Rev. Gehres expressed his appreciation to the commissioners for their dedicated work at the GA.

C. EVANGELISM COMMITTEE Richard Danielak reported for the Evangelism Committee. He stated that the committee is willing to assist congregations to focus on an active evangelism effort. He reported that there will be a mid-west evangelism celebration September 23-26, 1992 in Chicago.

> VII. ISSUE OF CONCERN SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE ECUMENICAL DECADE OF CHURCHES

Neil Cowling spoke on inclusive language and the need for choosing language carefully. He referred to the pamphlet "Well Chosen Words" and recommended that the presbyters read it. Susan Baldin reflected on the importance of words and the power of language in our lives.

VIII. SHARING OUR LIFE: EXPERIENCES, JOYS, CONCERNS
Members of the presbytery shared joys and concerns for members,
their families and friends. Several members expressed gratitude for
the prayers of the presbytery during their times of need.

IX. ADJOURNMENT There being no further business to come before the Presbytery, the meeting was adjourned by moderator Rumsey at 9:53 P.M. with prayer that incorporated the joys and concerns which had been shared with the presbytery.

The next stated meeting of the presbytery will convene on Tuesday, September 22, 1992, at 5:30 pm at Westminster Church, Detroit.

Motion was sustained to hold the retreat on Tuesday, September 15 with Planning and Structure Committee to coordinate time and arrangements and to notify members of Council.

D. BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

. Presbytery approve a VSO in the amount of \$40,000 for the

Hartland Area New Church Development.

2. Concerns were raised over the general mission budget and the low level of receipts at this time. A motion asking committees to reduce spending by 5% immediately failed. A motion was sustained that the Budget and Finance Committee is to review the budget and bring a proposal for handling the deficit to a special meeting in July.

The Committee on Stewardship and Mission Interpretation was asked to follw-up with churches on the lack of General

Mission pledges and the low rate of remittance.

III. ANNUAL STAFF REPORT

Tim Moran, part-time peace enabler for the presbytery presented his annual report. He spoke first to the relationship of his position to staff - his is a part-time position funded by receipts from the peacemaking offering which come through a grant from the Synod. In his report he noted barriers which can be identified and the lack of communication and unity across these barriers. He raised the question whether presbytery needs the function and person of a peace enabler as it is now structured in the presbytery or are structural modifications needed?

IV. SPECIAL REPORT

TASK FORCE FOR GRANDALE CHURCH AND MISSION CENTER
Ted Taylor, a member of the task force was introduced. He

5. Approve continuing the interest rate for loans from Presbytery at 5 1/2% through December 31, 1992.

6. Pending approval by the Committee on Church Strategy and the Committee on Property & Investments, approve the purchase of a used 1983, 9 passenger Dodge van from Shirley A. Briskey for \$1,600 to be used by the Arab-American New Church Development, and authorize receipting a contribution from Ms. Briskey for \$400. (The van will be paid for by contributions already in hand from members of the NCD. An inspection of the van by a Troy car dealership indicates the van would normally sell for \$3,000.)

The committee shared the following information:

 The Presbytery Endowment invested at Comerica had a market value of \$7,578,212 as of June 1, 1992 (This includes the Fort Street Joy Fund). The portfolio is distributed as follows: Equities - 48%; Fixed Income - 48%; and Cash - 4%.

 The Third New Hope Baptist Church is assigning their equity in the land contract held by the Presbytery to National Bank of Detroit.

B. STEERING COMMITTEE

Larry Van Til reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that council:

B. Following amendments for inclusion of reports and business the council approved the presbytery docket for the June 23 meeting with an adjournment time of 11:00 p.m.

C. Change the starting time for Council meetings to 2:30 p.m.

D. Deny the request of the Fort Street Church to publicize their Pledge-a-Wash to each church in the presbytery and to have docket time to present the program to presbytery in June. The church will be advised that they have access to the unofficial papers table at presbytery meetings.

E. Recommend presbytery enroll Mary Ann Standing and Richard Grant as members of presbytery, in accordance with G-11.0101c, for the duration of their service on the staff of

the presbytery.

F. Concern has been brought to the steering committee that there

Executive Presbyter Gehres distributed a letter from Artheillia Thompson which promotes a new direction in mission which includes education and training in addition to meeting immediate needs for living.

VII. ADJUNCT UNITS A. PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

Sally Rankin reported on the upcoming Synod Gathering of Presbyterian Women.

VIII. STANDING COMMITTEES CHURCH STRATEGY

Tom Hartley reported on the revised strategy statement which is being presented to presbytery for approval in June. Motion was sustained that the council recommend that the strategy document be retitled "Guidelines for the work of the Committee on Church Strategy; " and that the Planning and Structure Committee be instructed to consider the document during the process of developing revised Mission Directions for the presbytery as a whole.

Church Strategy will be presenting to presbytery a revised mission design for Faith NCD in Ortonville. The new design provides for greater accountability of the sterring committee.

COMMITTEE ON MINISTRY В.

Bill Schram reported the committee will be asking presbytery to name the committee as an Administrative Commission to appoint moderators for vacant churches until the September meeting of presbytery. He asked that Planning and Structure Committee consider including such powers in the bylaws.

PRESBYTERY MINUTES, JUNE 23, 1992 APPENDIX C

DETROIT PRESBYTERY RESOULTION

on the 500th Anniversary of Christopher Columbus in the Mid-West

WHEREAS, in 1992 observances of the 500th anniversary of the arrival of Christopher Columbus in the new world will be held; and

WHEREAS, such observances will be planned and take place in the cities and towns within the bounds of Detroit Presbytery and Detroit Presbytery's Congregations; and

WHEREAS, the commonly held view that Christopher Columbus "discovered America" is an interpretation of American history from an Eurocentric point of view, one which serves to perpetuate a denigration of Native America culture and non white history in North America; and

WHEREAS, violence, though not unknown to pre Columbus America, was raised to new brutal and sustained levels of institutionalized racism subsequent to the arrival of Christopher Columbus in the "new world", despite courageous efforts by some Christians to overcome racism and its dehumanizing consequences; and

WHEREAS, attempts at exploitation, of indigenous Americans and their resources continue to persist and justice remains to be carried out; and

WHEREAS, Presbyterians affirm all peoples have been created in God's image, that Jesus Christ came to pave the world, that Jesus Christ set us an example of a servant life by preaching, healing, and renewing, and calls his people to practice justice, mercy, and honesty; and

WHEREAS, indigenous North Americans, Carribeans, Central Americans and Latin Americans will declare 1992 a year of mourning over the injustices of the past 500 years.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Detroit Presbytery, meeting at Village Presbyterian Church the Presbytery in Detroit, Michigan, on June 23, declares the following as the result of the record of history and the convictions of our faith, and in an effort to move forward in our witness for the integrity of creation, justice and peace:

1. That the Committee on Racial Ethnic Concerns (in consultation with the committee(s) of Education and Nurture and Metropolitan Mission) remind Presbyterians through their constituted endeavors of the implications of the Columbus expeditions for the indigenous inhabitants and for other racial ethnic people who subsequently came to the Americas; and especially of the oppression, repression and exploitation to which peoples were subject throughout the several colonial periods and event to this day;

- 2. Help Presbyterians reflect during the remainder of 1992 upon the 500 years since the arrival of Columbus and to discern both that which is worthy of affirmation and that for which the most faithful attitude is contrition;
- 3. Strengthen the will of Presbyterians to work as agents of reconciliation and healing through designed activities and celebrations so as to further the causes of diversity and inclusivity in church and in society; and,
- 4. Provide an opportunity for Presbyterians to recommit themselves to a partnership that will build a human social order which will truly offer "liberty and justice for all".
- 5. That 1992 be a year of discovery discovering the truth of the past 500 years, and the truths by which to live for the next 500 years.

IN MINISTRY WITH ITS CONGREGATIONS

Key values and realities

Breadth and Depth on Our Witness

Strategy for the Presbytery of Detroit is guided by the statement on, "The church and Its Mission" outlined in chapter III of the Book of Order.

The churches of the Presbytery proclaim God's love in Christ in a region that is diverse in racial, ethnic, and economic terms and in many other respects. The Presbytery is most faithful when it finds ways to minister to all people of the larger community.

Therefore, every human community within the bounds of the Presbytery should be considered for a possible Presbyterian presence. The Presbytery is committed to growth and not status quo.

Detroit Presbytery is ecumenically involved and recognizes that churches of other Christian denominations have valid ministries. Presbyterians do not need to duplicate the efforts of others in particular communities, but whenever possible Presbyterians need to work with others in the body of Christ as well as those of other faith communities.

The Local Congregation and Its People

We believe the vitality of the Presbytery's life and mission is only as strong as the vitality of the life and mission of the local congregations that make up the Presbytery. Local congregations are the life blocd of the Church. We believe people come to know and grow in Christ guides through the ministry of local congregations. The question that guides the work of the various committees of Presbytery is: does this ministry strengthen the life and mission of local congregations in the Presbytery?

It is also a reality that local congregations of our Presbytery have different degrees of vitality. Some are thriving, some are maintaining, some are struggling to survive. Therefore, another question that will guide the use of our limited resources of time and money is: Does this ministry strengthen the life and mission of our struggling congregations? Does it have the potential to strengthen and enhance the life and mission of those congregations who are at a maintenance level of programming?

There will always be needs that transcend the ability of any one congregation to address and therefore the Presbytery, through its committees or appointed task forces, will address the need by enlisting the aid and directing involvement of local congregations.

Were a mission effort envisioned that night not only neet a great need in society but also have the potential of strengthening local congregations through direct involvement, and were the mission effort to be of such magnitude that no one committee could implement it, Presbytery staff may be called to administer and direct the program.

The identity of our congregations is very often tied into the buildings that house them. The Presbytery is both blessed and cursed with a number of older and often historically significant sacred spaces. Many of these sacred spaces are in our urban centers (Detroit, Pontiac,

Port Huron). There is an unquestionable value in maintaining the beautiful sacred spaces that have been left as a gift not only to seceding generations of churchgoers but to the communities in which these buildings stand.

Nevertheless, it is our belief that buildings exist for the sake of ministry. Certain congregations may need long term financial assistance for their ministry, and those whose buildings become liabilities will be encouraged to divest them-

selves of their buildings and seek alternatives. The question that must be asked is: Is this specific building essential to the ministry of the local congregation? The Presbytery cannot give financial assistance simply to maintain buildings that are not essential to ministry.

Our Connectionalism

The Presbytery is connectional. Local congregations should be encouraged and assisted to "partner" with other churches when such effort would result in sound stewardship, building up the body of Christ, and enlarging the witness. Therefore, another key question that will guide the work of Presbytery committees and staff is: Does the effort help to build connections between our local congregations? Does it build a sense of connection to the Presbyterian Church as a whole and reflect General Assembly priorities? Does it have the potential of connecting us ecumenically?

Likewise, the Committees and staff of the Presbytery should coordinate efforts for maximum use of resources. Ways will be found for Presbytery committees to share information and ideas.

Informed Decision Making and Reexamined Assumptions

The Presbytery values informed decisions. Strategy is subject to change as new information comes to light. It involves a process of speaking the truth together in love.

The reality is that our strategy is influenced by decreasing mission dollars available through the Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly. Economic realities may suggest certain action but should never be the main reason for giving up support of a congregation. Local congregations are treated as missions and not just numbers and dollars. Any strategy must take seriously the dignity and integrity of the people who are the church.

Those most affected by a decision will be actively involved in the decision making process. It may be that some congregations ultimately will be dissolved in the years ahead, but let it not be said that we did not earnestly consider and try other options such as alternative patterns of pastoral leadership, divesting of buildings, ecumenical ventures, and more.

The times, as they always have, call for creativity, new wineskins, forgiveness for past failures and a renewed sense of being partners in the Gospel.

REVISED MISSION DESIGN FAITH, BRANDON TOWNSHIP NEW CHURCH DEVELOPMENT Presented to Presbytery of Detroit June 23, 1992

AREA Being Served by Faith: Ortonville, Brandon Township, Goodrich, Groveland Township and Hadlev

NEEDS in the area: We believe that there are a variety of needs in the area in which we minister. We have decided that there are two of these needs that we are most able to focus on at this time -- Families with young children and single adults. We also believe that as a secondary ministry we should address the concerns of those who have the responsibility of caring for our older citizens.

Our history as a Presbytery of Detroit New Church Development

Our Preliminary Mission Design was approved at the November, 1988 meeting of the Presbytery of Detroit. Worship began on October 16, 1988 on Sunday evenings using the Prince of Peace Lutheran Church. The congregation held Sunday evening services with guest preachers and an average attendance of 10 weekly. A Sunday School was conducted and averaged four children.

Our original Mission Design called for a Non-Traditional New Church Development. Our understanding of Non-Traditional includes the following: part time pastor, no near future plans to build our own building, no grants or other monies from GA or Synod, limited funds from the Presbytery of Detroit (\$8,000, \$6,000, \$4,000, \$2,000 and \$1,000) and no pioneer families from other Presbyterian Churches.

The Mission Design stated that the one-third time (18 hours per week) pastor was to begin in March of 1989. However a pastor was not called until September and did not begin work until mid-October, 1989. We had hoped that with a pastor in place our worship attendance would increase, but this did not happen. In the search for office space for the pastor the Steering Committee, with the approval of the Local Church Development Committee of the Presbytery, decided to look for a multi-purpose space, one that would allow Sunday morning worship, mid-week gatherings, and ease of location by visitors from the community. This space was found and after approval by the Local Church Development Committee, work began to refurbish it. The Congregation held its first worship service in the building on Epiphany, January 1990. Attendance was 50.

With our new space came Sunday morning services and church school for all ages. Our attendance increased in both worship and education. On Maundy Thursday, 1990, the congregation received its first members - 15. Additional new members were added in 1990 and 91 bringing the total membership to 30. At this time we are serving an additional 31 family units on a continual basis. Many of them may make a formal commitment to membership in the future. We have 24 children on our rolls. The growth in numbers of children, especially infants and preschoolers, led the Steering Committee in August, 1991, to request the Presbytery's Committee on Church Strategy to allow

us to take advantage of additional space which was being vacated in the front portion of our building. Permission was granted and classes were held for the first time in our expanded space March 15, 1992.

Where we are going

With our current nucleus of 31 family units and 30 members we believe that there is sufficient evidence that the greater Brandon area is a growing community. And we believe that the current population projections indicate the ability to sustain a Non-Traditional New Church Development. Our continued understanding of Non-Traditional includes the following: part time pastor, no near future plans to purchase land and no grants or other monies from GA or Synod. We also understand that budgeted financial support from the Presbytery of Detroit will cease at the end of our five year original time line. We would, however, like to request that the Presbytery and local Presbyterian Congregations consider a program of providing 3 to 10 pioneer families. These families would help nurture and train the potential leadership in the Faith Fellowship. Families with special skills in the areas of music and teaching would be especially helpful. We believe that we would be able to achieve the goals and objectives of this revised design more quickly with the help of experienced Presbyterian pioneer families.

Our vision for Faith NCD begins with the Great Ends of the Church: "The proclamation of the gospel for the salvation of humankind; the shelter, nurture, and spiritual fellowship of the children of God; the maintenance of divine worship; the preservation of truth; the promotion of social righteousness; and the exhibition of the Kingdom of Heaven to the world." (BO G-1.0200)

The next two years consists of actively focusing on the two major need areas outlined at the beginning of this paper. We see ourselves as Christians reaching out to help families and singles cope with the stresses and problems we all face in the 1990's. We hope to provide programs and resources that will nurture these people and bring them to an understanding of the love of God. We also continue to see ourselves as supporters of mission both in the local community and globally.

To fulfill our vision we have established the following goals for the next twelve months:

1. To continue to provide weekly worship that is both Reformed and uplifting. a. To provide special music at worship services at least monthly. RESPONSIBLE SUB-COMMITTEE: Worship



2. To increase the intensity of our Evangelism efforts. a. To have the New Resident contact program in place by May 1. (After a two year search we have located a source for these names and addresses through the Brandon Township Offices. We are also considering the Prospects Unlimited program for obtaining monthly lists of new residents, allowing us to go beyond the Brandon boundaries.)

b. To conduct a systematic telephone canvas using materials from "This Phone's For You". Phase 1 of this program will begin the second week of September with phone contacts following by four weeks of mailings and a celebration Sunday.

c. To place monthly articles or advertisements in the "County Line Reminder" of Faith's activities and programs. ALL SUB-COMMITTEES WILL HAVE THIS RESPONSIBILITY.

RESPONSIBLE SUB-COMMITTEE: Evangelism & Member Care To be a fellowship that is "user friendly" to families with children concentrating on the needs and issues of both traditional and non-traditional family.

a. Being intentional about childcare for all events and programs, welcoming children in worship and fellowship.

b. Provide at least two speaker series or studies on the topics of parenting and family living by April 1, 1993. Some topics and speakers being considered at

Speaker: James Windell (Oakland County/and columnist on parenting issues Oakland Press.

Managing Time in Families Home Schooling in Michigan Single Parents "Active Parenting"

Possibility of a support group for parents c. To invite the Brandon Co-op Nursery to be partners in sponsoring programs that will nurture and educate

These programs would center on issues specific to parents with infants - pre-schoolers.

d. To provide a one week summer Vacation Church School for children preschool through sixth grade.

4. To provide an opportunity for singles to come together and develop programing. This will begin by holding a singles study/support group for six weeks beginning in May. From this group we will explore the possibilities of other social and educational programs.

"At the request of members of the Administrative Commission for the Trumbull Avenue Church, Elders Larry Van Til (Grosse Pointe Memorial) and Helen Robinson (Detroit, St. John's) and Ministers John Sefcik and Larry Glenn, and in accordance with G-11.0201 a special meeting is called for the following purposes:
1. To declare Trumbull Avenue Church 'Formally Dissolved',

- To act on the proposed sale of the Trumbull Avenue Church to
- the Pilgrim Church, Inc., and To take care of any other business related to items one and two above."

Motion was sustained to adopt the call to the meeting as the docket with the elimination of item 1. which the commission indicated was not necessary at this meeting.

Motion was made and seconded that presbytery approve the sale of the Trumbull Avenue Presbyterian Church located at 1435 Brainard Detroit, Michigan, (PARCEL A, SOUTH 22.50 FEET OF NORTH 27.50 FEET OF LOT 30 AND LOTS 31 AND 32, HODGES BROTHERS SUBDIVISION, AS RECORDED IN LIBER 1, PAGE 308 OF FLATS, WAYNE COUNTY RECORDS),

including all pews, pulpit furniture, organ, piano, kitchen appliances, tables and chairs, to Pilgrim Church, Inc. (Brooklyn, NY) for \$145,000.00 on land contract at 7% per annum interest with the following terms:

\$25,000.00 down payment,

\$500.00 per month principal and interest payments, commencing 30 days after closing

plus \$5,000.00 balloon annually

interest payments are waived if the land contract is paid in

full within one year

Jack Ziegler Royal Oak, Christ Memorial The Rev. William Schram welcomed new members of Presbytery to the Presbytery.

F. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH STRATEGY

Tom Hartley reported for the Committee on Church Strategy. recommendation of the committee motion was sustained to approve the Plan for Ministry and Program Grant Application (Appendix D) and supporting documentation prepared for General Assembly and Synod for the New Church Development in Hartland Township, Livingston County. Mr. Hartley asked the Presbyters to prayerfully consider entering into partnership with the Hartland NCD.

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSION FOR TRUMBULL AVENUE

Stated Clerk Schram reported that two positions on the commission appointed by a previous moderator are vacant and that the nominating committee asked Moderator Rumsey to appoint two persons to fill the vacancies. Moderator Rumsey appointed Elder Helen Morrison, Grosse Ile and the Rev. Larry Sharpless.

H. OTHER BUSINESS

A motion was sustained that presbytery approve a change in the action taken by council regarding nn Arbor,, First (9-8-92, II.E.6) by striking "the apprasied value of \$144,000" and inserting "\$135,000" in its place.

Vice-Moderator Larry VanTil assumed moderating the meeting at the

request of the moderator.

IV. ISSUE OF CONCERN PENSIONS

Executive Presbyter Gehres introduced the Rev. Dick Campbell, Board of Pensions representative from Chicago. Mr. Campbell stated that after conferring with the Stated Clerk he decided to give up his docket time and that he will return to Detroit to make his report within the next few months.

V. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported that the General Assembly Council has called a consultation "Convocation: Discerning the Spirit and Envisioning Our Future" and that each presbytery would be able to send one representative and would be able to nominate other people to be considered for at-large representation. The convocation will be held October 30-November 1 in Chicago Illinois. The Presbytery Council has elected the Rev. Thomas Eggebeen to represent Detroit at the convocation. In addition, six at-large persons from Detroit will be participating: Elder Valerie Giles-Reynolds (Detroit, Trinity; Elder Carol Hylkema (Dearborn, Littlefield), Elder Alfred Warren (Grosse Pointe Memorial), Ms. Rebecca Romanski (Warren, First) and the Rev. William Gepford.

Mr. Gehres shared some thoughts, concerns and presented some proposals in regards to the work of the Presbytery. He stated that he welcomes conversation and dialogue on the issues raised. He believes that the Presbytery of Detroit like the Synod of the Covenant and the denomination of which we are a part is in the midst of a major paradigm shift in a number of areas: in mission giving; in terms of being a denomination of rules in trying to see how we can be open and flexible to the movement of the Spirit and still keep balance with our need for order.

Mr. Gehres stated that this presbytery is in a paradigm shift in terms of staffing patterns. He stated that the Presbytery of Detroit, as well as other urban presbyteries, has been staff dependent because prior to 1972 it was a self-determining mission unit. He sees one of the paradigm shifts being imposed upon us is a reduction in staff. a result of this, one of the things that needs to be put in place is training and empowering the committees of the presbytery to carry out the work that is delegated to them. Mr. Gehres believes that one of the shifts that we must determine in the next few months is whether we will transfer work that has traditionally (last 30/40 years) been done by staff to people who chair committees and to volunteers.

He believes that we need to change our paradigms in the way that we do mission. He believes that we need to concentrate our mission resources, human and dollar, in particular well-placed programs or centers that will carry out mission in a Presbyterian witness in the Presbytery of Detroit, primarily in the city and urban centers. An example of how he thinks this might happen would be the establishment of mission centers. He thinks that the mission of the centers needs to have at least two foci: 1) continue the ministries of compassion, i.e., feeding the hungry, sheltering the homeless, providing clothing and emergency kinds of services but at the same time 2) we can help people break the cycle of poverty and powerlessness.

Executive Presbyter Genres believes that we must be more focused in our mission and in concentrating the resources that we have. resources need to be put into the congregations; he thinks that the Presbytery needs to serve the congregations where they are. He said that congregations have specific needs and that they need to be

treated specifically.

VI. SHARING OUR LIFE: EXPERIENCES, JOYS, CONCERNS A. JOYS AND CONCERNS

The joys and concerns of the members of Presbytery were lifted up and shared.

- RECOGNITION OF THE RETIREMENT OF ROLAND KEEBLER The Rev. Gareth Baker fondly recalled the ministry of the Rev. Roland Keebler from his seminary days in 1954 to the present time and the fact that they have been good friends and fellow servants of Christ through the years. Elders Susan Eddings and Bill Rinshar, members of Christ Memorial, Royal Oak recalled the leadership and ministry of Rev. Keebler at Christ Memorial Presbyterian Church. Vice-Moderator Larry VanTil called the Rev. Roland and Mrs. Mary Keebler forward and presented a certificate of honoring his retirement to Rev. Keebler from the Presbytery of Detroit.
- RECOGNITION OF THE RETIREMENT OF LEROY PETERSON The Rev. Paul Sutton recalled the life and work of the Rev. LeRoy Peterson. Vice-Moderator VanTil asked Rev. Peterson to come forward and presented a certificate of honoring his retirement to Rev. Peterson from the Presbytery of Detroit.
- RECOGNITION OF TIM MORAN, PEACE ENABLER The Rev. Peter Boeve commemorated the work of Tim Moran as Peace Enabler for the Presbytery. The Rev. Peter Moore presented a plague from Richard Kilmer, PC(USA) Peacemaking Director, to Mr. Moran in recognition of his peacemaking efforts.

Moderator Rumsey resumed his duties as moderator.

VII. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY

A. EDUCATION AND NURTURE
Marian West reported for the Education and Nurture Committee. She encouraged the presbyters to use the Presbytery Resource Center.

EVANGELISM

Norman Skeirik reported for the Evangelism Committee. presented Moderator Rumsey a certificate in recognition of the Presbytery of Detroit adopting the "Commitment to Evangelism." Mr. Skeirik asked representatives from Joslyn Avenue, Pontiac; Atonement, Waterford; Community, Drayton Plains; White Lake; Jefferson Avenue, Detroit and St. John's, Detroit to come forward and presented them with certificates recognizing their adoption of the "Commitment to Evangelism."

The Rev. Paul Irwin, Pastor White Lake Church, told of the membership growth that White Lake has experienced since the church has been relocated.

Mr. Skeirik announced that at the October stated meeting Mr. Gary Demarest, Associate Director, Evangelism and Church Development Ministry Unit will conduct a Pre-Presbytery Event.

C. YOUTH MINISTRIES

Dick Grant reported for Youth Ministries. The Alma Youth Mix will be held November 14-15, 1992. Mr. Grant reported that the Presbytery Youth Advisory Board (PYAB) will replace the central staff person that worked with the youth program. The group consists of four members from Education & Nurture, three co-opted youth professionals (from congregations), and four members of the former Youth Covenant Core. He believes that this group will lead the Presbytery in a strong youth ministry.

ALMA COLLEGE

Jan Holmes spoke for Alma College. She reported that: \cdot there are 450 first year students, the largest freshman class since the 1970's;

Alma is ranked second in Michigan just behind Kalamazoo College; and there are eleven members of the Kirk Council in Detroit Presbytery.

She asked the presbyters to send the names of students so that they may take part in the Early Decision Scholarships. These scholarships are worth \$6500 per year and are based on merit.

E. THEOLOGY AND WORSHIP

Larry Van Til reported for the Theology and Worship Committee. He stated that "A Theological Retreat" for lay and clergy will be held at the Weber Center in Adrian, Michigan November 20-21, 1992. Scholarships are available for the laity and clergy.

VIII. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Presbytery, the meeting was adjourned by moderator Rumsey at 10:28 p.m. with a prayer that incorporated the joys, concerns and work of the Presbytery which had been shared during the meeting.

The next stated meeting of the Presbytery will convene on Tuesday, October 27, 1992, at 5:30 p.m. at the St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Livonia.

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COUNCIL MINUTES, SEPTEMBER 3, 1992, APPENDIX A

Special Committee on the Ecumenical Decade of Churches in Solidarity with Women

Continued role for the Special Connittee

The purpose of this memorandum is to request that the Council recommend to Presbytery the life of the Special Committee be extended until December 3, 1998, which is the end of the Ecumenical Decade. This memorandum sets forth the history of the committee, the committee's understanding of its role and the reasons that the life of the committee should be extended.

History

The Special Committee was approved by the Presbytery in May, 1991 and the orginal membership was appointed by then Hoderator Carol Hylkena. Nine members were appointed to the committee, five were women, four were men, five were lay and four were clergy. The task of the Special Committee was set forth as follows: (by action of the council the language of the report was stricken and the language recorded in the presbytery ninutes is inserted in its place)

- Review what our denomination and other denominations are doing in regards to the Ecumenical Decade (1988-1998): Churches in Solidarity with Women.
- Make recommendations to the Presbytery Council about ways the Presbytery of Detroit night become involved in addressing the aims of the Ecumenical Decade

The special Connittee has been meeting regularly since September 1991. The first task was to acquaint ourselves with the resources available from the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and the World Council of Churches. We have identified the Connittee on Ministry, Education and Nurture, Metropolitan Mission and Theology and Worship as the committees of Presbytery with which we need to be working. Examples of activities during this past year include:

- involvement, along with the Conmittee on ministry and Metropolitan Mission, in the policy with regard to sexual miscondict and the amendment to the Book of Order on the statute of limitations in cases of sexual abuse.
- conversation with the Committee on Preparation for Ministry regarding the use of inclusive language in statements of candidates.
- review of guidelines for worship at Presbytery as it relates to inclusive language.
- participation in Super Saturday with two programs from the Special Committee as well as support for other Super Saturday programs related to the church standing in solidarity with women.
- assistance to Theology and Worship in planning a program with Brian Wren for Harch, 1993.

Carol Hylkema, who continues as an ad hoc member of the Special Committee, has been meeting regularly with an ecumenical group in Detroit which is addressing the issues of the Ecumenical Decade. At this point, however, our work in the Presbytery is ahead of what is being done in the other denominations.

Presentations to Presbytery on four different occasions in the spring of 1992 highlightedthe work of the Special Committee, advocated for the goals of the Ecumenical Decade and interpreted the issues that the committee is addressing. Ecumenical Decade packets were purchased by thirty churches within the Presbytery.

Current Direction

In April, 1992, the Special Committee met for an all day retreat and identified three major thrusts for our efforts into the future:

- working with existing committees so that the vision, mission and structure of Presbytery reflect the gifts and full participation of women in decision-making and leadership roles.
- educating the Presbytery, its committees and congregations as to the vision of the Ecumenical Decade and the issues we need to address.
- pronoting the use of language about God and the people of God that includes all members of God's family.

The approval by Presbytery of the continued life of the Special Committee will enable these thrusts to continue and allow this Presbytery to benefit more fully from the many gifts that women bring to the church.

Structural Issues

We recommend that the committee continue as a Special Committee of Council through 1998. The committee should continue to consist of nine members, to be chosen by the nominating committee in three classes, each with a three-year term. The committee should continue to maintain a balance between women and men and between laity and clergy. The committee will not need a separate budget, with expenses to be covered by the Council's budget and the budgets of the committees with which it works.

- C. Graphical Area Served by the New Church Development is in the region of Hartland Township in Livingston County, MI. The area served by the church currently is a mix of small town-rural-suburban, and is becoming increasingly suburban.

- E. The projected begin date of the new congregation is early 1993.
- F. General Assembly and Synod funding are requested beginning January, 1993.
- G. This application was completed August 11, 1992.

III. NCD PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

A. The need for the Hartland NCD is prompted by the fact that the community is fast growing and is comprised of families who particularly are drawn to a Presbyterian Church.

Please see attached demographic information from CIDS-Church Information and Development Services and SEMCOG-Southeast Michigan Council of Governments.

- B. The Presbytery's "Mission Directions and Goals" commit the Presbytery to "Respond to the need for the development of new churches within the Presbytery." The statement also calls for the development of "Partnerships between and among congregations." We believe new churches are essential to carrying out "The Church and Its Mission" outlined in Chapter III of the Book of Order. We are in agreement with the General Assembly Task Force on Church Membership Growth Statement, "Growing dominations throughout the world place significant emphasis on new church development and redevelopment." The Commitment to Evangelism the Presbytery adopted at its May 26, 1992 meeting includes goal setting for new church development and redevelopment. We believe planting a new church in Hartland is consistent with the nation wide new church plan presented in June, 1992 by the Evangelism and Church Development Ministry Unit which will target locations where there are large pockets of Presbyterian-type people but no Presbyterian Churches.
- The Presbytery of Detroit approved an NCD for Hartland April 28, 1992. The Executive Presbyter of Lake Huron Presbytery is informed of the Presbytery of Detroit's interest in establishing an NCD in Hartland and expressed positive interest. The pastors of neighboring churches in the Presbytery of Detroit (White Lake-ten miles east, Howell-nine miles west, Milford-ten miles southeast) also voiced encouragement. The closest church in the Presbytery is in Brighton (eight miles south). Its pastor and session have made a partnership commitment to Hartland to provide the following: (1) Families to help start the new congregation. (2) office space for the organizing pastor, if needed, (3) moral and spiritual support, along with financial and program assistance.
- D. Prospective charter members for the Hartland Church are not identified. They will be identified after an organizing pastor is called.
- E. The proposed NCD is not formally part of an ecumenical strategy for the area although the project was discussed with Charles Lindquist, Assistant to the Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of American. Mr. Lindquist informed us a Missouri Synod Lutheran Congregation is relocating and building a large church in Hartland, east of US 23. He recommended the Presbytery consider an NCD west of 23. Other churches in the Hartland area include a Roman Catholic Church west of 23, which has offered its chapel as a temporary home for the NCD. There are several independent Protestant Churches in Hartland, east of 23.

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F. The proposal is based on Presbytery's assessment of demographic trends that indicate Hartland is a community that is both growing and receptive to a Presbyterian Church.

IV. DESCRIPTION OF NEW CHURCH DEVELOPMENT

- A. As early as 1978 the Presbytery expressed interest in an NCD in Hartland when it ordered aerial photos of the area and began collecting demographic data. During 1991-2, interest of the NCD Committee of the Committee of Church Strategy was drawn to Hartland because of its recent and projected future growth.
- B. In October 1991, the Presbytery ordered an Infomark demographic study from the General Assembly. Because it used 1980 census data, we later requested the CIDS and SEMCOG reports. Relevant findings include the following: Hartland Township increased from 1,744 households in 1980 to 2,211 in 1990, an increase of nearly 27%. The population is overwhelmingly white and affluent. Nearly 91% of the homes are owner occupied. In 1990 the median housing value was \$113,600. The population is comprised primarily of young families. Nearly 29% of the residents are children under the age of 18; only 7.5% are aged 65 and older. There are several new high priced sub-divisions in the immediate vicinity of the NCD site and large new developments are planned. (Please see attached letter from Hartland Township clerk.)
- C. The people to whom the Hartland NCD will minister are predominately young business and professional families. Because of their privileged position in society, they are able to have a positive influence on others if they have a commitment to Christ and are guided by Christian values. If motivated by Christian faith they will provide responsible leadership in the community and practice high standards of ethical behavior in their business and professional life. In order for this to occur they need to be informed and challenged through preaching and church programs to see the relationship between Christian faith and daily life.

According to the CIDS study although 7.0% of the residents in the five mile radius are Presbyterian/Reformed in their church preference and 5.7% are interested in church but have no preference (higher than the national average on both counts), 38.9% are not presently involved in faith practice. (The latter also is higher than the national average.)

In terms of financial contributions, although currently residents in the five mile radius of the proposed NCD site give only the U.S. average to church, they give more than average to other charities (see CIDS report). The fact that significant numbers of residents have become uninvolved in their faith but have Presbyterian leanings presents both opportunity and challenge for a Presbyterian NCD. They are characteristic of many "baby boomers" whose affluence and business and professional success obscures their spiritual needs. In spite of their privileged position in society many of them experience a emptiness and lack of meaning in their lives. While pursuing financial security they are concerned for their marriage (see CIDS report). It is also characteristic of this population that they seek what they think is best for their children.

The great majority of residents (83.4%) believe in God but a significantly smaller number (60.3%) believe God is involved actively in the affairs of people and nations. The challenge of the NCD is to reach people who in spite of privilege and status have departed from the community of faith and are out of touch with Christian belief and experience.

D. None of the four Presbyterian Churches (USA) named in item C-3 above is within Hartland Township or the five mile radius from the NCD site. This is also true of several churches in the southern Lake Huron Presbytery (Tyrone-nine miles, Fenton-twelve miles, Linden-thirteen miles, and Holly-sixteen miles). Two Evangelical Presbyterian Churches, Cornerstone in Brighton is six miles from the site, and the Evangelical Church in Tyrone is nine miles. The Roman Catholic and Lutheran Churches in Hartland Township may have similar goals but would appeal to different segments of the population.

V. GOALS, OBJECTIVES AND ACTION PLAN OF THE NCD

- A. Please see attached preliminary mission design for Hartland NCD
- B. The goals of Hartland NCD are to develop a fast growing congregation that will be self-supporting within five years and faithful to the church's mission in Hartland and the world beyond. Evangelism is the church's highest priority. Strong pastoral leadership will help develop committed lay leadership both on the Steering Committee and within the congregation at large. Within three-five years the congregation will build a sanctuary and building to house Christian Education classes and church offices. The church program will respond to the needs of parents, children and youth.

C. The following are action steps related to goals during 1993:

Evangelism

The organizating pastor will make a minimum of fifteen home visits a week. (S)he will organize a strong Evangelism Committee that will assist the pastor in making telephone calls and home visits. The church will purchase new resident lists and initiate a tele-marketing plan to reach new families in the area. The church will develop an informational brochure and mail it to residents in zip code area 48353 (Hartland). There will be periodic display advertising in the local newspaper. Each Sunday afternoon lay members of the Evangelism Committee will call on those who visited the church for the first time that morning, leaving a small gift from the church.

Worship

The preaching will be grounded in Scripture and thoughtful, inspiring and relevant to the lives of the worshippers. Content and delivery will be strong and directed to people who are knowledgeable regarding social and political events.

The music will include both traditional and contemporary Christian hymns. A variety of musical instruments will be used.

Education/Nurture

The pastor will train selected members to be church school teachers for children, youth and adults. The Bible is the basic text, supplemented by a strong curriculum which emphasizes on the life of Jesus and history of the early church.

Stewardship

Sermons will challenge members to tithe. Every member will be requested to make a pledge. The pastor will approach individuals who may be especially able to offer large gifts and will challenge them to do so.

Leadership Development

Members of the congregation will be encouraged to take advantage of Presbytery-sponsored leadership training events, e.g. Super Saturday. Outside speakers will be invited to conduct leadership seminars for the congregation.

Community Ministry

The NCD will employ a lay youth director and will make a community-wide appeal to include all youth in the church's program. It will conduct a survey to determine what are the unmet needs of the youth in the community.

The estimates are based on the NCD Committee's assessment of our timing and the community's potential and response to an aggressive church program.

The estimates are based on the preponderance of young families in the community. According to the CIDS study in the five mile radius around the NCD site one third of the population are aged 19 and younger (26.5% are under the age of 15).

VI. STAFF FOR THE CONGREGATION

A. The plan is to make a commitment to an organizing pastor as soon as possible after financial support from General Assembly and Synod is assured. We expect to have a pastor on the field in early 1993. The project also will employ a part time lay youth leader as well as a music director.

- B. See attached job descriptions. The organizing pastor is integral to NCD programs of evangelism, worship, education/nurture, stewardship, and leadership development. Key lay people will assume primary responsibility for fellowship and community ministry activities.
- C. The organizing pastor first of all will be a person of mature and contagious Christian faith who has strong interpersonal and organizational skills. (S)he will be experienced in areas of evangelism and church growth. In addition the pastor will have a thorough knowledge of, and sympathy with, Presbyterian polity, denominational programs and linkages. The pastor will demonstrate flexibility, personal warmth, patience and persistence, and a sense of humor. The pastor will be sensitive to the needs of people in Hartland and will design church worship and programs to respond to those needs. (S)he will be prepared to provide key leadership for a church building campaign and project.
- D. The Presbytery is open to calling a woman or man to the Hartland NCD.
- E. The pastor and family will receive support from the NCD Committee of Presbytery and the staff of the First Presbyterian Church of Brighton. Pastors of Hartland, Howell, Milford, White Lake and Brighton will be encouraged to meet for monthly fellowship over breakfast or lunch.
- F. The organizing pastor will be encouraged to participate in the General Assembly sponsored Annual NCD Pastors' Conference. (S)he will be expected to take advantage of annual study leave. Study leave allowance is included in terms of the call.

11. GOVERNANCE FOR THE NEW CHURCH DEVELOPMENT

- A. We anticipate that all Steering Committee members will come from the Hartland area.
- B. The NCD Sub-committee of the Presbytery Committee on Church Strategy will supervise the organizing pastor. The pastor will meet monthly with representatives of the Committee and with the other NCD pastors within the Presbytery of Detroit. Committee members will meet individually with NCD pastors as needed.

III. INCOME AND EXPENSES BUDGET OF THE NCD

A. Please see attached budget projections.

- B. It is planned that beginning with the first year the NCD will give 10% of its income to Presbyterian General Mission.
- C. Hartland is a new NCD project. There has been no previous grant.
- D. After the expiration of the Mission Program Grant it is expected that the project will be fully selfsupporting.
- E. The project has no previous income or expenditures.

IX. CHURCH SITE AND BUILDING

- A. A store front in a small strip mall ajacent to the ten acre site is the most likely space for the project in its first year. Rental of space in a public school and free use of a Roman Catholic chapel also are possibilities. The new church will be built on a ten acre site to meet the needs of the congregation in subsequent years.
- B. The Presbytery Property and Investment Committee is negotiating to purchase a ten acre site on the south side of M-59, three quarters mile west of US-23, across from Hartland High School. The Presbytery's capital fund will be used and application will be made to General Assembly for a loan to help pay the land contract. It is expected construction of the sanctuary, Christian Education and office building will be completed in the third to fifth years of the project.

X. REVIEW AND EVALUATION OF NCD

- A. On an annual basis the Presbytery's Committee on Church Strategy will review the project and the Annual Review form will be completed. At the end of the first and third years the Synod Evangelism and Church Development Team will participate in an on-site review.
- B. At the end of the third year and at the conclusion of the Mission Program Grant cycle the progress of the project will be evaluated by comparing it with the goals set forth in this application. The final review report is the responsibility of the Presbytery's Committee on Church Strategy.

XI. REQUEST FOR GENERAL ASSEMBLY MISSION PROGRAM GRANT

- A. If a Mission Program Grant is approved we request monthly payments to begin upon the arrival of the organizing pastor. The Presbytery expects this will be early 1993.
- B. The anticipated termination of the grant is early 1998.

POSITION DESCRIPTIONS

Organizing Pastor

The minister will administer the programs of the NCD, including evangelism, Christian Education, and Stewardship. (5)he will provide diligent home and hospital visitations. (5)he will develop lay leadership for the Steering Committee and the key programs of the new church. (5)he will participate actively in Presbytery and will become involved in community activities, as time permits.

Youth Leader

The Youth Leader will be a part time lay person. Initially the leader's primary responsibility will be to canvass the community, contacting youth, parents, school officials, and other community leaders to ascertain the needs of Hartland youth. The next step is to design and implement, with help from parents and youth, a church based program to meet the needs.

Music Director

The Music Director will be a part time lay person who will be versatile in developing children and adult choirs. The director will (re)introduce the congregation to traditional and contemporary hymns and anthems of the church. (S)he will help others find joy in expressing their faith through song.

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MINUTES OF THE OCTOBER 27, 1992 STATED MEETING PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

ST. PAUL'S PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, LIVONIA

I. THE GATHERING

A. THE MODERATOR

A quorum being present, the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was convened in stated session on Tuesday, October 27, 1992 at 5:30 pm at the St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Livonia. The meeting was opened with prayer by the moderator, William Rumsey.

The moderator welcomed new commissioners and ministers and recognized guests. David Cameron was appointed Assistant to the Stated Clerk.

B. THE STATED CLERK

Stated Clerk Jenny Schram presented Part I of her report and motions were sustained that Presbytery:

- 1. DOCKET. Adopt the docket as presented.
- EXCUSES. Excuse all continuing members who have asked to be excused, all lay members of Council who have asked to be excused, and all non-resident continuing members who are not present.
- CORRESPONDING MEMBERS. Without further motions, seat as corresponding members all eligible persons who are presented to the Presbytery and who register on the enrollment sheet for corresponding members.

C. WELCOME BY HOST PASTOR

The Rev. Tom Eggebeen, pastor, welcomed the presbyters to St. Paul's Presbyterian Church.

D. MEMORIAL TRIBUTE TO WANZER BRUNELLE The Rev. David Swinehart gave a heartfelt tribute to the Rev. Wanzer

Brunelle in remembrance of the long, fruitful and faithful service that he rendered to the church.

II. EVENING PRAISE AND PRAYER SERVICE

An evening Praise and Prayer Service was led by the Theology & Worship Committee of the Presbytery Council. The Scripture Lessons were taken from Ephesians 1:11-23 and Luke 6:20-36. A dramatic interpretation of the text was given by the Rev. Steve Melde. The anthem, "Every Valley" was sung by the St. Paul's Presbyterian Church Choir.

III. ISSUE OF CONCERN - EVANGELISM

The time arrived for the Order of the Day and presbytery proceed to hearing the presentation on evangelism.

The Rev. Gary Demarest, Associate Director Evangelism and Church Development Ministry Unit, PC(USA) gave a profile of presbyterians stating that we are diverse. He encouraged the presbytery and congregations to study chapters 1 thru 5 of the <u>Book of Order</u> and suggested that congregations use chapter 5 for instruction in new members classes.

Mr. Demarest cited some things that he feels are obstacles to evangelism: 1) Separation of word and deed; 2) Unwarranted equation of inclusiveness/diversity/pluralism. We cannot be a pluralistic church - we can be inclusive with boundaries; 3) Lack of passion- a passion for evangelism needs to be regenerated. He stated that for 225 years we converted a mission into a institution. The question now is, can we convert/redirect the institution into a mission.

IV. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres introduced the two new associate interims, the Rev. John Sefcik and the Rev. Donald Poisson, to the presbytery. Mr. Gehres thanked the Rev. David Krehbiel for his service as interim associate as he leaves to assume another position.

Mr. Gehres reported that the congregations of the Presbytery of Detroit havecontributed more than \$40,000 to Somalian and Hurricane relief.

Executive Presbyter Gehres spoke about Staff Study Report. said that under the old paradigm the staff was put in place to serve/maintain the structure. He believes that under the new paradigm the staff will serve people and function as a team. He sees the staff as generalists who may move from area to area wherever needed. Gehres said that the committees of presbytery need to change so that they will serve congregations as they carry out the work of the presbytery. He said that the committees need to empower people and not rely so heavily on staff to do their work.

V. BUSINESS TO BE ADOPTED BY MOTION AND DEBATE Moderator Rumsey offered a prayer for illumination in preparation for the business of the Presbytery.

A. THE STATED CLERK

Stated Clerk Schram presented Part II of her report.

COMMUNICATIONS: CHRIST CHURCH
Stated Clerk Schram read a letter from the Christ Presbyterian Church (independent) addressed to the Council and to the Motion was made and seconded: To receive the letter Presbytery. and take no action at this time.

Mr. Reid, Clerk of Christ Church attempted to address the Presbytery. The Moderator ruled him out of order since he was not enrolled as a commissioner. Following protest by Mr. Reid a motion was sustained to sustain the moderator's ruling. Motion was sustained to grant Mr. Reid the priveledge of the floor. Motion to set aside the standing rules and to allow Mr. Reid greater than the three minutes allowed by the standing rules was defeated.

Following debate the main motion was sustained. A motion requesting the text of the letter from Christ Church be sent to commissioners through the churches failed by a vote of 96 yes, 116 no.

B. THE TREASURER

Treasurer Wilma Dellinger reported that as of September 30, 1992 the mission budget is \$42,979.00 short. She reported that the committees of presbytery have reduced their budgets because of the present and projected shortfall in mission giving for 1992. she stated that we are the fifth largest presbytery in the PC (USA) and that we can do better. Treasurer Dellinger asked the congregations to honor their pledges for 1992.

C. THE COUNCIL

Carol Hylkema reported for Council. Motions were sustained that Presbytery:

- 9. James Conley, Chair, Special Committee to Study Staffing, presented the report of the committee for first reading; explained the process; discussed the findings and answered questions. The report will be presented for action in November.

Carol Hylkema requested the prayers of the presbyters for those who are attending the special convocation of the PC(USA) in Chicago, Illinois October 30-November 1, 1992.

A motion to mail the letter from Christ Presbyterian Church to those commissioners wishing to receive it was defeated.

D. COMMITTEE ON MINISTRY

William Schram reported for the Committee on Ministry. Motions were sustained that presbytery:

INTERIMS AND STATED SUPPLIES

- Extend the Interim Pastor contract between First Church, Mt. Clemens, and the Rev. Paul Yutzy through April 24, 1993.
- Renew the Interim Pastor contract between First Church, South Lyon and the Rev. Charles Davidson for six months, effective January 1, 1993.
- 3. Approve the Interim Pastor contract between First Church, Plymouth, and the Rev. AA/EEO guidelines of the denomination have been followed during the search process.

Enroll Mr. Cullen as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit

upon receipt of his credentials.

7. Approve the call of the Trinity Community Church, Detroit, to the Rev. Anthony A. Patrick as Pastor, effective December 1, 1992, with the following terms: Salary \$25,600; Housing \$9,500; Automobile allowance \$1,201; Pension \$10,580; Book Allowance \$300; Medical insurance \$1,134; Moving costs; Study leave allowance \$300; FICA \$2,685; One month vacation, including 4 Sundays, 2 weeks study leave. AA/EEO guidelines of the denomination have been followed during the search process.

Enroll Mr. Patrick as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit

upon receipt of his credentials.

8. Approve the call to the Rev. Alice Anderson, as Associate Pastor of New York Avenue Presbyterian Church, Washington, D.C., National Capital Presbytery, effective September 1, 1992, and transfer her membership. Terms: Salary and Housing \$44,800; Auto allowance \$2,000; Expense allowance \$1,200; Book allowance \$200; Study leave allowance \$600; 4 weeks vacation and 2 weeks study leave.

9. Approve the following Commission to install Michael Lindvall as Pastor of First Church, Ann Arbor, November 22, 1992, during the morning service: Clergy: Lois Colon, Carl Geider, Amy Morrison. Elders: John Debbink (First, Ann Arbor), Jan Keller (St. Paul's,

Livonia), the Moderator or his designee.

10. Validate the work of the Rev. Gloria H. Albrecht as Assistant Professor in the Religion Department of the University of Detroit Mercy, and enroll her as a member of Presbytery upon receipt of her credentials from the Presbytery of Baltimore.

11. Appoint the Rev. Craig Seitz as Moderator of the Session of First Church, Saline, and enroll him as a Member of the Presbytery of Detroit, upon receipt of his credentials from Maumee Valley Presbytery.

Craig Seitz, effective October 11, 1992, for a period of six months with the following terms: Salary \$14,945; Housing \$14,945; FICA \$2,287; Travel allowance \$2,700; Study allowance \$385; Dental \$550; Full pension; One month vacation including 4 Sundays, and 2 weeks Study leave.

The committee reported that the Manse Policy will be voted on at the November meeting of Presbytery.

The committee reported it has begun the consultations with the Rev. Milton Henry, St. John's Presbyterian Church, PC(USA), and Christ Presbyterian Church (independent). COM is also meeting with the Committee on Church Strategy.

Mr. Schram welcomed new members to the Presbytery and assigned a special colleague to each new member of Presbytery.

E. COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND NURTURE

Susan Frazier reported for the Committee on Education and Nurture. A motion was sustained granting permission to Education and Nurture to approach our Ecumenical partners to participate in the Motor City Mission Mania Project in June 1993.

Ms. Frazier introduced Joelle Juers, director of the event. Ms. Juers reported that the event hopes to bring 300 young persons from around the country to work in mission centers in Detroit for a week in June.

Ms. Frazier announced that the Statistical and Annual Report Workshop for clerks, treasurers, and pastors will be held Saturday, December 12, 1992 at Westminster, Detroit.

F. TRUMBULL AVENUE COMMISSION

Larry Van Til reported for the commission. A motion was sustained that the congregation of Trumbull Avenue Presbyterian Church be permitted to continue for the time being and the Commission continue to operate with original jurisdiction and report to the Presbytery in six month's time as to the status and potential of the congregation.

- G. ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSION TO PURCHASE LAND IN HARTLAND The report of the commission was presented by Executive Presbyter Gehres. Motions were sustained by the Presbytery for the Commission to:
- 1. Continue its search for suitable land in the Hartland area.
- 2. Negotiate and sign on behalf of the Presbytery "an offer to purchase" if suitable property is found, with the understanding that the Commission will bring the offer to purchase to Presbytery for approval, if time permits.

H. PERMANENT JUDICIAL COMMISSION

George Bushnell reported for the Permanent Judicial Commission regarding the charges which had been filed against Mr. Michael Carson. Because of the confidential nature of the matter the PJC requested that the Presbytery of Detroit convene in executive session. At 9:03 Moderator Rumsey ruled that the body was in executive session and requested that all persons not registered and enrolled to leave the meeting room for this portion of the meeting.

The presbytery returned to stated session at 9:51 p.m.

VI. ISSUE OF CONCERN MONTH OF MISSION-MISSION CO-WORKERS

Francile Anderson reported the activities of the Month-of-Mission. She introduced the mission co-workers: The Rev. Joseph Hopkins, Malawi; Nancy Warlick, Zaire; Mark Rasmussen, Ethiopia; and The Rev. Linda Brebner, Peru to the Presbyters. Each mission co-worker spoke of the work with which they are involved and thanked the presbytery and its churches for receiving them.

VII. SHARING OUR LIFE: JOYS AND CONCERNS
The joys and concerns of the members of presbytery were lifted up and shared.

VIII. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF THE PRESBYTERY A. OUTDOOR MINISTRIES

Richard Grant reported on the Outdoor Ministries of the Presbytery. He gave a brief history of the Howell nature center Christmas tree project. Proceeds from the sale of the trees is used to support the Presbytery Camping Ministries. He reported on the progress of the evaluation of the camp properties and stated that the report would probably be ready for a first reading in January 1993.

IX. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the presbytery, the meeting was adjourned at 10:10 p.m. with prayer by Moderator Rumsey that incorporated the work, joys and concerns of the Presbytery which had been raised during the meeting.

The next stated meeting of Presbytery will convene Tuesday, November 24, 1992 at the Westminster Presbyterian Church, Detroit at The Arab New Church Development will be our host.

There shall be no penalty for prepayment of principal and the interest shall be figured on the basis of the principal amount outstanding at the time the payment is received.

affirmities to the Christian Missionary Alliance denomination).

4. Approve and recommend to presbytery the request from the Detroit, First Presbyterian Church to lease a major portion (including some use of the worship space) of the building, located at 2930 Woodward, for a period of five years to the Ecumenical Theological Center.

5. Approve an expenditure of \$2727 for insurance to cover the old Calvary building located at 8240 Grand River. The expense will be added to the outstanding balance due on the land contract with God's Love Missionary Baptist Church.

Jesse Bacalis (presbytery counsel) is proceeding with filing the forfeiture papers for the land contract on the property sold to God's Love Missionary Baptist Church. The church did not make a payment after the notice of intent was mailed, and they had only until the 10th of the October to obtain insurance on the building. The Farm Bureau Insurance Company cancelled the insurance after they had paid for a couple of break-ins during the summer.

The committee reported the following information:
A letter was sent to Detroit, Calvin West the latter part of August regarding the lack of payments since May 1992. No official response has been received from the church, but an elder called a couple of weeks ago asking about the current status of their loans. The total principal and interest at the end of September was \$163,498.69.

F. STEERING COMMITTEE

Larry Van Til reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that council:

- 1. Approve the docket for the October 27, 1992 stated meeting.
- 2. Approve the Policy Regarding the Role of Moderators in Worship and Reporting at Presbytery. The policy as presented was amended and approved in the following form:

POLICY REGARDING THE ROLE OF MODERATORS IN WORSHIP AND REPORTING AT PRESBYTERY

LAST STATED MEETING OF THE YEAR

The moderator will present a short Annual Moderator's Report at the last stated meeting of the moderator's tenure. (Under our current system of bylaws this would occur in November.)

JANUARY STATED MEETING

The bylaws provide for a worship service including preaching the Word and sharing the Lord's Supper in January. The bylaws also provide that the moderator and vice-moderator will be installed at this meeting.

- At the January stated meeting the presbytery shall provide for a service of worship which includes preaching the Word, sharing the Lord's Supper, and installing new officers.
- 2. The service will be planned by the newly elected moderator in consultation with the Executive Presbyter.
- 3. The newly elected moderator will preach the Word during this service.
- 4. The retiring moderator and Executive Presbyter will preside over the administration of the sacrament.
- Participants in the service, including communion servers, will be chosen from council so far as possible.

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IV. ADJUNCT UNITS

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE ECUMENICAL DECADE Ken Smith reported for the committee. The motion that was postponed from the September to October meeting was put before the council for discussion and debate: That the council recommend to presbytery that the life of the Special Committee be extended until December 31, 1998, which is the end of the Ecumenical Decade.

A substitute motion was made, voted to become the main motion and sustained: That council recommend presbytery continue the Special Committee through June 1993 for the purpose of either transferring the agenda to other committees and report such to Presbytery through the Council, or developing specific goals and objectives as to justify the continued work of the committee.

> SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO STUDY STAFF В.

Jim Conley and several members of the committee were present. He presented the report of the special committee. Background information, on process and the data gathered, were outlined before the council began discussion on the specific recommendation of the committee.

Questions and debate centered around several issues: how many Associate Executives are really needed, there is no plan for implementation or time line for implementation, the report does not address resolution of the budget implications inherent in the recommendation.

Appendix B: Procedures for Requesting and Validating a VSO

GUIDELINES FOR STAFF EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT

I. Transportation

Select the mode of transportation which is the best stewardship of time, money, and energy.

- A. Plane
 Use coach/economy or excursion rates if possible.
- B. Train
 Use standard coach accommodations. Employee's supervisor must approve in advance any additional charges for special reservations.
- C. Presbytery-Leased Automobile

 If an automobile is the best alternative, and the Presbytery provides an automobile for the employee's use, the employee will be expected to utilize the leased automobile provided by the Presbytery in accord with the established Automobile Policy.
- D. Personal Automobile
 If a personal car is the best alternative, the employee
 will be reimbursed at the current approved rate for the
 miles driven. Tolls and parking fees paid are also
 reimbursed. When an automobile is used because of
 personal preference, the total reimbursement shall not
 exceed the lower of either (a) economy air fare or (b)
 standard railroad fare, plus normal expense of going to
 and from airports/rail stations.
- E. Rented Automobile
 Use only when alternate forms of public transportation are
 more expensive or impractical. Reimbursement will be made for
 additional insurance because Presbytery's insurance does not
 include such coverage. Rented cars are to be operated only by
 the person (s) signing the agreement. If a rented car is also
 used for personal business, the staff person is expected to
 pay an appropriate percentage of the cost.

II. Hotels/Motels

Modest accommodations in moderate rate hotels and motels should be secured. Receipted bills must be filed with the expense report used for reimbursement, or with the authorization for the monthly statement for payment of the Presbytery-provided credit card. Staff member's may choose single room accommodations if they prefer.

III Meals

Meal charges should be moderate and should remain within any per diem rate established for a particular event (e.g., General Assembly). A proportionate share should be paid personally when high-priced meals are ordered or expensive restaurants are visited as a result of personal choice.

- A. <u>Meals when traveling</u> are normally covered as reimbursable expense.
- B. Meals when at the office are <u>not</u> normally covered (including informal committee and business meetings of staff during the luncheon hour.) Exceptions are when:
 - (1) It is prudent to entertain luncheon guests who are not staff members.
 - (2) Committees are scheduled to work during the luncheon hour, and members are not staff members.
 - (3) The Executive Presbyter decides that it is appropriate.
 - (4) When a supervisor requires a non-exempt employee to work a substantial period of overtime at the office (minimum of three hours in an evening or seven hours on a Saturday, Sunday or holiday), the cost of a dinner or luncheon may be reimbursed.
- C. Alcoholic beverages are not reimbursed by Presbytery.

IV. Phone Calls

Phone calls home may be reimbursed when on extended trips and made with reasonable judgement.

V. Reimbursement for Expenses

Expenses incurred are to be charged using the Presbytery-provided credit card whenever possible. Expenses not so charged are to be reported through the use of a "Travel Expense Voucher" for all staff. Bills, receipts, statements and original invoices (if available) shall accompany the report. Expenditures shall be explained and documented as follows: (a) Time and place; (b) Business purpose; (c) Business relationship and names of any other persons involved.

VI. Travel Advances

- A. <u>Temporary Advances</u> may be granted upon request to personnel who are expected to travel extensively in connection with their position. Whenever possible the Presbytery-provided credit card should be used in place of cash advances.
- B. The temporary advance is to be in the amount necessary to cover the expenses of the specific trip or event. Payment will normally be made by check.
- C. Advances shall be accounted for in accord with the principles for expenses outlined above.

VII. Expenses Reimbursed By Other Than the Presbytery

When staff expenses are expected to be reimbursed by another agency or council, the following procedure shall normally be followed:

All expenses are to be paid in the usual manner by A.

Presbytery.
The individual shall submit a separate expense voucher to В. the other agency, in the name of the Presbytery, reporting the total of such appropriate expenses incurred for the specific trip and forwarding a copy to the Presbytery. The reimbursement of these expenses by the other agency

c.

shall be made payable to the Presbytery.

D. Reimbursement shall then be credited to the expense account charged.

What is a VSO?

A Validated Special Opportunity (VSO) is a project that has been through the budgeting and/or validating process. It is considered an approved project of the Presbytery to be supported by special designated contribution from churches or individuals over and above the Presbytery Mission Budget.

PROCEDURES FOR REQUESTING AND VALIDATING A VSO

How do VSOs originate?

The request for inclusion in the Presbytery budget as a VSO, or designation of a current project as a VSO, shall be made by Committees of the Presbytery to the Budget and Finance Committee of Presbytery Council. The request shall be submitted on a "Validated Special Opportunity (VSO) Request Form". (See attached sample.) All portions of the request form shall be completed. VSO request forms for a budget year shall be completed and submitted on a date in October of the year prior to the budget year specified by the Budget and Finance Committee when the request forms are sent to the committees.

How is VSO status determined?

Upon receipt of a completed "Validated Special Opportunity (VSO) Request Form", the Budget and Finance Committee shall review all pertinent data and shall make a validation recommendation to the Council. Upon Council recommendation and motion, the Presbytery shall vote for approval or disapproval of VSO status for a project.

Procedure for Validation of a VSO

Validation of a project for VSO status within the Presbytery of Detroit annual budget will be determined using the following criteria applied to the responses to the questions and data requests set forth in the "Validated Special Opportunity (VSO) Request Form" and to project informational and financial data submitted.

Purpose

The purpose of the project shall be stated clearly.

- The stated purpose of the project shall be consistent with the Mission Directions and Goals of the Presbytery of Detroit.
- 3. Mormally, the projects should not compete for funds with a mission program of our denomination.
- The activities of the project should be consistent with its statement of purpose.
- Priority will be given to projects sponsored by Presbyterian agencies.

Funding/Financial

- 1. Promotion, fund raising and public information undertaken by the project must accurately identify the purpose, program and financial needs of the project.
- 2. At least 60% of annual expenses should support project
- Annual fund raising expenses should not exceed 25% of income.
- 4. Normally, the project's reserve fund should not exceed two (2) times its annual expenditures.
- 5. An annual report, or equivalent package of documents, should be available on request and if required should include:
 - a. Explicit narrative description of project's major activities
 - b. Current audited financial statements
 - c. Current annual budget
 - d. List of project board members
- 6. Means of assessing success potential of project shall be stated.
- Project should have success potential of Excellent or Good.

OVERTURE TO GENERAL ASSEMBLY On Developing a Human Sexuality Curriculum for Preschool-aged Children and Their Parents

Whereas, the 196th General Assembly (1984) took action to create a Human Sexuality Curriculum for youth and the 202nd General Assembly (1990) took action to create a Human Sexuality Curriculum for children, and that there is also a need for such a curriculum for preschool-aged children and their parents; and

Whereas, sexuality begins at birth, and attitudes about sexuality develop very early; and

Whereas, young children begin asking questions related to their own sexuality, and many parents often feel inadequate in their knowledge of sexuality to teach their children; and

Whereas, our culture has distorted the meaning and context of sexuality, and there is an overwhelming amount of sexual abuse in many forms, including sexual abuse of very young children; and

Whereas, one of the Great Ends of the Church (BO, G-1.0200) is the "promotion of social righteousness"; and

Whereas, our faith speaks about human sexuality as a vital part of a life-committed relationship, and the Confession of 1967 stated that "Reconciled to God, each person has joy in and respect for his (sic) own humanity and that of other persons"; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Presbytery of Detroit overture the 205th (1993) General Assembly to direct the Education and Congregational Nurture Ministry Unit to develop, and provide funds for, a human sexuality curriculum for preschool-aged children and their parents that may be used by churches and/or parents to teach young children about the gift of their own sexuality.

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D. V. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres announced that the Mission Yearbooks for Prayer and Study for 1993 are to be picked up by the churches who ordered them.

He reported that the Presbytery was well represented at the convocation held October 31-November 1, 1992. A copy of the report from the convocation is in the Resource Center. Elder Alfred Warren, Grosse Pointe Memorial was selected as one of the 12 persons to be on the General Assembly Council's Shape and Form Task Group that will develop recommendations regarding the future of the denomination.

Mr. Gehres reported on actions taken at the Synod Meeting held in November. The Synod of the Covenant will no longer have standing committees composed of members elected by the presbyteries. The Synod Commissioners will form the committees of Synod. The number of Commissioners will be increased and the Assemblies will be three days long, allowing commissioners to do the work of the committees.

Executive Presbyter Gehres attended two conferences. Part of each was dedicated to discussing issues related to sexual molestation of children. At one conference it was pointed out that the church is extremely vulnerable because the church is the last volunteer organization that does not screen prospective persons working with children. As a result, potential abusers are turning to the church.

VI. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY THEOLOGY AND WORSHIP COMMITTEE

Peter Bower reported that the Theology and Worship Committee is sponsoring a Pre-Presbytery Event at the January meeting of Presbytery. It will consist of presenting various resources that have been found to be helpful in planning, leading, worshipping, praying and studying during the seasons of Lent, Easter and the Day of Pentecost.

VII. SHARING OUR LIFE: EXPERIENCES, JOYS AND CONCERNS Members of Presbytery shared the concerns and joys that they have experienced during the past month.

VIII. ADJOURNMENT WITH PRAYER

There being no further business the presbytery meeting was adjourned at 9:21 p.m. with prayer by Moderator Rumsey which incorporated the work, joys and concerns of the presbytery that had been raised during the meeting.

The next stated meeting of Presbytery, will convene Tuesday, January 26, 1993 at the Grosse Pointe Memorial Church at 5:30 pm.

RE: Special Staffing Design Committee Report: A New Paradigm,

a New Direction

FR: Special Committee to Study Staffing (James Conley; Robert Arnold; Rev. Lawrence Chamberlain; Jean Lennox; Helen Morrison, Rev. Diane Smalley Norman; James Shirley)

In fall 1991 (September 24) the Presbytery motioned a "complete and thorough examination ... into staff rationales, and the possibilities for combining the two positions that have been vacated [Associate Executive Presbyter and Associate for Congregational Program] into one position." Presbytery Council later (October 8, 1991) implemented the motion by appointing a committee to proceed with "a needs assessment of staff, to decide the number of staff persons necessary, and if possible provide job descriptions."

Subsequently, a committee was assembled, and began a series of bimonthly meetings of April 23. (By no means incidentally, the committee gratefully acknowledges the advice and counsel of the Staff Services Committee, the direct participation of the Planning and Structure Committee, and the procedural support of several members of Council.)

The assigned committee made up of James Conley, chair; Robert Arnold; Rev. Lawrence Chamberlain; Jean Lennox; Helen Morrison; Rev. Diane Smalley Norman; and James Shirley now submits the following report:

Considerations:

A variety of factors influenced the committee to depart from the staff design adopted by Presbytery on June 16, 1988. Among these factors were: current trends in both general and ecclesiastical administration; patterns and procedures recently followed by comparable presbyteries in their staff designs; the inclinations and interests of our presbytery's present staff; opinions and ideas from the broader leadership constituency of the Presbytery. With these factors in the mind, the committee decided to conduct a broader a review of Presbytery's overall staffing pattern.

Our inquiry took us through an examination of current leadership trends represented in contemporary management literature, general and religious, communication with other presbyteries who have recently gone through similar staffing studies, interviews with the current Presbytery staff, and group interviews with a broad sampling of the general leadership of the Presbytery of Detroit (including Presbytery Council).

>From management literature: A new paradigm:
>From literature related to today's rapidly-developing management theory and practice, we are convinced that organizational leaders for the 90s and beyond, no matter their field of maneuver, must be much more service and development oriented and less institutional-maintenance-oriented. This implies that the Presbytery should reconceptualize itself in terms of a functional entity with its corporate-mission interests clearly defined, specifically focused and integrated around an amalgam of mission oriented, well-reasoned short- and long-term projects which would result in the upbuilding of the supporting congregations and significant service to our regional community.

The impetus here should be to create a paradigm shift from visualizing the staff's (and hence the Presbytery's) main task as that of meeting the disparate (and ever-expanding) needs of an array of special interests and concerns, a <u>vertical</u> conceptualization, locked in a repetitious zone of space and time, to a paradigm of the Presbytery as functional organization moving <u>horizontally through</u> space and time with a range of integrated sub-activities each supportive of a widely-accepted mission. (We realize that this can be a somewhat subtle, even elusive concept. But the commitment to a new way of visualizing the Presbytery as an advancing corporate body in cooperation with a leadership committed to that process could, we believe, have a powerfully energizing effect.)

>From other presbyteries: Permission to innovate:
What we have learned from correspondence with other presbyteries -National Capitol, Western Reserve, and Atlanta -- is that there is
apparently no prescribed staffing mode. And even when the staffing
pattern appears similar, e.g., there is always the required Executive
Presbyter, and a Stated Clerk (although we came across one instance
where it appears the <u>functions</u> of both were covered by the same
person), the overall philosophical orientation may be different, one
from the other, maybe as much driven by local social and economic
forces, along with tradition, as by any assumptions about "one best
way". Hence, we see National Capitol creating an inclusive
congregational model, Atlanta operating as a comprehensive service
organization, and Western Reserve focused on renewal through spiritual
development. Each Presbytery is compelled by its own special
historical and social circumstances, perceived needs and
opportunities. Hence, our committee felt free to suggest a new
pattern, based on our own special heritage and current intent.

>From interviews with staff: Commitment and frustration:
Interviews were conducted with present (and past) Presbytery
staff members. (All staff members were extremely cooperative,
patient, and generous with their valuable time in this process.)
One staff group interview was conducted, followed by a succession
of one-to-one interviews with individual members of staff. (In
addition, some staff members supplied the committee with lists of
their responsibilities and activities, lending insight into their
many commitments.) Primarily from the interviews, the committee
has learned that there is present an undercurrent of malaise, of
occasional frustration, even, at times, a sense of isolation.

The malaise is represented by the perception that Presbytery itself lacks a basic, across-the-board, shared vision direction. Instead, there is more a disparate and often confusing set of individual (and ever-changing) agendi, all seeking service to their unique intentions. Consequently, staff persons are frequently stretched beyond their limits of energy, expertise and enthusiasm. They experience frustration, as only a limited number of demands can be fully met, many are only partially served (in this job one can experience "a permanent guilt trip"), and many needs, clearly seen as critical from the vantage point of Presbytery staff, are never gotten to at all.

Further, and more critically, there is no clear rallying agenda about which to organize or by which to determine time and energy allocation. This frustration is intensified by a sensation of detachment as the staff become so burdened with day-to-day administrative expectations that they are deprived of opportunity to participate in the life and ministry of the churches where their prevailing commitment could be more generally fulfilled. And, in addition, they frequently experience situations where they are called upon to perform tasks for which they are ill-prepared, either by training or inclination; to do for some what they could probably as effectively do for themselves; or to provide counsel or "resourcing" in the face of grossly insufficient information.

Perhaps most debilitating, they have an overall feeling of being overwhelmed by expectations, of their work's being less and less relevant to a growing number of congregations, hence they feel isolated from "the loving community" they genuinely yearn for, have no time for enriching (and enlightening) dialogue among themselves, no opportunity for professional or personal renewal, no chance to stop out, stand down, and stoke up.

>From interviews with staff: New roles for the future:
Positively, the staff look forward to a reformation of Presbytery
focus, "a shift in expectations," away from "answer man",
archivist (What's the Book (of Order) say?"), accountant ("We
have a very intense, business-laden presbytery."), and arbiter
("Some think the only time someone from staff shows up is when
there's trouble."), to the broader roles of the future:
consultant, catalyst, communicator, and counselor.

Consultant:

There is a desire to relate to the Presbytery's many responsibilities on the basis of their own collective and individual perceptions of an endeavor's need and the staff's ability to constructively relate to it. They would like to serve, however, more as generalists, to not be so tightly delegated to "resourcing" particular committees, to have more freedom of choice among assignments, perhaps to see Presbytery consider a reduction in the number of standing committees needing prolonged resourcing. Further, they envision the use of professional survey, research and disciplinary experts as a means of upgrading the value of their advice. (Urban ministry, hunger relief, and social justice issues, for example, require well-developed knowledge and skills.)

Catalyst:

We have also learned from our interviews with the present professional staff that, mainly, they want to function as credible generalists, who lend their expertise and assistance to advancing our presbytery's across-the-board interests. The staff should be flexible, that is, more project (or process) management oriented; moving somewhat away from the presbytery-assigned advisory or "resourcing" model that has been in place for some time.

There is also the feeling among staff that they would function more productively in the role of agents of exchange and relationships. Rather than <u>be</u> the resource, the staff would prefer to move more into matching those in the Presbytery who have well-developed program enrichment and professional problem-solving skills with needful situations. In the same vein, the present staff generally believe that a large part of their activity should include making available training in group facilitation and organizational development, and enabling skills, especially for new Council members and other Presbytery committee leaders.

Communicator:

Another staff role of the future would emphasize communication; communication among staff members themselves, finding time for dialogue and sorting out priorities, coaching and internal consulting, strengthening their service capabilities. And, beyond that, staff seeks to establish themselves as connecting links for all parts of the Presbytery, not that all activities must report to Presbytery staff, but that many efforts -- programmatic, pastoral, and personal -- could possibly benefit from passing through a Presbytery staff which was truly equipped to help.

Counselor:

Finally, among the top roles of the future, our staff envisions themselves far more in personal, one-to-one touch with pastors and lay-persons, in manifesting "the generalized care of the connectional church" among all the parishes, especially showing pastoral concern for pastoral leaders.

>From interviews with Presbytery leaders: Solid preferences:
To discover the views of our Presbytery's leadership
constituency, a series of small-group interviews were held with
those who responded to a general invitation to a number of
selected sites. One of the group interviews was conducted with
Presbytery Council, and the rest were conducted with pastors and
lay leaders at various locations throughout Presbytery's service
area. In all, a robust total of 91 persons, including the
special committee members, took part. There were 45 ministers
and 46 elders and others. Some 47 churches were represented, 32
by ministers only, and 15 by elders and others, 11 by both, 21 by
ministers only, and 15 by elders and others only. (Staff members
did not participate in these meetings.)

A series of question-type items were put to the groups, following typical focus group format, and the responses were carefully recorded. From the assembled data, the committee on staffing has drawn the following inferences regarding the staff preferences of those who participated in the process:

They expressed preference for a staff who will:

- 1. ...guide development of a Presbytery mission vision and plan; (exceptionally frequent and strong mention)
- 2. ...be visible in local churches;
 (exceptionally frequent and strong mention)
- 3. ...provide for pastoral (personal and professional) consultation for pastors; (very frequent and strong mention)
- 4. ...provide for consultation on church order (calls, installations, procedures, interpretation, etc.); (very frequent mention)
- 5. ...provide liaison with and interpretation of (actions of) synod and General Assembly; (very frequent mention)
- 6. ...recruit, train, and coordinate (Presbytery) committees (lay and clergy); (very frequent mention)
- 7. ...encourage a high level of (staff) professionalism; (very frequent mention)
- 8. ...provide for (Presbytery) staff development while maximizing latitude in group- and self-assignment; (very frequent mention)
- 9. ...maintain general public relations and communication (and interpretation...among churches, between General Assembly, synod, and other Presbytery entities, and with the larger community; (very frequent mention)

- 10. ...maintain adequate office administration;
 (very frequent mention)
- 11. ...provide for consultation on budget and finance, property and investments; (frequent mention)
- 12. ...provide for Presbytery and local church program consultation (especially evangelism, church growth, education); (frequent mention)
- 13. ...coordinate research into and consultation regarding local church and general presbytery-area needs (hunger, social service, urban church development, etc.) (frequent mention)
- 14. ...facilitate communication among/between churches (large and small, urban and suburban, and pastors/staffs); (frequent mention)
- 15. ...facilitate celebration of achievements, express appreciation (of and for volunteer service and local church successes); (frequent mention)
- 16. ...emphasize interpersonal skills and cooperative skills development among staff, professional, support, and lay. (frequent mention)

RECOMMENDATION

On the basis of the above information, the committee recommends some modification of the staff configuration for the Presbytery of Detroit. In general, we are recommending a somewhat smaller staff at the executive/associate level. We are not advancing a rationale for reduction. Our recommendations are based entirely on the evidence cited above, and on the intent that Presbytery staff conduct itself in a somewhat new way, as previously We are strongly urging that Staff Services and described. Presbytery Council, along with Presbytery staff work out patterns of service and administration that will meet the expressed preferences of the presbytery's constituency. We urge that a plan of service be worked out between these three groups, one that has a firm means of determining that these preferences are being fulfilled. There should be a plan in place designed to deal with these preferences. There should be monitoring of how effectively the preferences are being met. Self-reports by staff should be a regular part of this process. Also, Staff Services and Council are requested to use various means of periodically seeking general information from presbytery's constituency as to how effectively their needs are being met vis a vis Presbytery staff. When there is reflection from this "customer" base that

preferences are not being served, then appropriate action -rescheduling, retraining, research, reprogramming -- should be
undertaken to make it so. There is no thought here that
perfection will ever be achieved. But if modern administration
is to have any meaning whatsoever as an active <u>service</u> process,
then there must be some expectation that it can be constantly,
and observably, improved.

Further, what follows are not to be taken as specific-duty recommendations. This list is both incomplete and merely suggestive. Those closest to the work are the ones to best design effective approaches to its accomplishment. We have a core mandate from our constituency. As Church professionals, knowing both the general ecclesiastical dimensions and specific local requirements, a competent staff will be able to adjust to the demands. Again, Staff Services, Council and Presbytery staff persons must work out assignments, perhaps with some trial and error, designed to meet our presbytery's preferences. We trust that all three will equally take seriously their servant opportunity.

With these considerations in mind, we would recommend the following:

That a staff team be assembled consisting of...

An Executive Presbyter and one or two Associates...
The Executive Presbyter functions as head of staff: deploys, supervises and evaluates all members of the staff team.

A Stated Clerk, Director of Outdoor Ministries, and Administrator for Business Affairs

These positions should remain in place with assignments essentially the same as outlined in the June 16, 1988, staff design recommendation, except for the Stated Clerk's position. We urge consideration be given to expanding the position of Stated Clerk, in responsibility and time commitment, to include church officer development, including consultation on the nominating process; and providing advice and counsel to the Presbytery Nominating Committee with regard to the need for volunteer leaders -ministers, elders, deacons, trustees, laypersons -to work in and through presbytery's general administration.

The Committee recognizes that there are persons now playing vital roles in the current administration of the Presbytery who are not designated in this "line" description (Hunger Enabler, Peace Enabler, and Resource Center Coordinator). These important short-and longer-term additions to the staff are the responsibility of the staff team.

The total team will be fundamentally charged with responsibility for the sixteen preferential emphases listed on pages 5 and 6 above. The team's priority will be these sixteen emphases, rather than the usual committee staffing patterns now in place. Team members will function as generalists, rather than specialists, with abilities and willingness to serve in interchangeable roles, as need be. However, we also urge that the team be self-monitoring in terms of having present the relevant skills and/or knowledge necessary for effective Presbytery service. This may come through training, through short- or longer-term consultants, or through additional staff.

Important concluding notes:

- 1. This is not a unanimous report. As should be expected by anyone familiar with what is happening in contemporary organizations of all types in terms of staffing, deciding how many should be in place to do what stimulates heavy discussion. At best, there is likely to be divided opinion.
- 2. The committee has recommended fewer persons for the staff complement than is currently carried. It is recommended that an amount equal to the usual support of one associate-level position be reserved and allotted to research and development needs, to be liberally used as the need for special information and skills presents itself.
- 3. The consequence of our recommendations should not be an increased workload for staff. The new paradigm that is implied in throughout this report is that the Presbytery assume more and more responsibility for its own progress through responsible individual, committee, and local church activity. The main burden of responsibility for staff of the future will be one of enabling, nurturing, serving and leading, rather than bearing the load of business that the Presbytery of Detroit has traditionally placed upon its staff. Again, Staff Services, Council, the staff, and the Presbytery itself, must collaborate to ensure that the declared expectations of the Presbytery are fulfilled. But these expectations should take the form of Presbytery-wide self-expectations, not necessarily assigned staff duties.
- 4. The committee recommendation is for one or two associates. This does not represent equivocation; rather, it is a legitimate choice. Our present Executive, in consultation with other staff, Staff Services, and Presbytery Council, must decide on the appropriate strategy for implementing the committee's recommended approach to Presbytery administration.

COM REPORT TO PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

NOVEMBER 24,1992

The Presbytery of Detroit, at its stated meeting on September 22, 1992, while meeting in executive session, approved a motion "to refer the main motion back to the Committee on Ministry [COM] to consult with Milton Henry, members of Christ Presbyterian Church (not PC(USA)), and members of St. John's, and to report back at the next stated meeting of the presbytery." The chair of the COM, the Rev. Mr. William C. Schram, at the October 27, 1992, meeting of the presbytery, reported that actions in response to this motion were on-going and a report would be filed at the November meeting of the presbytery. He also advised that the COM report would be coordinated with a report by the Committee on Church Strategy regarding Christ Presbyterian Church. The following report is respectfully submitted in compliance with the presbytery's actions.
