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# MINUTES OF THE JANUARY 26, 1993 STATED MEETING PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

# GROSSE POINTE MEMORIAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

# I. THE GATHERING A. THE MODERATOR

A quorum being present, the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was convened in stated session on Tuesday, January 26, 1993, at 5:30 p.m. at the Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, Grosse Pointe. Past moderator William Rumsey opened the meeting with a moment of silence followed by a memorial prayer for the Rev. David S. Swinehart, former pastor of Allen Park Presbyterian Church, who died January 24, 1993.

Mr. Rumsey welcomed new commissioners and ministers. Joanne

Higgins was appointed Assistant to the Stated Clerk.

## B. THE STATED CLERK

Stated Clerk Jenny Schram presented Part I of her report and motions

were sustained that presbytery:

1. DOCKET. Adopt the docket.

EXCUSES. Excuse all continuing members who have asked to be excused, all lay members of Council who have asked to be excused, and all non-resident continuing members who are not present.

CORRESPONDING MEMBERS. Without further motions, seat as corresponding members all eligible persons who are presented to the Presbytery and who register on the enrollment sheet forcorresponding members.

# C. WELCOME BY THE HOST PASTOR

Dr. Bruce Rigdon, pastor of the Grosse Pointe Memorial Presbyterian Church, greeted the presbyters and welcomed them to the church. He informed the presbytery that Grosse Pointe Memorial has been ministering in the community for 127 years and has been a congregation of the Presbyterian Church since 1920. He stated that Moderator Lawrence Van Til is an elder in Memorial Church.

# INSTALLATION OF MODERATOR LAWRENCE VAN TIL AND VICE-MODERATOR PETER SMITH

Elder Lawrence Van Til and the Rev. Peter Smith were installed as moderator and vice-moderator, respectively, of the Presbytery of Detroit for 1993 by past moderator William Rumsey. Following the installation, Elder Van Til assumed the duties of moderating the meeting.

#### BUSINESS TO BE ADOPTED BY MOTION AND DEBATE II. A. THE STATED CLERK

Stated Clerk Schram presented Part II of her report. Motions were sustained that presbytery:

- The General Assembly has responded to the invitation of the Presbytery of Detroit to host the assembly in the year 2000. The locations for the assembly are chosen by geographic regions. The Presbytery of Detroit is not located in the
- region stipulated for the assembly in the year 2000. Received notification of the lawsuit by Christ Presbyterian Church, the Rev. Milton Henry and Clerk of session James Reid vs. the Presbytery of Detroit, Inc.. Judge Claudia Morcom issued an injunction that enjoins the Presbytery of Detroit,

Inc. from implementing and carrying out the action taken at the November meeting of the Presbytery of Detroit concerning the Rev. Milton Henry.

- C. Stated Clerk Schram pointed out that Highlights of the Synod Assembly, held November 18-19, 1992 were in the papers distributed for the meeting. She noted that the Rev. In Soon Choi, a member of the Presbytery of Detroit, was elected and installed as the moderator of the Synod of the Covenant and expressed appreciation to him for his service to the larger church.
- D. Clerk Schram distributed a paper "COMMUNIQUE QUESTIONNAIRE" from the Communications Committee of the Synod of the Covenant and requested that the presbyters complete the questionnaire for the synod.

# B. THE COUNCIL

William Rumsey reported for the Council. Motions were sustained that presbytery:

#### D. COMMITTEE ON MINISTRY

William Schram reported for the Committee on Ministry. Motions were sustained that presbytery:

 Approve the dissolution of the associate pastor relationship between the Rev. Dale Ihrie and the Lake Shore Church, St. Clair Shores, effective March 31, 1993; grant the status of Honorably Retired to Mr. Ihrie; approve congregation's request that he be named Associate Pastor Emeritus.

 Grant the status of Honorably Retired to the Rev. Ralph Stribe, effective March 12, 1993.

- 3. Approve the following Commission to install the Rev. Bruce George as Associate Pastor at Cherry Hill Church, Dearborn, on January 17, 1993 at 4:00 P.M.: Clergy: Thomas Smith; Kathy McIntosh-Smith. Elders: Lawrence VanTil, Moderator (Grosse Pointe Memorial); Jean Perkins (First, Birmingham); John Banks (Cherry Hill, Dearborn).
- 4. Approve the following Commission to install the Rev. Anthony Patrick as Pastor at Trinity Community Church, Detroit, on January 10, 1993 at 4:00 P.M.: Clergy: Virgil Jones; William Schram. - 5. Dismiss the Rev. Barbara Peter to Chicago Presbytery to take a call as Interim Pastor at Kirk of the Lakes in Mundelein, Illinois.
- 6. Dismiss the Rev. William Jones to Lake Huron Presbytery to take a call as Interim Pastor of Farnumwood Church, Burton, Michigan.
- 7. Transfer the Rev. David Eshleman to Chicago Presbytery upon their request.

- 13. Renewed the Stated Supply contract between the Rev. James Beates and Joslyn Avenue Church, Pontiac, for one year effective January 1, 1993, with the following terms (80% time): Salary \$17,955; Housing \$6,000; FICA \$1,833; Travel \$.24/mile (approximately \$1,200); Study allowance \$300; Professional expenses \$600; Pension \$7,053; Medical as specified by the Board of Pensions.
- 14. Dissolved the pastoral relationship between the Rev. David Eshleman and First Church, Pontiac, effective January 15, 1993.

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Johnson (Waterford, Lakeland), James Stevens (Pontiac, First), Francile Anderson (Waterford, Drayton Plains Community).

- 17. Approve the call of Johnie Bennett as pastor of Detroit, St. John's, effective May 23, 1993, with the following terms: Salary \$25,922, Housing \$7,776, Automobile Allowance \$.024 per mile, Medical Insurance \$1,088, Moving costs as negotiated, Study Leave \$300, Social Security \$2,578, Full Pension, 1 month vacation (including 4 Sundays), 2 weeks study leave. AA/EEO requirements were met in issuing this call.
- 18. Approve the call of Ronald Byars as pastor of Birmingham, First, effective March 22, 1993, at the following terms: Salary \$50,000, Housing \$22,000, Automobile Allowance \$3,500, Book Allowance \$840, Medicl Insurance deductible, Study Leave Allowance \$2,500, moving costs as negotiated, Full Pension,1 month vacation (including 4 Sundays plus 1 Sunday per quarter), 2 weeks study leave. AA/EEO requirements were met in issuing this call.

New members were welcomed to the Presbytery and to each a member of Presbytery was assigned to act as shepherd.

# E. COMMITTEE ON METROPOLITAN MISSION

Peter Moore reported for the Committee on Metropolitan Mission. The committee presented a Resolution on Casino Gambling (Appendix D) and included in their motion additional rationale by a member of presbytery. The resolution was adopted that the Presbytery of Detroit actively opposes every effort to build and operate gambling casinos anywhere within the bounds of the presbytery.

# E. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH STRATEGY

Tom Hartley reported for the Committee on Church Strategy. A motion was sustained to change the name of the First Korean Church, Royal Oak to Hope Korean Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

# G. COMMITTEE ON OUTDOOR MINISTRIES

Michael Fonfara reported for the Committee on Outdoor Ministries. Mr. Fonfara presented a paper <u>Howell Center Implementation Plan</u> for first reading in January and action in February. Jennifer Kondak reviewed the history of the plan and Richard Grant explained the map and plans for development of the Howell Center.

# H. OTHER BUSINESS 1. ENROLL MINISTERS

A motion was sustained to enroll as members of the Presbytery of Detroit Ronald Byars upon receipt of his credentials from Transylvania Presbytery and Johnie Bennett upon receipt of his credentials from Savannah Presbytery.

# 2. CASINO GAMBLING RESOLUTION

A motion was sustained to direct the Stated Clerk to send copies of the Resolution on Casino Gambling to Governor Engler, the mayors and city councils of Detroit, Highland Park, Port Huron, and Windsor, as well as, the Detroit News and Free Press.

The presbytery was recessed at 6:45.

# III. ORDER OF THE DAY

WORSHIP INCLUDING THE SACRAMENT OF COMMUNION
The Presbytery of Detroit reconvened at 7:00 in a service of worship which included celebrating the sacrament of communion. Moderator Van Til preached the sermon. Moderator Van Til was joined by officers and staff of presbytery and past moderators of presbytery who assisted in the leadership of the service and the sacrament.

# IV. BUSINESS TO BE ADOPTED BY MOTION AND DEBATE (PART II) A. OTHER BUSINESS

Stated Clerk Schram presented information on an action taken in November. Gwendolyn Wilson, Trinity, Detroit was elected as an alternate for the 205th GA (1993). Ms. Wilson is not an elder and therefore is not eligible to serve as an Elder Commissioner to the General Assembly.

#### COMMITTEE ON PREPARATION FOR MINISTRY B. Leland Seese reported for the Committee on Preparation for Ministry. ANNUAL CONSULTATIONS

# II. ENROLL AS CANDIDATE

Mr. Seese presented Barbara O'Day, and recommended that she be enrolled as a candidate under care of the presbytery. After hearing her statement of faith, and opportunity being given for questions from the floor, presbytery voted to arrest and sustain the examination and to enroll Barbara O'Day as a candidate under the care of the presbytery.

Moderator Van Til asked the constitutional questions of Barbara She answered in the affirmative. Moderator Van Til charged the candidate and offered the support of the presbytery as she continues in her preparation for service to the Church. III. REMOVAL OF INQUIRER

Upon recommendation from the Committee on Preparation for Ministry the presbytery sustained a motion to remove the name of David Roberts from the roll of inquirers at his request. REMOVAL OF A CANDIDATE

Upon recommendation from the committee on Preparation for the Ministry the presbytery sustained a motion to remove the name of Ronald Brook-Eskridge from the roll of candidates under care of the presbytery.

The reasons for this removal are recorded as follows:

Mr. Brook-Eskridge met with the committee on October 6, 1992, because of concerns that were raised about his unauthorized field education and working with Christ Presbyterian Church (independent). The committee took the following actions, to which Mr. Brook-Eskridge agreed:

"After discussion, CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit required Mr. R. Brook-Eskridge to demonstrate a willingness to abide by the constitutional requirements for ordination with particular attention given to the peace, unity and purity of the Church and a willingness to be governed by the polity and discipline of our Church, (G-14.0405b, #5 & 7).

"The minimum requirement for demonstrating such a willingness is an affirmation in writing to his CPM liaison by two weeks from this date which positively addresses the following items:

- Mr. R. Brook-Eskridge shall immediately cease all 1. participation with Christ Presbyterian Church, Inc.
- Mr. R. Brook-Eskridge shall communicate in writing the break with Christ Presbyterian Church, Inc. to the leadership of Christ Presbyterian Church, Inc. and send a copy of such letter to his CPM liaison.
  Mr. R. Brook-Eskridge shall reaffirm active membership in

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- St. John's Presbyterian Church and request continuing support for his candidacy for ministry in writing to the clerk of session of St. John's Presbyterian Church.
- 4. Mr. R. Brook-Eskridge shall reaffirm to this committee in writing his active membership (as defined in G-5.0202) in St. John's Presbyterian Church.
- 5. Mr. R. Brook-Eskridge shall enroll in McCormick Theological Seminary [the school of his choice] for the Winter term.
- 6. Mr. R. Brook-Eskridge, upon enrollment at McCormick
  Theological Seminary, shall institute a field education
  assignment in a PC(USA) affiliated church, other than
  St. John's Presbyterian Church, which meets the approval of
  both the field education office of McCormick Theological
  Seminary and the Committee on Preparation for Ministry of the
  Presbytery of Detroit."

There has been no communication from Mr. Brook-Eskridge since October 6. He has not sent notice of his disassociation with Christ Presbyterian Church. He has not reaffirmed his active membership in St. John's Presbyterian Church or asked the session to reaffirm his candidacy. Mr. Brook-Eskridge was accepted for admission to McCormick Theological Seminary early in September. The committee has received no notice of matriculation from Mr. Brook-Eskridge or the seminary, and the committee has not received for approval a list of courses to be taken (all courses for all candidates are to be approved by the committee prior to taking them). There has been no indication of an approved field education placement or work in an approved PC(USA) congregation.

V. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported that the February issue of Reader's Digest contains an article titled, "The Gospel According to Marx" by Joseph Harris. The article is an indictment of the World Council of Churches and questions the involvement of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) in the WCC. Information on this issue is available by calling 1-800-up-2-date, a service of the General Assembly.

Mr. Gehres asked the presbytery to support the Allen Park Church and the family of the Rev. David Swinehart with prayer. It is particularly difficult for a congregation and family when a pastor dies tragically. The presbytery staff and the Committee on Ministry are taking measures to assure that the congregation receives the support need.

Executive Presbyter Gehres spoke of the lawsuit that has been filed against the Presbytery of Detroit, Inc. by the Christ Presbyterian Church (Independent), the Rev. Milton Henry and clerk of session James Reid. He assured the presbyters that we are in the good hands of a very capable law firm and lawyer as well as in God's hands. God is in our midst and will sustain us. He asked for the continued prayers of the presbytery and expressed appreciation for the support which has been given.

# VI. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY

A. COMMITTEE ON MISSION INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP
Tom Fearnside reported for the committee that 97% of the pledged
giving to General Mission for 1992 had been received. This
necessitated a cutting the 1992 budget by 10% balance income and
expenditures.

The 1993 General Mission Pledge Forms have been distributed with a narrative budget and should be returned to Presbytery by January 31.

# B. COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

Craig Aue reported for the committee and announced upcoming workshops. Mr. Aue presented certificates to representatives of churches that have adopted the COMMITMENT TO EVANGELISM. The churches

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were Troy, First; Royal Oak, First; Detroit, Jefferson Avenue; and Belleville.

The Rev. Debbie Kerr and member Gary Boyd did a short presentation on the evangelism project at the Belleville Church. The project was supported by the evangelism project fund.

# C. METROPOLITAN MISSION COMMITTEE

Peter Moore introduced Artheilla Thompson, Hunger Action Enabler for the Presbytery of Detroit. She reported that living conditions all across the US has worsened for many Americans during the last decade. She to speak to congregations to interpret the current situation and the causes of hunger, homelessness, and unemployment. She will update congregations on what the presbytery is doing to help to alleviate some of these problems. The Hunger Committee presented Ms. Thompson with flowers in appreciation of her 10 years of service as the hunger action enabler.

Larry Wyatt recognized and presented certificates to the churches who have signed covenants in the "2 cents per meal program" sponsored by the Hunger Committee. The churches recognized are: Plymouth, First; Birmingham, First; Walled Lake, Crossroads; Waterford, Drayton Plains Community; Wyandotte, First; Ecorse; Westland, Kirk of Our Savior; and Royal Oak, Christ Memorial.

Katie Thoreson invited the presbyters to B.R.A.V.E. DETROIT! in a six-week series of Lenten explorations into the inner city of Detroit.

# VII. ISSUE OF CONCERN REPORT ON THE CHURCH-WIDE CONVOCATION

The report on the Church-Wide Convocation, titled "Discerning the Spirit-Envisioning Our Future," was given by Carol Hylkema, William Gepford and Alfred Warren. The convocation was called to help the General Assembly Council and the 1993 General Assembly make the tough decisions needed to bring a balanced budget for the PC(USA) by the year 2000. Elder Alfred Warren is one of the twelve persons selected to serve on the "Shape and Form Committee" charged with the duty of taking the "book" produced by the 150 issue groups and to use the findings to restructure the PC(USA). The committee is composed of 12 people, eight clergy and four lay. Mr. Warren reported that the task of the "Shape and Form Committee" is to examine the spiritually, mission, structure, and financial standing of our church.

# VIII. EXPERIENCES, JOYS, CONCERNS

The joys and concerns of the members of Presbytery were lifted up and shared.

# IX. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the presbytery, the meeting was adjourned by moderator Van Til at 9:37p.m. with prayer that expressed the shared joys and concerns and the work of the presbytery.

The next stated meeting of Presbytery will convene Tuesday, February 23, 1993 at the Cherry Hill Presbyterian Church, Dearborn, at 5:30 pm.

PROPOSED MANSE POLICY Committee on Ministry Presbytery of Detroit

The following policy is for the purpose of clarifying the relationship between the clergy and the trustees of congregations with manses (or the appropriate committee such as property, buildings and grounds, manse). Its purpose is to facilitate clear communication between the parties to a pastoral call involving the use of a church-owned manse, and to assist the trustees (or appropriate committee) with their ongoing plans for repair, maintenance, and property upkeep.

- I. Inspections of the manse (with written reports) will be completed at the entrance and exit of clergy who will live in that manse as a part of their terms of call. Inspection will be done by the clergy involved, a representative of the personnel committee, a representative of the trustees (or appropriate committee), and a representative of the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry.
- II. A clergy's Facilities Use Agreement will be negotiated, drawn up and signed by the clergy, the clerk of session, and the president of the trustees (or chair of the appropriate committee) at the time the call is issued. This may be renegotiated during the time of the call as conditions change. A copy will be forwarded to the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry along with the report of the terms of call.
- III. There will be an annual manse evaluation by the clergy, a representative of the personnel committee and a representative of the trustees (or appropriate committee) with written report including (a) condition, (b) needs, (3) plans for the upcoming year's repair, redecoration, etc. This report will be signed by each of the above parties with a copy forwarded to the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry along with the annual terms of call report. At the request of any of the above parties, a representative of the Committee on Ministry can be included in the evaluation viewing.
  - IV. The repair of any damage caused by unusual use of the facility by the clergy or other occupants is the responsibility of the clergy. If the clergy is leaving the call, the repair or arrangements for the repair must be completed to the satisfaction of the trustees (or appropriate committee) and the Committee on Ministry before the clergy's credentials will be released from the Presbytery of Detroit.

# RESOLUTION ON CASINO GAMBLING PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

- WHEREAS God has created us in God's image to be responsible stewards of God's good creation;
- WHEREAS the Bible and our confessions remind us that we belong to God and not to ourselves and that our life and our labor are gifts from God;
- WHEREAS the money we earn in our society represents the fruits of the gifts of our life and our labor;
- WHEREAS our money is not our own to spend as we please but is to be spent in some responsible discipleship in obedience to Christ's call to "Come, follow me";
- WHEREAS casino gambling devalues and trivializes money as a symbol of God's gift of life and labor;
- WHEREAS there are currently a number of propossals to build gambling casinos in Detroit, Highland Park, and Port Huron;
- WHEREAS the citizens of Detroit three times have voted "NO" to casino gambling;
- WHEREAS the city of Detroit needs businesses and jobs which provide long-term and genuine prosperity;
- WHEREAS the majority of jobs created by casinos are low-paying service jobs;
- WHEREAS the presence of casino gambling produces an increase in street crime, organized crime, and prostitution;
- WHEREAS citizens of Detroit are already victimized by an overwhelming crime problem;
- WHEREAS casino gambling encourages addictive behavior in compulsive gamblers;
- THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Presbytery of Detroit actively opposes every effort to build and operate gambling casinos anywhere within the bounds of the presbytery.

Michael Fonfara reported for the committee and spoke briefly on the Howell Center Implementation Plan. He introduced Jennifer Kondak who gave a brief summary of the action being recommended. Motion was sustained that presbytery:

That the Presbytery approve in principle the ten year plan and commit itself to the development of the Howell Center

property.

b. That the sale of the current Camp Sarah Grindley be approved in principle and the programs now held there be relocated to the Howell Center site, with the proceeds of the sale of the present Grindley property to be used for the redevelopment of the new Camp Sarah Grindley at Howell.

- c. That to begin the process of relocating the present Camp Sarah Grindley, the Outdoor Ministries Committee and the Committee on Property & Investments be authorized to secure the services of an architect and a real estate appraiser. The architect will provide basic floor plans, conceptual drawings of buildings, and a cost analysis including site preparation. The appraiser will provide financial information including a market survey on the sale of Camp Sarah Grindley. Architect and appraiser fees up to \$25,000.00 to be funded from Bicentennial Fund.
- d. That the monies received from the sale of the Youth Island property be reserved for the development of the new Camp Sarah Grindley site at Howell. (Approximate balance is \$100,000.00).
- I. BICENTENNIAL FUND ACCOUNTABILITY COMMITTEE
  Henry Kempel reported for the Bicentennial Fund Accountability
  Committee. He stated that the purpose of the committee is to oversee
  the spending of the money collected through the Bicentennial Fund.
  The Bicentennial Funds are allocated 33% General Assembly; 19% synod;
  and 48% presbytery. He reported that \$985,000 had been received from
  the congregations in the Presbytery. The committee ensures that the
  funds are allocated proportionately between the governing bodies and
  evaluates the progress of each of the presbytery projects.
- Peter Moore reported for the commission. He summarized the chronological information and the work of the commission with the congregation. Motion was sustained to refer the letter from the Session of Woodward Avenue\Covenant (indicating their action to sell the church property to their pastor) to the Committee on Church Strategy, the Committee on Ministry, and the Presbytery Council through the Property and Investments Committee.

  Motion was sustained to receive the chronology as the report of the commission (Appendix D), and to dissolve the commission with much appeciation and gratitude to those who served. The three remaining members of the commission have indicated their availability for consultation with the above named committees.

# IV. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres commended and thanked the commission members for four years of service on the Woodward Avenue\Covenant Administrative Commission and asked that the presbyters personally express their appreciation to the commission members.

Mr. Gehres reported on the activities of the "Shape and Form" task group. It is necessary to reduce the budget from \$52 million to \$45 million dollars. The task of the "Shape and Form" group is to restructure the church so that it may conform to the budget. Mr. Gehres reported that the Rev. James Brown, Director, General Assembly Council, has requested that beginning March 21, 1993 the entire church be in prayer for the GAC.

Executive Presbyter Gehres is asking for the Presbytery to begin praying now and to continue through the GAC meeting. He also asked for prayer for the elected commissioners to the 205th General Assembly (1993).

Mr. Gehres reported that a search is under way for an Associate Executive Presbyter. The hope is to bring a recommendation for election at the June Presbytery meeting. The contracts of Interim Associates the Revs. John Sefcik and Donald Poisson will expire March 31. They will not be replaced. Mr. Gehres said that new procedures have been instituted to facilitate the work of the presbytery.

Mr. Gehres reported that the COCU report is being presented to the 205th General Assembly (1993) for adoption. Three actions are recommended:

- 1) To approve the text ("Churches in Covenant Communion: The Church of Christ Uniting") as the definitive agreement for joining with other participating churches;
- 2) To declare the willingness of the PC(USA) to enter into a relationship of covenant communion agreement with other member churches; and
- 3) To begin to identify steps to prepare for the reconciliation of ordained ministries among member churches. He stated that the Committee on Theology and Worship is hosting a pre-presbytery event on this issue. He urged presbyters to secure a copy of the document, read it, and attend the various events being planned for their edification.
- V. SHARING OUR LIFE: EXPERIENCES, JOYS, CONCERNS Experiences, joys, and concerns of members of the presbytery were lifted up and shared.

# VI. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY A. PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN ANNUAL REPORT

Ruth Mckinnon, Moderator, Presbyterian Women in the Presbytery of Detroit, gave an overview of the year's programs. The PW purpose, the Horizons Bible Study, the Enabler leader position, and the Red Thread Projects were briefly described.

# B. 'EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

Craig Aue reported for the committee on upcoming workshops. He asked the presbyters to pick-up and read the February issue of the Evangelist.

Ken Kaibel described an evangelistic program titled, "The Phone's For You!" that was successfully used at the Redford Presbyterian Church, Detroit.

Craig Aue presented a certificate to a representative from Troy, First for adopting the Commitment to Evangelism.

# C. OUTDOOR MINISTRIES

Pam Aue reported for the committee that the Summer Camp flyers and promotional materials are ready. She asked the presbyters to promote the Summer Camp program in their congregations.

# D. MISSION INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP

Tom Fearnside reported for the committee. 49 churches have not, as yet, submitted their General Mission Pledge for 1993. He said that a Year-Round Experience in Stewardship (YES) training session has been planned. There is still opportunity for other churches to become involved in the program this year. Mr. Fearnside reported on upcoming workshop opportunities and Wills Emphasis Sunday.

# VII. ISSUE OF CONCERN "CHURCHES IN COVENANT COMMUNION" (COCU)

Peter Bower, from the Theology and Worship Committee, presented an historical overview of the attempts of protestant denominations to reach consensus on unity. He explained that if the nine denominations that are studying the document "Churches in Covenant Communion: The Church of Christ Uniting" approve and adopt it, we will covenant to come together in union in ministry and mission. There will be shared mission and some reduction in duplication. Mr. Bower invited the presbyters to come and bring a friend to the pre-presbytery study of the document in April.

#### VIII. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Presbytery, the meeting was adjourned by Vice-Moderator Smith at 8:37p.m. with prayer for the work, joys and concerns expressed during the meeting of the Presbytery.

The next stated meeting of Presbytery will convene Tuesday, April 26, 1993 at the Westminster Presbyterian Church, Detroit, at 5:30 pm.

The Court orders that the motion for immediate consideration is GRANTED.

The Court orders, pursuant to MCR 7.205(D)(2), that the January 14, 1993 injunctive order entered by the Wayne County Circuit Court in this cause is VACATED, and the cause is REMANDED to the Wayne County Circuit Court for further proceedings consistent with this order.

Granting arguendo that defendant or its member churches may provide places of public accommodation for Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act Purposes may have discriminated in the lease or sale of property on racial grounds, and may likewise have discriminated in the assignment of clergy to affiliated and non-affiliated churches, the First Amendment bars resolution of the dispute in a judicial forum. 40th Street and Fairmount Avenue Church of God v Stover, 316 F Supp 375 (ED Pa, 1970); Presbyterian Church in the United States v Mary Elizabeth Blue Hull Memorial Presbyterian Church, 393 US 440; 89 S Ct 601; 21 L Ed 2d 658 (1969); First Presbyterian Church of Schenectady v United Presbyterian Church in the United States, 430 F Supp 450 (ND NY, 1977); Minker v Baltimore Annual Conference of United Methodist Church, 282 US App DC 314, 894 F2d 1354 (1990). When exercising its First Amendment rights, defendant is by definition "abiding by the laws of the United States and the State of Michigan," and so is not violating its bylaws so as to create a secular dispute resolvable by the judiciary. U.S. Const, Art VI.

This Court retains no further jurisdiction.

- 2. <u>Communicate</u> to the College Advisory Committee of the Regional Ministries Unit of the Synod of the Covenant that:

  a. we understand the right and need of Alma College to solicit
  - a. we understand the right and need of Alma College to solicit capital funds contributions from the 20 largest Presbyterian churches in Michigan to meet the requirements of the Kresge Foundation for a grant to construct a performing arts center to be called "Presbyterian Hall;"
  - b. while we have no major objections to such solicitation, we are concerned that the consultation with Presbyteries was carried out on such a short timeline, and we are further concerned about the possible effect this solicitation will have on General Mission giving and the support of other projects also soliciting funds at this time; and
  - c. we therefore respectfully request that representatives of Alma College involved in making these solicitations clearly indicate to those churches being approached that contributions to this project, whether from individuals or from congregations, are intended to be over and above General Mission support to the denomination, and are not eligible for inclusion under the Bicentennial Fund prospectus.

#### E. PROPERTY AND INVESTMENTS

Ron Wallis reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that council:

- 1. Grant permission to the First Presbyterian Church, Warren, MI to lease with an option to buy the manse property described as "Lot 14, except the North 5 feet thereof and the North 5 feet front, 0.0 feet rear of Lot 15, of Parkside Manor Subdivision, of part of the Northeast 1/4 of Section 18, Town 1 North, Range 12 East, City of Warren, Macomb County, Michigan," (28824 Warner, Warren MI) to the Rev. A. William Hockey and his wife Cathy for the amount of \$85,360, with interest at 8%, downpayment to be covered by the rental payments made during the first 18 month option period, and the balance on a land contract over 30 years with the following provisions:
  - a. Purchaser will be responsible for all repairs (major and minor) during the option period with two exceptions. The seller will respect and enforce previous agreements acted upon by the Session to repair existing water leaks in the manse basement, and to provide an inspection for insects.

- b. There will be no penalties incurred if the option is not exercised; however, the church will retain all monies paid during the option period. There will also be no credit made to the proposed purchaser for any home improvements made during that time.
- c. The option does not provide for a deposit or down payment other than rental payments.
- d. Following presbytery approval through the council, the option will commence upon signing by the purchasers.
- e. The seller (Church) will not make the repairs deemed needed in the home inspection report, excepting those indicated in item a.
- f. First right of refusal clause will be included in the option and the land contract.
- g. Proceeds of the sale of the manse will be set aside to meet future housing needs as directed by policy approved by Presbytery under 1.A.1.
- Presbytery under 1.A.1.

  2. Confirm the action taken by telephone poll on February 4, 1993, increasing the loan guaranty amount for the Northville, First Presbyterian Church mortgage with Comerica Bank to \$1,042,600 and adopting the corporate resolution Authorizing Another's Borrowing. (Appendix A).

If after receipt of any payment of all or any part of the Indebtedness, the Bank is for any reason compelled to surrender such payment to any person or entity, because such payment is determined to be void or voidable as a preference, impermissible setoff, diversion of trust funds or for any other reason, then to the extent of that payment, the Indebtedness shall be revived and the obligations under this Guaranty shall be continued in effect without reduction or discharge for that payment, and this Guaranty shall continue in full force notwithstanding any contrary action which may have been taken by the Bank in reliance upon such payment, and any such contrary action so taken shall be without prejudice to Bank's rights under this Guaranty and shall be deemed to have been conditioned upon such payment having become final and irrevocable.

Bank agrees to either: (a) give Guarantor thirty (30) days notice before it accelerates the Loan solely because Customer has failed to make required payments on the Loan (a "Payment Acceleration") and permit Guarantor to make the delinquent payments within thirty (30) days from receipt of the notice, or (b) if Bank has not given Guarantor a notice pursuant to phrase (a) above and a Payment Acceleration has occurred, Bank shall permit Guarantor to pay to Bank within thirty (30) days after Guarantor becomes aware of the Payment Acceleration, all delinquent payments, late charges, and any out-of-pocket costs, related to the Payment Acceleration and due under the Loan (excluding any payments due solely as a result of the Payment Acceleration). In the event Guarantor pays the amounts due within thirty (30) days after said Guarantor becomes aware of the Payment Acceleration, Bank agrees (to the extent permitted by applicable law) to then reverse the acceleration and reinstate the Loan and the payment schedule as it existed prior to the Payment Acceleration.

The total obligation under this Guaranty shall be UNLIMITED unless otherwise indicated, and such obligation shall include in addition to the Indebtedness any and all interest thereon, and all costs and expenses, including but not limited to, reasonable attorney fees incurred in enforcing any of the duties and obligations of the undersigned under this Guaranty. Any reference in this Guaranty to attorney fees shall be deemed a reference to fees, charges, costs, and expenses of both in-house and outside counsel, whether or not suit is instituted, and whether incurred at the trial court level, on appeal, in a bankruptcy proceeding or otherwise.

This Guaranty constitutes the entire agreement of the undersigned and the Bank with respect to the subject matter hereof. No waiver, consent, modification or change of the terms of this Guaranty shall bind any of the undersigned or the Bank unless in writing and signed by the waiving party or an authorized officer of the waiving party, and then such waiver, consent, modification or change shall be effective only in the specific instance and for the specific purpose given. This Guaranty shall be binding on the undersigned and the undersigned's heirs, legal representatives, successors and assigns including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, any debtor in possession or trustee in bankruptcy for any of the undersigned. The undersigned has entered into this Guaranty in good faith for the purpose of inducing the Bank to extend credit or make other financial accommodations to the Customer, and the undersigned acknowledge(s) that the terms hereof are reasonable. If any provision of this Guaranty is unenforceable in whole or in part for any reason, the remaining provisions shall continue to be effective. THIS GUARANTY SHALL BE GOVERNED BY AND CONSTRUED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN.

THE UNDERSIGNED WAIVE(S) ANY AND ALL RIGHTS TO TRIAL BY JURY IN ANY ACTION, SUIT OR CLAIM ARISING OUT OF THIS GUARANTY.

# Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant A Chronology

June, 1981 Moodward Avenue Presbyterian merges with Church of the Covenant.

November, 1981 Presbytery votes to accept purchase price of the Covenant Church property originally estimated at \$150,000, for \$115,000 To Trinity Deliverance Church; \$10,000 down payment and monthly land contract payments of at least \$1,000 over 10 years with a balloon payment at end. Woodward Avenue Church of the Covenant to receive \$12,000 (\$1,000/month) from Land Contract payments.

December, 1981 Church of the Covenant oves \$30,000 to Synod and Program Agency and \$16,000 to Presbytery for costs absorbed in getting Covenant Church ready for sale and other unpaid bills - total over \$45,000.

January, 1982 Session of Moodward Avenue Church of the Covenant votes to turn over title of the Covenant Church to the Division of Business Affairs and assigns the income from the Covenant sale to the Presbytery of Detroit until all obligations and liens against it are satisfied.

Pebruary, 1982 Presbytery disburses \$20,000 to help pay unpaid bills.

1983 General Assembly redevelopment grant of \$28,000.

Sept., 1984 Session votes to discontinue redevelopment grant because it cannot fulfill terms of grant.

March, 1985 Presbytery \$5,000 loan for unpaid gas bill.
Sept., 1985 Local Church Development (LCD) grants \$1,000 for energy audit.

June, 1986 Presbytery loans \$2,500 for unpaid gas bill.

November, 1986 Business Affairs assumes responsibility for over \$26,000 for General Assembly loan from capital fund; also agrees to accept payments of three previous loans from land contract payments from Church of the Covenant. These include loan 3-85 of \$5,000, 9-86 loan of \$2,471, the \$913 for 1986 per capita, and \$1,625 for 1986 per capita.

boiler repair and energy conservation neasures. Payments of \$500/nonth for first year, \$1,500/nonth for next four years.

April, 1988 Presbytery loan of \$5,000 to Rev. Douglas.

Consittee on Ministry (COM) requests meeting with Session in response to communication from Rev.

Douglas regarding potential tensions in the church.

COM meets with Session. Complaints that LCD

controlled boiler negotiations, treated Session like children.

Session says running deficit because of previous building problems and requests Presbytery to pay off previous debts. Session requests training on session and pastoral responsibilities and on stewardship.

January, 1989 Rev. Teri Taylor communication to Rev. Douglas regarding delinquency of per capita:

Hay, 1989 Commission neets with Session. Pastor's salary behind, pension behind; negative opinions about Presbytery after nerger; Commission requests full financial disclosure.

June, 1989 Guardian Alarm, Kasler Electric request payment of overdue bills.

Rev. Gehres request Business Affairs to pay insurance through 1989.

Presbytery pays Kasler Electric \$1,592.68.

\$12,690.99 to be added to loans paid back by land contract. Includes \$8,203 for back salary of Rev. Douglas.

It is impossible to reconstruct monthly expenses from bills paid, because rarely pay more than minimums.

July, 1989 Session requests more loans to pay off unpaid bills.

February, 1990 Communication from Rev. Taylor indicates insurance will be cancelled if further payment is not made.

Requests payment of half-balance of \$8,326.

Narch, 1990 Rev. Morse resigns from Commission.
Sept., 1990 Matika Electric requests payment of \$2,663.12 for unpaid balance for work completed.

March, 1991
Rev. Douglas suffers heart attack.
Commission neets. Questions as to how health considerations will affect ministry.
Commission neets with Rev. Douglas. Rev. Douglas reports that heart operating at 1/3 capacity. Not

reports that heart operating at 1/3 capacity. Not being paid on time. Expresses concern about hospital bills because pension payments behind. Commission neets and agrees:

July, 1991 Commission neets and agrees:
1. If Rev. Douglas goes on medical disability,
Presbytery will make pension payments.

If needs to go part-time, terms of call will be renegotiated through congregational meeting.

3. Outside audit of finances ordered.

 Reminds session no further funding for pastor's salary until stewardship increases in quality and quantity.

August, 1991 Letter from Rev. Gehres to session informing that Council has approved payment of pension dues, but that funds not available for pastor's salary.

Sept., 1991 Commission requests all financial data for full audit. C&O Services, independent auditors, hired.

October, 1991 Session reports in arrears on various bills of \$23,615. Connission requests \$20,830 to be taken from land contract payments.

January, 1992 Commission neets with Session. Rev. Douglas reports remarkable improvement in health. Session reaffirms its viability.

Connission discovers session operating van without insurance and that there is no insurance on building. Pastor's salary behind \$3,500.

February, 1992 Financial audit results: "The business will not recover from the deficit it faces.... The financial viability of the church clearly reveals severe financial trouble or even failure within a relatively short time....There is not sufficient likelihood that church will be able to continue as a going concern for . the next year without an alternative cash flow.... Commission neets with Session. Receives more unpaid February, 1992 bills. Does priority assessment. Commission notifies Session insurance reinstated, but April, 1992 van not included. Rev. Gehres conversation with Rev. Douglas, who Sept., 1992 reports that gas company demanding minimum payment of \$13,000 on \$16,000 unpaid bill. Session behind \$5,800 on Rev. Douglas' salary. Session has laid off custodian and van driver and decreased secretary to 15 hrs/wk. This has not cut deficit due to decrease in income. No fund-raisers being planned. Rev Douglas' heart back to 30% capacity. City of Detroit files long list of building violations, including roof, electrical, plumbing and structural problems. Rev. Douglas sends letter to session: "The Presbytery has not made any attempt to help, and our session has not moved the congregation to do anything ....It is clear that the end is near.... Cooperation has been very poor to none, even among the officers of the church. There seems to be no interest in the service of the Lord among many people here.... Elder Frances Pitts resigns from Commission. October, 1992 Hovenber, 1992 Letter (dated 10-22) from Session to Rev. Gehres requests back salary for pastor. Refers to Commission's "silence" on this subject, which they claim is "negligent." Letter claims "years" behind in salary totaling \$23,696.33. Commission and representatives from Church Strategy Jan. 6, 1993 and Connittee on Ministry meet with Rev. Douglas concerning current conditions at Moodward Avenue Church of the Covenant. Connission and representatives from Church Strategy Jan. 19, 1993 and Committee on Ministry neet with session to discuss options. Session presents unsigned, undated letter asking Presbytery (1) to sell church building to Rev. Douglas; and (2) to advise them on options for nembership in other Presbyterian Churches.

Allow additional monies for payment of recording fees, tax

b. pro-rations and other normal closing costs as cited in the

closing statement to be provided prior to closing.

Approve the payment of \$15,000 to Wayne R. Fretters as his commission for services rendered as our Broker.

Authorize any of the corporate officers to sign the closing documents for the Presbytery of Detroit on the Hartland d. property.

Dissolve the Hartland Property Administrative Commission.

# FOUR-PARTY PROPOSAL INVOLVING THE REVEREND GARY DOUGLAS, WOODWARD AVENUE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF THE COVENANT, WOODWARD AVENUE PROTESTANT CHURCH OF CHRIST, AND THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

The Presbytery of Detroit proposes that it will seek approval from its membership to grant permission to Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant, a Michigan ecclesiastical corporation, to deed its church property at 8501 Woodward Avenue, Detroit, Michigan, will all of its fixtures attached to the said church building and the contents described in the attached list, to Woodward Avenue Protestant Church of Christ, a michigan ecclesiastical corporation, contingent upon the accomplishment of the conditions set forth hereunder:

- 1. The Presbytery of Detroit will convene a special meeting of Presbytery on April 13, 1993 to seek preliminary approval in principle of this Agreement, and additionally shall schedule on the docket for April 27, 1993 of Presbytery a petition to authorize Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant to execute a deed to Woodward Avenue Protestant Church of Christ, a Michigan ecclesiastical corporation, in consideration of mutual releases and hold harmless agreements.
- 2. Woodward Avenue Protestant Church of Christ, a Michigan ecclesiastical corporation, shall accept the church property at 8501 Woodward Avenue, Detroit, Michigan in its "as is" condition. The known violations issued by the City of Detroit are attached to this Agreement.
- 3. Reverend Douglas and Woodward Avenue Protestant Church of Christ shall execute a written hold harmless agreement holding the Presbytery of Detroit and Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant harmless from any deficiencies in the building; any actual attorney fees and costs for litigation incurred as a result of the transfer of title, or resulting from physical complaints about the building, or from complaints by the City of Detroit for violations of the Building Code.
- 4. The deed to be given by Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant will be a quit claim deed and not a warranty deed because of outstanding issues of reverter which could come into play on the transfer of title.
- 5. Reverend Douglas and the Woodward Avenue Protestant Church of Christ shall assume full responsibility for all outstanding debts, individual and corporate, of Woodeard Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant. Reverend Douglas and Woodward Avenue Protestant Church of Christ shall execute a written hold harmless agreement holding the Presbytery of Detroit and Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant harmless from any liability concerning said debts including any actual attorney fees and costs that may result from litigation over said debts.
- 6. All of the parties herin, to wit: Reverend Douglas, Woodward Avenue Protest Church of Christ, Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant, and the Presbytery of Detroit, shall execute a mutual relase in favor of all of the other parties covering all claims any releasor shall have against any other released party named herein, whether known or unknown at the time of the execution of the written release, covering all claims herein described.

- 7. Presbytery shall forthwith pay all back pension dues owed to the pension fund for and on behalf of services rendered by the Reverend Gary Douglas while serving as pastor of Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant.
- 8. Presbytery shall release and discharge Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant of any liability concerning the loan outstanding and/or unpaid in favor of the Presbytery of Detroit for the Reverend Gary Douglas.
- 9. Woodward Avenue Protestant Church of Christ, Reverend Gary Douglas, and the Presbytery of Detroit each agree through their separate appropriate officers to execute a separate written agreement in favor of the opposite parties, in which the parties separately agree to pay a penalty sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) if at any time within five (5) years after the execution of the mutual release any opposite party shall engage in any negative publicity whatsoever against any opposite party.
- 10. Reverend Gary Douglas shall submit an application to Presbytery requesting to be released from the exercise of the ordained ministry in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). No judgment of failure on the part of the minister shall be implied by this action.
- 11. Reverend Gary Douglas shall extend an invitation to the person designated by the Committee on Ministry of the Presbytery of Detroit invited to moderate the congregational meeting of Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant at which meeting representatives of Presbytery will explain to the membership of Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant alternatives for their future existence as a group.
- 12. Each corporation, Woodward Avenue Protestant Church of Christ, Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant, and the Presbytery of Detroit, shall present to the other parties copies of the minutes of the appropriate board authorizing the execution of the proposed mutual release described in the premises, and the penalty clause described in paragraph 9 above.

A motion to refer the position description back to Staff Services was defeated.

An amendment to attach the 16 specific items in the Staff Study Report (pages 175-176, 1992 Presbytery Minutes) to the position descriptions was sustained.

The position description for the Executive Presbyter was approved. Motion was made and seconded that presbytery adopt the position description for the Associate Executive Presbyter.

Motions to amend the position description to make it specific as to the areas and committees the AEP will work with were defeated. Moderator Van Til ruled that the previous motion to attach the 16 items from the Staff Study report to the position descriptions was out of order and the 16 items are not a part of the position description being debated.

Motion to approve the Associate Executive Presbyter position description was defeated.

Motion to approve the Associate Executive Presbyter position description with the addition of the 16 items from the Staff Study report was sustained.

#### FOR INFORMATION

Following conversation with the support staff, Friday mornings have been designated as "Please do not disturb the Staff" time. A group of volunteers will be trained for answering the phones, allowing the staff to do filing and other paper work which accumulates through the week.

Moderator Van Til recognized and welcomed the confirmation class from Troy, First.

Grant the status of Honorably Retired to the Rev. Carl Geider, effective July 31, 1993, pending the approval of the congregation

of First Church, Ann Arbor.

- 3. Dissolve the pastoral relationship between the Rev. Charles R. MacDonald and Kirk in the Hills Church, Bloomfield Hills, effective September 30, 1993, and grant the status of Honorably Retired to Mr. MacDonald, pending action of the congregation.
- 4. Appoint the Rev. Larry Austin Moderator of the Session of Heritage Church, St. Clair Shores.
- 5. Approve the request of the Session of Greenfield Church, Berkley, that the Rev. Roland Keebler become a Parish Associate, without remuneration, except for automobile expenses.
- 6. Enroll the Rev. Rosalie Glover as a member of Presbytery upon receipt of her credentials from the Presbytery of Cincinnati and at that time appoint her Moderator of First Church, Pontiac.
- Approve the following honorarium for Supply Preaching: \$75 for a single service; \$100 for two services; plus \$.28 per mile for travel.
- 8. The committee presented a draft of the Presbytery of Detroit Sexual Misconduct Policy for first reading.
- 9. Approve the following Commission to ordain Lynne Kogel, Clergy:

Howard Radcliff, a regional minister in the Ohio Region of the Christian Church of the Disciples of Christ.
- 11. Approve the dissolution of the Associate Pastor relationship of the Rev. Gary Coppedge and the Orchard Lake Community Church effective April 18, 1993, with the following terms:

salary, housing, and pension continue through July 31,1993, a \$875 payment and renegotion of housing loan

and name him a member at-large.

12. Grant permission for the Rev. Sherwood W. Anderson, amember of the Cincinnati Presbytery, to labor in the bounds of the Presbytery of Detroit.

The committee reported the following actions taken under the authority granted to them:

- 1. Approved the contract between First Church, Pontiac, and the Rev. Rosalie Glover for six months, effective March 29, 1993, with the following annual terms: Salary \$28,800; Value of Manse \$9,000; Utilities \$2,100; Social Security \$3,101; Travel/Business Expense \$2,400; Study allowance \$500; Furnishings \$640; Full pension and Medical deductible as specified by Board of Pensions; One month vacation and 2 weeks study leave. Contract may be terminated by the session or the presbytery on one month's notice; Rev. Glover may terminate the agreement with one month's notice and forfeiture of any payment beyond that period.
- 2. Approved part-time Student Supply (to become Stated Supply upon ordination) Associate contract between Rosedale Gardens Church, Livonia, and Ruth Billington for 12 months, effective April 1, 1993. This is a one-quarter time position. Annual terms are: Salary and housing \$5,842; Social Security \$447; Travel \$.24/mile; Study allowance \$100; Full pension and medical deductible as specified by Board of Pensions; One month vacation and 2 weeks study leave, pro-rated to the part-time position. Contract may be terminated by the session or presbytery on one month's notice. Mrs. Billington may terminate the agreement with one month's notice and forfeiture of any payment beyond that period.
- 3. Extended the Interim Pastor contract between First Church, Mt. Clemens, and the Rev. Paul Yutzy for six months, effective

March 24, 1993, with the following terms: Salary \$28,500; Housing allowance \$11,700; Rent/utilities \$7,000; Social Security \$3,075; Professional reimbursement \$4,800; Study leave reimbursement \$840; Full major medical, pension, disability; Medical Deductible \$2,011; one month vacation, including 4 Sundays; 2 weeks study leave per year, both pro-rated over the life of the contract.

4. Approved the Interim Pastor contract between Northbrook Church, Birmingham, and the Rev. Sherwood W. Anderson for 12 months effective March 29, 1993, with the following terms: Salary \$29,000; Housing \$14,500; Social Security \$3,328; Travel \$2,000; Study allowance \$1,500; Full pension; One month vacation, including 4 Sundays, 2 weeks study leave per year, both pro-rated over the life of the contract.

New members were welcomed to the presbytery and presbytery buddies were assigned to each new pastor.

Vice-Moderator Peter Smith assumed the moderating of the meeting.

#### F. TRUMBULL AVENUE COMMISSION

John Sefcik reported for the Commission. A motion was sustained to dissolve the Trumbull Avenue Presbyterian Church Administrative Commission upon formation of a session, and to permit the congregation to proceed with the election, training and installation of elders and deacons.

#### IV. ORDER OF THE DAY-ALMA COLLEGE

Jan Holmes introduced Dr. Alan Stone, president Alma College who gave a report of the activities and state of Alma College. He reported that the new performing arts center will open in the fall of 1993. Dr. Stone reported that Alma has strengthened its relations with the Presbyterian Church.

#### V. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported that there is a new software package (EASE) available through the presbytery office for congregations to borrow and try out. It has been developed to enable easier maintaining of church records.

Mr. Gehres reported on the transitions faced at all levels in the church: The presbytery is undergoing a transition with the adoption of a new staffing design and position descriptions which go with that design. The Synod of the Covenant is experiencing transition with new by-laws, a new structure, a new staff design and a new design for mission. The General Assembly faces transition with a restructuring of the national level. The General Assembly Council has adopted, and sent on to the Assembly meeting in Orlando, the recommendations of the Shape and Form Task Forced: That there be three primary units of the GA: 1) Congregational Development; 2) National Ministries; and 3) Global Ministries. Staff will be reduced by between 125 and 175 positions. Budget limits are set for 1994; the budget must be reduced by seven and a half million dollars.

These are trying times of transition for all governing bodies. Presbyters were encouraged to support with prayer those who serve in governing body positions.

Mr. Gehres reported two success stories. The Theology and Worship Committee sponsored Symposium on Assisted Suicide had more than 100 persons in attendance. The Grandale Presbyterian Church of the Master celebrates the rebuilding of their facility after a fire a year ago. In particular, the gym will allow the congregation to continue a basketball outreach program in the community.

# VI. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY A. EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

Richard Danielak reported for the committee. Details were shared for programs and workshops that the committee is sponsoring. Mr. Danielak presented certificates to representatives from churches who have adopted the Commitment to Evangelism: Crossroads, Walled Lake; Howell, First; Milan, Peoples.

Ken Kaibel introduced Tom Kurtz, from Howell, First to report on a very successful advertising project during Advent in 1992. The campaign was partially funded by a \$600 grant from the Evangelism Committee of the presbytery.

B. MISSION INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

Francile Anderson reported on mission opportunities. It is time to sign up for the 1994 Mission Yearbook for Prayer and Study and also for Month-of-Mission (October) speakers. Mrs. Anderson introduced Dr. Stan and Mary Hoffman who reported on the 1% Theological Education Fund; 2000 of 11,500 congregations in the PC(USA) have contributed to the Fund.

Tom Fearnside requested that the Presbyters read and study the Presbytery of Detroit 1992 Mission Giving and Per Capita Report

Charles McCloskey spoke on the need to encourage members of congregations to make wills. He recommended two booklets (<u>How to Make Your Will</u> and <u>Making a Personal Record</u>) for distribution on Wills Emphasis Sunday.

C. ECUMENICAL DECADE CHURCHES IN SOLIDARITY WITH WOMEN 1988-1998
Barbara Gepford recommended the document from the "Women's Human
Rights Convention" which was distributed. Churches have been
challenged to share in women's struggles and to create a healing,
reconciling and empowering ministry as women's agendas become the
churches' agendas during the Ecumenical Decade. Ken Smith explained
how the paper, "The Convention on The Elimination of All Forms of
Discrimination Against Women," has and has not been owned and
implemented by the nations of the world.

D. COMMITTEE ON RACIAL ETHNIC CONCERNS

Sammie Solomon introduced Tony Patrick who spoke on The Endangered Black Male. The Synod of the Covenant has scheduled three hearings on the issue. One hearing will be held in Detroit on September 10-11, 1993, at Trinity Community Presbyterian Church. The four areas that will be covered are: health, education and culture, economics and the justice system.

VII. SHARING OUR LIFE: EXPERIENCES, JOYS, CONCERNS
The joys and concerns of the members and churches of presbytery were
lifted up and shared.

VIII. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Presbytery, the meeting was adjourned by vice-moderator Smith at 9:00 p.m. with prayer that included joys, concerns and work of the presbytery.

The next stated meeting of the presbytery will convene Tuesday, May 25, 1993, at the Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian Church, Detroit, at 5:30 pm.

pre-presbytery event from May 93 to October 93.

Ms. Draves reported on upcoming workshops and experiences for ministers and church members in the presbytery.

#### D. STAFF SERVICES

Sally Rankin reported for the committee on the status of the search for an Associate Executive Presbyter.

The committee distributed the Manual for Executive Staff which

will be acted upon at the April meeting of council.

It was announced that following conversation with the support staff, Friday mornings have been designated as "Please do not disturb the Staff" time. A group of volunteers will be trained for ansering the phones, allowing the staff to do filing and other paper work which accumulates through the week.

#### E. BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Jerry Seaton reported for the committee. He shared his pleasure with the work of the Committee on Mission Interpretation & Stewardship and announced that 1993 General Mission funds are coming in at a good rate. He urged all committees to work on their requests for the 1994 budget. Late requests will not be considered.

#### F. PROPERTY AND INVESTMENTS

Ron Wallis reported for the committee. Omnibus motion was sustained that council:

- 1. Approve amending the dollar amount from \$1,042,600 to \$1,047,000 in the loan guaranty and corporate resolution for the Comerica Bank loan to the First Presbyterian Church of Northville.
- 2. Approve a loan from the Presbytery to the Community Presbyterian Church, Drayton Plains, in the amount of \$50,000 for facility improvements, said loan to be at 5 1/2% interest for 10 years with payments of \$542.63 per month.
- 3. Recommend presbytery grant permission to the First Presbyterian of Ann Arbor to lease the Lemon Chapel to the Taiwanese Christian Fellowship on Sunday afternoons weekly between the hours of 1:00 to 3:30 P.M. during the period between February 7, 1993, and June 6, 1993, at a usage fee of \$25 weekly with payment three months in advance; and recommend that the church and its tenant check with their insurance carriers to be sure the insurance will cover this increased use of the building, and if there is additional cost, it will be passed on to the tenant.
- 4. Grant permission to the First Presbyterian Church, Farmington, to grant right of way to the City of Farmington Hills in return for certain concessions which will be advantageous to the church.

Following discussion motions were sustained that council:

- 5. Recommend presbytery grant permission to the Drayton Avenue Presbyterian Church, Ferndale, Michigan to lease a portion of its real property for the purposes of worship to the Divine Peace Metropolitan Community Church for one year (maximum 3 years) at \$80-\$90 per week; and recommend that the church and its tenant check with their insurance carriers to be sure that their insurance will cover this increased use of the building, and if there is additional cost that it be passed on to the tenant.
- 6. Concur with the recommendation of the joint committee to deal with the request of Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant referred to this committee, Committee on Ministry and Committee on Church Strategy:

That the Presbytery transfer the Woodward Avenue Church of the Covenant property to the Rev. Gary Douglas and the Woodward Avenue Protestant Church of Christ in exchange for the following:

- That Mr. Douglas and the Woodward Avenue Protestant Church of Christ hold the Presbytery blameless for any deficiencies in the building.
- That Mr. Douglas and the Woodward Avenue Protestant Church of Christ assume all outstanding debts, individual and corporate with the building.
- That Mr. Douglas and the Woodward Avenue Protestant Church of Christ release the Presbytery from all claims of back wages, and all other claims against the Presbytery.
- That Presbytery will pay back Pension Dues and absolve Mr. Douglas of any responsibility for his loan from the Presbytery.
- 5. All of this conditional upon Mr. Douglas renouncing the Jurisdiction of the Presbytery of Detroit, inasmuch as it would be conflict of interest to sell a building held in trust for the Presbytery to a member of the Presbytery who is establishing a congregation within another denomination.

Committee on Ministry.

Thomas Smith, Staff Services Committee of Council, reported that 8. the search for an Associate Executive Presbyter is ongoing; 24 dossiers have been received; supplemental questions have been sent to 14 people; AAEEO has been adhered to; and the committee will meet in June to review answers to the supplemental questions and schedule interviews. He reported that because of the search for the Associate Executive Presbyter, Staff Services has not begun investing changing the office of Stated Clerk to a full time position as recommended in the Special Committee to Study Staffing Report.

founded in Detroit by John Monteith who was brought from Princeton by
Governor Cass and others in the early days of the history of Detroit.

Grandale Church of the Master, Detroit, celebrated a rededication of their ministry in the city with the official opening of the reconstructed part of their building one year after the fire.

#### SEXUAL MISCONDUCT POLICY

Adopted May 25, 1993

#### PREFACE

The Presbytery of Detroit affirms the policy of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) that all ministers, church members, employees, volunteers and officers of governing bodies and entities of the Church are to maintain the integrity of ministerial employment and professional relationship at all times. Ethical conduct of all who serve in the name of Jesus Christ is of vital importance to the Church for through these representatives is conveyed an understanding of God and the good news of the Gospel. Whoever serves the Church is in a position of great trust and responsibility and carries authority and power over persons affected by the Church's ministry and mission.

#### PURPOSES

The Presbytery of Detroit adopts this policy on sexual misconduct to govern the behavior of all ministers, employees, volunteers and officers who serve the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) within the bounds of the Presbytery. Its purpose is:

- To set and enforce standards of ethical behavior consistent with Scripture and secular law.
- To provide procedures for inquiry and effective response to allegations of sexual misconduct.
- To serve as a guide for the application of powers under the Form of Government and the Rules of Discipline. See Book of Order D.1.0100.
- 4. To provide guidelines for the administration of employer/employee relationships with the Church, its governing bodies and entities.
- To serve as a guide for the prevention of sexual misconduct.
- To demonstrate pastoral concern for all who are affected by allegations of, and proven, sexual misconduct.
- To promote the peace, purity, health and unity of the Church.

### SEXUAL MISCONDUCT POLICY PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

The Presbytery of Detroit has adopted as its Standard of Conduct that it is unethical and unacceptable for ministers, employees, volunteers, or officers of the Church to have sexual relations with anyone served or employed by the Church other than a spouse, or to engage in sexually harassing activities. The application of this Standard is not meant to cover relationships between spouses nor is it meant to restrict church professionals from having normal, mutual, social, intimate or marital relationships.

#### I. PROCEDURAL OVERVIEW

Toward the end of maintaining the peace and health of its particular churches or agencies, and exercising its responsibility for them and for the ministers under its care, upon receipt of information of alleged offense involving sexual misconduct, properly filed, the Presbytery of Detroit shall move promptly to undertake investigation of the allegations [Book of Order G-10.0201, G-11.0502i; D-7.0800; D-7.0500] and shall:

- A. direct the Stated Clerk to request the moderator to appoint a Special Disciplinary Committee (SDC) in consultation with the Stated Clerk and the Nominating Committee: (see Appendix A)
- B. direct the Stated Clerk to notify the Committee on Ministry (COM) to appoint a Pastoral Response Team; (see Appendix B)
- C. expect that those appointed shall do all in their power to maintain the confidentiality of all names and particular churches involved;
- D. direct the Stated Clerk to notify the minister and the session of the particular church or entity that the accused is to be placed on Administrative Leave without prejudice, from all ministerial rights and responsibilities until the investigation is done and the decision of the SDC is rendered; (see Appendix C)
- E. provide through COM and at expense of the Presbytery as funds are available for the continuity of worship, preaching, administration of the sacraments and pastoral care of the particular church; (see Appendix C)
- F. provide through COM and the Pastoral Response Team resources for the counseling of the accused during the time of administrative leave and for the alleged victims; (see Appendix A)
- G. provide through the SDC advocates for the accused and the alleged victims; (see Appendix A)

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- H. work through the Pastoral Response Team and COM with the particular church's session to keep the particular church appropriately informed; (see Appendix A & B)
- I. when the work of the SDC is finished shall either proceed with whatever disciplinary action is necessary or shall appropriately exonerate the accused;
- J. work through the COM with the particular church to ameliorate, where possible, the pain, hurt and grief they experience; (see Appendix A)
- K. retain and utilize legal counsel if and as needed;
- L. direct the Stated Clerk and/or the COM to counsel those contemplating filing allegations that false allegations are punishable by church law and may be grounds for civil suit;
- M. direct the COM to provide guidelines for the development of a sexual misconduct policy by sessions for use within particular churches; (see Exhibit A)
- N. direct the COM to develop a covenant form relating to ethical guidelines for ministers of the presbytery; (see Exhibit B)
- O. direct the COM to develop employment questionnaires relating to sexual misconduct for its use and use by particular churches; (see Exhibit C)

#### II. THEOLOGICAL AFFIRMATIONS

Who we are and what we do as members of the Presbytery of Detroit is based on our understanding of God and our faith in God. God's expectations for humanity have been made known through Scripture. In the life of the people of Israel, in the voices of the prophets, in the person of Jesus Christ, in the gift of the Holy Spirit, in the words of the Apostles, we have learned what God wants from us as we relate to the gifts of Creation and to each other. God calls us to share the good news of the Gospel with love in our hearts and integrity in our actions.

This policy on sexual misconduct is based on these truths and the following affirmations:

- Human sexuality is a gift from God and, at all times, should be expressed in a manner which affirms the goodness of Creation and enhances the innate self-worth of each of God's children.
- God has forged a covenant with us and calls us to live in a covenant relationship with each other. This covenant is based on God's act of redemption and liberation in Jesus Christ, our willingness to accept this reality and our desire to live in obedience to theological and ethical truths which form the foundation for faithful living in all arenas of human existence, including the expression of our sexuality.
- As we live in a covenant relationship with God and each other we know <u>Shalom</u> which brings health, wholeness, unity and peace.
- When we, or others, break this covenant with God and each other we know sin and experience its consequences which is oppression, injustice, pain and death.
- Each one of us is a sinner, falling short of God's glory and the ethics of God's Kingdom.
- God wants us to confess our sinfulness and acknowledge our need for redemption and forgiveness.
- God offers us salvation for this life and eternity through the death and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth.
- The Church and all who serve it are called to express, in word and action, God's vision for humanity and should stand in judgement against anyone who violates God's will in abusing covenant relationships.
- The Holy Spirit is God's gift to the Church and can enable all of us who serve the Church to be faithful adherents to God's Word as we share our lives and express our sexuality.

#### III. STANDARD OF CONDUCT

As God who called you is holy, be holy yourselves in all your conduct.

Tend the flock of God that is your charge, not under compulsion but willingly, not for sordid gain but eagerly, not lord it over those in your charge but be example to the flock.

You know that we who teach shall be judged with greater strictness.

I Peter 1:15; 5:2; James 3:1. NRSV

- A. The ethical conduct of all who minister in the name of Jesus Christ is of vital importance to the Church because through these representatives is conveyed an understanding of God and the gospel's good news. Their manner of life should be a demonstration of the Christian gospel in the church and the world, G.6.0106.
- B. The basic principles guiding this policy are as follows:
  - Sexual misconduct is a violation of the role of pastors, employees, volunteers, counselors, supervisors, teachers, and advisers of any kind who are called upon to exercise integrity, sensitivity, and caring in a trust relationship. It breaks the covenant to act in the best interests of parishioners, clients, co-workers, and students.
  - 2. Sexual misconduct is a misuse of authority and power which breaches Christian ethical principles by misusing a trust relation to gain advantage over another for self-aggrandizement in an abusive, exploitative, and unjust manner. If the parishioner, student, client, or employee initiates or invites sexual content in the relationship, it is the pastor's, counselor's, officer's, or supervisor's responsibility to maintain the appropriate role and prohibit a sexual relationship.
  - 3. Sexual misconduct takes advantage of the vulnerability of children and persons who are less powerful to act for their own welfare. it is antithetical to the gospel call to work as God's servant in the struggle to bring wholeness to a broken world. It violates the mandate to protect the vulnerable from harm.

While it is unconscionable that anyone would violate these principles for the sake of personal gratification, the Presbytery of Detroit recognizes that it does happen. Sexual misconduct is not only a violation of the principles set forth in Scripture, but also of the ministerial employment and professional relationship and is never permissible.

It is the full intention of the Presbytery of Detroit to protect its members and those served by the Church from acts of sexual misconduct. When a breach of ethics takes place, this transgression will be dealt with expeditiously, with fairness and justice. While the Church is called to offer forgiveness to all persons, it is not called to overlook acts of misconduct by any person. Justice calls for corrective action. Forgiveness for persons who have violated trust should not be quickly or lightly given. The goal should always be to restore fellowship with God and communion with the Church, even when forgiveness and reconciliation cannot be extended to include restoration to a former position or responsibilities. The goal for the victim is healing and full restoration through the compassionate enfolding of the church.

#### IV. DEFINITIONS

<u>Accused</u> is the term used to represent the person against whom a claim is made of sexual misconduct.

Accuser is the term used to represent the person claiming knowledge of sexual misconduct by a person covered by this policy. The accuser may or may not be the victim of alleged sexual misconduct. A person such as a family member, friend or colleague of the victim may be the accuser whose information initiates an inquiry.

<u>Advocate</u> is a trained person who on request stands with the accuser or accused throughout the process of inquiry and adjudication; monitors the process; holds confidences; but is not legal counsel.

<u>Child Sexual Abuse</u> includes, but is not limited to, any contact or interaction between a child and an adult when the child is being used for the sexual stimulation of the adult person or of a third person. The behavior may or may not involve touching. Sexual behavior between a child and an adult is always considered forced whether or not consented to by the child.

<u>church</u> when spelled with the initial capitalized refers to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Church when spelled with the initial in lowercase refers to local churches. The word congregation is used loosely for members and participants.

Employee is the comprehensive term used to cover individuals who are hired or called to work for the Church for salary or wages.

Entity is the term used to refer to any program or office managed by a board, committee, council, or other body whose membership is elected by a governing body. See Manual of the General Assembly, Standing Rule 47.

Governing Body is a representative body composed of elders and ministers of the Word and Sacrament; these are sessions, presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly. A governing body may establish entities such as day care centers, conference centers, camps, or homes for the aged. A governing body may have both church members and non-members as employees.

<u>High Risk Occupation</u> is that which calls for a person to work in close contact with those who are vulnerable and less capable of protecting themselves, with children, elderly persons, those who are wholly or partially incapacitated, or counseling clients having emotional or personal problems.

Inquiry is the term used in the Rules of Discipline to determine whether charges should be filed based upon allegations of an offense received by a governing body. See Book of Order D.7.0200.

Mandated Reporter is described by some states' laws as a person who is required to report any and all suspected incidents of child abuse, including child sexual abuse that come to their attention. State laws vary from defining "all persons having knowledge" as mandated reporters to specifying very limited lists of professions whose members are required to report.

Pastoral Response Team is a body constituted by the Presbytery to facilitate the process of pastorally responding to allegations of sexual misconduct. The structure and function of the response team are detailed in Section IX of this report.

Persons Covered by this policy include church members, church officers, ministers, and non-members who are employees or volunteers under the supervision of governing bodies or entities, including those who are accused of sexual misconduct under circumstances in which (1) access to the victim is related to some form of service to or appointment by governing bodies or entities of the Church, or (2) sexual misconduct in a non-church related setting raises questions of character and effectiveness. For example, this policy covers a non-member adult who sexually abuses a non-member teenager while "helping out" on a church-sponsored camping trip.

Reasonable Suspicion is a subjective criterion that refers to a belief or opinion based on facts or circumstances that are sufficient for a prudent person to want to inquire further, to take protective action, or report to authorities. State child abuse reporting laws may include wording that indicates what degree of suspicion or knowledge gives rise to the duty to report.

Response is the action taken by the governing body or entity when a report of sexual misconduct is received. It may include (1) inquiry into facts and circumstances, (2) possible disciplinary action (administrative or judicial or both), (3) pastoral care for victims and their families and others, and (4) pastoral care and rehabilitation for the perpetrators and care for their families.

Secular Authorities are the governmental bodies, whether city, county, state, or federal, who are given the responsibility to investigate, criminally prosecute, and/or bring civil charges against individuals accused or sexual crimes or offenses against adults and children. The structure and identity of such secular authorities will vary from jurisdiction to jurisdiction but basic responsibilities to detect, deal with, and resolve such crimes and offenses will follow generally recognized patterns.

<u>Secular Law</u> is the body of municipal, state, and federal laws and is often referred to collectively as civil and criminal law. Prohibited behavior addressed by this policy may result in criminal and/or civil charges filed under secular law.

Sexual Harassment as defined for this policy is as follows:

Unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature constitute sexual harassment when:

- a. Submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of an individual's employment, volunteer services, participation in Presbytery activities, pastoral care and counseling.
- Submission to or rejection of such conduct by an individual is used as the basis for employment or assignment decisions affecting such individual, or
- c. Such conduct has the purpose or effect of interfering with an individual's work, volunteer, or participation in activities, or performance creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive working, program, pastoral care, or counseling environment.
- d. Such conduct has the effect of unreasonably interfering with a person's comfort or ability to participate in the functions and activities of a particular church; and if it creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive working environment for church volunteers.

<u>Sexual Misconduct</u> is the comprehensive term used in this policy to include:

- a. Sexual harassment as defined above.
- b. Child sexual abuse as defined above.
- c. Rape or sexual contact by force, threat, or intimidation.
- c. Sexual Malfeasance. Sexual malfeasance as defined for this policy is as follows: the broken trust resulting from genital/sexual contact within a ministerial (e.g. clergy with a member of their congregation) or professional relationship (e.g. counselor with a client, lay employee with a church member, presbytery executive with a committee member, presbytery executive with a lay employee). Adultery and fornication are never appropriate behaviors.

<u>Volunteer</u> is the term used for those who provide services for governing bodies and entities of the Church and receive no benefits or remuneration. Volunteers include persons elected or appointed to serve on boards, committees, and other groups. For purposes of this policy volunteers are treated the same as employees. Liabilities of the governing body or entity are the same for volunteers as for employees.

- V. TREATMENT AND CARE OF THOSE AFFECTED BY CHARGES OF SEXUAL MISCONDUCT
  - A. Victims and Families

The Church shall offer treatment and care to the alleged victims of sexual misconduct and their families. Sometimes the accuser is blamed for causing the behavior or for disrupting the church. Sometimes the victim or family is so angry and alienated from the Church that offers of help have been perceived as insincere or attempts at a cover-up. If the victim or family at first refuses, the Church should continue to offer help. Above all the Church should not act in a self-protective manner by ignoring the victims and their families.

Although the extent of the damage to the victims of sexual misconduct will vary from person to person, being influenced by such factors as the degree or severity of abuse, the age and emotional condition of the victim, personality dynamics, and the importance of the religious faith, the governing body, entity, and response team is to assume in all cases that the victim has been wounded by the experience.

Feelings of guilt, shame, anger, mistrust, lowered self-esteem, unworthiness, and feelings of alienation from God, self, the religious community, and family are frequent injuries suffered by victims. It is important for the response team to be sensitive to the victim's pain and need for healing, and to act by making appropriate pastoral care available.

B. Congregation, Governing Body or Entity

The Church should be aware of the problems a congregation, governing body or entity may experience when allegations are made of sexual misconduct by a minister, employee, volunteer or officer. The allegations may polarize the congregation or organization, damage morale, and create serious internal problems. Efforts shall be taken to recognize and identify the problems and heal the damage done to the congregation, governing body or entity.

#### C. The Accused

The Church shall offer treatment and care for the accused as well as alleged victims and families. Persons accused of rape or other sexual offenses do not inspire sympathy. There is evidence that persons accused of rape find it more difficult to obtain a lawyer than people accused of other crimes. News media often give much attention to the arrest and opening of the trial, while little or nothing is said when the accused is acquitted. There have been false accusations filed in cases of sexual harassment, child molestation, and sexual misconduct. For these and other reasons it is important that the Church does not make a presumption of guilt or over-react to charges.

If a person is acquitted of charges, the Church shall see that the acquittal is publicized as widely as possible when requested to do so by the accused.

D. Families of the Accused

Special care should be offered the family members of persons accused of sexual misconduct. Families may suffer disruption of marital relationships, parent-child relationships, as well as ostracism within the congregation and community. Where there is denial on the part of a spouse, proffered care is often rejected, but the church should continue to let its concern be known.

#### APPENDIX A



- I. PROCEDURE IN CASES OF ALLEGED SEXUAL MISCONDUCT BY MINISTERS
  - A. Presentation of Accusation
    - Any member of a church, or a person employed or being served by the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) who feels sexually victimized by a minister of the Word and Sacrament or who believes in good faith that there has been a violation of this policy should contact the Executive Presbyter, Presbytery's Moderator, or Chair of the Committee on Ministry.
    - The Person contacted is responsible to hear the complaint and explain the available options for resolution. These are:
      - a. The person who feels victimized may request that a meeting between the accused, accuser and the contacted person be held to discuss the matter and seek resolution.
      - b. The person who feels victimized may elect to file a formal complaint in writing, detailing the nature of the accusation, to the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery. A copy of this policy shall be provided to the accuser and alleged victim (if different than the accuser)
      - c. The person who feels victimized may choose to notify secular authorities. If this results in a police investigation, filing of criminal charges, civil lawsuit, or inquiry by any governmental agency, all efforts by the Church to seek resolution of the complaint will cease until the secular authorities complete their work.
  - B. Actions of the Stated Clerk
    - The Stated Clerk, upon receipt of a written accusation, shall:
      - a. Inform the accused in writing that an accusation has been made, the nature of the accusation, withholding the identity of the accuser. A copy of this policy shall be provided to the accused.
      - b. Instruct the accused and his/her governing body/entity that all professional duties (paid or volunteer) shall cease until the accusation has been resolved. If the accused is employed by a church or Presbytery, compensation would be paid by the employer during this leave of absence. If interim leadership is necessary, the cost for these services will be the responsibility of the Presbytery.
      - c. Report to the chair of the Pastoral Response Team that a formal complaint has been made.

- d. As soon as possible, provide for the appointment of a Special Disciplinary Committee in keeping with the procedures outlined in the Book of Order and the Presbytery By-Laws.
- e. The Clerk shall notify the accuser in writing that the complaint has been received and that appropriate actions are being taken in accord with this policy and the <u>Rules of Discipline</u>.
- The Stated Clerk shall act in accordance with D.7.000 informing Presbytery, the Special Disciplinary Committee and the accused of their rights and responsibilities (D.7.0800, D.7.0900, D.7.1000, D.7.1100, D.7.1200).
- C. Responsibility of the Presbytery Nominating Committee

The nominating committee shall make a list of potential Special Disciplinary Committee (SDC) members, looking for knowledge of law, church polity, and sexual misconduct concerns.

- D. Actions of the Special Disciplinary Committee
  - The Special Disciplinary Committee shall begin its work within thirty (30) days of its appointment by Presbytery and seek to conclude its inquiry within sixty (60) days.
  - The Committee in consultation with the <u>accuser</u> shall offer an advocate for the accuser who shall be present at all appearances before the committee.
  - The Committee in consultation with the <u>accused</u> shall offer an advocate for the accused who shall be present at all appearances before the committee.
  - The Committee shall meet separately with the accused and the accuser as it carries out the responsibilities listed in the Book of Order D.7.0800b.1-7.
  - 5. When the Committee has completed its investigation, a meeting shall be held with the accused, the accuser and the advocate and counsel for each. The Committee shall present its findings and its recommendations.
  - 6. When the Committee has decided the disposition of the accusations, it shall:
    - a. If charges will be brought, immediately deliver them in writing to the Stated Clerk and prepare to prosecute the case. (The Stated Clerk will inform the Presbytery and notify the accuser and the accused (and the employer when it is a governing body/entity of the Church).

- b. If charges will not be brought, notify the Stated Clerk who will inform the Presbytery, the accuser and the accused (and employer when it is a governing body/entity of the Church). If the accused was on a "leave of absence" from his/her employment, there will be an immediate restoration to the full function of his/her professional and volunteer duties.
- c. Persons shown to have filed false accusations are subject to disciplinary action (D-7.0200a(4), D-7.0500, D-7.1200, D-7.1400).
- E. Response of the Permanent Judicial Commission
  - The Stated Clerk upon receipt of the charges shall immediately convey the charges to the Permanent Judicial Commission.
  - 2. The Permanent Judicial Commission shall:
    - Set a time for a preliminary hearing not later than forty-five (45) days after receipt of charge(s), (D.7.1600);
    - b. Through its clerk, notify the accused, the counsel and advocate for the accused, the Special Disciplinary Committee, counsel and advocate for the accuser of the time and place of the hearing (D.7.1600b) and furnish the accused a copy of the charge(s).
  - When a decision has been reached, promptly transmit it in writing to the parties concerned and to the Stated Clerk who shall notify Presbytery of the judgement at its next meeting.



- A. When charges of Sexual Misconduct are filed against a minister and a Special Disciplinary Committee (SDC) is formed
  - The Committee on Ministry (COM) will not conduct its own investigation. COM will provide at least one of its members to serve on the Pastoral Response Team. The COM member(s) will be aware of the counseling and financial resources available. (The work of the Pastoral Response Team is detailed in Section IX.)
  - 2. The COM member of the Pastoral Response Team will be available to meet with the governing body or entity involved, under authority granted under G.11.0502j. COM will determine the timing and extent of information to be shared with the governing body or entity. The COM member shall:
    - Inform the governing body or entity about the ecclesiastical judicial process and the need for confidentiality;
    - b. Help the governing body or entity deal with rumors or conflict in the church or entity relating to this matter;
    - c. Share Presbytery policy regarding administrative leave:
    - d. Be available to the accused as supportive listeners;
    - e. Contact the chair of the Special Disciplinary Committee to maintain communications with the SDC which do not infringe on confidentiality or the work of the SDC.
  - 3. After the Special Disciplinary Committee has reached a conclusion, representatives of COM shall meet with the governing body or entity and communicate the results of the SDC report with special attention to any recommendations for disciplinary actions and the implications of such action. COM shall follow the same procedure after the report of the Permanent Judicial Commission. COM shall aid the governing body or entity in developing appropriate communication with the congregation or body involved.
  - 4. If the Special Disciplinary Committee or Permanent Judicial Commission (PJC) findings results in an agreement or termination of a minister:
    - a. COM will shepherd that termination through existing COM and Presbytery guidelines for terminations.

- b. In the case of a minister in a congregation, COM will guide the Session through the process of finding interim leadership for the church if a minister's service has been terminated.
- c. COM shall require an evaluation of the accused by an approved counselor/counseling center before clearing the accused to seek another call.
- 5. When the SDC and PJC process does not result in a termination of ministerial services, COM will help the governing body or entity in its work to bring reconciliation to the church or body involved.
- COM will aid the Session in developing appropriate communication with the congregation about the charges and the findings of the SDC and/or PJC.
- B. Committee on Ministry also shall:
  - Have annual training on issues of professional misconduct in matters of sexuality.
  - Provide for regular educational opportunities for Sessions on professional misconduct. This will be done in conjunction with Professional Growth and Development and other interested groups.
  - Encourage the Sessions to share information regarding the topic of sexual misconduct with the congregations.
  - 4. Carry out this policy of the Presbytery.
  - Distribute a Covenant of Christian Ethics, which when approved will be signed annually by minister members of the Presbytery.
  - Develop and use reference check questions regarding sexual misconduct to be used by COM and the Executive Presbyter.
  - Use the same questions in interviewing candidates for ministerial positions.
  - 8. Identify and keep a list of counseling resources.
  - Write a Covenant on Christian Ethics for use by Sessions and send it out with the annual reports on compensation.

#### I. THE PASTORAL RESPONSE TEAM

- A. The Formation of the Pastoral Response Team
  - 1. The Presbytery, through its Nominating Committee, shall enlist a group of people to serve as potential members of a Pastoral Response Team. The individuals recommended should become familiar with the Presbytery's Policy on Sexual Misconduct and the disciplinary procedures outlined in the Book of Order. Training shall be provided to equip them to be sensitive to the various issues surrounding charges of sexual misconduct and the appropriate ways of responding to accuser, accused and their families.
  - 2. When charges of sexual misconduct are submitted in writing to the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, the Stated Clerk shall notify the chair of the Pastoral Response Team subcommittee of the Committee on Ministry (COM). The chair of the subcommittee shall then appoint, from the membership pool, three (3) members to serve on a Pastoral Response Team and the Chair of COM shall appoint at least one COM member to serve on the team. At least two members of the Pastoral Response Team will be of the same gender as the alleged victim.
- B. Responsibilities of a Pastoral Response Team
  - The team shall make clear to all concerned that it has no investigatory role. Its sole purpose is to provide pastoral support to those affected by charges of sexual misconduct.
  - 2. The team shall offer the alleged victim(s) and the accused the opportunity to have a Team member designated to be with each one throughout the investigation and possible trial. This Team member would seek to provide spiritual nurture and personal support.
  - The team shall develop a list of qualified therapists and offer it to the alleged victim(s) and accused to be used at each one's discretion.
  - 4. The team shall make certain that reasonable financial assistance for therapy is offered to alleged victim(s), the accused and their respective families. The amount of financial assistance should be negotiated between Presbytery, the employing church or entity, the affected individuals and their own health insurance provisions.
  - 5. The team shall respond to the alleged victim and/or accuser with sensitivity and care, recognizing that the "message bearer" is often blamed for the message.

- The team shall respond to the accused with sensitivity and care, recognizing that accusations are too often viewed as a determination of guilt.
- 7. The team shall remember and remind everyone affected by charges of sexual misconduct that justice must be sought through the courts of the Church and with due process. The decisions of these courts shall be faithfully and clearly reported to the accuser, accused, employing congregation or entity, and the Presbytery.

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#### APPENDIX C

SEXUAL MISCONDUCT POLICY, PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT
ADMINISTRATIVE LEAVE POLICY FOR THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

I. When a charge is filed against a minister or employee of the Presbytery or an employee of a church, that person shall be placed on administrative leave without prejudice until the findings of the SDC and PJC are announced.

Administrative leave requires the minister to cease all pastoral functions and responsibilities including any contact with members or staff of the church or employing body until the judicial process is completed.

- II. The church, in the case of a minister or church employee, or the Presbytery in the case of an employee, shall bear the cost of the administrative leave. The pay includes salary, housing and utilities. It does not include any expense allowances.
- III. In the case of a pastoral vacancy in a church, the cost of providing essential pastoral services through an interim or a supply pastor will be paid by the Presbytery, as finances are available. In the case of a church employee, the governing body and entity will negotiate for Presbytery assistance as funds are available.
- IV. A finding of guilty will end the responsibility for paid administrative leave. A finding of guilty may be grounds for termination.
- V. A finding of not guilty will end the administrative leave and permit return to work.

#### STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS

- I. There are no time limits for the filing of Sexual misconduct charges under the ecclesiastical law. <u>Book of Order</u> D.7.1100.
- II. A person wishing to file civil charges should check with an attorney for the statutes of limitations of state and federal law.

- c. Notify the Session or Presbytery, within thirty (30) days, that a Special Disciplinary Committee must be designated. If no regular meeting is scheduled, a special Session or Presbytery meeting shall be requested. At this meeting, the Clerk or Stated Clerk shall present the names of those who might serve on the Special Disciplinary Committee.
- The Clerk or Stated Clerk shall act in accordance with D.7.000 informing Presbytery, the Special Disciplinary Committee and the accused of their rights and responsibilities (D.7.0800, D.7.0900, D.7.1000, D.7.1100, D.7.1200).
- C. Actions of the Special Disciplinary Committee
  - The Special Disciplinary Committee shall begin its work within thirty (30) days.
  - The Committee in consultation with the <u>accuser</u> shall offer an advocate for the accuser who shall be present at all appearances before the committee.
  - The Committee in consultation with the <u>accused</u> shall offer an advocate for the accused who shall be present at all appearances before the committee.
  - The Committee shall meet separately with the accused and the accuser as it carries out the responsibilities listed in the Book of Order (D.7.0800b.1-7).
  - When the Committee has completed its investigation, a meeting shall be held with the accused, the accuser and the advocates and counsel for each. The Committee shall present its findings and recommendations.
  - 6. When the Committee has decided the disposition of the accusations, it shall:
    - a. If charges will be brought, immediately deliver them in writing to the Clerk or Stated Clerk and prepare to prosecute the case. (The Clerk or Stated Clerk will inform the Session or Presbytery and notify the accuser and the accused (and the employer when it is a governing body/entity of the Church).
    - b. If charges will not be brought, notify the Clerk or Stated Clerk who will inform the Session or Presbytery, the accuser and the accused (and the employer when it is a governing body/entity of the Church). If the accused was on a "leave of absence" from his/her employment, there will be an immediate restoration to the full function of his/her professional and volunteer duties.

#### EXHIBIT A

 PROCEDURE IN CASES OF ALLEGED SEXUAL MISCONDUCT BY AN EMPLOYEE, VOLUNTEER, OR OFFICER OF THE CHURCH

#### A. Presentation of Accusation

- Any member of a church, or a person employed or being served by the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) who feels sexually victimized by an employee, volunteer, or officer of the Church should contact the Moderator of the Session, Clerk of the Session, Executive Presbyter, Chair of the Committee on Ministry, or the Chair of the Pastoral Response Sub-committee.
- The person(s) contacted is responsible to hear the complaint and explain the available options for possible resolution. These are:
  - a. The person who feels victimized may request that a meeting between the accused, accuser and the contacted person be held to discuss the matter and seek resolution.
  - b. The person who feels victimized may elect to file a formal complaint in writing, detailing the nature of the accusation, to the Clerk of Session or the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery.
  - c. The person who feels victimized may choose to notify secular authorities. If this results in a police investigation, filing of criminal charges, civil lawsuit, or inquiry by any governmental agency, all efforts by the Church to seek resolution of the complaint will cease until the secular authorities complete their work.
- B. Actions of the Clerk of Session or Stated Clerk
  - The Clerk of Session or Stated Clerk, upon receipt of a written accusation, shall:
    - a. Inform the accused that an accusation has been made, the nature of the accusation, withholding the identity of the accuser.
    - b. Instruct the accused and his/her governing body/entity that all professional duties (paid or volunteer) shall cease until the accusation has been resolved. If the accused is employed by a church or Presbytery, compensation would be paid by the employer during this leave of absence. If interim leadership is necessary, the cost for these services will be negotiated between the Presbytery and the employing body.

- D. Response of the Governing Body
  - If charges are brought, the Clerk or Stated Clerk upon receipt of those charges shall immediately convey them to the Session or a Permanent Judicial Commission.
  - 2. The Session or Permanent Judicial Commission shall:
    - a. Set a time for a preliminary hearing not later than forty-five (45) days after receipt of charge(s), (D.7.1600);
    - b. Through its clerk, notify the accused, the counsel and advocate for the accused, the Special Disciplinary Committee, counsel and advocate for the accuser of the time and place of the hearing (D.7.1600b) and furnish the accused a copy of the charge(s).

#### E. Role of the Committee on Ministry

- When charges are filed against an employee, volunteer or officer of the church, Committee on Ministry (COM) will not conduct its own investigation. COM will provide at least one member of COM to serve on the Pastoral Response Team. The COM member(s) will be aware of the counseling and financial resources available. (The work of the Pastoral Response Team is detailed in Section IX.)
- 2. The COM member of the Pastoral Response Team (PRT) will be available to meet with the Session of the church involved, under authority granted under G.11.0502j. COM will determine the timing and extent of information to be shared with the Session. The COM member shall:
  - a. Make sure the Session has available the Presbytery's Policy Sexual Misconduct and the "Statement on Sexual Harassment Rights and Procedures"; (see Exhibit A)
  - Inform the Session about the judicial process, and the need for confidentiality;
  - c. Help the Session deal with rumors or conflict in the church relating to this matter;
  - d. Share Presbytery policy regarding administrative leave;
  - e. Use available financial resources to help provide therapy to the accuser and the accused in conjunction with their own health policy provisions. Extent of participation to be determined by the Presbytery;

- f. Contact the chair of the Special Disciplinary Committee to maintain communications with the SDC which do not infringe on confidentiality or the work of the SDC.
- 3. After the Special Disciplinary Committee has reached a conclusion, representatives of COM shall meet with the Session of the church and communicate the results of the report of the SDC with special attention to any recommendations for disciplinary actions and the implications of such action. COM shall follow the same procedure after the report of the Permanent Judicial Commission (PJC). COM shall aid the Session in developing appropriate communication with the congregation.
- 4. When the SDC and PJC process does not result in a termination of services, COM will help the Session in its work to bring reconciliation to the church.
- COM will aid the Session in developing appropriate communication with the congregation about the charges and the findings.

## EXHIBIT B SEXUAL MISCONDUCT POLICY

#### Statement on Sexual Harassment Rights and Procedures

#### I. RIGHTS OF EMPLOYEES AND VOLUNTEERS

All employees and volunteers of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and its governing bodies and entities have the right to work in an environment free of discrimination and any form of sexual harassment. It is the policy of the Church to maintain a work place free of any form of sexual harassment or sexual intimidation from any Church employee or volunteer. Any form of sexual harassment is unacceptable behavior in the workplace and subject to appropriate disciplinary action.

#### II. DEFINITION OF SEXUAL HARASSMENT

Sexual harassment includes, but is not limited to, unwelcome and unsolicited sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, discriminatory tormenting based on gender and other undesirable verbal, visual, or physical conduct of a sexual nature. It may involve a wide range of behavior such as:

- verbal abuse
- unwelcome remarks, jokes or innuendos about a person's clothing, body or sexual activities
- indirect or explicit invitations to engage in sexual
- leering or other gestures associated with sexuality
- unnecessary physical contact such as touching, patting, pinching or constantly brushing against a person's body
- displaying pornographic pictures
- demanding sexual favors accompanied by inclied or overt threats concerning a person's job performance, evaluation, promotion, or termination

#### III. STEPS TO FOLLOW IN CASE OF SEXUAL HARASSMENT

If an employee or volunteer believes he/she is being subjected to any form of sexual harassment, the following steps should be observed:

The individual should exercise the right and responsibility to say no. It should be made clear to the harasser that the behavior is unwelcome and inappropriate. This should be said firmly and without apology.

A journal should be kept of the times, places and witnesses present whenever the harassment occurs. It should record exactly what was said or done. Any letters, gifts and notes should be saved. The journal and supporting evidence, should not be left in the workplace.

The harasser should be asked to stop the inappropriate behavior. This should be followed by a letter, detailing the specific things which were offensive. A copy should be given to the harasser, to a witness if appropriate, and kept for future documentation.

If the behavior persists, was so offensive, or results in discrimination, the individual should speak to someone in authority to seek resolution or formal action. In the local congregation, this might be the Pastor, Chair of a personnel committee, or a member of the Session. In the Presbytery, persons to contact would include the immediate supervisor, the Executive Presbyter, Chair of Staff Services or Chair of Committee on Ministry.

#### IV. INVESTIGATION OF SEXUAL HARASSMENT CLAIMS

The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission has published in its Compliance Manual the method it will follow in investigating sexual harassment claims. Logically, the Church should follow this same investigative procedure on its own, before a charge is filed alleging sexual harassment. That procedure, contained in section 615.4 of the EEOC compliance Manual, is paraphrased as follows:

- A. The Person contacted (or appropriate representative) should interview the complainant to:
  - Identify in detail the conduct which is alleged to constitute sexual harassment. Include the type(s) of conduct, the frequency of occurrence, and the date(s) on which or the time period over which the conduct occurred.
  - Ascertain the specific context(s) in which the conduct occurred. Include the nature and general description of the workplace and the specific location and circumstances in which the conduct occurred.
  - 3. Determine the effect of the conduct on the complainant: the type(s) of effect (e.g., economic, non-economic, and/or psychological), and detail the specific consequences involved. (For example, if the employee/volunteer was discharged for rejecting a supervisor's sexual advances, determine whether and to what extent (s)he suffered economic harm (including wages lost less other income earned, benefits lost, and expenses incurred).
  - Establish the time relationship between the occurrence of conduct and its effect on the complainant.



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- 5. If the alleged harasser was a co-worker or a non-employee, determine whether supervisor, executive, or pastor knew or should have known of the alleged sexual harassment. In this regard, ascertain whether:
  - a. The complainant, or any other person reported or complained of the harasser's conduct to a supervisor, executive or pastor.
  - A supervisor, pastor, or executive observed or was in a position to observe the conduct; or
  - c. A supervisor, pastor, or executive should have been otherwise alerted to the conduct (if, for example, the conduct was discussed in the presence of supervisor, pastor or executive).
  - d. Obtain copies of any available documentation (e.g., letters, memoranda, reports, statements) which would support a conclusion that such persons know or had reason to know of the sexual harassment.
- Document what specific steps, if any, did the complainant took to follow the sexual harassment policy or practice.
- B. Interview the appropriate individual(s) who had supervisory or management responsibilities to:
  - Ascertain whether other persons were subjected to similar conduct or were treated differently by the alleged harasser.
  - Identify the relationship of the alleged harasser to the employee; was (s)he an agent of the employer, a supervisory employee, a non-supervisory employee (co-worker), or a non-employee.
  - If the alleged harasser was a non-employee, ascertain the extent of the employer's control over, and legal responsibility for, the conduct of the harasser.
- C. Interview other witnesses:
  - Obtain statements from witnesses or other persons, if any, who can corroborate or support any of the allegations.
  - Obtain statements from other persons, if any, who are or have been victims of sexual harassment by the alleged harasser in the workplace.
- D. Interview the alleged harasser:
  - Obtain a statement from the alleged harasser. He/She should be told that an admission of wrongdoing may result in discipline.

- Obtain statements from witnesses or other persons, if any, who can corroborate or support the alleged harasser's statements.
- If adverse employment action was taken against the complainant, ascertain the alleged harasser's reason(s) for the action and obtain any information or documentation which would bear on the legitimacy of the reason given.

For example, if a supervisor discharges the employee because of his/her deteriorating work performance or absenteeism and the employee's poor record is the result of sexual harassment, the supervisor's reason may be a pretext for unlawful discrimination. Where an adverse action is taken, compare the employee's performance (or record) before and after the alleged harassment and note whether the supervisor provided the charging party with any notice (e.g., a written warning) prior to taking the adverse action.

#### E. Conduct of Interviews

- 1. The interviews must be handled in a confidential manner. All witnesses should be assured that no retaliatory action will be taken against them as a result of their participation in the investigation. Witnesses should be informed, however, that their statements may have to be used in defense of any charge that may result.
- 2. The interviews and conclusions drawn from them should be documented and filed in a locked container. Witness comments should be labeled as hearsay, rumor or first-hand knowledge. Signed statements by the witnesses should not be created unless the investigation is conducted by an attorney.

#### F. Findings and Conclusions of Inquiry

 If reasonable grounds exist to believe that sexual harassment has taken place, the complainant and the offending employee/volunteer should be notified. A formal complaint should be filed with the Clerk of the Session or the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery. At that time, the procedures outlined in the Sexual Misconduct Policy of the Presbytery of Detroit shall take effect.

Any discriminatory action taken against the complainant should be rectified. The individual should be offered, or placed in, the position he/she would have occupied but for the harassment (such as reinstated to employment, given a deserved promotion, etc.)

 If reasonable grounds do not exist to support the allegation of sexual harassment, the complainant and the alleged harasser shall be notified. The complainant has the right to appeal this finding within the structure of the Church or with secular authorities.

# COVENANT ON CHRISTIAN SEXUAL ETHICS AND STANDARD OF CONDUCT FOR CHURCH EMPLOYEES, VOLUNTEERS AND OFFICERS



Presbytery of Detroit Synod of the Covenant

The Presbytery of Detroit has adopted as its Standard of Conduct that it is unethical and unacceptable for ministers, employees, volunteers, or officers of the Church to have sexual relations with anyone served or employed by the Church (other than a spouse, and includes pastor, teacher, youth leader, elder, committee chair, congregant, scout leader, etc.), or to engage in sexually harassing activities. Such behavior is a breach of ethics, violates trust and abuses relationships in the community of faith.

The Presbytery of Detroit expects everyone who serves the Church within the bounds of the Presbytery to follow and demonstrate adherence to this Covenant. Anyone who does not shall be subject to disciplinary action based on the following assumptions:

Any allegation that this Covenant and its Standard of Conduct was violated, reported in writing to the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, Moderator or Clerk of a Session, Presbytery executive, or executive director of a Church-related governing body or entity, shall begin the disciplinary process in accordance with the Rules of Discipline of the Book of Order (chapter D.7), the Presbytery's Policy on Sexual Misconduct, and the appropriate governing body/entity's personnel guidelines.

As soon as allegations are filed, the accused shall be relieved of all Church-related duties (both paid and volunteer), pending the outcome of the investigation and any prosecution of charges. If the accused is employed by a church or Presbytery, compensation shall be paid by the employer during a leave of absence. The Committee on Ministry shall instruct the employer that no judgements or decisions should be made until the charges are adjudicated.

The Presbytery shall make certain personal support and spiritual nurture is provided to the accused and his/her family during the investigation and any prosecution. If the Presbytery conducts the inquiry it will ensure a fair, just and expeditious process in accordance with the Rules of Discipline of the Book of Order (chapter D.7).

Any decision supporting the charge(s) of sexual misconduct will be divulged on receipt of a reference check for other employment.

I have read this Covenant on Christian Sexual Ethics. I understand the consequences of unethical sexual behavior or sexually harassing activities. I commit myself to adhere to the Presbytery's Standard of Conduct.

A motion was sustained that in accorandance with G-7.0303a(2) presbytery authorize the calling of a special meeting of the congregation of the Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant for the purpose of determining the future of the congregation with the time and place of the meeting to be arranged by the Committee on Church Strategy or a sub-committee thereof.

# IV. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported that the motion for application for leave to appeal filed by the Rev. Milton Henry and Christ Presbyterian Church (independent) with the Michigan Supreme Court was denied. This means that the decision of the Appellate Court in favor of the Presbytery of Detroit remanding the case back to the Circuit Court for disposition now stands until something else happens.

Mr. Gehres gave information on the Motor-City Mission Mania Project that is being sponsored by the Presbytery of Detroit. He asked for the prayers of the presbyters and invited them to consider helping with the project. The project will provide opportunities for the presbyters to engage in direct service to the people of Detroit.

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported that he attended the gathering of Presbyterian Women in the Synod of the Covenant (PWSC) and that PW Presbytery of Detroit had the largest delegation, 65 persons at the Gathering. Carol Hylkema has completed her term as moderator of PWSC.

Mr. Gehres informed the Presbytery that John Haines, member of the Auburn Hills Church will serve as a volunteer in mission through the division of Worldwide Ministries PC(USA) in Metec Hospital in the Cameroon from June 25th through mid-October as an equipment repairer. He asked for the prayers of the presbyters as John leaves to serve in mission in another part of the world.

Mr. Gehres informed the presbytery that on Saturday, June 26, 1993 a walk down Woodward will commemorate the 30th anniversary of one of the largest civil rights marches in the country. The walk will begin at Woodward and Alexandrine at 10:30 am ending at Hart Plaza with speeches and a rally. National and local leadership will be in attendance. The walk also will show solidarity with those who still do not have justice and equality in the U.S.

do not have justice and equality in the U.S.

Mr. Gehres reported that the General Assembly Commissioners were faithful in attendance during plenary sessions, active and busy in committees, and addressed the Assembly with good points. James Shirley served as Vice-Moderator of a committee and the youth advisory delegates elected Edward Gehres, III as Co-Moderator of the YAD'S. This is the second year in succession that the Presbytery of Detroit's YAD has been elected Co-Moderator. He stated that the commissioners deserve our appreciation and thanks for representing the Presbytery very well.

# V. REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS TO 205TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Jack Ziegler gave an overview of the Assembly. He stated that he came away from the Assembly reassured that the PC(USA) is wrestling with the issues that are before the world as well as our church and are doing so in such a way that makes a difference. He referred the presbyters to the GA News wrap-up for details of the work of the Assembly. He said that serving as a commissioner to the GA has renewed his faith in what it means to be a Presbyterian.

VI. SHARING OUR LIFE: EXPERIENCES, JOYS, CONCERNS
Members of the Presbytery lifted up and shared the joys and concerns
that were experienced over the past month for prayer and thanksgiving.

# VII. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY A. THEOLOGY AND WORSHIP COMMITTEE

Peter Boeve reported for the committee that the new Book of Common Worship has been published and that the Theology and Worship Ministry Unit has scheduled six regional worship conferences to introduce it. The conferences are called Festivals of Worship. He referred the presbyters to a flyer/registration form detailing the conferences and urged participation in the conferences.

- B. METROPOLITAN MISSION COMMITTEE: 2-CENTS A MEAL
  The Metropolitan Mission Committee presented 2-cents a meal
  certificates to representatives from Southminster, Taylor; Drayton
  .Avenue, Ferndale; Hope, Detroit; and Greenfield, Berkley. These
  churches have signed the covenant agreement to participate in this
  mission program of the Presbytery of Detroit.
  - C. METROPOLITAN MISSION COMMITTEE: URBAN INTERNSHIP
    Brian Hamilton reported on the Urban Internship Program of the
    Presbytery of Detroit. This program is funded through the
    Bicentennial Fund. The presbytery has received funds to support a
    seminary intern in Urban Ministry. The plan is for the intern to
    serve three churches over a twelve month period. This will allow a
    four month experience with each congregation by the intern. Mr.
    Hamilton asked the urban churches to consider applying to be a part of
    the program.

Craig Aue reported for the Evangelism Committee. He presented Peoples Church, Milan with a certificate for signing the Commitment to Evangelism. He reported that presbytery-wide advertising blitz to encourage people to become part of this family of faith is being planned for 1994-95.

Clark Cowden, Pastor, of Walled Lake, Crossroads, reported on the evangelistic outreach of his congregation. He stated that the congregation is growing; therefore it was running out of parking spaces and sanctuary seating. There has been an increase in visitors to the church. In April, the congregation instituted two worship services, a contemporary style worship at 8:30 am, Sunday School at 9:30 am and a traditional style worship at 10:30 am. The second service met a need or desire for an early service, increased attendance and the morale of the congregation. Crossroads Church took advantage of free space in several local small newspapers to advertise its worship services. Mr. Cowden reported that attendance at Crossroads Church increased by 15-20% in April-May and has increased by 35-40 percent over last year's summer attendance. There is no longer a parking or seating problem.

### B. PLANNING AND STRUCTURE COMMITTEE

Wilma Dellinger reported that new mission directions will be ready for council review in September.

# C. THEOLOGY AND WORSHIP COMMITTEE

Peter Boeve reported on the October 18-19 retreat and other activities which have been planned for the months ahead.

Nancy Draves reported on some of the major issues which were dealt with at the General Assembly.

### D. STAFF SERVICES COMMITTEE

Sally Rankin reported for the committee and shared with council the progress that has been made in the search process. The committee expects to present a candidate for Associate Executive Presbyter to the presbytery in September.

Committee chairs were asked to be complete when filling out work request forms and to notify the office of meetings and workshops even

if they are held outside the presbytery offices.

#### E. BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Jerry Seaton reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that council:

- Recommend presbytery approve a 1993 VSO in the amount of \$2,000 for the African-American Male Mentoring Program as requested by the Committee on Racial Ethnic Concerns.
- 2. Recommend presbytery approve a 1993 VSO in the amount of \$2,000 for Family House funding as requested by the Committee on Metropolitan Mission.

Mr. Seaton did a walk through the 1993 budget status and 1994 projections. Motions were sustained that council:

3. Direct presbytery and council committees not to authorize expenditures or allocations of more than 85% of their 1993 budget through September 30, 1993.

through September 30, 1993.

4. Authorize the chair of council to appoint a task force, subsequent to discussions by the council as a whole, to take the initiative for an intentional study of what it means to be the Presbytery of Detroit in the 1990's and beyond with implications for mission goals and budget priorities. Use of outside consultants should be considered and should involve the council in special meetings. The outcome should include recommendations to the council and presbytery.

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Information was shared that the action of presbytery at its May 1993 meeting in holding the 1994 per capita at the 1993 rate of \$5.38 results in a projected loss of per capita funding in the amount of \$4,493. Although the per capita rate remains the same, the loss of membership reduces the income potential. The committees sharing per capita funding are: Council, Staff Services, Property and Investments, Preparation for Ministry and Committee on Ministry.

### III. BICENTENNIAL FUND ACCOUNTABILITY COMMITTEE ORDER OF THE DAY

Bud Kimpel reported for the Bicentennial Fund Accountability Committee. He briefly explained how the committee has calculated disbursements of funds against what has been remitted. The committee brought to council a concern that at this point one project has received a greater percentage of funds than other projects (in large part due to a selected giving gift from one church), and unless the council wished to change the policy which was adopted for the disbursement of funds that project would receive no further allocations until its percentage was brought back in line with the percentages of the other 11 projects being funded.

### COMMITTEES OF COUNCIL, PART II PROPERTY AND INVESTMENTS

Ron Wallis reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that council:

- Recommend presbytery approve continuing the present interest rate
- of 5 1/2% from July 1, 1993 through December 31, 1993.

  Approve the request of the Gratiot Avenue Presbyterian Church to sell a house located at 5746 Burns Avenue, Detroit, MI for Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000) in "as is" condition understanding that the buyer will pay for repairs and the church will be held harmless.
- Approve the request of the Farmington, First Presbyterian Church to increase the amount to be borrowed from the Metro Bank of Farmington Hills from the \$1,100,000, previously approved, to \$1,300,000.
- Proceed with foreclosure and resale of the Grand River property (the former Calvary Church) if the land contract on the property is not redeemed by the end of the 90-day redemption period which ends August 18, 1993.
- Authorize Ronald Wallis and Stanley King to sign the necesary documents to close on the White Lake mortgage, subject to the approval of presbytery counsel.

FOR INFORMATION:

The Outdoor Ministries and Property and Investment Committees, pending legal counsel's approval, will be proceeding to engage Arthur F. Smith, Architects, to complete phases one through three:

Phase One Information gathering

Graphic presentation of information Phase Two Phase Three Development of master plan recommendations, and also proceeding with a topographical survey cost not to exceed \$4,500.

Motion was sustained that council authorize up to \$15,000 for a presbytery-wide study to be conducted by Church Information Development Service (CIDS) using their VISTA Program.

Approve a mission development grant proposal for specialized community ministry at the Grandale Presbyterian Church of the Master and Presbyterian Mission Center, so it can be forwarded for consideration by the Synod of the Covenant and the General This grant proposal requests funding from the Synod in Assembly. the amount of \$9,500 over a three year period, and funding from the General Assembly in the amount of 36,000 over a three year period. No additional funds are requested from the Presbytery in conjunction with this request.

 Appoint the Rev. James Beates as the Peace Enabler for the Presbytery of Detroit beginning October 1, 1993.

#### G. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH STRATEGY

Tom Hartley reported for the committee. A motion was sustained that presbytery adopt the following policy:

In keeping with the requirements of our insurance carrier, all New Church Development projects and non-chartered projects under the direction of the Presbytery, submit to the Property & Investments Committee copies of all Steering Committee Meeting minutes, including financial reports, within 30 days of the date of each Steering Committee meeting.

# IV. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres thanked and commended the Rev. Jenny Schram for her work as Stated Clerk during some extremely difficult times and for the continuation of her work in the future. He stated that Mrs. Schram has worked beyond the technical duties of Stated Clerk and has been an asset to the Presbytery as well as a valued colleague to him.

Mr. Gehres shared what he perceives as exciting times in the Presbytery of Detroit: the re-election of Jenny Schram as Stated Clerk, the election of Clarisa C. Piecuch as Associate Executive, the election of Arthur W. Canada to the Grandale Church of the Master and Mission Center. He expressed appreciation to the Committee on Staff Services for the wonderful work that they have done during the past year, through the staff study and the search for and finding of an associate executive. Mr. Gehres stated that he is not only pleased that a new associate was found but that he is appreciative of the gifts and talents that Ms. Piecuch will bring to the Presbytery.

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported that he has been in the process of attempting to move into his new position description that includes pastoral visitation and pastoral care of clergy. He will be out of the office two days a week making pastoral calls, therefore he will not be as available to answer phone calls and attend meetings on those days. The office staff will be in touch with him at all times.

Mr. Gehres stated that the second clergy luncheon will be held Wednesday, October 20, 1993 at Westminster Church, Detroit.

# V. REFLECTIONS OF MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY A. EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

Craig Aue reported for the Evangelism Committee. He called attention to three up-coming evangelism events and encouraged the presbyters to attend. Mr. Aue reported that the Faith NCD, Brandon Township and the Utica, Sterling Heights churches had signed the Commitment to Evangelism and that he had certificates to present to each congregation.

# B. ECUMENICAL PARISH ASSOCIATE PROGRAM

Gareth Baker described the Ecumenical Parish Associate Program of the Synod of the Covenant and introduced the two ecumenical associates that are in the Presbytery of Detroit, Hawayda Adel, Egypt, associate at Garden City Church, and the Rev. Shehadek, the Middle East, associate at Birmingham, First.

Hawagda Adel, Egypt, is a member of the Presbyterian Church in Cario. It is in a place also called Garden City and there are 2,500 members in her church, of that, 1000 are youth. She said that the Christians in Egypt are the people who have been and are descendants of Christians since the Arab invasion, of Egypt in 641 A.D. The conversion of Christians from Islam is very difficult and against the law. There are 200 Presbyterian Churches in Egypt, dating back to 1863. She is here sharing Christ with her American brothers and

sisters and to prove that Christ is alive in every place in the world. The Rev. Shehadek brought greetings from brothers and sisters in Christ in Jerusalem and the Christian Palestinian Family in Israel and from his own church. He thanked the Presbyterian Church for the opportunity to share how it is to be a Christian in the Middle east. Mr. Shehadek said it is not easy, there are feelings of isolation and loneliness and they are outnumbered. He said that many of us visit the Holy sites, the historical stones, in the Middle East but that we forget that there are living witnessing stones, the Christian Community, in Israel, Palestine and Egypt. He asked that when we visit Israel, Palestine and Egypt that we also visit the Christian community because the community needs our care, prayers and recognition; this is the Koinonia, this is the fellowship that we need and which we can make happen.

Moderator Van Til resumed moderating the meeting of Presbytery.

COMMITTEE ON MISSION INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP Fran Anderson reported for the committee. She highlighted several Mission Interpretation events that will take place in October. reported that \$8000 was contributed through SERRV purchases last year. She reminded the presbyters that October is the Month of Mission and that she has mission co-workers available for speaking engagements.

#### THEOLOGY AND WORSHIP COMMITTEE

Peter Boeve reported for the committee that he took part in a conference at Evanston, Illnois that introduced the new Book of Common Worship. He recommended that clergy, choir directors and chairs of worship committees attend one of the five other conferences, if possible. Mr. Boeve reported that the Theology and Worship Retreat, October 18-19, 1993 needs 40-45 persons in order to take place. He encouraged presbyters to register to be inspired by Edward Dixon Junkin at the retreat. He is the author of Up from the Grassroots-The Church in Transition.

VI. SHARING OUR LIFE: EXPERIENCES, JOYS AND CONCERNS Members of the Presbytery lifted up and shared the joy and concerns that were experienced over the past month for prayer and thanksgiving.

VII. ADJOURNMENT
There being no further business to come before the presbytery, the meeting was adjourned by Moderator Van Til at 9:40 p.m. with prayer that included thankfulness for the joys, concerns, and work of the Presbytery.

The committee received feedback on responding to a request of the Committee on Education and Nurture to change the format for listing the Church Educators in the directory.

It was announced that an 18-month master calendar is being developed for the presbytery. The goal is to distribute the calendar in November with a starting date of January 1 for events and meetings.

The Job Training Task Force presented the its report. Since funding is not available the issue of participation is mute and no action was taken. However, the report was heard because proposals may come again in the future.

After reviewing the available materials and speaking with individuals in the job training project, it was the conclusion of the Task Force that the Presbytery of Detroit not enter into any agreement with the company promoting this venture. There are several reasons:

- The presbytery would have to sign the contract with the Detroit Board of Education.
- The presbytery would have no choice in the selection of the vendor to coordinate the job training programs. The vendor would be the company currently seeking the presbytery's participation.
- 3. The presbytery would not be permitted oversight of the
- program. We would simply be providing space.
  4. The Board of Education would keep 40% of the State funds allocated for this program.

### B. PLANNING AND STRUCTURE

Thomson Heinrichs reported for the committee. Questions were answered regarding the proposed Mission Directions and clarification was given on what is being presented for approval and what is background information.

A recommendation to ask the presbytery to overture the 206th General Assembly (1994) was read to the council. Because of the complicated nature of such an overture, and since the presbytery is not under immediate constraint to take action at this time, the committee was asked to make copies available and for the stated clerk to mail them before the next council meeting.

# MINUTES OF THE OCTOBER 26, 1993 STATED MEETING PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT MILFORD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, MILFORD

## I. THE GATHERING

CORRESPONDING MEMBERS. Without further motions, seat as corresponding members all eligible persons who are presented to the Presbytery and who register on the enrollment sheet.

### C. WELCOME BY THE HOST PASTOR

The Rev. John Harris, pastor of Milford Presbyterian Church, greeted the presbyters and welcomed them to the community and the church. He stated that this was the first time that Presbytery has met in session at the Milford Church.

- Special Disciplinary Committee 93.01 reports on the three allegations it was investigating: "The Committee, after reviewing all of the evidence, including papers; documents, records and live testimony, unanimously concludes that there is insufficient evidence to file charges." Notification has been sent to the accused, the accusers, and the church.

The second report of special disciplinary committee 93.01 responds to accusations lodged against a member of Presbytery by individuals D, E, F. (Appendix B). No charges were filed.

A three-page letter concerning remarks made at the September Meeting of Presbytery was referred to the Steering Committee of Presbytery Council for review with the audio tapes of the meeting and to respond to the person who sent the letter.

### B. THE TREASURER

Treasurer Wilma Dellinger referred to the printed balance sheets which were distributed and called attention to the fact that this year there is a YTD surplus of \$77,720. She reported that 75 percent of the per capita apportionment has been received and appealed to the churches who have not submitted per capita for 1993 to do so.

## THE COUNCIL

William Rumsey reported for the Council. Motions were sustained that the Presbytery:

- 12. In the matter regarding the Rev. Milton Henry, extend the time limit from November 1, 1993 to December 1, 1993 to provide the Committee on Ministry additional time to respond to Mr. Henry's latest communication to the Committee.

# FOR INFORMATION. The Sexual Misconduct Policy

The committee informed the presbytery where they are in dealing with questions concerning the presbytery's Sexual Misconduct Policy. Mr. Schram shared the list of issues the committee has identified as needing to be addressed and spoke of the committee's desire to look at the issues as they relate to and impact upon one another rather than changing the policy in piece-meal fashion. The committee will present a wholistic revision of the sexual misconduct policy taking into account both the mentioned issues and others which are brought to their attention as soon as possible.

Following the committee's presentation motions were sustained that:

- 1. The Sexual Misconduct Policy procedures for automatic administrative leave for persons accused of sexual misconduct be suspended until such a time as the presbytery adopts a revision to the exiting policy and that the Committee on Ministry be directed to present a proposed revision of the above provisions to the presbytery at a time that expresses the great urgency of this need.
- The preceding suspension be made Policy retroactive to include those persons who are already on administrative leave according to this policy. (Yes 118, No 48)
   To expand the COM review of the provisions of the Sexual
- 3. To expand the COM review of the provisions of the Sexual Misconduct Policy and its provisions to include, at least, those items mentioned by Rev. Schram during the informational report.

# G. COMMITTEE ON REPRESENTATION

Dorothy Seabrooks presented the report of the committee, highlighting portions of the printed report. Motions were sustained that presbytery direct the nominating committee to:

 Consult with pastors of churches to seek Asian American, Native American, Hispanic American and the disabled to serve on presbytery committees.

 More aggressively recruit females to serve on committees of presbytery, particularly the Committee on Ministry and the Presbytery Council.

3. More aggressively recruit younger persons, under the age of 35, to

serve on all committees of presbytery.

## H. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH STRATEGY

Thomas Hartley reported for the committee. A motion was sustained

that presbytery:

Authorize the moderator in consultation with the nominating committee to appoint an Administrative Commission for the Detroit, Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant as far as possible comprised of members of the Committee on Church Strategy plus one elder from the church, in accord with G-9.0500, to assume original jurisdiction and act as the session until the congregation of Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of the Covenant determines its future.

# VI. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported that the Arab New Church Development in Troy hosted the president of the protestant churches of Egypt. Mr. Gehres presented a plaque with the symbol of the PC(USA) to Dr. Samuel Habib, member of the Coptic Evangelical Church, who in turn presented to the Presbytery a silver plate inscribed with symbols from the Egyptian Protestant Church.

Mr. Gehres introduced the Rev. James Beates, the new Peace Enabler. Mr. Beates is part-time supply at Joslyn Avenue Church, Pontiac and will be working 10 hours a week for the Presbytery as Peace Enabler. This position is funded from the Peacemaking Offering.

When the Staff Study report was accepted, there was a provision to use funds from the salary of a second Associate Executive position for funding research and development projects. Mr. Gehres reported that council approved using some of those funds for a Church Information Development Services (CIDS/Percepts) Study which will produce a demographic survey of the entire geographic area of the Presbytery of Detroit. This survey will provide information to the presbytery as to where to plant new congregations and will provide information to existing congregations about the people living near their church, their religious values and preferences.

Next Monday through Wednesday, Stated Clerk Schram and Executive Presbyter Gehres will be leading a start-up seminar for individuals who are beginning a new ministry within the Presbytery of Detroit.

Mr. Gehres reflected that we need to remember that when a call has been dissolved that there is joy and sorrow contained in the action. Also, we should be mindful that that in a new call there is joy and happiness. There is a lot of pain and joy in many of the actions that we take. He asked the presbytery to pray for the pastors and congregations and to bear in mind the human side of the church.

Mr. Gehres announced that there will be open enrollment for Blue Cross-Blue Shield in November for lay employees of the churches.

# V. ISSUE OF CONCERN: MISSION

Francile Anderson presented some of the Mission Co-workers who are in the presbytery as part of the Month of Mission Celebration. The Mission Co-workers were: Rev. Don and Jessie McCall (41 years) Taiwan; Dr. Richard and Dr. Irene Foulkes (38 years), Costa Rica: Barbara Lewis (39 years), Pakistan and Joann Griffith (34 years) Ethiopia. Each Mission Co-worker spoke about their ministries and the countries in which they serve. They thanked the presbytery for its support, prayers and the opportunity to be with it.

# REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY A. METROPOLITAN MISSION

Nile Harper, Director of the Ecumenical Center, Ann Arbor, Michigan, reported for the committee that the Presbyterian Church has been in mission on the campus of the University of Michigan for over 100 years. He reported that the Ecumenical Center and International Residence in Ann Arbor is constructing a new residential and program facility for Presbyterian/Ecumenical Campus Ministry at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. The new dormitory will double the capacity to serve international students. He asked the presbyters to consider over a period of three years how they may help in this project. The facility will generate income to fund the work of the center. Mr. Harper asked for the prayers of the presbytery for this new venture.

# B. EDUCATION AND NURTURE

Raymond Lumley reported for the Education and Nurture Committee. He reported that Education and Nurture was provided with \$5000 from the Bicentennial fund to develop material on domestic violence. Task Force on Domestic Violence spent \$3000 in the production of a booklet on domestic violence. He asked the presbyters to pick up one from the table. Nancy Mikoski told of ways that the material contained in the booklet may be used.

C. ECUMENICAL DECADE
Carol Hylkema reported for the Task Force on the Ecumenical Decade: Churches in Solidarity with women of the Committee on Metropolitan Mission. She reported that three persons from the presbytery are attending the RE-imagining Conference on the Decade in Minneapolis, MN. She reported that the committee has resources to share with you and your church. Carol Hylkema said that there is a series "Violence Against Women and Children: Where is the Faith Community?" to be shown on VISN in November.

### D. PEACEMAKING COMMITMENT

Jim Beates reported that the Southminster Church, Taylor and Wayne, First had signed the Commitment to Peacemaking and certificates from the General Assembly were presented to them.

#### VIII. ADJOURNMENT ·

There being no further business to come before the presbytery, the meeting was adjourned by moderator Van Til at 9:30 p.m. with readings from Ephesians and Luke (Simeon's prayer).

The next stated meeting of the Presbytery will convene Tuesday, November 23, 1993, at the Westminster Presbyterian Church, Detroit, at 5:30 pm.

The Special Disciplinary Committee (93.01), responding to the accusations lodged against a member of presbytery by Individual D finds insufficient evidence to support the allegations.

In response to the allegations made by Individual E, we find that the charges do not fit the definitions of sexual misconduct as defined in Presbytery's policy.

In response to the charges made by Individual F, we find the accusations not of sufficient weight to require any sort of judication process.

Furthermore, it is the conviction of this committee that the Sexual Misconduct Policy of Presbytery is being abused by persons whose true aim and motivation is to harass the minister. We have reason to suspect that there may be persons waiting in line to file more charges. It is our recommendation that Presbytery appoint an administrative commission to step in at the . Church and deal directly with the problems which have spawned these sometimes frivolous complaints.

We believe that to deal with these allegations seriatim is an abuse of the accused, of the system, and of the members of the SDC. We respectfully request that the SDC 93.01 be dissolved.

- 1. Recommend presbytery approve using funds received from the Land Contract held by the Presbytery on the Church of the Covenant building located on E. Grand Blvd. to repay the Capital Fund \$3,137.11 for a loan issued to Woodward Avenue Church of the Covenant for Gary Douglas in 1988 and the Program Fund for all other open accounts for past years per capita.
- other open accounts for past years per capita.

  2. Approve using the guidelines set forth by the IRS for reimbursing mileage cost incurred while on official Presbytery business.
- Approve retaining McEndarffer, Hoke & Bernhard, Certified Public Accountants, as Auditors for 1993 for a fee of \$13,500.
- 4. Recommend presbytery approve adjusting and rewriting the current agreement with the Third New Hope Baptist Church using a mortgage and promissory note to replace the land contract with the following terms:
  - a. Principal will be the outstanding balance as of the date of closing;

  - d. Approximately 9 years and 3 months to amortize the balance.

7. Approve requesting Comerica to issue a Visa Charge Card with a limit of \$1000 to the Presbytery of Detroit for Clarissa Piecuch

to use for professional business expenses.

8. Recommend that presbytery approve loaning to the Southminster Church, Taylor, the sum of \$40,915.18, at 5 1/2% interest, monthly payments of \$600, for approximately 6 1/2 years. The loan will be secured with a mortgage and promissary note. These funds will be used to pay off General Assembly Church Extension Fund Loan #1375 for \$21,435.24 and Loan A Fund loan #2675 for \$19,479.94.

- 5. Trumbull Avenue building which was sold to Pilgrim Church, Inc., is now two-monthly payments (\$500 each) and one balloon payment (\$5000) behind in payment.
- 6. The committee is reviewing its processes and procedures, including the forms used and communication with congregations.

# VI. EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres shared with the council the gift which he received at the dinner with the Arab Speaking New Church Development. The denominational seal of the PC(USA) was given to the visiting president of the Egyptian Church.

# OVERTURE TO THE 206TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY (1994) THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH (U.S.A.)

Whereas . . .

...judgments of judicial commissions of sessions and permanent judicial commissions of presbyteries and synods may

be appealed (see D-13.0000);

...a judgment rendered by the Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly is beyond all appeal and stands as the final decision of the denomination on a given matter; ...the Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly acts on behalf of the General Assembly so that its decisions are confirmed by the governing body representative of the whole church;

...the General Assembly, if it cannot confirm a judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission, has the authority to remand it to the commission for further consideration; ...governing bodies have an inherent judicial capacity which can be delegated to a permanent judicial commission but cannot be surrendered without the possibility of review; ...Presbyterian polity does not provide for a separate judicial branch of government;

...the Constitution of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. did provide for accountability of the Permanent Judicial Commission to the General Assembly;

...a similar practice was followed in the Presbyterian Church in the United States up until the time of reunion;

...it seems prudent to reinstate this procedure in order to provide a more representative judgment in matters of controversy for the denomination;

"Therefore, the Presbytery of Detroit, in stated session on , respectfully overtures the 206th General Assembly (1994) to send the following proposed amendment to the Constitution to the presbyteries for their affirmative or negative replies:"

Shall rules of Discipline be amended in Chapter 8, Section 16, Paragraph a. (D-8.1600a.) by inserting the words "of a presbytery or synod" following the words "permanent judicial commission" so that the paragraph reads:

"The decision of a session or a permanent judicial commission of a presbytery or synod becomes a final judgment when a copy of the written decision is signed by the clerk or moderator of the session or commission."

And shall the Rules of Discipline be amended by adding the following sentence to Chapter 8, Section 16, Paragraph a. (D-8.1600a.):

"The decision of the Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly in any case committed to it shall be held to be the preliminary judgment in that case and shall be binding upon each party therein until the General Assembly shall hear and either confirm or reject the preliminary judgment."

so that the full paragraph (at D-8.1600a.) shall read:

"The decision of a session or a permanent judicial commission of a presbytery or synod becomes a final judgment when a copy of the written decision is signed by the clerk or moderator of the session or commission. The decision of the Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly in any case committed to it shall be held to be the preliminary judgment in that case and shall be binding upon each party therein until the General Assembly shall hear and either confirm or reject the preliminary judgment."

And shall the Rules of Discipline be amended by adding the following section to Chapter 8 , Section 16, noted as paragraph b. and relettering subsequent paragraphs:

\*Presentation of Preliminary Judgment to General Assembly
b. The procedure in connection with the presentation to the
General Assembly of the preliminary judgment of the Permanent
Judicial Commission, and of a dissenting opinion or opinions,
if any, shall be as follows:

- (1) The Moderator, when announcing that the General Assembly is about to sit in a judicial capacity, shall declare that only such commissioners who are present at the moment shall be eligible to vote upon the preliminary judgments presented. The Moderator shall then order all persons who are not commissioners, officers of the General Assembly, or members of the Permanent Judicial Commission, to depart from the floor and from the platform of the General Assembly, and shall take efficient measures to the end that during the report of the Permanent Judicial Commission no person shall either enter upon the floor or platform or depart therefrom.
- (2) The preliminary judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission, and the dissenting opinion or opinions, if any, shall be read to the General Assembly.
- (3) No member of the Commission shall argue for or against the judgment of the Commission or for or against any dissenting opinion in any case, nor in any manner participate in the proceedings of the General Assembly relating thereto.
- (4) The Moderator of the General Assembly, immediately after the reading of the preliminary judgment of the Commission and the reading of the dissenting opinion or opinions, if any, shall put the question as follows: "Shall the preliminary judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission be made the final judgment of the General Assembly?"
- (5) Immediately after the putting of the question, the General Assembly, without debate, shall vote.

- (6) If a majority of the General Assembly vote to confirm, the Moderator shall declare that the preliminary judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission is now the final judgment of the General Assembly, and the case is therewith closed.
- (7) If the General Assembly shall fail to confirm by a majority vote a preliminary judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission, the case shall be automatically recommitted to the Commission for a rehearing, and the General Assembly shall appoint a committee of not more than five persons to represent it before the Commission in further consideration of the case. If a second judgment of the Commission be likewise rejected, the case shall go over a year without further action, and the succeeding General Assembly shall determine on the second day of its sessions whether to recommit the case to a special judicial commission or to try the case itself sitting in its judicial capacity."

Current compensation to be reduced by remuneration received from other employment. Continuing compensation to be paid out of Mission Program Grant.

- 5. Dissolve the pastoral relationship between the Rev. Lawrence Chamberlain and First Church, Northville, effective January 1, 1994, that he might receive the call of the Morris Plains Church, New Jersey; and transfer him to Newton Presbytery upon their request.
- 6. Dissolve the pastoral relationship between the Rev. Peter Bower and Drayton Avenue Church, Ferndale, effective November 30, 1993, that he might accept the call of First Church, Babylon, New York; and transfer him to the Presbytery of Long Island upon their request.
- 7. Dissolve the designated pastor relationship between the Rev. Peter Moore and the Greenfield Church, Berkley, December 31, 1993, and approve his call as Pastor, effective January 1, 1994, with the following terms of call: Salary \$10,800; Housing \$15,750; Expense Allowance \$10,500; FICA \$2,031; Full pension; Medical deductible, 1 month vacation, including 4 Sundays and 2 weeks study leave, including 2 Sundays. AA/EEO guidelines of the denomination have been followed during the search process.

- 8. Validate the ministry of the Rev. Ernest Krug as Director of the Center for Human Development at Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak, upon receipt of his job description by the Chair of the Committee on Ministry.
- 9. Dismiss the Rev. Donald Nepstead to Milwaukee Presbytery upon their request and grant him permission to labor outside bounds of this presbytery pending dismissal.
- 10. Approve the following Administrative Commission to install the Rev. Peter Moore as Pastor on January 16, 1993, 11:00 a.m. at Berkley, Greenfield Church: Elders Helen Morrison, Grosse Ile; Bernard Walker, Detroit, Hope; Thomas Hule, Berkley, Greenfield; and Clergy Ruth Poisson, T. Andrew Kim, Alfred Baliad, Roland Keebler, and Thomson Heinrichs.
- 11. That whereas we are appreciative of the Rev. Milton Henry's attitude that acknowledges his mistakes in ministry that have done harm to the peace and unity of the Presbytery, we continue to ask, that as an outward sign of this change in attitude, that Mr. Henry cease and desist in his work at Christ Presbyterian Church by the deadline previously established by presbytery (December 1, 1993).
- 12. Appoint the Committee on Ministry an Administrative Commission with authority under G-11.0502h; to appoint moderators of vacant churches; approve ordination and installation commissions; enroll ministers upon transfer from other presbyteries between the November and January meetings of the Presbytery, and further refer this matter to Planning and Structure Committee for change in Presbytery Bylaws to give this authority.

The committee reports the following actions to presbytery:

The terms of call for the approved (October presbytery meeting) interim pastor contract between the Rev. Edith Gause and Ecorse Church, are reported as follows: effective November 4, 1993, for 12 months, with the following terms: Salary \$26,700; Value of Manse \$8,010; Social Security \$2,655; Travel reimbursed at \$.28 per mile; Study allowance \$700; Full pension; Medical deductible \$1,121; plus 30 days additional medical and pension, if needed; 1 month vacation, including 4 Sundays, 2 weeks study leave per year, pro-rated over the life of this contract. Any party to the contract may terminate with two month's notice.

# G. METROPOLITAN MISSION

Peter Moore reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that presbytery:

- Endorse the Faith and Resistance Retreat to take place in the Detroit area during Pentecost Weekend, May 20-23, 1994.
- Invite the Rev. Jane Sparr to visit the Presbytery of Detroit between May 20-24, 1994 to continue to promote the dialogue called for by the 1993 (205th) General Assembly.

The presbytery was recessed for the Annual Meeting of the Corporation.

# IV. ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CORPORATION

The annual meeting of the corporation was opened with prayer by Vice-President Stanley King. Minutes were recorded by corporate secretary, Edward Gehres. The presbytery elected the members of Council as Trustees. Treasurer Wilma Dellinger presented the audit report on the 1992 financial records. It was approved. Stanley King closed the meeting with prayer.

The presbytery was reconvened following the corporation meeting.

# V. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MODERATOR

Moderator Van Til reported on his part in the activities of presbytery during the past year. He reflected on how the short tenure of the moderator affects their work and effectiveness. However, the moderator can contribute a great deal to the spirit and the life of the presbytery, and to the atmosphere which exists. Mr. Van Til believes that we need to adopt new ways of working in collegiality without being confrontational. We need to support our ministers, both emotionally and intellectually, and our elder presbyters.

Moderator Van Til restated the six goals he set out for his year

as moderator and he spoke to each of them.

## VI. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres expressed his delight at the call and installation of Clarisa Piecuch as Associate Executive of the presbytery. It has taken three years to reach this place, as it was exactly three years ago that the presbytery began to loose executive staff as they found new and different avenues for their talents. He spoke of the historical staffing patterns of the presbytery. of the new staff design, we now have new and different staffing patterns which affect the working of patterns upon the presbytery. Mr. Gehres asked for the prayers and suggestions of the presbyters as the presbytery moves into a new, exciting and fertile time.

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported that the process of scheduling introductory meetings for pastors to become acquainted with Associate Executive Piecuch and for her to meet them has already begun. Parish pastors have been invited to attend meetings scheduled for November and December. Other pastors on the roll will be invited to meet her at times sensitive to their needs.

# VII. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY A. EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

Craig Aue reported for the committee. Applications for 1994 grants will be sent to churches. The deadline for return is January 30.

Mr. Aue presented Vernita Storehouse, Greenfield Church, Berkley, who reported how Greenfield Church used and benefited from the grant from presbytery. Ms. Storehouse thanked the presbytery for the grant and reported that the projects funded have helped church attendance to double and that 80 people have joined the church since 1990.

# B. METROPOLITAN MISSION

James Beates reported for the Social Justice and Peacemaking Focus Group of Metropolitan Mission. He alerted presbyters to watch for an overture calling for changes in the Directory for Worship on services of healing and wholeness at the January meeting of presbytery.

He reported that 44 of the 90 persons attending the Synod Retreat for people living with HIV/AIDS were from our presbytery. He thanked the Presbytery of Detroit and the churches for supporting the event.

As Peace Enabler, Mr. Beates reported that Wayne, First; Sterling Heights, Utica; Grosse Pointe Woods, and Fort Gratiot, Lakeshore have signed the Commitment to Peacemaking and that he has certificates from the General Assembly for each church.

# C. MISSION INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP

Francile Anderson reported for Mission Interpretation and Stewardship. She reported that the Mission Yearbook for Prayer and Study is being printed and will be distributed upon arrival.

# D. RACIAL ETHNIC CONCERNS

William Gepford and Anthony Patrick reported on the Racial Ethnic Convocation held in San Antonio, Texas, and on the work of the committee. We need to sensitize our congregations and aid them in becoming culturally sensitive. Our congregational growth depends on how we accept new persons into our congregations.

## E. PRESBYTERIAN VILLAGE

Roger Myers reported for Presbyterian Villages of Michigan. He reported that there are five Presbyterian Village retirement communities, each operated by its own Board of Trustees: Presbyterian Village Redford, Presbyterian Village East, Presbyterian Village North, Presbyterian Village Westland, and Presbyterian Village Holly. There are over 1200 residents in the villages and that the average age is 82, 2/3 of which are presbyterians or presbyterian family members. 30% receive financial support. He wishes to renew and redefine the presbyterian relationship between the villages and the Presbytery of Detroit. Mr. Myers highlighted several events that are upcoming at the villages.

# F. EDUCATION AND NURTURE

Gordon Mikoski, Nancy Mikoski and Steven Melde reported on the Motor-City Mission Mania ecumenical mission project sponsored by the Presbytery of Detroit. Slides and narration gave presbyters a close-up look at the event which took place in June 1993. There were 135 youth and their adult sponsors from Michigan, Virginia, New York,

Iowa, Ohio, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, and Texas here to participate in the project. The young people were united to serve Christ, Detroit, and each other.

VIII. SHARING OUR LIFE: EXPERIENCES, JOYS AND CONCERNS Members of the presbytery lifted up and shared the joys and concerns that were experienced during the past month.

## IX. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the presbytery, the meeting was adjourned by moderator Van Til at 9:40 p.m. with prayer encompassing those concerns and joys which had been shared and for the work of the presbytery.

The next stated meeting of the presbytery will convene Tuesday, January 25, 1994, at Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian Church.

# E. PROPERTY AND INVESTMENTS COMMITTEE

Stan King reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that council:

- 1. Pending Congregational approval and the receipt of an appraisal or comparable listings of property in the area, approve the request made by Detroit, Fort Street Presbyterian Church to purchase on a land contract Lots 7, 8, and the westerly 1/2 of lot 9, Block 21, Cass Farms with an address of 526-42 W. Fort Street, Detroit. The following terms apply to this transaction: purchase price of \$278,000, downpayment of \$30,000, interest at 7% for a period of 15 years, with an annual principal payment of \$16,533.33 plus accrued interest due at the time of the payment.
- 2. Approve loaning to the Westland, Kirk of Our Savior Church up to \$35,000 at 5.5% interest for a period of 15 years, secured by a mortgage and promissory note. Checks to retire the General Assembly loan and the Synod of the Covenant loan will be made payable to the respective lenders directly from Presbytery, and the balance of the loan will be issued as capital improvements and office equipment purchases are made.

The following information was made available to the council:

 Pontiac, First Presbyterian Church received permission in 1989 to borrow up to \$350,000 at the best available interest. The Church has reported that a commercial loan was secured from National Bank of Detroit for \$54,000 at 6% interest. All other expenses for the project were covered without additional borrowing.

2. Jesse Bacalis was consulted regarding a proposed agreement between participating planned development parties and the Hartland Township's planned development district code sections. Bacalis advised the Presbytery "not to sign until an absolute clarification of what responsibilities McMasters (seller) is asking Presbytery to assume or to agree to share in." Jesse suggested that the Trustees should have a discussion with McMasters and his attorney to ascertain what they are trying to do.

Motion was sustained directing the Property and Investments Committee to develop standard policies for the work of the committee and for council to review the policies.

# III. STANDING COMMITTEES (Part I) A. METROPOLITAN MISSION

Peter Moore reported for the committee. Motion was sustained that the council endorse the Youth on the move for Jesus Christ, enabling them to receive support from the denomination.

# IV. ANNUAL STAFF REPORT

Richard Grant presented his annual staff report as the manager of the presbytery's outdoor ministries. He explained the areas in which the ministries are offered and the number of persons served in each category. COUNCIL MINUTES, NOVEMBER 9, 1993, page 4

# V. ADJUNCT UNITS A. ECUMENICAL DECADE

Jenny Schram reported for the Ecumenical Decade Committee. A copy of correspondence with the Metropolitan Mission Committee, about becoming a focus group of that committee, is being sent to the council. Council postponed taking any action until the letter can be distributed to the council members.

# VI. STANDING COMMITTEES (Part II) A. COMMITTEE ON MINISTRY

William Schram left a report for the council that a sub-committee is working on redrafting the presbytery's Sexual Misconduct Policy.

## B. CHURCH STRATEGY

Tom Hartley reoported for the committee. Motion was sustained that council approve and recommend that presbytery approve changing the focus of its Bicentennial Fund project entitled "redevelopment pastor at-large" to permit the funding to be used to support the costs of redevelopment in various congregations, rather than to support the hiring of a single pastor for a limited time.

# VII. EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported on the presbytery-wide demographics study the council previously approved. The contract has been signed and the process has begun.

# VIII. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business, the council was adjourned with prayer at 6:51 p.m.

### Worship at Meetings of the Presbytery of Detroit (Approved by Council on 6 December 1989) (Amended November 1993)

### I. PURPOSE

As one of our confessional standards, the Westminster Shorter Catechism affirms that our chief end is to glorify and enjoy God forever (C-7.001). The primary purpose of our worship, therefore, is to express our sheer delight in God, by striving to be faithful to:

- -God's Word revealed in Christ through Scripture,
- -the Reformed faith,
- -the tradition of the church.
- -and the life of this Presbytery in this time and place.

Such worship shapes our identity and mission as the body of Christ.

- II. GUIDELINES FOR THE PLANNING AND CONDUCT OF WORSHIP
- 1. The authoritative constitutional document ordering the worship of this Presbytery is the Directory for Worship of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).
- 2. Planners should be mindful of the service most appropriate for the season of the church year, the day, the time of day, the place, and the occasion.
- 3. Each service shall be rooted in Scripture, sensitive to the issues of the day, and open to the guidance of the Holy Spirit.
- 4. Since worship is our response to God's initiative-embodying praise, prayer, the proclamation of God's word, and grateful response--planners shall refrain from the temptation to use worship to promote particular causes or Presbytery programs.
- 5. Each service should encourage active participation by the worshipers, so that worship will not be a spectator activity.
- 6. Liturgical leadership and style should reflect the gift of diversity as well as the diverse gifts among Presbyterians.
- 7. The language of worship shall be inclusive, displaying a sensitivity to varied figures of speech that reflect our belief in a covenanting God, the limitations as well as the richness of human imagery in language about God, and diversity among Presbyterians.
- 8. Music and other art forms (e.g., drama, dance, visual arts, mime) should be integrated with the liturgy.

## OVERTURE TO THE 206TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY (1994) THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH (U.S.A.)

### Whereas...

...judgments of judicial commissions of sessions and permanent judicial commissions of presbyteries and synods may

be appealed (see D-13.0000);

...a judgment rendered by the Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly is beyond all appeal and stands as the final decision of the denomination on a given matter; ...the Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly acts on behalf of the General Assembly so that its decisions are confirmed by the governing body representative of the whole church;

...the General Assembly, if it cannot confirm a judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission, has the authority to remand it to the commission for further consideration; ...governing bodies have an inherent judicial capacity which can be delegated to a permanent judicial commission but cannot be surrendered without the possibility of review; ...Presbyterian polity does not provide for a separate judicial branch of government;

...the Constitution of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. did provide for accountability of the Permanent Judicial Commission to the General Assembly;

...a similar practice was followed in the Presbyterian Church in the United States up until the time of reunion; ...it seems prudent to reinstate this procedure in order to provide a more representative judgment in matters of controversy for the denomination;

"Therefore, the Presbytery of Detroit, in stated session on respectfully overtures the 206th General Assembly (1994) to send the following proposed amendment to the Constitution to the presbyteries for their affirmative or negative replies:"

Shall rules of Discipline be amended in Chapter 8, Section 16, Paragraph a. (D-8.1600a.) by inserting the words "of a presbytery or synod" following the words "permanent judicial commission" so that the paragraph reads:

"The decision of a session or a permanent judicial commission of a presbytery or synod becomes a final judgment when a copy of the written decision is signed by the clerk or moderator of the session or commission."

And shall the Rules of Discipline be amended by adding the following sentence to Chapter 8, Section 16, Paragraph a. (D-8.1600a.):

"The decision of the Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly in any case committed to it shall be held to be the preliminary judgment in that case and shall be binding upon each party therein until the General Assembly shall hear and either confirm or reject the preliminary judgment."

"The decision of a session or a permanent judicial commission of a presbytery or synod becomes a final judgment when a copy of the written decision is signed by the clerk or moderator of the session or commission. The decision of the Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly in any case committed to it shall be held to be the preliminary judgment in that case and shall be binding upon each party therein until the General Assembly shall hear and either confirm or reject the preliminary judgment."

And shall the Rules of Discipline be amended by adding the following section to Chapter 8, Section 16, noted as paragraph b. and relettering subsequent paragraphs:

"presentation of Preliminary Judgment to General Assembly
b. The procedure in connection with the presentation to the
General Assembly of the preliminary judgment of the Permanent
Judicial Commission, and of a dissenting opinion or opinions,
if any, shall be as follows:

- (1) The Moderator, when announcing that the General Assembly is about to sit in a judicial capacity, shall declare that only such commissioners who are present at the moment shall be eligible to vote upon the preliminary judgments presented. The Moderator shall then order all persons who are not commissioners, officers of the General Assembly, or members of the Permanent Judicial Commmission, to depart from the floor and from the platform of the General Assembly, and shall take efficient measures to the end that during the report of the Permanent Judicial Commission no person shall either enter upon the floor or platform or depart therefrom.
- (2) The preliminary judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission, and the dissenting opinion or opinions, if any, shall be read to the General Assembly.
- (3) No member of the Commission shall argue for or against the judgment of the Commission or for or against any dissenting opinion in any case, nor in any manner participate in the proceedings of the General Assembly relating thereto.
- (4) The Moderator of the General Assembly, immediately after the reading of the preliminary judgment of the Commission and the reading of the dissenting opinion or opinions, if any, shall put the question as follows: "Shall the preliminary judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission be made the final judgment of the General Assembly?"
- (5) Immediately after the putting of the question, the General Assembly, without debate, shall vote.

- (6) If a majority of the General Assembly vote to confirm, the Moderator shall declare that the preliminary judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission is now the final judgment of the General Assembly, and the case is therewith closed.
- (7) If the General Assembly shall fail to confirm by a majority vote a preliminary judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission, the case shall be automatically recommitted to the Commission for a rehearing, and the General Assembly shall appoint a committee of not more than five persons to represent it before the Commission in further consideration of the case. If a second judgment of the Commission be likewise rejected, the case shall go over a year without further action, and the succeeding General Assembly shall determine on the second day of its sessions whether to recommit the case to a special judicial commission or to try the case itself sitting in its judicial capacity."
