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# MINUTES OF THE JANUARY 25, 1994 STATED MEETING PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

# JEFFERSON AVENUE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, DETROIT

#### I. THE GATHERING

## A. THE MODERATOR

A quorum being present, the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was convened in stated session on Tuesday, January 25, 1994, at 5:30 p.m. at the Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan. The meeting was opened with prayer by Lawrence Van Til, Chairperson of Council.

Mr. Van Til welcomed new commissioners and ministers. Steve

Voorhees was appointed Assistant to the Stated Clerk.

#### B. THE STATED CLERK

Stated Clerk Jenny Schram presented Part I of her report and motions were sustained that presbytery:

1. DOCKET. Adopt the docket as presented.

- 2. EXCUSES. Excuse all continuing members who have asked to be excused and all elder members of Council who have asked to be excused. The complete roll is found in Attachment One.
- 3. CORRESPONDING MEMBERS. Without further motions, seat as corresponding members all eligible persons who are presented to the Presbytery and who register on the enrollment sheet for corresponding members.

#### C. WELCOME BY HOST PASTOR

The Rev. Brian Hamilton, Associate Pastor welcomed the presbytery on behalf of the members and friends of Jefferson Avenue Church. He was particularly pleased to welcome the presbytery for the installation of the Rev. Peter Smith, Pastor of Jefferson Avenue Church as moderator of the presbytery. Mr. Hamilton highlighted the life and ministry of the Jefferson Avenue Church.

FOR INFORMATION: Mr. Van Til reported that the he received a letter of protest with respect to the debate and vote of the action taken at the November 1993 stated meeting of Presbytery concerning The Rev. Milton Henry. The letter has been answered.

# II. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY (PART I) A. EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

Craig Aue reported for the committee. Mr. Aue highlighted the committee's program of funding for churches to do special new projects in the area of evangelism and outreach. Applications for the 1994 evangelism grants are due now.

Mr. Aue presented Sterling Heights, Utica Church and Brandon Township, Faith (N.C.D.) with certificates for adopting the Commitment to Evangelism. He recognized all churches that signed the Commitment to Evangelism in 1993.

Elder Terry Styles shared evangelism projects that Taylor, Southminster Church did in 1993 with the help of the evangelism grant program. As a part of the report, a group of children and adults performed a song, "Love in Any Language" that was written in celebration of the evangelism projects of the church.

- c. A complaint against members of presbytery has been received. Moderator Smith, in accordance with the <u>Book of Order</u> and the bylaws of the presbytery has appointed sdc 93.04: Rev. Ruth Billington, Elder Evelyn Baker (Garden City), Rev. Sherwood Anderson.
- d. A complaint has been filed against a member of presbytery.
   Moderator Smith, in accordance with the <u>Book of Order</u> and the presbytery bylaws is in the process of appointing special disciplinary committee 94.02.
   e. A letter was received from the Detroit, Calvin (West) Church.
- e. A letter was received from the Detroit, Calvin (West) Church.
  The session and congregation has shown interest in working
  with the presbytery in three areas.

The interest in seeking permission to speak with a neighboring congregation regarding merger was referred to the Committee on Church Strategy.

The interest in dissolving the pastoral relationship has been referred to the Committee on Church Strategy.

The third interest is for the presbytery to "explore the possibilities of establishing another ministry at Calvin's present location." Motion was sustained that this be referred to the Committee on Church Strategy and the Property & Investments Committee of Council.

# B. THE TREASURER

Treasurer Wilma Dellinger reported that the books will be closed January 31, 1994 so that the 1993 audit may be taken. She stated that the per capita assessment is due in January and requested that the churches pay it as soon as possible.

Moderator Peter Smith assumed moderating the meeting.

#### C. COUNCIL

Lawrence Van Til reported for Council. Motions were sustained that presbytery:

1. Receive the minutes of December 14, 1993, and January 11, 1994, as the record of all that was transacted at those meetings and order them printed as an appendix to the minutes. (Appendices B & C)

Approve the request of Alma College to solicit congregations within the Presbytery of Detroit for contributions to the capital building campaign to construct a new center for the performing arts on the college campus; and communicate the following to Alma College along with the presbytery's action:

We understand the need of Alma College to solicit capital funds contributions from the Presbyterian churches in Michigan to meet the requirements of the Kresge Foundation for a grant to construct a performing arts center. While we have no major objections to another solicitation, we are concerned that

- a. Alma College conducted the first solicitation of the Presbyterian congregations without the prior approval of the Presbytery of Detroit;
- b. the current consultation with presbyteries was again carried out on such a short timeline; and
- c. we are further concerned about the possible effect this solicitation will have on General Mission giving at this time.

We therefore respectfully request that representatives of Alma College involved in making these solicitations clearly indicate to those churches being approached that contributions to this project, whether from individuals or from congregations, are intended to be over and above General Mission support to the denomination, and are not eligible for inclusion under the Bicentennial Fund.

## E. COMMITTEE ON PREPARATION FOR MINISTRY

Steve Melde reported for the committee.

1. The following individuals had an annual consultation (G14. 03091) and the committee voted to continue them in the status indicated:

2. The following candidates have met with the committee for the final assessment (G-14.0309c4) and have been granted permission to seek a call: Douglas Learned and Barb O'Day

3. Upon recommendation of the committee a motion was sustained to enroll Rebecca Dean (Birmingham, Northbrook) as an Inquirer under

the care of the presbytery.

4. Upon recommendation of the committee, presentation of a statement of faith, and opportunity being given for questions from the presbytery, a motion was sustained that Julia Robinson-Harrold (Detroit, St. John's) be enrolled as a candidate under the care of the Presbytery of Detroit. Chairperson Van Til asked the constitutional questions, which were answered in the affirmative. Mr. Van Til offered a brief charge and Steve Melde offered a prayer of thanksgiving.

5. Upon recommendation of the committee motion was sustained that presbytery, in accordance with G-14.0313, waive the requirement of courses in Hebrew and Greek for candidate Douglas Learned.

Rationale:

The committee has had lengthly discussion with Mr. Learned concerning his difficulties with language courses. Mr. Learned underwent testing which revealed a learning disability which affects his ability to learn languages. Specifically his disability lies in the area of character recognition, retention, and in visual processing speed time.

As an alternate to learning the languages through language courses Mr. Learned has done additional exegetical coursework in which he demonstrated proficiency in doing good and proper exegetical work leading to interpretation of Biblical texts. The Committee on Preparation for Ministry is satisfied and confident that Mr. Learned has the skills and ability to use exegetical tools.

Mr. Learned has taken and passed all the ordination examinations, including Biblical Exegesis.

#### F. COMMITTEE ON MINISTRY

Tony Patrick reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that presbytery:

#### INTERIMS AND STATED SUPPLIES

- Approve the Parish Associate relationship between First Church, Birmingham, and the Rev. Ernest Krug, a non-salaried position of resource to adult education programs, and leader of monthly chapel services for healing and wholeness and participation in pastoral care.
- 2. Approve the part-time Parish Associate relationship between Faith Community Church, Novi and the Rev. J. Cyrus Smith, for one year, effective 1/1/94, with the following terms: Salary \$7,696; Housing \$8,840; Pension \$1,860; Medical deductible \$465; Auto/Travel \$1,872; Study allowance \$208; One month vacation, including 4 Sundays; Two weeks study leave.
- 3. Approve the full-time Stated Supply relationship between Community Church, Orchard Lake and the Rev. Jennifer McLaren-Saad for twelve months beginning January 1,1994, with the following terms: Salary \$20,889; Housing \$18,000; FICA \$3,221; Study allowance \$1,000; Car allowance \$3,600; Full Pension; Medical Deductible; One month vacation, including 4 Sundays; two weeks study leave, pro-rated over the life of the contract. This covenant may be terminated by 30 days notice by any of the parties.

CALLS, DISSOLUTIONS, AND TRANSFERS

- 4. Grant the status of Honorably Retired to the Rev. Gerald Cobleigh, effective March 6, 1994.
- 5. Approve dissolution of pastoral relationship between the Rev. Delmar Meester and the Littlefield Church, Dearborn, effective February 3, 1994, and grant Mr. Meester permission to labor inside bounds of Chicago Presbytery at their request.
- 6. Approve the call of the Hope Church, Detroit, to the Rev. M. Coleman Gilchrist as pastor, effective March 1, 1994, with the following terms: Salary \$23,722; Housing \$6,850; Auto allowance \$3,000; Book allowance \$300; Medical \$903; Continuing education \$1,000; FICA \$2,339; Full pension; One month vacation, including 4 Sundays, Two weeks study leave. AA/EEO guidelines of the denomination have been followed during the search process. Enroll Mr. Gilchrist as a member of Presbytery upon receipt of his credentials from the Presbytery of Charlotte.
- 7. Move the Rev. Kevin Johnson to the member at-large roll.
- 8. Approve the call of Lake Shore Church, St. Clair Shores, to Kevin Piecuch as Associate Pastor, upon his ordination, effective March 1, 1994, with the following annual terms: Salary \$9,100; Manse allowance \$18,400; Tax-deferred annuity \$2,000; Medical/Dental Reimbursement \$500; FICA 7.65%; Pension Plan; Professional Expenses \$3,400; One month vacation, including 4 Sundays; Two weeks study leave. AA/EEO guidelines of the denomination have been followed during the search process. Enroll Mr. Piecuch as a member of Presbytery upon his ordination.
- Dissolve the pastoral relationship between Calvin (West) Church, Detroit, and the Rev. William Kight, effective February 14, 1994, and transfer Mr. Kight to Maumee Valley Presbytery upon their request.
- 10. Close the position of Associate Pastor at the Southfield, Southfield Church.

The committee reports the following actions taken under the authority that has been granted to it:

 Dissolved the pastoral relationship between Community Church, Orchard Lake, and the Rev. Philip Hazelton, effective December 31, 1993, and transferred him to the Presbytery of Scioto Valley, at their request.

- Transferred the Rev. Janet Sonnanburg, to the Presbytery of North Puget Sound, at their request.
- 3. Approved the following Installation Commission to install the Rev. Arthur W. Canada as designated pastor at Grandale Church of the Master, Detroit, January 15, 1994: Clergy: Edward Gehres, Jr., Kathryn Thoresen. Elders: Yolanda Truitt (Detroit, Grandale), Roberta Cottman (Detroit, Westminster), Moderator Lawrence VanTil (Grosse Pointe Memorial); with Antonio Lawrence, New Hope Presbytery, seated as a corresponding member.
- 4. Appointed William Schram, Moderator of the Session at Orchard Lake, Community Church.

#### G. METROPOLITAN MISSION

Patrick Thompson reported for the committee. He presented the Organizational Proposal for THE PRESBYTERIAN DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION OF DETROIT for a first reading. The committee will be asking for approval of the document at the February meeting. Presbyters may contact him with questions concerning the proposal prior to the February meeting.

Mr. Thompson reported that the committee is soliciting churches to apply to be part of the 1994-95 urban intern program that is funded through the Bicentennial Funds. The deadline for submitting applications is May 9, 1994. The 1993-94 intern is working in Detroit with the Jefferson Avenue Church and Southwest United.

The Lenten Urban Encounters for 1994 will begin February 17, 1994.

#### H. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH STRATEGY

Gretchen Denton reported for the committee. Upon recommendation of the committee, a motion was sustained that presbytery, through the Moderator, appoint an administrative commission to explore the possibility of merger between Detroit, Calvin (West) Presbyterian Church and Detroit, Westminster Presbyterian Church, said commission to be comprised of:

one elder from Calvin (West) Church, Detroit one elder from Westminster Church, Detroit

two members of the Property & Investments Committee of Council three members of the Committee on Church Strategy.

Ms. Denton reported that on February 28, 1994 a meeting will be held to unpack the demographic study of the presbytery that will unveil the maps and release the information contained in the study.

# IV. ORDER OF THE DAY WORSHIP INCLUDING THE SACRAMENT OF HOLY COMMUNION AND INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS

A Service of Celebration was led by members of the presbytery. The Lessons were: Joel 2:23a, 27, 28 and 1 Corinthians 2:1-10. Moderator Smith preached the sermon "What's Your Vision?" PeterC. Smith, Helen Morrison and Jenny Schram were installed respectively as Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Stated Clerk of the presbytery after answering affirmatively the constitutional questions asked by past-moderator Lawrence Van Til. Mr. Van Til offered a prayer for the work of the newly installed officers of the presbytery. The Sacrament of Communion was celebrated. The Jefferson Avenue Chancel Choir provided music.

Moderator Smith assumed moderating the meeting.

# V. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported that he represented the Presbytery of Detroit at the interfaith prayer service the day of the inauguration of Mayor of Detroit, Dennis Archer. On January 14, 1994 he had lunch with the Mayor and other religious leaders of

Southeastern Michigan. Mr. Gehres is a member of "The Religious Leaders Forum," which arranged for the lunch with the Mayor. The forum membership includes Archbishop Mida, the Episcopal, Methodist and Lutheran Bishops and others.

Mr. Gehres reported that the sanctions on South African policy for investment have been lifted by the PC(USA) and that in November the General Assembly Council agreed to lift the recommended sanctions on South Africa. The request came from the South African Council of Churches.

Executive Presbyter Gehres lifted up for prayer the incredible service provided by the enormous numbers of persons who serve the presbytery in committees that nurture and support the work of the churches in the presbytery. He asked the presbyters to celebrate and pray for all who serve Christ through this presbytery and its structures.

VI. SHARING OUR LIFE: EXPERIENCES, JOYS, CONCERNS
Members of the Presbytery lifted up and shared the joys, and concerns
that were experienced since the presbytery last met.

# VII. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY (PART II) A. ALCOHOL AND DRUG ABUSE TASK FORCE

Lynn Boyle reported for the task force. She spoke for and about children that are born crack-addicted and with fetal alcohol syndrome. The task force is sponsoring a workshop titled, "Give a Day in Lent for a Child...CHILDREN IN CRISIS." that will be held February 26, 1994.

#### B. EDUCATION AND NURTURE

Anna Marie Austin reported for Education and Nurture. Ms. Austin requested that the churches secure a paper titled "DO THIS NOW!!!" from the tables, check the list of Church Educators and update it to reflect the current situation in your church. She stated that Education and Nurture seeks to help each local church be more effective in its ministry. She reminded the presbyters of the upcoming church officer training workshop and urged them to attend.

# VIII. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the presbytery, the meeting was adjourned by Moderator Smith at 8:39 p.m. with prayer by Vice-Moderator Helen Morrison.

The next stated meeting of Presbytery will convene Tuesday, February 22, 1994, at Redford Presbyterian Church, Detroit.

# A. SUMMARY OF THE ROLL

## F. PROPERTY AND INVESTMENTS COMMITTEE

- Approve a loan to White Lake Presbyterian Church effective January 1, 1994 in the amount of \$360,000 to be secured by a first mortgage on the church property; with \$160,000 of the principal being silent (no interest and no payment) for the first five years; with monthly payments of \$2,000 initially, to be increased by \$500 per month every two years until the payments reach \$3,500 per month; with interest at 5.5% until the end of the fifth year when the interest rate will be reviewed. The following was reported for information:

The audit will begin after the first of the year. The Budget and Finance Committee asked to be included in the discussions on the audit. The auditor's conclusions will be brought to the trustees (council) in April or May.

The committee is evaluating the current status of the presbytery's investments as this has not been done for several years.

III. EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported on several celebrations around the presbytery:

- Grandale Presbyterian Church of the Master celebrates the calling of a designated pastor.
- Celtic Cross Church has a 9-minute video they share with visitors to their church.
- The Y.E.S. (year-round experiences in stewardship) program is still alive and active among churches in the presbytery.

A concern was shared with the council over the low balance in the Helping-Hand Fund. Motion was sustained to authorize Executive Gehres to send a letter soliciting contributions to the Helping-Hand Fund.

Staff services is hosting small group gatherings to introduce Clarisa Piecuch to the presbytery. Groups for parish pastors are being organized before the end of the year. Groups for non-parish clergy will be organized around their schedules in the new year. Executive Gehres asked Mrs. Piecuch to share with the council some of the themes she has heard expressed by the pastors in the presbytery.

Executive Gehres raised the question: How do we gather as a community eight times a year for more than just business? Motion was sustained to direct the Steering Committee to take responsibility for beginning a process to review the docket and the gathering of the presbytery for more than just business.

Fran Anderson shared the flood relief program in which Presbyterian Women participate. The program they aided was run from the Parksville Presbyterian Church in Missouri.

A motion was sustained to allow the committee on Ministry to host a pre-presbytery event at the january meeting to share proposed changes in the Sexual Misconduct Policy.

#### B. METROPOLITAN MISSION

Motion was made and seconded to endorse and seek presbytery concurrence for the position of Hunger Action Enabler and a request for \$6,000 grant to fund the poistion. The motion was defeated. A motion was sustained to call a special meeting of presbytery for December 28, 1993, at 12:00p.m. at the First Presbyterian church of Dearborn to decide the issue.

# VII. OTHER BUSINESS

We understand the need of Alma College to solicit capital funds contributions from the Presbyterian churches in Michigan to meet the requirements of the Kresge Foundation for a grant to construct a performing arts center. While we have no major objections to another solicitation, we are concerned that

Alma College conducted the first solicitation of the Presbyterian congregations without the prior approval of the Presbytery of Detroit;

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- b. the current consultation with presbyteries was again carried out on such a short timeline; and
- c. we are further concerned about the possible effect this solicitation will have on General Mission giving and the support of other projects also soliciting funds at this time.

We therefore respectfully request that representatives of Alma College involved in making these solicitations clearly indicate to those churches being approached that contributions to this project, whether from individuals or from congregations, are intended to be over and above General Mission support to the denomination, and are not eligible for inclusion under the Bicentennial Fund.

# F. PROPERTY AND INVESTMENTS COMMITTEE

Stan King reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that council:

- 1. Approve a loan, from the Capital Funds, of up to \$27,000 to the Redford, Michigan, St. James Presbyterian Church. - 2. This permission is contingent upon the church's satisfaction of receiving clear title and that the total of any encumbrance or lien does not exceed the market value of the property as determined by the appraisal received by the church. The Presbytery will alert the church as to the advisability of an environmental study of the land.
- 3. Authorize the Property and Investments Committee to act on behalf of the council in extending a loan to the Calvin (West)
  Presbyterian Church if requested by the congregation and necessary before the next meeting of council, such loan not to exceed \$35,000.

Vice-moderator Helen Morrison assumed moderating the meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Edward Gehres lifted up for celebration new beginnings in the lives of people, in the lives of congregations, and in the lives of communities that the churches of the presbytery minister in:

He noted the beginning of an N.C.D. in Macomb Township, the approval for council to implement establishing an economic development corporation, and the plans for the revitalization of Mt. Clemens, First. Mr. Gehres reported a new beginning for the people in Southwest Detroit, including our Southwest Presbyterian Church. Nineteen congregations of different denominations have agreed to covenant together as the Jermiah Project which will focus on church-based community organizing, helping the people of the community to have a voice through their religious congregations to try to bring new life to the area. Mr. Gehres represented the presbytery at the covenanting gathering.

Mr. Gehres lifted up the three individuals who have completed the trials of ordination, and the new beginning this represents for people who have responded to the call of God to become Ministers of the Word and Sacrament.

Mr. Gehres lifted up Myung Ja Yue and the new beginning she embarks upon with the move from Inquirer to Candidate.

Mr. Gehres stated that we need to celebrate with the University Church, Rochester in the calling of Roger Shoup as interim pastor and with Mt. Clemens, First as they call Linda Burger to serve as Designated Pastor of the church. Elders commissioners were asked to go back to their congregations and to share with their sessions they decisions made tonight that have resulted in new beginnings that will bear fruit for the Kingdom of God in metropolitan Detroit.

# VII. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY A. METROPOLITAN MISSION

William Hockey reported on the Family House Project of Metropolitan Mission. Family House is a mission project for families affected by alcohol and other drug addictions. A tape describing the project is available for congregations.

## B. EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

Richard Danielak reported for the committee. He called attention to an Evangelism Workshop being held Saturday, April 23, 1994 and invited the presbyters to attend. He reported that the committee has \$15,000 to distribute as evangelism grants to the churches, however he has received requests for \$40,000 from 24 churches. The grants will be awarded in March. Elder Anne Steinhouse reported on the video produced by Celtic Cross Church sponsored in part by an evangelism grant from the presbytery in 1993. The video is given to first time visitors to Celtic Cross Church.

#### C. OUTDOOR MINISTRIES

Dick Grant reported for the committee. He provided an update on the plans for the redevelopment of Howell Center. He pointed out that the 1994 camping brochures are ready and should be picked up by the churches. He announced some incentives for attending the Presbytery Summer Camps. Mr. Grant introduced Terry Taylor, summer camp director. Mr. Taylor is willing to go out to the congregations to speak about the camps. Bulletin inserts will be sent to churches describing the camping program.

Moderator Smith resumed moderating the meeting.

# Overture 94- . On Developing Liturgies for Use in Ministries with Victims and those who Victimize--From the Presbytery of Detroit

- WHEREAS, the church, today and throughout history, is called to a ministry of healing, following the example of Our Lord, Jesus Christ; and
- 2. WHEREAS, in our broken world, there are ever increasing numbers of people, both in our congregations and in our wider community, who are victims of sexual, physical and emotional violence and abuse; oppression based on race, gender, disabilities and sexual orientation; and accidents, physical and mental illness and addictions; and
- 3. WHEREAS, the spiritual violence experienced by such victims can result in confusion, a loss of faith and trust, and alienation from God, self and the church community; and
- 4. WHEREAS, the expectation of an easy, immediate forgiveness and wholeness may be damaging to victims and offenders alike; and
- 5. WHEREAS, the church often finds itself ill-equipped to respond appropriately to these victims, thereby participating in silence and denial; and
- 6. WHEREAS, in order to be truly redemptive in healing victims and offenders, the church must offer and encourage the use of liturgies and rituals which acknowledge wounds as well as sins; understand that confession, repentance and forgiveness hold different meanings for the abused and the abuser; seek justice; mourn the losses; and call upon and celebrate the healing power of God; and
- 7. WHEREAS, the community of faith ever remembers the victimization of Jesus Christ, experiences his companionship and rejoices in the unique, transcendent power of his presence in our midst; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Presbytery of Detroit meeting on February 22, 1994, respectfully overtures the 206th General Assembly (1994) to direct the Christian Faith and Life Area in the Congregational Ministry Unit to develop appropriate liturgies and resources that will assist congregations in their ministries to victims of violence, abuse and oppression and to those who victimize; and that if necessary, appropriate amendments to the Constitution be developed which will address these issues from the perspective of the Reformed Tradition.

Overture 94- . On Amending the General Assembly Standing Rules Section 31 Regarding the Election of a Stated Clerk - From the Presbytery of Detroit.

- 1. WHEREAS, the current term of office of the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly expires at the conclusion of the 208th General Assembly in 1996; and
- 2. WHEREAS, the Standing Rules of the General Assembly currently provide for the election of the Stated Clerk to take place at the 208th General Assembly and for such person to take office at the conclusion of the meeting of the 208th General Assembly; and
- 3. WHEREAS, the Standing Rules of the General Assembly do not now provide for any period of transition or orientation for the benefit of a newly elected Stated Clerk if the current Stated Clerk is not reelected; and
- 4. WHEREAS, the persons willing or able to be candidates for the office of Stated Clerk may be reduced because of perceived problems associated with relocation and the winding up of other affairs; and
- 5. WHEREAS, there is now no time provided for the church to celebrate the contributions the current Stated Clerk has made to the life of the Presbyterian Church (USA); therefore, be it
  - RESOLVED, that the Presbytery of Detroit meeting on February 22, 1994, respectfully overtures the 206th General Assembly (1994) to amend Sections 31.a.(1), 31.a.(4), 31.a.(6), 31.b.(1), 31.b.(3), 31.b.(4), 31.b.(5), 31.b.(6), 31.b.(7), 31.c.(1), 31.c.(4) and 31.c.(6) and to add thereto Sections 31.d.(1), (2) and (3) of the Standing Rules of the General Assembly as follows:
- 1. That section 31.a.(1) be amended to delete the words WHICH MEETS ONE YEAR PRIOR TO THE END OF THE TERM OF AN INCUMBENT STATED CLERK and insert the words 206TH before the words GENERAL ASSEMBLY, insert the words AND EVERY FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY THEREAFTER after the words GENERAL ASSEMBLY, and insert the words ANY GENERAL ASSEMBLY before the words WHICH MEETS; and
- 2. That section 31.c.(4) be amended by adding the words STATED CLERK ELECT at the end of such section; and
- 3. That new sections 31.d.(1), 31.d.(2) and 31.d.(3) be added as follows:
  - (1) THE STATED CLERK ELECT SHALL TAKE THE OFFICE OF STATED CLERK AT THE END OF THE MEETING OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY NEXT FOLLOWING THE ELECTION OF THE STATED CLERK ELECT WITHOUT FURTHER ELECTION.
  - (2) THE DUTIES OF THE STATED CLERK ELECT, AFTER ELECTION BUT BEFORE ASSUMING THE OFFICE OF STATED CLERK, SHALL INCLUDE SUCH DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES AS MAY FROM TIME TO TIME BE DELEGATED BY THE STATED CLERK TO THE STATED CLERK ELECT.
  - (3) THE STATED CLERK ELECT SHALL BE PAID FOR THE SERVICES PROVIDED AS STATED CLERK ELECT IN SUCH AMOUNTS AS MAY BE NEGOTIATED BY THE COMMITTEE ON THE OFFICE OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

With such amendments the relevant portions of amended section 31 of the Standing Rules of the General Assembly will read as follows:

31.a.(1). The 206TH General Assembly AND EVERY FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY THEREAFTER, or ANY GENERAL ASSEMBLY which meets following the death, incapacitation, or resignation of a Stated Clerk (see Standing Rule 30.), shall elect a commission from among the commissioners . . . ;

- 31.a.(4) . . . to advertise throughout the church the scheduled election of a Stated Clerk ELECT in such ways as the commission shall determine;
- 31.a.(6). The commission moderator shall make sure that, upon the election of the Stated Clerk ELECT, all papers and records of the commission shall be destroyed . . . ;
- 31.b.(1). Sixty days prior to the convening of the General Assembly that shall elect a Stated Clerk ELECT, the Moderator . . . shall appoint . . . ;
- 31.b.(3). The representative committee so established shall meet as soon as a date and place can be selected. It shall received at that time the papers assembled by the search commission. No additional papers from applicants for the position of Stated Clerk ELECT shall be received by the Representative Committee on Nomination of a Stated Clerk ELECT.
- 31.b.(5). At the conclusion of the last business meeting which ends at least forty eight hours before the time docketed for the election of a Stated Clerk ELECT, this committee shall distribute to the commissioners and . . . shall release . . . no more than two names which it has decided to place in nomination.
- 31.b.(6). The representative committee moderator shall make sure that, upon the election of a State Clerk ELECT, all papers . . . shall be destroyed.
- 31.b.(7). The Representative Committee on Nomination of a Stated Clerk ELECT shall be dissolved upon the election of a Stated Clerk ELECT.
- 31.c.(1). When the General Assembly is ready to elect its Stated Clerk ELECT, the Representative Committee on Nomination of a Stated Clerk ELECT, shall place in nomination the nominee or nominees proposed by it.
- 31.c.(6). The election shall proceed in the same manner as the election of the Moderator (see Standing Rule 25.f. and g.). The stated Clerk ELECT shall take office as soon as practicable after the adjournment of the General Assembly by which elected.
- Section 31.c.(4) will then read as follows:
- 31.c.(4). Each nominee shall affirm willingness to serve as Stated Clerk if elected STATED CLERK ELECT.
- And new sections 31.d.(1), 31.d.(2) and 31.d.(3) shall read as follows:
- 31.d.(1). THE STATED CLERK ELECT SHALL TAKE THE OFFICE OF STATED CLERK AT THE END OF THE MEETING OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY NEXT FOLLOWING THE ELECTION OF THE STATED CLERK ELECT WITHOUT FURTHER ELECTION.
- 31.d.(2). THE DUTIES OF THE STATED CLERK ELECT SHALL INCLUDE SUCH DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES AS MAY FROM TIME TO TIME BE DELEGATED BY THE STATED CLERK TO THE STATED CLERK ELECT.
- 31.d.(3). THE STATED CLERK ELECT SHALL BE PAID FOR THE SERVICES PROVIDED AS STATED CLERK ELECT IN SUCH AMOUNTS AS MAY BE NEGOTIATED BY THE COMMITTEE ON THE OFFICE OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

#### MERGER AGREEMENT

AGREEMENT AND PLAN OF MERGER, made March 28, 1994, between THE WESTMINSTER CHURCH OF DETROIT, a Michigan non-profit ecclesiastical corporation, (hereinafter referred to as "WESTMINSTER"), and CALVIN PRESEYTERIAN CHURCH OF DETROIT, a/k/a Calvin West, a Michigan non-profit ecclesiastical corporation, (hereinafter referred to as "CALVIN");

Both WESTMINSTER and CALVIN are currently organized as non-stock membership corporations according to the faith and polity of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. whose members are the members on the active rolls of WESTMINSTER and CALVIN congregations, which are churches of the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A.

WHEREAS, WESTMINSTER and CALVIN have each separately met in a congregational meeting conducted on March 27, 1994, and agreed to the spirit of this Merger Agreement;

WHEREAS, all the members of WESTMINSTER and CALVIN separate corporations have been duly notified of this proposed Merger Agreement and did adopt this Merger Agreement at a meeting between the churches held on March 27, 1994.

WHEREAS, the Administrative Commission elected by the Presbytery of Detroit on January 25, 1994, and was granted the power to work out a merger agreement between WESTMINSTER and CALVIN congregations, met on March 21, 1994, and formally approved this merger.

For the reasons set forth above, and in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises of the parties hereto, WESTMINSTER and CALVIN shall be merged into THE WESTMINSTER CHURCH OF DETROIT as the surviving corporation, and the parties hereby agree to and adopt the terms and conditions of this merger. The method of effecting this merger is as follows:

- I. <u>SURVIVING CORPORATION</u>. WESTMINSTER and CALVIN congregations shall be merged into WESTMINSTER which shall be the surviving corporation and the legal continuation of both prior corporations. This new merged corporation shall bear the name of THE WESTMINSTER CHURCH OF DETROIT.
- II. <u>BY-LAWS</u>. The current by-laws of WESTMINSTER is the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. Book of Order which shall continue to be the by-laws of the new merged church as they may be amended, altered or repealed as provided by the Book of Order of Presbyterian Church U.S.A.
- III. <u>MEMBERSHIP</u>. The membership of the merged church will consist of all members on the rolls of WESTMINSTER and all members on the rolls of CALVIN.

The Session Minutes, Membership Rolls, and records of weddings, births, baptisms and deaths of CALVIN congregation will become the property of the merged church.

IV. TRUSTEES. The current officers of WESTMINSTER congregation will be the officers of the new merged church. Former CALVIN members will be considered by the Nominating Committee of the merged church for successive slates of officers to be

The Trustees shall have the power identified by the Presbyterian Churches Act 265 of 1909 as amended, and more particularly described as MSA 21.1835, through 21.1837.

- V. ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION. The present Articles of THE WESTMINSTER CHURCH OF DETROIT as amended to date shall continue to be the Articles of Incorporation of the new merged church.
- VI. <u>SUBMISSION OF PLAN TO VOTE</u>. This plan of merger shall be adopted upon receiving the affirmative vote of a majority of the active members present at the meeting of the members of WESTMINSTER and CALVIN congregational meetings.
- VII. THE EFFECTIVE DATE. The effective date of this merger shall be April 10, 1994 for accounting purposes. The actual effective date shall be determined by the date of filing of this Merger Agreement with the Michigan Department of Commerce Corporation and Securities Bureau.

- VIII. EFFECT OF MERGER. Upon merger becoming effective, the following shall occur:
  - A. Title to CALVIN manse property, 14421 Warwick, Detroit, and the CALVIN church site, 14221 Southfield, Detroit, and burial plots owned by CALVIN will be transferred to the Presbytery of Detroit, Inc. who shall be solely responsible for the future disposition of said properties.
  - B. All financial records of CALVIN shall become the property of the Presbytery of Detroit.
  - C. Proceeds from the sale of 14421 Warwick (the manse property) and 14221 Southfield Road (the church property) and burial lots owned by CALVIN if and when sold will be used in the following manner:
    - The priorities for distribution representing invested costs and actual costs shall be repaid in the following priority sequence:
      - (a) Repay the Presbytery of Detroit for all outstanding debts incurred by the congregation of CALVIN;
      - (b) Repay the Presbytery of Detroit for the costs of repairs needed to prepare and list properties for sale;
      - (c) Repay the Presbytery of Detroit for the cost of securing and maintaining the buildings until sale;
      - (d) Pay to the Presbytery Bicentennial Fund an amount equal to CALVIN congregation pledge to the Bicentennial Fund.
    - 2. The remainder of proceeds will be divided on the following percentage basis:
      - (a) One-third (1/3) to WESTMINSTER.
      - (b) Two-thirds (2/3) to the Presbytery of Detroit for use in urban ministry.
  - D. Monies designated to CALVIN from Wills, Trusts, gifts and endowments intended to support the former ministry at 14221 Southfield will go in their entirety to the merged church for use at the direction and discretion of the WESTMINSTER Session. Specifically, the Laurine Warthman Living Trust monies bequeathed to CALVIN will be used first to pay the per capita owed based on the member of CALVIN as reported in December 1992 and 1993, due in 1994 and 1995. The balance will be used at the discretion of the Session of the merged church.
  - E. The merged church will not be responsible for the debts incurred by CALVIN during its life at 14221 Southfield, Detroit, Michigan.

# GATHERED AS THE BODY OF CHRIST WESTMINSTER PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, DETROIT

# I. GATHERED AS THE PEOPLE OF GOD

#### A. THE MODERATOR

A quorum being present, the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was convened in stated session on Tuesday, April 26, 1994, at 5:30 p.m. at the Westminster Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan. The meeting was opened with prayer by Peter Smith, Moderator.

Charles Holek was appointed Assistant to the Stated Clerk. New commissioners and ministers were welcomed by Moderator Smith.

#### B. THE STATED CLERK

Stated Clerk, Jenny Schram presented Part I of her report and motions were sustained that presbytery:

#### C. WELCOME FROM HOST CHURCH

The Rev. David Abbott, Parish Associate, welcomed the presbytery to Westminster Presbyterian Church. He reported that the Rev. William Fuerstenau, Pastor, was recovering from by-pass surgery. Presbytery celebrated with the church on their merger with the Calvin (West) Presbyterian Church.

# II. RELATED ORGANIZATIONS AND PEOPLE A. 1% THEOLOGICAL AID FUND

Stanley Hoffman, a member of the Mission Interpretation and Stewardship Committee, reported that the committee is proud of the participation of the presbytery in the 1% Theological Aid Fund. The presbytery's participation is the best in the Synod of the Covenant. He introduced Dr. David Pierce from Dubuque Seminary. Dr. Pierce related that the 1% Theological Aid Fund has become the only source of financing that the church gives to the 11 theological educational institutions related to the PC(USA). The presidents and deans of the institutions are asked not to solicit the churches for operational costs apart from the fund. He said that 2200 churches out of 11,000 participate in the 1% Fund. He encouraged the support of the churches through the 1% Fund. He presented James Anderson, pastor, Kirk in the Hills, Bloomfield Hills, with a plaque in special recognition of this church being responsible for one of the largest gifts to the Fund in the nation.

# III. MOMENTS OF CELEBRATION AND REMEMBRANCE A. JOYS AND CONCERNS

Members of presbytery lifted up and shared the joys and concerns that were experienced over the past two months.

#### B. EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

Craig Aue reported for the committee. He highlighted the up-coming Evangelism Workshops that have been planned and invited the presbyters to participate in them. He reported that a very successful workshop was held, Saturday, April 23, 1994 at the Lake Shore Church, St. Clair Shores. He presented Fort Street Presbyterian Church, Detroit with a certificate for adopting the Commitment for Evangelism.

Mr. Aue introduced Maceo Coleman III from New Grace N.C.D., Detroit who shared with the presbytery the evangelism project of New Grace N.C.D. that was enabled by a grant from the committee in 1993.

Mr. Gehres asked the presbytery to give time to recognize the ministry of the Calvin West Church, Detroit. He reported on the closing ceremonies of Calvin West.

Mr. Gehres reported that the Synod of the Covenant will meet in Ann Arbor for three days beginning April 27, 1994. The commissioners will visit the Ecumenical Campus Center and International Residence at the University of Michigan, a campus ministry that is funded by the Synod and the Presbytery. They will be served dinner by the Ann Arbor Community Taiwanese Church, NCD that is housed at First Church, Ann Arbor.

The Presbyterian churches of Michigan have donated over \$400,000 to furnishing Presbyterian Hall. Ms. Holmes thanked all who participated in furnishing the Hall. Opportunities for giving to the project are still available.

Anna Marie Austin reported for the committee. The committee wants to help strengthen the ministries already present in local churches. Super Saturday will be held Saturday, September 17, 1994 at Allen Park Presbyterian Church.

The Presbytery of Detroit has been invited to participate in a survey of young adults and requested that churches with a Young Adult Ministry contact the committee to arrange interviews. She asked that the churches who were not at the pre-presbytery event "Reducing the Risk of Child Sexual Abuse" contact the Resource Center to obtain their copy of Reducing the Risk of Child Sexual Abuse."

Peter Smith resumed moderating the meeting.

Motion was sustained to name Stan King, Wilma Dellinger, John Seitz, and Fran Anderson (along with any other interested council members) to form a committee to make recommendations to the next meeting of council on where from the bicentennial funds or presbytery budget the funds will come from to pay the University of Michigan prospectus.

- 2. Grant permission to Calvin (West) to sell the manse located at 14421 Warwick, Detroit, MI, and authorize Property and Investments to lend up to \$10,000 to Calvin Church to ready the property for sale, with all proceeds of the sale to be applied to the outstanding Calvin indebtedness.

APPENDIX A: Amended Standing Rule 31

Insert the following as Standing Rule G.I.c.:

- "c. The Stated Clerk of the General Assembly shall be elected in the manner described in this Standing Rule. No person involved in this procedure as a member of the search commission or the nominating committee or as a person providing staff services to either group, may be considered for nomination to the Office of the Stated Clerk. Nor may any incumbent Stated Clerk eligible for reelection participate in any way in the process described in this Standing Rule.
- (1) The 206th General Assembly and every fourth General Assembly thereafter or any General Assembly which meets following the death, incapacitation, or resignation of a Stated Clerk, shall elect a commission from among the commissioners who had seats at that assembly. The commission shall be organized and shall conduct its business in conformity with G-9.0500 of the Book of Order and Standing Rule E.7.
  - (a) The General Assembly Nominating Committee shall present to the assembly for election as the first order of business on the next to last day of the assembly's session a slate of nominees equal in number to the minimum size required for such a commission (see Book of Order, G-9.0504a).
  - (b) Nominations from the floor shall be in order following the distribution of the printed list of proposed nominees by the General Assembly Nominating Committee and a declaration by the Moderator that the names are in nomination. Names placed in nomination from the floor shall be in opposition to a particular name placed in nomination by the General Assembly Nominating Committee. More than one person may be placed in nomination from the floor in opposition to a nominee of the General Assembly Nominating Committee.
  - (2) The search commission shall receive staff services as appointed by the Moderator in consultation with the Committee on the Office of the General Assembly. The commission moderator shall make sure that, upon the election of a Stated Clerk Elect, all papers and records of the commission shall be destroyed except the 'Administrative Log' of the commission (including copies of blank forms), which shall contain no names of persons applying for or being considered for the position of Stated Clerk. This log shall be preserved for the use of the subsequent commission and shall be deposited with the Department of Histor; of the Office of the General Assembly. The commission so established shall have the following duties:
    - (a) to advertise throughout the church the scheduled election of a Stated Clerk Elect in such ways as the commission shall determine;
    - (b) to approve and make available a form to be used in submitting nominations or making application;
    - (c) to receive such forms and to request the completion of appropriate applications or information forms as it shall consider appropriate;
    - (d) to receive and retain such forms as may be returned by individuals who have been nominated, and to request letters of reference or recommendation from persons listed for such purposes by those suggested for nomination;
    - (e) to assemble the information forms and related references and recommendations, and to present them without further comment or recommendation to the assembly committee (see Standing Rule G.1.c.(3)).
  - (3) Sixty days prior to the convening of the General Assembly that shall elect a Stated Clerk Elect, the Moderator of the preceding General Assembly shall appoint from among the persons chosen by one of the presbyteries to be commissioners to that General Assembly the moderator of an Assembly Committee on Nomination of a Stated Clerk Elect. No later than fifteen days after the appointment of the moderator an assembly committee equal in size to the smallest of the assembly committees for that year's assembly shall be chosen by the random selection process (see Standing Rule C.2.) from among the commissioners whose names have been received in the Office of the Stated Clerk. The Assembly Committee on Nomination of a Stated Clerk Elect shall be dissolved upon the election of a Stated Clerk Elect.

- (a) The assembly committee so established shall meet as soon as a date and place can be selected. It shall receive at that time the papers assembled by the search commission. No additional papers from applicants for the position of Stated Clerk shall be received by the Assembly Committee on Nomination of a Stated Clerk Elect. The assembly committee moderator shall make sure that, upon the election of a Stated Clerk Elect, all papers, including the minutes or administrative records, correspondence, forms, recommendations, references, or any other papers of any kind, shall be destroyed.
- (b) The assembly committee shall establish its meeting schedule and a process for selecting the persons it wishes to interview. The committee may make provision for hearings or interviews during the General Assembly.
- (c) Staff services for this committee shall be provided as appointed by the Moderator in consultation with the Committee on the Office of the General Assembly.
- (d) At the conclusion of the last business meeting which ends at least forty-eight hours before the time docketed for the election of a Stated Clerk Elect, this committee shall distribute to the commissioners and advisory participants, and shall release to the public generally, no more than two names which it has decided to place in nomination.
- (4) When the General Assembly is ready to elect its Stated Clerk Elect, the Assembly Committee on Nomination of a Stated Clerk Elect shall place in nomination the nominee or nominees proposed by it.
  - (a) The Moderator shall then invite nominations from the floor.
  - (b) Whether nominated by the assembly committee or from the floor, only one speech shall be made to nominate each nominee. Such speech shall not exceed five minutes in length. There shall be no speech seconding any nomination.
  - (c) Each nominee shall affirm willingness to serve as Stated Clerk if elected Stated Clerk Elect.
  - (d) After nominations are closed, each nominee shall be afforded an opportunity to address the General Assembly for a time not to exceed five minutes expressing the nominee's views regarding the functions and work of the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly. The order of speaking shall be determined by lot, the drawing being made by the most recent past moderator present.
  - (e) The election shall then proceed in the same manner as the election of the Moderator. The Stated Clerk Elect shall take office as soon as practicable after the adjournment of the session of the General Assembly by which elected.
  - (5) The Stated Clerk Elect shall take the Office of Stated Clerk at the end of the meeting of the General Assembly next following the election of the Stated Clerk Elect without further election.
    - (a) The duties of the Stated Clerk Elect, after election but before assuming the Office of the Stated Clerk, shall include such duties and responsibilities as may from time to time be delegated by the Stated Clerk to the Stated Clerk Elect.
    - (b) The Stated Clerk Elect shall be paid for the services provided as Stated Clerk Elect in such amounts as may be negotiated by the Committee on the Office of the General Assembly."

## Overture 94- . On the HIV/AIDS Crisis and the Church's Response

Whereas, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), has spoken to the whole church through the various governing bodies since 1986 concerning the HIV/AIDS pandemic; and

Whereas, in 1988 the 200th General Assembly in the significant statement "To Meet AIDS with Grace and Truth" confessed that our own church's response to the AIDS pandemic continues to be tardy in spite of evidence that the rate if HIV infection is predicted to double every nine to twelve months (31.066); and

Whereas, the same General Assembly recommended, presbyteries and congregations should use their human and material resources to respond to the AIDS crisis with support groups, counseling, grants, facilities for recreational activities and community organization of persons with AIDS (31.072,6); and

Whereas, the 200th General Assembly also directed the former Social Justice and Peacemaking Unit to produce educational material; and

Whereas, the 202th General Assembly (1990), in response to several overtures, urged the Church to address the problems facing African-American males and AIDS is a leading cause of death among African-American males ages 24-40; and

Whereas, the 203rd General Assembly (1991) received no less than eight similar overtures concerning the growing need for support and a more comprehensive commitment of the nine ministry units, the lower governing bodies and their churches by assessing and developing actions plans for HIV/AIDS ministries and to report back to the 204th General Assembly (1992) on the actions that had been taken; and

Whereas, through a recommendation to the 205th General Assembly (1993) the former nine unit structure has been redesigned by General Assembly action into three ministry divisions; and

Whereas, through the work of the Presbyterian AIDS Network of the Presbyterian Health, Education and Welfare Association it is clear that some governing bodies and churches have made available to their members the educational materials developed by the former Social Justice and Peacemaking unit and have used the expert consultation services made available through the Presbyterian AIDS Network and the former Social Justice and Peacemaking unit, a majority of governing bodies and churches have not yet utilized the educational materials nor the consultation services available to them; therefore, be it

Resolved, that the Presbytery of of Detroit overtures the 206th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to

- 1. encourage and challenge all churches and governing bodies of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to live out Jesus' ministry of healing love, compassion and justice for all of God's children infected with HIV and AIDS-related diseases through ministries and educational efforts including the request for and use of our denominational education and worship materials and resource persons available to them.
- 2. instruct the three ministry divisions to review the manner in which they and their sub-divisions are affected and will be affected in the future by the HIV/AIDS crisis and to report on any current and proposed action plans they have in support of all prior General Assembly actions taken with regard to this crisis and to report these actions and plans to the General Assembly over the next three years: 1995, 1996 & 1997.
- 3. instruct the three ministry through their appropriate sub-divisions to lift up before the next three General Assemblies the accomplishments of their own staff, the lower governing bodies and churches regarding models of ministry and support groups and education programs on behalf of persons and their families living with HIV/AIDS

# INSTITUTIONAL COVENANT Between The Presbytery of Detroit and Presbyterian Villages of Michigan

The Presbytery of Detroit (Presbytery) and Presbyterian Villages of Michigan (Villages) based on a desire to describe and define their mutual relationship(s) have entered into this Institutional Covenant as of this \_\_\_\_\_\_, day of \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, 1994.

The Presbytery of Detroit covenants that it will:

- recognize the Villages as an ongoing validated mission and ministry of the Churches of the Presbytery and endorse the Villages as a continuing Validated Special Opportunity (VSO);
- refer prospective residents to the Villages, as appropriate;
- encourage the ministers and churches in the Presbytery to be supportive of the Villages' ministry and to develop relationships with individual Villages, including assistance with Bible studies, worship services, musical programs, etc.;
- assist in the dissemination of information regarding the Villages (e.g. literature tables at Presbytery meetings, mailing lists of pastors/elders/deacons);
- when appropriate, actively participate in the Villages' strategic planning efforts;
- encourage constituents to pursue volunteer opportunities with the Villages;
- identify potential candidate names to be considered for Villages' future Board membership needs;

### The Villages covenant that it will:

- keep the Presbytery informed of ongoing plans, developments and activities through various means, including an annual written report to Presbytery Council and periodic verbal reports to Presbytery meetings;
- advise the Presbytery of its strategic planning efforts and solicit active participation, involvement and input;
- provide for priority admission status in the Villages for members of Presbyterian (U.S.A.) Churches;
- promote diverse volunteer service opportunities for members of churches in the Presbytery;
- inform the Presbytery regarding its Board leadership needs and encourage the submission of candidate names to the Villages' Board Development Committee;

- whenever possible, make its physical and human resources availabl to assist the Presbytery (e.g. meeting/conference space, staff resources);
- be available to consult with local churches that desire to provide non-institutional outreach senior services;
- provide periodic educational, leadership and advocacy programming concerning aging related issues, and;
- consult with and seek the agreement of the Presbytery regarding fund-raising initiatives as follows:
  - seek the agreement of the Presbytery Council prior to any solicitation of direct congregational support beyond that authorized by the VSO;
  - b. consult with, and obtain the agreement of, the Presbytery Council prior to engaging in non-recurring major fund-raising efforts through churches of the Presbytery;
  - c. report annually to the Presbytery Council the totals of gifts received from:
    - 1) congregations of the Presbytery; and from
    - individual donors from congregations within the Presbytery who may be approached by the Villages without prior consultation or agreement by the Presbytery.
- keep Presbyterian churches informed of potential facility developments in their local communities.

The above covenants may be amended from time to time in the mutual interests of the parties and their shared ministry to older persons.

The 205th General assembly has called upon governing bodies of the church to be engaged in the discipline of open, diligent, prayerful study and dialogue on the issues of human sexual behavior and orientation as they relate to membership, ministry, and ordination within the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), with careful attention to listening with the particular contextual setting of its ministry to the insights of any who may find themselves aggrieved by current practices, policies, or laws relating to homosexuality and membership, ministry, and crdination in the church. It has also said, "before seeking such insights, each governing below the General Assembly shall take care to address the serious problem of how to insure a climate for dialogue that is open and non-incrimating, and that would not result in jeopardizing the reputation or standing of any partner in dialogue. It is therefore proposed that the Presbytery of Detroit adopt the following covenant:

### COVENANT FOR DIALOGUE FOR THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

As participants in the discipline of "open, diligent, prayerful study and dialogue" on the issues of sexual orientation as they relate to membership, ministry, and ordination within the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.):

- 1. We agree to remain prayerful and open to the workings of the Holy Spirit within this process.
- 2. We agree not to initiate any disciplinary case against any person who participates in such study and dialogue when such action would be based solely upon the current policy of the Church which prohibits the ordination of lesbian and gay people as Deacons, Elders, and Ministers of the Word and Sacrament.
- 3. We agree not to initiate any remedial case against any Session or the Presbytery for failure to initiate such a disciplinary case against a participating person.

This covenant is adopted in order to "assure a climate for dialogue which is open and non-incriminating and in order to assure that no testimony given by any person will result in jeopardizing the reputation or standing of any partner in dialogue."

Upon adoption, this covenant shall be included in all announcements of study and dialogue events.

## MINUTES OF THE MAY 24, 1994 STATED MEETING PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

GATHERED AS THE BODY OF CHRIST FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, PONTIAC I. GATHERED AS THE PEOPLE OF GOD

A. THE MODERATOR

A quorum being present, the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was convened in stated session on Tuesday, May 24, 1994, at 5:30 p.m. at the First Presbyterian Church Pontiac, Michigan. The meeting was opened with prayer by Peter Smith, Moderator.

Laura Walsh was appointed Assistant to the Stated Clerk. New commissioners and ministers were welcomed by Moderator Smith.

### B. THE STATED CLERK

Stated Clerk Jenny Schram presented Part I of her report and motions were sustained that Presbytery:

1. DOCKET. Adopt the docket as amended.

Amendment was sustained to add 15 minutes for a response to Moments of Seeking Understanding (Yes-88, No-68).

Amendment was passed to add five minutes to allow the Rev. Janie Spahr to respond to the response (Yes-94, No-65).

- 2. EXCUSES. Excuse all continuing members of the presbytery and elder commissioners members of Council who have asked to be excused. The complete roll is found in Attachment One.
- CORRESPONDING MEMBERS. Without further motions, seat as corresponding members all eligible persons who are presented to the presbytery and who register on the enrollment sheet for corresponding members.

### C. WELCOME FROM HOST CHURCH

The Rev. Rosalie Glover welcomed the Presbytery to First Presbyterian Church, Pontiac.

## II. MOMENTS OF CELEBRATION AND REMEMBRANCE (Part I) A. JOYS AND CONCERNS

Members of presbytery lifted up and shared the joys and concerns that were experienced during the past month.

B. RECOGNITION OF RETIREMENT: THE REV. DR. JAMES ANDERSON
The Rev. Anne Schaefer and Elder Gordon Robertson spoke in honor
of the ministry of the Rev. James Anderson as he retires as pastor of
the Kirk in the Hills Presbyterian Church, Bloomfield Hills. They
praised Mr. Anderson for his leadership ability, his preaching skills,
and for being a wonderful pastor. Moderator Smith presented a
Certificate of Honorable Retirement to Mr. Anderson.

### C. "COMMITMENT TO PEACEMAKING" RECOGNITIONS

Jim Beates, Peace Enabler, recognized the following churches for adopting the "Commitment to Peacemaking": Sterling Heights, Utica; Wayne, First; Southfield; Grosse Pointe Woods; Fort Gratiot, Lakeshore. Ken Smith, Chair Social Justice and Peacemaking Focus Group, presented certificates from the General Assembly to representatives of the churches.

### D. COMMISSIONING OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY COMMISSIONERS

Stated Clerk Jenny Schram and Executive Presbyter Edward Gehres presided at the commissioning ceremony for the Commissioners to the 206th General Assembly. The commissioners affirmed their willingness to serve the presbytery and the larger church at the General Assembly and the presbytery pledged to support the commissioners with prayer.

Jenny Schram announced that the Presbytery of Detroit through Presbyterian Women in the Presbytery of Detroit will receive the presbytery level recognition at the General Assembly from the Ecumenical Decade In Solidarity With Women Committee in appreciation and recognition of the "Four Red Thread Projects" that support women and children who are homeless or battered individuals.

III. BUSINESS TO ADOPTED BY MOTION AND DEBATE
Associate Executive Clarisa Piecuch lead the presbytery in a
moment of prayer incorporating Psalm 46 in the prayer.

### A. THE STATED CLERK

Stated Clerk Jenny Schram presented Part II of her report.

- 1. MINUTES. Motion was sustained to approve the minutes of April 26, 1994.
- 2. TRANSFERS COMPLETED. Information was received that the following transfers were completed:
  - a. to the Presbytery of Detroit Eldon Beery

### B. THE TREASURER

Treasurer Wilma Dellinger presented the printed balance sheet of April 30, 1994. She asked the presbyters to continue their stewardship of mission giving through the summer and fall. Wilma Dellinger requested that as the churches plan their budgets for 1995 that they consider our church's connectional system and support it. A motion was sustained to receive the report of the treasurer.

### C. THE COUNCIL

Lawrence Van Til reported for the council. Motions were sustained that presbytery:

- 1. Receive the minutes of the May 10, 1994 meeting of Council as the record of all that occurred in that meeting and order them printed as an appendix to the minutes. (Appendix A).
- 2. Set \$5.67 as the presbytery portion of the 1995 per capita. Jack Seitz and Jerry Seaton made a presentation in regards to the rationale for the presbytery portion of the 1995 per capita.
- rationale for the presbytery portion of the 1995 per capita.

  3. Approve the sale of the Calvin (West) Church property (Lots 61 through 68 inclusive, lot 77 through 84 inclusive, and all of the vacated portion of Ashton Avenue and all of the vacated alley adjoining any of the referenced lots, Rosemont Forrest Subdivision, Liber 71, page 18 of Plats, Wayne County Records, also known as 14221 Southfield, including all improvements and appurtenances) to the New St. Luke Missionary Baptist Church of Detroit for \$875,000; with \$25,000 in deposit, \$175,000 on or before June 28, 1994, and the remainder (\$675,000) by closing September 30, 1994.
- 4. Authorize the sale of the Calvin, West manse for \$65,000.

- 5. The Council advises the presbytery that it cannot deal with anonymous letters or allegations. If a church or individual has an issue they feel need to be dealt with, the letter detailing the issue must be signed.
- 6. The Steering Committee of Council invited the presbytery to a Special Event concerning the Re-Imagining Conference held in November 1993. It will be held at Birmingham, First on Tuesday, May 31, 1994, at 7:30pm-9:00pm.

- 6. Approve Parish Associate relationship between First Church, Birmingham, and the Rev. Kathryn Thoresen, contingent upon notification of financial terms.
- Transfer the Rev. Sherwood Anderson to the Presbytery of Whitewater Valley, effective May 1, 1994, at their request.

8. Approve the call of First Church, Wyandotte, to the Rev. Barry D. Sweet, as Pastor, effective July 23, 1994, with the following terms: Salary \$27,500; Fair market value of manse \$8,250; Utilities allowance \$2,000; Pension \$11,378; Medical deductible \$1,219; FICA \$2,888; Auto allowance \$.28/mile; Book allowance \$200; Moving costs \$3,000; Study allowance \$600; Manse decorating allowance \$1,500; One month vacation, including 4 Sundays; Two weeks study leave, including 2 Sundays. AA/EEO guidelines of the denomination have been followed during the search process.

9. Approve the Covenant for Intentional Interim Ministry between Littlefield Church, Dearborn, and the Rev. Carol Wood for 12 months, effective June 15, 1994, with the following terms: Salary \$20,914; Housing \$11,502; FICA \$2,480; Pension \$9,770; Travel/auto allowance \$3,500; Study allowance \$400; Reimbursement medical deductible \$1,047; Dental \$230; one month vacation, including 4 Sundays; two weeks study leave.

### OTHER BUSINESS

- 10. Suspend the provision of the Sexual Misconduct Policy which directs that the accuser <u>must</u> meet with the accused until policy is voted on in September.
- 11. Grant the Rev. John Thomas Campbell, Director of Training, Samaritan Care Center and a member of the Presbytery of Lake Huron, permission to labor within the bounds of Detroit Presbytery.

### IV. ORDER OF THE DAY - WORSHIP

Worship was led by members of the Theology and Worship Committee. The Scripture Lessons were proverbs 4:1-27, 1 John 4:7-21, and Matthew 11:7-15. Reflections on the Word were given by the Rev. Dixon Junkin, Associate for Discipleship and Spirituality, Presbyterian Church, (U.S.A.). Communion was served.

## V. BUSINESS TO BE ADOPTED BY MOTION AND DEBATE (PART II) A. COMMITTEE ON PREPARATION FOR MINISTRY

Steve Melde reported for the committee.

1. In formation was shared the the following individuals have had an annual consultation (G-14.03091) and that the committee voted to continue them in the status indicated:

Linda Holderedge, Inquirer Iris Tucker-Lloyd, Candidate Douglas Denne, Candidate

2. Upon recommendation of the committee, presentation of a statement of faith, and opportunity being given for questions from the presbytery, a motion was sustained that Margie Osborn (Port Huron, First) be enrolled as a candidate under the care of the presbytery. Moderator Smith asked the constitutional questions of Margie Osborn. She answered in the affirmative. After reading from Micah 6:6-8, Moderator Smith charged the new candidate and led the presbytery in prayer.

### B. COMMITTEE ON METROPOLITAN MISSION

Patrick Thompson reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that presbytery:

1. Recommend the <u>Covenant for Dialogue</u> (adopted by Presbytery April 1994) as a model to the sessions of the presbytery for adoption and use by the churches of the presbytery in dialogue events they sponsor in response to the action of the 205th General Assembly

(three-year study of homosexuality and ordination through the 208th General Assembly, 1996).

- 2. Authorize the Metropolitan Mission Committee and its Hunger Task Force to complete Project Appraisals as requested by the General Assembly Hunger Program for:
  - 1. Hunger Action Coalition for Southeastern Michigan
  - 2. TAP Food Program
  - 3. Youth on the Move for Jesus Christ

Vice Moderator Morrison assumed the duties of moderating the meeting.

### C. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH STRATEGY

Gretchen Denton reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that presbytery:

- 1. Approve the name Church of the Covenant, Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) for the Macomb Township NCD.
- 2. Authorize the Church Strategy Committee to develop guidelines for the use of the Calvin West sale proceeds designated for use in urban ministry, with representation from appropriate presbytery bodies including, but not limited to Metropolitan Mission and Evangelism Committees, and that no funds be committed or disbursed until these guidelines are approved by presbytery.

An amendment to strike "for use of the Calvin West Sale proceeds" from the motion was defeated.

### VI. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres discussed a letter from James Andrews, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, which addressed the Re-Imagining Conference, and resulting fall-out from the conference and what is happening across and within the church. The letter is a well-balanced reflection that discusses what is happening in the church as we try to dialogue but sometimes end up fighting and arguing.

Mr. Gehres reflected on the celebration of the Day of Pentecost. He wondered, and challenged the presbytery to wonder, what would be the response if tongues of fire appeared over the heads of the elected officers and staff of the Presbytery of Detroit or over the heads of the General Assembly Commissioners. How would we respond if there were a mighty wind rushing here and we could understand the language of our ancestors? Would we argue whether it was fire or fumes; whether it was the movement of the Spirit or some tricky hologram? Mr. Gehres raised the question because he believes that the Spirit of God is moving deeply in our midst and we often think that it is fumes.

Mr. Gehres shared a deep concern for relationships between the levels of our denomination. He sees in this presbytery the tremendous potential represented in the faces of the persons gathered here and in the churches. Mr. Gehres believes that at times we get caught up in arguments and miss the movement of the Spirit. There are a lot of new things happening in our presbytery. A sampling of new things were lifted up and celebrated.

Peter Smith resumed moderating the meeting.

### VII. MOMENTS OF CELEBRATION AND REMEMBRANCE (PART II)

A. RECOGNITION OF THE MINISTRY OF CALVIN, WEST CHURCH William Schram began the remembrance of the ministry of the Calvin (West) Presbyterian Church of Detroit. He introduced Donald Brownell who shared some of the history and life of Calvin (West). The church was organized in 1924 and has had a history of ministry in its community. The pastors who led the Calvin (West) Church were remembered. John Goodenow, former clerk of session of Calvin (West) read a list of seven members of Calvin (West) who became Ministers of Word and Sacrament.

Moderator Smith led the presbytery in prayer celebrating the ministry of Calvin (West) Church and for the continuing ministry of these individuals in their new church home with Westminster Church of Detroit.

### VIII. MOMENTS OF SEEKING UNDERSTANDING

A. HOMOSEXUALITY AND THE CHURCH TASK FORCE: CONTINUING THE DIALOGUE Kenneth Smith introduced Brian Hamilton and Peter Boeve who shared what transpired at two of the wekend events with the Rev. Janie Spahr.

Ms. Spahr then spoke about the different events that she was a part of here. She told of her ministry to and for gay and lesbian persons. She related thepain experienced by many homosexual persons and their families and the impact that has had on her ministry. Ken Collinson presented a gift from the Metropolitan Mission Committee to Janie Spahr.

B. RESPONSE TO SEEKING UNDERSTANDING

Paul Irwin spoke as a responder to the message of Janie Spahr. He raised a concern about the issue of homosexual behavior and scriptural teachings and affirmed the denomination's position on the ordination of homosexuals.

Clark Cowden affirmed the denomination's stand on the ordination of homosexual persons. He stated that the questioned behaviors are listed in the Scriptures with other sins and asked the question: Is it fair to pull one behavior out and say that it is ok? He stated that there is no Scripture that says that homosexual behavior is good, that homosexual behavior are God's will for someone's life. There are no Scriptures saying homosexuality is a gift from God so there is reasonable doubt that is raised. Jesus shows us that it is possible to love someone without approving of their behavior.

### RESPONSE BY REV. SPAHR

Janie Spahr reiterated her position on this issue. She stated that the question is not behavior but sexual orientation persons.

### IX. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the presbytery, the meeting was adjourned at 10:26 p.m. with a charge and benediction given by Moderator Smith.

The next stated meeting of presbytery will convene Tuesday, June 28, 1994, at the St. James Presbyterian Church, Redford, at 5:30 pm.

### C. TASK FORCE ON MISSION 2000

Peter Smith reported for the task force. He shared details for the October 7-8 special meeting of presbytery. It will not be an overnight event but will be at a local congregation with the Friday and Saturday portions being independent of each other. Friday's session will be in the evening and Saturday's session will be from 9-3.

### D. TASK FORCE ON BICENTENNIAL FUNDING

Fran Anderson reported on the work of the task force to make recommendations to pay the Ecumenical Campus Center/University of Michigan prospectus in full. \$3000 of the approved \$17,000 has already been sent. Motion was approved to take the remaining \$14,000 from funds designated to the prospectus, the balance of the Calvin Alive prospectus, and from interest. All these monies are from the Bicentennial Fund.

- Regarding the action taken in April on the Sexual Misconduct Policy.
  - a. The policy was adopted as an interim policy until the September meeting. If it is not adopted at the September meeting we are back to the old policy previously adopted.
  - b. The Committee on Ministry was asked to make editorial corrections to clarify wording and correct inconsistencies. They were not asked to make changes in content.
  - c. The Committee on Ministry or any voting member at presbytery could propose amendments to the content of the policy. These changes would be debated and voted upon by the presbytery.

### C. BUDGET AND FINANCE

Jack Seitz reported for the committee. A presentation was made on the proposal for the 1995 per capita. Motion was sustained to recommend to presbytery that the presbytery portion of the per capita be set at \$5.67%. A request was made to include the whole report as an appendix. (Appendix A)

Committee members were notified of a meeting on June 20 at 5:30 p.m. to discuss the state of the 1994 budget and any adjustments which may need to be made.

### D. PROPERTY AND INVESTMENTS COMMITTEE

Stan King reported for the committee.

- Motion was sustained to approve the establishment of an account with CompUSA.
- Information was shared that the committee is looking into whether or not to change the institution where the staff Visa cards are issued.
- 3. Motion was presented to accept terms of sale for the Calvin (West) Church property and to instruct the Administrative Commission not to remove any other items from the building. A letter from the Administrative Commission in response to this action was distributed to the council. Following debate, an amendment was passed to add "and that council send a letter on Wednesday to the churches of the presbytery notifying them that items from the Calvin (West) Church are no longer available to them."

The motion, as amended was passed as follows by a vote of

14-yes and 7-no:

Recommend presbytery accept the offer of Macedonia Baptist Church for \$775,000 cash for the Calvin West Property (14221 Southfield, Detroit) to New Commercial Mortgage, with the following stipulations:

Subject to the the limiting indemnification as to monetary claims of New Genesis Missionary Baptist Church to only those arising out of the 36th District Court Judgment after the tenants occupying prior to closing and clarification as to the fact that not all personal property in the building is owned by the seller and review and approval of agreement by corporate counsel;

and that council send a letter on Wednesday to the churches of the presbytery notifying them that items from the Calvin (West) Church are no longer available to them;

and that council instruct the Calvin Administrative Commission to remove no further equipment or furnishings from the building which is also a requirement of the sale agreement.

### E. STAFF SERVICES

Jim Conley reported for the committee that a consultant is being arranged for implementation of the new staff design and that he may wish time to speak with council members.

He raised a concern about pressure being put upon staff by actions such as the previous one which demands immediate action by the support staff to do an immediate mailing in a week that is already very busy with the presbytery mailing.

## IV. STANDING COMMITTEES A. COMMITTEE ON MINISTRY

Tony Patrick reported for the committee. He reminded the nominating committee that with the interim adoption of the Sesual Misconduct Policy they need to prepare a slate of names for special disciplinary committees.

### B. METROPOLITAN MISSION

Patrick Thompson reported for the committee. He distributed information on actions which the committee is bringing to presbytery in May. The committee is bring an action relating to apraisal of hunger programs for the Presbyterian Hunger Program and will also recommend that the Covenant for Dialogue adopted by the presbytery in April be commended to the sessions of our our churches as a model to be used in dialogue which the churches are sponsoring.

### C. CHURCH STRATEGY

Gretchen Denton reported for the committee. A motion was presented that council establish guidelines with input from various interested bodies for spending the 2/3 of the funds designated for urban ministry that will be realized from the sale of Calvin (West) properties. Further, that none of these monies be disbursed until feasibility studies of a new church development in the Grandmont/Rosedale area is completed. The motion was defeated.

### D. EDUCATION AND NURTURE

Anna Marie Austin reported on the May 16 workshop with Tex Sample on Ministry With Baby-Boomers.

### V. OTHER BUSINESS A. AUDIT

The audit report was not available for all trustees. The consensus was that the audit report would be made to the council and the presbytery in June and that the May docket will be amended to reflect this change.

### VI. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business, the council was adjourned with prayer by Moderator Peter Smith at 5:30 p.m.

APPENDIX A: BUDGET REPORT

### RE: 1995 PER CAPITA AMOUNT

The Budget and Finance Committee recommends that the 1995 Presbytery portion of the per capita be set at \$ 5.67.

Rationale: The 1995 budget funds requested by the presbytery committees as per capita disbursements, approved by the Budget and Finance Committee, total \$260,491. Based on a membership of 45,926 (12-31-93), the amount necessary to meet the requests is \$5.67 per member. The 1994 presbytery portion of per capita is \$5.38; therefore the increase is 5.6%. The 1994 per capita was not increased; thus the increase represents an increase of 2.8% per year.

There are several factors to be taken into account.

The membership of the Presbytery is declining at a rate of approximetly 2% per year. Therefore, each member must bear increased amounts.


Each year the Presbytery approves an increase in wages, generally in the 3% to 4% range. The Staff Services and the Property & Investments budgets contain most of the salaries and are the largest part of the Per Capita budget; therefore there is little flexibility in budgeted amounts. Also, other portions of the Property & Investments budget are fixed such as occupancy expenses, insurance, telephone etc. Also, legal expenses are subject to increase in today's business climate.


The definition of the Per Capita Apportionment is governed by action of the Presbytery in January, 1986.

The policy specifically states:

\*In the case of staff salaries and expenses, those staff members whose position descriptions relate primarily to the functions listed in the definition should have their salaries and expenses included in full. Those whose position descriptions relate primarily to carrying out the Presbytery's program and mission should not be included at all. Using this guideline, the amounts for the Executive Presbyter and the Business Manager/Stated Clerk are included, while those for the three Associate Executives are not.

Since two of the five executive staff positions are therefore allocated to the Per Capita Apportionment, it seems reasonable to allocate 40% of the office operations costs to the per Capita Apportionment also." (section C.-Allocation of Line Items, Minutes of the Presbytery of Detroit, 2-25-86, p 259)

## MINUTES OF THE JUNE 28, 1994 STATED MEETING PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

I. GATHERED AS THE PEOPLE OF GOD

### A. THE MODERATOR

Patrick Thompson reported for the committee. Mr. Thompson introduced a paper "Seeking to be Faithful Together: Guidelines for Presbyterians during Times of Disagreement," to the Presbytery for a first reading. The paper will be presented at the September stated meeting for adoption.

### H. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH STRATEGY

Gretchen Denton reported for the committee. The Committee on Church Strategy is forming a committee to determine the use of the money realized from the sale of the Calvin West properties. They hope to bring a recommendation to the presbytery by the end of this year.

She reported that a VISTA task force is being formed to examine the demographic and ethographic information obtained from the PERCEPTS Study to determine where new church development and redevelopment is appropriate in the Presbytery of Detroit. Ms. Denton invited the presbyters to submit names of persons who would be willing to serve on the task force.

### V. MOMENTS FOR SHARING MINISTRIES (PART II)

A. REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY Kemba Mitchell, YAD, reported on youth activities in which she engaged at the General Assembly. Gertrude E. Rogers reported on the election of Moderator Robert W. Bohl. Brewster H. Gere shared perspectives on the issue of Human Sexuality. Phyllis T. Hunt reported on the actions taken on the four overtures from the Presbytery of Detroit. Anna Marie Austin reported on the action taken in regards to the RE-Imagining Conference and controversy. Leland Seese captured and related to the presbyters the Kairos moment that occurred when the Spirit of God moved through those gathered as General Assembly Commissioners who voted, nearly unanimously, in affirmation of the ten page report of the Assembly Committee on General Assembly Council Review concerning the RE-Imagining Conference and controversy. Other actions of the General Assembly were reported by the other commissioners. Slides taken during the Assembly were shown. The Commissioners are available to visit congregations and discuss issues addressed by the 206th Assembly.

### VI. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Edward Gehres shared that in accordance with the staff design adopted by presbytery in 1992, and through the auspices of the Council Staff Services Committee, consultants have been engaged to work with the presbytery staff and the Staff Services Committee. Work is being done in two phases: 1) Working specifically with staff on team building and assisting the staff to function more effectively with the gifts and talents and people that are on staff. Phase one is well under way. A one and a half day retreat was held with staff and two consultants out of which issues and concerns of staff were identified and are being addressed. 2) To focus on the consultants helping the presbytery staff interface with the presbytery and the presbytery committees.

Mr. Gehres discussed the PERCEPTS Study and VISTA Program, a three year program in which the presbytery is now engaged. The PERCEPTS Study was presented to the presbytery on February 28, 1994. He stated that the Committee on Church Strategy is in the process of assembling a task force to assist the committee with the process of working through the PERCEPTS data and doing some strategic planning and development of strategy for church development or congregational development in the presbytery. The study is at the presbytery office. The data is available for congregations. The staff and committee members are ready to meet with members of congregations to share the data collected.

Executive Presbyter Gehres asked the presbyters to take seriously the offer of the General Assembly Commissioners to meet with the congregations. He stated that this was a particularly fine group of commissioners and that they represented us well at the Assembly.

Mr. Gehres will be on study leave, June 29-July 10, 1994. He will visit Israel, Jordan and Jerico with a group led by the pastors of Grosse Pointe Memorial and Grosse Pointe Woods Churches, Bruce Rigdon and Jack Zeigler. They will be in dialogue with religious leaders in the Middle East. Mr. Gehres asked for the prayers of the presbytery for the group and the church leaders with whom they will be meeting.

Helen Morrison assumed the duties of moderating.

## VII. MOMENTS FOR SHARING MINISTRIES (PART III) A. COMMITTEE ON MISSION INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP

Kevin Piecuch reported on two events sponsored by the committee. First, there will be a presbytery-wide stewardship campaign in the fall. The hope is that members of Council and the Committee on Mission Interpretation & Stewardship will be invited by all sessions to visit and explain presbyterian mission. The committee believes that these visits will help sessions to make good decisions in support of the mission of presbytery. Specific challenges to increase mission will be given to each church. A kick-off dinner will be held Saturday, October 1, 1994 with Daniel Little, Interim President of McCormick Seminary, as the keynote speaker.

Second, Mr. Piecuch reported that mission co-workers and other mission interpreters will be available in October, The Month of Mission, to visit churches to talk about mission.

### B. THEOLOGY AND WORSHIP COMMITTEE

Nancy Draves reported for the committee. She reported on the eight week study of Euthanasia and Assisted Suicide sponsored by the Theology and Worship Committee that will be held in August and September. She urged the presbyters to sign up for the study. "Choosing Death" by Ron Hamill will be the study book for the sessions.

Nancy Draves announced that in October and November 1994 the Theology and Worship Committee will be conducting a two month study on issues revolving around ordination. During the worship service at the October meeting of presbytery, the committee would be interested in participating in the massed choir or offering special musical talents to inform the committee.

Craig Aue reported for the committee. Persons talented in the area of advertising are needed to work with the committee to develop an advertising proposal for a presbytery-wide Media Blitz 1995.

Mr. Aue introduced Andrew Chang, member of the Taiwanese Presbyterian New Church Development of Royal Oak. He spoke on the congregation that is meeting at Starr Presbyterian Church and its meeting.

### D. COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND NURTURE

Anna Marie Austin reported for the committee. She reported that the committee is able to help congregations through education, mission resources, stewardship, evangelism and worship. She introduced Dick Hanna who spoke on how the committee may help congregations in adult education. Mr. Hanna spoke about the <u>Directory for Speakers</u> produced by the committee and encouraged the presbyters to make use of it. Anna Marie Austin reported several upcoming events sponsored by the Education and Nurture Committee. She stated that PREM advocates are ready and willing to visit churches to explain the PREM materials.

Moderator Peter Smith resumed the duties of moderating the meeting.

A motion was sustained that the meeting will stand adjourned with the pronouncement of the benediction at the end of worship.

### VIII. WORSHIP

Worship was led by members of the Theology and Worship Committee. The meditation was given by the Rev. Paul Bousquette titled, "Where's the Spirit," Text: 2 Corinthians 8:7.

### IX. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the presbytery, the meeting was adjourned at 10:05 p.m. with the pronouncement of the benediction by the Rev. Paul Bousquette.

The next stated meeting of the Presbytery of Detroit will convene Tuesday, September 27, 1994 at the Westminster Presbyterian Church, Detroit, at 5:30 pm.

- 2. Grant permission to the Westminster Presbyterian Church, Port Huron, to purchase land containing a house (2523 Stone St.) adjacent to the present church site for \$40,000 cash.
- 3. Recommend to presbytery that the interest rate for new loans to churches and members of presbytery be set at 5.5% for the period July 1, 1994 through December 31, 1994.
- 4. Authorize the Property and Investments Committee to consult with the Committee on Ministry regarding an overdue loan to a member of presbytery and further to declare the loan in default and demand payment.

### III. REFLECTION ON ISSUES BEFORE THE PRESBYTERY

Council members shared reflections on issues before the presbytery and churches outside the arena of debate. Among the issues spoken about were the General Assembly meeting, the Re-Imagining Conference, ordination of homosexuals, the May pre-presbytery meetings and dialogues, the divisions which keep us apart and the commonalities which hold us together, the need for presbytery-wide Bible study, and the need for real dialogue.

Lawrence Van Til resumed moderating the meeting.

To the Presbytery of Detroit:

The Special Disciplinary Committee (93.03), responding to the accusations lodged against seven persons, and two Committees within the Presbytery by several individuals, makes the following statements:

The Special Disciplinary Committee has carefully reviewed the written complaints that it has received, and the other written communications that have been provided to it by the complainants, and by several of the persons accused. The Committee has also reviewed many written documents, letters, Session minutes and other written materials which were provided to or obtained by the Committee.

The Special Disciplinary Committee has also interviewed 15 persons; 7 persons who have filed written complaints, and 8 persons who were identified in the written complaints, or who requested the opportunity to address the Special Disciplinary Committee.

The Special Disciplinary Committee also found that because of a variety of broken relationships difficult problems have existed at the local church for some time. There were individual persons at the church who became increasingly frustrated that issues which were serious to them had not been corrected or even addressed. By way of contrast, many of the persons asked by the Presbytery to work with the church had difficulty comprehending the extent to which the failure of working relationships at the church had destroyed the normal tolerance for less than satisfactory conduct by several of the persons against whom complaints were filed.

It is clear to the members of the Committee that the actions of several persons, including persons accused of misconduct, and of other persons who have been participants in a series of personal conflicts and confrontations, fall short of the new reality revealed in Jesus Christ. Human life in the Church should exhibit that sin is forgiven, reconciliation is accomplished, and the dividing walls of hostility are torn down. G-3.000 (2).

"If any one of you is without sin, let him be the first to throw a stone ..." John 8:7. Recognizing our failures in finding the path to reconciliation, the Special Disciplinary Committee found numerous instances of failure to acknowledge fault, failure to recognize hurt and injury received whether intended or accidental, failure to forgive, failure to repent, failure to modify conduct when change was necessary, and failure to rehabilitate conduct and attitude so that healing could occur among partners in ministry of the Church of Jesus Christ.

Turning to the specific accusations stated in the written complaints received by the Committee, the following conclusions are the unanimous determination of the Committee:

ITEM 1 In response to the first allegation of Individual "A" relating to Person "1", we find that there are insufficient grounds for a chargeable offense, and that there is insufficient evidence to establish that an offense which could be prosecuted has been committed.

ITEM 2 In response to the second allegation of Individual "A" relating to Person "2", we find that there are insufficient grounds for a chargeable offense, and further that this Special Disciplinary Committee was without jurisdiction to act concerning this complaint because the complaint against Person "2" should have been filed with the Session of the particular Church. See D-6.0500(5)(a)

ITEM 3 In response to the third allegation of Individual "A" relating to Person "3", we find that Person "3" had no authority over the claimed irregularity or delinquency, that the accusation was of insufficient weight to require adjudication, and that a complaint relating to the conduct of the Session meeting and the accuracy of the Session minutes should have been filed with the Session of the particular Church. See D-6.0500(5)(a).

ITEM 4 In response to the fourth allegation of Individual "A" relating to Person "3", we find that there are insufficient grounds for a chargeable offense, and that the accusation is of insufficient weight to require adjudication.

The lease agreement provides for a 2% increase each year beginning January 1, 1996 in the monthly rent. The annual security cost of \$8400 will remain the same.
- 4. Approve securing a membership in the Greater Detroit Area Chamber of Commerce. The membership fee is approximately \$250.

### PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

### SEXUAL MISCONDUCT POLICY

## Adopted:

#### **PREFACE**

The Presbytery of Detroit affirms the policy of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) that all ministers, church members, employees, volunteers and officers of governing bodies and entities of the Church are to maintain the integrity of ministerial employment and professional relationship at all times. Ethical conduct of all who serve in the name of Jesus Christ is of vital importance to the Church for through these representatives is conveyed an understanding of God and the good news of the Gospel. Whoever serves the Church is in a position of great trust and responsibility and carries authority and power over persons affected by the Church's ministry and mission.

#### **PURPOSES**

The Presbytery of Detroit adopts this policy on sexual misconduct to govern the behavior of all ministers, employees, volunteers and officers who serve the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) within the bounds of the Presbytery. Its purpose is:

- 1. To set and enforce standards of ethical behavior consistent with Scripture and secular law.
- 2. To provide procedures for inquiry and effective response to allegations of sexual misconduct.
- 3. To serve as a guide for the application of powers under the Form of Government and the Rules of Discipline. See Book of Order D.1.0100.
- 4. To provide guidelines for the administration of employer/employee and volunteer relationships with the Church, its governing bodies and entities.
- 5. To serve as a guide for the prevention of sexual misconduct.
- 6. To demonstrate pastoral concern for all who are affected by allegations of, and proven, sexual misconduct.
- 7. To promote the peace, purity, health and unity of the Church.

# SEXUAL MISCONDUCT POLICY PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

The Presbytery of Detroit has adopted as its Standard of Conduct that it is unethical and unacceptable for ministers, presbytery employees, volunteers, or officers of the Church to have sexual relations with anyone served or employed by the Church other than a spouse, or to engage in sexually harassing activities. The application of this Standard is not meant to cover relationships between spouses nor is it meant to restrict church professionals from having normal, mutual, social, intimate or marital relationships.

#### I. PROCEDURAL OVERVIEW

Toward the end of maintaining the peace and health of its particular churches or agencies, and exercising its responsibility for them and for the ministers under its care, upon receipt of information of alleged offense involving sexual misconduct, properly filed, the Presbytery of Detroit shall move promptly to undertake investigation of the allegations [Book of Order G-10.0201, G-11.05021; D-7.0800; D-7.0500] and shall:

- A. direct the Stated Clerk to request the moderator to appoint a Special Disciplinary Committee (SDC) in consultation with the Stated Clerk and the Nominating Committee; (see Appendix A)
- B. direct the Stated Clerk to notify the Committee on Ministry (COM) to appoint a Pastoral Response Team; (see Appendix B)
- C. expect that those appointed shall do all in their power to maintain the confidentiality of all names and particular churches involved;
- D. provide through Presbytery Council and the Pastoral Response Team resources for the counseling of the accused and the accuser.
- E. provide through the SDC advocates for the accused and the accuser.
- F. work through the Pastoral Response Team and COM with the particular church's session to keep the particular church appropriately informed.
- G. when the work of the SDC is finished, the Presbytery shall proceed with whatever disciplinary action may be called for.
- H. work through the COM with the particular church to ameliorate, where possible, the pain, hurt and grief they experience.
- I. retain and utilize legal counsel if and as needed:

- J. direct the Stated Clerk and/or the COM to counsel those contemplating filing allegations that false or unwarranted allegations are punishable by church law and may be grounds for civil suit:
- K. direct the COM to provide guidelines for the development of a sexual misconduct policy by sessions for use within particular churches; (see Exhibit A)
- L. direct the COM to develop a covenant form relating to ethical guidelines for ministers of the Presbytery, with the understanding that signing this form is mandatory.
- M. direct the COM to develop employment questionnaires relating to sexual misconduct for its use and use by particular churches; (see Exhibit C)

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#### II. THEOLOGICAL AFFIRMATIONS

Who we are and what we do as members of the Presbytery of Detroit is based on our understanding of Gcd and our faith in God. Gcd's expectations for humanity have been made known through Scripture. In the life of the people of Israel, in the voices of the prophets, in the person of Jesus Christ, in the gift of the Holy Spirit, in the words of the Apostles, we have learned what God wants from us as we relate to the gifts of Creation and to each other. God calls us to share the good news of the Gospel with love in our hearts and integrity in our actions.

This policy on sexual misconduct is based on these truths and the following affirmations:

- Human sexuality is a gift from God and, at all times, should be expressed in a manner which affirms the goodness of Creation and enhances the innate self-worth of each of God's children.
- God has forged a covenant with us and calls us to live in a covenant relationship with each other. This covenant is based on God's act of redemption and liberation in Jesus Christ, our willingness to accept this reality and our desire to live in obedience to theological and ethical truths which form the foundation for faithful living in all arenas of human existence, including the expression of our sexuality.
- As we live in a covenant relationship with God and each other we know <u>Shalom</u> which brings health, wholeness, unity and peace.
- When we, or others, break this covenant with God and each other we know sin and experience its consequences which are oppression, injustice, pain and death.
- Each one of us is a sinner, falling short of God's glory and the ethics of God's Kingdom.
- God wants us to confess our sinfulness and acknowledge our need for redemption and forgiveness.
- God offers us salvation for this life and eternity through the death and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth.
- The Church and all who serve it are called to express, in word and action, God's vision for humanity and should stand in judgement against anyone who violates God's will in abusing covenant relationships.
- The Holy Spirit is God's gift to the Church and can enable all of us who serve the Church to be faithful adherents to God's Word as we share our lives and express our sexuality.

#### III. STANDARD OF CONDUCT

As God who called you is holy, be holy yourselves in all your conduct.

Tend the flock of God that is your charge, not under compulsion but willingly, not for sordid gain but eagerly, not lord it over those in your charge but be example to the flock.

You know that we who teach shall be judged with greater strictness.

I Peter 1:15; 5:2; James 3:1, NRSV

- A. The ethical conduct of all who minister in the name of Jesus Christ is of vital importance to the Church because through these representatives is conveyed an understanding of God and the gospel's good news. Their manner of life should be a demonstration of the Christian gospel in the church and the world, G.6.0106.
- B. The basic principles guiding this policy are as follows:
  - Sexual misconduct is a violation of the role of pastors, employees, volunteers, counselors, supervisors, teachers, and advisers of any kind who are called upon to exercise integrity, sensitivity, and caring in a trust relationship. It breaks the covenant to act in the best interests of parishioners, clients, co-workers, and students.
  - 2. Sexual misconduct is a misuse of authority and power which breaches Christian ethical principles by misusing a trust relation to gain advantage over another for self-aggrandizement in an abusive, exploitative, and unjust manner. If the parishioner, student, client, or employee initiates or invites sexual content in the relationship, it is the pastor's, counselor's, officer's, or supervisor's responsibility to maintain the appropriate role and prohibit a sexual relationship.
  - 3. Sexual misconduct takes advantage of the vulnerability of children and persons who are less powerful to act for their own welfare. it is antithetical to the gospel call to work as God's servant in the struggle to bring wholeness to a broken world. It violates the mandate to protect the vulnerable from harm.

While it is unconscionable that anyone would violate these principles for the sake of personal gratification, the Presbytery of Detroit recognizes that it does happen. Sexual misconduct is not only a violation of the principles set forth in Scripture, but also of the ministerial employment and professional relationship and is <u>never</u> permissible.

It is the full intention of the Presbytery of Detroit to protect its members and those served by the Church from acts of sexual misconduct. When a breach of ethics takes place, this transgression will be dealt with expeditiously, with fairness and justice. While the Church is called to offer forgiveness to all persons, it is not called to overlook acts of misconduct by any person. Justice calls for corrective action. Forgiveness for persons who have violated trust should not be quickly or lightly given. The goal should always be to restore fellowship with God and communion with the Church, even when forgiveness and reconciliation cannot be extended to include restoration to a former position or responsibilities. The goal for the person who has experienced sexual misconduct is healing and full restoration through the compassionate enfolding of the church.

#### IV. DEFINITIONS

Accused is the term used to represent the person against whom a claim is made of sexual misconduct.

<u>Accuser</u> is the term used to represent the person claiming knowledge of sexual misconduct by a person covered by this policy.

Advocate is a trained person who on request stands with the accuser or accused throughout the process of inquiry and adjudication; holds confidences; but is not legal counsel.

<u>Child Sexual Abuse</u> includes, but is not limited to, any contact or interaction between a child and an adult when the child is being used for the sexual stimulation of the adult person or of a third person. The behavior may or may not involve touching. Sexual behavior between a child and an adult is always considered forced whether or not consented to by the child.

<u>Church</u> when spelled with the initial capitalized refers to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Church when spelled with the initial in lowercase refers to local churches. The word congregation is used loosely for members and participants.

Employee is the comprehensive term used to cover individuals who are hired or called to work for the Church for salary or wages.

Entity is the term used to refer to any program or office managed by a board, Committee, council, or other body whose membership is elected by a governing body. See Manual of the General Assembly, Standing Rule 47.

Governing Body is a representative body composed of elders and ministers of the Word and Sacrament; these are sessions, presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly. A governing body may establish entities such as day care centers, conference centers, camps, or homes for the aged. A governing body may have both church members and non-members as employees.

<u>High Risk Occupation</u> is that which calls for a person to work in close contact with those who are vulnerable and less capable of protecting themselves, with children, elderly persons, those who are wholly or partially incapacitated, or counseling clients having emotional or personal problems.

<u>Inquiry</u> is the term used in the Rules of Discipline to determine whether charges should be filed based upon allegations of an offense received by a governing body. See Book of Order D.7.0200.

Investigation is the term generally used by colice, secular prosecutors, and child protective services when responding to allegations of an offense.

Pastoral Response Team is a body constituted by the Presbytery to facilitate the process of pastorally responding to allegations of sexual misconduct. The structure and function of the response team are detailed in Section VIII of this report.

Persons Covered by this policy include church members, church officers, ministers, and non-members who are employees cr volunteers under the supervision of governing bodies or entities, including those who are accused of sexual misconduct under circumstances in which (1) access to the victim is related to some form of service to or appointment by governing bodies or entities of the Church, or (2) sexual misconduct in a non-Church related setting raises questions of character and effectiveness. For example, this policy covers a non-member adult who sexually abuses a non-member teenager while "helping out" on a church-sponsored camping trip.

Reasonable Suspicion is a subjective criterion that refers to a belief or opinion based on facts or circumstances that are sufficient for a prudent person to want to inquire further, to take protective action, or report to authorities. State child abuse reporting laws may include wording that indicates what degree of suspicion or knowledge gives rise to the duty to report.

Response is the action taken by the governing body or entity when a report of sexual misconduct is received. It may include (1) inquiry into facts and circumstances, (2) possible disciplinary action (administrative or judicial cr both), (3) pastoral care for victims and their families and others, and (4) pastoral care and rehabilitation for the perpetrators and care for their families.

Secular Authorities are the governmental bodies, whether city, county, state, or federal, who are given the responsibility to investigate, criminally prosecute, and/or bring civil charges against individuals accused of sexual crimes or offenses against adults and children. The structure and identity of such secular authorities will vary from jurisdiction to jurisdiction but basic responsibilities to detect, deal with, and resolve such crimes and offenses will follow generally recognized patterns.

Secular Law is the body of municipal, state, and federal laws and is often referred to collectively as civil and criminal law. Prohibited behavior addressed by this policy may result in criminal and/or civil charges filed under secular law.

Sexual harassment includes, but is not limited to, unwelcome and unsolicited sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, discriminatory tormenting based on gender and other undesirable verbal, visual, or physical conduct of a sexual nature. It may involve a wide range of behavior. The following list is an attempt to list instances in order of seriousness.

- unwelcome remarks, jokes or innuendoes about a person's clothing, body or sexual activities
- verbal abuse of a sexual nature
- leering or other gestures associated with sexuality

- displaying pornographic pictures indirect or explicit invitations to engage in sexual activities.
- unnecessary physical contact such as touching, patting, pinching or constantly brushing against a person's body demanding sexual favors accompanied by implied or
- overt threats concerning a person's job performance, evaluation, promotion, or termination of a person's position or standing within a particular group or congregation

Sexual Misconduct is the comprehensive term used in this policy to include:

- a. Sexual harassment as defined above.
- b. Child sexual abuse as defined above.
- Rape or sexual contact by force, threat, or intimidation.
- Sexual Malfeasance. Sexual malfeasance as defined for this policy is as follows: the broken trust resulting from genital/sexual contact within a ministerial (e.g. clergy with a member of their congregation) or professional relationship (e.g. counselor with a client, lay employee with a church member, presbytery executive with a committee member, presbytery executive with a lay employee). Adultery and fornication are never appropriate behaviors.

Volunteer is the term used for those who provide services for governing bodies and entities of the Church and receive no benefits or remuneration. Volunteers include persons elected or appointed to serve on boards, committees, and other groups. For purposes of this policy volunteers are treated the same as employees. Liabilities of the governing body or entity are the same for volunteers as for employees.

- V. PROCEDURE IN CASES OF ALLEGED SEXUAL MISCONDUCT BY MINISTERS, AN EMPLOYEE, VOLUNTEER, OR OFFICER OF THE CHURCH
  - A. Presentation of Accusation
    - Any member of a church, volunteer, or a person employed or being served by the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) who feels that sexual misconduct has taken place by a minister of the Word and Sacrament or who believes in good faith that there has been a violation of this policy should contact the Executive Presbyter, Presbytery's Moderator, or Chair of the Committee on Ministry.
    - The person contacted is responsible to hear the complaint and explain the available options for reconciliation and/or resolution.
      - a. The person who feels that sexual misconduct has taken place might request that a meeting between the accused, accuser and the contacted person be held to discuss the matter and seek resolution. When children are involved, we must be particularly sensitive to the rights of children.
      - b. The person who feels that sexual misconduct has taken place may elect to file a formal complaint in writing, detailing the nature of the accusation, to the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery. A copy of this policy shall be provided to the involved parties.
      - c. The person who feels that sexual misconduct has taken place may choose to notify secular authorities. If this results in a police investigation, filing of criminal charges, civil lawsuit, or inquiry by any governmental agency, all efforts by the Church to seek resolution of the complaint will cease until the secular authorities complete their work.
  - B. Actions of the Stated Clerk
    - The Stated Clerk, upon receipt of a written accusation, shall:
      - a. Inform the accused in writing that an accusation has been made, the nature of the accusation, withholding the identity of the accuser. A copy of this policy shall be provided to the accused.
      - b. Report to the chair of the Pastoral Response Team that a formal complaint has been made.
      - c. As soon as possible, provide for the appointment of a Special Disciplinary Committee in keeping with the procedures outlined in the Book of Order and the Presbytery By-Laws.

- d. The Clerk shall notify the accuser in writing that the complaint has been received and that appropriate actions are being taken in accord with this policy and the <u>Rules of Discipline</u>.
- The Stated Clerk shall act in accordance with D.7.000 informing Presbytery, the Special Disciplinary Committee and the accused of their rights and responsibilities (D.7.0800, D.7.0900, D.7.1000, D.7.1100, D.7.1200).
- C. Responsibility of the Presbytery Nominating Committee

The nominating committee shall submit a list of potential Special Disciplinary Committee (SDC) members, looking for knowledge of law, church polity, and sexual misconduct concerns. These persons shall be elected by the presbytery and receive training arranged for by the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, so that they are ready to respond quickly when allegations are filed.

- D. Initial Step of the Special Disciplinary Committee
  - As soon as an allegation of sexual misconduct is filed with the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, the SDC should be appointed and begin its initial investigation.
  - Timeline: When the SDC receives from the Stated Clerk the statement of the allegation, the SDC should complete the process of initial interviews and dealing with the parties involved within seven days and notify the Stated Clerk that these interviews have taken place.
  - Responsible parties must cooperate with this timeline.
  - The SDC will interview the accused and the accuser separately.
  - The SDC will inform the accused of the nature of the allegations and the identity of the accuser.
  - The SDC will determine whether or not the accuser had dealt with the accused as outlined in the policy. (See steps noted on page 19 of this policy.)
  - The SDC would determine where the allegation fits in the prioritized list of sexual misconduct/harassment definitions (see page 9, definition of sexual harassment).
  - If both parties are willing, an attempt would be made for reconciliation of the accused and the accuser, which may or may not result in resolution. If reconciliation is achieved, conditions may be mutually established and agreed upon in writing. The SDC would be responsible for follow-through.

- If there is no reconciliation, the allegations would be dealt with in the process outlined in this policy.
- If warranted, the SDC could recommend to the Committee on Ministry administrative leave with pay, or limited suspension of duties related to the allegation. It is the responsibility of COM to take this action (See Appendix A).
- This process is to be kept confidential at all times, with only the responsible parties being informed of the proceedings. Both the accused and the accuser must accept responsibility for confidentiality.
- If confidentiality is breached, in order to preserve the peace and unity of the Church, the appropriate governing body may take disciplinary action under the Book of Order.
- E. Actions of the Special Disciplinary Committee
  - If the SDC determines that a full investigation is called for, it shall begin its work within one week of its report to the Stated Clerk of Presbytery, and conclude its inquiry within thirty days.
  - The SDC investigation at this stage is limited to the allegations as filed.
  - The SDC in consultation with the <u>accuser</u> shall offer an advocate for the accuser who shall be present at all appearances before the committee.
  - The SDC in consultation with the <u>accused</u> shall offer an advocate for the accused who shall be present at all appearances before the committee.
  - The SDC shall meet separately with the accused and the accuser as it carries out the responsibilities listed in the Book of Order D.7.0800b.1-7.
  - 6. When the SDC has completed its investigation, a meeting shall be held with the accused, the accuser and the advocate and counsel for each. The Committee shall present its findings and its recommendations.
  - 7. When the SDC has decided the disposition of the accusations, it shall:
    - a. If charges will be brought, immediately deliver them in writing to the Stated Clerk and prepare to prosecute the case. (The Stated Clerk will inform the Presbytery and notify the accuser and the accused (and the employer when it is a governing body/entity of the Church).

- b. If charges will not be brought, notify the Stated Clerk who will inform the Presbytery, the accuser and the accused, in writing (and employer when it is a governing body/entity of the Church). If the accused was on a "leave of absence" from his/her employment, there will be an immediate restoration to the full function of his/her professional and volunteer duties.
- c. Persons shown to have filed false accusations are subject to disciplinary action (D-7.0200a(4), D-7.0500, D-7.1200, D-7.1400).

#### F. Response of the Governing Body

- If charges are brought, the Clerk or Stated Clerk upon receipt of those charges shall immediately convey them to the Session or a Permanent Judicial Commission.
- 2. The Session or Permanent Judicial Commission shall:
  - Set a time for a preliminary hearing not later than forty-five (45) days after receipt of charge(s), (D.7.1600);
  - b. Through its clerk, notify the accused, the counsel and advocate for the accused, the Special Disciplinary Committee, counsel and advocate for the accuser of the time and place of the hearing (D.7.1600b) and furnish the accused a copy of the charge(s).

#### G. Role of the Committee on Ministry

- When charges are filed against a minister, an employee, volunteer or officer of the church, Committee on Ministry (COM) will not conduct its own investigation. COM will provide at least one member of COM to serve on the Pastoral Response Team. The COM member(s) will be aware of the counseling and financial resources available. (The work of the Pastoral Response Team is detailed in Section VII.)
- 2. The COM member of the Pastoral Response Team (PRT) will be available to meet with the governing body or entity involved, under the authority granted under G.11.0502j. COM will determine the timing and extent of information to be shared with the governing body or entity. The COM member shall:
  - a. Make sure the governing body or entity has available the Presbytery's Sexual Misconduct Policy and the "Statement on Sexual Harassment Rights and Procedures"; (see Section VIII.)

- b. Inform the governing body or entity about the judicial process, and the need for confidentiality;
- c. Help the governing body or entity deal with rumors or conflict in the church or entity relating to this matter;
- d. Be available to the accused as supportive listeners:
- e. Share Presbytery policy regarding leave, if appropriate;
- f. Use available financial rescurces to help provide therapy to the accuser and the accused in conjunction with their own health policy provisions. Extent of participation to be determined by the Presbytery;
- g. Contact the chair of the SDC to maintain communications with the PRT which do not infringe on confidentiality or the work of the SDC.
- 3. After the SDC has reached a conclusion, representatives of COM shall meet with the governing body or entity and process the results of the report of the SDC with special attention to any recommendations for disciplinary actions and the implications of such action. COM shall follow the same procedure after the report of the Permanent Judicial Commission (PJC). COM shall aid the governing body or entity in developing appropriate information for the church or entity.
- 4. If the SDC or PJC findings results in the termination of a minister, employee, volunteer or officer of the church:
  - a. COM will shepherd that termination through existing COM and governing body guidelines for terminations.
  - b. In the case of a minister in a congregation, COM will guide the Session through the process of finding interim leadership for the church if a minister's service has been terminated.
- When the SDC and PJC process does not result in a termination of services, COM will help the governing body or entity in its work to bring reconciliation to the church or body involved.
- COM will aid the governing body or entity in developing appropriate communication with the congregation or body involved about the charges and the findings of the SDC and/or PJC.

#### 7. Committee on Ministry also shall:

- Have annual training on issues of professional misconduct in matters of sexuality.
- Provide for regular educational opportunities for Sessions on professional misconduct. This will be done in conjunction with Professional Growth and Development and other interested groups.
- c. Encourage the Sessions to share information regarding the topic of sexual misconduct with the congregations.
- d. Carry out this policy of the Presbytery.
- e. Distribute a Covenant of Christian Ethics, which when approved will be signed annually by minister ministers of the Presbytery.
- f. Develop and use reference check questions regarding sexual misconduct to be used by COM and the Executive Presbyter.
- g. Use the same questions in interviewing candidates for ministerial positions.
- h. Identify and keep a list of counseling resources.
- Write a Covenant on Christian Ethics for use by Sessions and send it out with the annual reports on compensation.

# VI. TREATMENT AND CARE OF THOSE AFFECTED BY CHARGES OF SEXUAL MISCONDUCT

#### A. Accusers and Families

The Church shall offer treatment and care to the accusers of sexual misconduct and their families. Sometimes the accuser is blamed for causing the behavior or for disrupting the church. Sometimes the accuser or family is so angry and alienated from the Church that offers of help have been perceived as insincere or attempts at a cover-up. If the accuser or family at first refuses, the Church should continue to offer help. Above all the Church should not act in a self-protective manner by ignoring the accusers and their families.

Although the extent of the damage to the accusers of sexual misconduct will vary from person to person, being influenced by such factors as the degree or severity of abuse, the age and emotional condition of the accuser, personality dynamics, and the importance of the religious faith, the governing body, entity, and response team is to assume in all cases that the accuser has been wounded by the experience.

Feelings of guilt, shame, anger, mistrust, lowered self-esteem, unworthiness, and feelings of alienation from God, self, the religious community, and family are frequent injuries suffered by accusers. It is important for the response team to be sensitive to the accuser's pain and need for healing, and to act by making appropriate pastoral care available.

#### B. Congregation, Governing Body or Entity

The Church should be aware of the problems a congregation, governing body or entity may experience when allegations are made of sexual misconduct by a minister, employee, volunteer or officer. The allegations may polarize the congregation or organization, damage morale, and create serious internal problems. Efforts shall be taken to recognize and identify the problems and heal the damage done to the congregation, governing body or entity.

#### C. The Accused

The Church shall offer treatment and care for the accused as well as accusers and families. Persons accused of rape or other sexual offenses do not inspire sympathy. There is evidence that persons accused of rape find it more difficult to obtain a lawyer than people accused of other crimes. News media often give much attention to the arrest and opening of the trial, while little or

nothing is said if the accused is acquitted. There have been false accusations filed in cases of sexual harassment, child molestation, and sexual misconduct. For these and other reasons it is important that the Church does not make a presumption of guilt or over-react to charges.

If a person is acquitted of charges, the Church shall see that the acquittal is publicized as widely as possible when requested to do so by the accused.

#### D. Families of the Accused

Special care should be offered the family members of persons accused of sexual misconduct. Families may suffer disruption of marital relationships, parent-child relationships, as well as ostracism within the congregation and community. Where there is denial on the part of a spouse, proffered care is often rejected, but the church should continue to let its concern be known.

#### VII. THE PASTORAL RESPONSE TEAM

- A. The Formation of the Pastoral Response Team
  - 1. The Presbytery, through its Nominating Committee, shall nominate and elect a group of people to serve as potential members of a Pastoral Response Team. This Response Team is to serve as a sub-committee of COM. The individuals recommended should become familiar with the Presbytery's Policy on Sexual Misconduct and the disciplinary procedures outlined in the Book of Order. Training shall be provided to equip them to be sensitive to the various issues surrounding charges of sexual misconduct and the appropriate ways of responding to accuser, accused and their families.
  - 2. When charges of sexual misconduct are submitted in writing to the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, the Stated Clerk shall notify the chair of the Pastoral Response Team subcommittee of the Committee on Ministry (COM). The chair of the subcommittee shall then appoint, from the membership pool, three (3) members to serve on a Pastoral Response Team and the Chair of COM shall appoint at least one COM member to serve on the team. At least two members of the Pastoral Response Team will be of the same gender as the accuser.
- B. Responsibilities of a Pastoral Response Team
  - The team shall make clear to all concerned that it has no investigatory role. Its sole purpose is to provide pastoral support to those affected by charges of sexual misconduct.
  - 2. The team shall offer the accuser(s) and the accused the opportunity to have a Team member designated to be with each one throughout the investigation and possible trial. This Team member would seek to provide spiritual nurture and personal support.
  - The team shall respond to the accused with sensitivity and care, recognizing that accusations are too often viewed as an indication of guilt.
  - 4. The team shall remember and remind everyone affected by charges of sexual misconduct that justice must be sought through the courts of the Church and with due process. The decisions of these courts shall be faithfully and clearly reported to the accuser, accused, employing congregation or entity, and the Presbytery.
  - If issues arise in the congregation as a result of allegations, it is the responsibility of the Session to consult with the Committee on Ministry to address those issues.

VIII. STATEMENT ON SEXUAL HARASSMENT, RIGHTS AND PROCEDURES

The Policy is available from the Clerk of Session upon request.

A. RIGHTS OF EMPLOYEES, VOLUNTEERS AND PARISHONERS

All employees, volunteers and parishoners of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and its governing bodies and entities have the right to work in an environment free of discrimination and any form of sexual harassment. It is the policy of the Church to maintain a work place free of any form of sexual harassment or sexual intimidation from any Church employee or volunteer. Any form of sexual harassment is unacceptable behavior in the workplace and subject to appropriate disciplinary action.

B. STEPS TO FOLLOW IN CASE OF SEXUAL HARASSMENT

If an employee or volunteer believes he/she is being subjected to any form of sexual harassment, the following steps should be observed:

The individual should exercise the right and responsibility to say no. It should be made clear to the harasser that the behavior is unwelcome and inappropriate. This should be said firmly and without apology, documented and dated.

A journal should be kept of the times, places and witnesses present whenever the harassment occurs. It should record exactly what was said or done. Any letters, gifts and notes should be saved. The journal and supporting evidence, should not be left in the workplace.

The harasser should be asked to stop the inappropriate behavior. This should be followed by a letter, detailing the specific things which were offensive. A copy should be given to the harasser, to a witness if appropriate, and kept for future documentation.

If the behavior persists, was so offensive, or results in discrimination, the individual should speak to someone in authority to seek resclution or formal action. In the local congregation, this might be the Pastor, Chair of a personnel committee, or a member of the Session. In the Fresbytery, persons to contact would include the immediate supervisor, the Executive Presbyter, Chair of Staff Services or Chair of Committee on Ministry.

#### C. INVESTIGATION OF SEXUAL HARASSMENT CLAIMS

The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission has published in its Compliance Manual the method it will follow in investigating sexual harassment claims. Logically, the Church should follow this same investigative procedure on its own, before a charge is filed alleging sexual harassment. That procedure, contained in section 615.4 of the EEOC compliance Manual, is paraphrased as follows:

- The Person contacted (or appropriate representative) should interview the complainant to:
  - a. Identify in detail the conduct which is alleged to constitute sexual harassment. Include the type(s) of conduct, the frequency of occurrence, and the date(s) on which or the time period over which the conduct occurred.
  - b. Ascertain the specific context(s) in which the conduct occurred. Include the nature and general description of the workplace and the specific location and circumstances in which the conduct occurred.
  - c. Determine the effect of the conduct on the complainant: the type(s) of effect (e.g., economic, non-economic, and/or psychological), and detail the specific consequences involved. (For example, if the employee/volunteer was discharged for rejecting a supervisor's sexual advances, determine whether and to what extent (s)he suffered economic harm (including wages lost less other income earned, benefits lost, and expenses incurred):
  - d. Establish the time relationship between the occurrence of conduct and its effect on the complainant.
  - e. If the alleged harasser was a co-worker or a non-employee, determine whether supervisor, executive, or pastor knew or should have known of the alleged sexual harassment. In this regard, ascertain whether:
    - The complainant, or any other person reported or complained of the harasser's conduct to a supervisor, executive or pastor.
    - (2) A supervisor, pastor, or executive observed or was in a position to observe the conduct; or
    - (3) A supervisor, pastor, or executive should have been otherwise alerted to the conduct (if, for example, the conduct was discussed in the presence of supervisor, pastor or executive).

- (4) Obtain copies of any available documentation (e.g., letters, memoranda, reports, statements) which would support a conclusion that such persons know or had reason to know of the sexual harassment.
- f. Document what specific steps, if any, the complainant took to follow the sexual harassment policy or practice.
- Interview the appropriate individual(s) who had supervisory or management responsibilities to:
  - a. Ascertain whether other persons were subjected to similar conduct or were treated differently by the alleged harasser.
  - b. Identify the relationship of the alleged harasser to the employee; was (s) he an agent of the employer, a supervisory employee, a non-supervisory employee (co-worker), or a non-employee.
  - c. If the alleged harasser was a non-employee, ascertain the extent of the employer's control over, and legal responsibility for, the conduct of the harasser.
- 3. Interview other witnesses:
  - a. Obtain statements from witnesses or other persons, if any, who can corroborate or support any of the allegations.
  - b. Obtain statements from other persons, if any, who are or have been victims of sexual harassment by the alleged harasser in the workplace.
- 4. Interview the alleged harasser:
  - a. Obtain a statement from the alleged harasser. He/She should be told that an admission of wrongdoing may result in discipline.
  - Obtain statements from witnesses or other persons, if any, who can corroborate or support the alleged harasser's statements.
  - c. If adverse employment action was taken against the complainant, ascertain the alleged harasser's reason(s) for the action and obtain any information or documentation which would bear on the legitimacy of the reason given.

For example, if a supervisor discharges the employee because of his/her deteriorating work performance or absenteeism and the employee's poor record is the result of sexual harassment, the supervisor's reason may be a pretext for unlawful discrimination. Where an adverse action is taken, compare the employee's performance (or record) before and after the alleged harassment and note whether the supervisor provided the charging party with any notice (e.g., a written warning) prior to taking the adverse action.

#### 5. Conduct of Interviews

- a. The interviews must be handled in a confidential manner. All witnesses should be assured that no retaliatory action will be taken against them as a result of their participation in the investigation. Witnesses should be informed, however, that their statements may have to be used in defense of any charge that may result.
- b. The interviews and conclusions drawn from them should be documented and filed in a locked container. Witness comments should be labeled as hearsay, rumor or first-hand knowledge. Signed statements by the witnesses should not be created unless the investigation is conducted by an attorney.

### 6. Findings and Conclusions of Inquiry

a. If reasonable grounds exist to believe that sexual harassment has taken place, the complainant and the offending employee/volunteer should be notified. A formal complaint should be filed with the Clerk of the Session or the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery. At that time, the procedures outlined in the Sexual Misconduct Policy of the Presbytery of Detroit shall take effect.

Any discriminatory action taken against the complainant should be rectified. The individual should be offered, or placed in, the position he/she would have occupied but for the harassment (such as reinstated to employment, given a deserved promotion, etc.)

b. If reasonable grounds do not exist to support the allegation of sexual harassment, the complainant and the alleged harasser shall be notified.

#### APPENDIX A

# SEXUAL MISCONDUCT POLICY, PRESEYTERY OF DETROIT ADMINISTRATIVE LEAVE POLICY FOR THE PRESEYTERY OF DETROIT

- If administrative leave is recommended to COM, this requires the minister in any governing body to cease all pastoral functions and responsibilities. Contacts with members or staff of the church or employing body shall be at the discretion of the SDC.
- II. The church, in the case of a minister or church employee, or the Presbytery in the case of an employee, shall bear the cost of the administrative leave. The pay includes salary, housing, utilities, pension and medical. It does not include any expense allowances.
- III. In the case of a pastoral vacancy in a church, the cost of providing essential pastoral services through an interim or a supply pastor will be negotiated with the Committee on Ministry. In the case of a church employee, the governing body and entity will negotiate for Presbytery assistance as funds are available.
- IV. A finding of guilty by the PJC will end the responsibility for paid administrative leave. A finding of guilty may be grounds for termination.
- V. If charges are not brought by the SDC, or a finding of not guilty is brought by the PJC, administrative leave will end and permit return to work.

## APPENDIX B

## STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS

- There are no time limits for the filing of Sexual misconduct charges under the ecclesiastical law. <u>Book of Order</u> D.7.1100.
- II. A person wishing to file civil charges should check with an attorney for the statutes of limitations of state and federal law.

# EXHIBIT B COVENANT ON CHRISTIAN SEXUAL ETHICS AND STANDARD OF CONDUCT FOR CHURCH EMPLOYEES, VOLUNTEERS AND OFFICERS

### Presbytery of Detroit Synod of the Covenant

The Presbytery of Detroit has adopted as its Standard of Conduct that it is unethical and unacceptable for ministers, presbytery employees, volunteers, or officers of the Church to have sexual relations with anyone served or employed by the Church (other than a spouse, and includes pastor, teacher, youth leader, elder, committee chair, congregant, scout leader, etc.), or to engage in sexually harassing activities. Such behavior is a breach of ethics, violates trust and abuses relationships in the community of faith.

The Presbytery of Detroit expects everyone who serves the Church within the bounds of the Presbytery to follow and demonstrate adherence to this Covenant. Anyone who does not shall be subject to disciplinary action based on the following assumptions:

Any allegation that this Covenant and its Standard of Conduct was violated, reported in writing to the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, Moderator or Clerk of a Session, Presbytery executive, or executive director of a Church-related governing body or entity, shall begin the disciplinary process in accordance with the Rules of Discipline of the Book of Order (chapter D.7), the Presbytery's Policy on Sexual Misconduct, and the appropriate governing body/entity's personnel guidelines.

In the case of administrative leave the church, in the case of a minister or church employee, or the presbytery in the case of an employee shall bear the cost of administrative leave. The pay includes salary, housing, utilities, pension and medical. It does not include any expense allowances. The Committee on Ministry shall instruct the employer that no judgements or decisions should be made until the charges are adjudicated.

The Presbytery shall make certain personal support and spiritual nurture is provided to the accused and his/her family during the investigation and any prosecution. If the Presbytery conducts the inquiry it will ensure a fair, just and expeditious process in accordance with the Rules of Discipline of the Book of Order (chapter D.7).

Any decision supporting the charge(s) of sexual misconduct will be divulged on receipt of a reference check for other employment.

I have read this Covenant on Christian Sexual Ethics. I understand the consequences of unethical sexual behavior or sexually harassing activities. I commit myself to adhere to the Presbytery's Standard of Conduct.

Questions and answers about the Guidelines for use by presbyteries

🎵 s Presbyterians, we are called to work for the "peace, unity and purity of the Church" (Book of Order) as we seek to be faithful to God's work in the world. However, disagreements and conflicts are inevitable in the life of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) as we try to be faithful. They exist within committees, congregations, presbyteries, synods, at General Assemblies and in the national life of the denomination.

Conflicts are inevitable in all of life and certainly in the church. The history of the church is filled with conflicts and disagreements. Several of Paul's letters address the conflicts which were common in the early church. There have been and are going to be disagreements as Christians attempt to discern God's work in the world and as we interpret scripture.

Conflicts can be harmful and even destructive. They can cause individuals a great deal of pain and the community of faith immeasurable damage. Congregations have been divided; denominations have experienced schisms.

At the same time, conflicts can be an opportunity for new insights, learning, and individual and corporate growth. Disagreements can illuminate a topic in helpful ways and can present solutions to problems which previously had not been seen. The successful resolution of conflict can also bind people together in a powerful way.

The Bible contains many stories of conflict and disagreement and much advice about how they can be addressed. As those stories indicate, God is already present wherever there is brokenness, granting wholeness and peace. God promises to be with us in times of disagreement and calls us to reconciliation, trust, love and forgiveness.

We realize that our perspectives are limited, so to help us affirm each other, enhance our community, stay open to the viewpoints of others and be sensitive to cultural diversity, we commit ourselves to the Guidelines in a spirit of prayer, trust, and love, seeking the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

uestions and answers about the Guidelines. for use by presbyteries

What are the Guidelines and how did they come about?

"Seeking To Be Faithful Together: Guidelines for Presbyterians During Times of Disagreement" is a response to requests from many Presbyterian congregations and presbyteries which have experienced pain and brokenness resulting from disagreements that were not dealt with in a healthy and productive way. Some of these disagreements were about issues important in our national life (e.g. abortion and human sexuality), while some of them were about matters dealing with the life of the presbytery or congregation (e.g. whether or not the presbytery should develop a new urban ministry).

Every presbytery has conflicts. They will either be occasions for divisiveness and harm or they will provide opportunities for growing and learning. The Guidelines may help the presbyteries of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) use conflict in a creative and productive way.

The 204th General Assembly (1992) adopted the Guidelines for its own life and provided this tool to congregations, presbyteries, synods and theological institutions of the Presbyterian Church to help them deal with the inevitable conflicts and disagreements which occur.

What is the biblical basis for the Guidelines?

The Bible contains many stories of conflict and offers a great deal of guidance for dealing with disagreements. It is also rich in its description of God's peacegiving and reconciling work.

## Questions and answers about the Guidelines for use by presbyteries

- God, through Jesus Christ is reconciling the world and gives us the ministry of reconciliation.
   (II Cornthians 5:17-20)
- · We are one body. (I Corinthians 10:17)
- We are called to maintain the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace. (Ephesians 4:3)
- · Make peace with your brother or sister when you have a conflict. (Matthew 5:23-24)
- . Bless those who persecute you; live in harmony with one another. (Romans 12:14-16)
- Be kind to one another and forgive one another. (Ephesians 4:31-32)
- · Listen carefully before you speak. (Proverbs 18:13)
- . Speak the truth in love. (Ephesians 4:13-16)
- . Work for consensus. (Acts 15:1-31)

## Why should your presbytery agree to use the Guidelines?

Conflicts and disagreements occur in presbyteries. Where there are people who care deeply, there is bound to be conflict.

The Guidelines offer clear, simple suggestions for dealing with differences, so they become occasions for growing in grace and understanding, not times of divisiveness and separation. Though use of the Guidelines cannot prevent conflict from happening, they might help develop an open, helpful climate where differences are expected and dealt with productively.

## What are some suggested steps for considering the use of the Guidelines in your presbytery?

- Designate a leadership team to help the presbytery study and consider a vote to agree to use the Guidelines.
   This team could also help the presbytery use them if it votes to do so. The leadership could be provided by representatives from the Peacemaking Committee, the Committee on Ministry, the Christian Education committee, the General Council and other appropriate committees.
- Offer skill building sessions for dealing with conflict at a pre-presbytery event, a presbytery day, officer training sessions or at other gatherings of your presbytery. Consider adapting and using one of the resources listed on the "Resource Order Form" for the presbytery event.
- Present the Guidelines to the presbytery Distribute copies of the Guidelines to every presbyter prior to the
  presbytery meeting. Begin your presentation to the whole presbytery with a Bible study. One resource you
  might use is Behold the New Has Come: Peacemaking in Corinthians (see "Resource Order Form"). Review each
  Guideline one by one.
- Ask the presbytery to vote to agree to use the Guidelines and to recommend that each session in the presbytery study and consider a vote to use the Guidelines.
- Tell the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program if your presbytery agrees to use the Guidelines, about your
  experience with them and other efforts to deal with conflict and disagreement.

## How can the Guidelines be used in our presbytery?

Once your presbytery has agreed to use the Guidelines, there are several ways they might be used:

- Urge presbyters to use the Guidelines in presbytery meetings, committee meetings and during informal conversations.
- Read a simple prayer together at the beginning of the presbytery meeting which asks God's help in dealing with conflict effectively. One possible prayer:

## Questions and answers about the Guidelines for use by presbyteries

"Gracious and Loving God, You have called us together to do the work of Your church. Be present with us during this meeting, guide us that we may make decisions that will reflect Your loving presence in this world. Create within us open minds and hearts that we will not fear conflict or run from it, but embrace it, knowing that it is an opportunity for growing in faith and a fuller understanding of Your will for us. Help us to listen to each other, share our thoughts in loving, honest ways and do all we can to maintain the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace. Through Jesus the Christ we pray. Amen."

- Pray before voting on a matter which has created significant disagreement, reminding all present that some
  will be happy about the decision and some will be disappointed.
- Use the Guidelines in ways which encourage open candid discussion. Discourage the use of the Guidelines
  in ways which would stifle the sharing of disagreements and impede presbyters from sharing their opinions.
- · Display the Guidelines where presbytery is meeting.
- Encourage the use of the Guidelines in all areas of presbytery life, including committee work, mission projects, conferences, leadership training events, camps and retreats.
- Ask the General Council to review and evaluate the use of the Guidelines annually and to report the results
  of their evaluation to presbytery. The Council might also ask each committee to evaluate how useful the
  Guidelines were in its work.

## What are some suggestions for presbyteries as they help congregations consider and use the Guidelines?

- Determine which committee of presbytery will help congregations consider and use the Guidelines. Consider the Peacemaking Committee, the Committee on Ministry, the Christian Education committee or other appropriate committees.
- Send a copy of the Guidelines (the congregation version) to every congregation with a description of the nature of the help available from your presbytery.
- Ask that the presbytery's resource center have a sufficient number of copies of the Guidelines as well as the
  resources described on the last page of this form.
- . Develop a plan for making a presentation about the Guidelines to every session.
- Provide a training session on the Guidelines for clusters of congregations in geographically convenient locations. Consider also providing training sessions as pre-presbytery events.
- Offer a workshop on the Guidelines at presbytery leadership development events and officer training sessions.
- Develop a long-term plan for keeping the Guidelines before each congregation and for helping congregations implement them.

## Why inform the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program of any actions taken by your presbytery on the Guidelines, as well as your experiences, concerns, and suggestions?

The information received by the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program will help it and perhaps the General Assembly evaluate the Guidelines and their use. This information may lead to the strengthening of this tool and the development of resources which will help presbyteries use the Guidelines.

The Presbyterian Peacemaking Program will send information about new resources and other assistance to presbyteries which are using the Guidelines as well as good ideas and suggestions received from other presbyteries.

Communion was served by mission co-workers from around the world; officiants were the Rev. Peter Smith and the Rev. Edward D. Gehres, Jr. Teens of the Presbytery participated in the communion service.

## V. BUSINESS TO BE ADOPTED BY MOTION AND DEBATE (PART II) A. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH STRATEGY

Gretchen Denton reported for the committee. Following statements from persons involved in the life and ministry of the Faith New Church Development, Mrs. Denton led the Presbytery in a prayer of thanksgiving for the six year ministry of the Faith NCD congregation in Brandon Township. A motion was sustained to concur with the action of the Faith NCD members and discontinue the Faith NCD in Brandon Township.

Gretchen Denton and William Schram introduced for first reading guidelines for the distribution of net proceeds of the Calvin (West) sale available to the presbytery. The guidelines will be voted upon

in November.

## B. COMMITTEE ON OUTDOOR MINISTRIES

Michael Fonfara reported for the committee. He presented, for first reading, a plan to proceed with the consolidation of Camp Sarah Grindley onto the Howell Center property.

Richard Grant and Bob Tompkins briefly explained the plan and its history to the presbyters. The plan will be brought for adoption in November.

Vice-Moderator Helen Morrison assumed the duties of moderator.

## VI. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres lifted up and shared several events in the life of the presbytery as causes for celebration. He reported that the visit of the World Council of Churches to the PC(USA) and the Presbytery of Detroit marked the midpoint of the Ecumenical Decade: Churches in Solidarity with Women 1988-1998 and was a smashing success. He has received very positive feedback from the WCC and the General Assembly offices of the PC(USA).

Mr. Gehres is pleased with the action taken to place in nomination the name of Richard Milford as a candidate for Moderator of the 207th General Assembly as it represents the many wonderful gifts and resources that this presbytery possesses.

Mr. Gehres presented an update on presbytery staff. He reported that: (1) Evelyn Baker, resource center associate will retire January 31, (2) Ruth Allaben, accountant retires on October 31, (3) Sandy Jensen has been hired as the new receptionist. The presbytery is looking for a new resource center associate, an accountant and a senior secretary.

Mr. Gehres reported that Phase II of the new staff design and reorganization will soon be implemented. A plan of transition to implement the new staff design will be provided to council and the presbytery.

VII. MOMENTS OF SEEKING UNDERSTANDING

Members of presbytery shared their concerns about procedures, processes and actions that occurred during the meeting.

Moderator Smith resumed the duties of moderator.

Patrick Thompson reported for the committee and introduced Nora Wilson who spoke on the ministries of the Presbyterian Health, Education and Welfare Association (PHEWA) and the 1995 conference.

Patrick Thompson introduced Jean Lupe who called attention to the printed material distributed on the 2-Cents-Per-Meal hunger program and encouraged congregations who are not now participating in the program to join it.

## VIII. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the presbytery, the meeting was adjourned at 9:45 p.m. with a charge and benediction given by Moderator Smith.

## Urban Strategy Focus Group

## Preliminary Proposal for the creation of an Urban Ministry Training Institute

## Introduction

Urban Ministry is a very difficult undertaking. The City of Detroit is a classic example of the transformations in community life that are impacting American society. What was once a growing and thriving city of over two million citizens is now in decline and struggling to maintain the most basic forms of life. Where there were once good economic opportunities and life-sustaining jobs are now often minimum-wage and demeaning alternatives. At the same time, as a unified culture our inability to work cooperatively across racial, ethnic and class lines has diminished us all leaving us with isolation, powerlessness and hopelessness. Against this context we enter reflections of congregational life and the prospects for proclaiming the Gospel to those we wish to affirm who need to hear its good news.

Because the urban environment is changing rapidly and lacks prevalent patterns of growth, strategies must be developed to confront a diminishing quality of life. Many churches have failed to reflect on their purpose and prospects for expansion and have died as a result. As individual communities of faith we have particular situations to address and often must deal with these realities alone. Yet, as a collective church we have tremendous resources, particularly when enhanced by a careful consideration of the power of unified and cooperative action. Reflection, analysis, strategy development, networking and building relationships offer us an opportunity to draw strength from one another.

This proposal suggests the need and possibility to work toward our common goals facilitated by an Urban Ministry Training Institute. Urban ministry is a discipline which requires skills and perspectives refined by a wide range of concentrations. By bringing these concentrations together in an organized fashion we can be far more intentional and well-equipped.

Various components of the discipline should be assembled. The following general areas for reflection should be expanded by a thorough curriculum development resulting in very specific forums, classes, exercises and opportunities for critical thinking. Upon completion of this curriculum we should be far better prepared for constructive and self-perpetuating actions and ministry.

## COMPONENTS OF URBAN MINISTRY TRAINING

- 1. Theological Reflection is essential to ensure that we question and challenge our values and faith. Unless we are clear about our concepts of God and God's call to the Church we will lack a focus and direction that will sustain following steps toward an urban agenda for ministry.
- 2. Community and Institutional life is an important focus because while we affirm

- a faith in Christ we also live within particular cultures. Our particular cultural expressions vary and left unexamined, create barriers and gulfs of misinformation and mistrust between our various communities.
- 3. Structural analysis allows us to consider the impact of demographics and population factors, trends of growth and decline in various regions of metropolitan areas, socio-economic forces at work which may contribute to or detract from the quality of life of our communities, etc.
- 4. Leadership development allows us to reflect on the personal journey and essential discipline required to be a leader within a particular community. It also offers an opportunity to consider how to elicit leadership qualities in others, especially our young people who comprise the future of our churches and communities.
- 5. Church-based community organizing is another discipline which offers us the ability to reflect and act upon our own local interests and resources. It allows us to work as an organized community to strengthen one another by affirming our larger group concerns.
- 6. Social, economic and community development is another discipline which allows us a perspective and strategy to capitalize on larger societal resources coming from public as well as private sources. Much of the capital available in the form of money, technical expertise and other forms of support can only be appropriated by careful planning and structuring of our organizations.
- 7. Evaluation and Application is a concerted effort to apply the learnings about urban ministry which occurs in all offerings to concrete situations and opportunities. There is a need to coordinate such applications of learning to solidify the learning and to help focus further learning about particular aspects of urban life and its challenges. This also aids in refining the entire curriculum toward more effective programs and structure.

## PILOT PROJECT

As a way of beginning this institute we will initiate a pilot project in the early part of 1995. This project will involve one introductory class of a more general nature. Close observation and evaluation to our initial response from the community will help guide us in moving toward a full implementation which should be done by September 1995. Networking and coalition building will assist further development and participation.

## SCHEDULES

It is important to provide educational opportunities at times when a maximum number of persons would be able to take full advantage of them. Classes will be scheduled on a quarterly basis with possibly differing durations for various classes. Two sessions will be established in the first half of the year and two in the latter half. July and August will be minimized because of summer schedules. Classes should be approximately 6 to 8 weeks in duration; at 2-3 per week.

## ADMINISTRATION

Perhaps the most important aspect of this project is that it is intended to be truly ecumenical. Currently, contact has been made with leaders from other denominational governing bodies to solicit their support and participation for this program. By making this ecumenical we will be able to mobilize more persons to participate in urban training and more funds to help advance its purpose. Furthermore, the principle of ecumenicity should be lifted up to build coalitions for action which will support future urban ministry efforts.

To accomplish this we also have approached the Ecumenical Theological Seminary to function as a facilitating and organizing institution to develop this training institute. ETS already has explored possibilities for community and lay education so that our efforts would naturally fit with a direction they already seem committed to. Its location on Woodward and its presence in the city offers us a solid and credible resource to bring this project together. The Dean of ETS, Dr. Biersdorf, has suggested his willingness to support this effort and focus on curriculum development. Funding sources have been approached already by them in thinking about similar programs.

Instructors and group leaders will be solicited from the area universities, community groups and other institutions in the Detroit area. Since the goal of this project is to involve as many persons as possible only a nominal tuition will be charged (approximately \$25). Instructors must agree to participate for nominal fees of approximately \$250.

An Institute Coordinator will be hired to organize and promote the work of this project. This person will be responsible for registration, communications, community relations and record keeping. Ultimately, more staff will be involved as the program grows including development and support personnel. An initial budget of \$60,000 should be anticipated for the first year of operations to compensate the coordinator and provide overhead resources for promotions and operations. These funds should come initially from various judicatories willing to be charter organizational members of this project. Eventually, individual and other institutional memberships can be sold to broaden the base of support.

- 3. A proposal may originate in any congregation of the Presbytery as long as the ministry proposed is to be implemented in an area defined as "urban".
- 4. A proposal must be consistent with mission directives of the Presbytery.
- 5. A proposal shall articulate a clear Christian theological vision for urban ministry.
- 6. A proposal must have a clear outreach beyond current church membership in evangelism, mission, or both.
- 7. A proposal must generate an amount equal to at least 10% of the grant from sources other than Presbytery committees. Proposals with greater than 10% of such funds will be given preference.
- 8. A proposal may be funded for more than one year, however, a separate application must be submitted each year.

#### D. Procedural Guidelines:

- 1. Applications for Urban Ministry Fund grants will be made through the Presbytery Council, with a May 1 deadline for application. Disbursements of approved grants will begin July 1.
- 2. Applications shall be evaluated by a seven (7) person review board including 2 members from the Presbytery unit representing urban mission concerns; 2 members from the unit representing congregational strategy, 1 member from the unit representing evangelism, and the remaining 2 at-large members appointed by the Presbytery Council.
- 3. Ordinarily, up to 33% of the balance or \$50,000, whichever is greater, may be disbursed each year.
- III Designate 80% of an unencumbered proceeds from any future sale of urban church property to the Urban Ministry Fund is the Presbytery of Detroit and explore additional sources of funding. Designate 20% of unencumbered proceeds from any such future sales to invest in the national Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Urban Ministry Endowment Fund.

In 1992, the Presbytery of Detroit sent an overture to the General Assembly recommending that presbyteries be urged to designate 80% of proceeds from future sales of urban church property for use in urban ministry and 20% be designated to a national Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Urban Ministry Endowment Fund. The overture was overwhelmingly passed by the General Assembly. To date, the Presbytery of Detroit has taken no action to implement this recommendation for its own practice.

#### CALVIN (WEST) PROCEED GUIDELINES

The Committee on Church Strategy recommends that the Presbytery of Detroit:

- I. Designate the proceeds for the Calvin West sale allocated for urban ministry as follows:
  - A. Eighty percent (80%) to establish the Urban Ministry Fund in the Presbytery of Detroit.
  - B. Twenty percent (20%) to invest in the national Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Urban Ministry Endowment Fund.
  - The "starting balance" will be the amount of money available to the Presbytery according to the terms of the Calvin West/Westminster merger agreement which declared that 2/3 of the balance of sale proceeds (following the payment of outstanding bills and debts to the Presbytery) be designated for "urban ministry".

If a new church development (NCD) in the Calvin West area is recommended to and approved by the Presbytery, then the "starting balance" of the Urban Ministry Fund will be the remainder after funding for the NCD is established.

- II. Adopt the following paper describing the Urban Ministry Fund in the Presbytery of Detroit:
  - A. The Urban Ministry Fund in the Presbytery of Detroit
    The goal of this fund recognizes: the need for support of
    Presbyterian witness in urban areas; the need for well trained
    leadership; the need for creative and experimental ways to do
    urban ministry; the need for significant funding for major
    projects; and the need for partnerships that increase the
    resources available for urban ministry.

The criteria and procedures are consistent with: the mission directions of the Presbytery; the General Assembly resolution on use of funds from the sale of urban churches stemming from an overture from this presbytery; the mission statement of the former Urban Ministry Cabinet of the Presbytery of Detroit; and the merger agreement between Calvin West Church and Westminster Church.

- B. "Urban" Defined
  For the purposes of this fund, "urban" includes but is not
  limited to the cities of Detroit, Ecorse, Pontiac, Port Huron
  and Mt. Clemens. Consideration may be given for use of the
  funds in near suburbs that strongly exhibit some of the
  following sociological qualities:
  - a. high racial/ethnic diversity and/or racial/ethnic minority population;
  - concentration of populations at or below poverty level;
  - c. areas of declining housing stock and infrastructure;
  - d. consistency with "urban lifestyle" descriptions used in the Percepts studies to describe the population of Detroit and Pontiac.
- C. Proposal Criteria:
  - 1. Grants will be limited to new urban ministry proposals.
  - Regardless of origination, a proposal must have the endorsement of the session of at least one congregation of the Presbytery. Preference will be given to proposals that include active participation by membership.

E. COMMITTEE ON MISSION INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP
Tom Fearnside reported for the committee. He thanked the members
of council who served as visiting stewards. One visiting steward
brought a concern from the Park United Church in Highland Park
concerning proposed building in that city. Motion was sustained to
direct the clerk to send a letter to the Mayor of Highland Park (Mayor
Linsey Porter) expressing the concerns of council in this matter.

### F. COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND NURTURE

Anna Marie Austin reported for the committee that the Committee on Metropolitan Mission had asked their committee for financial support of the Urban Training Institute.

#### G. PRESBYTERIAN MEN

George Irwin reported the Annual Men's Advent Communion Breakfast is December 3 at Farmington, First Church. Lloyd Reuss is the speaker. Arrangements for the 1995 breakfast are already well under way.

#### H. THEOLOGY AND WORSHIP COMMITTEE

Peter Boeve reported the committee has the complete set of tapes of the Re-Imagining Conference which are available from the committee.

#### I. EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported on staff changes in the office. Sandy Jensen has been hired as the Receptionist/Secretary and they are close to hiring an accountant.

He reported the staff continues to work with the consultants on building teamwork and the implementation of the new staff design.

Mr. Gehres raised a concern about ecumenical relationships and the possibility of putting all ecumenical relationship costs in one place in the budget. He will be talking with committees that currently have ecumenical costs in their budgets.

A flyer was distributed that announced the availability of desktop publishing through the office for committees of presbytery and council.

## IV. ORDER OF THE DAY PRAYER AND REFLECTION: MISSION 2000

The task force on Mission 200 prepared a presentation for the council and following the presentation engaged in discussion with the council. Helen Morrison began with a background of how we got to the point we are at now. This was followed by an overview of the Mission 2000 document by Clarisa Piecuch. Ed Gehres presented an overview of what happened at the special meeting of presbytery in October and Peter Boeve shared the responses of the small group discussions at that special meeting.

The council then discussed the document and steps to take in the future. Motion was sustained to refer the document and concerns back to the task force to bring a specific recommendation on next steps to the December council meeting.

Tom Heinrichs was thanked for his work on developing the Mission 2000 document.

#### V. ECUMENICAL VISITOR - STEPHEN TER

Stephen Ter, from Sudan shared with the council the plight of his country, the Sudan, and the destructive effects 37 years of war have had on that country. He talked about his work in Theological Education and the work of the church in ministering to individuals. He encouraged us, indeed challenged us, to continue to support missions in his country through our mission giving.

## VI. IN THE LIFE OF THE PRESBYTERY (PART II) A. STAFF SERVICES COMMITTEE

Jim Conley reported for the committee. Ed Gehres, Mary Ann Standing, Jenny Schram, and Clarisa Piecuch were excused from this portion of the meeting. Motion was sustained to approve and recommend to Presbytery an increase of 3% in compensation in 1995 for the positions of Executive Presbyter, Associate Executive, Administrator for Business Affairs, Stated Clerk and Director of Outdoor Ministries. Actual figures for each position are shown in Appendix A.

### VII. TRUSTEES

#### A. PROPERTY AND INVESTMENTS COMMITTEE

Stan King reported for the committee. Acting in their capacity as trustees of the Presbytery of Detroit, Inc. and under the authority granted by the presbytery, motions were sustained that council:

- 1. Approve a loan of \$20,000 to the Jefferson Avenue Housing Development Corporation. Term of loan shall be four (4) years. Interest rate shall be fixed at 5.5%, accruing from inception. Monthly payments of \$1,000.00 to begin in twenty fifth month from inception. Loan shall be fully amortized in forty eighth month. Loan to be secured by a promissory note from J.A.H.D.C. Loan source shall be the Eastminster Fund.
- 2. Property and Investments Committee along with representatives of the Committee on Church Strategy and the Committee on Metropolitan Mission, develop guidelines for the review of future loan requests from economic development or other mission entities which are not directly related to a congregation.

Motion was not sustained that council:

 Approve a contract with Automatic Data Processing to process Presbytery staff and Howell Center payroll and withholding tax payments and reports.

- 4. Approve Kirk in the Hills Church request to sell for \$432,000 cash, land known as "The Gate House Property" located on the east side of Kirk Way Drive. Legal description is found in Appendix B.
- 5. Approve a loan not to exceed \$250,000 to New St. Luke Missionary Baptist Church of Detroit, Inc. Interest rate to be ten (10) percent. Payments to be amortized at a twenty (20) year rate. Term of loan to be five (5) years. Loan to be secured by note and second mortgage, subordinated to NBD Bank, NA., on the property located at 14178 Ashton, Detroit.
- 6. Authorize any one of its following officers: President, Vice President, Secretary or Treasurer to sign all documents on behalf of the Corporation relating to the sale of the Ashton Street property.

And further, that the Corporate Secretary, Mr. Gehres, be authorized to provide and sign appropriate documents attesting to this Trustee authorization.

#### VIII. FINANCIAL REPORT

#### A. BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

John Seitz reported for the committee. Printed balance sheets were distributed and discussed.

#### IX. JOYS, CONCERNS AND ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business the meeting of the council was adjourned at 5:20 p.m. with prayer by the Reverend Stephen Ter.
