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MINUTES OF THE JANUARY 24, 1995 STATED MEETING PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT GATHERED AS THE BODY OF CHRIST FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, DEARBORN

I. GATHERED AS THE PEOPLE OF GOD A. THE MODERATOR

A quorum being present, the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was convened in stated session on Tuesday, January 24, 1995 at 5:30 pm at the First Presbyterian Church, Dearborn, Michigan. The meeting was opened with prayer by Past-Moderator Peter Smith.

Jennifer Kondak was appointed Assistant to the Stated Clerk. New commissioners and ministers were introduced and welcomed.

B. THE STATED CLERK

Stated Clerk Jenny Schram presented Part I of her report and motions were adopted that presbytery:

1. DOCKET. Adopt the docket as presented.

- 2. EXCUSES. Excuse all continuing members of presbytery and elder members of Council who have asked to be excused.
- 3. CORRESPONDING MEMBERS. Without further motions, seat as corresponding members all eligible persons who are presented to the Presbytery and who register on the enrollment sheet for corresponding members.

C. WELCOME FROM THE HOST CHURCH

The Rev. William Steele, pastor Dearborn, First welcomed the presbyters to the church on behalf of the Staff and Session of Dearborn, First. He stated that Alden Dow designed Dearborn, First.

II. MOMENTS OF CELEBRATIONS AND REMEMBRANCE A. JOYS AND CONCERNS

Joys and concerns of the presbytery were shared by presbyters.

III. EMPOWERING OUR MINISTRIES THROUGH MOMENTS OF CHALLENGE BUSINESS TO BE ADOPTED BY MOTION AND DEBATE

The Rev. Peter Smith led the presbytery in a prayer for illumination before action on the business before the presbytery.

A. THE STATED CLERK

Stated Clerk Jenny Schram presented Part II of her report. Motions were sustained that presbytery:

- a. Receive the report of Special Disciplinary Committee 94.02 that it has completed the investigation of the allegation before it and will not be filing charges. SDC 94.02 was dismissed with gratitude.
- b. Peter Smith, in accordance with the presbytery bylaws, has appointed Special Disciplinary Committee 94.05 to investigate an accusation against a member of presbytery: The Rev. David Krehbiel (chair), The Rev. Gregory Wiggins, Elder Sally Rankin and the Rev. Anna Marie Austin.
- c. Peter Smith, in accordance with the presbytery bylaws, has appointed Special Disciplinary Committee 94.06 to investigate an accusation which was made against a member of presbytery: Elder Patrick Thompson (chair), Elder Sammie Solomon, the Rev. Kevin Johnson, Elder Gertrude Rodgers and the Rev. Claudia Lewis.

- d. Information was received that Clarisa Piecuch was ordained as an elder. A motion was sustained that the presbytery restore the word "Presbyter" to her job title, making her title Associate Executive Presbyter. In accordance to the Book of Order G-11.0101c a motion was sustained to make her a voting member of presbytery for the duration of her tenure of service as Associate Executive Presbyter.
- e. A motion was sustained to allow the Rev. Charles Blasdell, who has relocated to James Presbytery but has not received a call as yet, permission to labor outside the bounds of the presbytery in the Presbytery of the James doing pulpit supply until he receives a call.

B. THE COUNCIL

Helen Morrison reported for the council. Motions were sustained that presbytery:

C. COMMITTEE ON MINISTRY

William Rumsey reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that presbytery:

- Dissolve the pastoral relationship between First Church, Royal Oak, and the Rev. Charles Blasdell, effective January 24, 1995, pending action of the congregation, and move Mr. Blasdell to the member at-large roll.
- 2. Dissolve the pastoral relationship between First Church, Brighton, and the Rev. Robert C. McConnell, effective February 5, 1995, pending action of the congregation, and move Mr. McConnell to the member at-large roll. Appoint the Rev. Brewster Gere moderator of session of First Church, Brighton.
- 3. Dissolve the pastoral relationship between Northside church, Ann Arbor, and the Rev. Peter Boeve, effective March 31, 1995.
- 4. Approve the call of the Korean Church, Southfield to the Mr. Jin Suk Kim, as Associate Pastor, effective February 1, 1995, with the following terms: Salary & Housing \$26,000; FICA \$1,989; Pension \$7,387; Medical deductible \$840; Auto/Travel \$2,400; Continuing education \$1,500; One month vacation, including 4 Sundays; Two weeks study leave, including 2 Sundays. Enroll Mr. Kim as a member of presbytery upon ordination and receipt of his credentials from The Presbytery of the James.

Acting Moderator Smith declared the presbytery in recess for the purpose of convening as the Presbytery of Detroit, Inc.

The presbytery was convened in a corporation meeting and elected the newly elected members of council as trustees for 1995. The corporation meeting was adjourned.

Acting Moderator Smith reconvened the stated meeting of presbytery.

E. METROPOLITAN MISSION

Patrick Thompson reported for the committee. A motion was sustained that presbytery become an endorser of the AIDS Quilt display that will be brought to Detroit in April by the Names Project so that the Presbytery of Detroit might appear on the printed literature as an endorser.

Mr. Melde introduced Candidate Matthew Jun, Southfield, Korean, who has met the requirements for ordination and has received a call to the Korean Presbyterian Church of Metropolitan Detroit, Southfield. After hearing his statement of faith, and opportunity being given for questions from the floor, presbytery voted to arrest and sustain the examination, and to proceed to ordain Mr. Jun. Acting Moderator Smith offered a prayer for the ministry of Mr. Jun, all who had touched him along his journey to service and for all presbyters in their service.

H. CHERRY HILL ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSION

Ken Smith reported for the commission. He gave the history of the commission including their charge from presbytery. The commission had no authority to act on its own and was to strictly advise the staff and session of Cherry Hill Presbyterian Church. Mr. Smith reported that the commission met regularly with the Administrative Committee of the session, the Staff and the Session of Cherry Hill. The commission determined that there were irreconcilable differences between certain staff members and the senior pastor, therefore, it recommended that one full-time and five part-time staff be asked to resign and that the session concur with the senior pastor's request for a dissolution of the pastoral relationship. The session voted to follow the recommendation of the commission by a two to one margin. However, a minority group of members did not agree with the recommendation and reconciliation has not occurred. Mr. Smith stated that the commission will continue to work with the church as long as necessary to help bring about reconciliation.

I. OTHER BUSINESS - OVERTURE TO THE BOOK OF CONFESSIONS Jim Beates presented for a first reading a draft of an overture to amend the Book of Confessions. A motion was sustained that the overture be referred to the Planning and Structure Committee which, after consultation with other appropriate committees, will bring a recommendation to the February meeting of presbytery.

IV. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported that effective immediately the office hours for the Presbytery Office will be 8:30 am to 5:00 pm, Monday - Friday.

Mr. Gehres recognized two members of the presbytery staff who are leaving the employ of the presbytery. They are the Rev. Jim Beates, Peace Enabler and Elder Evelyn Baker, Resource Center Coordinator. Mr. Gehres thanked each person for their work and the expertise they exemplified in their areas of service. He presented each with a certificate of appreciation.

Executive Presbyter Gehres shared an administrative concern that he has for the congregations of the presbytery. Mr. Gehres explained that each congregation should be incorporated as a Michigan corporation and needs to keep the incorporation papers current. He encouraged the congregations to be in consultation with the Property and Investments Committee if they are renting or leasing space in their buildings so that the committee may help the congregations secure maximum protection from legal complications that may occur when renting or leasing space to community groups.

V. MOMENTS OF SHARING OUR MINISTRIES - PART I A. EDUCATION AND NURTURE

Jennifer Kondak reported on the youth Triennium which will be held in July. Ms. Kondak encouraged the congregations to nominate delegates to the Triennium. Scholarship money is available. Ten adults are needed; five women, five men. She said that Clarisa Piecuch and Nancy McCloskey are coordinating the adults.

VI. ORDER OF THE DAY: WORSHIP

INCLUDING THE INSTALLATION OF THE MODERATOR AND VICE-MODERATOR Worship was led by members of presbytery. The Scripture was taken from selected verses of 2 Corinthians. The sermon, titled, "Following the Star/The Cost of Partnership", was given by Moderator Helen Morrison. The Rev. Peter Smith, retiring moderator, installed Helen Morrison as Moderator and the Rev. In Soon Choi as Vice-Moderator for 1995. The constitutional questions were asked and answered in the affirmative. Mr. Smith offered a prayer and declared the moderator and vice-moderator duly installed for 1995. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was served. Officiants were the Revs. Peter Smith and Edward Gehres; communion was served by members of the presbytery council and friends of Moderator Helen Morrison.

VII. MOMENTS OF SHARING OUR MINISTRIES - PART II A. METROPOLITAN MISSION

Patrick Thompson reported for the committee. He asked for the prayers of the presbyters for Artheillia Thompson, Hunger Action Enabler, who is ill and on medical leave. He reported that the presbytery received 33,000 pounds of food from Operation Can-Do and it is housed at Grandale Church of the Master. Mr. Thompson reported that monies have been severely curtailed from the Michigan Department of Social Services and the Federal Emergency Management Agency for food distribution. The Personal Responsibility Act (PRA) will change the way food programs will be administered in the future. Some programs that may be affected are school lunches and food stamp distribution. Mr. Thompson reported that the 2-Cents-Per-Meal program continues and that the committee is grateful for the support of the presbyters. He encourages continued support for this program. He reported that there are 17 hunger outlets in the Presbytery of Detroit.

B. EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

Craig Aue reported for the committee on three upcoming events. Mr. Aue introduced Martha Subel, Lincoln Park Church, who reported on the 1994 project at the Lincoln Park Church that was funded through a grant from the Evangelism Committee.

VIII. MOMENTS OF SEEKING UNDERSTANDING

Presbyters spoke of work that has been done in the presbytery during the past year and of upcoming events in the life of the presbytery.

IX. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the presbytery, the meeting was adjourned at 8:30 pm with prayer by Moderator Morrison. The next stated meeting of presbytery will convene Tuesday,

February 28, 1995, at the Fort Street Presbyterian Church, Detroit, at 5:30 pm.

Congregations in the 200-600 range with strong potential and a pattern of growth may apply through the Church Strategy Committee. Over a five year period the congregation's share of support for the position's salary will increase from 50% to full funding. The assumption is that the membership growth during those five years would allow for the increased financial commitment of the part of the congregation.

"Lyle Schaller identifies congregations with 85-165 at worship as being one of the most comfortable plateaus, and therefore one of the hardest plateaus to escape upward from. Churches of 200-250 fall into this attendance pattern. Another plateau is at the 350-600 member range if there is only one pastor. Churches at these levels need another program staff person to maintain growth past a plateau, but often lack financial resources to take that step.

A quorum being present, the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was convened in stated session on Tuesday, February 28, 1995 at 5:30 pm at the Fort Street Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan. The meeting was opened with prayer by Moderator Helen Morrison.

"The Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod of the Covenant finds that the orders of the Presbytery of Detroit to the Rev. Milton R. Henry to cease and desist his work at Christ Presbyterian Church are not irregularities and Issue One of the Complaint is not sustained. Aye 8, No 0.

"The Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod of the Covenant finds that the Presbytery of Detroit did respond to Rev. Henry's request for validation sufficiently to be understood by Rev. Henry, and therefore, the Presbytery did not fail to act, and therefore there is no delinquency. Issue Two of the complaint is not sustained. Aye 6, No 2." The previous actions the presbytery took concerning Mr. Henry's work at Christ Church are in force.

- B. 94.04, Watt., et. al., Complainant vs. Session of Cherry Hill Presbyterian Church, Respondent. The Permanent Judicial Commission of the Presbytery of Detroit reports this case is closed pursuant to the request of the complainants to withdraw the complaint.
- C. Special Disciplinary Committees 94.03, 94.05 and 94.06 continue their investigations.
- D. 95.01, A complaint against a session was received and forwarded to the Permanent Judicial Commission.
- 3. Motion was sustained to authorize the Committee on Nominations, looking at the issue of representation, to consult with those who have been elected commissioners to GA to determine which of those elders and ministers will represent the Presbytery of Detroit. (It was necessary to reduce the number of commissioners because of membership loss in the presbytery.)

Milton Henry's attitude that acknowledges his mistakes in ministry that have done harm to the peace and unity of the Presbytery, we continue to ask, that as an outward sign of this change in attitude, that Mr. Henry cease and desist in his work at Christ Presbyterian Church by the deadline previously established by Presbytery (December 1, 1993); and

Whereas the Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod of the Covenant

sustained the actions of the Presbytery of Detroit, ruling our actions were in order and not irregularities, and transmitted this action to all parties involved by certified mail on February 1, 1995;

Therefore, the Presbytery of Detroit calls upon the Rev. Milton R. Henry to communicate in writing to the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery by noon on Friday, March 3, 1995 that he has complied with the orders of the presbytery to:

- acknowledge that he is subject to the Presbyterian Church a. (U.S.A.) in matters pertaining to his ordination and the exercise of ministry as a minister of Word and Sacrament (G-6.0201 and G-14.0405, b.3, 7, 9);
- cease by March 3, 1995, all current work not approved by the Presbytery of Detroit, including Christ Presbyterian Church b. (G-11.0411);
- c. refrain from engaging in future work not approved by the Presbytery of Detroit (G-11.0411).

Failure to comply with the orders of the Presbytery of Detroit by continuation in disapproved work will be considered a renunciation of the jurisdiction of the Church, and will result in removal from the rolls of the Presbytery of Detroit effective March 3, 1995, in accord with G-6.0502 and G-6.0503.

(There were no negative votes and one abstention.)

VI. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER Executive Presbyter Edward Gehres reflected on what we do as disciples of Jesus Christ and the people of God to work for the poor, the disadvantaged, the oppressed, those who do not know where they will get their next meal, those who have no shelter.

- B. 94.04, Watt., et. al., Complainant vs. Session of Cherry Hill Presbyterian Church, Respondent. The Permanent Judicial Commission of the Presbytery of Detroit reports this case is closed pursuant to the request of the complainants to withdraw the complaint.
- 5. Motion was sustained to recommend presbytery grant the request of the Grosse Pointe Memorial Church to sanction a congregational meeting on February 5, 1995, with less than a quorum of members present (quorum - 236 members; present 118 - members). The business transacted at the meeting was receiving the 1994 annual report, approval of terms of call, to ordain officers and to elect a trustee to fill a vacancy.

C. THE MODERATOR

Moderator Helen Morrison reported she officiated at the installation of the Rev. Judy Shipman at Saline, First Church on January 29. She raised the concern of how to involve more members of presbytery in this act of the presbytery.

Moderator Morrison reported on the January 20 Synod consultation. The minutes have just been received and will be copied and distributed.

Motion was sustained to authorize the Chair of council, in consultation with the Moderator and Richard Milford, to appoint additional members to the committee to elect Richard Milford moderator of the General Assembly to broaden presbytery representation.

II. FELLOWSHIP AND REFLECTION

Peter Smith asked new members of council to introduce themselves. The reset of the council then introduced themselves to the new members. Helen Morrison presented information on the council retreat March 28, 1995 and asked each member of council to submit a statement on what they would like to see council do in the coming year.

III. TRUSTEES

A. PROPERTY AND INVESTMENTS COMMITTEE

Bernard Walker reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that council:

- Approve the request from the Belleville Presbyterian Church to sell property described as lots 258 and 259, Huron Park No. 1 sub (T3S RBE L56 P14 WCR) known as 70 N. Biggs for \$98,000 on a seven year land contract with a \$10,000 down payment and monthly payments of \$850 from John and Linda Lombardo.
- 2. Approve, with the contingency of Westminster's approval and sufficient funding being found, the presbytery's participation in the purchase of a Garaventa Stair-lift Model GSL-2 for the stairway to the second floor of Westminster Church on the basis of Presbytery of Detroit providing 50% of the initial cash required up to \$7500, with the understanding that the Presbytery will amortize 10% of its share in each year's budget for the next ten years. If current lease is not renewed after 12/31/98, the unamortized balance is to be refunded by Westminster Church. There will be a written agreement that if the lease is less than ten years the amount owed will be prorated. Further, the agreement will state that the Westminster Church assumes all direct costs of inspecting and maintaining the lift and assumes liability resulting from its operations.
- 3. Grant Shelby, St. Thomas Presbyterian Church permission to borrow for up to one year, \$19,000 from the Huntington Bank at 1% above prime.

4. Accept the bid presented by East Michigan Distribution Company to make roof repairs on the New Grace Presbyterian Church building located at 18391 Morang, Detroit for \$1,180 contingent upon the Presbytery being provided with written verification that the contractor is properly insured and licensed.

IV. FINANCIAL

A. BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Jerry Seaton reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that council:

- 1. Approve the following procedure for dealing with 1994 carry overs:
 - A. the unexpended funds available for carry over from the 1994 Budget, except those that are of a contractual nature, be placed in a new line under the council budget entitled "Carry over";
 - B. that these funds be available to fund the accounts previously approved by council for carry over into the 1995 budget up to the amount approved as listed below;
 - C. that such funding be authorized by council upon recommendation of the Budget & Finance Committee after receiving, no later than May 1, 1995, a written application setting forth a specific proposal for funding that clearly states the purpose, action plan and timeline for use of the carry over funds;
 - D. that the unexpended balance of 1994 carry over funds on August 1st will be designated to be carried as surplus for funding the 1996 budget.

MINUTES OF THE APRIL 25, 1995 STATED MEETING PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT GATHERED AS THE BODY OF CHRIST ALLEN PARK PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ALLEN PARK I. GATHERED AS THE PEOPLE OF GOD A. THE MODERATOR

A quorum being present, the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was convened in stated session on Tuesday, April 25, 1995 at 5:30 P.M. at the Allen Park Presbyterian Church, Allen Park, Michigan. The meeting was opened with prayer by Moderator Helen Morrison.

Marie Brunnelle was appointed Assistant to the Stated Clerk. New commissioners and ministers were introduced and welcomed by Moderator Helen Morrison.

B. THE STATED CLERK

Stated Clerk Jenny Schram presented Part I of her report and motions were adopted that presbytery:

- 1. DOCKET. Adopt the docket as presented.
- 2. Excuses. Excuse all continuing members of Presbytery and elder members of Council who have asked to be excused. A quorum was present. The full roll is found in Attachment One.
- 3. CORRESPONDING MEMBERS. Without further motions, seat as corresponding members all eligible persons who are presented to the Presbytery and who register on the enrollment sheet for corresponding members.

C. WELCOME FROM THE HOST CHURCH

The Rev. Mark McDonough, pastor Allen Park Presbyterian Church, with the Rev. Kellie Bohlman, associate pastor, welcomed the presbyters to the church on behalf of the moderator and the entire church staff. Rev. McDonough stated that he hoped the presbyters enjoyed the brass concert during the dinner hour.

II. MOMENTS OF CELEBRATION AND REMEMBRANCE A. JOYS AND CONCERNS

Joys and concerns of the presbytery were shared by presbyters. Associate Executive Presbyter Piecuch recognized the work of Stated Clerk Schram as she leaves the Presbytery of Detroit.

B. COMMITTEE TO ELECT RICHARD MILFORD

Steve Melde spoke on behalf of the committee to elect Richard Milford as moderator of the 207th General Assembly (1995). He gave a review of the life and work of Mr. Milford and stated that the committee is working with Mr. Milford in his preparation for election. Mr. Melde asked for the prayers of the presbytery and for the people to join the committee in Cincinnati to help in the election of Mr. Milford.

SHARING OUR MINISTRIES (PART I) & A. MISSION INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP

Kevin Piecuch reported for the committee. He introduced Charles McCloskey who spoke on Wills Emphasis Sunday and planned giving to the Church. Mr. Piecuch introduced the stewardship education resource <u>Stewardship 1995</u>. He introduced Julie McDonough who designed the cover of the resource. Ms. McDonough explained the stained glass window depicted on the cover.

B. READERS OF ORDINATION EXAMS

Steve Melde explained the process undertaken in the reading of the ordination examinations of persons who are nearing completion of studies that will prepare them to become Ministers

of the Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The candidates are required to take four sets of ordination exams and the exams are graded in one of six reading groups. Six persons from the Presbytery participated in the reading of the exams at the Chicago Reading Group in March. The six readers were elected by the presbytery.

The Permanent Judicial Commission of the Presbytery of Detroit met on March 28, 1995 to consider the above complaint on light of D-6.1200a of the Form of Government. The PJC made the following determinations:

> 1. The complaint was not timely filed. D-6.1200a(1). The complaint must be filed within 3 months of the irregularity. D-6.0600a. The act complained of occurred no later than October 6, 1994, according to the papers filed. A complaint must have been filed no later than January 6, 1995. The complaint was filed no earlier than February 23, 1995

2. The complainant has no standing to file the case. D-61200a(3). In order for a person to file a complaint against a particular church with the presbytery permanent judicial commission, the party must be a member of that church. Mr. Whitehead is not a member of Kirk in the Hills.

Since the complaint does not meet the requirements of D-6.1200a(1) of the Form of Government, the complaint is dismissed and the file is closed.

Treasurer Wilma Dellinger presented the Post Audit Report for December 31, 1994. She stated that the auditors have completed the audit for 1994. Ms. Dellinger reminded the presbyters that the per capita payments from the churches were due January 31, 1995. The presbytery has paid the per capita assessment to the Synod in full and has paid one half of the General Assembly assessment with the remainder due in June.

V. ORDER OF THE DAY: WORSHIP

Worship was led by Elders Pam Hutchens and Gertrude Rogers and the Reverends Gloria Albrecht and Raafat Hanna. Music was provided by the Allen Park Presbyterian Choir. Acts 9:1-17 was used as the text for the sermon by Dr. Albrecht.

VI. ORDER OF THE DAY: SHARING OUR MINISTRIES (PART II) A. EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

Craig Aue reported for the Evangelism Committee. He encouraged the presbyters to use the Member Referral Service when members of congregations move from city to city. A speaker from the Church of Our Savior, West Bloomfield reported on the evangelism project held June 1994 that was funded by the Evangelism Committee. Mr. Aue announced that the Southfield Presbyterian Church has signed the Commitment to Evangelism and that he has a certificate for them.

B. CHURCH STRATEGY COMMITTEE

Deborah Kerr reported for the committee. She stated that the committee works with churches in the area of congregational development and has limited funds to assist churches in redevelopment, revitalization and church growth. Rev. Kerr informed presbyters of the process for applying for funding. Rev. Kerr emphasized that the committee also works with congregations in the areas of redevelopment and church growth in more ways than just funding.

C. ALMA COLLEGE

Jan Holmes brought greetings from Alma College. She reported that a continuing education event for Pastors and Christian Educators will be held at Alma College, Alma, Michigan May 15-17, 1995.

3. Mr. Melde introduced Candidate Timothy Davenport-Herbst, who has met the requirements for ordination and has received a call in Mission Presbytery (Texas). After hearing his statement of faith, and opportunity being given for questions from the floor, presbytery voted to arrest and sustain the examination, and to proceed to ordain

Mr. Davenport-Herbst and to transfer his credentials to Mission Presbytery effective May 28,1995. Moderator Morrison offered a prayer for the ministry of Mr. Davenport-Herbst after which the presbyters sang "We Are One In The Spirit".

William Rumsey reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that Presbytery:

- 3. Dissolve the interim pastoral relationship between First Church, Birmingham and the Rev. Randall Painter, grant him the status of Honorably Retired, effective May 31, 1995.
- 4. Dissolve the pastoral relationship between First Church, Royal Oak and the Rev. William J. Rumsey, effective June 30, 1995 and dismiss him to the Presbytery of Central Florida.

 9. Grant the status of Honorably Retired to the Rev. Dewitt McIntyre, effective May 1, 1995.
- 10. Approve the terms of "Agreement for Termination and Dissolution of the Associate Pastor Relationship between the Redford Church, Detroit and the Rev. Kenneth G. Kaibel, as follows:
 - (1) That the Associate Pastor relationship be dissolved as of March 31, 1995.
 - (2) Recognizing that Ministers of Word and Sacrament are self employed and do not have access to unemployment security payments, that the Redford Presbyterian Church pay the Rev. Kenneth G. Kaibel full cash salary, free use of the manse, housing allowance, utility allowance, Board of Pension dues (pension, major medical, disability), and reimbursable medical supplement payments, at the rate of the Terms of Call for 1995, for a period of three months (April, May, and June 1995). Payments will be made in the usual, customary and timely manner (every other Friday), beyond the date of dissolution (March 31, 1995) and not beyond the period ending June 30, 1995.
 - (3) That occupancy of the church owned manse at 14006 Riga will terminate June 30, 1995 and that the manse property will be vacated by June 30, 1995.
 - It is further agreed:
 - A. That the Rev. Kenneth G. Kaibel is subject to the Book of Order G-14.0606 and Detroit Presbytery's Committee on Ministry policy which states "The minister shall have no pastoral contact with members of the former parish after the date of dissolution. This will include weddings, baptisms, counseling, teaching, resourcing and any other pastoral functions."
 - B. Because of the negotiated statement above, I, Kenneth G. Kaibel, hereby agree not to sue the Redford Presbyterian Church and/or its officers, singularly or collectively.
 - C. On behalf of the Redford Presbyterian Church, we agree to the negotiated settlement stated above, and further, in consideration of the Rev. Kenneth G. Kaibel leaving in peace, we hereby individually and collectively agree not to sue the Rev. Kenneth G. Kaibel.
 - D. WAIVER: In conjunction with the considerations provided above and release with the Redford Presbyterian Church and Detroit Presbytery, I Kenneth G. Kaibel agree, knowingly and voluntarily, to waive any and all claims that I might have under the Age Discrimination In Employment Act of 1967 against the Church, its employees and agents, occurring on or before the date of this Waiver. I acknowledge that I have been advised to consult with legal counsel prior to executing this Waiver and have been provided up to twenty-one (21) days within which to consider the Waiver. I further understand that I have seven (7) days after the execution of this Waiver in which to revoke the Waiver, subject to the provisions and possible penalties specified in this Agreement for Termination and Separation.
 - E. The Committee on Ministry of Detroit Presbytery expects the church and the minister to fulfill all of these conditions. If they are not fulfilled by the minister,

the Committee shall reserve the right to withhold transfer of credentials and/or reserve recommendations for future secular/ecclesiastical employment. If they are not fulfilled by the church, the Committee shall reserve the right to not allow further pastoral search processes to continue. Rumsey and his wife, Nancy, at Royal Oak, First on the occasion of their leaving the presbytery for a new call in Vero Beach, Florida. He thanked Mr. Rumsey for his service at Royal Oak, First and to the presbytery.
- 12. Appoint the Rev. Raphael Francis Stated Supply (one-quarter time, 15 hours, 12 months, effective April 25, 1995), at Gratiot Avenue Church, Detroit, with total compensation of \$10,800, and waive payment of pension.
- 13. Terminate the Interim Pastor contract between First Church, Pontiac, and the Rev. Rosalie Glover, effective April 21, 1995, and place her on the Member-at-Large Roll.
- 14. Appoint the Rev. Thomas Green, Moderator of First Church, Pontiac, effective at time of termination of Rosalie Glover's contract (April 21, 1995) until May 15, 1995.

The Committee on Ministry reported the following actions taken under the authority that has been granted to it:

- 15. Renewed the Stated Supply Associate Pastor relationship between Rosedale Gardens Church, Livonia and the Rev. Roger Shoup for a period of 12 months, effective March 1, 1995, with the following terms: Full time; Salary \$28,000; Value of Manse \$12,600; Utilities \$8,000; FICA \$3,718; Travel \$3,000; Study allowance \$1,000; Dental \$252; Full pension \$13,608; Medical deductible as specified by Board of Pensions; One month vacation, including 4 Sundays; Two weeks study leave. This Covenant may be terminated by any party on one month's notice provided there is prior consultation with and concurrence by the Committee on Ministry.

Gerald Cobleigh, for 6 months, effective February 1, 1995, with the following terms: 8 hours/week; Salary \$58.33/week; Housing \$116.67/week. Lawrence Glenn welcomed new members to the presbytery.

E. COMMITTEE ON METROPOLITAN MISSION Patrick Thompson reported for the committee.

- Motion was sustained to adopt the resolution on legalized gambling (Appendix F) and that the Stated Clerk be directed to immediately send a copy of the resolution to the Mayor of the City of Detroit, the Governor of Michigan, the Lt. Governor of Michigan in her capacity as President of the Senate of Michigan and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- 2. A motion was sustained to overture the 207th General Assembly (1995) to recommit to the PC(USA) historic commitment to support public education (Appendix G).
- 3. A motion was sustained that the Presbytery of Detroit endorse the 12th Annual Detroit AIDS Candlelight Vigil May 21, 1995 at 7 P.M. to be held at Christ the Good Shepherd Catholic Church in Lincoln Park.
- 4. A motion was sustained that a special offering be collected during this meeting and sent to the Indian Nations Presbytery in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma as a gesture of solidarity and goodwill in the aftermath of the bombing tragedy that occurred in Oklahoma City.

F. COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND NURTURE Anna Marie Austin reported for the committee. Ms. Austin reminded the presbyters of the success of the 1993 Motor City Mission Mania event and reported that a committee to plan a Motor City Mission Mania event for 1996 has been formed. The group will be working ecumenically with churches in greater Detroit to make it an ecumenical event in 1996. She reported that the Committee on Education and Nurture is trying new methods of serving the congregations in the areas of education and nurture. Ms. Austin asked the presbyters to be in touch with the committee so that it can better serve the churches.

VII. REPORT OF THE ASSOCIATE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER Associate Executive Presbyter Clarisa Piecuch highlighted various happenings in the life of the Presbytery. She reported that last fall the Committee on Mission Interpretation visited over 45 congregations, meeting with sessions and that the Committee on Church Strategy and the Committee on Ministry are finding new ways to work together to provide support to pastors and congregations. Ms. Piecuch reported that there are four New Church Development churches in the presbytery and that Education and Nurture is reaching out to congregations through the resource center. Speaking of the bombing in Oklahoma, she asked the presbyters to pray for the country, our leaders and to discern God's will for us in these changing times.

A. THE MODERATOR

A quorum being present, the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was convened in stated session on Tuesday, June 27, 1995 at 5:37 PM at the First Presbyterian Church, Ann Arbor, Michigan. The meeting was opened with prayer by Moderator Helen Morrison.

Elizabeth Balch was appointed Assistant to the Stated Clerk. New commissioners and ministers were introduced and welcomed by Moderator Helen Morrison.

B. THE STATED CLERK

C. COMMITTEE ON METROPOLITAN MISSION Patrick Thompson reported for the committee.

- 1. A motion was sustained to endorse the position of Hunger Action Enabler for 1996. (for information: this involves a Presbytery of Detroit line item budget of \$7,852 and \$6,000 from the General Assembly).
- 2. Mr. Thompson reported for information that there is a group called the Hunger Action Coalition for Southeastern Michigan that has a sub-group called Hunger Action Voter Educational Supporters (HAVES), at the June meeting of the Metropolitan Mission Committee, the committee endorsed the HAVES program and the Presbytery's participation in it. This does not involve any presbytery supervision or presbytery funds and the evaluation for the program is done by the Hunger Task Group, a sub-committee of Metropolitan Mission.
- 3. He presented a position described for Peace Enabler and stated that the position is open and that anyone wishing to apply for the position should contact the persons listed on page.
- 4. Mr. Thompson reported a follow-up on an action previously taken (April Meeting) by presbytery, a Resolution Condemning the Proliferation of Casino Gambling in the city of Detroit and across the state. He reported that Gov. Engler has indicated that he strongly opposes casino gambling anywhere in Michigan.
- 5. Nile Harper reported that Presbyterian Campus Ministry has existed at the University of Michigan for 108 years since 1887 under the guidance and sanction of the Synod and the Detroit Presbytery. He said that three years ago, the Presbyterian Campus Ministry undertook the challenge of raising the funds to build a new Ecumenical Center and International Residence for American and International students to better minister to students in Ann Arbor and which would become an income generating source that would help to ensure the financial future of a strong Presbyterian presence in campus ministry at the University of Michigan in the coming decades. Mr. Harper thanked Detroit Presbytery for its guidance, blessing and encouragement to ECC in the project and for the \$150,000 that ECC has been able to borrow for the project from Detroit Presbytery toward the project. He also thanked the eight congregations that have joined with ECC to make a pledge or gift to the project. He stated that by October, ECC needs to raise \$250,000 to complete the project. Mr. Harper asked the congregations to make a pledge or gift of \$1000 to the project.

D. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH STRATEGY

Debbie Kerr reported for the committee. A motion was sustained that the Presbytery of Detroit appoint through its Moderator, an administrative commission to work with Lake Shore Presbyterian Church, St. Clair Shores, and Covenant Presbyterian Church, Eastpointe, to explore and negotiate the merger of the two congregations, including the recommendations concerning the disposition of any property and assets, the clarification of issues related to pastoral leadership, and the place and times of public worship. Said Commission to be comprised of: One Elder from Covenant, Eastpointe One Elder from Lake Shore, St. Clair Shores Tom Duncan, Pastor, Lake Shore Two representatives from Committee on Church Strategy Two representatives from Committee on Ministry.

E. COMMITTEE ON OUTDOOR MINISTRIES

Jennifer Kondak reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that:

- Approve as an addition to the above plan, the relocation of the animal compound and infirmary to a more desirable location on the Howell property.

He is encouraging participation by the congregation and requested that each congregation ask each member to contribute \$1.00 in support of the project.

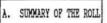
X. ADJOURNMENT

The Presbytery of Detroit and Alma College

This Memorandum of Understanding is one of five guiding documents which describe the relationship between the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), which is represented by the Synod of the Covenant and the four Presbyteries of Michigan and Alma College, an independent Presbyterian college within the boundaries of the Synod.

I.

By this agreement, the Presbytery of Detroit pledges itself to the understandings and responsibilities as outlined below:

- A. The Presbytery will designate a particular liaison to work with Alma College in carrying forward the terms of this agreement and the joint mission. This individual will sit on the College's Kirk Council.
- B. The Presbytery will cooperate with the College in the recruitment of students.
- C. The Presbytery will seek to interpret, promote, and advocate the purposes and programs of Alma College among Presbyterian churches.
- D. The Presbytery will consult with Alma College through the College's Presbytery Representative, its own particular liaison, and the Kirk Council about the "status of religion" on its campus; utilize, as available, the resources of the campus, assist in identifying areas of common mission concern at Alma College, and assist in strengthening, through good counsel, the programs of the College.
- E. The Presbytery will give moral support to the College in its ongoing annual fund-raising efforts through individual donors and churches within the Presbytery.
- F. The Presbytery will act through the Council to receive any request should the College wish to conduct a campaign within the boundaries of the Presbytery.
- G. The Presbytery will work with Alma College when the College wishes to conduct a campaign in its boundaries.

II.

Alma College, through its independent Board of Trustees, hereby pledges for the period of this agreement:

- A. The President of Alma College, through the College's Presbytery Representative, the Presbytery's particular representative and the Presbyterian Executive Officer, will cooperate with the Presbyteries in carrying forward the Presbytery's mission to improve Presbyterian church-associated college education in Michigan.
- B. The College will cooperate with the Presbytery's own fund-raising agenda when the College is raising funds in the local churches.

- C. The College will provide resources for the Presbyteries through offering the use of facilities for meetings and conferences and will host a biannual joint meeting of the Michigan Presbyteries.
- D. The College will provide special programs in Christian education and ministry for the church's laity and clergy.
- E. The College will seek to provide a Christian presence in the religious life of the campus through:
 - 1. regular worship opportunities for students;
 - 2. the teaching of credit courses in religion by distinguished full-time faculty;
 - 3. maintenance of religious organizations and clubs on campus;
 - 4. bringing special speakers of various Christian persuasions to the campus;
 - 5. the maintenance of an official Presbyterian College chaplaincy on campus.
- F. The College will continue to maintain a majority of Presbyterian lay and clergy presence within its Board of Trustees.
- G. The College will continue its promotional and interpretive efforts with local Presbyterian churches in Michigan through efforts such as its Kirk Council, the local ministers' meetings, occasional preaching and teaching by faculty and administration in local churches, choir performances and student presentations in churches, and periodic bulletins, posters and newsletters to the churches.
- H. Alma College will provide a high-quality liberal arts education as a continuing source of church and community leadership. Part of that education is to lift up value concerns throughout its curriculum.
- I. The College will seek the approval of the Presbytery Council to conduct any campaign within the Presbytery boundaries.
- J. The College will, prior to November 1 of each year, request a specific amount, to its Validated Special Opportunity status.
- K. The College will provide on an annual basis the list of churches and contributions to the College within its boundaries.

III.

This agreement will continue in effect for three years. It is subject to revision and/or renewal by mutual consent.

C. FELLOWSHIP AND REFLECTION

Council took a period to review and reflect on Proposed Synod Focus Areas referred by Synod to the Council.

By Motion, council directed the Stated Clerk to correspond to the Synod of the Covenant:

It would have been better if the Synod had sent a person familiar with the document to Council to explain and advocate for it. None of the Synod commissioners present at Council were aware of the document. Furthermore, the Council recommends:

1. That the focus on "theological reflection" should include references to Christian education and spiritual formation. [The Council felt that not including these functions seriously limited the activity of Synod.]

2. That the term "utilizing volunteers as resources" be amended to say something like "enabling the use of volunteers."

[The term "utilizing" is offensive and suggests that volunteers are some kind of implement.]

3. Something should be added that describes the unique role of Synod.

[In the discussion, some members of Council wondered if Synod had any unique role at all. Others were able to articulate such a role, but the absence of any Focus that could not be done by a Presbytery or local congregation was apparent.]

II. TRUSTEES

PROPERTY AND INVESTMENTS COMMITTEE

Al Glover reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that:

Council approve granting permission to the First Presbyterian Church, Pontiac, MI to sell the manse located at 4981 Shoreline, Waterford, MI (Lot 22 of Lakeland Estates, sub-division #1), at the best available price. The proceeds are to be invested in an interest bearing account with the principal held in a reserve "Manse Account" to be used any time in the future to provide a church owned manse or loans for pastor housing. Earnings from the reserve account to be used to support the Pastor's housing allowance.

Pontiac, First Presbyterian Church be encouraged to invest the "Manse Account" fund, with the advice of an investment broker, to produce income and protect the purchasing power of the principal.

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Final terms of the sale to be reported to the Presbytery's Administrator for Business Affairs.

IV. FINANCIAL

BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Jerome Seaton reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that council:

- approve the request for VSO Request for <u>Presbyterian</u> <u>Development Corporation of Detroit</u> in the amount of \$10,000 for the year 1995.
- 2. approve the "Contractual Items Budget for 1996" and submit them to Presbytery for a first reading, for approval at the November meeting of Presbytery; pending adoption of the total 1996 Budget in the January/February 1996 time period.

A 3% cost of living allowance is included in the Contractual Items Budget for staff salaries. This increase will be voted on in November after recommendations from Staff Services.

V. STEERING COMMITTEE

Helen Morrison reported for the committee. Motions were sustained that Council:

- 1. Approve the docket for the October 24, 1995 stated meeting.
- 2. Approve authorization for the Stated Clerk to rent a vehicle for a cost of up to \$60 for those Presbytery meetings away from the Westminster, Detroit site. To come from account 15223.
- 3. Approve taking the costs (over and above the \$250 allotted from Social Justice and Peacemaking) for hosting Metropolitan Filaret from Minsk from account 15201 (Council contingency).

The Steering Committee reported that the following Churches have signed the Helping Hand Covenant: Grosse Ile, Grandale/Church of the Master, Jefferson Avenue, New Grace, Celtic Cross, St. John's, Ecorse, and People's Church Milan.

The Litigation Committee notes that a settlement conference is scheduled for November 2 in the Cherry Hill case.

The Steering Committee has directed the Stated Clerk to write a letter to Erin Church acknowledge receipt of the \$700 in honor of Ed Gehres. The Steering Committee will recommend guidelines for its use to Council.

VI. IN THE LIFE OF THE PRESBYTERY

A. COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL JUSTICE AND PEACEMAKING Judy Borchardt reported for the committee.

She presented a proposal for the formation of a conflict response team, which was referred to several committees for consideration, coordination, and planning.

B. COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

Clark Cowden reported for the committee. A conference will be held on March 16, 1996 on the servant aspect of evangelism.

C. COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP

Kevin Piecuch reported for the committee. He expressed appreciation for those who attended the kick-off dinner.

D. COMMITTEE ON RACIAL AND ETHNIC CONCERNS

Sammie Solomon reported on the activities of the Committee. She reported a conference on October 28, 1995 on Women of Color. The keynote speaker will be Annalee Walker, author and activist. She is the sister of Bernard Walker.

E. COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS

Kathryn Thoresen reported for the committee. By motion Council referred the following motion to the Committee on Structure:

The Committee on Nominations recommends that the functions of the Committee on Representation be transferred to the Committee on Racial and Ethnic Concerns with a change to our By-Laws to reflect this.

F. COMMITTEE ON BICENTENNIAL ACCOUNTABILITY

Bud Kempel reported for the Committee. Mr. Kempel reported that roughly 64% of the pledged funds have been received, that the approved projects had received amounts as requested (pro-rated to the level of income, except for the U of M project), and that he did not expect to receive all pledged funds. He expects to make a final report next year. The following motion was made and postponed until the next meeting of Council:

That Council authorize unused amounts from discontinued programs be used to offset the University of Michigan Campus Ministry (which has received 100% of its request).

G. STAFF SERVICES COMMITTEE

Jim Conley reported for the committee. The request to create a position referred to the Committee last month will be referred to the staff to determine the degree to which the functions can be carried out with the current staffing arrangement.

H. EXECUTIVE STAFF

Ed Gehres reported.

The Washtenaw County Circuit Court has ruled in favor of the City of Ypsilanti against First Presbyterian Church, Ypsilanti.

By motion, Council referred to the Litigation Committee the charge to meet with the church, enter discussions, and to determine if we should participate in a possible appeal. If yes, the Committee is authorized to allocate funds up to the amount of the reserve, the legal fund, and the fund for judicial expenses.

I. MISCELLANEOUS

Council considered the request by Calvary, Ann Arbor that Presbytery not pay the GA portion of per capita it had withheld in protest of the fact that the health plan permits use of health benefits for abortions. By motion, Council: Directed the Chair of Council to appoint 2 or 3 people to meet

Directed the Chair of Council to appoint 2 or 3 people to meet with representatives of Calvary before the next Council meeting. VII. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the council the meeting was adjourned at 4:56 p.m. and dismissed with prayer by Neil Cowling.

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Criteria for Validated Ministry Within the Presbytery of Detroit FIRST READING Committee on Ministry September 26, 1995

Presbytery membership classifications include the following for ministers of the Word and Sacrament who are Continuing Members of Presbytery. (G-11.0406)

A. Active: (G-11.0406a) Active members have been admitted to the Presbytery in accordance with G-11.0401 and engaged in a validated ministry that complies with criteria in G-11.0403 without exception,

in service in a Presbyterian congregation

in other service of this church and honorably retired. This status shall be reviewed every three years. An active member in service beyond the jurisdiction of this church whose ministry is validated shall have this status reviewed and renewed annually.

B. Members-at-Large: (G-11.0406b; 0413) Members-at-large who have been previously admitted to the presbytery but without intentional abandonment of ministry are no longer engaged in an occupation that complies with all criteria in G-11.0403. This status shall be reviewed annually.

C. Inactive: (G-11.0406c; 11.0413) Inactive members are previously active members of presbytery, voluntarily engaged in an occupation that does not comply with all the criteria in G-11.0403. This status shall be reviewed annually.

This position deals with the status of active membership of those who are engaged in service beyond the jurisdiction of this church. Such ministry in service beyond the jurisdiction of this church must be validated by the presbytery.

In order for a ministry to be validated it must comply with all the criteria in G-11.0403 which are as follows:

a. "The ministry of continuing members shall be in demonstrable conformity with the mission of God's people in the world as set forth in Holy Scripture, the Book of Confessions, and the Book of Order of this church." (G-11.0403a)

Comment: A statement of Mission is essential in order for presbytery to determine if a particular ministry is in "conformity with the mission of God's people." Such a statement should specify what the presbytery sees as its mission within its geographic bounds and should clarify the types of ministries needed in order to accomplish this mission. This statement should be as comprehensive as possible; it should be flexible and dynamic, periodically assessed and modified as new concerns emerge or new human resources become available.

A particular work should not be ruled invalid simply because it is not funded by the presbytery nor does all involvement in validated mission projects mean that the person serving there will automatically be validated.

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b. "The ministry shall be one that serves others, aids others, and enables the ministries of others." (G-11.0403b)

Comment: The primary thrust of the work being validated is toward serving people and enabling them to serve other peoples. Its primary thrust is not toward things, nor toward profit-making activities.

This does not mean that a person in a profit-making business cannot perform ministry, nor that a minister cannot be employed in a profit-making enterprise. The primary functions of one's work should relate to the service of people rather than the production of goods or of profits. The special gifts and training of the minister of Word and Sacrament that provide a theological perspective on the life of people must be used in a validated ministry.

c. "The ministry shall give evidence of theologically informed fidelity to God's Word. This will normally require the Master of Divinity degree or its equivalent and the completion of the requirements for ordination set forth in G-14.0202" (G-11.0403c)

Comment: "Theologically informed fidelity to God's Word" will be evident in the ministry if it requires the ability to apply theological competence to such skills as communication, interpretation, or the care and nurture of a person's wholeness and growth. Key questions may be: Does the ministry relate God's Word to life experience, to faith and service? Does the ministry gather persons for worship, support and study? If a proposed calling does not provide opportunity to articulate the Christian faith, questions should be raised as to whether it can be a validated ministry.

d. "The ministry shall be carried on in accountability for its character and conduct to the presbytery and to other organizations, agencies and institutions." (G-11.0403d)

Comment: Accountability implies that a member of presbytery is answerable to the presbytery for agreed-upon end results or activities in addition to the "character and conduct" of one's ministry. It must be clear from the outset what is expected in the ministry. Accountability involves intentionality. It includes a performance review by the employer and provides support from presbytery which enables the person to carry out the ministry with maximum effectiveness.

A person who is employed by a body other than the presbytery or a congregation will be accountable to an employer in ways which may not necessarily relation to the mission intentions of that person or of the presbytery. Presbytery should ask that person to describe the specific ways in which his or her work contributes to the mission of presbytery. Both presbytery and the person need to evaluate the ministry on a regular basis.

It may be helpful for presbytery to assign this accountability and support relationship not only to COM but to another committee whose responsibilities related in some closer way to the work of the minister concerned. Presbytery could assign a colleague group or another minister to meet with these persons at least once a year to discuss their ministry. It is inadequate for a presbytery to exercise its accountability relationship solely by collecting and reviewing annual report forms. At the very least, accountability to the presbytery should involve a face-to-face review of the ministry every three years.

The same criteria used for full-time ministers should be used in determining the validity of part-time ministers. Presbytery may validate ministries for which there is no compensation. While neither the amount of time spent in the particular ministry nor the amount of compensation should be prime considerations in applying the criteria for validation, a lack of compensation and large time demands can be a means of misusing people and abusing the system of validation.

e. "The ministry shall include responsible participation in the deliberations and work of the presbytery and in the worship and services of a congregation." (G-11.0403e)

Comment: Minimum standards for involvement in presbytery and congregations include the following:

-persons with validated ministries shall attend at least one presbytery meeting per year

-persons with validated ministries shall be encouraged to participate in the committee life of presbytery

-persons with validated ministries shall be available to moderate sessions and preach in congregations

-persons with validated ministries shall regularly participate in worship in a congregation.

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If one or more of the criteria (a-e) cannot be met, the continuing member should ask to be designated either a member-at-large or an inactive member of presbytery. If presbytery is unwilling to grant this then the continuing member should seek release from the exercise of ordained office (G-11.0414) until he or she receives a call to ministry that fulfills all five criteria.

Ordinarily, the presbytery needs to be a formal party to any call involving a minister of Word and Sacrament. While this is obvious for those engaged in ministries within a congregation, in ministries beyond the jurisdiction of the church, such calling process is less evident.

Normally, the agency or employer will participate as a third party to the call. If the employer does not wish to be involved in the call or if the minister does not wish to approach the employer about this matter, a call can still be validated if the function to be performed meets the criteria in G-11.0403.

The comments are adapted from the 1994 GA handbook for Committee on Ministries. The Book of Order is the primary resource for the above position paper on Validated ministries that are beyond the jurisdiction of this church.

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A quorum being present, the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was convened in stated session on Tuesday, November 28, 1995 at 5:30 P.M. at the Westminster Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan. The meeting was opened with prayer by the Moderator Helen Morrison.

Charles Holek was appointed Assistant to the Stated Clerk. New commissioners and ministers were introduced and welcomed by Moderator Helen Morrison.

B. THE STATED CLERK Stated Clerk Edward Koster presented Part I of his report and motions were adopted that Presbytery:

1. DOCKET. Adopt the docket as presented.

2. EXCUSES. Excuse all continuing members of presbytery and elder members who have asked to be excused.

3. CORRESPONDING MEMBERS. Without further motions, seat as corresponding members all eligible persons who are presented to the Presbytery and who register on the enrollment sheet for corresponding members.

C. WELCOME FROM THE HOST CHURCH The Rev. Barbara Ndovie, Associate Pastor, Westminster Presbyterian Church, Detroit welcomed the presbyters to the church.

II. MOMENTS OF CELEBRATION AND REMEMBRANCE A. JOYS AND CONCERNS

Joys and concerns of the presbytery were shared by the presbyters.

The Rev. In Soon Choi, Vice-Moderator Presbytery of Detroit, assumed the duties of moderating the Presbytery meeting. III. SHARING OUR MINISTRIES - I

A. ANNUAL REPORT OF PRESBYTERIAN VILLAGES OF MICHIGAN Roger Meyers, President/CEO of PVM, reported on the mission, ministry and vision of PVM. He shared the vision that by 2001 PVM will better meet the physical, intellectual, social and spiritual needs of older adults who live in communities throughout Michigan through organized and managed systems of services, care and housing. He said that many renovations to existing villages are planned and that new village Peace Presbyterian Village, Clinton Township has been completed this fall, and Bethany Presbyterian Manor, Detroit, will be completed in 1996.

Moderator Morrison resumed moderating the meeting.

A motion was sustained to allow the addition of a report from the Barnabas Youth Opportunity Center to the docket.

B. METROPOLITAN MISSION: BARNABAS YOUTH OPPORTUNITY CENTER Stanley Edwards, Director, Barnabas Youth Opportunity Center, reported on the work of the center. He stated that the project is 12 years old and that it affords an opportunity for young people to learn skills that will enable them to secure gainful employment. He asked the churches to call him so that he might present Minute-for-Mission talks to congregations that they may learn more about the work of the Center.

IV. MODERATOR'S REPORT TO THE PRESBYTERY - ORDER OF THE DAY I Moderator Morrison gave her perception on the state of the Presbytery of Detroit as she saw it. She reported that she had been in 43 churches this past year. During her travels, Ms. Morrison has found that we are in a time of questioning. She believes that it is time to look at who we are as Presbyterians and whose we are as followers of Jesus Christ. She believes that we need to ask the question: "What are we about that others would want to be a part of our congregation -presbytery?" Ms. Morrison said that we need to come to know one another; to accept our similarities and differences.

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V. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER In his report, Executive Presbyter Edward Gehres reflected on the theme, "...Be not afraid." Mr. Gehres reported that he believes that the church is going through a period of change of the magnitude of the Reformation. We are in a period of transition as presbyteries and churches. He said that this is a time for the Presbyterian Church (USA) in Southeast Michigan to celebrate and rejoice in the "new thing" that is occurring within our bounds. In the past year we have developed an Economic Development Corporation, have begun two New Church Developments, bringing to four NCD within the Presbytery. Church development, revitalization, redevelopment and new mission directions are being implemented through God's activity in our midst.

Moderator Morrison resumed moderating the meeting.

XI. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Presbytery, the meeting was adjourned at 8:20 P.M. with Moderator Morrison charging the presbyters to live simply, love generously, serve faithfully, speak truthfully, pray daily and to truly leave everything else to God.
