## The Presbytery of Detroit Minutes of the Stated Meeting January 25, 2011

#### WE GATHERED IN GOD'S NAME

A quorum being present, the Presbytery of Detroit convened in a stated meeting with a litany and prayer on January 25, 2011 at Detroit Westminster Church at 4:00 p.m. Kent Clise moderated the meeting.

## WE CELEBRATED OUR CONNECTIONS IN CHRIST (15)

By consent, the Moderator appointed Gay Montgomery the assistant to the Stated Clerk.

The Moderator greeted new members and commissioners.

Upon motion, the Presbytery approved the docket.

<u>Upon motion</u>, the Presbytery excused those who have requested to be excused.

<u>Upon motion</u>, the Presbytery enrolled Rafaat Zaki, the new Executive of the Synod of the Covenant, as a corresponding member and granted him the privilege of the floor.

Neeta Nichols welcomed the Presbytery to Westminster Church.

Dianne Bostic Robinson began moderating the meeting.

## **Reports from Other Governing Bodies**

Rafaat Zaki, the new Executive of the Synod of the Covenant brought the greetings of the Synod to the Presbytery, and brought thanks for our support on this ministry of Jesus Christ.

#### WE LISTENED FOR THE WORK OF THE SPIRIT IN OUR COMMUNITY

Presbytery heard announcements from on the Presbytery's youth education ministry, Presbyterians Organized in Nurture and Training activities, and the Presbytery's Youth Council

The Presbytery heard reports from the Multi-Cultural Ministries Work Group and the Metropolitan Urban Ministry Team.

Trustees. Don Morgan reported for the Trustees..

The Trustees report the following for the information of the Presbytery:

1. The Trustees elected the following officers:

Don Morgan as President

Marva Banks as Vice President

Al Timm as Secretary

The Trustees also coopted John Daniel for finances and Lou Prues for special projects.

2. The Detroit Southwest Church has decided they have reached the end of their ministry in that location and held their last worship on 12/26. The Trustees have voted to permit the Hispanic Ministry Group to use the building for 18 months. The NCD/RD is overseeing the work of the Hispanic Ministry Group, which is led by Elias Cabaracos Arroyo, reporting to NCD/RD on a monthly basis and approved by NCD/RD to use the building.

- 3. The Trustees met with Stan Edwards who declared his dissatisfaction with what he believed were opinions and attitudes of the Trustees about him and the Barnabas Project. The Trustees all agreed that Mr Edwards and his mission at Barnabas are commendable and should be sustained.
- 4. Because no further need exists to utilize the assumed name of Morang Street Mission, the Trustees decided not to file an extension of that name as a d/b/a of the Presbytery of Detroit,
- 5. The Church of Our Savior (West Bloomfield) has reported it intends to close as of 12/31/11. The Trustees are working with them about the procedures for closing and the disposition of the property.
- 6. Some time ago, the Howell Nature Center decided to file its own EIN, and they began the process. This had to be reversed because it is inappropriate. By the end of 2008, the Trustees believed that everything had been properly changed and reported. We have received a letter from the IRS claiming some taxes were not properly paid, and they are due. The Trustees have designated members to hold the IRS power of attorney on Form 2484, and have authorized overtime for Bev Auger and additional time for John Heber to resolve the matter.
- 7. Since the NCD/AC Far West probe is not planning on utilizing the vacant Hartland Township real property owned by the Presbytery of Detroit, Inc. and the holding cost exceeds \$5,000 per year, the Trustees are looking into the sale of that property.

- 3. There is one candidate writing ordination exams on January 28-29 and two who are taking the Bible Content exam on February 4.

Spiritual Formation and Faith Development Team Doyll Andrews reported for the Team.

Mr Andrews reported that we are beginnign the process of stewardship development for time and talents and mission for the year 2012 now..

#### WE RESPONDED TO CHRIST'S CALL TO MISSION AND MINISTRY

By consent, the Presbytery granted Mr Timm 10 minutes for his report.

## Executive Presbyter's Report. Allen D. Timm reported

Mr Timm thanked the officers of Presbytery, and those who serve on committees, our General Assembly commissioners, our staff and consultants, and the commissioners who come to the meetings of the Presbytery.

Mr Timm reported on the state of the Presbytery from his perspective. Detroit is the unemployment capital of the world, but it has generating interesting times. Detroit is reimagining itself; Presbytery has been right-sizing; We have made our 2010 budget. Even though we are making progress, he has some concerns: The shifting center of Christianity to the southern hemisphere; The general decline in North America. Our Presbytery follows the denominational trend. He believes we have so much to offer, and that we can reverse this trend. The Planning and Visioning Team has formed a task force to look at these trends, which has scheduled a clergy meeting to hear and consult and talk about what is working. Mr Timm encouraged every minister to come to the Clergy day where these matters will be presented. We have found that from 2000-2005 the average Presbytery of Detroit church declined 18% in worship attendance. Since 2005, that decline reduced to 8%, the national average.

Kent Clise began moderating the meeting.

The Moderator offered a brief prayer for openness.

#### **Business Adopted by Motion and Debate**

Treasurer: Elder Alvin Smith reported.

Mr Smith presented the Treasurer's report, which is appended to the minutes.

Ms. Bostic-Robinson began moderating the meeting

#### Coordinating Cabinet. Kent Clise reported for the Cabinet.

Amendments to the Constitution 10-J through 10 O, submitted by the 219<sup>th</sup> General Assembly, were placed on the floor for approval or disapproval of Presbytery. Amendment M was removed for separate consideration.

The Presbytery approved the following Amendments to the Constitution

- 10-J. Stay of Enforcement—On Amending D-6.0103
- 10-K. Preliminary Questions—On Amending D-6.0306, D-8.0302, and D-13.0302.
- 10-L. Reviewing Work of Investigating Committee—On Amending D-10.0202
- 10-N. Appeal of "Not Guilty" Verdict—On Amending D-13.0102 and D-13.0106
- 10-O. Decision of Permanent Judicial Commission—On Amending D-13.0404

After discussion and debate, the Presbytery approved the following amendment to the Constitution:

10-M. Time Limit—On Amending D-10.0401

<u>Upon motion</u> of the Coordinating Cabinet, Presbytery voted to:

- 1. Approve the service of communion at the Clergy Day on February 4.
- 2. Change the location of the February meeting of the Presbytery from Milford to Plymouth First.

The motion was made to amend the 2011 budget for the Mission Interpretation/Projects/Partnerships Team to move \$2000 from Barnabas to the Second Mile Center and \$2800 from Campus Ministry to the Thika Partnership.

The motion was made to divide the motion.

\$2000 from Barnabas to the Second Mile Center

\$2800 from Campus Ministry to the Thika Partnership

The motion was defeated: 62 yes, 64 no.

Upon motion, Presbytery voted to end debate. The main motion was approved.

The Coordinating Cabinet reported the following for the information of Presbytery:

- 1. The Coordinating Cabinet is reviewing its 2009 decision to remove the Ranney-Balch Fund from the ordinary budget processes and make it a source of grants.
- 2. The Coordinating Cabinet has voted to form a committee to make preparations for the 2012 MLK celebration.
- 3. The Coordinating Cabinet has decided the \$800 designated for the MLK celebration may be used for an award for an essay contest on the life and ministry of Martin Luther King, Jr. to support college expenses. The Black Caucus will review the essays and make the award.

## Committee on Ministry Dixie Elam reported for the Committee.

<u>Upon motion</u> of the Committee, Presbytery voted to:

- 1. Approve the installation of Rev. William L. Adams III as Associate Pastor at Kirk in the Hills, Bloomfield Hills, on February 27, 2011, 11:00 AM, pending naming of an Administrative Commission.
- 2. Approve the ability of Temporary Pastoral Relations sub-committee to examine Commissioned Lay Pastors (CLP) and to allow the committee to distribute the candidates' Pastor Information Forms to suggested congregations within the bounds of the Presbytery of Detroit.
- 3. Approve the 12 month Interim Pastor Contract, effective February 14, 2011, between First, Pontiac and Rev. Elizabeth Downs with the following terms: Full time; Salary \$6,500;

- Housing \$28,500; Deferred Compensation \$11,637; Social Security \$3,568; Medical deductible reimbursement \$1,399; Professional expense reimbursement \$4,000. Vacation of one month (4 Sundays) and Study Leave of 2 weeks, each pro-rated over the life of the contract.
- 4. Approve the extension of the **Temporary Supply** relationship between **Rev. James Kumin-Severance** and **White Lake** through May 1, 2011.
- 5. Transfer of **Rev. Karen Ferguson** to the Presbytery of Chicago to accept a call at Winnetka Presbyterian Church.
- 6. Transfer Rev. Mickey Blair to the Presbytery of Plains and Peaks to accept a call at First Presbyterian Church, LaSalle, Colorado.
- 7. Approve the terms of dissolution between Cherry Hill, Dearborn and Rev. Dr. Drew. Tomberlin, Jr. effective December 12, 2010, with the following terms: Salary \$11,715; Housing arrangements \$12,670; Vacation pay \$7,882; Deferred compensation (403b/annuity), Life Insurance, Supplemental dental \$2,409; One time gift (to be paid before 1/31/2011) \$9,000; Pension/Medical to be paid \$13,563; Social Security \$3,147; Total \$60,396. And place him on the At-Large Roll.

The committee reported the following actions taken under the authority that has been granted to it. It has:

- 1. Approved the dissolution of the pastoral relationship between First Korean Presbyterian Church of Royal Oak and Rev. Byeongjin Woo, effective November 14, 2010. Terms: 3 months compensation and pension until February 15, 2011. Upon sale of the church building, KFPC will pay ½ monthly compensation and full monthly pension between February 15, 2011, and June 16, 2011, if Rev. Woo has not found another pastoral position.
- 2. Approved the 12 month Interim Pastor contract between Rosedale Gardens, Livonia, and Rev. Anne Schaefer, effective January 1, 2011. Terms: Full-time; Salary \$37,100; Housing \$30,500; Social Security \$5,171; Full Pension \$21,294; Travel/Study Leave/Professional Expenses (vouchered) \$1,000. One month vacation including 4 Sundays; Study leave 2 weeks.
- 3. Approved the 6 month renewal of the Interim Pastor contract between Rev. Neeta R. Nichols and Westminster, Detroit, effective October16, 2010.Terms: Full-time, Salary \$24,000; Housing \$24,860; Tax Deferred Annuity \$15,000; Pension \$20,116.00; Medical Deductible \$639; Dental \$331; Social Security \$4,885; Auto \$1,200; Study Leave \$1,900; Business Expense \$1,242.Six weeks vacation including 6 Sundays; Study leave 2 weeks.

The Committee reported the following for the information of Presbytery. It has:

- 1. Approved the request from **Rev. Matthew B. Morse** to attend the first phase of Interim Ministry Training in March 2011.
- 2. Approved the submission of an application for selection as one of the Presbyteries to participate in a non-denominational initiative to serve congregations that are "underserved."
- 3. Melissa Rogers was installed at First, Ann Arbor on December 5, 2010.
- 4. Corrected the minutes from the August, 2010, COM meeting, and the subsequent report to the Presbytery of Detroit to read as follows:

"BY Motion, approved on behalf of Presbytery, the Parish Associate contract between First, Plymouth, and Rev. Douglas Campbell, effective June 15, 2010 for 12 months. Terms: Salary \$25,800; SECA \$1,973.70; Pastoral Expenses \$1,000; Vacation one month (4 Sundays)."

- 5. Recommended that the Moderator of COM appoint a collegial support group (to report to COM) for the pastor at Fort Street, Detroit.
- 6. Co-opted the following to COM: Ron Case, Kimo Kim, Jean Loup, Dorothy Buchan, Sue Melrose, Martha Nelson, and Judy Shipman.

**Trustees.** Don Morgan reported the following for the information of Presbytery:

- 1. The Trustees have reviewed the financial reports of the Howell Center and believe the center is healthy and functioning well. Their long-term goal is to be independent of the Presbytery by 2014. It will take them that much time to build a sufficient reserve.

## INTRODUCTION

The Presbytery of Detroit is a Christian organization committed to Christian ethics and principles. These Personnel Guidelines reflect that philosophy and have been developed to help clarify what is expected of each employee, and to help each employee know what may be expected by the Presbytery of Detroit (hereafter referred to as "Employer").

The Personnel Guidelines are the policies of Employer and are not a contract between Employer and any employee. As circumstances demand, these policies can be amended or revised by Employer at Employer's sole discretion and without advance notice to any employee.

The policies outlined in these Personnel Guidelines, as amended from time to time, apply to all personnel staff of the Presbytery to the extent required by applicable law, including both hourly and salaried employees. Unless otherwise specifically provided, all amendments to these Personnel Guidelines will be given effect after the date of the applicable amendment (all prior actions will be grandfathered under the Personnel Guidelines as in effect prior to the amendment).

These policies are also subject to the current edition of the Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

Questions about these Personnel Guidelines or other human resources procedures should be referred to your supervisor or to the Operations Ministry Team.

#### HIRING

These Personnel Guidelines shall apply to all paid positions and employees holding those positions who are hired by the Presbytery of Detroit, or at the request of entities related to the Presbytery of Detroit that are not separately incorporated and therefore legally unable to hire employees, except through the Presbytery of Detroit ("Presbytery Affiliates"). This will include all employees of Presbytery Affiliates who receive payment issued through the Presbytery of Detroit or otherwise, where the Employer Identification Number assigned to the Presbytery of Detroit is utilized with respect to the payment of such employees.

No person shall be hired, called, or otherwise placed in the Presbytery of Detroit's employee payroll system until the Presbytery of Detroit has completed the following approvals:

- 1) Approval of openings for Executive Director and Associate Director positions (Presbytery of Detroit approval is not required for lower level positions);
- 2) Approval of job description and salary ranges (<u>provided</u>, that approval of salary ranges is not required for positions with Presbytery Affiliates); and
- 3) Approval of the position posting process or, for Executive Director and Associate Director positions, approval of the candidate search process (including the search committee).

If the Board of Trustees determines that an employee working for a Presbytery Affiliate is legally considered to be an employee of the Presbytery of Detroit, then the Operations Ministry Team will have oversight over the hiring practices of such employee in conformity with these guidelines. All employee hiring practices by Presbytery Affiliates shall adhere to these Personnel Guidelines, including the applicable Equal Employment Opportunity ("EEO") guidelines and all applicable Presbytery Policies. The Presbytery Affiliates shall provide a report to the Operations Ministry Team on an annual basis on or before November 1 of each year, describing changes to employee positions, titles and responsibilities that are in the nature of organizational changes during the year, including all such changes that did not require compliance with the search process referred to in the following paragraph.

For any proposed new hires and any proposed promotions from a lower level position to the position of an Associate Director or Executive Director by a Presbytery Affiliate, the Presbytery Affiliate shall provide to the Operations Team evidence of a search process conforming to the EEO guidelines and all related Presbytery Policies. If the Operations Ministry Team determines that such guidelines and policies have not been followed, then the Operations Ministry Team may take action to address the non compliance, including

requiring that the proposed new hire be rejected and so informing the responsible entity, the Coordinating Cabinet and Presbytery. If a proposed new hire is hired under a process that is not in compliance with these Personnel Guidelines, then the Operations Ministry Team may take action to address the non compliance, including requiring that the new hire be terminated and so informing the responsible entity, the Coordinating Cabinet and Presbytery. Notice of any resulting employee terminations shall be given to the affected employee according to these Personnel Guidelines. If it is determined that the EEO guidelines have been followed, the position descriptions and the proposed employee hires shall be presented for approval by the appropriate bodies as indicated in these guidelines and other policies of the Presbytery of Detroit.

Each Presbytery Affiliate shall be responsible for providing funding for all employment related costs, including the cost of employment benefits, of the employees hired by or on the behalf of such Presbytery Affiliate. In addition, each Presbytery Affiliate shall be responsible for indemnifying and holding harmless the Presbytery of Detroit for any cost, expense, charge, or liability incurred by the Presbytery of Detroit that arises from the improper action or inaction of the Presbytery Affiliate or its officers and/or representatives in connection with the hiring, employment and subsequent termination of such employees (including the cost of any claims or litigation related to such employment). Each Presbytery Affiliate shall either directly pay all such costs that they are responsible for, or shall provide advance funding to the Presbytery of Detroit for any costs that the Presbytery of Detroit is required to pay directly. Upon failure of a Presbytery Affiliate to pay or provide advance funding for the salary or benefits of any employee, the Presbytery of Detroit shall discuss the situation with the Presbytery Affiliate. Following such discussion, the Presbytery of Detroit shall coordinate with the Presbytery Affiliate and determine the appropriate course of action, which may include requiring that the affected employee(s) be immediately placed on unpaid leave and be given notice of termination.

## **EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY**

It is the policy of the Presbytery of Detroit to engage in employment policies and practices which promote equality of opportunity in all aspects of employment.

All employment policies and practices including recruiting, selection, benefits, compensation, performance appraisal, promotion, transfers, discipline, training, and separation will be administered without discrimination based on race, color, national origin, gender, age, marital status, creed, disability, or religious affiliation (except where a category is determined to be a bona fide occupational qualification), Federal, state or local law.

Employer will make reasonable accommodation for the known physical or mental limitations of qualified individuals with disabilities unless to do so would impose an undue hardship on Employer.

It is the policy of Employer to act affirmatively to expand employment opportunities which contribute to a diverse workforce.

## **Pay Periods**

Beginning on January 1, 2011, staff employees will be paid twice monthly – on the 15<sup>th</sup> and on the last day of each month.

#### **EMPLOYEE CLASSIFICATIONS**

The employee classifications are: regular, term, and interim. Where it is required by law, a distinction will be made between those considered exempt and non-exempt by the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), or any other applicable statutes. Exempt employees are not eligible to receive overtime pay, while non-exempt employees are eligible to receive overtime pay, as pre-approved by the Executive Presbyter.

Notwithstanding anything else in this manual, all employees, regardless of status, are at-will employees as defined by the laws of the State of Michigan. The employment relationship may be terminated at any time for any lawful reason by either party.

No person may be employed in a position that is under the direct supervision of an immediate family member.

Three factors define the status of employees. These are: the period of employment (regular/term/interim), the number of hours regularly scheduled to work (full-time/part-time) and eligibility for overtime (exempt called staff, exempt staff and non-exempt staff).

#### Regular Employment

If the period of employment has no prearranged ending date, the employee's status is regular.

#### **Term Employment**

If the maximum period of employment for an employee is three months or more and has a prearranged ending date, the employee's status is term. Term employment is appropriate for:

- a. special projects of finite duration;
- b. projects of time-limited funding; or
- c. programs in transition

#### Full-Time or Part-Time Status

Full-time employees are those regularly scheduled to work a full work schedule as defined by Employer. Part-time employees are those regularly scheduled to work less than a full work schedule as defined by Employer.

#### **Exempt or Non-Exempt Status**

Employees whose positions meet specific exemption tests established by the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) are exempt from overtime.

Employees whose positions do not meet those tests are not exempt and must be paid at least time and a half of their established hourly rate of pay or receive compensatory time in an amount equal to 1 1/2 multiplied by the amount of all time worked in excess of 40 hours per week.

#### **Exempt Called Staff**

Written calls to service are required for certain staff positions. These must be approved by Presbytery on the recommendation of the Coordinating Cabinet and the Presbytery Operations Ministry Team.

For persons employed in positions where ordination is not a minimum qualification, the terms of call and benefits will be established by the Employer and may or may not meet the Presbytery minimums but will be comparable to those offered to other exempt and non-exempt staff in similar positions.

For Ministers of the Word and Sacrament, Employer will provide detailed "terms of call" consistent with the <u>Book of Order</u> 11.0410 and the terms of call must at least meet the Presbytery minimums for salary and study leave.

Changes in the terms of the call or dissolution of the employment relationship for any exempt called employee shall be reported to the Presbytery.

#### Non-employees

Consultants, independent contractors, temporary agency workers, and volunteers are not employees, and are not eligible for any benefits available to employees, including withholding taxes, FICA contributions, etc.

#### INTRODUCTORY PERIOD

During the first three months of employment, newly hired employees will be evaluated on attendance, job performance, and compliance with all work rules by a supervisor. The employee will be advised if their

overall performance is deemed acceptable or unacceptable. If the employee's performance is unacceptable, employment will be promptly terminated. Following the introductory three month period of employment, each employee will continue to be subject to overall performance reviews and disciplinary action (including termination) if their performance is not acceptable.

## **WORK SCHEDULE**

#### **Exempt Called Staff**

The standard work week for full-time Exempt Called Staff is 50 hours, including any time spent providing leadership for Presbytery-related work, meetings and or events held in the evenings, on Saturdays and/or Sundays.

## **Exempt Non-Called Staff**

The standard work week for full-time Exempt Non-Called Staff is 40 hours The standard work week is Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 5:00 pm with a 30 minute break for lunch and two additional 15 minute breaks. The standard work week number of hours and daily schedule for full-time Exempt Non-Called Staff may be reduced from time to time at the request of, or with the approval of, the Executive Presbyter. Any change in work schedules must be approved by the employee's supervisor.

## Other Full-Time Staff - Non-Exempt

The standard work week for full time staff is 40 hours. The standard work week is Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 5:00 pm with a 30 minute break for lunch and two additional 15 minute breaks. Any change in work schedules must be approved by the employee's supervisor.

## Flex Time - Non-Exempt Staff

Flex Time arrangements are possible for temporary and specified periods of time. All such arrangements must be documented and signed by the employee and her/his immediate supervisor (See Appendix #2)

## **EMPLOYMENT AT WILL**

The employment of all employees covered by these policies, is not pursuant to any contract (either written or oral, expressed or implied) and is not for any set period or upon any set conditions, and is terminable by either party at any time for any reason. Any manuals, handbooks or other personnel-related material which employees or supervisory personnel may receive, do not constitute a commitment of employment or require any graduated disciplinary steps prior to termination of employment.

No representative of the Employer has any authority to enter into any agreement for employment for any specified period of time, or to make any agreement contrary to the foregoing, unless such agreement is in writing and signed by the Chairperson of the Operations Ministry Team and the Executive Presbyter.

#### **EMPLOYEE RELOCATION**

It is the policy of the Employer to assist new or transferred called employees, who must relocate more than 50 miles with certain moving expenses. However, it must be remembered that full reimbursement for all such expenses is not guaranteed, and reimbursement will be granted at the sole discretion of the Executive Presbyter and the Presbytery Operations Ministry Team.

The reimbursement for new or transferred employees of the Presbytery of Detroit may include the following types of expenses: house search, travel to new location, shipment of household effects, and temporary living costs up to three (3) months.

#### **GENERAL EMPLOYEE COMPLAINTS**

This policy relates to general complaints of unfairness, inappropriate application of policy, or similar work-related problems. It is the policy of the Employer to encourage good working relationships that affirm the importance of each individual and his or her contribution to the organization in an atmosphere of mutual respect.

Employees are encouraged to take initiative in seeking answers to their questions or offering solutions to work-related problems through open discussion with their immediate supervisor. Supervisors are expected to encourage honest and frequent communication with employees, to give prompt attention to suggestions, and to provide active assistance in dealing with concerns or complaints in a manner free from reprisal or retaliation.

The employee's immediate supervisor is the person through whom an employee should initially raise concerns. Other sources such as the Presbytery Operations Ministry Team are available to the employee to check information, clarify personnel policies, or obtain guidance.

In the event that the immediate supervisor is the subject of the concern or complaint, the employee may go to the Executive Presbyter, or if the Executive Presbyter is the subject of the concern or complaint, the employee may go to the Chair of the Presbytery Operations Team.

Supervisors or managers working with employees to resolve complaints shall take advantage of the full resources as identified by the Presbytery of Detroit for counsel and direction during the investigation and resolution process.

This complaint process may also be used to address concerns or complaints related to termination of an employee.

The employee must notify her/his immediate supervisor, or if that is not possible, the Executive Presbyter or the Chair of the Operations Ministry Team, in a timely fashion, of any complaint considered appropriate for handling under this policy. This complaint process is the exclusive remedy for employees with appropriate complaints. As used in this policy the terms "timely fashion," "reasonable time," "as soon as practical," and "promptly" generally mean within the span of five working days. The Employer will promptly investigate all complaints in conjunction or consultation with the Operations Ministry Team.

In all events, supervisors, managers and employees must act with mutual respect throughout the complaint process. Personal attacks, either verbal (including name-calling) or physical, will not be tolerated. Profanity and other vulgar language will also not be tolerated, nor will yelling and screaming. These and other inappropriate behaviors will be subject to disciplinary action (including termination).

## SEXUAL MISCONDUCT COMPLAINTS

All complaints regarding sexual harassment or sexual misconduct shall be reported and handled pursuant to the Presbytery of Detroit Sexual Misconduct Policy, attached as Appendix #1.

#### BENEFIT PLANS AND ELIGIBILITY

It is the policy of the Employer to provide fair, competitive, and family-supportive benefit plans to attract and retain qualified employees. Regular full-time and part-time employees that work twenty hours or more a week are eligible for plan benefits. Term and interim employees may be eligible for certain benefits. Non-employees are not eligible for benefits.

Optional benefits are benefits which are not paid by the employer. Information regarding benefits may be obtained from your supervisor.

## **JOB POSTINGS**

Current job postings for positions at the Presbytery of Detroit will be: (1) sent to all churches; (2) published in Newsletter; (3) distributed at Presbytery Meetings; (4) published on the website; and (5) posted on a bulletin board in the main hallway at the Presbytery Office.

## PAID TIME OFF

It is the policy of the Employer to provide time off with pay for certain holidays and to allow employees to enjoy time away from work. Provided, however, that employees who have an unexcused absence on the day preceding or following a holiday are ineligible for holiday pay.

The following are designated holidays for the Presbytery of Detroit:

New Year's Day Memorial Day Thanksgiving Day Martin Luther King Jr. Day Independence Day Friday following Thanksgiving Day Good Friday Labor Day Christmas Eve

Day

Christmas Day New Year's Eve Day

When a holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday, it will be observed as a day off with pay on the nearest Friday or Monday, respectively.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, for so long as the Presbytery retains a reduced four (4) day work week of Monday through Thursday (and is closed on Friday), then the following will apply: (A) the designated holidays will not include either (i) Friday following Thanksgiving Day or (ii) Good Friday; and (B) when one of the remaining holidays falls on a Friday, Saturday or Sunday, it will be observed as a day off with pay on either the prior Thursday or the following Monday, as determined by the Executive Presbyter in his sole discretion.

#### **VACATION TIME**

It is the policy of the Employer to provide paid vacation time to employees. Each employee will accrue vacation time with respect to each pay period over the course of each calendar year. For each such pay period, the vacation time accrual will be computed as the pro rata portion of the annual vacation time allocated to the pay period.

#### Vacation - Exempt Called Staff

All Exempt Called full-time and part-time employees who work twenty (20) hours or more a week are eligible for 26 days of paid vacation time, based on a 50 hour work week. Term and interim employees may

also be eligible for up to 26 days of paid vacation time, depending on their length of service. Paid vacation eligibility for part-time employees is pro-rated based on the percentage of time worked.

#### Vacation - Exempt Non-Called Staff

All Exempt Non-Called full-time and part-time employees who work twenty (20) hours or more a week are eligible for 22 days of paid vacation time, based on a 40 hour work week. Term and interim employees may also be eligible for 22 days of paid vacation time, depending on their length of service. Paid vacation eligibility for part-time employees is pro-rated based on the percentage of time worked.

#### Vacation - Non - Exempt Staff

Paid vacation time is available to all non-exempt full-time and part-time employees who work twenty (20) hours or more a week. Paid vacation time for part-time employees is pro-rated based on the percentage of time worked.

On January 1 of each year, non-exempt employees with one or more years of service are eligible for paid vacation time according to the following service schedule (pro-rated for part-time employees):

With prior approval of the employee's immediate supervisor, paid vacation time may be used in increments of four hours. Under extenuating circumstances, a lesser increment can be used with the approval of the Executive Presbyter or the Associate Executive Presbyter.

No more than eight hours of vacation may be charged to one working day. Employees must exhaust all paid vacation time before moving into an unpaid leave status (except time off for military obligations).

If an employee resigns or is terminated because of reduction in force or job elimination, the employee will be paid for any unused vacation time determined as a pro-rata portion of the vacation time available for the full year, based on the date of separation. If the employee has exceeded her/his vacation allocation at the time of separation, the employee will be asked to reimburse the Employer for the excess vacation time taken, based on the employee's base salary.

## Vacation Pav Calculations for Grandfathered Employees

Notwithstanding the foregoing, all employees who were hired as full time employees and later asked by the Presbytery to reduce their work week from a five (5) day, forty (40) hour work week, to a four (4) day, thirty-two (32) hour work week will continue to accrue vacation leave based on a forty (40) hour work week. That accrual exception shall continue for so long as such employee works fewer than forty (40) hours per week at the request of the Presbytery.

#### Vacation Carryover - Exempt Called/Exempt/Non-Exempt

No more than 10 days of vacation time may be carried over into another calendar year. Any vacation time carry-over must be approved by the Operations Ministry Team.

#### OTHER TIME OFF

#### Sick Leave - Exempt Called/Exempt/Non-Exempt

Paid sick leave is available to all regular full-time and part-time employees and may be available to term and interim employees. Paid sick leave for part-time employees is prorated based on the percentage of time worked. Sick leave is available January 1 to eligible employees, and accrues at the rate of 4 hours per pay period. For newly hired employees, sick leave will begin accruing on the date of hire, and for the first pay period will be prorated based on days worked. The rate of accrual of paid sick leave does not increase with length of service.

An employee who cannot report to work because of illness or injury must notify his/her supervisor as soon as possible, but in any case before the start of the shift. A physician's statement may be required for any sick leave absence at the discretion of the employee's supervisor. Absences of three days or more require a doctor's statement.

## Sick Leave Carryover - Exempt Called/Exempt/Non-Exempt

Unused sick leave may be accumulated up to a maximum of 120 days.

#### Sick Leave at Separation - Exempt Called/Exempt/Non-Exempt

Employees whose employment with the Presbytery of Detroit ends, for any reason, shall not be paid for any accumulated and unused sick leave.

#### Personal Days - Exempt Called/Exempt/Non-Exempt

Employees are entitled to three paid personal days per year to be used for personal business or emergencies. These personal days may be used in 1 hour increments. Personal days will not carry over from one calendar year to a subsequent calendar year.

In the first year of employment and in the year of termination of employment, personal leave will be prorated at the rate of 2 hours per month worked.

Employees whose employment with the Presbytery of Detroit ends, for any reason, will not be paid for any accumulated and unused personal leave.

#### LEAVES OF ABSENCE POLICY

#### UNPAID LEAVES OF ABSENCE

## **Eliaibility**

Only Regular full-time and part-time employees are eligible for a leave of absence. Employees shall not be entitled to a leave more than once in a 12 month period unless granted by the Presbytery Operations Ministry Team.

- Military covered as required by law
- Family Emergencies
- Personal -for personal reasons

#### **Description of Benefit**

Eligible employees may request an unpaid leave of absence (maximum of three months). However, all paid personal and vacation time must be used before any unpaid leave of absence will be granted. The unpaid leave of absence must be continuous.

#### **Notice of Use of Leave**

The employee shall provide the Employer with thirty days' advance notice in writing. If the employee is unable to do this, reasonable justification must be provided.

#### **Approva**

Requests for leave without pay must be approved by the Executive Presbyter, in concurrence with the employee's supervisor, and the Presbytery Operations Ministry Team. While all requests will be considered, they will be granted or denied at the sole discretion of the Executive Presbyter after consultation with the Presbytery Operations Ministry Team.

#### Return to Work

Upon completion of the leave, the employee may be returned to his or her position. Failure to return at the end of a scheduled leave under this policy will constitute a voluntary resignation.

#### **Health Care Benefits During Leave**

Heath care benefits will continue during unpaid Leaves of Absence. No other benefits, other than the Employer provided life insurance, are available during a Leave of Absence.

#### PAID LEAVES OF ABSENCE

#### **Bereavement**

Regular full-time and part-time employees who work 20 or more hours a week are eligible for <u>up to three days</u> of paid leave, immediately following the death of a member of their immediate family (spouse, parent, parent-in-law, child, grandchild, brother, sister, grandparent). Verification of death and date of funeral is required to receive this benefit.

## **Jury Duty**

Regular full-time and part-time employees shall be paid when summoned for jury duty. If the summon is for less than 3 hours, the employee shall return to work for the remainder of the day. Any compensation received for jury duty must be paid to the Employer.

Employees are required to submit appropriate documentation to their supervisor concerning jury duty, which documentation will be placed in their personnel file.

#### Annual Study Leave - Exempt Called Staff

Annual study leave with pay may be granted to Exempt Called staff at the discretion of the Executive Presbyter and Presbytery Operations Ministry Team in accordance with the approved salary package of the applicable Exempt Called staff.

Study leave will be granted only when the employee and the supervisor/Operations Ministry Team have agreed on the appropriate timing of the leave related to the needs of the employee and the Employer.

Annual study leave may be accumulated for up to three years. The total accumulation of annual study leave will be no more than six weeks. Pay in lieu of annual study leave will not be provided.

#### Sabbatical - Exempt Called Staff

After seven years of service, each Exempt Called staff person is eligible for a sabbatical leave of an additional eight weeks to be used within the next seven years. The sabbatical leave must be scheduled one year in advance and the purpose and timing approved by the Presbytery Operations Ministry Team. Requests for sabbatical leave shall be granted in the order of seniority.

## CONDUCT/MISCONDUCT IN THE WORKPLACE

To ensure the highest standards of work, health and safety, all employees shall conduct themselves in a professional manner appropriate for a business setting, and perform their job duties with integrity. While no list can be all inclusive, any of the following offenses (and violations of other policies, procedures or practices detailed in these Personnel Guidelines) may, in the sole judgment of the Presbytery, result in disciplinary action up to and including dismissal:

-	Smoking is prohibited in the Presbytery of Detroit building.
	Employees who report to work intoxicated or under the influence of illegal drugs will be
	disciplined and required to seek help.
-;	Weapons of all types (whether or not a permit is issued) are prohibited on Presbytery grounds
	(including the parking lot).
-	Insubordination (disobedience to authority or willful failure to follow instructions) will not be
	tolerated.

## CONDUCT/MISCONDUCT OUTSIDE THE WORKPLACE

Since the Presbytery of Detroit is a Christian organization committed to Christian ethics and principles, conduct by any employee outside the workplace that is inconsistent with these principles and Christian standards of morality, or that may be detrimental to the reputation of the Presbytery of Detroit may result in discipline or discharge.

#### **ATTENDANCE**

Each employee is expected to be present and ready to work during all scheduled work hours. Attendance records are kept to document absences for pay purposes and will be considered in evaluating performance.

If an employee develops a recurring pattern of lateness or unexcused absences, he or she will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including dismissal. An employee may be counseled by Executive Presbyter or designee for a recurring lateness pattern.

Under most circumstances, an employee must give adequate and timely notice of her/his intended absence or lateness to work It is expected that this notice be prior to her/his scheduled start of work The notice should include the reason for absence or lateness and the expected time of appearance. Failure to communicate with the employee's supervisor for three consecutive scheduled working days will be cause for termination of employment.

#### <u>Tardiness</u> (5 to 15 minutes late)

If there are 5 occurrences of tardiness in a 6 month period the employee shall receive a disciplinary warning that will be placed in her/his personnel file. If there is a sixth episode in the same six month period, the employee will be subject to termination.

#### <u>Unscheduled Absences</u> (16 minutes or more of unscheduled absence)

If there are 5 occurrences of unscheduled absences in a 12 month period the employee shall receive a disciplinary warning that will be placed in her/his personnel file. If there is a sixth episode in the same 12 month period, the employee will be subject to termination.

#### ANNUAL PERFORMANCE REVIEW

It is the policy of the Employer to conduct performance reviews/evaluations of all staff at least annually. These evaluations serve several purposes. They provide employees with feedback on performance; provide managers with an opportunity to coach, counsel, and motivate employees to exert their best efforts; serve as a measurement of organizational effectiveness; and provide a basis for merit salary increases.

Performance review is accomplished by comparison of the employee's performance to job responsibilities and pre-established performance goals and objectives.

Evaluations shall be conducted honestly and fairly and reflect the collaborative nature of the work environment. The evaluation must be documented in writing and signed by the reviewer; the employee should acknowledge the review and may add written comments.

An employee that receives a rating that is less than satisfactory shall be placed on probation.

#### ON-THE-JOB ACCIDENTS AND INJURIES

It is the policy of the Employer to provide worker's compensation or travel accident insurance at the employer's expense for injuries incurred by employees while performing duties specifically related to the employee's position or while traveling on Employer business.

Employees are responsible for reporting on-the-job accidents or injuries as soon as possible after the incident.

#### **Worker's Compensation**

Employees shall be covered by worker's compensation insurance in accordance with state law.

During a period of absence due to injury or illness, the employee's position may be filled due to business necessity on either a temporary or regular basis, depending upon the business needs of the department. Upon return, the employee will be placed in the same or equivalent position.

#### **EMPLOYMENT SEPARATIONS**

It is the policy of the Employer that employment relationships are at-will and may be terminated at any time with or without cause by the employee or the Employer (except where limited by Federal or state law).

Non-exempt employees ending employment voluntarily are requested to give at least two weeks notice; exempt employees are requested to give one month's notice.

#### **Reduction in Force/Job Elimination**

Reductions in force will be accomplished in a manner that best preserves overall organizational effectiveness as determined by the Employer. Decisions on which groups of jobs are affected will be based on functions being eliminated or changed. Where choices must be made between employees, decisions will be based on objective criteria such as job performance, individual experience and qualifications for the jobs which remain, need for specific skills and the number of people with similar skills. Staff members with outstanding performance ratings and exceptional qualifications should be the last to be affected by a reduction in force, giving appropriate consideration to affirmative action commitments and equal employment opportunity. Employees who choose to accept a voluntary severance package during a Reduction in Force process are not eligible for re-employment with the Employer for a minimum of five (5) years.

Exempt employees whose jobs will be eliminated in a reduction in force will receive three months notice of the separation date; non-exempt employees will receive thirty days notice. At its sole discretion, the Employer may require certain employees to continue to work through the notice period in order to phase out the responsibilities of their positions. Whether or not the employees are required to work during all of the notice period, the notice pay will continue as regular wages. These employees may also be eligible for severance pay at the end of the notice period. Employees required to work through the notice period who choose to resign before the official separation date as determined by the Employer may forfeit any remaining notice and severance pay. If the employee secures other employment, notice pay will cease on the first day of such other employment and no severance will be paid. If an employee is required to work through the notice period, he or she shall be granted an equivalent amount of notice pay from the time they leave.

Benefits continue for employees as long as they are receiving notice pay and severance in biweekly payments.

#### Vacation leave - reimbursement to employee

Any unused <u>pro-rated</u> vacation leave will be paid to the employee within 30 days of the termination or separation date, whichever is later, as well as accrued carryover vacation leave.

#### Vacation leave - reimbursement to employer

If the employee has used all of her/his vacation allowance and based on a pro-rated formula has exceeded the number of days available at the time of termination or separation, the employee may be required to reimburse the Employer for the number of days taken that exceed the prorated allocation. Any accrued carry-over is not subject for reimbursement to the employer.

#### **Severance**

It is the policy of the Employer to provide financial assistance, when able, to eligible employees whose employment is involuntarily terminated because of organizational structure change, fundamental change in objectives, significant change in financial outlook, or for other reasons unrelated to job performance. Severance, if available, is paid in addition to unused prorated vacation, notice pay, and any other compensation owed to the employee. This policy does not guarantee the payment of severance to any employee. Severance is granted at the sole discretion of the Executive Presbyter after consultation with the Presbytery Operations Ministry Team.

In order to be eligible for severance, termination must not be voluntary or due to unsatisfactory performance. Only exempt/non-exempt full-time or part-time employees on the date of termination are eligible for

severance. Term employees are not eligible or entitled to severance pay. Severance for part-time employees will be prorated according to the percentage of time normally scheduled to work.

Employees who have received official notice of the date of job elimination but who choose to resign before the date of termination forfeit any remaining notice and may forfeit any severance pay.

This policy does not guarantee severance pay to any employee.

#### Retirement

As the Board of Pensions' Plan currently stands, employees must be at least 55 years of age to be eligible for retirement. Employees who retire and who are to receive pension benefits from the Board of Pensions will receive payment for hours worked up to their retirement plus payment for unused accrued vacation leave.

Employees who retire with 20 or more years of service will receive severance pay of one month's salary.

Employees who retire should give one month's notice of their intention to retire. Retirement benefits must be coordinated with the Board of Pensions.

I understand that this Employee Handbook does not create or constitute a contract of any kind between any employee and the Presbytery of Detroit. I also understand that these policies and procedures are continually evaluated and may be amended, modified, or discontinued at any time by the Presbytery of Detroit.

This is a remedial case which has come before this Permanent Judicial Commission as a result of a complaint filed by the above named Complaints against the Presbytery of Detroit, Respondent.

#### **HISTORY**

The Complaint was received in the office of the Synod of the Covenant on July 27, 2010. The clerk of the Permanent Judicial Commission recused herself from participating in this case because she is from the Presbytery of Detroit. The Moderator and Vice-Clerk of the PJC met by telephone conference call on September 15, 2010 to determine whether the Preliminary Questions listed in the Book of Order, D-6.0305, could be answered in the affirmative. It was determined that the governing body has jurisdiction and that the complainants have standing to file the case. It was further determined that the Complaint was not timely filed, and that the Complaint did not state a claim upon which relief could be granted. Therefore the Moderator and Vice-Clerk ruled that the case could not be accepted. The ruling of the Moderator and Vice-Clerk was delivered by United States Postal Service to the Complainants, the Respondent, and the members of the Synod Permanent Judicial Commission. No one challenged the findings and ruling of the Moderator and Vice-Clerk under the provisions of the Book of Order, D-6.0306.

#### **DECISION**

The Permanent Judicial Commission concurs with the findings and ruling of the Moderator and Vice-Clerk and the case is not accepted.

The Presbytery of Detroit (a "Corporation") of the Presbyterian Church (USA) having received and reviewed the loan application of the Lake Shore Presbyterian Church of St Clair Shores, Michigan, a member in good standing of this Presbytery, approves the loan application and guarantees the repayment of principal and interest on the loan to the Presbyterian Church (USA), a Corporation ("CLP"), in the amount of \$522,000.00, provided that that they change their Church Information Form to reflect their financial situation, and that the new pastor must have a gift for stewardship in order to facilitate the payoff of this loan. The officers of the Presbytery Corporation are authorized to sign a Guaranty Agreement for this loan as agents of the Presbytery corporation.

The time for the special order of the day having arrived, the Presbytery adjourned for dinner and worship at 6:02 p.m.

- 3. Three churches in the Presbytery have received rebates from PILP.
- 4. The Trustees have approved the listing of the Church of Our Savior real property for \$1,185,000.
- 5. Trustees voted to loan Detroit Hope Church \$7,000 for 30 months at 5% simple interest, to be repaid at \$245/month.
- 6. The Trustees have responded to a request from one of the Presbytery teams to spend funds not expended from the 2010 budget on the grounds that they do not have the authority to authorize it.
- 7. The Trustees have been investigating the sale of the Hartland property. Because of the times, this is not a good time to sell property, so they have decided not to list it. They will place a sign on the property saying it is for sale by the owner.
- 8. The Trustees report on the serious situation of sexual misconduct at Vienna Presbyterian Church in the National Capital Presbytery. It was reported extensively by the Washington

Post, and can be found at http://www.washingtonpost.com/local/vienna-presbyterian-church-works-to-overcome-revelations-of-sexual-abuse/2011/03/30/AF3hNxQC\_story.html. According to the article, teenage victims of sexual involvement with a youth leader reported incidents and the church initially supported the youth leader. It is a cautionary tale for churches of the Presbytery to ensure they have a sexual misconduct policy (as required in the new amendment to the Book of Order), and that they are scrupulous in following it. They would also like to inform Presbytery that for \$10, the Presbytery will do a national background check on staff and volunteers.

- 9. The Trustees have voted to accept full financial reviews from Presbyterian Women, Second Mile Center, and the Riverside NCD for purposes of the 2010 audit.
- 10. The Trustees have voted to advance a \$20,000 line of credit to Barnabas for the period 5/1-12/31/2011 at no interest if it is fully repaid by 4/30/2012.

#### Coordinating Cabinet: Kent Clise reported for the Coordinating Cabinet.

Amendment 10-2, the Belhar Confession, was placed on the floor by the General Assembly for Presbytery's approval or disapproval.

Mr Clise presented a history of the Belhar Confession and arguments pro and con.

The motion was made to postpone action on this motion until such time as there is an equal time given in opposition to the Belhar Confession as had been given in favor.

The motion was made to amend the motion to read "postpone until the next meeting of Presbytery."

After debate, the <u>motion was put</u> to postpone to the June meeting of Presbytery. The motion to postpone to the June meeting failed.

A point of order was raised that the motion approved was only whether to set the time of postponement to June. The Moderator ruled against the point of order since she put the motion as postponing until June.

Upon motion, the Presbytery voted to end debate.

The Presbytery voted to approve Amendment 10-2, the Belhar Confession, by a vote of 78 yes to 33 no.

The Coordinating Cabinet voted to confirm the appointment of Peter Smith as chair of the Committee on Local Arrangements for the 2014 General Assembly; Sue Ellis Melrose and Elaine Terrell Ellis as co-vice chairs; Elaine Terrell Ellis as treasurer; and Budge Gere as chair of the fundraising committee.
- 3. The Coordinating Cabinet has approved the following as a Coordinating Cabinet policy: "When non-budget funds or grants are available for use by units of the Presbytery of Detroit,

the amount of the funds, the process for application, and the use of such funds shall be made public before making grants."

# PEACEMAKING OFFERING GRANT POLICIES PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT SOCIAL JUSTICE & PEACEMAKING TEAM

- 1. Peacemaking Offering funds are available for use by churches and organizations within the bounds of the Presbytery of Detroit who wish to sponsor a special peacemaking program or event.
- 2. Applications for Peacemaking Offering Grants will be received by the Social Justice & Peacemaking (SJP) Team of the Presbytery of Detroit at any time.
- 3. Applications should be made on the form provided by the SJP Team, available on the Presbytery's website.
- 4. Action will be taken by the SJP Team three times a year on all applications received within 60 days prior to their meeting day.
- 5. Meetings when action takes place will ordinarily be in March, June, & October.
- 6. There will be a public announcement on the Presbytery website at least 90 days prior to the date of the meetings when the SJP Team will act on grant applications.
- 7. No church or organization will be eligible to receive a grant, if they have received one within the previous twelve months.
- 8. All grant recipients must submit quarterly reports, including financial reports, to the SJP Team until the grant funds are exhausted.
- 9. Grants will be limited to \$2,500.00 or less, based on the present amount of annual income from the Peacemaking Offering. Should the annual income increase, this policy will be reviewed by the SJP Team.

### EQUALIZATION OF ELDER COMMISSIONERS PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT MAY, 2011-APRIL, 2012

The Book of Order requires the Stated Clerk annually to ascertain the members of Presbytery who are active in the life of the Presbytery in order to determine the appropriate number of commissioners that the churches should be sending. The intention is to ensure that the number of ministers and elders is equal: G-11.0101

The Book of Order specifies certain representation according to the size of the church. G-11.0101a. It further states that if additional commissioners are needed to bring the representation to equal numbers, a Presbytery may select its own criteria for granting additional commissioners. By policy, the Presbytery of Detroit has given precedence to churches that have a majority of members who are an ethnic minority.

The number of ministers reported last year was 176. I report the number of active ministers this year as 161. I count the number of active ministers as those on the active roll who are resident in the area, plus those on the retired roll who are active in the life of Presbytery. I measured the latter by counting those retired ministers who are on a Presbytery committee, who have a position of some kind in a local congregation, or who attended a meeting last year.

The far-right column represents the number of commissioners a church should elect for the period May 1, 2011 to April 30, 2012. Commissioners should report this new figure to Session so the proper number will come to the June meeting.

- 3. **Presbytery Minutes**. The Presbytery minutes have been reviewed by the Synod and approved with the following exception: There was no report from the Committee on Representation.
- 4. The new Form of Government. The new Form of Government has been approved and will take effect on July 11<sup>th</sup>. While it will not materially affect the operation of congregations, it will require that churches take some steps to conform to it. The most

immediate involves the bylaws. The Michigan Nonprofit Corporation Act governs the corporate structure of our churches. Under the current Book of Order, the necessary provisions are present that preserve our polity. Since many of those provisions are not in the new Form of Government, bylaws may need to be amended. The most urgent needs are to change the quorum of a congregational meeting to 10% of the membership (the current rule), since state law requires 50%; to ensure that there is a 10-day notice for calling a meeting; and to change the quorum of a session meeting to the pastor plus 1/3 of the elders. (This latter is not urgent as long as the pastor and 50% of the elders are present at a session meeting.)

Later this summer, after I get a chance to review state law and the new FoG, I will prepare a more thorough set of recommendations for congregations and sessions.

The effect on the Presbytery is of a different kind. With the exception of a committee on representation, there are no longer any required committees. Moreover, a general mission mandate of the Presbytery has been changed from "initiat[ing] mission through a variety of forms in light of the larger strategy of the synod and the General Assembly," G-11.0103c, to "assisting and supporting the witness of congregations to the sovereign activity of God in the world . . . ." G-3.0301. Because our current structure is established in both our Bylaws and Policies and Procedures Manual, no urgent changes are required. It is likely that a revision of the Bylaws will be prudent.

#### The Committee on Ministry reported that it has:

- 1. Appointed Rev. Iris Tucker-Lloyd moderator of the Session at Detroit, Trumbull Avenue.
- 2. Appointed Rev. Phil Reed moderator of the Session at Starr, Royal Oak.
- 3. Appointed Rev. Larry Chamberlain moderator of the Session at Westminster, Port Huron, and granted permission for him to officiate at communion.
- 4. Approved the final report from the Cherry Hill Administrative Commission and dissolved the commission with thanks.

- 5. Approved a Shared Grant of \$2,100 be distributed among 3 pastors in need (each to receive \$700). This action is based on adjustments in the COM budget, which will be acted upon by Presbytery.
- 6. Voted to ask Operations to come up with a plan to address the "New Form Government," which could include a project manager.
- 7. Voted to grant authority to the COM Committee Chairs to deal with issues that come before COM over the next month, in lieu of a meeting of the whole COM in July.

15439 Cleveland Avenue, (A84A259 LOT 259 ALSO NE ½ ADJ VAC AL- LEY LINCOLNLAWN SUB PC 84, 86, 9) at a price not less than \$80,000 and

15446 Harrison Avenue (Lot 407 also Sly 1/2 ADJ vacated alley of Lincolnlawn Sub) at a price not less than \$120,000.

- 2. Approve Kirk in the Kills' granting an easement to DTE Energy for electrical service from the utility pole on the west side of the manse, across the land on the western and northern borders of the west parking lot, towards the refectory where it will be connected to the transformer located in the maintenance area of the Kirk, in accordance with the metes and bounds description to be provided by DTE Energy.
- 3. Dissolve Peace Church as a congregation effective August 31, 2011, and that the assets of Peace Church be transferred to Utica Church for \$1 consideration as to real property and \$1 as to all tangible and intangible personal property on the effective date of dissolution of Peace Church, pursuant to the Plan of Union agreed to by both churches and reviewed by the Trustees.

The Trustees reported the following for the information of Presbytery:

- 1. The Trustees have amended the due date for the repayment of funds borrowed by Barnabas on their \$20,000 line of credit from 4/30/12 to 6/30/12.
- 2. The Trustees have authorized Allen Park Church to list manses for sale as follow:
  - 15439 Cleveland Avenue (Lot 258 and also NE 1/2 ADJ vacated alley of Lincolnlawn Sub) at not less than \$80,000
  - 15446 Harrison Avenue (Lot 407 also Sly 1/2 ADJ vacated alley of Lincolnlawn Sub) at not less than \$120,000.

After sharing joys and concerns, and offering prayers of thanksgiving and information, by consent the Presbytery adjourned with prayer at 8:18 p.m.

### ANSWER OF THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

The Committee of Counsel of The Presbytery of Detroit submits the following answer to the complaint of the irregularity alleged in the complaint of the Session of Cavalry Presbyterian Church, as follows:

1. Allegation: The Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church of Detroit alleges an irregularity in the discharge of duty within the work of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry of the Presbytery of Detroit.

Response: Respondent denies that an irregularity occurred in the discharge of duty within the work of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry ("COPM") of the Presbytery of Detroit for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated.

2. Allegation: Thomas Priest, an elder in good standing of Calvary, is currently under the care of this Presbytery's CPM.

Response: Respondent admits that Thomas Priest is an elder and a candidate for ministry under the guidance, care and oversight of the COPM. Respondent does not have personal knowledge that Thomas Priest is an elder in good standing with Complainant and so denies that allegation and leaves the Complainant to its proofs.

3. Allegation: Allegations were brought against Elder Priest by another member of the Presbytery and an investigating process was initiated.

Response: Respondent admits that certain allegations were made against Elder Priest by another member of the Presbytery and brought to the attention of the COPM. Respondent admits that the COPM formed a sub-committee to investigate those allegations. Respondent denies for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated that COPM initiated an investigating process pursuant to the Rules of Discipline to investigate those allegations.

4. Allegation: The investigating committee of Calvary has since completed its work and a report has been discharged to all necessary parties.

Response: Respondent does not have personal knowledge of the facts of this allegation and so denies the allegation and leaves Complainants to its proofs.

5. Allegation: During the course of CPM's care of Thomas Priest, an investigating committee was empowered and it is here that the Session of Calvary sees the irregularity.

Response: Respondent admits that a sub-committee of COPM investigated allegations made against Mr. Priest by another member of Presbytery in furtherance of the COPM's responsibility to provide guidance, care and oversight to a candidate under its care. See G-14.0412. Respondent denies as untrue or mistakenly stated that the sub-committee of COPM was an investigating committee organized pursuant to the Rules of Discipline.

6. Allegation: In as much as CPM is not a governing body, we contend that such action (empowering an investigating committee) is irregular.

Response: Respondent admits that COPM is not a governing body. Respondent admits that a COPM may not organize an investigating committee pursuant to the Rules of Discipline (see D-10.0201; G-14.0411). Respondent denies the COPM empowered an investigating committee pursuant to the Rules of Discipline and also that an irregularity has occurred for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated.

7. Allegation. Enclosed are two documents. One is a copy of an agenda for the 2/1/11 CPM meeting. The other is a copy of correspondence sent to Elder Priest from CPM.

Response: This paragraph does not make a factual allegation. The documents speak for themselves. To the extent Respondent must otherwise respond to this paragraph, Respondent denies the allegation and leaves Complainants to its proofs.

8. Allegation. We are asking your office to initiate a process with the hope that at the end thereof the Committee on Preparation for Ministry of the Presbytery of Detroit be instructed to arrange a meeting with the Session of Calvary to give an account of its actions in this matter to us.

Response: This paragraph requests a remedy and does not make a factual allegation. The documents speak for themselves. To the extent Respondent must otherwise respond to this paragraph, Respondent denies the allegation and leaves Complainants to its proofs.

### OTHER FACTS THAT MAY EXPLAIN THE SITUATION IDENTIFIED AS AN IRREGULARITY OR DELINQUENCY - D-6.0303

- 1. Mr. Thomas M. Priest is a candidate under the care of Respondent. See Exhibit A January 18, 2011 Report of COPM Sub-Committee at pg. 1.
  - 2. Mr. Priest is also a former moderator of Respondent. Id at 2.
- 3. In 2010, a member of Presbytery wrote to Respondent's Committee on Ministry ("COM") and COPM complaining about remarks made by Mr. Priest when he visited a mission center of Respondent's known as the Second Mile Center. See Exhibit B Letter from Ruth Azar dated April 20, 2010.
- 4. Mr. Priest was then visiting the center in his capacity of a seminary student writing a paper. See Exhibit A.
  - 5. The member's letter alleged that Mr. Priest's remarks were racist. See Exhibit B.
- 6. Respondent's Stated Clerk informed the COM that COM had no jurisdiction over Mr. Priest, but that COPM would have jurisdiction over him in since he is a candidate for ministry. See also G-14.0411.
- 7. Respondent's Stated Clerk further informed the member of Presbytery who wrote the letter that the letter could not be considered a complaint under the Rules of Discipline, since such a complaint would need to be filed with the Complainant. See G-14.0411.
- 8. The letter was subsequently filed, and Complainant formed an investigating committee in accordance with the Rules of Discipline. See Complaint.
- 9. Complainant's investigating committee declined to bring charges against Mr. Priest. *Id*.
- 10. While the investigating committee of Complainant declined to file charges, Respondent's COPM had a separate duty pursuant to G-14.0412, including a duty to provide guidance and instruction to Mr. Priest in light of the allegations in the letter and determine his fitness for ministry. See Exhibit A.

- 11. The COPM formed a sub-committee, which it labeled an investigating committee. Id.
- 12. The sub-committee of COPM conducted interviews and wrote a report with recommendations to the COPM. Id.
- 13. Mr. Priest objected to the recommendations in the report, which would have required him to pursue counseling. See Exhibit C Minutes of COPM dated March 1, 2011.
- 14. Respondent's Stated Clerk informed COPM that COPM not only must give Mr. Priest a copy of the report, it must schedule a hearing concerning the recommendations of the report.
- 15. COPM was further informed by Respondent's Stated Clerk that Mr. Priest had the right to full knowledge of the allegations against him, the right to defend himself before a neutral body, the right to counsel, and the right to have advocates with him.
  - 16. Mr. Priest availed himself of all of the rights identified in paragraph 15, supra.
- 17. A COPM hearing on the report was scheduled for the February 2011 meeting of COPM, but was postponed to the March 2011 meeting at Mr. Priest's request; his counsel was not able to come to the February meeting. See Exhibits D and E hearing transcripts.
- 18. The COPM hearing on the report was conducted at the March 2011 meeting of COPM, where Mr. Priest was represented by attorney/minister Archibald Wallace III of Richmond, Va. See Exhibit E.
- 19. Following the public portion of the hearing, the COPM adjourned to executive session, where the COPM voted to adopt the report and an augmented set of recommendations. See Exhibits C and E.
- 20. Complainant has now filed the remedial suit against Respondent the focus of which is that the COPM did not have the right to form a sub-committee to evaluate a candidate under its care.

#### ARGUMENTS RELATED TO D-6.0305 - EXAMINATION OF PAPERS

#### a. Does the governing body has jurisdiction;

Respondent's comment: No

A remedial case is one in which an irregularity or a delinquency of a lower governing body... may be corrected by a higher governing body. D-2.0202 (emphasis added). The complaint here did not allege any action by a lower governing body. The only action alleged was that of the COPM, which is not a governing body. Therefore, Respondent respectfully submits that this Commission does not have jurisdiction to hear the complaint.

There is absolutely no dispute that Respondent's COPM is not a governing body. See Allegation no. 6, *supra*. There is also no dispute that the complaint focused exclusively on actions taken by the COPM. This limited factual scope in the complaint is wholly attributable to that fact that Complainant never took its concerns regarding the COPM to the floor of the presbytery. As a result, Respondent has never had occasion to address or otherwise act on Complainant's concerns.

If Complainant had a problem with the COPM, and the procedure the COPM used to investigate Mr. Priest's fitness for ministry, then Complainant had a clear avenue of appeal to the floor of presbytery. Indeed, Complainant through its commissioner could have requested from Respondent (by way of a motion from the floor) the very remedy Complainant now demands from this Commission. Stated directly, Complainant could have made a motion on the floor of Presbytery that COPM be instructed to meet with Complainant. Had Complainant taken even this basic step, and had Respondent then failed (in Complainant's mind) to act appropriately, Complainant would then be able to point to at least SOME action by a lower governing body with which to vest this Commission with jurisdiction. But that is not what happened here. What happened (and is happening) here is that Complainant is attempting to use this Commission and the judicial process to circumvent standard parliamentary procedure, Respondent's wide discretion in considering the worthiness of candidates for ministry, and the Constitution. Complainant's efforts should not be rewarded.

In addition, if at any time the Commission concludes that Respondent did not form a disciplinary committee in accordance with the Rules of Discipline then this case should be dismissed for lack of jurisdiction. The inappropriate formation of a disciplinary committee in violation of the Book of Order is the only Constitutional violation alleged in the complaint. Absent that allegation, all that remains is a question of policy. However, under prevailing caselaw, the Commission only has jurisdiction to hear violations of the Constitution, not violations of policy. See e.g., See 2004, 217-1 Hope v. Pby of San Francisco.

#### b. the complainant has standing to file the case;

Respondent's comment: None.

#### c. the complaint was timely filed; and

Respondent's comment: No.

D-6.0301(f) required Complainant to deliver a copy of the complaint to Respondent by certified delivery or personal service. See 2004, 217-1 Hope v. Pby of San Francisco ("...personal service or certified delivery is a requirement of the Book of Order"). Complainant here failed – completely – to deliver a copy of the complaint to Respondent. Respondent only learned of the complaint after the Stated Clerk of the Synod mailed a copy to Respondent's Stated Clerk.

Complainant was also required to file with the stated clerk of the higher governing body a receipt signed by Respondent or an affidavit of personal service. Here again Complainant did not comply with the Constitution. The complaint did not include a receipt or an affidavit of personal service.

Section D-6.0301 begins, "A complaint shall state the following: ..." Use of the term "shall" confirms that the provisions of D-6.0301(f) were mandatory. And, as a result, Complainant's failure to comply with the notice requirements renders its complaint incomplete and untimely filed — the 90 day window from March 1 having expired. Compare, Order in the Matter of John F. Veldhuizen, 11.056 (GAPJC May 13, 1991)(appeal dismissed for failure to comply with content requirements for a notice of appeal).

#### d. the complaint states a claim upon which relief can be granted.

Respondent answers: No.

The complaint confuses the separate duties and obligations of Complainant and Respondent's COPM concerning the oversight of a candidate – Mr. Priest. Paragraph G-14.0412 of our Constitution granted Complainant original jurisdiction to investigate the disciplinary complaint against Mr. Priest. However, that same paragraph also granted Respondent's COPM original jurisdiction to administratively determine Mr. Priest's fitness for ministry. It is well established that a COPM may appoint a task force to investigate allegations made against a candidate. See 2004, 217-1 Hope v. Pby of San Francisco. The Hope decision is particularly relevant because there, as here, the COPM "... appointed a task force to investigate concerns about the candidate's ability to resolve conflicts..." See also Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 10th ed. 480 (Cambridge, Mass.: Perseus Publishing, 2000)("A committee can appoint a subcommittee, which are responsible to and report to the committee and not to the assembly.")

Respondent's COPM did not need to resort to the Rules of Discipline to investigate and exercise oversight of Mr. Priest when considering his fitness for ministry, because our Constitution and numerous GAPJC decisions make clear that the COPM inherently has that authority. See e.g. 1997, 210-2 Bevensee v. Pby of New Brunswick (upholding Presbytery removal of inquirer from roles for not complying with counseling requirement mandated by CPM). Therefore, even if the allegations in the complaint are taken as true, the complaint failed to state a claim. Respondent's COPM did investigate Mr. Priest, but that investigation was not a disciplinary investigation. Rather, the COPM conducted an administrative investigation of Mr. Priest in accordance with the COPM's constitutionally mandated duty to provide oversight of candidates under its care. See G-14.0412. Moreover, during that investigation and subsequent hearing, Mr. Priest was treated with fundamental fairness. He was supplied with copies of relevant documents. He was afforded the opportunity to speak on his behalf. And, he was granted a right to counsel.

In addition, Respondent submits that this entire case is now moot. The only relief requested by Complainant was that Respondent be "instructed to arrange a meeting with the Session of Calvary to give an account of its actions in this matter to us." Respondent's COPM has requested a meeting with Complainant. Complainant has, however, not responded to that request.

Finally, Respondent points out that the relief requested by Complainant is somewhat of a non sequitur. The irregularity complained of is an allegation that the COPM usurped the authority of the Complainant and inappropriately functioned as an "investigating committee" in accordance with Rules of Discipline. However, even if that were true, the relief requested – a meeting – would not remedy in whole or in part the harm alleged. The COPM recommendations against Mr. Priest would remain in place.

#### **FURTHER CONSIDERATIONS**

Respondent reserves the right to file a motion to dismiss in the event the Commission decides to accept the case notwithstanding the arguments set forth above.

Date of Report - January 18, 2011

#### Introduction

After prayerful consideration, the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, on May 4, 2010, authorized the formation of a subcommittee to investigate the above referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbott, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to CPM concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

- concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC)
- · disturbing statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC
- a perception that SMC was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included:

- a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context
- Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and SMC work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries
- his preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of SMC.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to SMC and Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and a later meeting at SMC.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and further planning.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at SMC.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011.

#### Central Issues

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their

frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### Recommendations

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

We do not have function or power to determine disciplinary action, and this is not a legal or disciplinary hearing.

#### 5. Hearing Stage

- On February 1, 2011, a motion was made and seconded to adopt the Investigating Committee's report and recommendations. Having been postponed and not withdrawn, it was still on the floor. The Investigating Committee's report and recommendations were read.
- Mr. Wallace acknowledged CPM's right and responsibility to evaluate suitability for ministry, but
  maintained that the style and tone of the report and process of the investigative committee are
  disciplinary in nature and therefore in excess of that right.
- Mr. Wallace responded to the issues raised in the report, specifically: that Mr. Priest did not abuse

# CPM SUBCOMMITTEE CONVENED IN THE MATTER OF COMPLAINT BY RUTH AZAR AGAINST CANDIDATE THOMAS H. PRIEST, JR. Date of Report – January 18, 2011

#### Introduction

After prayerful consideration, the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, on May 4, 2010, authorized the formation of a subcommittee to investigate the above referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbott, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to CPM concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

- concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC)
- disturbing statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC
- a perception that SMC was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the Interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included:

- · a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context
- Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and SMC work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries
- his preferred model of urban ministry and his Interpretations of his observations of SMC.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to SMC and Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and a later meeting at SMC.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and further planning.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at SMC.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011.

#### Central Issues

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### Recommendations

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

[This assessment will include asking Mr. Priest to present a report on what he has learned

personally and professionally.

CPM requires Mr. Priest to subsequently undergo professional assessment through Midwest Career Counseling Center. CPM will furnish Midwest with the CPM Sub-Committee report and require that Midwest furnish their assessment to CPM.

Pastoral counseling may also be helpful in Mr. Priest's learning and healing through this process, and CPM encourages Mr. Priest to pursue that option.)

Upon examining Liz on her statement of faith, her exegesis and her sermon, a motion was made and seconded to grant her final assessment and give her permission to circulate her PIF. Approved. Liz was dismissed with prayer.
- Group C met with Monique Fube for Annual Consultation (CLP, Rice). A motion was made to continue her in the learning phase of CLP, while urging her to complete her field placement. Seconded Approved. Although she submitted her exam after the due date, a recommendation is made to proceed to grade it. Jenny McDevitt and Judi McMillan agreed to help. Monique was dismissed with prayer.
- Group D met with Cynthia Rouse-Baird for Annual Consultation (CLP, Barbara Jackson). Group D does not recommend any action to be taken by CPM at the moment. They recommend that we not sustain her annual consultation, because her paperwork was late, incomplete and her written responses hard to evaluate. This is a time for discernment for her and the committee. She has yet to decide if she will retake the exam. The committee requests a follow-up assessment with Cynthia in two months. Tom raised concerns about the lack of appropriate care and nurture provided by the committee, lack of clear instructions, and constructive feedback. Cynthia was dismissed with prayer.

#### 10. Business:

- Report from Al Timm:
  - Al reported on the clergy event in February. It was well received, and 8 candidates attended.

- There will be a workshop on stewardship on March 26, at Ypsilanti. Robert Hunter is the presenter.
- Al will offer a course on Polity at ETS in the Fall, depending on what the educators want, either Al or Ed Koster will teach it.
- Sub-committee Reports:
  - o Lay Pastor Preparation Sub-Committee Report (formerly CLP report).
    - The committee will meet in April at 9:30 am, focusing on the issue of the final examination for the CLP candidates. Larry has collected other samples for the committee to compare and consider for the recommendation for the format of the examination.
  - Ordination Exams The exam results are due in about two weeks.
  - Session Relations No new business.
  - o CPM Retreat No new business to be reported.
- Coordinating Cabinet Operations requests us to describe what we would require in an
  associate executive presbyter. Richard Brownlee will attend in March. Betsy will attend in April.
- Liaison Reports:
  - We need a new liaison for David Oh, who is currently working in California.
  - We thank David Abbott for his faithful service, and relieve him of any co-opt responsibilities.
  - There are three other people who would like to be reassigned to a new liaison. We need to assess how assignments are made, rather than default to whoever raises their hand.
  - We need to ensure appropriate liaison oversight. Larry suggests a half-day retreat to regroup for reorientation. Richard recommends that the covenant include clear responsibilities on the candidate's part.

There being no further business, CPM adjourned at 3:50 pm with prayer. The next gathering of CPM is scheduled for April 5, 2011 at 11:00 am at Drayton Plains Community Church, Waterford. Tom Hartley and Beth Downs will be our hosts, and Larry Gage will lead in prayer.

Something that's a lot less measurable, whether it's in theology or in self-confidence, whether it's in recognition of the various pastoral roles or in academic competence, whether it's in emotional difficulties or instabilities and so on. And we have required some of those under our care to have additional experience, supervision, and training, another course or two, another field placement, psychological counseling, and other things. We have required those of our candidates even when they're all done with that checklist.

And it's with pride that I say about the people on this committee, that we do wrestle with these things and we don't take that task lightly. We struggle to both properly guide and nurture those under our care as well as determine whether or not they would serve the church well which we call the Presbyterian Church USA. This task has made me fall in love with our calling all over again because of quality, if we use it, it ensures fairness, considered deliberation, and not knee jerk or emotional reactions while counting votes on one side or another. It's grounded in Scripture. It's open to the Rules of the Holy Spirit and the Body of Christ which is the whole Church.

So today we aren't here as a disciplinary committee. We don't have that function, and we don't have that power. Disciplinary action is not ours to decide. That belongs to other bodies. Sessions for their members and Presbytery for

the members who are ordained ministers. So if we're not here as a disciplinary body, why the heck are we here? Our task is always and not only to determine Fitness for Ministry. Always and only to determine Fitness for Ministry. That's why we're here right now.

Ms. Azar's Letter of Complaint was sent to both the Committee on Ministry and the Committee on Preparation for Ministry. Ms. Azar's complaint alleges misconduct on the part of one of our candidates, and since Mr. Priest is not ordained, COM does not have jurisdiction and that responsibility to investigate this falls to us. We're obligated to investigate a written complaint. We have to. No one sitting here would want to have such a complaint filed against him or her or be the one filing it and not have a fair hearing. The Investigative Subcommittee Report states the following:

"The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to CPM concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister or Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview."

Concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC), disturbing statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC, a perception that Second Mile Center was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included: a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context. Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and Second Mile work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries. His preferred model of urban ministry and

his interpretations of his observations of Second Mile Center.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately

Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan

Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to Second Mile Ministries and Barnabas Youth

Opportunities Center and a later meeting at Second Mile.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and further planning.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at Second Mile Center.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011.

CENTRAL ISSUES

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile

Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he

knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require

Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills

Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard

Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral

development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

this attorney knew prior to this meeting that he was not going to be available, I think the least that attorney could have done was to submit in writing why he could not be here. I think that's the least this committee is owed. Is it possible to get a written statement from your attorney to that effect? Not that I don't trust Mr. Priest relaying the message. I don't think it's good protocol or good form.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: I don't know where that falls within the context of the motion. His attorney should have sent us some correspondence indicating his unavailability.

ELDER BARBARA JACKSON: My question for you, Tom, is do you think that this delay will be helpful to the end result? Seems to me they gave specific recommendations. DOWNS: In response to Henry's comment though, even you and I had a little bit of conversation before the meeting began because he wanted to put in his request for postponement in front of the committee. Then I received a copy from Beth about the agenda on I think January 27th, 28th, not sure what date, and then I sent that to him. And he was traveling and the next day, I think the next day, 28th or 29th, he called me back. He said, oh, no, this is a hearing in the form of a disciplinary proceeding, and because I had sent him an e-mail earlier to ask him is it proper to have a court reporter and all that. He said, yeah, sometimes people want to do that. So he was very open with me, and for my attorney to allow me to come by myself to say, go ahead, no problem, I was comfortable with that. But when he saw the flow of the agenda in terms of a discipline hearing, he said, no, you need representation. And that's why he has the issues raised and I agreed.

As far as what his travel schedule is, I don't know. I didn't ask him to send anything in. I'm sure he'd be happy. He travels all over the country, and he has commitments to clients. He needs more notice than a few days. We only had like a few days notice to respond.

comments just now made reference to the fact that your attorney said, actually I should be present because this is a hearing of a disciplinary nature. And I would wonder from your perspective, because it is obviously your prerogative to have legal counsel, from your perspective what was the necessity for legal counsel based on what the purpose of this hearing was? What did you envision the legal counsel's role to be in requesting presence?

ELDER PRIEST: I trust his judgment, and initially it was, you go ahead to committee. It's, it's asking questions about your Fitness for Ministry and suitability, no problem. Go ahead, be there. You have my blessing. Just remember, hear the findings. Don't get off target. Stay succinct, all of that, the things he reminds me of most of the time. But when the agenda came out, he says, I meant to say he said it's a hearing, now becomes calling a discipline type process, and not to say it is, but when it becomes a hearing and it becomes this stage, a hearing stage, and Mr. Priest advocate and IC using the terms which I'm going to read what he states why, I'm going to read those, that's what his concern was. He didn't say it was a disciplinary hearing, but disguised to read this way, then you have a right to counsel, for me to read his concerns, and then that committee can talk about it.

he had no problem me coming and doing an on target review, but until the agenda came out on the 27th or 28th and I sent it to him and when he got to read it, he said, oh, I may need to be there because now it looks like it's a hearing as opposed to just a meeting with CPM.

REV. DOWNS: I don't want us to get stymied by semantics. Hearing to me sounds disciplinary and in the function of the life of CPM and in your pursuit of ministry, to me, this is somewhat more formal consultation. It's not an annual consultation, but it's a discussion with you about next steps towards ordination. I think the hearing term is a distraction.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: Am I permitted to speak?

REV. DOWNS: No. You can talk to Tom, but not to the committee.

Anyway, I'm going to ask Ed to simply clarify what this means.

REV. KOSTER: The Book of Order is interpreted and written, gives people what we call fair, fundamental fairness rights. In any case where there is an adversarial, some type of event that could affect a person's ministry in the future, outside of judicial process, this is not a judicial case, that person has some rights. One is the right to fair notice, quick notice, and the right to present his or her defense to the allegations and to the matters before, the matters

presented before a fair body, and that is what this hearing is designed to do. That is to say, the allegations are going to be presented by the subcommittee before you as a committee as the bodies of assembly.

There are two other rights that are attached to this. One is the right to have an advocate. An advocate is an advisor, somebody to be with someone. What distinguishes between that and counsel, counsel is somebody who can speak for the person. A person has a right to counsel, period. And to deprive Mr. Priest of the right of a reasonable right to have counsel here would make it detrimental to this motion to fairness, fundamental fairness. He doesn't have to justify having counsel here. The requirement is counsel be Presbyterian, that's required. He does not have to be an attorney either. The reason he has to be Presbyterian, attorneys have been known to misbehave. So we have to have somebody watch over the attorney.

So those are the requirements of fundamental fairness that the Book of Order and various cases and interpretation lay out in a matter which affects a person's ministry.

to know about my attorney being a pastor, very spiritual. And he is concerned about my theological health, my spiritual health, and fitness for being pastor. Believe me, with him, is pretty tough. And he is concerned, he more than me wants me to get moving on this process. He doesn't want to do anything to delay it. He's been through a second career, and he says, Tom, my role is to help you get through this, not to delay it in any way.

So the reason for this is even though it's not a legal stance, the wording of "hearing" and following that process sends an antenna up. Even though these are allegations, it's a report of committee and they are charging me with something, allegations, this happened and this happened and they're very serious. And as a result of these allegations in this report, a judgment can be rendered, either punitive or taking a class or some judgment can be done out of this. So when you look at that, his concern is me. So on top of that, the recommendation of these, if it's accepted, I will suffer something based on something that can be challenged, that some of these things can be challenged. And I think all he is looking out for my best interest, not only legal issues, but as Fitness for Ministry.

REV. DOWNS: Tom?

REV. HARTLEY: I think I want to speak more than the process. In fact at the table, we have legal and counsel

representation, Ed Koster, and the perception of fairness or equitability, it's reasonable on our part to acknowledge his desire safely to have legal representation and advocacy. It's better to proceed deliberately but fairly and delay, though this is already been warned for six months. Reasonable for us to be patient in the process.

Our authority, my view is only ministerial and declarative, not judicial, only Presbytery remains, we recommend. So as far as the need for legal representation, constitutionally and legally, isn't needed at this hearing I believe, but because of the recommendation by the committee at hand, there is an implicit if not explicit requirement or demand to admit responsibility with a tentative requirements. So I think it's reasonable that he recognize that, to even consent to these recommendations admits responsibility. That's where we are in the process. I think it's an unfortunate delay, but I understand.

REV. DOWNS: Any other comments of the committee or questions of the committee?

Issue number one, he knows of no provision in our constitutional documents that would allow a CPM to appoint an investigative committee to look into issues raised in a complaint or to conduct a hearing on its findings and recommendations in the nature of prosecution.

The agenda that has been provided uses words such as "hearing stage," "investigative committee's report," and "recommendation". As Mr. Priest's advocate, no opportunity for Mr. Priest to present testimony from others or right to face accusers or right to examine his accusers.

Issue number two that concerns him is the lack of sufficient notice. Being subjective to the equivalent of a disciplinary hearing, Mr. Priest should have received more notice and Mr. Priest should have afforded the right to have an advocate of his choosing present to represent him.

Issue number three, double jeopardy. The Ruth Azar Complaint is already before the Presbytery by her written complaint. An investigative committee appointed by Calvary Presbyterian Church has conducted numerous hearings and appears close to deciding whether to proceed or not. If CPM convicts in the meantime on the same written statement, will that not render the IC's work a nullity? Or if the IC decides not to press charges, can CPM convict from the same issues? The decision by CPM to go forward will be a violation of both Mr. Priest's substantive and procedural due process rights and

could lead to a one to two year court proceeding to prevent what waiting may cure otherwise.

That's his legal statement and he asked me to read. These are not my words. These are his words.



REV. DOWNS: Again, last month the motion was made to adopt the committee's report and recommendations, and then we postponed any discussion of that at Tom Priest's request so we are reconvening on this day.

referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbot, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to the Committee on Preparation for Ministry concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

Concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC), disturbing

statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC, a perception that Second Mile Center was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included: a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context. Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and Second Mile work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries. His preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of Second Mile Center.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately

Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan

Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to Second Mile Ministries and Barnabas Youth

Opportunities Center and a later meeting at Second Mile.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at Second Mile Center.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011. CENTRAL ISSUES

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did

he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban

Investigative committee is formed by the session of his own church or sponsoring church, and that investigating committee examined and did the same thing as this committee. That committee has declined to file charges. Mr. Priest was charged in the complaint by Mrs. Azar with racial discrimination, reverse racial discrimination, among other charges.

say or do the things with which Ms. Azar has written or charged. Now, this committee has appointed its own investigative committee. I must submit as a student of the Book of Order, CPM, and I am a long-standing member of the CPM in Virginia, CPM's have the right and power and ability and directive to consider the suitability of persons seeking to be ordained. You have that right and you have the right to exercise that and you have the right to look in to matters. There's no question about that. But the issue as we, as I look at it and we look at it up front is what you are doing here is in excess of that right. And you're going to say, oh, no, I'm attacking the process, and you're going to be upset that I'm attacking your process, but I have to point out to you that Ms. Azar's original complaint was a disciplinary complaint. It is filed under D6 of the Book of Order. That is a disciplinary complaint. This committee had the right to look into those issues, but it could not do so as a second investigative committee or second judicial committee.

You will tell me, oh, no, there's plenty of language in what our report is that's been submitted. There's language in it that says we're not doing anything that's disciplinary when this is not a judicial proceeding, that's not within this committee's purview, I agree, and you have said that and remarkably so that is the purview of what's in the investigation.

Do CPM's appoint ad hoc committees? All the time.

Do they ask the seat to look into matters? All the time. Is that within your purview and power? Yes, but there's a line.

And when you style your report as investigative "CPM Subcommittee Convened in the Matter of Complaint by Ruth Azar," the complaint is a disciplinary complaint. Now I would point out to you there's nothing in G14.0400 that authorizes you to act as a judicial commission or as an investigative committee appointed by a body such as a presbytery or a session or a general assembly. Just don't have that power. You may exercise it as you have done here informally, which you have gone about it and we been saying we're objecting to the approach you're taking getting to a result that you have a right to get to. We're objecting to the process, because we believe this is an irregularity under the Book of Order, and I advised Mr. Priest that it is such an irregularity and if carried to finality could form the basis for remedial action. That's my advice. That's not what Mr. Priest is doing.

Mr. Priest comes today to say to you that he's in submission to you. He wants to work with this committee. He seeks this committee's approval and endorsement and movement from candidate to readiness so he can move on with the process. He feels a deep spiritual call to serve as a minister of the word and sacrament in the presbytery church USA. He also says that he's listening to the Holy Spirit to

Also should tell you that he bears malice toward none and that he wishes that the process here today would be fully spelled out and spread out so that you, too, could see what many have seen, these actions either didn't occur or are not violative or are not as conclusions of the committee.

We're going back to the first point, we object to the proceedings in the way in which we're doing with a court reporter; with an agenda that spells out a number of places that this is a hearing; that the report itself has language that we're here to investigate yet takes Mr. Priest to task for any number of things; and, in fact, what has occurred here is a disciplinary hearing without all of the rights, all of the duties that are owed a person facing a disciplinary hearing. For example, Ms. Azar is not here today to be cross-examined. If you look at and hear all of the evidence, these statements were not made to her. He is charged in the complaint which she originally brought with racial discrimination. That is not Tom Priest. That is nothing about him. That's just not where he comes from. Is he an African-American? Sure. He will tell you he sees through the lens of presbyterian elder. He sees through the lens of being presbytery. Yes, he's concerned about issues of justice for African-Americans and for all and he's concerned about those kinds of things, but not inordinately to the point of saying or doing things.

Now, we also take issue not only with the process, and frankly, I have to say that process Mr. Priest is in a very difficult position, because if he challenges the process he may never get ordained. This committee has the power and the right to say whether he should ever be ordained. You can do it in a number of ways and you can say, no, he always has the right to go to presbytery and challenge their decision. But where does that get him if he does that, what is the taste in your mouth, what is the future, how are we working together if we go that route? So a more reasoned route and a route certainly recommended that he's willing to take is we have to be here, we have to participate. We object to it, because we believe it violates his rights and we have to participate and we are participating. We don't waive that, but there's no other way to go with this. We have to go ahead the way it is today.

Now, let me talk to you for a moment about the evidence that is in this case. On February 18, 2009, Mr. Priest went to Second Mile Center as part of a seminary project to look at urban ministries within the presbytery as opposed to the model being taught in the seminary. I don't know whether that model is good, bad, or otherwise. I just know that's the model the professors are teaching and that was a part of his courses to go in some center somewhere against the model. So he went to the two in the presbytery, the two centers in the presbytery, urban ministry centers, one on the 17th, one on the 18th.

He then presented on March 9th, he presented his report to the seminary, and we have all the slides and everything he said is on those slides and documents. I trust the committee had access to it and can see it. On March 12th he presented that again to the seminary, and on the 16th he shared the results in March of '09 with both centers meeting with Mr. Edwards who's here, one of the centers and meeting with Ms. Azar, the other head, and he shared results of his study of his visit there at both centers compared to the model. He believes in the model, rightly or wrong he believes in the model. As the committee reports he prefers that model. I don't see anything wrong with preferring a particular model with having to do urban ministry, but that's certainly a mistake.

But anyway, in March '09 he met with Ms. Azar and other folks from SMC, Second Mile, and Mr. Edwards, and presented his findings. They were all present together. He only ever spoke with Ms. Azar twice. Once was during his visit, once first visit; once during his presentation of his findings on March 16th. March 16, '09, onward he had no contact with Ms. Azar.

Now, hold that over here aside to deal with another factual setting that I'm sure the committee also went in to.

For a long time there was a question of Ms. Azar's and the center's reporting or oversight, reporting to or oversight by presbytery, and one of the issues was, how do we as a presbytery, how to raise benefits and who has oversight. So that needed to be cleaned up. Had nothing to do with Mr. Priest. Started long before he came on board. Mr. Priest was hired by a women's council, I may not be given exact right name, that oversaw Second Mile Center. But the question came up, how to make sure she's under the purview, control, and oversight of the presbytery. That was in the works before Mr. Priest ever went out there.

On March 2, '09, the coordinating cabinet of presbytery approved the Second Mile Center model that is with Ms. Azar at the head and approved it to come in under the oversight of the presbytery. June 23, '09 the presbytery approved the action of the coordinating cabinet of March 2,

'09, and said, yes, we will accept her, accept her as employees or technical employees of the presbytery. Again, this is not something that Mr. Priest was involved in directly. But I must tell you for the full year of 2009, he served as moderator of the presbytery and also a member of the coordinating cabinet. Why is that important? Because in September, October 2009, a lady named Rosy Lattimore submits a letter to stated clerk or to the coordinating cabinet and the stated clerk weighs in on it and deals with the question of, the question of can the presbytery approve a position and make a presbytery position without adhering to the rules of the presbytery procedure of the presbytery regarding open bidding and open advertising and that type of thing. Can we just allow somebody to come in to that position without having to go through the process the presbytery says this is our procedure when we have presbyteries all over.

Coordinating cabinet some time between October 5 and December 5 of '09 looked into the subject. Mr. Priest was on that committee, and they agreed on December 5 to send a letter to Ms. Lattimore that says, in the future we're not going to do this. We're not going to just take somebody in without advertising, promoting the position. But there are extenuating circumstances here, and so we're not going to undue this particular one, that's December 5, 2009.

January 2010 meeting. No action has been taken by anybody to do anything at that point in time except the committee that he's a member of has written back to Ms. Lattimore saying, you're right, it probably was a violation of our procedure but the extenuating circumstances we're going to leave it that way. Once he's no longer moderator in April 2010, he prepares and requests and submits to the presbytery a motion to rescind that action, that action of approval of the appointment and the adoption of Ms. Azar as that position. He was not at that presbytery meeting in 2010.

Another, Ms. Lattimore did offer the motion. There was a lot of exchange in that time frame April 2010 just before the presbytery meeting about six or seven days before. One part of the exchange that went on during that time frame was executive presbytery provided Mrs. Azar with a heads up, this motion is coming and I want you to know about it and stated clerk talked about e-mails talking about here's the way the parliamentary process and procedure we're going to use at that meeting, presbytery meeting.

One of the things this jumps out at that point in time is an e-mail at that point in time, now talking about April 2010, that Ms. Azar said to the presbytery, what can we do to bring charges against Mr. Priest and Ms. Lattimore, because this is just a wreck? And they are told and response, here's where you go to find out how to do a complaint. So a

Any member of the presbytery has a right to make a motion, and there's nothing wrong with making motion. May not agree with it and you could certainly vote them down, but why did nothing go on until after the motion came forward over being deposed in April 2010, thirteen months later.

The presbytery at the April 27 meeting did not deal with that motion directly. The presbytery at that motion, at that meeting heard a motion by another who said, I move that we not hear that motion. I object to it and move we not hear it. So presbytery voted on that issue and that issue prevailed and the motion that Mr. Priest was offered was not heard, read, made, voted on per se.

I will submit to you in July 2010, Mr. Priest and Elder Dorothy Seabrooks and Ms. Lattimore filed a complaint with the Senate about that process, that is how can you deny a motion and rule it out of order before you ever had a motion made? Is that appropriate process, is there an issue here? That has since been dismissed for jurisdiction. Mr. Priest was not at the meeting so he did not have standing.

The other motion of the other two was a day late in being filed, so it was dismissed as not timely, that's all.

In the meantime, the complaint had been filed by Ms. Azar and Mr. Priest's sponsoring church along with investigative committee and began hearing. The presbytery did not form an investigative committee. This committee did and the Book of Order gives you the power to look into things, but not in the form of investigative committee. So we would submit to you that if you look at all of the facts and all of the documents and all of the records, and hear all of the witnesses -- for example, Mr. Edwards is given a statement saying I was there in March 2009 at the meeting with Mr. Priest and Ms. Azar and myself to figure out how the directors of the two urban ministries program of presbytery of Detroit can work together and share information and resources. There's nothing in this statement, nothing in this statement that says Mr. Priest made disparaging remarks, didn't listen, abused his authority or did anything racial or made any racial . statements or acted in any way untoward toward Ms. Azar or the Second Mile. that was his second meeting with her and all the meetings he ever had. And CPM representatives, I felt they already made up their minds before they come and meet with me since they waited so long to find out what happened. CPM representatives assured me they did not form an opinion. Time delay was due to them just getting information April 2010. So I read that particular paragraph to show again the time line that 13 months after the fact, 13 months after the last meeting, there are charges made by Mrs. Azar, charges that are disciplinary in nature which are very damaging to Mr. Priest, charges which accuse him of very serious offenses if true.

This committee says one of the concerns we have is with the use of authority. Nothing that Mr. Priest did in March of '09 was as moderator of the presbytery. In fact, there's no evidence that says he came in and said, I'm the moderator, I want to do this. The evidence is that he was there doing a study and he shared results of that study as a student with his school and with the two centers. Mr. Edwards will share that this is what I heard him say. So what authority is he exercising in '09? He is the moderator of the presbytery. He is on the coordinating cabinet. But while as a moderator, nothing came up at a presbytery meeting that he swayed, oversaw, or did, or any actions taken by him there against Second Mile. In fact, as a member of the coordinating cabinet he was part of the cabinet's discernment and

discussion when they responded to Ms. Lattimore's concern that, yes, we didn't follow procedure but you're correct, but this isn't the case to change it. We will leave it as is.

So that whole year '09 when he's in that position of moderator and member of that committee, where is any evidence that he used his authority against Second Mile Center or Ms. Azar? And we take strong exception to that inclusion, that he abused his authority, which is a very serious charge. But we will say this at this point too, if the conclusion of those listed in trying to discern as this sounds like that to us, certainly apologize and begs forgiveness because that's not who he is or what he was trying to do and that's a misperception of what actually happened on that occasion.

But you cannot point to any place in any record of the presbytery or in the coordinating cabinet, you cannot point to any evidence there that says here, here's when he abused his power, here's where he over-used his authority, here's where he took advantage of that authority. And the motion was made in April 2010 by him to look into the issue, not Ms. Azar, but look into the issue of, can we allow folks to be put in presbytery positions without following our process and procedure, and if not, what should we do about situations for that to occur. He has the right to make that motion as member of the presbytery. Is that an abuse of his authority? He disagreed and goodness knows I go to presbytery

meetings all the time, people disagree. Is that an abuse of authority? I submit that is not.

It says at that time, Mr. Priest did not notify

Second Mile he was taking his findings and interpretations of

findings to presbytery. There's no evidence he took them to

presbytery at the time that he was moderator or member of

coordinating cabinet. Now, did it come up at some later time

to the presbytery when he made the motion? Sure. But is that

wrong to at that point in time raise it in support of his

motion? He says he didn't use that same influence and

authority to provide opportunity to Second Mile and voice and

actions intended to dramatically affect him. He was not

moderator. He was not dysfunction if he filed a motion to

tell them this is the motion per se. The motion is not

directed at them per se, although certainly can be perceived

that way.

I submit to you the conclusion drawn about abuse of authority is, we submit, overreaching.

Now the committee also observed a consistent pattern of prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening. All of us need to be better listeners, and if he's not a good listener I think this committee ought to encourage him to be a better listener and encourage him to take training in being a better listener. Mediation skills, I don't know if he needs that. I'm a mediator. I certainly handle hundreds

and hundreds of mediations in my life time, does that train you to listen? Yes. So does counseling courses I took in seminary, they trained me to listen. So years of practice of law trained me to listen. Lots of places you can go to learn to listen. Not everybody's a good listener. The bible tells you over and over, hear, see. Always enjoy the line, God gave us two ears and one tongue, two eyes and one tongue, so suggests I need to hear twice as much as I talk. I know you want me to shut up now.

I think those are two serious things, abuse of authority and persistent pattern of prejudging. I think if you sat and listened to Mr. Priest, find out who he is. He's a man, middle age, hearing the call of God to serve, to be a minister of the word and sacrament. How easy it would be to say I'm too old, too many other things going on, but he's here and listening to the Holy Spirit. He cares about people. Is he an African-American concerned about issues of justice and fairness? Yes, but all of us are whether we're African-American, otherwise. We as Christians certainly heard the words of our Lord speaking to us and walk humbly before our God and seek justice and love mercy.

Tom Priest I know is that way. I think the gentleman here with us today, say the Tom Priest that they know is that way. Does that mean he's not to speak out on issues where he doesn't think it's right? If a job is going

to be offered in a minority area is it right not to have it advertised so it can be filled by someone who may not have gone through that process? I think that's fair to raise that question. Maybe in this case we wished he hadn't, but is it fair to raise it? I think there's folks here who raised questions about that before.

Now, the suggestion that there's something wrong being fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry, I don't know that that's objectionable, but if being fiercely devoted is a problem, we again beg forgiveness. I don't think that's really what the issue is here.

Seems to me in looking at the charges, concerns as they are called, dealing with authority and consistent patterns and assumptions of knowing more than others know. I think those are admonitions that he needs, fair to say them and tell him he needs to be concerned about those things, but not in the context of a disciplinary proceeding, not in a context where every word is being taken down and preserved for goodness knows what purpose, not in the context of investigating a complaint of this committee that doesn't have the authority to do them, investigating presbytery itself.

Seems to me when we on CPM approach a candidate we're here for two functions. Gatekeeping surely and we have to do that.

But nurturing too, and I commend you because I think your report does seek to provide, nurture, gatekeeping and nurture

and comes to the recommendation. Frankly, we're fine with the recommendation and perhaps would even say let's go with them but not with the conclusions and not with the report and not with the process.

So when we conclude all of this, what we ask you to do is not approve this report as it's written, because it makes a very strong statement about this man that could be damaging for the rest of his, potentially damaging for the rest of his career, but to adopt the recommendations and say we reviewed the report and we mark it as receive. We do not adopt the report but we do believe that the recommendations, we do accept the recommendations. As our moderator has said, Ms. Bohn said at the beginning, often CPM's do require additional steps not particularly spelled out in the Book of Order, but certainly in the purview of determining suitability and nurture. I think it would be appropriate to assure yourselves that, one, this man is ready to go forward at some point in time. I think you ought to do that, but to assign to him fault and to investigate him in this way and determine that he has violated certain steps and proceedings, I would encourage you not to do that.

I appreciate your listening to me and letting me go through this. I can take you through the evidence. I brought copies of all the documents I referred to that if you would like to have them. I got Mr. Priest here. I got Mr. Edwards

things you don't want to do. Am I'm ready to go into ministry? Yes, I'm ready. I felt I been ready since I accepted the call. Is patience once of my virtues? against you of harassment, sexual -- racial insensitivity, and I think some gender inequality, I was going there with that comment? What is then the motivation in your bottom line for what her actions were, the fact that she fabricated these allegations as retribution toward you for the role you saw yourself necessarily having to play in her appointment?

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: My question is whether Tom feels that the complainant fabricated the allegations as retribution towards him?

#### Statement of Complaint

We, the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church of Detroit complain to the Synod of the Covenant against the Presbytery of Detroit concerning an irregularity of an action taken by the Committee on Preparation for Ministry (CPM). In that in a letter dated March 10, 2011 the Committee on Preparation for Ministry did assert that they "adopted the report of the investigating committee". This investigating committee was formed to look into the complaints lodged against Thomas H. Priest Jr. by another member of the Presbytery of Detroit.

Complainants believe that the action was irregular because CPM is not a governing body and therefore cannot form an Investigating Committee. That said Elder, Thomas H. Priest Jr., was not an ordained pastor with a call and therefore falls under the jurisdiction of the Session of the church in which he was a member, that church being Calvary Presbyterian Church.

Complainants have a right to complain because they are a Session of the Presbytery of Detroit, and because they are the only governing body having jurisdiction over this member to convene an investigating committee. The Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church Detroit did convene and empower an investigating committee to duly investigate the complaints of said member. The actions of the CPM were initiated and completed rendering a response of their own with the full implications that did not give credence to that of the investigating committee of Calvary Presbyterian Church of Detroit in essence, rendering our findings null and void. That this very instance undermines the integrity of the disciplinary process established in the Book of Order.

Complainants request that the Synod of the Covenant order the Presbytery of Detroit to order the Committee on Preparation for Ministry to rescind their recommendation to require Elder Priest to attend the Mennonite mediation training, and a Midwest Counseling Service (Columbus, Ohio) assessment of its effects. Complainants also request that all negative references with regard to the actions of the investigating committee be removed from all records, and that Elder Thomas H. Priest Jr. be made whole in all respects. Lastly, the complainants request that the Committee on Preparation for Ministry be required to give an accounting of their actions to the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church of Detroit.

#### COMPLAINT

Thomas H. Priest, Jr., a member of Calvary Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan, and an enrolled Candidate of the Presbytery of Detroit complains to the Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod of the Covenant concerning certain irregularities committed against him by the Presbytery of Detroit, acting by and through its agent, the Committee on the Preparation For Ministry (CPM), in that on March 1, 2011 the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting by and for the Presbytery, conducted a "Hearing" against Thomas Priest on the, "Form 26, Accusation By Individual As Statement of Offense," of Ruth Azar dated April 21, 2010 and submitted under D-10.0102a of the Discipline of the Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) with letter attached. See Exhibit A attached. While the CPM labeled the March 1, 2011 proceeding a Hearing as to the Suitability for Ministry of Thomas Priest, the entire proceeding was instead a Disciplinary Hearing against Thomas H. Priest. On March 18, 2011 CPM mailed notice of its decision to Mr. Priest, saying in essence Mr. Priest had

abused his authority as Moderator of the Presbytery, had exhibited prejudice and bias against others, and had routinely used methods of confrontation and intimidation to get his way. See Exhibit B, the Notification of the CPM's decision, Exhibit C, the Report of the CPM Subcommittee dated January 18, 2011, which was adopted March 1, 2011. At the March 1, 2011 CPM Meeting Mr. Priest (1) objected to the hearing claiming a disciplinary hearing by CPM was ultra vires, (2) cited the lack of fundamental fairness (procedural and substantive due process) in the conduct of the hearing, and (3) objected to the impropriety of the proceeding because it subjected Mr. Priest to double jeopardy, since a separate PJC disciplinary investigation of the complaint of Mrs. Azar had already been held, following which that Investigative Committee declined to initiate Disciplinary proceedings against Mr. Priest. See Exhibit D attached.

The decision of CPM was mailed March 18, 2011, and was received on March 21, 2011 by Mr. Priest. See Exhibit E attached. It is from this decision that Mr. Priest brings this Remedial Complaint, since the actions complained of are final under the delegated authority of the Presbytery to CPM and since the decision of CPM has not and will not be subject to Presbytery approval or disapproval at any subsequent meeting of the Presbytery.

#### The Irregularities

Mr. Priest states the following as Irregularities in the Actions taken by CPM:

1. The CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting as agent for and on behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit, conducted a disciplinary hearing against Mr. Priest on March 1, 2011 in violation of D-10.0100, et seq., of the Book of Order which empowers only permanent judicial commissions to hear and decide disciplinary charges.

- The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit improperly referred the
   Complaint to the CPM or the Presbytery of Detroit for investigation and action in
   contravention of D-10.0103 of the Book of Order.
- 3. The CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting as agent for and on behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit, formed an Investigative Committee to consider the disciplinary charges and present its conclusions at a formal hearing. At the time of the March 1, 2001 Hearing CPM was aware that the same charges had been referred to an Investigative Committee of the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church, which had investigated the charges and declined to initiate formal disciplinary charges against Mr. Priest.
- 4. The Hearing of March 1, 2011 was Irregularly conducted in that Mr. Priest was denied the fundamental fairness guaranteed throughout the Book of Order for such proceedings in that he was not allowed:
  - a. to confront his accuser;
  - b. to call any witnesses;
  - to cross examine the Investigators, the accusers or any of the other witnesses; and
  - to know what the accuser or any witnesses said or see what any witness might have provided to the Investigating Committee; and
- 5. The findings of CPM of March 1, 2011, while said not to be disciplinary in nature, were in fact disciplinary and, as such, were beyond the scope of authority of CPM (ultra vires).

#### FACTUAL BACKGROUND

- 1. During the calendar year 2009 Elder Thomas H. Priest of Calvary

  Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan, served as Moderator of the Presbytery of

  Detroit. During that year Mr. Priest was also a student at Ecumenical Theological

  Seminary in Detroit Michigan, working toward an M. Div. Degree, which he was

  awarded later that year. On June 23, 2009 the Presbytery, after examination, enrolled Mr.

  Priest as a Candidate for the Ministry of Word and Sacrament at its June Presbytery

  Meeting.
- 2. As a part of one of Mr. Priest's classes in 2009 at Seminary, Mr. Priest evaluated two urban ministry centers in Detroit (the Barnabas Mission and Second Mile Center) using Ronald Peters,' *Urban Ministry* and John M. Perkins' *Beyond Charity* as guides. Mr. Priest's conclusions were that the Barnabas Mission was a mission of reconciliation and empowerment, under the *Peters'* guidelines, while the Second Mile Center would only qualify as a charitable mission. Mr. Priest conducted his field evaluation at the Second Mile Center on February 18, 2009. After completing his evaluations, Mr. Priest shared his findings with his Seminary class on March 9, 2009, with the Presbytery's Metropolitan Urban Ministry Team on March 12, 2009, and with members of the two centers involved on March 16, 2009. (A copy of the Power Point Presentation used by Mr. Priest in all three presentations is attached as Exhibit F)
- 3. On March 2, 2009, Mr. Priest, while serving as a member of the Presbytery's Coordinating Cabinet, participated in the Cabinet's consideration and approval of a recommendation that the Presbytery call Ruth Azar as Executive Director of Second Mile Creek. There is nothing in the minutes of that meeting to suggest Mr.

Priest objected in any way to the call. See Exhibit G attached. On June 23, 2009 the Presbytery approved the call of Ms. Azar to the Second Mile Center after a spirited effort to postpone the vote. Mr. Priest Moderated the Presbytery Meeting where the call was ultimately approved and did not participate in the discussions about postponement. See Exhibit H attached.

- 4. At the end of 2009 Mr. Priest ended his term as Moderator of the Presbytery. In October 2009, just before Mr. Priest's term as Moderator ended, the Coordinating Cabinet received a Report from Ed Koster, Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, about the way the Presbytery had handled the call of Ms. Azar to be Executive Director of Second Mile Center. The report was intended as response to the questions raised by some within the Presbytery as to whether the decision of the Presbytery to call Ms. Azar in June 2009 was proper or not. See Exhibit I attached. The solution suggested was to discharge Ms. Azar and go through the call process again. No action was taken on the issue before the end of 2009.
- 5. As an elder commissioner to the Presbytery but no longer Moderator and while still a member of the Coordinating Cabinet, Mr. Priest on April 5, 2010 advised the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of his intent to file a Motion with the Presbytery asking it to rescind its earlier action regarding the called position at Second Mile Center. A copy of the Motion was to be a part of the Presbytery Packet sent to all commissioners and was to be voted on at the April 27, 2010 Presbytery Meeting. A copy is attached as Exhibit J. On April 12, 2010, the Presbytery Executive emailed a copy of Mr. Priest's Motion to Ms. Ruth Azar to give her a "heads up" that the Motion was coming. See Exhibit K attached. Two days later, on April 14, 2010, Ms. Azar and two others responded, asking the Presbytery Executive what "charges" could be brought against Mr. Priest for what

they perceived to be harassment by Mr. Priest. See Exhibit L attached. The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery responded the same day, saying that charges could be brought under the Discipline against Mr. Priest, if Ms. Azar wished and, because Mr. Priest was under the care of Presbytery, a complaint could be made to CPM. See Exhibit M attached.

On April 21, 2010 Ms. Azar submitted a "Form No. 26, Accusation By 6. Individual As Statement of Offense against Mr. Priest, citing D-10.0102a with letter attached as basis for the accusation (together her written statement), thereby invoking the procedure to be used when initiating a Disciplinary Case against a person under the jurisdiction of a governing body. See Exhibit A attached. In the Disciplinary Accusation Ms. Azar claimed Mr. Priest committed the offenses of racism, discrimination, and division against her and others at the Second Mile Center. Interestingly, the accusations related to the one day visit of Mr. Priest on February 18. 2009 to the Second Mile Center. No explanation was given in the Written Statement of Ms. Azar why the accusation had lain dormant for fourteen months. The Disciplinary Accusation was addressed to Rhonda Favors, Clerk of Session of Mr. Priest's home church and to Edward Koster, Stated Clerk of the Presbytery. The Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church immediately appointed an Investigating Committee as required by D-10.0201. Edward Koster, the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery sent the Charge to Presbytery's CPM and advised CPM how it could proceed with its own investigation without having to defer to the Presbyter's Permanent Judicial Commission or the Session of Mr. Priest's home church. Mr. Koster did not refer the Disciplinary Accusation to an Investigating Committee of the Presbytery as required by D-10.0201 of the Book of Order

- On April 27, 2010 Mr. Priest's Motion to Rescind was brought to the floor
  of Presbytery but was not voted upon as to its merits because of procedural rulings. Mr.
  Priest was not in attendance at the meeting.
- 8. Ms. Azar's disciplinary charges were the subject of an extensive investigation by Calvary Presbyterian Church's Investigative Committee, including a hearing where Mr. Priest was allowed to address and refute the charges. On February 10, 2011, the Investigative Committee of Calvary Presbyterian Church issued its Conclusion of Investigation, advising that "no charges would be filed." This information was provided Presbytery's CPM, before it began its hearing on March 1, 2011; however, CPM went ahead with its hearing related to the same Charges.
- 9. On May 4, 2010 CPM established its own Investigative Committee and was guided in its investigation by the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery. CPM asked the Investigating Committee it appointed to investigate the accusations of Ms. Azar. The Investigating Committee recognized that the approach of CPM could be viewed as violative of the powers granted a CPM by the Book of Order, so the Investigating Committee in its Report of January 18, 2011 took pains to label its actions as advisory only, saying its intended purpose was to advise CPM on issues of Mr. Priest's suitability and not to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC (USA) was violated. Unfortunately, the stated intent was subverted by a deliberate use of the discipline of the church in a manner not permitted by the Constitution of the PC (USA). The result was the Committee's Report of January 18, 2011. See Exhibit C attached. At no time during its investigation was Mr. Priest given a copy of Ms. Azar's written statement, nor advised what Ms. Azar had said in her presentations to the Committee, nor given any information about the investigation. Subsequently, Mr. Priest was called to an August 9, 2010

meeting with the Investigating Committee where he was asked to discuss his actions on February 18, 2009 in light of the written statement of Ms. Azar. Both before and after the August 9, 2010 meeting the Investigating Committee met with and obtained testimony from other witnesses, some of whom it has not even named to date. None of the materials collected by the Investigating Committee were made available to Mr. Priest. At the end of its work, the Investigative Committee submitted its report dated January 18, 2011 to CPM with conclusions about Mr. Priest's behavior and with recommendations of what he should do to continue under the care of the Presbytery. Among the conclusions the Investigative Committee stated were Mr. Priest's,

- abuse of his authority as Moderator of the Presbytery;
- deceit in the identification of himself to the Second Mile Center employees;
- misuse of his Presbytery office to influence the actions of the Presbytery against Second Mile Center;
- denial of due process to Second Mile Center in not allowing it be heard regarding his Motion of April 2010;
- 5. bias against the opinions and experiences of others;
- 6. racism in his treatment of other racial-ethnic individuals; and,
- 7. misuse of confrontation and intimidation to achieved his will.

Each of these conclusions has been cited by PJC's across the church as basis for the imposition of discipline upon other minister members of the church. Here, the conclusions were reached without affording Mr. Priest the rights of fundamental fairness. Simply by labeling the proceedings as something other than a disciplinary proceeding. Mr. Priest was called to a Hearing on March 1, 2011 before the whole of CPM, to hear the report and respond to it. CPM advised before the Meeting that it intended on March 1, 2011 to receive the Report of the Investigating Committee of CPM and to act upon it.

Mr. Priest was given a copy of the proposed Agenda for the Meeting before the Hearing. This Agenda was adopted as the Agenda for that Hearing. See Exhibit N attached. He was not given a copy of the Report until just before the original date of the Hearing. In the Agenda adopted, CPM advised Mr. Priest that a court reporter would be present, that Mr. Priest could have an advocate, if he wished, and that there would be a time in the Meeting called the "Hearing Stage." CPM advised at the onset of the Hearing that the Investigative Committee would present its findings and report on the evidence it had collected but could not be subjected to cross examination or direct questioning. CPM also advised that none of the witnesses examined by the Investigative Committee would be present or available for cross examination. The procedure for the day only allowed Mr. Priest to submit his testimony and to argue his defense. CPM advised it intended to vote to adopt the Report but wanted to hear from Mr. Priest before it finally ruled. Inexplicably, the Stated Clerk, who had engineered the way the charges were handled by CPM was allowed to sit in with CPM during its deliberations and to advise CPM as to its actions. Mr. Priest was given time to argue his defense, but it mattered not, because the evidential basis for CPM's action (the evidence behind the Report of January 18, 2011) was unavailable and not disclosed throughout the meeting. On March 11, 2011 Mr. Priest received Notice of the decision of CPM. See Exhibit E attached. Because of this Notice Mr. Priest submits this Complaint to the PJC of the Synod of the Covenant, asking this tribunal to correct the Irregularities listed above through this Remedial Action.

#### **STANDING**

Thomas Priest states this permanent judicial commission has jurisdiction over his Complaint filed under D-6.0202, et seq., of the Book of Order in that

- 1. Complainant has standing to file this Complaint, since he is an elder of Calvary Presbyterian Church (PCUSA), a graduate of Ecumenical Theological Seminary with a Master of Divinity Degree and is enrolled under the care of the Presbytery of Detroit as a Candidate to become a Minister of the Word and Sacrament. Because of his enrollment he qualifies as a member of the Presbytery. In addition, some of the actions complained of and the conclusions reached purportedly occurred when Mr. Priest served as Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit and related to his use or misuse of that office. And finally, he is aggrieved by the actions of the Presbytery, acting by and through its agent, the CPM.
- 2. The Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod has jurisdiction to hear this Complaint since it involves the decisions and final actions of the Presbytery, acting by and through its Committee for the Preparation of Ministry taken against a Candidate under the care of the Presbytery. The actions taken by CPM are final actions of the Presbytery because of the Presbytery's designation of CPM to act on its behalf in certain matters without further review or action by the Presbytery.
- 3. The Complaint is timely in that the Complainant seeks to remedy actions taken March 1, 2011, of which he was not notified until notice was mailed to him on March 10, 2011 and received by him on March 11, 2011.
- 4. The Complaint states a claim upon which relief can be granted in that it cites as irregularities four erroneous actions taken by the Presbytery, acting by and through its CPM, as relates to the decisions reached in the meeting of CPM of March 1, 2011, including the conduct of CPM both

before and during that meeting and one erroneous act taken by the Stated

Clerk of the Presbytery, which was continuing in nature, even to this date.

#### **ARGUMENT**

1. The decision of the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting for and on behalf of the Presbytery, to conduct a disciplinary investigation and hearing against Mr. Priest by (a) appointing an Investigative Committee, (b) authorizing it to investigate the disciplinary charges against Mr. Priest, and (c) holding a judicial hearing involving disciplinary charges against Mr. Priest was erroneous and not permitted under the Book of Order, and, as such, it is an Irregularity committed by the Presbytery.

The Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) D-10.0100, et seq. establishes those steps that are to be taken when a written statement of an alleged offense is submitted to one of the governing bodies of the church. In no instance is the power to investigate the accusations or to hear the charges ever delegated or extended to a Committee for the Preparation for the Ministry. Here, the CPM of the Presbytery usurped the power reserved to the Presbytery by investigating and hearing charges that were disciplinary in nature only and it acted beyond its authority in appointing an investigative committee, directing it to investigate disciplinary charges and holding a disciplinary hearing regarding those charges.

Section D-11.0100, et seq. provides that a disciplinary case can only be heard by a permanent judicial commission.

2. The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit improperly referred the Written Statement of Ms. Azar to the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit for investigation and action in contravention of D-10.0103 of the Book of Order.

The Book of Order requires the Stated Clerk, upon receipt of a written statement claiming a violation of the discipline of the church, to report to the governing body that an offense has been alleged and to turn the accusations over to an Investigative Committee designated by the Presbytery to investigate and determine whether to bring

charges or not. An Investigative Committee can bring charges or announce that it will not bring charges. If charges are brought, they are presented to the Permanent Judicial Commission of the governing body having jurisdiction. In no instance is the CPM of any governing body empowered to appoint an Investigating Committee or conduct a disciplinary hearing against anyone under the jurisdiction of the governing body. Here, the Stated Clerk referred the accusations against Mr. Priest set forth in the written statement of Ms. Azar against him, to CPM and assisted CPM in outlining a course of action that would allow CPM to circumvent the Discipline of the Church and to withhold those due process safeguards of the church called fundamental fairness due Mr. Priest.

3. The CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting as agent for the Presbytery of Detroit, subjected Mr. Priest to double jeopardy when it formed an Investigative Committee to consider the charges and present its conclusions in a formal hearing, knowing that the same charges had been submitted to the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church and were the subject of an investigation there.

CPM was specifically advised that Mr. Priest had been subjected to one investigation on the same charges by Calvary Presbyterian Church and that Calvary's Investigative Committee had declined to bring charges against Mr. Priest. This information was specifically communicated to CPM at the beginning of its March 1, 2011 Hearing, but disregarded when the Stated Clerk advised the Meeting that it was not double jeopardy, since charges had not been the subject of a hearing before the Church's Session sitting as a PJC.

- 4. The Hearing of March 1, 2011 was irregularly conducted (assuming it could be conducted) in that Mr. Priest was denied the fundamental fairness guaranteed throughout the Book of Order for such proceedings in that Mr. Priest was not allowed:
  - a. to confront his accuser or hear her testimony
  - b. to call any witnesses
  - to examine or cross examine the Investigators, the accusers, or any of the other witnesses
  - d. to know what the accuser or any of the witnesses said or to see what any of the witnesses might have provided to the Investigating Committee

The Discipline of the Book of Order (D-1.000) requires that all participants in church discipline are to be accorded procedural safeguards and due process, and it is the intention of the Rules of Discipline to provide them.

Section D-14.0100, et seq., sets forth the rules of evidence to be followed in a proceeding, which rules prohibit each of the denials of rights stated above.

Throughout the Form of Government Section of the Book of Order, due process safeguards are required in the conduct of any investigation, commission proceeding or hearing.

#### RELIEF REQUESTED.

- 1. That the Permanent Judicial Commission rule that it was irregular and impermissible for the Presbytery, acting by and through its Committee for the Preparation for the Ministry, to conduct a disciplinary proceeding against Mr. Priest on March 1, 2011 under D-10.0100, et seq., of the Book of Order, and that the adoption of its Investigative Committee's Report and recommendations presented was in error and should be reversed.
- That the Permanent Judicial Commission rule that the Presbytery, acting
   by and through its Stated Clerk improperly referred the Disciplinary Written Statement of

Ms. Azar to the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit for investigation and action in contravertion of D-10.0100 of the Book of Order.

- 3. That the Permanent Judicial Commission rule that the Presbytery, acting by and through its Committee can not form an Investigative Committee to consider disciplinary charges or hold a hearing on those charges when those charges have already been subjected to investigation and been dismissed by another properly formed Investigative Committee, as such second action would constitute double jeopardy, and, as such, is impermissible under the Book of Order.
- 4. That the Permanent Judicial Commission rule that the Hearing of the Committee for the Preparation for the Ministry, held March 1, 2011, was improperly conducted for reason that Mr. Priest was not afforded fundamental fairness (procedural and substantive due process) required by the Book of Order.
- That the Permanent Judicial Commission declare the proceedings of
   March 1, 2011 are null and void and of no further effect.

#### **CERTIFICATION**

This Complaint is signed by Complainant's attorney, Archibald Wallace, III and by the Complainant. Archibald Wallace, III is a Minister of the Word and Sacrament and a member of the Presbytery of the James. He is also a member of the Virginia and West Virginia Bars. In participating in this proceeding Rev. Wallace is not acting for or on behalf of the Presbytery of the James.

Complainant reserves the right to submit a Brief in Support of this Complaint after the officers of the Synod's Permanent Judicial Commission have made their decision regarding the jurisdictional questions related to this proceeding.

As an ordained elder of the PC (USA) it saddens me to have to request an investigation of Thomas H. Priest, Jr. due to the racist remarks made to me, my staff, and volunteers of The Second Mile Center. This act of racism has caused there to be brokenness not only between Mr. Priest and myself but between larger bodies in the Presbytery.

The comments listed below were made while Mr. Priest between February 2009 and March 2009 during this time Mr. Priest was under care of the Presbytery as an inquirer and also the Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit. I am attaching the letters and emails that provide a written witness to these comments and to the brokenness that followed. After conversation with the National Middle Eastern Presbyterian Caucus I was encouraged to file racism charges against Mr. Priest due his comments and behaviors. As a racial ethnic women, a child of immigrants, I have been on the receiving end of racist comments all of my life as I know that any racial/ethnic persons are; that is why these comments are so troubling to me and why I am moved to bring this action.

Comments that Mr. Priest said to Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, Parn Whitaker Reid, Kari Gorman and me:

- "You get the money from the churches because you are white they will not give it to Stan from Barnabas."
- 2. "How many "Arabs" own the gas stations and party stores in the area?"
- 3. When Lawrence Lorkowski told Tom that I am a minority woman and of Arabic heritage, Tom's response was, "she is too white and the people only see white. Especially she is the head of the center and the power is with a white person it sends the wrong message."
- 4. "A black person needs to be running the center not a different race."
- 5. "A white person cannot teach the children about their culture."
- 6. "Like Jesus he will be persecuted confronting the establishment showing that the Presbytery of Detroit is racist."
- 7. "You are too white to be here." (to Ruth Azar a racial ethnic person)
- 8. Tom demanded I meet with him so he could teach me about Urban Ministry in spite of me being at The Second Mile for almost 3 years. In a few hours he decided that I did not know anything about Urban Ministry because I am a Middle Eastern Woman.
- 9. "White men have all the power."

10. "Your assistant Lawrence is a white male he has the power."

Mr. Priest started making these comments approximately one hour after being at the center, he had come to the center as part of his Urban Ministry Project at The Ecumenical Theological Seminary. Pam, as an African-American, was so upset by his remarks that she left abruptly stating; "I ain't got time for this. He is racist as hell, and I'm not coming back to volunteer, you Presbyterians are a mess." Pam did not return for months. Sandra Addrow, as an African-American, issued a letter to Al Timm, Executive Presbyter informing him of Tom Priest prejudice.

I called Al Timm following Mr. Priest's visit to inform him of the racist remarks in which he told me to call Rev. Marcia Foster Boyd, President of the Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Detroit since Tom came to the center for a class he was taking at the seminary. I called her immediately and she directed me back to Al Timm since she said it was a Presbyterian issue not a seminary issue. I called Al Timm and he explained that I could file a complaint against Mr. Priest. After that, I had a meeting with Mr. Priest, Kari Gorman, Stan Edwards, Lawrence Lorkowski and the racist comments were worse and the idea of reconciliation was crushed by Mr. Priest. I prayed about it for awhile however in conversation with the National Middle Eastern Caucus I was encouraged to file disciplinary action against Mr. Priest.

As a racial ethnic woman I am deeply offended by his remarks and feel oppressed. I also feel that there is no longer an avenue to be reconciled with Mr. Priest outside of this type of action. This behavior should not be ignored and certainly not from a potential pastor.

#### CONVENED IN THE MATTER

#### OF COMPLAINT BY RUTH AZAR

#### AGAINST CANDIDATE THOMAS H. PRIEST, JR.

Date of Report - January 18, 2011

#### Introduction

After prayerful consideration, the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, on May 4, 2010, authorized the formation of a subcommittee to investigate the above referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbott, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to CPM concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

- concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC)
- disturbing statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC
- a perception that SMC was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included:



- a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context
- Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and SMC work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries
- his preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of SMC.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to SMC and Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and a later meeting at SMC.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and further planning.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at SMC.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011.

#### Central Issues

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their

frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of atternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### Recommendations

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

Archibeld Wallace, attorney and advisor to Tom Priest, Mrs. Courter as court reporter, Christine Bohn as member of the Investigative Committee, and Ed Koster, Stated Clerk of Presbytery.

## 3. Motion to Approve Agenda:

The agenda was approved

#### 4. Explanation of Purpose and Process:

Beth Downs reminded the committee that we are reconvening the CPM hearing on the motion to adopt the report and recommendations of the investigative sub-committee regarding the complaint of Ruth Azar, of Second Mile Center, against Tom Priest, candidate. The complaint is included here:

#### Dear Reverends:

As an ordained elder of the PC (USA) it saddens me to have to request an investigation of Thomas H. Priest, Jr. due to the racist remarks made to me, my staff, and volunteers of The Second Mile Center. The intention of this document is to enlighten the Committee on Preparations for Ministry and the Committee on Ministry of the Racist behavior that we have document. I am concerned that this behavior would limit Mr. Priest ability to be an effective leader and pastor in our churches.

The comments listed below were made while Mr. Priest was under care of the Presbytery as an inquirer and also while he was the Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit. I have letters and emails that provide a written witness of these comments that I can provide to you if you would like to review them. After conversation with the National Middle Eastern Presbyterian Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CPM and COM of Mr. Priest's comments and behaviors. As a racial ethnic women I have been on the recoiving end of racial comments all of my life as I know that any racial/ethnic persons are, that is why these comments are so troubling to me and why I am moved to bring this to your attention.

3/17/2011 B A sampling of the comments that Mr. Priest said to Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, Pam Whitaker Reid. Kari Gorman and I:

- "You get the money from the churches because you are white they will not give it to Stan from Barnabas."
- 2. "How many 'Arabs' own the gas stations and party stores in the area?"
- 3. When Lawrence Lorkowski told Tom that I am a minority woman and of Arabic heritage, Tom's response was, "she is too white and the people only see white. Especially she is the head of the center and the power is with a white person it sends the wrong message."
- 4. \*A black person needs to be running the center not a different race.\*
- 5. "A white person cannot teach the children about their culture."
- \*Like Jesus he will be persecuted confronting the establishment showing that the Presbytery of Detroit is racist.\*
- 7. "You are too white to be here." (to Ruth Azar a racial ethnic person)
- 8. Tom demanded I meet with him so he could teach me about Urban Ministry in spite of me being at The Second Mile for almost 3 years. In a few hours he decided that I did not know anything about Urban Ministry because I am a Middle Eastern Woman.
- 9. "White men have all the power."
- 10. "Your assistant Lawrence is a white male he has the power."

Mr. Priest starting making these comments approximately one hour of being at the center, he had come to the center as part of his Urban Ministry Project at The Ecumenical Theological Seminary. Pam was so upset by his remarks that she left abruptly stating, "I ain't got time for this. He is racist as hell, and I'm not coming back to volunteer, you Presbyterlans are a mess." Pam did not return for months. Sandra Addrow, issued a letter to Al Timm, Executive Presbyter informing him of Tom Priest prejudice (copy attached).

I called Al Timm following Mr. Priest visit to inform him of the racist remarks in which he told me to call Rev. Marcia Foster Boyd, President of the Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Detroit since Tom came to the canter for a class he was taking at the seminary. I called her immediately in which she directed me back to Al Timm since she said it was a Presbyterian Issue not a seminary issue. I called Al Timm and he explained that I could file a complaint against Tom. I prayed about it for awhile however in conversation with the National Middle Eastern Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CMP and COM, which Is why I am sending this letter to you now.

As a racial ethnic woman I am deeply offended by his remarks and feel oppressed. This behavior should not be ignored and certainly not from a potential pastor. I pray that you will review Mr. Priest and his call, Mr. Priest as a pastor in a racially mixed community I have concerns about his ability to service a church and not offend or oppress races that are not his own.

The investigative committee included David Abbott, Christine Bohn (COM), Elizabeth Rice, and Henry Johnson. Beth urged fairness and diligence in our task to assess the report, and to determine Tom's fitness for ministry, in accordance with the process outlined in the Book of Order, and the manual for CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit. We do not have function or power to determine disciplinary action, and this is not a legal or disciplinary hearing.

## 5. Hearing Stage

- On February 1, 2011, a motion was made and seconded to adopt the Investigating Committee's
  report and recommendations. Having been postponed and not withdrawn, it was still on the floor.
  The Investigating Committee's report and recommendations were read.
- Mr. Wallace acknowledged CPM's right and responsibility to evaluate suitability for ministry, but
  maintained that the style and tone of the report and process of the investigative committee are
  disciplinary in nature and therefore in excess of that right.
- Mr. Wallace responded to the Issues raised in the report, specifically: that Mr. Priest did not abuse
  his authority as Moderator of the Presbytery; and that Mr. Priest values justice and equity highly and
  never intended prejudice or malice in any interactions he had with Ms. Azar.
- Mr. Wallace submitted that Mr. Priest does not object to the recommendations of the sub-committee, but to the nature of the report, its conclusions, and the process by which this has been handled.
   They requested that the committee approve the recommendations, but not the report.
- Mr. Priest stated that he is committed to his call to ministry, and submits to the authority of this body and the recommendations for growth and training. He suggested that all parties involved should be offered the training as an opportunity to build community. He maintained that any conflict resolution should include all involved.
- Mr. Wallace submitted a narrative from Mr. Stan Edwards, elder, Calvary Presbyterian Church and director of Barnabas Center, about his participation in the meetings with Tom (copy attached).
- . The committee went into executive session. Mr. Koster was asked to remain.

#### 6. Executive Session

 The approved minutes of this session are sealed and on file in the offices of the Presbytery of Detroit.

#### 7. Move to Open Session

- The Committee approved a motion to separate the January 18, 2011 report of the CPM Subcommittee, which was convened in the Matter of Complaint by Ruth Azar against Thomas H. Priest, Jr., from the recommendations

- . The Committee adopted the recommendations of the Subcommittee, as amended.

# CPM SUBCOMMITTEE CONVENED IN THE MATTER OF COMPLAINT BY RUTH AZAR AGAINST CANDIDATE THOMAS H. PRIEST, JR. Date of Report – January 18, 2011

#### Introduction

After preyerful consideration, the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, on May 4, 2010, authorized the formation of a subcommittee to investigate the above referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbott, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Cierk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its Investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to CPM concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.  $\ddot{}$ 

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azer. Key issues included:

- concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC)
- · disturbing statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC
- a perception that SMC was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included:

- a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context
- Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and SMC work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries
- his preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of SMC.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to SMC and Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and a later meeting at SMC.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and further planning.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at SMC.

On December 10, 2010, we met egain for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011.

## Central Issues

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitian Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### Recommendations

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as acking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own conse of pastoral identity and authority.

[This assessment will include asking Mr. Priest to present a report on what he has learned

personally and professionally.

CPM requires Mr. Priest to subsequently undergo professional assessment through Midwest Career Counseling Center. CPM will furnish Midwest with the CPM Sub-Committee report and require that Midwest furnish their assessment to CPM.

Pastoral counseling may also be helpful in Mr. Priest's learning and healing through this process, and CPM encourages Mr. Priest to pursue that option.]

Recently a communication was sent out by the Homosexuality & the Church Task Force to the Churches of the Presbytery. This mailing was carried out fully within the Task Force's authority, and the Cabinet exercises no authority over the content,

However, in the mailing a folder was included which stated "These Churches Welcome All" and then listed on an insert 19 Churches described as "SE Michigan Presbyterian Churches That Welcome Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and All Other People." By clear inference the 19 Churches listed were identified as the only Presbyterian Churches in SE Michigan with such a welcoming attitude and practice.

The Task Force has no basis that the Cabinet is aware of upon which to state that any of our 91 Churches and Fellowships of Detroit Presbytery does not welcome all people, in full accord with the message of the Gospel, the example of Christ, and the polity of the Presbyterian Church, USA.

The Cabinet wishes to make clear that it in no way supports nor is responsible for this communication which inaccurately, unfairly and prejudicially separated the Churches of the Presbytery into "us" and "them" categories.

In what was perhaps an effort to promote inclusiveness, this communication instead is an example of the kind of exclusiveness and judgementalism we are committed to work against.

The Cabinet regrets this action on the part of one of the units of the Presbytery, and commits itself anew to working for the peace, purity and unity of the Church and the creation of a Christian community among us marked by understanding, acceptance and love, one of another.

Operations Ministry Team moved that Coordinating Cabinet and the Presbytery of Detroit (POD) approve the call of Ruth Azar as Executive Director of the Second Mile Center of the Presbyterian Women of the Presbytery of Detroit (PWPD), with the following terms of call:

Effective Salary \$59,500 FICA 4,351 Medical Pension 11,802 Disability 595 Reimbursables 2,000 Workman's Comp 193 Total \$84,987.25

The motion was made to postpone the motion until budget considerations are reviewed. (By consent the Coordinating Cabinet permitted Fran Anderson to address the Coordinating Cabinet.)

<u>Upon motion</u>, the Coordinating Cabinet voted to end debate. The motion to postpone was not approved. The motion was made to end debate on the main motion. The motion was approved. The main motion was approved. (This motion will come to the June meeting of Presbytery for approval.)

Questions raised about further relationships and status of Presbyterian Women were referred to the Presbytery Operations Team.

### From the Presbytery minutes of June 23, 2009

The motion was made by the Coordinating Cabinet, that Presbytery approve the call of Ruth Azar as Executive Director of the Second Mile Center of the Presbyterian Women of the Presbytery of Detroit (PWPD), with the following terms of call:

Effective Salary. \$59,500 FICA 4,351 Medical Pension 11.802 Pension 6,546.25 Disability 595 Reimbursables 2,000 Workman's Comp. 193 Total \$84,987.25

The motion was made to postpone until the next meeting.

[Dinner and worship.]

Presbytery continued the debate on the motion to postpone at 7:32 p.m. <u>Upon motion</u>. Presbytery voted to end debate on the motion to postpone. The motion to postpone was not approved.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery voted to end debate on the main motion. The main motion was approved.

The Coordinating Cabinet reported the following for the information of Presbytery:

Team when it considered the action to approve the call of Ruth Azar to the Second Mile
Contern

Background:

The PWPD approached the trustees with a request to start a mission outreach to the East side of Detroit. PWPD asked for the used of the church on Morang Street that had been used previously but was no longer in use. The trustees agreed with the wish of the Michigan Presbyterian Black Caucus to delay the project while notice was given to other groups within the presbytery to start a mission at the facility.

Since no group came forward to request use of the building, the trustees granted the wishes of the PWPD for use of the building, but asked PWPD to consider setting up a not-for-profit organization so that there would be separation from the POD.

After some discussion, and legal counsel, PWPD told trustees they were opposed to separating their mission from the POD. The trustees were reluctant, but agree to keep the mission under the umbrella of the presbytery, since it is a mission of the PWPD, who are part of the POD.

Meanwhile, during all the elapsed time of about a year, the PWPD had hired an Executive Director and other staff to run the mission.

Then, an employment issue arose, since an employee who was thought to have a green card did not have a green card, and counsel was employed to discuss how to make restitution with the Internal Revenue Service.

Ì



The counselors who advised the POD trustees, looked further into the employment matters, and advised POD that since PWPD is under the umbrella of the POD, such as Howell Conference and Nature Center, the mission is required to follow all presbytery policies and procedures, including employment and protection policies.

When discussing the role of the Executive Director, Ruth Azar, it was noted that her ministry follows the called position, since she manages her own schedule and work, and is expected as a rule to make visits to churches to raise money and run programs.

Operations believes that Ms. Azar needs to fall under the oversight of the Operations Ministry Team, in addition to the Second Mile Center board. That is why they are bringing this motion to endorse the called position of Executive Director. The other staff position falls under the POD middle management category, and does not require a call by presbytery.

#### From the 6/23/09 Presby-Lite

#### Major Actions Taken

Call of Ruth Azar. Presbytery debated and approved the call of Ruth Azar as the director of the Second Mile Center. Special circumstances generated vigorous and lengthy debate. The Second Mile Center is a ministry of Presbyterian Women Presbytery of Detroit, but because of legal technicalities had to be included as a staff member of the Presbytery. This raised the issue of whether the ordinary staff hiring procedures were followed. They were not because at the time of her employment by the Second Mile Center Board there was no thought of this being a called staff position. The requirement that she be on the staff also increased her salary because Presbytery pays retirement and health benefits. These things were vigorously debated for nearly 90 minutes.

There have been some questions raised regarding the decision of the Presbytery at the June meeting to call Ruth Azar as the Executive Director of the Second Mile Center. This memo is intended to address the issues raised by various people. In preparing it, I have spoken to some of the parties and reviewed the minutes of the Trustees, Coordinating Cabinet, Presbytery, and Second Mile Center.

The matter is very complex and cannot be well understood unless placed in a broader context. Specifically, the ministry at the Morang Street address has developed over a period of years, and the history of this development seems to be a part of the current controversies. So I believe it prudent to review the current issues in the context of the history of the Morang Street property.

#### **Origins**

The Morang Street property was built by the Presbytery in 1954 for use by a new church development, later commissioned as St. James Church. St. James merged with another church, Bethany, in 1984 as Grace Presbyterian Church, located in the Morang Street building. In the 1991 Grace closed and merged with Faith Church to form St Clair Shores Heritage. The congregation agreed to give the Morang Street property to the Presbytery for use as an African American NCD, and that if that NCD failed, the property would be sold and the proceeds given to St Clair Shores Heritage.

The Presbytery soon thereafter initiated the New Grace New Church Development, which failed. In 1996, Presbytery created a new NCD, the Martin Luther King, Jr. New Church Development, and called James Ephraim to be the NCD Pastor in April, 1998. The Martin Luther King, Jr. NCD failed in 2002.

The Trustees of the Presbytery reviewed the agreement with the former Grace church in 2001 and found that the Presbytery had been obligated to sell the building after the failure of the

New Grace NCD, but had not. After getting an appraisal of the building of \$500,000, the Trustees negotiated with Heritage to settle the matter for \$200,000...

By the time Presbytery took complete control of the building after the departure of the MLK NCD, the physical condition of the building was such that substantial repairs were necessary. The extent of the problems emerged over time, but included the heating system, water damage, electrical repairs, problems with mold and asbestos. Some \$75,000 had already been spent on repairs, and there was an estimate of an additional \$75,000.

#### The Morang Street Mission

With the demise of the MLK NCD in June, 2002, the Council decided that the Presbytery would continue to use the building in that location for continuing ministry to east Detroit. In August of that year, Council changed the name of the location to the Morang Street Mission and appointed a task force to review it. At its October, 2002 meeting, the Council approved the following resolution:

- From now to at least June 30, 2003, the Presbytery shall maintain a mission presence and program at Morang Street, with the following provisions:
- Financed with funds from DMC grant, rental funds from a Worshipping body to be named; staff now available through the Urban League; \$5,500 from 2003 Budget; a portion of \$10,000 New Initiative in 2003 budget; current and additional support from churches in the Presbytery; grants to be sought from Michigan Black Presbyterian Caucus and other granting sources; with volunteers from across Presbytery; and \$1,800 recently received from the Synod of the Covenant Council on Ethnic Church Affairs:
- The availability of Henry Johnson to coordinate activities; and
- That a new Five to Seven member Mission at Morang Committee be appointed by the Moderator in 2002 to recommend a long range future for the Presbytery's presence at this sight beyond June 30 2003, report to be made to Presbytery by its April, 2003 meeting.

The following was also proposed as a mission statement:

"That the interim mission at Morang Street Site, in addition to the current programs there (DMC, Urban League and the computer tutoring, community aide training, be the continuing efforts to provide after school programming and weekend recreational events, and other activities of this nature that may emerge in this time period."

For the remainder of its time as the Morang Street Mission, the Trustees were in constant attendance, dealing substantially with maintenance, repairs, insurance, operation, staffing, programming costs, and security. The cost of maintaining the site remained very high, and the income was not sufficient to cover it. From June to December, 2002, the cost to the Presbytery

was \$15,000 over income, and the amount for 2003 was estimated to be \$20,000. The actual deficit from January-June was \$9,461.

#### The Gratiot Avenue Mission

At the initiative of the Gratiot Avenue Church, the Trustees recommend Presbytery approve a lease with the Gratiot Avenue Church for the exclusive use of the property for its ministry, effective February 14, 2004. The annual lease fee was \$1, but in return Gratiot Avenue Church agreed to insure and maintain the property. Presbytery would assume the responsibility for the capital repairs, and during the period of the lease, the Presbytery invested substantial sums for capital repairs of the building.

The relationship between the Trustees and Gratiot Avenue deteriorated, however, over the maintenance of the building. Within six months the Trustees concluded that the building was not kept properly cleaned and maintained. The disagreement over the maintenance and use of the building continued to sour, reaching a high point when two Trustees went to the site to clean the rain gutters on the roof, the cause of the water damage, when they could not get the church to do it

By April of 2006, the Trustees were discussing the continued use of the building for ministry. The options available were to continue with Gratiot Avenue, to accept an offer from another church to lease the building, to return it directly to Presbytery control, or to sell it. Part of the consideration during this period were the difficulties Gratiot Avenue was having complying with the requirements of a redevelopment grant provided by Presbytery, the Synod of the Covenant, and the General Assembly. In May the Trustees received a report that the Presbytery's New Church Development/Redevelopment and Mission Support teams decided later to end their support of Gratiot Avenue that summer. These things were reported to the Coordinating Cabinet at its June, 2006 meeting, at which the Coordinating Cabinet directed the Trustees to pursue the possibility of selling the building.

At its June meeting, 2006, the Trustees voted to end the lease with Gratiot Avenue as of September 1. The cancellation of the lease with Gratiot was reported to the June meeting of Presbytery. The decision included the provision to offer the use of the building by Gratiot Avenue for specific activities. (The Trustees heard a report in its July meeting that Gratiot Avenue had been informed of the decision. A formal letter was sent the session of the church on August 3.) The Trustees also heard a report in June that Presbyterian Women were thinking about a use of the building, and the Trustees asked them to make their intentions clear by October 1. The Trustees reported to the Presbytery in August that there were several groups seeking to use the Morang Street Property.

The Trustees received a report at its September 2006 meeting that the Presbyterian Women were very interested in leasing the Morang Street Property. At its October meeting, the Presbyterian Women returned to the Trustees with their ideas about the use of the building and

the mission in the area. The Trustees asked that they return the next month with a proposal that included financial and budget figures.

On November 7, 2006, Ruth Azar and Artheillia Thompson presented the Trustees with a five-year operating budget for the Presbyterian Women of Detroit Mission Center, and provided a description of the programs they intended to conduct from the property. The goals stated for the use of the site were:

- Have a once-a-week mission dinner for the neighborhood in partnership with the Fort Street Open Door program (initially to be held upstairs and moved downstairs later)
- Have a once-a-week senior luncheon and program for the neighborhood (initially to be held upstairs and catered)
- 3. Open a food pantry (dry and canned goods only)
- 4. Have an after school tutoring program
- Make the facility available to the community as a community center (longer term)

The Trustees at that meeting voted to approve a license to the Second Mile Center. At the same meeting the Trustees voted to use the proceeds of the sale of a former bank property on Jefferson to the Jefferson Avenue Business Association for capital repairs to the building. The sale had been completed in the Spring of the year and netted \$108,000.

At its December 12 meeting, the Trustees met with representatives of Gratiot Avenue, the 
Anti-Racism Team, and the Black Caucus to answer charges that the Trustees should not have leased the property to the Presbyterian Women. The reasons given were that Gratiot Avenue had not been involved in the process, there was insufficient notice, and racism. The request was made to delay the lease by six months. The Trustees did not comply with the request.

The Trustees approved the final lease agreement at its January, 2007 meeting.

#### Second Mile Center

The Presbyterian Women voted in December 2006 to create the Second Mile Center and to allocate funds to it. The first Board of the Second Mile Center met in February, 2007, and proceeded to prepare bylaws. They reported to the Trustees in February that they desired to use Presbytery's tax and MESC numbers.

In the succeeding months, the Second Mile Board and the Trustees discussed whether Second Mile/Presbyterian Women would incorporate and file as a 501(c)(3) organization with the IRS. Historically, the Presbyterian women had followed the national structure, whereby they were covered under the umbrella of the Presbytery for its tax-exempt status. This is the same kind of organization reflected in local churches, where the women's associations are treated the same way. At the Presbytery and General Assembly level, however, the arrangement has always been a little strange. While the women have always been significant contributors to the church

and frequently have representation on councils and such, they have never been under the direct control of the governing bodies. They have been considered independent. (Women's associations in a local church are under the authority of the session.) Presbyterian Women of the Presbytery of Detroit have been and are operating under a "doing business as" part of the Presbytery of Detroit, and this arrangement has been satisfactory for a very long time.

In recent years, however, there has been pressure for groups such as Presbyterian Women to incorporate and seek their own tax exemptions. This has been pushed by questions of liability and independence. The national organization of Presbyterian Women has very recently decided to incorporate and seek its own tax-exempt status (501(c)(3)) with the IRS. Here in Detroit, the matter has been discussed at length, for example, with regard to the Howell Center, where the decision has been made that it remain as a ministry owned and operated by the Presbytery of Detroit. (Its Director is also a called staff.) For various reasons cited below, the Presbyterian Women Presbytery of Detroit were urged to incorporate and seek their own tax-exempt status when the Second Mile Center was created.

When the Presbyterian Women of the Presbytery of Detroit signed a lease, hired employees, and began programs, this changed their status significantly in a way never encountered. Under the default arrangement, the payroll, benefits, retirement, taxes, FICA, etc., have been and are paid through the Presbytery's accounts from funds received from Second Mile. As Presbytery employees, application was made with the Board of Pensions for benefits, the denial of which is under appeal. While Second Mile does receive grants from the Presbytery (and other organizations), that is a matter not connected to the staffing relationship.

In March, 2007, the Second Mile Board appointed Ruth Azar as the Acting Director. The Presbyterian Women were urged to post this position and Ms. Azar relates that she thought it had been, and that she was in competition with others for the position, but this there is no record of that having happened. At its June meeting, she was appointed its permanent, full-time director.

The Trustees received at their April, 2007 meeting a request from Second Mile to lease the worship space to Triumphant International Ministries. Because of concerns expressed by the Black Caucus and others about notice, the Trustees declined to approve the lease and directed Second Mile to advertise the availability of the sanctuary to the Presbytery and associated groups, which was reported to the Presbytery at its April meeting. Having received no other request, the Trustees approved the lease at its September meeting.

#### Employment Issues at Second Mile

On January 2, 2008, the Executive Presbyter reported to the Trustees that Second Mile had employed an illegal alien. The Trustees discussed this at great length, expressing grave concern about the liability of the Presbytery, given that the person was on the Presbytery's payroll. The Trustees decided to seek legal counsel for advice on what steps should be taken. There were several outcomes of this incident. One was that the employee was discharged. The

more prolonged effect was to question the relational and liability issues arising because of Presbytery's relationship with Presbyterian Women and Second Mile.

Over a period of time, the Trustees found that the relationship was a very fragile one legally. The Presbytery had folks on the payroll (paid with money received from Second Mile) over which the Presbytery had no control. Presbytery owns the building and has a legal liability for what goes on in the building, the building is carried on the Presbytery's insurance policy, with premiums paid by Second Mile. Presbytery has a liability for the acts of the employees and volunteers. These issues were lifted up by Presbytery's counsel when he reported to the Trustees. In this context, the Trustees once again raised the matter of possible incorporation of the Second Mile Center.

While these matters were under discussion at the Trustee level, the Presbytery Operations Team had been working on a personnel manual. This personnel manual was adopted by the Coordinating Cabinet as a Coordinating Cabinet policy at its October 2008 meeting, and reported to the Presbytery on October 28. This new policy defined different kinds of employees, each type having different types of job descriptions and benefits. The basic classifications are, in compliance with federal law, exempt (salaried), non-exempt (hourly) employees, and independent contractors. Federal law prohibits paying different benefits to people in similar staffing classifications. According to Presbytery policy, some exempt employees are considered called positions and some are not. E.g., the director of the Howell Center is a called, exempt employee; the Presbytery's accounting manager is not. Those in called positions who are ordained as Ministers of the Word and Sacrament are covered under the Board of Pensions system. The Board denies that to non-clergy, so the policy is to equalize this difference by paying allowances to non-clergy called staff.

The Presbytery Operations Team reviewed the matter and reported it to the Coordinating Cabinet at its November, 2008 meeting, along with a motion to call Ms Azar.. The Cabinet postponed the matter until its next meeting, partly in response to opposition from some members of the Second Mile Board and Presbyterian Women. It turned out That when the benefits package was applied to Ms. Azar's salary, it generated a significant increase in the cost to the Second Mile Center. Apparently because of this increase in costs, roughly \$12,000, there seems to have been some vigorous opposition.

In early January, 2009, the Trustees received a memorandum from its counsel on the employment matter. The memorandum reviewed the history of the relationship between the church and Presbyterian Women at the Presbytery and national levels, the requirements for equal treatment in the Book of Order, the bylaws of the Presbytery, the bylaws of Second Mile and Presbyterian Women, and other documents. One of the conclusions of the memorandum is that under our bylaws and personnel policy, Ms. Azar must be treated as a called exempt staff.

After a December meeting with members of the Second Mile Board to reach an agreement on reporting relationships, the Presbytery Operations Team returned to the Coordinating Cabinet at its March meeting with an extensive memorandum explaining why they

were recommending the Presbytery call Ms. Azar. The Coordinating Cabinet approved the motion, but, for meeting planning purposes, directed that it be presented to June meeting of Presbytery.

#### Onestions raised

At its meeting of June 23, 2009, the Presbytery approved the resolution to call Ms. Azar as the Director of Second Mile. During the meeting a series of questions were raised, and many continue to be raised.

In answering these questions, it is very important to understand that when Ms. Azar was elected the Executive Director of Second Mile, Presbyterian Women and Second Mile were not under the authority of the Presbytery, were not required to follow any Presbytery or Book of Order provision, and were fully independent of the Presbytery. Moreover, that designation in the Personnel Guidelines that required Ms Azar to be called did not exist before October, five months after the Second Mile Board finally decided to appoint Ms Azar its Executive Director. Nothing in any Presbytery policy, precedent, or history applied in any way that would have allowed the Presbytery to exert any kind of control over the process of employment of Ms. Azar.

What has generated this difficulty is post-hiring implementation of a policy that required Ms. Azar's position be designated a called position. The only reason that that designation is required is that the Second Mile Center is not incorporated and thus does not have an EIN (employee identification number, required of every employer by the IRS). Because of this, she and other employees are paid through the Presbytery's payroll system. This is exactly the same process used in paying the Director and staff of the Howell center.

The Bylaws require that Presbytery approve new positions. Was this done?

No. The position was created by Presbyterian Women/Second Mile Center independently of the Presbytery. Presbytery had no authority here even if it had been inclined to try.

When presented for approval, should not the job descriptions also be approved?

The bylaws suggest that this should be done. In this case, the job description was generated by the Second Mile Board, which was and is not under the authority of the Presbytery.

Who determines which positions are called?

The Personnel Guidelines. Because Ms. Azar's job description was such that it conformed to the Personnel Guidelines classification as called exempt staff, and since she is on our payroll, we were required by federal law to designate her such and pay her benefits accordingly.

#### Should all positions be posted before they are filled?

Yes. The Presbytery Operations Team suggested this to Presbyterian Women and the Second Mile Board, but they declined to do so. Ms. Azar thought this was posted between March and June, 2008. Since this process was done entirely under the authority of Second Mile Center and Presbyterian Women, it would be appropriate to raise any complaints there.

What is the reporting structure of this position?

Ms. Azar reports to the Presbytery Executive.

Were employees of Second Mile put on the payroll before October, 2009?

Yes, because they were paid using our EIN. But they were not being paid from Presbytery funds.

A question not asked, but pertinent: What can be done at this point?

The only option open to the Presbytery at this point is to require Second Mile Center to discharge Ms Azar, and then follow the procedures suggested. It could then be brought back to the Presbytery for approval. It is not possible to rescind the act of the Presbytery to approve this, because actions of this type cannot be rescinded.

#### Motion to Rescind

Motion: I move to rescind the action that we approved the call of Ruth Azar as Executive Director of the Second Mile Center of the Presbyterian Women of the Presbytery of Detroit (PWPD) with the following terms of call, Effective Salary \$59,500; FICA \$4,351; Medical Pension \$11,802; Pension \$6,546.25; Disability \$595; Reimbursable \$2,000; Workman's Comp. \$193; Total \$84,987.25.

#### Rationale:

The call of Ruth Azar as Executive Director of the Second Mile Center of the Presbyterian Women of the Presbytery of Detroit failed to comply with the following policy and procedures of the Presbytery of Detroit which requires a position design, approval of the design, staffing design and a hiring process detailed by the following:

Bylaws Article VIII - 3.a. Presbytery Operations - It shall recommend position descriptions and staff assignments to the Coordinating Cabinet. In consultation with the Planning and Visioning Team, the Presbytery Operations team.shall bring changes of staff designs to the Coordinating Cabinet for its recommendation to the Presbytery for its approval.

Presbytery Policy P-18 On interviewing candidates for Staff Positions - When candidates are interviewed in person for a Presbytery of Detroit staff position, the candidates interviewed shall include persons of both genders and at least two racial ethnic groups.

Ministry Guidelines and Policies PO 1.1 Staff/ Affirmative Action - All staff search committees make the strongest possible commitment to Affirmative Action in the naming of all executive staff. We understand this to require: (1) Full adherence to the requirements of G-4.0403 (Diversity and Inclusiveness - Full Participation; (2) Full adherence to the requirements of G-9.0104 (Participation and Representation).

Ministry Guidelines and Policies CC -4 Personnel Guidelines - Job Postings - Current job postings for positions at the Presbytery of Detroit will be (1) sent to all churches; (2) published in Newsletter; (3) distributed at Presbytery Meetings; (4) published on the website and (5) posted on a bulletin board in the main hallway at the Presbytery Office.

The Presbytery allows many options to fulfill the mission of Presbyterian Women without being a called position of the Presbytery of Detroit.

No one at that table has spent more than a handful of hours at the center and are making claims and accusations about what the center is doing and how its employee are dealt with.

We also wonder how this motion to resend can be presented, is there new information? Is there something that we are unaware of and should we be aware of? Or are we rechewing the same food that we did in June. I have one more question we have verified that this is not an action of the Black Caucus so how is it that two people can hold a whole Presbytery hostage.

We would like to know what charges we can bring against Mr. Priest and Ms. Lattermore — we believe that this is harassment and we would like to move forward with charges. The charges will come from the Second Mile Center Board. Some of the proof we offer is: Ms. Azar overheard Ms. Lattermore say to you after the CC meeting in march that she did not intend to hurt the camp only second mile. This is not appropriate and is harassment specially after our meeting with Presby Ops when Mr. Grant stated that he has never followed the EEO guidelines in his hiring at the camp and that it would be a hardship and a detriment to the camp to do so — why just second mile? Because it is now a personal target of Mr. Priest and Ms. Lattermore and again that is harassment.

Mr. Koster just to be clear this is a private email between the board of Second mile through its President Kari Gorman, its director Ruth Azar and a member of the board Brenda Jarvis and you and the executive presbyter. It is not intended for any other person and we believe we have the right to ask for personal conversations between the Board and the Presbyteries Stated Clerk.

#### Ms Jarvis

When it comes to advising on process, nothing is private or confidential as far as I am concerned. I do and shall continue to include the leadership of the Presbytery in all such correspondence where they have stake. Later today I shall forward this response this afternoon to Kent Clise, Tom Priest, and to Dianne Bostic-Robinson. I will also inform them in an e-mail to them shortly the advice I have given you and Ms Gorman by telephone today. I do this for the following reasons:

I am the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, and the Presbytery (through its appointed and elected people) has the right to know what procedural advice I give that relates to the Presbytery.

I believe that transparency is one of the critical issues facing the church in general
and the Presbytery of Detroit. I will not contribute to secrecy in any matter that
involves the Presbytery, with very few exceptions. This matter is not one of them.

To answer your questions:

- You are not included on earlier discussions with Mr Priest because you do not have a need to know.
- The meeting on Monday was to prepare the docket for the Presbytery meeting, plus
  other issues. You have no standing to be present at that meeting, and you could not
  have prevented Mr Priest from scheduling his motion even if you did. You were
  informed of the outcome of that meeting as it applied to you.
- The motion to rescind can be presented because it is the right of a member to bring motions to the Presbytery. Whether it is in order under Robert's Rules of Order is for the Moderator to decide if a point of order is raised, and the Presbytery if it is appealed. That Mr. Priest is bringing no new rationale does not prevent him from bringing the resolution: I point to the repeated resolutions regarding marriage and ordination of gays and lesbians as a prime example of this same principle. The Black Caucus has no standing to bring this motion, since it is not an organization of the Presbytery and is not under its authority. If this were to be brought by any committee, team, or the Black Caucus (which has representation on the Coordinating Cabinet), it would need to come through the Coordinating Cabinet.
- Any charges under the Rules of Discipline fall under Chapter X. Any Presbyterian or governing body can bring allegations of violations of the Constitution (including Scripture) against any Presbyterian. These allegations are made to the clerk of the body of which the person is a member: In this case, Birmingham First for Ms Latimore and Detroit Calvary for Mr Priest. In the case of Mr Priest, he is under the authority of the Presbytery as a candidate. A complaint could be made to the Presbytery's agent for candidacy, the Committee on Preparation for Ministry. It has significant authority over all candidates.
- Your arguments about Mr Grant and whether or not they have followed the AA/EEO guidelines is not an argument that would prevent Mr. Priest from bringing the motion.
- To the degree that this involves processes of the Presbytery, it is not private or confidential, and I shall forward this e-mail to the leadership of the Presbytery later this afternoon. No member of Presbytery has the right to ask me to keep confidential any communications that affect the processes and business of the Presbytery.

#### Statement of Complaint

We, the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church of Detroit complain to the Synod of the Covenant against the Presbytery of Detroit concerning an irregularity of an action taken by the Committee on Preparation for Ministry (CPM). In that in a letter dated March 10, 2011 the Committee on Preparation for Ministry did assert that they "adopted the report of the investigating committee". This investigating committee was formed to look into the complaints lodged against Thomas H. Priest Jr. by another member of the Presbytery of Detroit.

Complainants believe that the action was irregular because CPM is not a governing body and therefore cannot form an Investigating Committee. That said Elder, Thomas H. Priest Jr., was not an ordained pastor with a call and therefore falls under the jurisdiction of the Session of the church in which he was a member, that church being Calvary Presbyterian Church.

Complainants have a right to complain because they are a Session of the Presbytery of Detroit, and because they are the only governing body having jurisdiction over this member to convene an investigating committee. The Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church Detroit did convene and empower an investigating committee to duly investigate the complaints of said member. The actions of the CPM were initiated and completed rendering a response of their own with the full implications that did not give credence to that of the investigating committee of Calvary Presbyterian Church of Detroit in essence, rendering our findings null and void. That this very instance undermines the integrity of the disciplinary process established in the Book of Order.

Complainants request that the Synod of the Covenant order the Presbytery of Detroit to order the Committee on Preparation for Ministry to rescind their recommendation to require Elder Priest to attend the Mennonite mediation training, and a Midwest Counseling Service (Columbus, Ohio) assessment of its effects. Complainants also request that all negative references with regard to the actions of the investigating committee be removed from all records, and that Elder Thomas H. Priest Jr. be made whole in all respects. Lastly, the complainants request that the Committee on Preparation for Ministry be required to give an accounting of their actions to the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church of Detroit.

#### Respondent's Answer to Complaint

The Presbytery of Detroit answers the Complaint of the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church, laid out in the following assertions, as follow:

 The Committee on Preparation for Ministry did assert that they "adopted the report of the investigating committee."

2. This investigating committee was formed to look into the complaints lodged against Thomas H. Priest Jr. by another member of this Presbytery.

Further answering, Respondent asserts that the parties in question, Thomas Priest and Ruth Azar, are not members of Presbytery and under its jurisdiction, but are members of individual churches.

3. CPM is not a governing body and therefore cannot form an Investigative Committee.

Respondent admits that Committee on Preparation for Ministry is not a governing body and that it cannot form an Investigating Committee under the Rules of Discipline to determine if a person has violated the Constitution.

Further answering, Respondent declares that the Committee on Preparation for Ministry formed an investigating sub-committee that did not inquire as to whether Mr Priest violated the Constitution, a matter for disciplinary proceedings, but whether his actions reflected on fitness for ministry. Exhibit 1, the Report of the Investigating Subcommittee and Paragraph 6, below.

4. That said Elder, Thomas H. Priest Jr., was not an ordained pastor with a call and therefore falls under the jurisdiction of the Session of the church in which he was a member, that church being Calvary Presbyterian Church.

Further answering, Respondent asserts that Thomas Priest is under the jurisdiction of the Presbytery of Detroit's Committee on Preparation for Ministry for the purposes of preparation for ministry. See Paragraph 5.

5. Complainants have a right to complain because as the only governing body having jurisdiction over this member, this session empowered and convened an investigating committee to duly investigate the complaints of said member.

Deny for the reason that it does not properly describe the relationships.

Further answering, Respondent declares that for the purposes of preparation for ministry, Mr Priest is under the supervision and jurisdiction of the Presbytery of Detroit through its Committee on Preparation for Ministry. G-14.0401; G-14.0411; G-14.0412; G-14.0450. When Mr Priest was received as a candidate, promised to "accept the proper supervision of the presbytery in matters that concern your preparation for this ministry." Exhibit 2.

6. The actions of the CPM were initiated and completed rendering a response of their own with the full implications that did not give credence to that of the investigating committee of Calvary Presbyterian Church in essence, rendering our findings null and void.

Deny for the reason that it misstates the facts and the law.

Further answering, Respondent notes that the report that is the subject of the complaint clearly states:

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to CPM concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

Report of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry Investigating Subcommittee, p. 1. Exhibit 1. (Emphasis added.)

Respondent further states that the jurisdictions of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry and the Session of Calvary Church are distinguishable and concurrent. G-14.0411. An action by the Committee on Preparation for Ministry about fitness for ministry does not conflict with or compromise a concurrent action of the Session of Calvary Church under the Rules of Discipline on the same facts. Moreover, even though the Session of Calvary Church has declined to file charges that Mr Priest violated the Constitution (a disciplinary complaint), that does not preclude the Committee on Preparation for Ministry from finding that the behavior alleged (or any other behavior discovered) is relevant to fitness for ministry.

Re: Issues mentioned in D-6.0305

D-6.0305a. Jurisdiction the governing body has jurisdiction;

Respondent asserts that the Presbytery of Detroit has no jurisdiction to hear a complaint against the Presbytery. D-D-6.0202a.(3) states that a complaint against a presbytery must be filed with the synod.

D-6.0305d. Relief Can Be Granted the complaint states a claim upon which relief can be granted.

Respondents assert that no relief can be granted because the complainant has stated no violation of the Book of Order, as required by *Hope*, et.al. v. Pby of San Francisco, 2006, 217-1, 455.

Furthermore, the Book of Order grants the Committee on Preparation for Ministry the full authority and discretion to decide matters of readiness before recommending Presbytery declare a person ready to receive a call. G-14.0401; G-14.0411; G-14.0412; G-14.0450. Since Committee on Preparation for Ministry has this discretion, its decision cannot be overruled except in cases where there has been an abuse of discretion. Lightner v the Presbytery of Middle Tennessee, 1983; Jackson v. the Presbytery of Susquehanna Valley. 1996; Leslie v. Session, First Church, Manhattan, KS., 2002. Since no abuse of discretion has been alleged, no relief can be granted.

# CPM SUBCOMMITTEE CONVENED IN THE MATTER OF COMPLAINT BY RUTH AZAR

#### AGAINST CANDIDATE THOMAS H. PRIEST, JR.

Date of Report - January 18, 2011

#### Introduction

After prayerful consideration, the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, on May 4, 2010, authorized the formation of a subcommittee to investigate the above referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbott, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to CPM concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

- concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC)
- disturbing statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC
- a perception that SMC was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we Interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included:

- · a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context
- Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and SMC work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries
- his preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of SMC.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to SMC and Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and a later meeting at SMC.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and further planning.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at SMC.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011.

#### Central Issues

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their

frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### Recommendations

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

#### Dear Reverends:

As an ordained elder of the PC (USA) it saddens me to have to request an investigation of Thomas H. Priest, Jr. due to the racist remarks made to me, my staff, and volunteers of The Second Mile Center. The intention of this document is to enlighten the Committee on Preparations for Ministry and the Committee on Ministry of the Racist behavior that we have document. I am concerned that this behavior would limit Mr. Priest ability to be an effective leader and pastor in our churches.

The comments listed below were made while Mr. Priest was under care of the Presbytery as an inquirer and also while he was the Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit. I have letters and emails that provide a written witness of these comments that I can provide to you if you would like to review them. After conversation with the National Middle Eastern Presbyterian Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CPM and COM of Mr. Priest's comments and behaviors. As a racial ethnic women I have been on the receiving end of racist comments all of my life as I know that any racial/ethnic persons are, that is why these comments are so troubling to me and why I am moved to bring this to your attention.

A sampling of the comments that Mr. Priest said to Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, Pam Whitaker Reid, Kari Gorman and I:

- "You get the money from the churches because you are white they will not give it to Stan from Barnabas."
- 2. "How many "Arabs" own the gas stations and party stores in the area?"
- 3. When Lawrence Lorkowski told Tom that I am a minority woman and of Arabic heritage, Tom's response was, "she is too white and the people only see white. Especially she is the head of the center and the power is with a white person it sends the wrong message."
- 4. "A black person needs to be running the center not a different race."
- 5. "A white person cannot teach the children about their culture."
- "Like Jesus he will be persecuted confronting the establishment showing that the Presbytery of Detroit is racist."

- 7. "You are too white to be here." (to Ruth Azar a racial ethnic person)
- 8. Tom demanded I meet with him so he could teach me about Urban Ministry in spite of me being at The Second Mile for almost 3 years. In a few hours he decided that I did not know anything about Urban Ministry because I am a Middle Eastern Woman.
- 9. "White men have all the power."
- 10. "Your assistant Lawrence is a white male he has the power."

Mr. Priest starting making these comments approximately one hour of being at the center, he had come to the center as part of his Urban Ministry Project at The Ecumenical Theological Seminary. Pam was so upset by his remarks that she left abruptly stating, "I ain't got time for this. He is racist as hell, and I'm not coming back to volunteer, you Presbyterians are a mess." Pam did not return for months. Sandra Addrow, issued a letter to Al Timm, Executive Presbyter informing him of Tom Priest prejudice (copy attached). I called Al Timm following Mr. Priest visit to inform him of the racist remarks in which he told me to call Rev. Marcia Foster Boyd, President of the Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Detroit since Tom came to the center for a class he was taking at the seminary. I called her immediately in which she directed me back to Al Timm since she said it was a Presbyterian issue not a seminary issue. I called Al Timm and he explained that I could file a complaint against Tom. I prayed about it for awhile however in conversation with the National Middle Eastern Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CMP and COM, which is why I am sending this letter to you now.

As a racial ethnic woman I am deeply offended by his remarks and feel oppressed. This behavior should not be ignored and certainly not from a potential pastor. I pray that you will review Mr. Priest and his call. Mr. Priest as a pastor in a racially mixed community I have concerns about his ability to service a church and not offend or oppress races that are not his own.

Do you accept the proper supervision of the presbytery in matters that concern your preparation for this ministry?

Do you desire now to be received by this presbytery as a candidate for the ministry of the Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)?

If these questions are answered in the affirmative, a brief charge shall be given, the candidate's name shall be recorded on the presbytery's roll of candidates, and the proceedings shall close with prayer.

This remedial action has come before the Permanent Judicial Commission ("PJC") as a result of the filing of a complaint by the above-named Complainant against the Presbytery of Detroit, Respondent.

#### **HISTORY**

The complaint was filed with the Presbytery office on June 1, 2011. An answer was filed on June 21, 2011. The moderator and clerk of the PJC met by telephone conference call on June 22, 2011, to determine whether all four (4) preliminary questions listed in the Book of Order, D-6.0305, could be answered in the affirmative. The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery was not present on the conference call

#### **DECISION**

Upon review of the pleadings, it was determined that the governing body does not have jurisdiction to hear the case. Complainant is a Session located in the Presbytery of Detroit (Respondent). The Rules of Discipline are unambiguously clear that a remedial complaint initiated by a session against a presbytery can only be filed with the synod. See D-6.0202(a)(3). It is, therefore, the conclusion of the moderator and clerk of the PJC that the governing body/PJC does not have jurisdiction. It is also noted that Complainant has already filed two (2) complaints with the Synod, including one that is nearly identical to the complaint filed in this case.

#### Appendix I

Since at least one (1) of the four preliminary questions must be answered in the negative this case cannot be accepted. The officers of the PJC decline to review the three remaining preliminary questions.

If any party to this case, or any member of the PJC, wish to challenge the findings of the moderator and clerk of the PJC they may do so under the provisions of the Rules of Discipline D-6.0306. Such challenges should be filed with the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, care of the moderator of the PJC.

for the sale price of \$85,000.

- 5. The Trustees have reviewed and approved the 2010 audits for the Presbytery and for the Howell Center for presentation by the Treasurer for adoption by the Presbytery.
- 6. The Trustees have estimated income from endowments in 2012 will be \$525,000, and will inform the Planning and Visioning Team so it can be used for the 2012 budget.

Coordinating Cabinet. Kent Clise reported for the Coordinating Cabinet.

<u>Upon motion</u> of the Coordinating Cabinet, Presbytery voted to:

1. Create an Administrative Commission on Riverside Church with seven members, as follows:

The organizing pastor of the Riverside Church has resigned. In a congregational meeting that may have been irregular, the congregation has voted to dissolve so that it can form itself into a non-denominational congregation. The matter has been reviewed by

members of the NCD Administrative Commission, the Committee on Ministry, and the New Church Development/Redevelopment Team. From the observations of those who have engaged the matter, it is apparent that the session of Riverside Presbyterian Church is unable or unwilling to manage wisely its affairs. G-3.0303e.

Pursuant to G-3.0109 and G-3.0109.b. the Presbytery of Detroit establishes this Administrative Commission on Riverside Church, and charges it with the following duties and powers:

#### **Duties.** The AC shall:

- 1. inquire into all circumstances relating to the decision of the Riverside Church to dissolve as a congregation, and as necessary;
  - a. consult with appropriate committees, teams, staff and members of Presbytery;
  - b. consult with members, ruling elders, the teaching elder involved with the ministry;
- 2. account for all property over which the church has any ownership or claim to ownership;
- 3. review all accounts and financial arrangements and require an accounting of them;
- 4. decide on the disposition of all property, real and personal (tangible and intangible) in ways consistent with the requirements of the Constitution;
- 5. review all obligations and contracts and conclude them;
- 6. report all of its actions to the Presbytery; and
- 7. make a report to Presbytery of findings and recommendations that arise from the events and relationships of this new church development. This report may include a recommendation to continue the congregation in a new location and different leadership.

#### **Powers.** The AC shall have the following powers:

- 1. Pursuant to G-3.0303e, to assume original jurisdiction of the session with all the powers and authorities of elders and the session found in G-2.030, G-3.0101-07, G-3.02, G-4.01, and G-4.02;
- 2. To dispose of all property, whether it be tangible or intangible personal property, or real property;
- 3. To take control over all accounts in any financial institution;
- 4. To assume all powers granted the congregation under state law;
- 5. On behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit:
  - a. to approve the sale, transfer or encumbrance of all property pursuant to G-4.0206;
  - b. to approve the dissolution of the congregation at its request;
  - c. to negotiate with all higher councils regarding finances and grants, and to conclude agreements unless they require the expenditure of Presbytery funds.
  - d. Approve an amendment to the 2011 Social Justice and Peacemaking Team budget to move \$150 from the Greening Work Group to the Domestic Violence Project.
- 2. Approve the grant request for the Hunger Action Enabler.

3. <u>Upon nomination</u> of the Coordinating Cabinet, there being no nominations from the floor, the Presbytery elected following to be members of the Riverside Church Administrative Commission:

Jim Skimins (Chairperson), teaching elder Bernard Ogelsby, ruling elder Don Brownell, ruling elder Ted Taylor, teaching elder Judy Shipman, teaching elder Beth Baergen, ruling elder To be appointed by the Moderator

The Coordinating Cabinet reported the following for the information of the Presbytery:

1. The Coordinating Cabinet reviewed the policy on placing papers on the table at Presbytery meetings. Here is the policy:

#### CC-1.1 Official and Unofficial Tables.

There shall be two tables at presbytery meetings: one for business papers and one for papers of an informational nature. Papers shall be germane to the programs and concerns of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Placing of papers one the tables must be approved by the Stated Clerk, the Executive Presbyter or a presbytery unit. The Stated Clerk shall be informed in advance of all papers, which are to be distributed at a presbytery meeting. Business papers shall ordinarily be available to commissioners at the Presbytery office by noon on the Friday before the meeting of Presbytery.

If you have a paper you would like placed on the unofficial table, please see either the Executive Presbyter or the Stated Clerk.

The above note referred to a paper placed on the table at the June Presbytery meeting. Thomas Priest presented a statement that rebutted what he said were false statements in that paper, and <u>moved</u> that his statement be included in the minutes. <u>The motion was made</u> to amend the motion to include the paper that had been put on the table. In the course of the debate, A <u>point of order</u> was raised that the discussion must be on whether to approve the motion as made.

<u>Upon motion</u> the Presbytery voted to end debate. Presbytery voted 83 yes to 46 no to approve the amendment. The motion as amended was not approved by a vote of 64 yes to 69 no.

- 2. The Coordinating Cabinet heard a report from the Planning and Visioning Team that it is reviewing the vision and values of the Presbytery so that it can create a design for a new associate executive presbyter that meets our needs. They will be making contact with the various committees and teams of Presbytery. The end product will be a new set of bylaws and policies that meet out needs and comply with the nFoG.
- 3. The Spiritual Formation and Faith Development Team has agreed to take the responsibility for planning the annual Martin Luther King, Jr. celebration.
- 4. It was expressed at Coordinating Cabinet that there is some pain related to the passing of Amendment 10-A. The leadership of the Coordinating Cabinet is in the process of planning ways to assist pastors to share and work through the issues in their congregations.

Presbytery recessed for dinner at 6:15.

### **Independent Auditor's Report**

To the Presbytery Board of Trustees The Presbytery of Detroit, Inc.

We have audited the accompanying statements of financial position of The Presbytery of Detroit, Inc. (Consolidated) as of December 31, 2010 and 2009 and the related statements of activities and changes in net assets and cash flows for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Presbytery's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As more fully described in Note 6 to the financial statements, certain capital expenditures were not capitalized or depreciated as assets by The Presbytery of Detroit, Inc. Also, as discussed in Note 1, not all entities under the control of The Presbytery of Detroit are included. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that such assets be capitalized and depreciated, and all entities are included in consolidated reporting. The effect of these departures from generally accepted accounting principles on financial position, results of operations, and cash flows has not been determined.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the unrecorded net book value of capital assets, the depreciation expense and the related entities excluded from the consolidation report as discussed in the preceding paragraph and in Note 1 to the financial statements, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Presbytery of Detroit, Inc. as of December 31, 2010 and 2009 and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The accompanying additional information on page 14 is presented for the purpose of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

#### Note 1 - Nature of Operations and Significant Accounting Policies:

The Presbytery of Detroit. Inc. (the "Presbytery") is one of the presbyteries that comprise the Synod of the Covenant, which is a member of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). These Consolidated financial statements include: the "Presbytery", and "Howell Conference and Nature Center". These Consolidated financial statements exclude the following related entities: "The Second Mile Center", "Riverside Church", and "Presbyterian Women". The effect on the consolidated report as of December 31, 2010 has not been determined.

In addition to starting and sustaining new churches in southeastern Michigan, the Presbytery provides program leadership and resources to help meet the educational needs of the churches and also participates in the operation of outdoor ministries (Howell Conference and Nature Center) in southeastern Michigan for use by church groups, school, businesses, and individuals. Funds are expended to develop and support ministries to meet the needs of people served by the Presbytery.

The Presbytery records transactions based on the nature of the activity as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted.

**Unrestricted Assets** - Unrestricted net assets of the Presbytery consist of general operations and programs. Unrestricted designated funds consist of amounts received or receivable that the Presbytery, Council, or trustees have earmarked for a specific purpose. Unrestricted property and equipment consist of the Presbytery's investment in tangible property.

Gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets initially are reported as restricted support. Absent donor stipulations about how long these long-lived assets must be maintained, the Presbytery reports expirations of donor restrictions when the acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Temporarily Restricted Assets - Temporarily restricted assets of the Presbytery consist of amounts received from donors who have specified the time and purpose for which the funds are to be spent. When a donor restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are released to unrestricted net assets.

Permanently Restricted Assets - Permanently restricted assets of the Presbytery consist of amounts received from donors who have specified that the principal of the donation is to remain intact for investment purposes. Realized and unrealized gains on these assets are also permanently restricted. Annual earnings on these assets are released to unrestricted or temporarily restricted net assets.

#### Significant accounting policies are as follows:

Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses and changes in net assets during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash Equivalents - The Presbytery considers all highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Investment Securities - Marketable securities are recorded at fair market value.

## Note 1 - Nature of Operations and Significant Accounting Policies: (Continued)

Notes Receivable and Payable - The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) makes loans to various churches within The Presbytery of Detroit, Inc.'s jurisdiction, and the Presbytery cosigns for these loans. Included in notes receivable balance from Presbyterian churches is \$3,914,322 and \$2,610,844 at December 31, 2010 and 2009. Of this amount \$3,686,750 for December 31, 2010 and \$2,112,555 for December 31, 2009 is due on Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) loans, and \$35,871 and \$37,178 for December 31, 2010 and 2009 is due on Synod of the Covenant loans. Principal and interest payments on these loans are made directly by the churches to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), and include interest rates from 3 percent to 7 percent due at various maturity dates through 2021. Notes receivable are reviewed periodically throughout the year and assessed for collectibility. An allowance (shown net) is \$105,275 for the year ended December 31, 2010 and \$77,543 as of December 31, 2009.

Other Receivables - This amount represents receivables from participants in the outdoor ministries program and other miscellaneous receivables. The outdoor ministries receivables are stated at their net invoice amounts. An allowance for doubtful accounts is established based on specific assessment of all invoices that remain unpaid following normal payment periods. All amounts deemed to be uncollectible are charged against the allowance for doubtful accounts in the period the determination is made. The Other Receivables also contain annual Mission receivables not received until the subsequent year, and the Committee on Preparation for Ministry (CPM) receivables in which one-half of the receivables are forgiven as a grant providing that an individual who is ordained serves within the PC (USA).

**Property, Building, and Equipment** - Buildings, furniture and fixtures, and equipment are depreciated over their estimated useful lives using the straight-line method. Buildings are depreciated over a 20-year life and furniture and fixtures and equipment are depreciated over lives ranging from 3 to 10 years.

**Investment Fees** - The investment management fee is allocated pro rata between income and principal activity. The fee related to principal is paid by a reduction in trust principal. The fee related to income is allocated pro rata to the beneficiaries of the income.

**Income Tax Status** - The Presbytery is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code and did not conduct any unrelated business activities during the calendar year. Therefore, The Presbytery has no provision for federal income taxes in the accompanying financial statements.

# Note 1 - Nature of Operations and Significant Accounting Policies: (Continued)

Pension Plan - Certain members of the Presbytery's staff are participants in a pension plan that is administered by the Board of Pensions, which is governed by the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The Presbytery's contributions are calculated as a percentage of eligible wages and are funded as accrued. Pension expense was approximately \$14,651 and \$16,684 for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009. While contributions are based on fixed rates, federal laws impose certain contingent liabilities on contributors to multiemployer plans. In the event of withdrawal from the plan and under certain other conditions, a contributor to a multiemployer pension plan may be liable to the plan in accordance with formulas established by law.

Trustee Expenses - These expenses represents non-salaried expenses used to run the day-to-day operation of the Presbytery office.

#### Note 2 - Investment Loan Program

At December 31, 2010 and 2009, the Presbytery has \$516,147 and \$515,334 in a money market fund with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Investment Program. Under this program, loans are made to churches for capital investments or improvements. The investments are available for allocation to reduce interest charged on loans to local churches participating in the program. Under, this program the Presbytery is required to maintain a balance of twenty-five percent (25%) of the outstanding balance in liquid assets. The Presbytery is contingently liable for the full amount of the loan outstanding should an individual church default on its loan and the proceeds from the liquidation of the collateral is insufficient to satisfy the outstanding balance. Periodic assessments are made to determine the exposure to the Presbytery for this contingency.

#### Note 3 - Fair Value Measurement (Continued)

The Presbytery adopted the Fair Value Measurements of its Investments. This accounting standard establishes a fair value hierarchy that measures the difference market participant assumptions developed based on market data obtained from sources independent of the Presbytery (observable inputs) and the reporting Presbytery's own assumptions about market participant assumptions developed based on the best information available in the circumstances (unobservable inputs). The Fair Value measurement also include an adjustment for risk if mark participants would include one in pricing the related asset or liability, even if the adjustment is difficult to determine. Fair Value further reports and discloses its results on one of the three levels:

Level 1 - Quoted market prices in an active markets for the same assets or liabilities.

Level 2 – Observable market based inputs or unobservable inputs that are corroborated by market data.

Level 3 - Unobservable inputs that are not corroborated by market data.

The Presbytery holds investments in corporate stock and bonds, U.S. government obligations, and Money Market Securities. These investments are based upon quoted prices and determined to be Level 1's for the year ended December 31, 2010.

#### Note 4 - Investment in Equity Participation Agreement

The Presbytery had invested \$0 for 2010 and \$13,600 for 2009 in homes acquired by ministers in return for a specified ownership percentage interest in the property. This investment was collateralized by a second mortgage on the property. Upon the sale of the property or the minister's termination of employment with the Presbytery, the minister would pay the Presbytery a sum representing the Presbytery's interest in the property, determined by multiplying the appraised fair market value of the property, less the cost of any capital improvements and closing costs, by the Presbytery's specified ownership interest. These investments were recorded at cost. In September 2010, this investment was determined to have no value and was written off.

As further discussed in Note 6, certain capital expenditures are not recorded as assets by the Presbytery.

#### Note 6 - Depreciation of Assets

During 1989, Accounting Standards "Accounting For Depreciation of Assets" became effective for all not-for-profit organizations. This statement required the Presbytery to record as assets all capital expenditures since inception, and record depreciation charges each year over their estimated useful lives. Prior to 2010 the Presbytery recorded, as assets, all expenditures of a capital nature since 1983 and was recognizing their cost over the estimated useful lives through depreciation charges. In 2010 the Presbytery removed all of their assets from their books, the remaining properties reported reflects the Camp assets only.

#### Note 7 - Leases

The Presbytery rents its office facility from a member church under a thirty-six month lease commencing January 1, 2010 and expiring August 31, 2013, with options of renewal through August 31, 2015. Rent expense, including costs of security, was \$49,530 for 2010 and \$57,136 for 2009. The Presbytery also leases photocopier equipment under an operating lease agreement expiring June, 2015. The lease expense for the year ended December 31, 2010 amounted to \$6,791.

#### Note 8 - Notes Payable Others

As of December 31, 2009, Howell Conference and Nature Center had a note payable to a bank due in 48 monthly installments of \$353, including interest at 6.29% per annum, this note was paid off, February 2010.

#### Note 9 - Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are available for the following purposes:

Presbytery of Detroit – Ranney-Balch Fund are available to provide aid to the aged, poor, and/or for the benefit of Christian work among Italian, Negro, and other underprivileged groups within the boundaries specified in this fund.

Howell Conference and Nature Center – This represents funds contributed by various donors to the Nature Center to help nurture nature creations.

Presbytery of Detroit - Mission Fund represents funds (per capita, shared and directed missions, offerings, etc.) collected from the various church entities on behalf of General Assembly and the Synod. The fund balances as of December 31, 2010 and 2009 reflects excess dollars paid out during this time period than collected. The excess represents a temporary timing difference.

In March 2009, a meeting was held with Tom Priest, Ruth Azar and myself to figure out how the directors of the two urban ministries programs of the Presbytery of Detroit could work together and share information and resources. In August 2010, I was called upon by the representatives of Committee on Ministries asking if I could meet with them to discuss what happened in the meeting with Tom Priest and Ruth Azar in March 2009. During the discussion, the COM representatives informed me that Ruth Azar had filed a racism complaint against Tom Priest.

The COM representatives stated that they were not the assigned investigating committee (through Presbytery of Detroit) but in fact, they were there to help and support Tom Priest since he was under their care. They stated that this meeting was to help them gain clarity of the March 2009 events. As the meeting continued, I shared my views of what occurred and my surprise of a complaint by Ruth because the meeting we had did not display any racial problems.

The COM share with me that Tom and Ruth have had several meetings of which I had not attended. I informed the COM representatives that I felt that they had already made up their minds before they had come to meet with me since they had taken so long to find out what had occurred. The COM representatives ensured me that they had not formed an opinion and that the time delay was due to them just getting the information in April 2010.

Now I see that the end report filed by the COM does not reflect any of my statement per our August 2010 meeting or what I shared with the investigating committee of the Presbytery.

So I am requesting that my information of the meeting held in March 2009 (with Tom Priest, Ruth Azar and myself) be added to the record of the report of COM as it pertains to this investigation stating that no racial remarks were made during the meeting in which I was in attendance.

**RE: Ordination Standards** 

The Session of Westminster Presbyterian Church, Port Huron, Michigan, is deeply disappointed in the recent approval by the Presbytery of Detroit and the General Assembly of the PC(USA) of the changes to the ordination standards.

The original language of the Book of Order regarding ordination stated that those called to office must live either in fidelity within the covenant of marriage between a man and a woman, or chastity in singleness. Persons refusing to repent of any self-acknowledged practice which the confessions call sin shall not be ordained and/or installed as deacons, elders, or ministers of the Word and Sacrament. Amendment 10-A changes the standards for ordained service to "submit joyfully to the Lordship of Jesus Christ in all aspects of life."

Amendment 10-A allows for compromising biblical teaching regarding sexual relationships. We cannot see how one can submit to the Lordship of Jesus Christ and set aside such basic teaching in His Word, (Titus 1:5-9, Romans 1:26-27). The change now allows the ordination of persons in homosexual, lesbian, and transgendered relationships as well as adulterers as ministers, elders, and deacons. We believe that this transgresses basic Christian and biblical ethical values and standards that churches from the beginning were exhorted to follow. We are sinners, but when we repent of our sin we are taught to give up that sin. As I Corinthians 5:9-11 reads, "I have written you in my letter not to associate with sexually immoral people—not at all meaning the people of this world who are immoral, or the greedy and swindlers, or idolaters. In that case you would have to leave this world. But now I am writing you that you must not associate with anyone who calls himself a brother but is sexually immoral or greedy, an idolater or a slanderer, a drunkard or a swindler. With such a man do not even eat."

We are a loving community of believers and would pray for and work with a member of our congregation who might fall into these life styles. We are to love the sinner but to hate the sin. But, we would surely not want someone who lives an unrepentant sinful lifestyle in a position of leadership within the church.

We will not be able to abide by the degree of sexual lifestyle openness that Amendment 10-A seems to allow for in our ministry at Westminster. We are concerned that with these changes, we may be prevented from asking prospective pastors, moderators or pulpit supply, elders or deacons about their sexual lifestyle.

Thank you for your letter of June 20, 2011, in which you lay out the objections and concerns you at Westminster have regarding the passage of Amendment 10-A. I will pass on this letter to the leadership of Presbytery and report it to the Presbytery in August.

You express concern that you may be prevented from asking prospective pastors, moderators or pulpit supply, elders or deacons about their sexual lifestyle. The answer is simply no. You will not be prevented from doing that. When it comes to examining elders and deacons for ordination or installation, which is where all the "law" is, there is a rule: If a member of session has reason to believe that a person's sexual lifestyle is not in accord with expected standards, the session has a duty to inquire, but a session may not ask such a question unless it has cause to believe it may be an issue. A session can refuse to ordain or install a person elected by the congregation; in such a case, it would inform the nominating committee to get a new nominee.

Session is not required to accept any pastor or pulpit supply, and can inquire. As to moderators, who are appointed by Presbytery in the absence of an installed pastor, I believe it appropriate to object to the Committee on Ministry if it has appointed a moderator whose lifestyle you find unacceptable.

I do understand your distress. But I believe you will find that even with all the changes that are in process, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and the Presbytery of Detroit will remain substantially what you have been a member of for so long.

The Session of Drayton Avenue Presbyterian Church would like to petition the Coordinating Cabinet to reconsider the start-up time for Presbytery meetings. When the time was changed to 4:00 three years ago, we authorized elder Mark Schneider to write a letter expressing our concern. That concern has not changed, and it fundamentally boils down to this: a 4:00 start-up time makes it difficult for working elders to be able to serve as commissioners to Presbytery. They either have to get permission to leave work early or take a half-day off to make the meeting on time. On our present Session, this would affect five out of our nine elders. It seems apparent to us that the current arrangement significantly discourages the participation of working elders in the work of our Presbytery.

Following our initial letter of complaint, we were told that the Coordinating Cabinet would try to arrange the agenda so that business that is controversial or otherwise "important" would be conducted later in the meeting, in order to accommodate elders who could not make it by 4:00. However, that has clearly not been the case. For example, the recent vote on Amendment 10-A took place well before dinner. Indeed, there have been several meetings in recent years when we have completed most, if not all, of our business before dinner, and the only reason we reconvened after dinner was for worship. Moreover, we believe that breaking for dinner makes for a disjointed feel to the meeting and at times contributes towards a delay in reconvening the body. If the primary reason for starting earlier is ending earlier, then let the record show that we as a Presbytery are quite capable of conducting the bulk of our business in two to three hours.

We cannot imagine that we are the only Session in our Presbytery negatively impacted by this 4:00 start-up time. And frankly we find it frustrating when younger elders who have been elected to office and are eager to get involved in the governance of the church find the Presbytery discouraging their involvement by the time they schedule their stated meetings, not to mention the majority of their committee meetings. We, therefore, respectfully request the Coordinating Cabinet to reconsider this matter and move the start-up time for Presbytery meetings back to 5:30, with dinner at 4:30.

# ANSWER OF THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

The Committee of Counsel of The Presbytery of Detroit submits the following answer to the complaint of the irregularity alleged in the complaint of the Session of Cavalry Presbyterian Church, as follows:

1. Allegation: We, the Session of Cavalry Presbyterian Church of Detroit complain to the Synod of the Covenant against the Presbytery of Detroit concerning an irregularity of an action taken by the Committee on Preparation for Ministry (CPM).

Response: Respondent denies that an irregularity occurred in the discharge of duty within the work of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry ("COPM") of the Presbytery of Detroit for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated.

2. Allegation: In that in a letter dated March 10, 2011 the Committee on Preparation for Ministry did assert that they "adopted the report of the investigating committee".

Response: Respondent admits that the COPM formed a sub-committee to investigate allegation against a candidate for ministry under the care of COPM pursuant to COPM's duty to determine if the candidate was fit for ministry, and that COPM adopted a report of that sub-committee. Respondent denies for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated that the sub-committee was an investigating committee pursuant to the Rules of Discipline.

3. Allegation: This investigating committee was formed to look into the complaints lodged against Thomas H. Priest Jr. by another member of the Presbytery of Detroit.

Response: Respondent admits that certain allegations against Elder Priest were brought to the attention of the COPM by another member of the Presbytery. Respondent admits that the COPM formed a sub-committee to investigate those allegations pursuant to COPM's duty to determine if the Elder Priest was fit for ministry. Respondent denies for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated that COPM initiated an investigating process pursuant to the Rules of Discipline to investigate those allegations.

4. Allegation: Complainants believe that the action was irregular because CPM is not a governing body and therefore cannot form an Investigating Committee.

Response: Respondent admits that COPM is not a governing body. Respondent admits that a COPM may not organize an investigating committee pursuant to the Rules of Discipline (see D-10.0201; G-14.0411). Respondent denies for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated that COPM's sub-committee was an investigating committee pursuant to the Rules of Discipline.

5. Allegation: That said Elder, Thomas H. Priest Jr., was not an ordained pastor with a call and therefore falls under the jurisdiction of Session of the church in which he was a member, that church being Calvary Presbyterian Church.

Response: Respondent admits that Elder, Thomas H. Priest Jr., was (and is) not an ordained pastor with a call. Respondent admits that Elder, Thomas H. Priest Jr., falls under the jurisdiction of Complainant for purposes of disciplinary action in accordance with the Rules of Discipline. See G-14.0411. Respondent denies for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, any suggestion that COPM does not have jurisdiction over Elder, Thomas H. Priest Jr., a candidate for ministry under COPM's care, to provide guidance, care and oversight to Mr. Priest concerning his fitness for ministry. See id.

6. Allegation: Complainants have a right to complain because they are a Session of the Presbytery of Detroit, and because they are the only governing body having jurisdiction over this member to convene an investigating committee.

Response: Respondent admits that Complainant is the only governing body having jurisdiction over Mr. Priest to convene an investigating committee pursuant to the Rules of Discipline to investigate an offense, for which the minimum prescribed penalty rebuke. Respondent denies for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, any suggestion that COPM does not have jurisdiction over Elder, Thomas H. Priest Jr., a candidate for ministry under COPM's care, to provide guidance, care

and oversight to Mr. Priest concerning his fitness for ministry. See G-14.0411.

7. Allegation: The Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church Detroit did convene and empower an investigating committee to duly investigate the complaints of said member.

Response: Respondent does not have personal knowledge of the facts of this allegation and so denies the allegation and leaves Complainants to its proofs.

8. Allegation: The actions of the CPM were initiated and completely rendering a response to their own with the full implication that did not give credence to that of the investigating committee of Calvary Presbyterian Church in essence, rendering our finding null and void.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated. That Complainant exercised its rights to undertake a disciplinary investigation of Elder, Thomas H. Priest is a wholly separate matter from COPM's own Constitutional right to discern whether Mr. Priest is fit to be a Minister of Word and Sacrament.

9. Allegation: That this very instance undermines the integrity of the disciplinary process established in the Book of Order.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated. Respondent, for example, refers to G-14.0411, which states that during the phases of inquiry and candidacy, the individual continues to be an active member of his or her particular church and subject to the concern and discipline of the session. However, in matters relating to preparation for ministry, the individual is under the oversight of the presbytery through the committee on preparation for ministry.

10. Allegation: Complainant request that the Synod of the Covenant order the Presbytery of Detroit to order the Committee on Preparation for Ministry to rescind their recommendation to require Elder Priest to attend the Mennonite mediation training, and a Midwest Counseling Service (Columbus, Ohio) assessment of its effects.

Respondent requests that Complainant's request be denied.

11. Allegation: Complainants also request that all negative references with regard to the actions of the investigating committee be removed form all records, and that Elder Thomas H. Priest Jr. be made whole in all respects.

Respondent requests that Complainant's request be denied. Respondent further requests that Complainant be order to specifically identify all such "negative references".

12. Allegation: Complainants also request that all negative references with regard to the actions of the investigating committee be removed form all records, and that Elder Thomas H. Priest Jr. be made whole in all respects.

Respondent requests that Complainant's request be denied.

# OTHER FACTS THAT MAY EXPLAIN THE SITUATION IDENTIFIED AS AN IRREGULARITY OR DELINQUENCY - D-6.0303

- 1. Mr. Thomas M. Priest is a candidate under the care of Respondent. See Exhibit A January 18, 2011 Report of COPM Sub-Committee at pg. 1.
  - 2. Mr. Priest is also a former moderator of Respondent, Id at 2.
- 3. In 2010, a member of one of the churches of Presbytery wrote to Respondent's Committee on Ministry ("COM") and COPM complaining about remarks made by Mr. Priest when he visited a mission center of Respondent's known as the Second Mile Center. See Exhibit B Letter from Ruth Azar dated April 20, 2010.
- 4. Mr. Priest was then visiting the center in his capacity of a seminary student writing a paper. See Exhibit A.
  - 5. The accuser's letter alleged that Mr. Priest's remarks were racist. See Exhibit B.
- 6. Respondent's Stated Clerk informed the COM that COM had no jurisdiction over Mr. Priest, but that COPM would have jurisdiction over him in since he is a candidate for ministry. See also G-14.0411.
- 7. Respondent's Stated Clerk further informed the accuser who wrote the letter that the letter could not be considered a complaint under the Rules of Discipline, since such a complaint would need to be filed with the Complainant. See G-14.0411.
- 8. The letter was subsequently filed, and Complainant formed an investigating committee in accordance with the Rules of Discipline. See Complaint.
- 9. Complainant's investigating committee declined to bring charges against Mr. Priest. Id.
- 10. While the investigating committee of Complainant declined to file charges, Respondent's COPM had a separate duty pursuant to G-14.0412, including a duty to provide guidance and instruction to Mr. Priest in light of the allegations in the letter and determine his fitness for ministry. See Exhibit A.
- 11. The COPM formed a sub-committee, which it labeled an investigating committee. Id.
- 12. The sub-committee of COPM conducted interviews and wrote a report with recommendations to the COPM. Id.

- 13. Mr. Priest objected to the recommendations in the report, which would have required him to pursue training and further consultation. See Exhibit C Minutes of COPM dated March 1, 2011.
- 14.A COPM hearing on the report was scheduled for the February 2011 meeting of COPM, but was postponed to the March 2011 meeting at Mr. Priest's request; his counsel was not able to come to the February meeting. See Exhibits D and E hearing transcripts.
- 15. The COPM hearing on the report was conducted at the March 2011 meeting of COPM, where Mr. Priest was represented by attorney/minister Archibald Wallace III of Richmond, Va. See Exhibit E.
- 16. Following the public portion of the hearing, the COPM adjourned to executive session, where the COPM voted to adopt the report and an augmented set of recommendations. See Exhibits C and E.
- 17. Complainant has now filed the remedial suit against Respondent the focus of which is that the COPM did not have the right to form a sub-committee to evaluate a candidate under its care.

# ARGUMENTS RELATED TO D-6.0306 - EXAMINATION OF PAPERS

# a. Does the governing body has jurisdiction;

Respondent's comment: No

A remedial case is one in which an irregularity or a delinquency of a lower governing body ... may be corrected by a higher governing body. D-2.0202 (emphasis added). The complaint here did not allege any action by a lower governing body. The only action alleged was that of the COPM, which is not a governing body. Therefore, Respondent respectfully submits that this Commission does not have jurisdiction to hear the complaint.

There is absolutely no dispute that Respondent's COPM is not a governing body. See Allegation no. 4, *supra*. There is also no dispute that the complaint focused exclusively on actions taken by the COPM. This limited factual scope in the complaint is wholly attributable to that fact that Complainant never took its concerns regarding the COPM to the floor of the presbytery. As a result, Respondent has never had occasion to address or otherwise act on Complainant's concerns.

If Complainant had a problem with the COPM, and the procedure the COPM used to investigate Mr. Priest's fitness for ministry, then Complainant had a clear avenue of appeal to the floor of presbytery. Indeed, Complainant through its commissioner could have requested from Respondent (by way of a motion from the floor) the very remedies Complainant now demands from this Commission. Stated directly, Complainant could have made a motion on the floor of Presbytery that COPM

be instructed to meet with Complainant, remove any negative references, etc. Had Complainant taken even this basic step, and had Respondent then failed (in Complainant's mind) to act appropriately, Complainant would then be able to point to at least SOME action by a lower governing body with which to vest this Commission with jurisdiction. But that is not what happened here. What happened (and is happening) here is that Complainant is attempting to use this Commission and the judicial process to circumvent standard parliamentary procedure, Respondent's wide discretion in considering the worthiness of candidates for ministry, and the Constitution. Complainant's efforts should not be rewarded.

In addition, if at any time the Commission concludes that Respondent did not form a disciplinary committee in accordance with the Rules of Discipline then this case should be dismissed for lack of jurisdiction. The inappropriate formation of a disciplinary committee in violation of the Book of Order is the only Constitutional violation alleged in the complaint. Absent that allegation, all that remains is a question of policy. However, under prevailing caselaw, the Commission only has jurisdiction to hear violations of the Constitution, not violations of policy. See e.g., See 2004, 217-1 Hope v. Pby of San Francisco.

# b. the complainant has standing to file the case;

Respondent's comment: None.

# c. the complaint was timely filed; and

Respondent's comment: No.

The complaint was seven (7) days late. Complainant cannot rely on the March 10<sup>th</sup> date of the COPM's letter, the mailing date of that letter, or even the receipt date of that letter to determine whether its filing was timely. The only relevant date was March 1<sup>st</sup>, the date the COPM made its decision. And the complaint here was filed more than ninety days after that date.

D-6.0202 makes clear that "...a complaint of an Irregularity shall be filed within ninety days after the alleged irregularity has occurred..." The phrase "after the irregularity has occurred" being the relevant point. This language makes clear that the clock starts to run on the date of the alleged irregular action, and not on the date an allegedly aggrieved party received notice. Where things otherwise, the deadline for filing would be never ending because a complaining party could secure more time merely by claiming that he or she was unaware of the irregular action. The purpose of the filing deadlines in our Constitution "is to prevent controversies with the church from going on and on..." 1994, PJC 206-7, Bayley v. Pby of Minn. Valleys. A notice requirement would undermine this purpose.

The Stated Clerk of this Synod has confirmed that the complaint here was received by his office on June 6, 2011. Even giving Complainant the benefit of a March

2<sup>nd</sup> start date (omitting March 1<sup>st</sup>), the complaint was seven (7) days late. Indeed, the last day the complaint could have been filed by Respondent's count was May 31, 2011 (the actual 90<sup>th</sup> day having been Memorial Day).

The case of 2005, PJC 218-7, <u>Jackson v. Session of Cordova Presbyterian Church</u> is instructive. In <u>Jackson</u>, an investigating committee drafted and mailed out a decision memorandum. The memorandum was undated, which prevented the GAPJC from knowing the actual date of the committee's decision. So, the GAPJC inferred a decision date by concluding that the decision could have been no later than the day the memorandum was postmarked. The point is, in <u>Jackson</u> the GAPJC could have relied on the date Jackson received the decision. But it didn't. In fact, that date was not even mentioned. Instead, the GAPJC inferred a *decision* date based on the available evidence and it then counted out the relevant time period. Jackson's complaint was then found to have been untimely.

Two points distinguish this case from <u>Jackson</u>. Neither point favors Complainant. The first point is that, unlike the undated memorandum in <u>Jackson</u>, the March 10<sup>th</sup> letter relied on by Complainant clearly referenced the COPM's March 1<sup>st</sup> decision. Complainant, therefore, cannot claim that it was not aware of the decision date. The second point is that Complainant actually filed a complaint (see case 2011-1) within the 90-day period. That complaint is untimely for other reasons, but it still stands as indisputable evidence that Complainant could have filed timely filed the complaint in this case

The complaint in this case is clearly untimely and it should be not accepted/dismissed on that basis.

# d. the complaint states a claim upon which relief can be granted.

Respondent answers: No.

The complaint confuses the separate duties and obligations of Complainant and Respondent's COPM concerning the oversight of a candidate – Mr. Priest. Paragraph G-14.0411 of our Constitution granted Complainant original jurisdiction to investigate the *disciplinary* complaint against Mr. Priest. However, that same paragraph also granted Respondent's COPM original jurisdiction to *administratively* determine Mr. Priest's fitness for ministry. It is well established that a COPM may appoint a task force to investigate allegations made against a candidate. See 2004, 217-1 Hope v. Pby of San Francisco. The Hope decision is particularly relevant because there, as here, the COPM "... appointed a task force to investigate concerns about the candidate's ability to resolve conflicts..." See also Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 10th ed. 480 (Cambridge, Mass.: Perseus Publishing, 2000)("A committee can appoint a subcommittee, which are responsible to and report to the committee and not to the assembly.")

Respondent's COPM did not need to resort to the Rules of Discipline to investigate and exercise oversight of Mr. Priest when considering his fitness for ministry,

because our Constitution and numerous GAPJC decisions make clear that the COPM inherently has that authority. See e.g. 1997, 210-2 <u>Bevensee v. Pby of New Brunswick</u> (upholding Presbytery removal of inquirer from roles for not complying with counseling requirement mandated by CPM). Therefore, even if the allegations in the complaint are taken as true, the complaint failed to state a claim. Respondent's COPM did investigate Mr. Priest, but that investigation was not a disciplinary investigation. Rather, the COPM's conducted an *administrative* investigation of Mr. Priest in accordance with the COPM's constitutionally mandated duty to provide oversight of candidates under its care. See G-14.0412. Moreover, during that investigation and subsequent hearing, Mr. Priest was treated with fundamental fairness. He was supplied with copies of relevant documents. He was afforded the opportunity to speak on his behalf. And, he was granted a right to counsel.

Respondents assert that no relief can be granted because the complainant has stated no violation of the Book of Order, as required by *Hope*, et.al. v. Pby of San Francisco, 2006, 217-1, 455.

Furthermore, the Book of Order grants the COPM the full authority and discretion to decide matters of readiness before recommending Presbytery declare a person ready to receive a call. G-14.0401; G-14.0411; G-14.0412; G-14.0450. Since the COPM has this discretion, its decision cannot be overruled except in cases where there has been an abuse of discretion. Lightner v the Presbytery of Middle Tennessee, 1983; Jackson v. the Presbytery of Susquehanna Valley. 1996; Leslie v. Session, First Church, Manhattan, KS., 2002. Since no abuse of discretion has been alleged, no relief can be granted.

# **FURTHER CONSIDERATIONS**

Respondent reserves the right to file a motion to dismiss in the event the Commission decides to accept the case notwithstanding the arguments set forth above.

# Introduction

After prayerful consideration, the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, on May 4, 2010, authorized the formation of a subcommittee to investigate the above referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbott, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to CPM concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

- concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC)
- · disturbing statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC
- a perception that SMC was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included:

- · a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context
- Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and SMC work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries
- his preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of SMC.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to SMC and Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and a later meeting at SMC.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and further planning.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at SMC.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011.

# Central Issues

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their

frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

# Recommendations

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

The comments listed below were made while Mr. Priest was under care of the Presbytery as an inquirer and also while he was the Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit. I have letters and emails that provide a written witness of these comments that I can provide to you if you would like to review them. After conversation with the National Middle Eastern Presbyterian Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CPM and COM of Mr. Priest's comments and behaviors. As a racial ethnic women I have been on the receiving end of racist comments all of my life as I know that any racial/ethnic persons are, that is why these comments are so troubling to me and why I am moved to bring this to your attention.

A sampling of the comments that Mr. Priest said to Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, Pam Whitaker Reid, Kari Gorman and I:

- 1. "You get the money from the churches because you are white they will not give it to Stan from Barnabas."
- 2. "How many "Arabs" own the gas stations and party stores in the area?"
- 3. When Lawrence Lorkowski told Tom that I am a minority woman and of Arabic heritage, Tom's response was, "she is too white and the people only see white. Especially she is the head of the center and the power is with a white person it sends the wrong message."
- 4. "A black person needs to be running the center not a different race."
- 5. "A white person cannot teach the children about their culture."
- "Like Jesus he will be persecuted confronting the establishment showing that the Presbytery of Detroit is racist."

- 7. "You are too white to be here." (to Ruth Azar a racial ethnic person)
- Tom demanded I meet with him so he could teach me about Urban Ministry in spite of me being at The Second Mile for almost 3 years. In a few hours he decided that I did not know anything about Urban Ministry because I am a Middle Eastern Woman.
- 9. "White men have all the power."
- 10. "Your assistant Lawrence is a white male he has the power."

Mr. Priest starting making these comments approximately one hour of being at the center, he had come to the center as part of his Urban Ministry Project at The Ecumenical Theological Seminary. Pam was so upset by his remarks that she left abruptly stating, "I ain't got time for this. He is racist as hell, and I'm not coming back to volunteer, you Presbyterians are a mess." Pam did not return for months. Sandra Addrow, issued a letter to Al Timm, Executive Presbyter informing him of Tom Priest prejudice (copy attached). I called Al Timm following Mr. Priest visit to inform him of the racist remarks in which he told me to call Rev. Marcia Foster Boyd, President of the Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Detroit since Tom came to the center for a class he was taking at the seminary. I called her immediately in which she directed me back to Al Timm since she said it was a Presbyterian issue not a seminary issue. I called Al Timm and he explained that I could file a complaint against Tom. I prayed about it for awhile however in conversation with the National Middle Eastern Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CMP and COM, which is why I am sending this letter to you now.

As a racial ethnic woman I am deeply offended by his remarks and feel oppressed. This behavior should not be ignored and certainly not from a potential pastor. I pray that you will review Mr. Priest and his call. Mr. Priest as a pastor in a racially mixed community I have concerns about his ability to service a church and not offend or oppress races that are not his own.

Priest, Jr. due to the racist remarks made to me, my staff, and volunteers of The Second Mile Center. The intention of this document is to enlighten the Committee on Preparations for Ministry and the Committee on Ministry of the Racist behavior that we have document. I am concerned that this behavior would limit Mr. Priest ability to be an effective leader and pastor in our churches.

The comments listed below were made while Mr. Priest was under care of the Presbytery as an inquirer and also while he was the Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit. I have letters and emails that provide a written witness of these comments that I can provide to you if you would like to review them. After conversation with the National Middle Eastern Presbyterian Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CPM and COM of Mr. Priest's comments and behaviors. As a racial ethnic women I have been on the receiving end of racist comments all of my life as I know that any racial/ethnic persons are, that is why these comments are so troubling to me and why I am moved to bring this to your attention.

A sampling of the comments that Mr. Priest said to Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, Pam Whitaker Reid, Kari Gorman and I:

- "You get the money from the churches because you are white they will not give it to Stan from Barnabas."
- 2. "How many "Arabs" own the gas stations and party stores in the area?"
- 3. When Lawrence Lorkowski fold Tom that I am a minority woman and of Arabic heritage, Tom's response was, "she is too white and the people only see white. Especially she is the head of the center and the power is with a white person it sends the wrong message."
- 4. "A black person needs to be running the center not a different race."
- 5. "A white person cannot teach the children about their culture."
- "Like Jesus he will be persecuted confronting the establishment showing that the Presbytery of Detroit is racist."
- 7. "You are too white to be here." (to Ruth Azar a racial ethnic person)
- Torm demanded I meet with him so he could teach me about Urban Ministry in spite of me being at The Second Mile for almost 3 years. In a few hours he decided that I did not know anything about Urban Ministry because I am a Middle Eastern Woman.
- 9. "White men have all the power."
- 10. "Your assistant Lawrence is a white male he has the power."

Mr. Priest starting making these comments approximately one hour of being at the center, he had come to the center as part of his Urban Ministry Project at The Ecumenical Theological Seminary. Pam was so upset by his remarks that she left abruptly stating, "I ain't got time for this. He is racist as hell, and I'm not coming back to volunteer, you Presbyterians are a mess." Pam did not return for months. Sandra Addrow, issued a letter to Al Timm, Executive Presbyter informing him of Tom Priest prejudice (copy attached).

I called Al Timm following Mr. Priest visit to inform him of the racist remarks in which he told me to call Rev. Marcia Foster Boyd, President of the Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Detroit since Tom came to the center for a class he was taking at the seminary. I called her immediately in which she directed me back to Al Timm since she said it was a Presbyterian issue not a seminary issue. I called Al Timm and he explained that I could file a complaint against Tom. I prayed about it for awhile however in conversation with the National Middle Eastern Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CMP and COM, which is why I am sending this letter to you now.

As a racial ethnic woman I am deeply offended by his remarks and feel oppressed. This behavior should not be ignored and certainly not from a potential pastor. I pray that you will review Mr. Priest and his call. Mr. Priest as a pastor in a racially mixed community I have concerns about his ability to service a church and not offend or oppress races that are not his own.

The Investigative committee included David Abbott, Christine Bohn (COM), Elizabeth Rice, and Henry Johnson. Beth urged fairness and diligence in our task to assess the report, and to determine Tom's fitness for ministry, in accordance with the process outlined in the Book of Order, and the manual for CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit. We do not have function or power to determine disciplinary action, and this is not a legal or disciplinary hearing.

# 5. Hearing Stage

- On February 1, 2011, a motion was made and seconded to adopt the Investigating Committee's
  report and recommendations. Having been postponed and not withdrawn, it was still on the floor.
  The Investigating Committee's report and recommendations were read.
- Mr. Wallace acknowledged CPM's right and responsibility to evaluate suitability for ministry, but
  maintained that the style and tone of the report and process of the investigative committee are
  disciplinary in nature and therefore in excess of that right.
- Mr. Wallace responded to the Issues raised in the report, specifically: that Mr. Priest did not abuse
  his authority as Moderator of the Presbytery; and that Mr. Priest values justice and equity highly and
  never intended prejudice or malice in any interactions he had with Ms. Azar.
- Mr. Wallace submitted that Mr. Priest does not object to the recommendations of the sub-committee, but to the nature of the report, its conclusions, and the process by which this has been handled.
   They requested that the committee approve the recommendations, but not the report.
- Mr. Priest stated that he is committed to his call to ministry, and submits to the authority of this body
  and the recommendations for growth and training. He suggested that all parties involved should be
  offered the training as an opportunity to build community. He maintained that any conflict resolution
  should include all involved.
- Mr. Wallace submitted a narrative from Mr. Stan Edwards, elder, Calvary Presbyterian Church and director of Barnabas Center, about his participation in the meetings with Tom (copy attached).
- The committee went into executive session. Mr. Koster was asked to remain.

#### 6. Executive Session

 The approved minutes of this session are sealed and on file in the offices of the Presbytery of Detroit.

# 7. Move to Open Session

- The Committee approved a motion to separate the January 18, 2011 report of the CPM Subcommittee, which was convened in the Matter of Complaint by Ruth Azar against Thomas H Priest, Jr., from the recommendations
- The Committee adopted the report of the Subcommittee.
- The Committee adopted the recommendations of the Subcommittee, as amended.
- The report and the recommendations as amended and adopted are included below:

# Introduction

After prayerful consideration, the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, on May 4, 2010, authorized the formation of a subcommittee to investigate the above referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbott, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to CPM concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

- concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC)
- disturbing statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC
- a perception that SMC was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included:

- a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context
- Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and SMC work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries
- his preferred model of urban ministry and his Interpretations of his observations of SMC.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to SMC and Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and a later meeting at SMC.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and further planning.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at SMC.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011.

# Central Issues

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### Recommendations

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

[This assessment will include asking Mr. Priest to present a report on what he has learned personally and professionally.

CPM requires Mr. Priest to subsequently undergo professional assessment through Midwest Career Counseling Center. CPM will furnish Midwest with the CPM Sub-Committee report and require that Midwest furnish their assessment to CPM.

Pastoral counseling may also be helpful in Mr. Priest's learning and healing through this process, and CPM encourages Mr. Priest to pursue that option.]

  and her sermon, a motion was made and seconded to grant her final assessment and give her
  permission to circulate her PIF. Approved. Liz was dismissed with prayer.
- Group C met with Monique Fube for Annual Consultation (CLP, Rice). A motion was made to
  continue her in the learning phase of CLP, while urging her to complete her field placement.
   Seconded. Approved. Although she submitted her exam after the due date, a recommendation
  is made to proceed to grade it. Jenny McDevitt and Judi McMillan agreed to help. Monique was
  dismissed with prayer.
- Group D met with Cyrthia Rouse-Baird for Annual Consultation (CLP, Barbara Jackson). Group D does not recommend any action to be taken by CPM at the moment. They recommend that we not sustain her annual consultation, because her paperwork was late, incomplete and her written responses hard to evaluate. This is a time for discernment for her and the committee. She has yet to decide if she will retake the exam. The committee requests a follow-up assessment with Cyrthia in two months. Tom raised concerns about the lack of appropriate care and nurture provided by the committee, lack of clear instructions, and constructive feedback. Cyrthia was dismissed with prayer.

- Sub-committee Reports:
  - c Lay Pastor Preparation Sub-Committee Report (formerly CLP report).
    - The committee will meet in April at 9:30 am, focusing on the issue of the final examination for the CLP candidates. Larry has collected other samples for the committee to compare and consider for the recommendation for the format of the examination.
  - Ordination Exams The exam results are due in about two weeks.
  - Session Relations No new business.
  - CPM Retreat No new business to be reported
- Coordinating Cabinet Operations requests us to describe what we would require in an
  associate executive presbyter. Richard Brownlee will attend in March. Betsy will attend in April.
- Liaison Reports:
  - We need a new lialson for David Oh, who is currently working in California.
  - We thank David Abbott for his faithful service, and relieve him of any co-opt responsibilities.

We're here at this portion of our meeting reluctantly I think. I know I am, and I'm reluctant because we're faced with a decision regarding someone we all like and admire. It's easy to serve on CPM when all goes well, and when it inquires, a candidate sails through the process. It's hard when it appears that that may not be the case, but that's our job. The CPM is one of the few committees actually required by the Book of Order. Our overall charge is to determine Fitness for Ministry within the Presbyterian Church USA of those who are under our care.

There's a long checklist of things that helps make this easy in some ways. Do you have an undergrad degree? Check it off. Are you endorsed by your Session? Check it off. Are you working on, have and give from an accredited theological school? Check. Have you satisfactorily completed field placement, clinical pastoral education, and all ordination exams? Check, check, check.

Our task, however, is not just to check off a list. Our task is also to determine the more elusive parts of what we call Fitness for Ministry, and this is why I love you guys on this committee and why I love our Presbyterian calling. It's because we not only look at checklists, but we wrestle with concerns and take action with candidates who haven't completed the checklist, still something needs to happen.

Something that's a lot less measurable, whether it's in theology or in self-confidence, whether it's in recognition of the various pastoral roles or in academic competence, whether it's in emotional difficulties or instabilities and so on.

And we have required some of those under our care to have additional experience, supervision, and training, another course or two, another field placement, psychological counseling, and other things. We have required those of our candidates even when they're all done with that checklist.

And it's with pride that I say about the people on this committee, that we do wrestle with these things and we don't take that task lightly. We struggle to both properly guide and nurture those under our care as well as determine whether or not they would serve the church well which we call the Presbyterian Church USA. This task has made me fall in love with our calling all over again because of quality, if we use it, it ensures fairness, considered deliberation, and not knee jerk or emotional reactions while counting votes on one side or another. It's grounded in Scripture. It's open to the Rules of the Holy Spirit and the Body of Christ which is the whole Church.

So today we aren't here as a disciplinary committee. We don't have that function, and we don't have that power. Disciplinary action is not ours to decide. That belongs to other bodies. Sessions for their members and Presbytery for

 the members who are ordained ministers. So if we're not here as a disciplinary body, why the heck are we here? Our task is always and not only to determine Fitness for Ministry. Always and only to determine Fitness for Ministry. That's why we're here right now.

Ms. Azar's Letter of Complaint was sent to both the Committee on Ministry and the Committee on Preparation for Ministry. Ms. Azar's complaint alleges misconduct on the part of one of our candidates, and since Mr. Priest is not ordained, COM does not have jurisdiction and that responsibility to investigate this falls to us. We're obligated to investigate a written complaint. We have to. No one sitting here would want to have such a complaint filed against him or her or be the one filing it and not have a fair hearing. It's not our immediate task to determine a motive for any complaint. It is our task to sufficiently determine its validity, and whether and to what degree it might impact our evaluation of Fitness for Ministry.

Because Ms. Azar's letter initially came to COM as well as CPM, we informed the Investigative Subcommittee last night, we included a representative from COM, Reverend Christine Bohn. We also included active and co-opted members of our CPM, Reverend Betsy Rice, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Dave Abbot. Dave is unable to be with us today because his illness.

It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview."

Because this isn't a disciplinary report, we have much more leeway in how we receive it and act upon it or not act upon it. This is a hearing, not a trial, to help us determine Fitness for Ministry. It's not to look at violations of the Constitution, because this is a legislative action, not a legal one. We're not guided by the same strict rules of evidence such as beyond a reasonable doubt required in legal proceedings, and we can even consider hearsay.

So no new witnesses are permitted today during this hearing. We can permit new evidence if you choose to accept it, because this is an action of this committee and not of the investigative committee. Any comments that we hear need to be directed to the CPM committee, not to the investigative committee. And then in Executive Session, members of CPM can discuss and ask questions, and we will raise on behalf of

Mr. Priest any questions he brings before us. That's our job.

You all know me. I'm co-moderator of this committee. We'll be following parliamentary procedures. Any questions about that or about Book of Order, I will refer you to Mr. Koster if I don't know them, and it's likely I won't. We will have a verbatim of the hearing portion so that when you speak or ask a question, identify yourself by name and what your position is in the Presbytery for the record.

Our decision need not go before Presbytery, unless the very unlikely chance the decision to remove Tom Priest from the role of standing, otherwise the decision remain right here with notice to COM. Our discussion today could feel as if it's a legal or disciplinary one, but that is not the case. Our responsibility is strictly to determine Fitness for Ministry within the Presbytery Church USA, through our Presbytery. That's the only task we have. And I know we are up to that task. We are up to that task, because we are a faithful people who love the church. We take our mandate to mentor seriously, and we give consideration not only to facts and checklists, but to the growth and nurture of our candidates and our churches. We're up to it, because we've dealt with sticky issues before. We're up to it because we rely not merely on ourselves, but on the guidance of the Holy Spirit. We do this faithfully, follow the scripture, acting in common with Mr. Priest, the Presbytery, and one another as

Subcommittee is in three parts. It's three-pages written by the four of us. It includes the Complaint by Ruth Azar against Tom Priest, and a one-page flier from the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center.

"CPM Subcommittee, Convened in the Matter of complaint by Ruth Azar Against Candidate Thomas H. Priest, Jr. Date of Report is January 18, 2011.

After prayerful consideration, the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, on May 4, 2010, authorized the formation of a subcommittee to investigate the above referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbot, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to the Committee on Preparation for Ministry concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee

was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

Concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC), disturbing statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC, a perception that Second Mile Center was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included: a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context. Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and Second Mile work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries. His preferred model of urban ministry and

his interpretations of his observations of Second Mile Center.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to Second Mile Ministries and Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and a later meeting at Second Mile.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and further planning.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at Second Mile Center.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011.

CENTRAL ISSUES

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile

Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he

knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require

Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills

Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard

Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral

development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

Not that I don't trust Mr. Priest relaying the message. I don't think it's good protocol or good form.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: I don't know where that falls within the context of the motion. His attorney should have sent us some correspondence indicating his unavailability.

ELDER BARBARA JACKSON: My question for you, Tom, is do you think that this delay will be helpful to the end result? Seems to me they gave specific recommendations. They weren't throwing you out in the street. And you know the quicker you get there and start doing them, the quicker you might be able to resolve the problem.

So I must be patient myself; otherwise, yes, I'll be the first to say, whatever it takes for us to move forward, I'm willing to do. So I must be patient also and respect the advice of my attorney.

REV. DOWNS: In response to Henry's comment though, even you and I had a little bit of conversation before the meeting began because he wanted to put in his request for postponement in front of the committee. And would you explain to the committee why it is that he can't be here and what changed, because he knew the date? What was it that changed from?

ELDER PRIEST: Sure, no problem. We had two days. I received an e-mail from Betsy Rice on, a week before last. What's the date of your e-mail, Betsy? Thursday I think. The report came out January 18th, it was, anyway that was about a week and a half I received that, and I sent information to my attorney. He replied back to me, okay, have all your information, I feel comfortable with you going through with this information, going through with the knowledge that you have. Then I received a copy from Beth about the agenda on I think January 27th, 28th, not sure what date, and then I sent that to him. And he was traveling and the next day, I think the next day, 28th or 29th, he called me back. He said, oh, no, this is a hearing in the form of a disciplinary proceeding, and because I had sent him an e-mail earlier to ask him is it proper to have a court reporter and all that. He said, yeah, sometimes people want to do that. So he was very open with me, and for my attorney to allow me to come by myself to say, go ahead, no problem, I was comfortable with that. But when he saw the flow of the agenda in terms of a discipline hearing, he said, no, you need representation. And that's why he has the issues raised and I agreed.

As far as what his travel schedule is, I don't know. I didn't ask him to send anything in. I'm sure he'd be happy. He travels all over the country, and he has commitments to clients. He needs more notice than a few days. We only had like a few days notice to respond.

comments just now made reference to the fact that your attorney said, actually I should be present because this is a hearing of a disciplinary nature. And I would wonder from your perspective, because it is obviously your prerogative to have legal counsel, from your perspective what was the necessity for legal counsel based on what the purpose of this hearing was? What did you envision the legal counsel's role to be in requesting presence?

ELDER PRIEST: I trust his judgment, and initially it was, you go ahead to committee. It's, it's asking questions about your Fitness for Ministry and suitability, no problem. Go ahead, be there. You have my blessing. Just remember, hear the findings. Don't get off target. Stay succinct, all of that, the things he reminds me of most of the time. But when the agenda came out, he says, I meant to say he said it's a hearing, now becomes calling a discipline type process, and not to say it is, but when it becomes a hearing and it becomes this stage, a hearing stage, and Mr. Priest advocate and IC using the terms which I'm going to read what he states why, I'm going to read those, that's what his concern was. He didn't say it was a disciplinary hearing, but disguised to read this way, then you have a right to counsel, for me to read his concerns, and then that committee can talk about it.

So the thing I want you to realize, in the beginning

he had no problem me coming and doing an on target review, but until the agenda came out on the 27th or 28th and I sent it to him and when he got to read it, he said, oh, I may need to be there because now it looks like it's a hearing as opposed to just a meeting with CPM.

REV. DOWNS: I don't want us to get stymied by semantics. Hearing to me sounds disciplinary and in the function of the life of CPM and in your pursuit of ministry, to me, this is somewhat more formal consultation. It's not an annual consultation, but it's a discussion with you about next steps towards ordination. I think the hearing term is a distraction.

REV. DOWNS: No. You can talk to Tom, but not to the committee.

Anyway, I'm going to ask Ed to simply clarify what this means.

REV. KOSTER: The Book of Order is interpreted and written, gives people what we call fair, fundamental fairness rights. In any case where there is an adversarial, some type of event that could affect a person's ministry in the future, outside of judicial process, this is not a judicial case, that person has some rights. One is the right to fair notice, quick notice, and the right to present his or her defense to the allegations and to the matters before, the matters

presented before a fair body, and that is what this hearing is designed to do. That is to say, the allegations are going to be presented by the subcommittee before you as a committee as the bodies of assembly.

There are two other rights that are attached to this. One is the right to have an advocate. An advocate is an advisor, somebody to be with someone. What distinguishes between that and counsel, counsel is somebody who can speak for the person. A person has a right to counsel, period. And to deprive Mr. Priest of the right of a reasonable right to have counsel here would make it detrimental to this motion to fairness, fundamental fairness. He doesn't have to justify having counsel here. The requirement is counsel be Presbyterian, that's required. He does not have to be an attorney either. The reason he has to be Presbyterian, attorneys have been known to misbehave. So we have to have somebody watch over the attorney.

So those are the requirements of fundamental fairness that the Book of Order and various cases and interpretation lay out in a matter which affects a person's ministry.

ELDER PRIEST: Can I respond to that?

REV. DOWNS: Sure.

ELDER PRIEST: Again, about my attorney, I want you

to know about my attorney being a pastor, very spiritual. And he is concerned about my theological health, my spiritual health, and fitness for being pastor. Believe me, with him, is pretty tough. And he is concerned, he more than me wants me to get moving on this process. He doesn't want to do anything to delay it. He's been through a second career, and he says, Tom, my role is to help you get through this, not to delay it in any way.

So the reason for this is even though it's not a legal stance, the wording of "hearing" and following that process sends an antenna up. Even though these are allegations, it's a report of committee and they are charging me with something, allegations, this happened and this happened and they're very serious. And as a result of these allegations in this report, a judgment can be rendered, either punitive or taking a class or some judgment can be done out of this. So when you look at that, his concern is me. So on top of that, the recommendation of these, if it's accepted, I will suffer something based on something that can be challenged, that some of these things can be challenged. And I think all he is looking out for my best interest, not only legal issues, but as Fitness for Ministry.

REV. DOWNS: Tom?

REV. HARTLEY: I think I want to speak more than the process. In fact at the table, we have legal and counsel

representation, Ed Koster, and the perception of fairness or equitability, it's reasonable on our part to acknowledge his desire safely to have legal representation and advocacy. It's better to proceed deliberately but fairly and delay, though this is already been warned for six months. Reasonable for us to be patient in the process.

Our authority, my view is only ministerial and declarative, not judicial, only Presbytery remains, we recommend. So as far as the need for legal representation, constitutionally and legally, isn't needed at this hearing I believe, but because of the recommendation by the committee at hand, there is an implicit if not explicit requirement or demand to admit responsibility with a tentative requirements. So I think it's reasonable that he recognize that, to even consent to these recommendations admits responsibility. That's where we are in the process. I think it's an unfortunate delay, but I understand.

REV. DOWNS: Any other comments of the committee or questions of the committee?

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: I like to call a question.

ELDER PRIEST: Can I read the points?

 Issue number one, he knows of no provision in our constitutional documents that would allow a CPM to appoint an investigative committee to look into issues raised in a complaint or to conduct a hearing on its findings and recommendations in the nature of prosecution.

The agenda that has been provided uses words such as "hearing stage," "investigative committee's report," and "recommendation". As Mr. Priest's advocate, no opportunity for Mr. Priest to present testimony from others or right to face accusers or right to examine his accusers.

Issue number two that concerns him is the lack of sufficient notice. Being subjective to the equivalent of a disciplinary hearing, Mr. Priest should have received more notice and Mr. Priest should have afforded the right to have an advocate of his choosing present to represent him.

Issue number three, double jeopardy. The Ruth Azar Complaint is already before the Presbytery by her written complaint. An investigative committee appointed by Calvary Presbyterian Church has conducted numerous hearings and appears close to deciding whether to proceed or not. If CPM convicts in the meantime on the same written statement, will that not render the IC's work a nullity? Or if the IC decides not to press charges, can CPM convict from the same issues? The decision by CPM to go forward will be a violation of both Mr. Priest's substantive and procedural due process rights and

could lead to a one to two year court proceeding to prevent what waiting may cure otherwise.

That's his legal statement and he asked me to read.

These are not my words. These are his words.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: Which in a sense goes back to my question. Could he not have sent that in advance? I can ask the question.

REV. DOWNS: Yes.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: We're all on the spot. It's not, excuse me, it is not heroics to his attorney and to him. We spent a number of months going through this whole process. We, the subcommittee. It's not as though we haven't had our own time, energy, and expertise tested and invested. I really feel strongly that if your attorney felt that strongly about what you just read that you said are his words, then I assume that he would have sent that to us in advance so we would have a sense what his feelings were.

ELDER PRIEST: The attorney doesn't relate to this body. He relates through me, and I brought his wishes immediately as I could. I spoke to him yesterday, and when he got it, processed information, he asked me to do a certain process and I did, and to get with the moderate ahead of time with no surprises, to keep everything above board.

We on this committee are also I believe dedicated and caring, and we strive to do what is just and faithful. I pray that any discussion we have or any decision we make will have no reason to be labelled as unfair or unjust or even politically or racially motivated. We work hard. We work hard to keep each other on track in our responsibility. Our task remains simple and straight forward and is really limited in scope. If we as a committee determine the report to be fair, then we adopt it. Do we need to require additional work or education or other effort on the part of the candidate under our care before we feel it's prudent to grant that candidate final assessment? referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbot, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to the Committee on Preparation for Ministry concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

Concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC), disturbing

statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC, a perception that Second Mile Center was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included: a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context. Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and Second Mile work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries. His preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of Second Mile Center.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately

Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan

Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to Second Mile Ministries and Barnabas Youth

Opportunities Center and a later meeting at Second Mile.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at Second Mile Center.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011.

CENTRAL ISSUES

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did

he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Friest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban

ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require

Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills

Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard

Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

say or do the things with which Ms. Azar has written or charged. Now, this committee has appointed its own investigative committee. I must submit as a student of the Book of Order, CFM, and I am a long-standing member of the CPM in Virginia, CPM's have the right and power and ability and directive to consider the suitability of persons seeking to be ordained. You have that right and you have the right to exercise that and you have the right to look in to matters. There's no question about that. But the issue as we, as I look at it and we look at it up front is what you are doing here is in excess of that right. And you're going to say, oh, no, I'm attacking the process, and you're going to be upset that I'm attacking your process, but I have to point out to you that Ms. Azar's original complaint was a disciplinary complaint. It is filed under D6 of the Book of Order. That is a disciplinary complaint. This committee had the right to look into those issues, but it could not do so as a second investigative committee or second judicial committee.

You will tell me, oh, no, there's plenty of language in what our report is that's been submitted. There's language in it that says we're not doing anything that's disciplinary when this is not a judicial proceeding, that's not within this committee's purview, I agree, and you have said that and remarkably so that is the purview of what's in the investigation.

 Do CPM's appoint ad hoc committees? All the time.

Do they ask the seat to look into matters? All the time. Is that within your purview and power? Yes, but there's a line.

And when you style your report as investigative "CPM Subcommittee Convened in the Matter of Complaint by Ruth Azar," the complaint is a disciplinary complaint. Now I would point out to you there's nothing in G14.0400 that authorizes you to act as a judicial commission or as an investigative committee appointed by a body such as a presbytery or a session or a general assembly. Just don't have that power. You may exercise it as you have done here informally, which you have gone about it and we been saying we're objecting to the approach you're taking getting to a result that you have a right to get to. We're objecting to the process, because we believe this is an irregularity under the Book of Order, and I advised Mr. Priest that it is such an irregularity and if carried to finality could form the basis for remedial action. That's my advice. That's not what Mr. Priest is doing.

Mr. Priest comes today to say to you that he's in submission to you. He wants to work with this committee. He seeks this committee's approval and endorsement and movement from candidate to readiness so he can move on with the process. He feels a deep spiritual call to serve as a minister of the word and sacrament in the presbytery church USA. He also says that he's listening to the Holy Spirit to

discern as to how he should respond to this. Also should tell you that he bears malice toward none and that he wishes that the process here today would be fully spelled out and spread out so that you, too, could see what many have seen, these actions either didn't occur or are not violative or are not as conclusions of the committee.

We're going back to the first point, we object to the proceedings in the way in which we're doing with a court reporter; with an agenda that spells out a number of places that this is a hearing; that the report itself has language that we're here to investigate yet takes Mr. Priest to task for any number of things; and, in fact, what has occurred here is a disciplinary hearing without all of the rights, all of the duties that are owed a person facing a disciplinary hearing. For example, Ms. Azar is not here today to be cross-examined. If you look at and hear all of the evidence, these statements were not made to her. They were supposedly made to others, yet when you examine them and look at the records, it did not happen in the context which they were reported.

He is charged in the complaint which she originally brought with racial discrimination. That is not Tom Priest. That is nothing about him. That's just not where he comes from. Is he an African-American? Sure. He will tell you he sees through the lens of presbyterian elder. He sees through the lens of being presbytery. Yes, he's concerned about issues of justice for African-Americans and for all and he's concerned about those kinds of things, but not inordinately to the point of saying or doing things.

Now, we also take issue not only with the process, and frankly, I have to say that process Mr. Priest is in a very difficult position, because if he challenges the process he may never get ordained. This committee has the power and the right to say whether he should ever be ordained. You can do it in a number of ways and you can say, no, he always has the right to go to presbytery and challenge their decision. But where does that get him if he does that, what is the taste in your mouth, what is the future, how are we working together if we go that route? So a more reasoned route and a route certainly recommended that he's willing to take is we have to be here, we have to participate. We object to it, because we believe it violates his rights and we have to participate and we are participating. We don't waive that, but there's no other way to go with this. We have to go ahead the way it is today.

 Now, let me talk to you for a moment about the evidence that is in this case. On February 18, 2009, Mr. Priest went to Second Mile Center as part of a seminary project to look at urban ministries within the presbytery as opposed to the model being taught in the seminary. I don't know whether that model is good, bad, or otherwise. I just know that's the model the professors are teaching and that was a part of his courses to go in some center somewhere against the model. So he went to the two in the presbytery, the two centers in the presbytery, urban ministry centers, one on the 17th, one on the 18th.

He then presented on March 9th, he presented his report to the seminary, and we have all the slides and everything he said is on those slides and documents. I trust the committee had access to it and can see it. On March 12th he presented that again to the seminary, and on the 16th he shared the results in March of '09 with both centers meeting with Mr. Edwards who's here, one of the centers and meeting with Ms. Azar, the other head, and he shared results of his study of his visit there at both centers compared to the model. He believes in the model, rightly or wrong he believes in the model. As the committee reports he prefers that model. I don't see anything wrong with preferring a particular model with having to do urban ministry, but that's certainly a mistake.

On March 2, '09, the coordinating cabinet of presbytery approved the Second Mile Center model that is with Ms. Azar at the head and approved it to come in under the oversight of the presbytery. June 23, '09 the presbytery approved the action of the coordinating cabinet of March 2,

'09, and said, yes, we will accept her, accept her as employees or technical employees of the presbytery. Again, this is not something that Mr. Priest was involved in directly. But I must tell you for the full year of 2009, he served as moderator of the presbytery and also a member of the coordinating cabinet. Why is that important? Because in September, October 2009, a lady named Rosy Lattimore submits a letter to stated clerk or to the coordinating cabinet and the stated clerk weighs in on it and deals with the question of, the question of can the presbytery approve a position and make a presbytery position without adhering to the rules of the presbytery procedure of the presbytery regarding open bidding and open advertising and that type of thing. Can we just allow somebody to come in to that position without having to go through the process the presbytery says this is our procedure when we have presbyteries all over.

Coordinating cabinet some time between October 5 and December 5 of '09 looked into the subject. Mr. Priest was on that committee, and they agreed on December 5 to send a letter to Ms. Lattimore that says, in the future we're not going to do this. We're not going to just take somebody in without advertising, promoting the position. But there are extenuating circumstances here, and so we're not going to undue this particular one, that's December 5, 2009.

Now Mr. Priest's term as moderator ends with the

 January 2010 meeting. No action has been taken by anybody to do anything at that point in time except the committee that he's a member of has written back to Ms. Lattimore saying, you're right, it probably was a violation of our procedure but the extenuating circumstances we're going to leave it that way. Once he's no longer moderator in April 2010, he prepares and requests and submits to the presbytery a motion to rescind that action, that action of approval of the appointment and the adoption of Ms. Azar as that position. He was not at that presbytery meeting in 2010.

Another, Ms. Lattimore did offer the motion. There was a lot of exchange in that time frame April 2010 just before the presbytery meeting about six or seven days before. One part of the exchange that went on during that time frame was executive presbytery provided Mrs. Azar with a heads up, this motion is coming and I want you to know about it and stated clerk talked about e-mails talking about here's the way the parliamentary process and procedure we're going to use at that meeting, presbytery meeting.

One of the things this jumps out at that point in time is an e-mail at that point in time, now talking about April 2010, that Ms. Azar said to the presbytery, what can we do to bring charges against Mr. Priest and Ms. Lattimore, because this is just a wreck? And they are told and response, here's where you go to find out how to do a complaint. So a

complaint was filed.

Now, the timing, I submit to this committee, is a big issue, something I would really want to know about. Why Ms. Azar, why from March of '09 when he makes his report with Mr. Edwards present -- I'm not sure what Mr. Edwards remembers -- why was nothing taken until this motion came up by a member of presbytery? Any member of the presbytery has a right to make a motion, and there's nothing wrong with making motion. May not agree with it and you could certainly vote them down, but why did nothing go on until after the motion came forward over being deposed in April 2010, thirteen months later.

The presbytery at the April 27 meeting did not deal with that motion directly. The presbytery at that motion, at that meeting heard a motion by another who said, I move that we not hear that motion. I object to it and move we not hear it. So presbytery voted on that issue and that issue prevailed and the motion that Mr. Priest was offered was not heard, read, made, voted on per se.

I will submit to you in July 2010, Mr. Priest and Elder Dorothy Seabrooks and Ms. Lattimore filed a complaint with the Senate about that process, that is how can you deny a motion and rule it out of order before you ever had a motion made? Is that appropriate process, is there an issue here? That has since been dismissed for jurisdiction. Mr. Priest was not at the meeting so he did not have standing.

The other motion of the other two was a day late in being filed, so it was dismissed as not timely, that's all.

In the meantime, the complaint had been filed by Ms. Azar and Mr. Priest's sponsoring church along with investigative committee and began hearing. The presbytery did not form an investigative committee. This committee did and the Book of Order gives you the power to look into things, but not in the form of investigative committee. So we would submit to you that if you look at all of the facts and all of the documents and all of the records, and hear all of the witnesses -- for example, Mr. Edwards is given a statement saying I was there in March 2009 at the meeting with Mr. Priest and Ms. Azar and myself to figure out how the directors of the two urban ministries program of presbytery of Detroit can work together and share information and resources. There's nothing in this statement, nothing in this statement that says Mr. Priest made disparaging remarks, didn't listen, abused his authority or did anything racial or made any racial statements or acted in any way untoward toward Ms. Azar or the Second Mile. I have his statement here and submit it to be part of the record if there's no objection. But in essence, he's saying this is the one that was difficult when I read it. I received this yesterday.

CPM shared with me that Tom and Ruth had several meetings which I had not attended. Mr. Priest would tell you

that was his second meeting with her and all the meetings he ever had. And CPM representatives, I felt they already made up their minds before they come and meet with me since they waited so long to find out what happened. CPM representatives assured me they did not form an opinion. Time delay was due to them just getting information April 2010. So I read that particular paragraph to show again the time line that 13 months after the fact, 13 months after the last meeting, there are charges made by Mrs. Azar, charges that are disciplinary in nature which are very damaging to Mr. Priest, charges which accuse him of very serious offenses if true.

This committee says one of the concerns we have is with the use of authority. Nothing that Mr. Priest did in March of '09 was as moderator of the presbytery. In fact, there's no evidence that says he came in and said, I'm the moderator, I want to do this. The evidence is that he was there doing a study and he shared results of that study as a student with his school and with the two centers. Mr. Edwards will share that this is what I heard him say. So what authority is he exercising in '09? He is the moderator of the presbytery. He is on the coordinating cabinet. But while as a moderator, nothing came up at a presbytery meeting that he swayed, oversaw, or did, or any actions taken by him there against Second Mile. In fact, as a member of the coordinating cabinet he was part of the cabinet's discernment and

 discussion when they responded to Ms. Lattimore's concern that, yes, we didn't follow procedure but you're correct, but this isn't the case to change it. We will leave it as is.

So that whole year '09 when he's in that position of moderator and member of that committee, where is any evidence that he used his authority against Second Mile Center or Ms. Azar? And we take strong exception to that inclusion, that he abused his authority, which is a very serious charge. But we will say this at this point too, if the conclusion of those listed in trying to discern as this sounds like that to us, certainly apologize and begs forgiveness because that's not who he is or what he was trying to do and that's a misperception of what actually happened on that occasion.

But you cannot point to any place in any record of the presbytery or in the coordinating cabinet, you cannot point to any evidence there that says here, here's when he abused his power, here's where he over-used his authority, here's where he took advantage of that authority. And the motion was made in April 2010 by him to look into the issue, not Ms. Azar, but look into the issue of, can we allow folks to be put in presbytery positions without following our process and procedure, and if not, what should we do about situations for that to occur. He has the right to make that motion as member of the presbytery. Is that an abuse of his authority? He disagreed and goodness knows I go to presbytery

meetings all the time, people disagree. Is that an abuse of authority? I submit that is not.

It says at that time, Mr. Priest did not notify
Second Mile he was taking his findings and interpretations of
findings to presbytery. There's no evidence he took them to
presbytery at the time that he was moderator or member of
coordinating cabinet. Now, did it come up at some later time
to the presbytery when he made the motion? Sure. But is that
wrong to at that point in time raise it in support of his
motion? He says he didn't use that same influence and
authority to provide opportunity to Second Mile and voice and
actions intended to dramatically affect him. He was not
moderator. He was not dysfunction if he filed a motion to
tell them this is the motion per se. The motion is not
directed at them per se, although certainly can be perceived
that way.

I submit to you the conclusion drawn about abuse of authority is, we submit, overreaching.

Now the committee also observed a consistent pattern of prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening. All of us need to be better listeners, and if he's not a good listener I think this committee ought to encourage him to be a better listener and encourage him to take training in being a better listener. Mediation skills, I don't know if he needs that. I'm a mediator. I certainly handle hundreds

and hundreds of mediations in my life time, does that train you to listen? Yes. So does counseling courses I took in seminary, they trained me to listen. So years of practice of law trained me to listen. Lots of places you can go to learn to listen. Not everybody's a good listener. The bible tells you over and over, hear, see. Always enjoy the line, God gave us two ears and one tongue, two eyes and one tongue, so suggests I need to hear twice as much as I talk. I know you want me to shut up now.

I think those are two serious things, abuse of authority and persistent pattern of prejudging. I think if you sat and listened to Mr. Priest, find out who he is. He's a man, middle age, hearing the call of God to serve, to be a minister of the word and sacrament. How easy it would be to say I'm too old, too many other things going on, but he's here and listening to the Holy Spirit. He cares about people. Is he an African-American concerned about issues of justice and fairness? Yes, but all of us are whether we're African-American, otherwise. We as Christians certainly heard the words of our Lord speaking to us and walk humbly before our God and seek justice and love mercy.

Tom Priest I know is that way. I think the gentleman here with us today, say the Tom Priest that they know is that way. Does that mean he's not to speak out on issues where he doesn't think it's right? If a job is going

to be offered in a minority area is it right not to have it advertised so it can be filled by someone who may not have gone through that process? I think that's fair to raise that question. Maybe in this case we wished he hadn't, but is it fair to raise it? I think there's folks here who raised questions about that before.

Now, the suggestion that there's something wrong being fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry, I don't know that that's objectionable, but if being fiercely devoted is a problem, we again beg forgiveness. I don't think that's really what the issue is here.

Seems to me in looking at the charges, concerns as they are called, dealing with authority and consistent patterns and assumptions of knowing more than others know. I think those are admonitions that he needs, fair to say them and tell him he needs to be concerned about those things, but not in the context of a disciplinary proceeding, not in a context where every word is being taken down and preserved for goodness knows what purpose, not in the context of investigating a complaint of this committee that doesn't have the authority to do them, investigating presbytery itself.

Seems to me when we on CPM approach a candidate we're here for two functions. Gatekeeping surely and we have to do that.

But nurturing too, and I commend you because I think your report does seek to provide, nurture, gatekeeping and nurture

and comes to the recommendation. Frankly, we're fine with the recommendation and perhaps would even say let's go with them but not with the conclusions and not with the report and not with the process.

So when we conclude all of this, what we ask you to do is not approve this report as it's written, because it makes a very strong statement about this man that could be damaging for the rest of his, potentially damaging for the rest of his career, but to adopt the recommendations and say we reviewed the report and we mark it as receive. We do not adopt the report but we do believe that the recommendations, we do accept the recommendations. As our moderator has said, Ms. Bohn said at the beginning, often CPM's do require additional steps not particularly spelled out in the Book of Order, but certainly in the purview of determining suitability and nurture. I think it would be appropriate to assure yourselves that, one, this man is ready to go forward at some point in time. I think you ought to do that, but to assign to him fault and to investigate him in this way and determine that he has violated certain steps and proceedings, I would encourage you not to do that.

I appreciate your listening to me and letting me go through this. I can take you through the evidence. I brought copies of all the documents I referred to that if you would like to have them. I got Mr. Priest here. I got Mr. Edwards

here. We can go through any or all of this, but we will ask you in the long run don't adopt this report as is stated but do seek to discern ways to assure that this man is ready at the appropriate time and he wants to continue in the process. He wants to be, to answer the call that he believes God is making to him to be ordained in word and sacrament and serve in that capacity. It would be very easy just to say, no, we hear that but our committee did this and they're good people and we're not going to budge. This is our committee and we're right. I submit to you if we considered every fact fully, you come to a different conclusion number one. And number two, I would submit to you in a court of law which my arena has been for 35 years before I became a lawyer on this side of the house, minister lawyer, this is a case evidentially Ms. Azar's case would not stand up, be dismissed and investigative committee heard the evidence that was their conclusion. They did not press charges. Obviously they're not a commission or a court. They have to decide whether there's probable cause. That's the lesser standard of necessity of guilt.

Thank you for listening to me, and if you want to hear anything from Mr. Priest he'll certainly speak if you'll let him to.

Mr. Wallace said. I just want to give you an idea when I met with him I drove overnight to Richmond, Virginia, where he's stationed, where he lives. And I stayed at a hotel, he told me I should never stayed at, but I went to school in DC in that area so I knew the area. I stayed at the Days Inn and when I drove up to the exit at two in the morning I didn't see any lights, I didn't see anything. Where was I? Finally I drove up, somebody came out. Half the units were windows were knocked out and vacant. That's the only place I could afford. I drove to his office and next to his office was a nice hotel.

So we sit there for four hours and he said, look, you need to tell me everything. I never sat with a lawyer before. He said you need to tell me everything, everything. If you did tell me whatever I need for you to deny what you, what's true, what is not true, and stand up for what you said from the beginning. And we went through that. A very spiritual, a very open experience for me.

I'm going to add to what he has said. When I met with the committee, excuse me, the investigative committee for CPM, when I met with them we met for roughly two hours and my advocate Darrell, Darrell Reynolds was with me, and we did not complete the investigation. We just got through preliminaries where I was explaining the report, why I was there, and the time line. So as we were going through that, the chair of the committee said we need to reconvene because we ran out of

 time. So we need to get back together, because we're not finished. So I said, I cannot commit to rescheduling until I meet with my attorney. Need to look at this, look at that, very open and up front as I have been. So with that, I told out of respect for that I came to this meeting without an attorney, but the next meeting I need to have my attorney with me. I sent an e-mail on September 26, Greetings, Betsy,
I pray all is well with you and your family. I am now able to
schedule a time to meet with the investigating committee. At
our last meeting I was unable to schedule a next meeting until
I consulted with my lawyer. Please let me know possible time
the investigative committee is available to meet.

I received a response back from Betsy. My prayers continue with you and all involved in investigation. Thank you for letting me know. The committee meets again tomorrow, and I will let you know.

I did not hear back from the committee until I got the report. So I felt at all that at least there should be some continuation to have an opportunity that there was some

work left undone.

 I am very sensitive to conclusions that were drawn about me, because in fact that is not my behavior. Everything that has been said I have been up front and above board. Not all people agree with what I said, but I been always up front, honest, and above board with everything. Most members of my church, and Darrell and Stanley can talk to that, didn't even know I was moderator presbytery before. All they know is, we call Tom to teach Sunday school. He teaches Sunday school. Need him to come preach, he'll preach. Need Tom to come work the food ministry, Tom will work the food ministry. Whatever my church asks me to serve, that's what I did.

I'm not the type person that even uses titles or offices. You go into my office and work where I was working you didn't see any awards. You go in my office at home, no awards, no diplomas, no anything. I been like that my whole life.

So being led by the Holy Spirit, not one time during my discernment process I committed to this call. I put myself under the guidance of this committee. I feel like a fighter, a prize fighter call, one or two punches I have to take another one. I don't like it. I don't want to do it, but if that's what God is calling me to do and I put myself under the authority of this body, I have to do it. I understand what it means to walk humbly with God. It means you may have to do

But to send me out alone to come back under these conditions, I'm very concerned with that.

REV. DOWNS: "In this report" meaning the committee? ELDER PRIEST: This report here.

REV. DOWNS: The investigating committee's report?

REV. WALLACE: Mrs. Lattimore initiated the action on her own. Subsequently, Mr. Priest believed that justice had not been done in allowing someone to be put in a position without going through advertising and discernment by the presbytery about, is this the right person. So he then took up that issue himself. But when he did the motion, in response to that motion, we even had it e-mailed from Mrs. Azar to the effect, what can we do to bring charges against him now that we know he's going to file this motion that's been filed and going to be brought to presbytery on the 27th of 2010. She writes on the 21st, what can we do to bring charges against him? There no charges, nothing, 13 months. So our submission is that this is retaliation and it's unfortunate and I think she was concerned about her job.

I would offer to you also, and I don't know if the committee, investigative committee has this, but trustees minutes for Second Mile Center from late '09 we have those.

If you don't, it shows where the problem is within Second Mile Center, the Clark Hill attorney's memorandum in December 2008 saying they really are not in keeping with presbytery procedure. The January 22, 2009 motion of the operations ministry team to the coordinating cabinet, and then a series

 of e-mails about that, minutes of the coordinating cabinet of March 2009 showing where it was dealt with, the presbytery minutes, coordinating council minutes of March 2, '09, again showing where they're dealing with how do we reconcile that position not being filled properly. Then we have the slides that Mr. Priest used in his presentation both in the seminary and with Mrs. Azar and Mr. Edwards. The minutes of the Metropolitan Urban Ministry Team is March 12, 2009 where they dealt with an issue motion to rescind over in 2010, first put together April 5 and then it shows being sent out by e-mail showing it being sent out April 12 by moderator, I mean Executive Presbyter Timm and Stated Clerk Mr. Koster sending it out to responding to Ms. Azar's concerns.

And anyway then one of these e-mails if you like to have it, one of these e-mails, April 14, we would like to know what charges we can bring against Mr. Priest and Ms. Lattimore. We believe this is harassment. We want to move forward with charges. That's Paragraph 3 of that e-mail.

Mr. Koster then writes a response, very eloquent response the next day saying, you're fair to everybody here, here's the outline of the process. Anybody can do what they have to do. Here's how it works, spells it out with a whole series of e-mails and here's a complaint filed April 21.

against you of harassment, sexual -- racial insensitivity, and I think some gender inequality, I was going there with that comment? What is then the motivation in your bottom line for what her actions were, the fact that she fabricated these allegations as retribution toward you for the role you saw yourself necessarily having to play in her appointment?

UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: What's your question, Larry?

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: My question is whether Tom feels
that the complainant fabricated the allegations as retribution
towards him?

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: I don't know if that would be appropriate to even answer.

REV. WALLACE: I was getting ready to say something close to that. We don't say whether she tells the truth or not. We do point to two things. One, we deny all these things, context changes all of these things. They weren't said to her and there was an issue before the house, the presbytery about re-advertising the job. What motivated her I don't think anybody would say.

ELDER PRIEST: Can I say something in my defense? I feel bad people talking for me. People aren't used to that from me. I will say this. It's very important to me what Mr. Wallace says about what was said to her, and I think that's a key piece of data what was said to each person individually, not summed up and said these are the comments

## ANSWER OF THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

The Committee of Counsel of The Presbytery of Detroit submits the following answer to the complaint of the irregularity alleged in the complaint of Thomas H. Priest, Jr., as follows:

1. Allegation: Thomas H. Priest, Jr., a member of Calvary Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan, and an enrolled Candidate of the Presbytery of Detroit complains to the Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod of the Covenant concerning certain irregularities committed against him by the Presbytery of Detroit, acting by and through its agent, the Committee on the Preparation For Ministry (CPM), in that on March 1, 2011 the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting by and for the Presbytery, conducted a "Hearing" against Thomas Priest on the, "Form 26, Accusation By Individual As Statement of Offense," of Ruth Azar dated April 21, 2010 and submitted under D-10.0102a of the Discipline of the Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) with letter attached.

Response: Respondent admits that Thomas H. Priest ("Priest") is a member of Calvary Presbyterian Church, Detroit. Respondent admits that Priest is an enrolled candidate with the Presbytery of Detroit. Respondent denies that an irregularity was committed against Priest for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated. Respondent denies that the Presbytery of Detroit has taken any action against Priest for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated.

Respondent denies that the Committee on the Preparation For Ministry "conducted a "Hearing" against Thomas Priest on the, "Form 26, Accusation By Individual As Statement of Offense," of Ruth Azar dated April 21, 2010 and submitted under D-10.0102a of the Discipline of the Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)" for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated.

Respondent further notes that the complaint omitted the letter of Ruth Azar dated April 20, 2010 and addressed to CPM and the Committee on Ministry, which letter included exactly the same allegations as Exhibit A of the complaint. The April 20<sup>th</sup> letter is attached as Exhibit O (Respondent is lettering its exhibits starting from where the Complaint left off)

2. Allegation: While the CPM labeled the March 1, 2011 proceeding a Hearing as to the Suitability for Ministry of Thomas Priest, the entire proceeding was instead a Disciplinary Hearing against Thomas H. Priest. On March 18, 2011 CPM mailed notice of its decision to Mr. Priest, saying in essence Mr. Priest had abused his authority as Moderator of the Presbytery, had exhibited prejudice and bias against others, and had routinely used methods of confrontation and intimidation to get his way.

Response: Respondent admits that the March 1<sup>st</sup> hearing was a hearing as to the suitability of Priest for ministry. Respondent denies as untrue or mistakenly stated that the March 1<sup>st</sup> hearing was a disciplinary hearing against Priest. Respondent admits that CPM mailed out a letter dated March 10<sup>th</sup> on or about March 18<sup>th</sup>. Respondent denies as untrue or mistakenly stated that it was a "notice of its decision" since Priest had received actual notice of the decision at least as early as March 2<sup>nd</sup>, and certainly no later than March 5, 2011. See e.g., <u>Exhibits P and Q</u>. Respondent notes that the March 10th letter speaks for itself, and otherwise denies as untrue or mistakenly stated the remainder of this allegation and leaved Complainant to his proofs.

3. Allegation: At the March 1, 2011 CPM Meeting Mr. Priest (1) objected to the hearing claiming a disciplinary hearing by CPM was ultra vires, (2) cited the lack of fundamental fairness (procedural and substantive due process) in the conduct of the hearing, and (3) objected to the impropriety of the proceeding because it subjected Mr. Priest to double jeopardy, since a separate PJC disciplinary investigation of the complaint of Mrs. Azar had already been held, following which that Investigative Committee declined to initiate Disciplinary proceedings against Mr. Priest.

Response: The hearing transcript, Exhibit R, speaks for itself regarding objections made by Complainant. Respondent denies that the objections and this allegation have any merit for the reason that they are untrue or mistakenly stated. Any objections, for example, ignored the unambiguous provisions of G-14.0411 that granted Complainant's Session jurisdiction over disciplinary matters, but also granted the CPM jurisdiction over Complainant to determine fitness for ministry.

4. Allegation: The decision of CPM was mailed March 18, 2011, and was received on March 21, 2011 by Mr. Priest.

Response: Respondent admits a summary of the CPM's March 1<sup>st</sup> decision was transmitted by letter dated March 10, 2011. Respondent does not have personal knowledge as to when Complainant received that letter, and so denies same as

untrue or mistakenly stated, and leaves Complainant to his proofs. Respondent notes that Complainant received actual notice of the decision at least as early as March 2, 2011 and certainly no later than March 5, 2011 (see Exhibits P and Q), and also that by virtue of the letter Complainant was aware that the CPM had made its decision on March 1, 2011. Furthermore, had Complainant remained at the meeting of the CPM until the decision was made rather than departing, he would have been notified of the decision immediately and in person.

5. Allegation: It is from this decision that Mr. Priest brings this Remedial Complaint, since the actions complained of are final under the delegated authority of the Presbytery to CPM and since the decision of CPM has not and will not be subject to Presbytery approval or disapproval at any subsequent meeting of the Presbytery.

Response: Respondent denies that the actions of CPM were final for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated. Complainant could have taken this matter to the floor of Presbytery and moved that the Presbytery direct that CPM withdraw its decision.

6. Allegation: Mr. Priest states the following as Irregularities in the Actions taken by CPM:

Response: Respondent answers the claims of Mr. Priest as follows:

7. Allegation: 1. The CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting as agent for and on behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit, conducted a disciplinary hearing against Mr. Priest on March 1, 2011 in violation of D-10.0100, et seq., of the Book of Order which empowers only permanent judicial commissions to hear and decide disciplinary charges.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and leaves Complainant to his proofs.

8. Allegation: 2. The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit improperly referred the Complaint to the CPM or the Presbytery of Detroit for investigation and action in contravention of D-10.0103 of the Book of Order.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue. The complaint referred to was addressed to the CPM and the Committee on Ministry. The Stated Clerk merely told the Committee on Ministry that it had no jurisdiction, and the CPM that it had jurisdiction over Mr. Priest for the purposes of deciding fitness for ministry.

9. Allegation: 3. The CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting as agent for and on behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit, formed an Investigative Committee to consider the disciplinary charges and present its conclusions at a formal hearing.

At the time of the March 1, 2001 Hearing CPM was aware that the same charges had been referred to an Investigative Committee of the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church, which had investigated the charges and declined to initiate formal disciplinary charges against Mr. Priest.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and leaves Complainant to his proofs.

- 9. Allegation: 4. The Hearing of March 1, 2011 was Irregularly conducted in that Mr. Priest was denied the fundamental fairness guaranteed throughout the Book of Order for such proceedings in that he was not allowed:
  - a. to confront his accuser;
  - b. to call any witnesses;
  - c. to cross examine the investigators, the accusers or any of the other witnesses; and
  - d. to know what the accuser or any witnesses said or see what any witness might have provided to the investigating Committee; and

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and leaves Complainant to his proofs. The hearing transcript, **Exhibit R**, speaks for itself concerning what Complainant was and was not allowed to do. Respondent submits, however, the CPM treated Complainant in a fundamentally fair manner.

10. Allegation: 5. The findings of CPM of March 1, 2011, while said not to be disciplinary in nature, were in fact disciplinary and, as such, were beyond the scope of authority of CPM (ultra vires).

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue.

### FACTUAL BACKGROUND

11. Allegation: 1. During the calendar year 2009 Elder Thomas H. Priest of Calvary Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan, served as Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit. During that year Mr. Priest was also a student at Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Detroit Michigan, working toward an M. Div. Degree, which he was awarded later that year. On June 23, 2009 the Presbytery, after examination, enrolled Mr. Priest as a Candidate for the Ministry of Word and Sacrament at its June Presbytery Meeting.

Response: Admitted.

12. Allegation: 2. As a part of one of Mr. Priest's classes in 2009 at Seminary, Mr. Priest evaluated two urban ministry centers in Detroit (the Barnabas Mission and Second Mile Center) using Ronald Peters,' *Urban Ministry* 

and John M. Perkins' Beyond Charity as guides. Mr. Priest's conclusions were that the Barnabas Mission was a mission of reconciliation and empowerment, under the Peters' guidelines, while the Second Mile Center would only qualify as a charitable mission. Mr. Priest conducted his field evaluation at the Second Mile Center on February 18, 2009. After completing his evaluations, Mr. Priest shared his findings with his Seminary class on March 9, 2009, with the Presbytery's Metropolitan Urban Ministry Team on March 12, 2009, and with members of the two centers involved on March 16, 2009.

Response: The cited documents speak for themselves. Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs. Further answering, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

13. Allegation: 3. On March 2, 2009, Mr. Priest, while serving as a member of the Presbytery's Coordinating Cabinet, participated in the Cabinet's consideration and approval of a recommendation that the Presbytery call Ruth Azar as Executive Director of Second Mile Creek. There is nothing in the minutes of that meeting to suggest Mr. Priest objected in any way to the call. On June 23, 2009 the Presbytery approved the call of Ms. Azar to the Second Mile Center after a spirited effort to postpone the vote. Mr. Priest Moderated the Presbytery Meeting where the call was ultimately approved and did not participate in the discussions about postponement.

Response: The cited documents speak for themselves. Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs. Moreover, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

14. Allegation: 4. At the end of 2009 Mr. Priest ended his term as Moderator of the Presbytery. In October 2009, just before Mr. Priest's term as Moderator ended, the Coordinating Cabinet received a Report from Ed Koster, Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, about the way the Presbytery had handled the call of Ms. Azar to be Executive Director of Second Mile Center. The report was intended as response to the questions raised by some within the Presbytery as to whether the decision of the Presbytery to call Ms. Azar in June 2009 was proper or not. The solution suggested was to discharge Ms. Azar and go through the call process again. No action was taken on the issue before the end of 2009.

Response: Admitted. The cited documents speak for themselves. Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs. Further answering, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

15. Allegation: 5. As an elder commissioner to the Presbytery but no longer Moderator and while still a member of the Coordinating Cabinet, Mr. Priest

on April 5, 2010 advised the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of his intent to file a Motion with the Presbytery asking it to rescind its earlier action regarding the called position at Second Mile Center. A copy of the Motion was to be a part of the Presbytery Packet sent to all commissioners and was to be voted on at the April 27, 2010 Presbytery Meeting. On April 12, 2010, the Presbytery Executive emailed a copy of Mr. Priest's Motion to Ms. Ruth Azar to give her a "heads up" that the Motion was coming. Two days later, on April 14, 2010, Ms. Azar and two others responded, asking the Presbytery Executive what "charges" could be brought against Mr. Priest for what they perceived to be harassment by Mr. Priest. The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery responded the same day, saying that charges could be brought under the Discipline against Mr. Priest, if Ms. Azar wished and, because Mr. Priest was under the care of Presbytery, a complaint could be made to CPM.

Response: The cited documents speak for themselves Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs. Further answering, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

Allegation: 6. On April 21, 2010 Ms. Azar submitted a "Form No. 26. Accusation By Individual As Statement of Offense against Mr. Priest, citing D-10.0102a with letter attached as basis for the accusation (together her written statement), thereby invoking the procedure to be used when initiating a Disciplinary Case against a person under the jurisdiction of a governing body. See Exhibit A attached. In the Disciplinary Accusation Ms. Azar claimed Mr. Priest committed the offenses of racism, discrimination, and division against her and others at the Second Mile Center. Interestingly, the accusations related to the one day visit of Mr. Priest on February 18, 2009 to the Second Mile Center, No explanation was given in the Written Statement of Ms. Azar why the accusation had lain dormant for fourteen months. The Disciplinary Accusation was addressed to Rhonda Favors, Clerk of Session of Mr. Priest's home church and to Edward Koster, Stated Clerk of the Presbytery. The Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church immediately appointed an Investigating Committee as required by D-10.0201. Edward Koster, the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery sent the Charge to Presbytery's CPM and advised CPM how it could proceed with its own investigation without having to defer to the Presbyter's Permanent Judicial Commission or the Session of Mr. Priest's home church. Mr. Koster did not refer the Disciplinary Accusation to an Investigating Committee of the Presbytery as required by D-10.0201 of the Book of Order

Response: Respondent observes that on April 20, 2010, Ms. Azar transmitted a letter address to the COM and CPM that included exactly the same accusations set forth in the Form No. 26, dated April 21, 2010. See Exhibit O. Respondent notes further that a copy of the April 20, 2011 letter was not attached to the complaint. Moreover, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

Respondent further denies this allegation as untrue or mistakenly stated - and frankly, patently misleading. The allegation makes a less than veiled allegation that the Stated Clerk conspired to lead the CPM in a process to avoid the Book of Order. Such unsupported and blanket allegations have no place in his church, or any church for that matter. See e.g., Exodus 23:1. The Book of Order is clear that Complainant's Session had jurisdiction over him in disciplinary cases. See G-14.0411. As such, there was no reason for the Stated Clerk to refer the matter to a presbytery investigating committee because the presbytery did not have disciplinary jurisdiction over Complainant. However, that same section, and the one that follows it (G-14.0412) gave the CPM wide discretion to determine (and investigate if necessary) the fitness of an inquirer or candidate for ministry. Indeed the CPM's discretion to investigate, order counseling, and even remove a candidate from the rolls (with the consent of Presbytery) has been supported time and time again by decisions of the GAPJC. See e.g., 2004, PJC 217-1 Hope v. Pby. of San Francisco; 1997, PJC 210-2 Bevensee v. Pby. of New Brunswick; 1993, PJC 205-4 LeTourneau v. Pby. of Twin Cites Area. Respondent notes that, for all of its length, the complaint failed to cite even one (1) decision supporting Complainant's position.

17. Allegation: 7. On April 27, 2010 Mr. Priest's Motion to Rescind was brought to the floor of Presbytery but was not voted upon as to its merits because of procedural rulings. Mr. Priest was not in attendance at the meeting.

Response: The cited documents speak for themselves. Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs. Further, Respondent questions how it could have been Complainant's motion, when he was not in attendance at the meeting? See <a href="Exhibit S">Exhibit S</a> - SPJC Letter of 9/23/2010 in 2010-2. Moreover, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

18. Allegation: 8. Ms. Azar's disciplinary charges were the subject of an extensive investigation by Calvary Presbyterian Church's Investigative Committee, including a hearing where Mr. Priest was allowed to address and refute the charges. On February 10, 2011, the Investigative Committee of Calvary Presbyterian Church issued its Conclusion of Investigation, advising that "no charges would be filed." This information was provided Presbytery's CPM, before it began its hearing on March 1, 2011; however, CPM went ahead with its hearing related to the same Charges.

Response: The cited documents speak for themselves. Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs. Still further, on information and belief, Calvary's "extensive" investigation did not include questioning Ms. Azar. Finally, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

On May 4, 2010 CPM established its own Investigative Committee and was guided in its investigation by the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery. CPM asked the Investigating Committee it appointed to investigate the accusations of Ms. Azar. The Investigating Committee recognized that the approach of CPM could be viewed as violative of the powers granted a CPM by the Book of Order, so the Investigating Committee in its Report of January 18. 2011 took pains to label its actions as advisory only, saying its intended purpose was to advise CPM on issues of Mr. Priest's suitability and not to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC (USA) was violated. Unfortunately, the stated intent was subverted by a deliberate use of the discipline of the church in a manner not permitted by the Constitution of the PC (USA). The result was the Committee's Report of January 18, 2011. See Exhibit C attached. At no time during its investigation was Mr. Priest given a copy of Ms. Azar's written statement, nor advised what Ms. Azar had said in her presentations to the Committee, nor given any information about the investigation. Subsequently, Mr. Priest was called to an August 9, 2010 meeting with the investigating Committee where he was asked to discuss his actions on February 18, 2009 in light of the written statement of Ms. Azar. Both before and after the August 9, 2010 meeting the Investigating Committee met with and obtained testimony from other witnesses, some of whom it has not even named to date. None of the materials collected by the Investigating Committee were made available to Mr. Priest. At the end of its work, the Investigative Committee submitted its report dated January 18, 2011 to CPM with conclusions about Mr. Priest's behavior and with recommendations of what he should do to continue under the care of the Presbytery. Among the conclusions the Investigative Committee stated were Mr. Priest's.

- abuse of his authority as Moderator of the Presbytery;
- deceit in the identification of himself to the Second Mile Center employees;
- 3. misuse of his Presbytery office to influence the actions of the Presbytery against Second Mile Center:
- denial of due process to Second Mile Center in not allowing it be heard regarding his Motion of April 2010;
- 5. bias against the opinions and experiences of others;
- 6. racism in his treatment of other racial-ethnic individuals; and.
- . misuse of confrontation and intimidation to achieved his will.

Each of these conclusions has been cited by PJC's across the church as basis for the imposition of discipline upon other minister members of the church. Here, the conclusions were reached without affording Mr. Priest the rights of fundamental fairness. Simply by labeling the proceedings as something other than a disciplinary proceeding. Mr. Priest was called to a Hearing on March 1, 2011 before the whole of CPM, to hear the report and respond to it. CPM advised before the Meeting that it intended on March 1, 2011 to receive the Report of the Investigating Committee of CPM and to act upon it. Mr. Priest was given a copy of the proposed Agenda for the Meeting before the Hearing. This Agenda was

adopted as the Agenda for that Hearing. See Exhibit N attached. He was not given a copy of the Report until just before the original date of the Hearing<sup>1</sup>. In the Agenda adopted, CPM advised Mr. Priest that a court reporter would be present. that Mr. Priest could have an advocate, if he wished, and that there would be a time in the Meeting called the "Hearing Stage." CPM advised at the onset of the Hearing that the Investigative Committee would present its findings and report on the evidence it had collected but could not be subjected to cross examination or direct questioning. CPM also advised that none of the witnesses examined by the Investigative Committee would be present or available for cross examination. The procedure for the day only allowed Mr. Priest to submit his testimony and to arque his defense. CPM advised it intended to vote to adopt the Report but wanted to hear from Mr. Priest before it finally ruled. Inexplicably, the Stated Clerk, who had engineered the way the charges were handled by CPM was allowed to sit in with CPM during its deliberations and to advise CPM as to its actions. Mr. Priest was given time to argue his defense, but it mattered not, because the evidential basis for CPM's action (the evidence behind the Report of January 18, 2011) was unavailable and not disclosed throughout the meeting. On March 11, 2011 Mr. Priest received Notice of the decision of CPM. See Exhibit E attached. Because of this Notice Mr. Priest submits this Complaint to the PJC of the Synod of the Covenant, asking this tribunal to correct the Irregularities listed above through this Remedial Action.

Response: The cited documents speak for themselves. Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs.

Further answering, Respondent notes that the Complainant first appeared before the CPM at the meeting on February 1, 2011 and requested an adjournment so that he could have counsel present. That adjournment was granted (in a showing of fairness), and he appeared again before the CPM on March 1, 2011 with counsel.

# RESPONDENT'S RESPONSE TO COMPLAINANT'S ARGUMENTS CONCERNING STANDING

Respondent denies that this Permanent Judicial Commission has jurisdiction to

hear this complaint for at least the following reason:

20. Allegation: 1. Complainant has standing to file this Complaint, since he is an elder of Calvary Presbyterian Church (PCUSA), a graduate of Ecumenical Theological Seminary with a Master of Divinity Degree and is enrolled under the care of the Presbytery of Detroit as a Candidate to become a Minister of the Word and Sacrament. Because of his enrollment he qualifies as a member of the

Presbytery. In addition, some of the actions complained of and the conclusions reached purportedly occurred when Mr. Priest served as Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit and related to his use or misuse of that office. And finally, he is aggrieved by the actions of the Presbytery, acting by and through its agent, the CPM.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs.

Complainant does not have standing. Complainant is only eligible to file his complaint if he qualifies under D-6.0202(a)(1)(Jurisdiction based on membership in the presbytery). Complainant, however, fails to qualify under that provision.

In this allegation, Complainant boldly claims that he is a member of presbytery because he is a candidate for ministry. This claim is a manifestly false. It is also expressly contradicted by other allegations in the complaint. Specifically, at paragraph 1, *supra*, Complainant avers that he a member of Calvary. And, at paragraph 18, *supra*, Complainant avers that he was subject (exclusively) to a disciplinary investigation by Calvary (pursuant to the Rules of Discipline). Thus, by his own admission, Complainant is a member of Calvary and not a member of the Presbytery.

Complainant also (noticeably) failed to cite to any authority to support his claim that his status as a candidate endowed him with the privilege of membership in the presbytery. Respondent cites to G-14.0411, which refutes Complainant's claim as that section clearly states that every candidate is subject to the jurisdiction of his or her session for purposes of discipline.

Complainant's status as a candidate does not grant him membership in the presbytery. Therefore, he is not eligible to file the complaint, and this Commission does not have jurisdiction to hear the complaint.

Also, in order for an individual to have standing to file a remedial case against the Presbytery, he or she must have been a commissioner to the meeting at which the alleged irregularity occurred. D-6.0202a.(1). Complainant claims the Committee on Preparation for Ministry, acting as the agent of Presbytery, committed the irregularity. Complainant was not a member of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry, and has no standing on his own right to file a remedial action against Committee on Preparation for Ministry or the Presbytery.

21. Allegation: 2. The Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod has jurisdiction to hear this Complaint since it involves the decisions and final actions of the Presbytery, acting by and through its Committee for the Preparation of Ministry taken against a Candidate under the care of the Presbytery. The actions taken by CPM are final actions of the Presbytery

because of the Presbytery's designation of CPM to act on its behalf in certain matters without further review or action by the Presbytery.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs.

Respondent also notes that a remedial case is one in which an irregularity or a delinquency of a lower governing body ... may be corrected by a higher governing body. D-2.0202 (*emphasis added*). The complaint here did not allege any action by a lower governing body. The only action alleged was that of the CPM, which is not a governing body. Therefore, Respondent respectfully submits that this Commission does not have jurisdiction to hear the complaint.

There can be no dispute that the CPM is not a governing body. There is also no dispute that the complaint focused exclusively on actions taken by the CPM. This limited factual scope in the complaint is wholly attributable to that fact that Complainant never took his concerns regarding the CPM to the floor of the presbytery. As a result, Respondent has never had occasion to address or otherwise act on Complainant's concerns.

In addition, Respondent notes that the action taken by the CPM was not final. It was a decision made in the course of its responsibilities to guide the Complainant as he prepared for ordained ministry pursuant to G-14.0405 and G-14.0512. The action merely directed the Complainant to do additional things to prepare himself. A "final" action would be a decision to report to the Presbytery that the Complainant had passed his final assessment and was ready to receive a call. G-14.0450. Or make recommendation to Presbytery that be removed from the roll. G-14.0463. Since the supervision of a Committee on Preparation for Ministry over a candidate is a continuing process, its decisions regarding preparation for ministry in that process are not final and are not reviewable by a higher governing body.

If Complainant had a problem with the CPM, and the procedure the CPM used to investigate his fitness for ministry, then Complainant had a clear avenue of appeal to the floor of presbytery. Indeed, Complainant through Calvary's commissioner(s) could have requested from Respondent (by way of a motion from the floor) some, if not all, of the remedies Complainant now demands from this Commission. That, however, was clearly not something that Complainant wanted to do. See, e.g., Exhibit R at 22, wherein Complainant's counsel argued:

This committee has the power and the right to say whether he should ever be ordained. You can do it in a number of ways and you can say, no, he always has the right to go to presbytery and challenge their decision. But where does that get him if he does that, what is the taste in your mouth, what is the future, how are we working together if we go that route?

Exhibit R, at 22, In. 14 - 19 (emphasis added).

Had Complainant taken the basic step of appealing the CPM's decision to the floor of Presbtery, and had Respondent then failed (in Complainant's mind) to act appropriately, Complainant would then be able to point to at least SOME action by a lower governing body with which to vest this Commission with jurisdiction. But that is not what happened here. What happened (and is happening) here is that Complainant is attempting to use this Commission and the judicial process to circumvent standard parliamentary procedure, Respondent's wide discretion in considering the worthiness of candidates for ministry, and the Constitution. Complainant's efforts should not be rewarded.

Finally, if at any time the Commission concludes that Respondent did not form a disciplinary committee in accordance with the Rules of Discipline then this case should be dismissed for lack of jurisdiction. The inappropriate formation of a disciplinary committee in violation of the Book of Order is the only Constitutional violation alleged in the complaint. Absent that allegation, all that remains are questions of policy. However, under prevailing case law, this Judicial Commission only has jurisdiction to hear violations of the Constitution, not violations of policy. See e.g., See 2004, PJC 217-1 Hope v. Pby of San Francisco.

22. Allegation: 3. The Complaint is timely in that the Complainant seeks to remedy actions taken March 1, 2011, of which he was not notified until notice was mailed to him on March 10, 2011 and received by him on March 11, 2011.

Respondent denies this allegation as untrue. The complaint was ten (10) days late. Complainant cannot rely on the March 10<sup>th</sup> date of the CPM's letter, the mailing date of that letter, or even his receipt of that letter to determine whether the complaint was timely filed. The only relevant date was and is March 1<sup>st</sup>, the date the CPM made its decision. And the complaint here was filed more than ninety days after that date.

Under D-6.0202, "...a complaint of an irregularity shall be filed within ninety days after the alleged irregularity has occurred...". The phrase "after the irregularity has occurred" being the relevant point (and one left unreferenced by Complainant's pleading). This language makes clear that the clock starts running on the date of an alleged irregular action, and not on the date an allegedly aggrieved party received notice. Where things otherwise, the deadline for filing would be never ending because a complaining party could secure more time by claiming that he or she was unaware of the irregular action. The purpose of filing in our Constitution "is to prevent controversies with the church from going on and on..." 1994, PJC 206-7, Bayley v. Pby of Minn. Valleys. A notice requirement would undermine that purpose. Moreover, it must be pointed out that other (unrelated) provisions in the Book of Order do include a notice

requirement. D-6.0306, for example, allows for a challenge to the finding of a PJC clerk and moderator "... within thirty days after receipt of those findings...". Therefore, had the denomination desired to include a notice provision in D-6.0202, it would have done so.

The Stated Clerk of this Synod has confirmed that the complaint in this case was received by his office on June 9, 2011. Even giving Complainant the benefit of a March 2<sup>nd</sup> start date (omitting March 1<sup>st</sup>), the complaint was ten (10) days late. Indeed, the last day the complaint could have been filed by Respondent's count was May 31, 2011 (the actual 90<sup>th</sup> day having been Memorial Day).

But, let's say for sake of argument, that Complainant was entitled to a notice requirement. Even under that requirement the complaint was untimely because Complainant had actual notice of the CPM's decision by March 2, 2011. Specifically, on that date Complainant had an approximately 40 minute telephone conversation about the CPM decision with Sam Clark – a co-moderator of CPM. Then, on March 3, 2011, Complainant responded to an email from Elizabeth Downs – the other CPM co-moderator concerning the decision. See Exhibits P and Q. Then, on March 5, 2011, counsel for Complainant transmitted an email to Rev. Downs, the content of which makes clear that Complainant was fully aware of the CPM's decision. Id. (FYI – a March 6<sup>th</sup> notice date should have been filed by June 3, 2011).

In addition, Respondent notes the obvious problem with Complainant's allegations against Respondent's Stated Clerk – (i.e., the Second Irregularity). Complainant was clearly aware of the Stated Clerks actions as of the March 1<sup>st</sup> hearing, but never filed a complainant. As a result, Complainant's ninety-day window to take action as to that allegation expired a long time ago.

The case of 2005, PJC 218-7, <u>Jackson v. Session of Cordova Presbyterian Church</u> is instructive. In <u>Jackson</u>, an investigating committee drafted and mailed out a decision memorandum. The memorandum was undated, which prevented the GAPJC from knowing the actual date of the committee's decision. So, the GAPJC inferred a decision date by concluding that the decision could have been no later than the day the memorandum was postmarked. The point is, in <u>Jackson</u> the GAPJC could have relied on the date Jackson received the decision. But it didn't. In fact, that date was not even mentioned. Instead, the GAPJC inferred a *decision* date based on the available evidence and it then counted out the relevant time period. Jackson's complaint was then found to have been untimely.

Two points distinguish this case from <u>Jackson</u>. Neither point favors Complainant. The first point is that, unlike the undated memorandum in <u>Jackson</u>, the March 10<sup>th</sup> letter relied on by Complainant clearly referenced the CPM's March 1<sup>st</sup> decision. Complainant, therefore, cannot claim that it was not aware of the decision date when he received the letter. The second point is that Complainant's

own Session actually filed a complaint (see case 2011-1) within the 90-day period. The complaint in 2011-1 is untimely for other reasons, but it still stands as strong evidence that Complainant could have filed timely filed the complaint in this case.

The facts are clear. Complainant knew about the CPM's decision as early as March 2, 2011 and has missed the ninety-day deadline. As a result, he is now 1) ignoring his own actual notice of the CPM's decision and 2) attempting to construct an unconstitutional "written notice" requirement in an effort to gain standing. Complainant's efforts should not be rewarded. The complaint was clearly not timely filed and it should be not accepted.

23. Allegation: 4. The Complaint states a claim upon which relief can be granted in that it cites as irregularities four erroneous actions taken by the Presbytery, acting by and through its CPM, as relates to the decisions reached in the meeting of CPM of March 1, 2011, including the conduct of CPM both before and during that meeting and one erroneous act taken by the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, which was continuing in nature, even to this date.

The complaint confuses the separate duties and obligations of Complainant and Respondent's CPM concerning the oversight of a candidate – Mr. Priest. Paragraph G-14.0411 of our Constitution granted the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church original jurisdiction to investigate the *disciplinary* complaint against Mr. Priest. However, that same paragraph also granted Respondent's CPM original jurisdiction to *administratively* determine Mr. Priest's fitness for ministry. It is well established that a CPM may appoint a task force to investigate allegations made against a candidate. See 2004, 217-1 Hope v. Pbv of San Francisco. The Hope decision is particularly relevant because there, as here, the COPM "... appointed a task force to investigate concerns about the candidate's ability to resolve conflicts..." See also Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 10th ed. 480 (Cambridge, Mass.: Perseus Publishing, 2000)("A committee can appoint a subcommittee, which are responsible to and report to the committee and not to the assembly.")

Respondent's CPM did not need to resort to the Rules of Discipline to investigate and exercise oversight of Mr. Priest when considering his fitness for ministry, because our Constitution and numerous GAPJC decisions make clear that the CPM inherently has that authority. See e.g. 1997, 210-2 <u>Bevensee v. Pbv of New Brunswick</u> (upholding Presbytery removal of inquirer from roles for not complying with counseling requirement mandated by CPM). Therefore, even if the allegations in the complaint are taken as true, the complaint failed to state a claim. Respondent's COPM did investigate Mr. Priest, but that investigation was not a disciplinary investigation. Rather, the CPM conducted an *administrative* investigation of Mr. Priest in accordance with the CPM's constitutionally mandated duty to provide oversight of candidates under its care. See G-14.0412. Moreover, during that investigation and subsequent hearing, Mr. Priest was

treated with fundamental fairness. He was supplied with copies of relevant documents. He was afforded the opportunity to speak on his behalf. And, he was granted a right to counsel.

Respondents assert that no relief can be granted because the complainant has stated no violation of the Book of Order, as required by 2006, PJC 217-1, <u>Hope v. Pby of San Francisco</u>.

Furthermore, the Book of Order grants the CPM the full authority and discretion to decide matters of readiness before recommending Presbytery declare a person ready to receive a call. G-14.0401; G-14.0411; G-14.0412; G-14.0450. Since the CPM has this discretion, its decision cannot be overruled except in cases where there has been an abuse of discretion. Lightner v the Presbytery of Middle Tennessee, 1983; Jackson v. the Presbytery of Susquehanna Valley. 1996; Leslie v. Session, First Church, Manhattan, KS., 2002. Since no abuse of discretion has been alleged, no relief can be granted.

#### **RESPONSE TO ARGUMENT**

24. 1. behalf of the Presbytery, to conduct a disciplinary investigation and hearing against Mr. Priest by (a) appointing an Investigative Committee, (b) authorizing it to investigate the disciplinary charges against Mr. Priest, and (c) holding a judicial hearing involving disciplinary charges against Mr. Priest was erroneous and not permitted under the Book of Order, and, as such, it is an Irregularity committed by the Presbytery.

Respondent points to the statement made by Complainant's counsel at the hearing on March 1, 2011:

"I must submit as a student of the Book of Order, CPM, and I am a long-standing member of the CPM in Virginia, CPM's have the right and power and ability and directive to consider the suitability of persons seeking to be ordained. You have that right and you have the right to exercise that and you have the right to look into matters. There's no question about that."

Exhibit R at 19, In. 3-9 (statements made by Counsel for Complainant at March  $1^{st}$  hearing).

Complainant admitted at the hearing, as he must, that the CPM had the right to determine his fitness for ministry. However, while conceding that CPM has a right to act, Complainant now attempts to reserve for himself the privilege of instructing the CPM how to exercise its rights. No candidate in this denomination is granted that ability, or that privilege.

Robert's Rules (and thus our own Book of Order) grants to every committee the right to appoint sub-committees. See RONR (10<sup>th</sup> ed.), p 480, l. 11 - 13. Therefore, implicit in the CPM's right to consider the suitability of persons seeking to be ordained was a right to appoint a sub-committee to determine the suitability of a particular candidate and report back to the full CPM. Complainant's argument then that the investigation by CPM sub-committee was disciplinary is a red herring.

Moreover, Complainant's argument that the CPM hearing was a disciplinary proceeding under the Rules of Discipline is simply without merit. fundamental characteristic of a disciplinary proceeding under our Rules of Discipline is the possibility that the party charged could be subject to a public censure before presbytery. At a minimum, the censure is a judgment of "guilt" followed by verbal rebuke before the assembled presbytery. See D-11.0403; D-12.000; D-12.0102. The worst possible censure is removal from office and/or membership. D-12.0105. Complainant was NEVER at risk of to even the lowest degree of censure by the CPM. Therefore, no matter how much Complainant might wish to characterize the CPM hearing as a disciplinary hearing - it simply was no such thing. To be sure, Complainant was admonished and "corrected" by the CPM as part of CPM's assessment for his fitness for ministry. But that is See e.g., 1997 PJC 210-2 Bevensee v. Pby of New CPM's right. Brunswick)(candidate required to receive counseling). The GAPJC has ruled time and time again in cases just like this - indeed more extreme than this - that a Presbytery has exceptionally wide discretion over candidates under its care. See e.g., Bevensee, supra, where the GAPJC noted that only mandatory requirement prior to REMOVING a candidate from the rolls is that the candidate be given an opportunity to be heard. Complaint here was granted that right, and much much more.

The CPM was well within its rights, and the record is clear that Mr. Priest was treated with fundamental fairness. The case should be dismissed.

25. 2. The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit improperly referred the Written Statement of Ms. Azar to the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit for investigation and action in contravention of D-10.0103 of the Book of Order.

The actions of the Stated Clerk, even if accepted as true, occurred more than 90 days before the Complaint was filed. As a result, the Commission clearly does not have jurisdiction over this alleged irregularity.

However, assuming jurisdiction exists, Respondent was and is astonished that the complainant did not include Ms. Azar's letter of April 20, 2010 to COM and CPM. See Exhibit O. The content of that letter was nearly identical to the Written Statement authored the next day. Why was the letter not provided in the complaint? Respondent doesn't know – at present. But the existence of the letter turns Complainant's narrative on its head. Without Ms. Azar's letter

Complainant is free to spin and weave a story of a conspiracy, in which Respondent's Stated Clerk is out to "get" Mr. Priest. But, with Ms. Azar's letter, what we have (at best) is a story of the Stated Clerk providing duplicate information to the CPM. Clearly, the latter is not as sexy, or supportive, of the alleged plight of Complainant.

This irregularity is nothing more than a red herring founded on the convenient omission of an exceptionally material fact. It should be dismissed.

26. 3. The CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting as agent for the Presbytery of Detroit, subjected Mr. Priest to double jeopardy when it formed an Investigative Committee to consider the charges and present its conclusions in a formal hearing, knowing that the same charges had been submitted to the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church and were the subject of an investigation there.

This irregularly has no merit. Zero. It is directly refuted by the plain language of G-14.0411, which granted Complainant's home church jurisdiction over him in disciplinary matters but granted the CPM jurisdiction over determining his fitness for ministry.

One way to test a theory is to see how well it holds up at the extremes. In this case, suppose we have a candidate for ministry in presbytery X that commits a serious secular felony. Suppose further that the victim of the felony happened to also be Presbyterian and so files a disciplinary case against the candidate with the candidate's church. And, suppose further that the candidate is never charged by the church. Does Complainant really think that under those circumstance the CPM doesn't have the right to undertake is own investigation to determine the fitness of the candidate for ministry? The answer in the example, and also under the much less extreme circumstances at issue here, is the same — CPM clearly does the right to conduct its own investigation.

As mentioned *supra*, the CPM had and has every right to determine Complainant's fitness for ministry. That right is separate and distinct from the rights of the Session of Calvary Presbytery. And it includes the right to investigate charges against a candidate until the CPM is satisfied that the candidate is fit to be a minister of the Word and Sacrament.

- 27. 4. The Hearing of March 1, 2011 was irregularly conducted (assuming it could be conducted) in that Mr. Priest was denied the fundamental fairness guaranteed throughout the Book of Order for such proceedings in that Mr. Priest was not allowed:
  - a. to confront his accuser or hear her testimony
  - b. to call any witnesses
  - c. to examine or cross examine the Investigators, the accusers, or any of the other witnesses

 d. to know what the accuser or any of the witnesses said or to see what any of the witnesses might have provided to the Investigating Committee

The accused in a disciplinary case under the Rules of Discipline is entitled to full due process rights. The reason for that is simple. As explained *supra*, every accused in a disciplinary action is at risk of a formal public censure. Here, Complainant did not risk censure. He was not the subject of a disciplinary hearing under the rules of discipline. And, he was not entitled to full due process.

What Complainant was entitled to was fundamental fairness. Which is exactly what he got. Complainant had the opportunity to speak at the hearing. Complainant was allowed to have counsel present (and speaking) during the hearing. Complainant was also given copies of all relevant papers – and more than a month to review them before the March 1<sup>st</sup> hearing. And the matter was heard before a body different from the investigating body: It was heard before the CPM as a whole, which had full rights and authority to inquire of the subcommittee and to deny or add to its recommendations. Indeed, the CPM, after hearing the Complainant and his counsel, adopted requirements different from what was in the original report. See Exhibit T - Minutes of the CPM of March 1, 2011, pp 3f. It is then, simply not true that Complainant was denied fundamental fairness.

This irregularity too is a red herring and should be dismissed.

Respondent reserves the right to file a motion to dismiss in the event the Commission decides to accept the case notwithstanding the arguments set forth above.

#### Dear Reverends:

As an ordained elder of the PC (USA) it saddens me to have to request an investigation of Thomas H. Priest, Jr. due to the racist remarks made to me, my staff, and volunteers of The Second Mile Center. The intention of this document is to enlighten the Committee on Preparations for Ministry and the Committee on Ministry of the Racist behavior that we have document. I am concerned that this behavior would limit Mr. Priest ability to be an effective leader and pastor in our churches.

The comments listed below were made while Mr. Priest was under care of the Presbytery as an inquirer and also while he was the Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit. I have letters and emails that provide a written witness of these comments that I can provide to you if you would like to review them. After conversation with the National Middle Eastern Presbyterian Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CPM and COM of Mr. Priest's comments and behaviors. As a racial ethnic women I have been on the receiving end of racist comments all of my life as I know that any racial/ethnic persons are, that is why these comments are so troubling to me and why I am moved to bring this to your attention.

A sampling of the comments that Mr. Priest said to Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski. Pam Whitaker Reid, Kari Gorman and I:

- 1. "You get the money from the churches because you are white they will not give it to Stan from Barnabas."
- 2. "How many "Arabs" own the gas stations and party stores in the area?"
- 3. When Lawrence Lorkowski told Tom that I am a minority woman and of Arabic heritage, Tom's response was, "she is too white and the people only see white. Especially she is the head of the center and the power is with a white person it sends the wrong message."
- 4. "A black person needs to be running the center not a different race."
- 5. "A white person cannot teach the children about their culture."
- "Like Jesus he will be persecuted confronting the establishment showing that the Presbytery of Detroit is racist."

- 7. "You are too white to be here." (to Ruth Azar a racial ethnic person)
- 8. Tom demanded I meet with him so he could teach me about Urban Ministry in spite of me being at The Second Mile for almost 3 years. In a few hours he decided that I did not know anything about Urban Ministry because I am a Middle Eastern Woman.
- 9. "White men have all the power."
- 10. "Your assistant Lawrence is a white male he has the power."

Mr. Priest starting making these comments approximately one hour of being at the center, he had come to the center as part of his Urban Ministry Project at The Ecumenical Theological Seminary. Pam was so upset by his remarks that she left abruptly stating, "I ain't got time for this. He is racist as hell, and I'm not coming back to volunteer, you Presbyterians are a mess." Pam did not return for months. Sandra Addrow, issued a letter to Al Timm, Executive Presbyter informing him of Tom Priest prejudice (copy attached). I called Al Timm following Mr. Priest visit to inform him of the racist remarks in which he told me to call Rev. Marcia Foster Boyd, President of the Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Detroit since Tom came to the center for a class he was taking at the seminary. I called her immediately in which she directed me back to Al Timm since she said it was a Presbyterian issue not a seminary issue. I called Al Timm and he explained that I could file a complaint against Tom. I prayed about it for awhile however in conversation with the National Middle Eastern Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CMP and COM, which is why I am sending this letter to you now.

As a racial ethnic woman I am deeply offended by his remarks and feel oppressed. This behavior should not be ignored and certainly not from a potential pastor. I pray that you will review Mr. Priest and his call. Mr. Priest as a pastor in a racially mixed community I have concerns about his ability to service a church and not offend or oppress races that are not his own.

of the Presbytery. I've been asked to come as advisor on the process.

REV. DOWNS: Again, last month the motion was made to adopt the committee's report and recommendations, and then we postponed any discussion of that at Tom Priest's request so we are reconvening on this day.

There are a couple of things. I wrote out some remarks I would like to read and a reminder that for the purposes of this day and this meeting today, only you, Tom, and your lawyer can speak to the committee during this meeting, during this hearing.

We reconvened today the CPM hearing on the motion to adopt the report and recommendations of the special investigating committee. I have to tell you that this report has generated a lot of response from a number of people outside of the committee. I have received e-mails and phone messages. I have documents forwarded to me from individuals and other pastors in the presbytery, as well as requests from the black caucus of our presbytery to meet separately with them to discuss Mr. Priest's status and this issue. Reverend Timm also has had some of these contacts. I can only assume that some of the others on the committee have received similar contacts, but I don't know that. I appreciate that there are so many people concerned with what we are doing is just and fair and faithful, and that Tom has as many supporters as he

does. I'm grateful for their dedication and care.

We on this committee are also I believe dedicated and caring, and we strive to do what is just and faithful. I pray that any discussion we have or any decision we make will have no reason to be labelled as unfair or unjust or even politically or racially motivated. We work hard. We work hard to keep each other on track in our responsibility. Our task remains simple and straight forward and is really limited in scope. If we as a committee determine the report to be fair, then we adopt it. Do we need to require additional work or education or other effort on the part of the candidate under our care before we feel it's prudent to grant that candidate final assessment? referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbot, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to the Committee on Preparation for Ministry concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

Concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC), disturbing

statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC, a perception that Second Mile Center was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included: a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context. Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and Second Mile work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries. His preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of Second Mile Center.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately

Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan

Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to Second Mile Ministries and Barnabas Youth

Opportunities Center and a later meeting at Second Mile.

24 25 On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at Second Mile Center.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011. CENTRAL ISSUES

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did

he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban

ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require
Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills
Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard
Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

That disciplinary complaint was directed to the stated clerk of the presbytery and to the stated clerk of the sponsoring church for Mr. Priest.

Investigative committee is formed by the session of his own church or sponsoring church, and that investigating committee examined and did the same thing as this committee. That committee has declined to file charges. Mr. Priest was charged in the complaint by Mrs. Azar with racial discrimination, reverse racial discrimination, among other charges.

Mr. Priest denies and has repeatedly said he did not

say or do the things with which Ms. Azar has written or charged. Now, this committee has appointed its own investigative committee. I must submit as a student of the Book of Order, CPM, and I am a long-standing member of the CPM in Virginia, CPM's have the right and power and ability and directive to consider the suitability of persons seeking to be ordained. You have that right and you have the right to exercise that and you have the right to look in to matters. There's no question about that. But the issue as we, as I look at it and we look at it up front is what you are doing here is in excess of that right. And you're going to say, oh, no, I'm attacking the process, and you're going to be upset that I'm attacking your process, but I have to point out to you that Ms. Azar's original complaint was a disciplinary complaint. It is filed under D6 of the Book of Order. That is a disciplinary complaint. This committee had the right to look into those issues, but it could not do so as a second investigative committee or second judicial committee.

You will tell me, oh, no, there's plenty of language in what our report is that's been submitted. There's language in it that says we're not doing anything that's disciplinary when this is not a judicial proceeding, that's not within this committee's purview, I agree, and you have said that and remarkably so that is the purview of what's in the investigation.

Do CPM's appoint ad hoc committees? All the time.

Do they ask the seat to look into matters? All the time. Is that within your purview and power? Yes, but there's a line.

And when you style your report as investigative "CPM Subcommittee Convened in the Matter of Complaint by Ruth Azar," the complaint is a disciplinary complaint. Now I would point out to you there's nothing in G14.0400 that authorizes you to act as a judicial commission or as an investigative committee appointed by a body such as a presbytery or a session or a general assembly. Just don't have that power. You may exercise it as you have done here informally, which you have gone about it and we been saying we're objecting to the approach you're taking getting to a result that you have a right to get to. We're objecting to the process, because we believe this is an irregularity under the Book of Order, and I advised Mr. Priest that it is such an irregularity and if carried to finality could form the basis for remedial action. That's my advice. That's not what Mr. Priest is doing.

Mr. Priest comes today to say to you that he's in submission to you. He wants to work with this committee. He seeks this committee's approval and endorsement and movement from candidate to readiness so he can move on with the process. He feels a deep spiritual call to serve as a minister of the word and sacrament in the presbytery church USA. He also says that he's listening to the Holy Spirit to

discern as to how he should respond to this. Also should tell you that he bears malice toward none and that he wishes that the process here today would be fully spelled out and spread out so that you, too, could see what many have seen, these actions either didn't occur or are not violative or are not as conclusions of the committee.

We're going back to the first point, we object to the proceedings in the way in which we're doing with a court reporter; with an agenda that spells out a number of places that this is a hearing; that the report itself has language that we're here to investigate yet takes Mr. Priest to task for any number of things; and, in fact, what has occurred here is a disciplinary hearing without all of the rights, all of the duties that are owed a person facing a disciplinary hearing. For example, Ms. Azar is not here today to be cross-examined. If you look at and hear all of the evidence, these statements were not made to her. They were supposedly made to others, yet when you examine them and look at the records, it did not happen in the context which they were reported.

So first thing is Ms. Azar's not here, can't be examined nor the other witnesses, not been confronted, not given the information which they presented, given this conclusion by this committee and this report by this committee.

He is charged in the complaint which she originally brought with racial discrimination. That is not Tom Priest. That is nothing about him. That's just not where he comes from. Is he an African-American? Sure. He will tell you he sees through the lens of presbyterian elder. He sees through the lens of being presbytery. Yes, he's concerned about issues of justice for African-Americans and for all and he's concerned about those kinds of things, but not inordinately to the point of saying or doing things.

Now, we also take issue not only with the process, and frankly, I have to say that process Mr. Priest is in a very difficult position, because if he challenges the process he may never get ordained. This committee has the power and the right to say whether he should ever be ordained. You can do it in a number of ways and you can say, no, he always has the right to go to presbytery and challenge their decision. But where does that get him if he does that, what is the taste in your mouth, what is the future, how are we working together if we go that route? So a more reasoned route and a route certainly recommended that he's willing to take is we have to be here, we have to participate. We object to it, because we believe it violates his rights and we have to participate and we are participating. We don't waive that, but there's no other way to go with this. We have to go ahead the way it is today.

Now, let me talk to you for a moment about the evidence that is in this case. On February 18, 2009, Mr. Priest went to Second Mile Center as part of a seminary project to look at urban ministries within the presbytery as opposed to the model being taught in the seminary. I don't know whether that model is good, bad, or otherwise. I just know that's the model the professors are teaching and that was a part of his courses to go in some center somewhere against the model. So he went to the two in the presbytery, the two centers in the presbytery, urban ministry centers, one on the 18th.

He then presented on March 9th, he presented his report to the seminary, and we have all the slides and everything he said is on those slides and documents. I trust the committee had access to it and can see it. On March 12th he presented that again to the seminary, and on the 16th he shared the results in March of '09 with both centers meeting with Mr. Edwards who's here, one of the centers and meeting with Ms. Azar, the other head, and he shared results of his study of his visit there at both centers compared to the model. He believes in the model, rightly or wrong he believes in the model. As the committee reports he prefers that model. I don't see anything wrong with preferring a particular model with having to do urban ministry, but that's certainly a mistake.

But anyway, in March '09 he met with Ms. Azar and other folks from SMC, Second Mile, and Mr. Edwards, and presented his findings. They were all present together. He only ever spoke with Ms. Azar twice. Once was during his visit, once first visit; once during his presentation of his findings on March 16th. March 16, '09, onward he had no contact with Ms. Azar.

Now, hold that over here aside to deal with another factual setting that I'm sure the committee also went in to.

For a long time there was a question of Ms. Azar's and the center's reporting or oversight, reporting to or oversight by presbytery, and one of the issues was, how do we as a presbytery, how to raise benefits and who has oversight. So that needed to be cleaned up. Had nothing to do with Mr. Priest. Started long before he came on board. Mr. Priest was hired by a women's council, I may not be given exact right name, that oversaw Second Mile Center. But the question came up, how to make sure she's under the purview, control, and oversight of the presbytery. That was in the works before Mr. Priest ever went out there.

On March 2, '09, the coordinating cabinet of presbytery approved the Second Mile Center model that is with Ms. Azar at the head and approved it to come in under the oversight of the presbytery. June 23, '09 the presbytery approved the action of the coordinating cabinet of March 2,

'09, and said, yes, we will accept her, accept her as employees or technical employees of the presbytery. Again, this is not something that Mr. Priest was involved in directly. But I must tell you for the full year of 2009, he served as moderator of the presbytery and also a member of the coordinating cabinet. Why is that important? Because in September, October 2009, a lady named Rosy Lattimore submits a letter to stated clerk or to the coordinating cabinet and the stated clerk weighs in on it and deals with the question of, the question of can the presbytery approve a position and make a presbytery position without adhering to the rules of the presbytery procedure of the presbytery regarding open bidding and open advertising and that type of thing. Can we just allow somebody to come in to that position without having to go through the process the presbytery says this is our procedure when we have presbyteries all over.

Coordinating cabinet some time between October 5 and December 5 of '09 looked into the subject. Mr. Priest was on that committee, and they agreed on December 5 to send a letter to Ms. Lattimore that says, in the future we're not going to do this. We're not going to just take somebody in without advertising, promoting the position. But there are extenuating circumstances here, and so we're not going to undue this particular one, that's December 5, 2009.

Now Mr. Priest's term as moderator ends with the

January 2010 meeting. No action has been taken by anybody to do anything at that point in time except the committee that he's a member of has written back to Ms. Lattimore saying, you're right, it probably was a violation of our procedure but the extenuating circumstances we're going to leave it that way. Once he's no longer moderator in April 2010, he prepares and requests and submits to the presbytery a motion to rescind that action, that action of approval of the appointment and the adoption of Ms. Azar as that position. He was not at that presbytery meeting in 2010.

Another, Ms. Lattimore did offer the motion. There was a lot of exchange in that time frame April 2010 just before the presbytery meeting about six or seven days before. One part of the exchange that went on during that time frame was executive presbytery provided Mrs. Azar with a heads up, this motion is coming and I want you to know about it and stated clerk talked about e-mails talking about here's the way the parliamentary process and procedure we're going to use at that meeting, presbytery meeting.

One of the things this jumps out at that point in time is an e-mail at that point in time, now talking about April 2010, that Ms. Azar said to the presbytery, what can we do to bring charges against Mr. Priest and Ms. Lattimore, because this is just a wreck? And they are told and response, here's where you go to find out how to do a complaint. So a

Now, the timing, I submit to this committee, is a big issue, something I would really want to know about. Why Ms. Azar, why from March of '09 when he makes his report with Mr. Edwards present -- I'm not sure what Mr. Edwards remembers -- why was nothing taken until this motion came up by a member of presbytery? Any member of the presbytery has a right to make a motion, and there's nothing wrong with making motion. May not agree with it and you could certainly vote them down, but why did nothing go on until after the motion came forward over being deposed in April 2010, thirteen months later.

The presbytery at the April 27 meeting did not deal with that motion directly. The presbytery at that motion, at that meeting heard a motion by another who said, I move that we not hear that motion. I object to it and move we not hear it. So presbytery voted on that issue and that issue prevailed and the motion that Mr. Priest was offered was not heard, read, made, voted on per se.

I will submit to you in July 2010, Mr. Priest and Elder Dorothy Seabrooks and Ms. Lattimore filed a complaint with the Senate about that process, that is how can you deny a motion and rule it out of order before you ever had a motion made? Is that appropriate process, is there an issue here? That has since been dismissed for jurisdiction. Mr. Priest was not at the meeting so he did not have standing.

The other motion of the other two was a day late in being filed, so it was dismissed as not timely, that's all.

In the meantime, the complaint had been filed by Ms. Azar and Mr. Priest's sponsoring church along with investigative committee and began hearing. The presbytery did not form an investigative committee. This committee did and the Book of Order gives you the power to look into things, but not in the form of investigative committee. So we would submit to you that if you look at all of the facts and all of the documents and all of the records, and hear all of the witnesses -- for example, Mr. Edwards is given a statement saying I was there in March 2009 at the meeting with Mr. Priest and Ms. Azar and myself to figure out how the directors of the two urban ministries program of presbytery of Detroit can work together and share information and resources. There's nothing in this statement, nothing in this statement that says Mr. Priest made disparaging remarks, didn't listen, abused his authority or did anything racial or made any racial statements or acted in any way untoward toward Ms. Azar or the Second Mile. I have his statement here and submit it to be part of the record if there's no objection. But in essence, he's saying this is the one that was difficult when I read it. I received this yesterday.

CPM shared with me that Tom and Ruth had several meetings which I had not attended. Mr. Priest would tell you

that was his second meeting with her and all the meetings he ever had. And CPM representatives, I felt they already made up their minds before they come and meet with me since they waited so long to find out what happened. CPM representatives assured me they did not form an opinion. Time delay was due to them just getting information April 2010. So I read that particular paragraph to show again the time line that 13 months after the fact, 13 months after the last meeting, there are charges made by Mrs. Azar, charges that are disciplinary in nature which are very damaging to Mr. Priest, charges which accuse him of very serious offenses if true.

This committee says one of the concerns we have is with the use of authority. Nothing that Mr. Priest did in March of '09 was as moderator of the presbytery. In fact, there's no evidence that says he came in and said, I'm the moderator, I want to do this. The evidence is that he was there doing a study and he shared results of that study as a student with his school and with the two centers. Mr. Edwards will share that this is what I heard him say. So what authority is he exercising in '09? He is the moderator of the presbytery. He is on the coordinating cabinet. But while as a moderator, nothing came up at a presbytery meeting that he swayed, oversaw, or did, or any actions taken by him there against Second Mile. In fact, as a member of the coordinating cabinet he was part of the cabinet's discernment and

discussion when they responded to Ms. Lattimore's concern that, yes, we didn't follow procedure but you're correct, but this isn't the case to change it. We will leave it as is.

So that whole year '09 when he's in that position of moderator and member of that committee, where is any evidence that he used his authority against Second Mile Center or Ms. Azar? And we take strong exception to that inclusion, that he abused his authority, which is a very serious charge. But we will say this at this point too, if the conclusion of those listed in trying to discern as this sounds like that to us, certainly apologize and begs forgiveness because that's not who he is or what he was trying to do and that's a misperception of what actually happened on that occasion.

But you cannot point to any place in any record of the presbytery or in the coordinating cabinet, you cannot point to any evidence there that says here, here's when he abused his power, here's where he over-used his authority, here's where he took advantage of that authority. And the motion was made in April 2010 by him to look into the issue, not Ms. Azar, but look into the issue of, can we allow folks to be put in presbytery positions without following our process and procedure, and if not, what should we do about situations for that to occur. He has the right to make that motion as member of the presbytery. Is that an abuse of his authority? He disagreed and goodness knows I go to presbytery

meetings all the time, people disagree. Is that an abuse of authority? I submit that is not.

It says at that time, Mr. Priest did not notify
Second Mile he was taking his findings and interpretations of
findings to presbytery. There's no evidence he took them to
presbytery at the time that he was moderator or member of
coordinating cabinet. Now, did it come up at some later time
to the presbytery when he made the motion? Sure. But is that
wrong to at that point in time raise it in support of his
motion? He says he didn't use that same influence and
authority to provide opportunity to Second Mile and voice and
actions intended to dramatically affect him. He was not
moderator. He was not dysfunction if he filed a motion to
tell them this is the motion per se. The motion is not
directed at them per se, although certainly can be perceived
that way.

I submit to you the conclusion drawn about abuse of authority is, we submit, overreaching.

Now the committee also observed a consistent pattern of prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening. All of us need to be better listeners, and if he's not a good listener I think this committee ought to encourage him to be a better listener and encourage him to take training in being a better listener. Mediation skills, I don't know if he needs that. I'm a mediator. I certainly handle hundreds

and hundreds of mediations in my life time, does that train you to listen? Yes. So does counseling courses I took in seminary, they trained me to listen. So years of practice of law trained me to listen. Lots of places you can go to learn to listen. Not everybody's a good listener. The bible tells you over and over, hear, see. Always enjoy the line, God gave us two ears and one tongue, two eyes and one tongue, so suggests I need to hear twice as much as I talk. I know you want me to shut up now.

I think those are two serious things, abuse of authority and persistent pattern of prejudging. I think if you sat and listened to Mr. Priest, find out who he is. He's a man, middle age, hearing the call of God to serve, to be a minister of the word and sacrament. How easy it would be to say I'm too old, too many other things going on, but he's here and listening to the Holy Spirit. He cares about people. Is he an African-American concerned about issues of justice and fairness? Yes, but all of us are whether we're

African-American, otherwise. We as Christians certainly heard the words of our Lord speaking to us and walk humbly before our God and seek justice and love mercy.

Tom Priest I know is that way. I think the gentleman here with us today, say the Tom Priest that they know is that way. Does that mean he's not to speak out on issues where he doesn't think it's right? If a job is going

to be offered in a minority area is it right not to have it advertised so it can be filled by someone who may not have gone through that process? I think that's fair to raise that question. Maybe in this case we wished he hadn't, but is it fair to raise it? I think there's folks here who raised questions about that before.

Now, the suggestion that there's something wrong being fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry, I don't know that that's objectionable, but if being fiercely devoted is a problem, we again beg forgiveness. I don't think that's really what the issue is here.

Seems to me in looking at the charges, concerns as they are called, dealing with authority and consistent patterns and assumptions of knowing more than others know. I think those are admonitions that he needs, fair to say them and tell him he needs to be concerned about those things, but not in the context of a disciplinary proceeding, not in a context where every word is being taken down and preserved for goodness knows what purpose, not in the context of investigating a complaint of this committee that doesn't have the authority to do them, investigating presbytery itself.

Seems to me when we on CPM approach a candidate we're here for two functions. Gatekeeping surely and we have to do that.

But nurturing too, and I commend you because I think your report does seek to provide, nurture, gatekeeping and nurture

and comes to the recommendation. Frankly, we're fine with the recommendation and perhaps would even say let's go with them but not with the conclusions and not with the report and not with the process.

So when we conclude all of this, what we ask you to do is not approve this report as it's written, because it makes a very strong statement about this man that could be damaging for the rest of his, potentially damaging for the rest of his career, but to adopt the recommendations and say we reviewed the report and we mark it as receive. We do not adopt the report but we do believe that the recommendations, we do accept the recommendations. As our moderator has said, Ms. Bohn said at the beginning, often CPM's do require additional steps not particularly spelled out in the Book of Order, but certainly in the purview of determining suitability and nurture. I think it would be appropriate to assure yourselves that, one, this man is ready to go forward at some point in time. I think you ought to do that, but to assign to him fault and to investigate him in this way and determine that he has violated certain steps and proceedings, I would encourage you not to do that.

I appreciate your listening to me and letting me go through this. I can take you through the evidence. I brought copies of all the documents I referred to that if you would like to have them. I got Mr. Priest here. I got Mr. Edwards

here. We can go through any or all of this, but we will ask you in the long run don't adopt this report as is stated but do seek to discern ways to assure that this man is ready at the appropriate time and he wants to continue in the process. He wants to be, to answer the call that he believes God is making to him to be ordained in word and sacrament and serve in that capacity. It would be very easy just to say, no, we hear that but our committee did this and they're good people and we're not going to budge. This is our committee and we're right. I submit to you if we considered every fact fully, you come to a different conclusion number one. And number two, I would submit to you in a court of law which my arena has been for 35 years before I became a lawyer on this side of the house, minister lawyer, this is a case evidentially Ms. Azar's case would not stand up, be dismissed and investigative committee heard the evidence that was their conclusion. They did not press charges. Obviously they're not a commission or a court. They have to decide whether there's probable cause. That's the lesser standard of necessity of guilt.

Mr. Wallace said. I just want to give you an idea when I met with him I drove overnight to Richmond, Virginia, where he's stationed, where he lives. And I stayed at a hotel, he told me I should never stayed at, but I went to school in DC in that area so I knew the area. But as Mr. Wallace says, not under the conditions of being portrayed in this manner.

against you of harassment, sexual -- racial insensitivity, and I think some gender inequality, I was going there with that comment? What is then the motivation in your bottom line for what her actions were, the fact that she fabricated these allegations as retribution toward you for the role you saw yourself necessarily having to play in her appointment?

The allegations, and I understand you be defensive in that situation, but the allegations have been dismissed for lack of evidence and I'm not concerned about the allegations, but I am concerned how he functions with relation to this committee.

REV. KOSTER: As a point of order, we don't know why the allegations were dismissed. The Book of Order says that an investigative committee must decide whether it has the evidence to prove it, whether they have considering the people who testified and evidence they have. They could say they didn't violate the constitution, we don't know. So your

Elder Thomas Priest was not in attendance at the presbytery meeting at which the action in question was taken by the presbytery and therefore, does not have standing. Both Elder Rosy Latimore and Elder Dorothy Seabrooks were in attendance and enrolled as elder commissioners at this meeting so therefore, the answer is yes.

D-6.0305c the complaint was timely filed

The complaint was received by the Synod office on Tuesday, July 27, 2010 which is at least ninety-one days after the date of the presbytery meeting. The Synod office was open on Monday, July 26, 2010 on which the documents could have been delivered. Therefore, the answer is no.

D-6.0305d the complaint states a claim upon which relief can be granted.

According to Robert's Rules of Order (10<sup>th</sup> edition), the motion, *Objection to the Consideration of a Question*, is one of a category of motions known as incidental Motions. Incidental Motions relate to "pending" business or other business at hand. (RONR, page 66, ¶15). "The purpose of an Objection to the Consideration of a Question is to enable the assembly to avoid a particular original main motion altogether when it believes it would be strongly undesirable for the motion even to come before the assembly." (RONR, page 258, ¶ 25) This indicates that the procedures used during the Presbytery meeting of April 27, 2010, while unusual, were not out of order. Because the action of the presbytery in dealing with this matter was in order and because the SPJC cannot force a Presbytery to applogize to its own assembly, the SPJC cannot grant the relief requested. Therefore the answer is no.

Since two of the four Preliminary Questions have been answered in the negative, the officers of the Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod of the Covenant have determined that this case cannot be accepted. The request from the Presbytery Committee of Counsel to dismiss this case will not be considered since the case is not being accepted.

If any party to this case, or any member of the Synod Permanent Judicial Commission, wish to challenge the findings of the moderator and clerk of the PJC they may do so under the provisions of the Rules of Discipline D-6.0306. Such challenges should be sent to me at the synod office address.

#### 1. Call to Order:

CPM co-chair Beth Downs called the meeting to order at 9 am with prayer. The minutes were approved, as corrected

#### 2. Introductions:

All members were introduced and the following were seated: Tom Priest, Stanley Edwards, elder Calvary Pres, Darryl Reynolds, elder Calvary, Rev. Archibald Wallace, attorney and advisor to Tom Priest, Mrs. Courter as court reporter, Christine Bohn as member of the Investigative Committee, and Ed Koster, Clerk of Presbytery.

#### 3. Motion to Approve Agenda:

The agenda was approved

#### 4. Explanation of Purpose and Process:

Beth Downs reminded the committee that we are reconvening the CPM hearing on the motion to adopt the report and recommendations of the investigative sub-committee regarding the complaint of Ruth Azar, of Second Mile Center, against Tom Priest, candidate. The investigative committee included David Abbott, Christine Bohn (COM), Elizabeth Rice, and Henry Johnson. Beth urged fairness and diligence in our task to assess the report, and to determine Tom's fitness for ministry, in accordance with the process outlined in the Book of Order, and the manual for CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit. We do not have function or power to determine disciplinary action, and this is not a legal or disciplinary hearing.

#### 5. Hearing Stage

- On February 1, 2011, a motion was made and seconded to adopt the Investigating Committee's
  report and recommendations. Having been postponed and not withdrawn, it was still on the floor.
  The Investigating Committee's report and recommendations were read. This report can be found on
  the POD Caucus website.
- Mr. Wallace acknowledged CPM's right and responsibility to evaluate suitability for ministry, but
  maintained that the style and tone of the report and process of the investigative committee are
  disciplinary in nature and therefore in excess of that right.
- Mr. Wallace responded to the issues raised in the report, specifically: that Mr. Priest did not abuse
  his authority as Moderator of the Presbytery; and that Mr. Priest values justice and equity highly and
  never intended prejudice or malice in any interactions he had with Ms. Azar.
- Mr. Wallace submitted that Mr. Priest does not object to the recommendations of the sub-committee, but to the nature of the report, its conclusions, and the process by which this has been handled.
   They requested that the committee approve the recommendations, but not the report.
- Mr. Priest stated that he is committed to his call to ministry, and submits to the authority of this body
  and the recommendations for growth and training. He suggested that all parties involved should be
  offered the training as an opportunity to build community. He maintained that any conflict resolution
  should include all involved.
- Mr. Wallace submitted a narrative from Mr. Stan Edwards, elder, Calvary Presbyterian Church and director of Barnabas Center, about his participation in the meetings with Tom (copy attached).
- The committee went into executive session. Mr. Koster was asked to remain.

#### 7. Executive Session

 The approved minutes of this session are sealed and on file in the offices of the Presbytery of Detroit.

#### 8. Move to Open Session

- The Committee returned to open session. While in executive session, the Committee adopted
  the report and recommendations of the CPM Subcommittee Convened in the Matter of Complaint
  by Ruth Azar against Thomas H. Priest, Jr, dated January 18, 2011, as follows:
- After considerable discussion, a motion is made to separate the report from the recommendations. Second. Votes to approve 10, to oppose 8. The motion passed.
- The motion to adopt the report is approved.
- A motion on the floor is to adopt the recommendations. A question was raised about including objective measurements of progress.
- A motion was made that in addition to the mediation training. Mr. Priest return to this committee to report on what he learned, and then as a follow-on he participate in a psychological assessment.
   Withdrawn.
- A motion was made to adopt the recommendations, amended as follows:

# CPM SUBCOMMITTEE CONVENED IN THE MATTER OF COMPLAINT BY RUTH AZAR AGAINST CANDIDATE THOMAS H. PRIEST, JR. Date of Report - January 18, 2011

#### Introduction

After prayerful consideration, the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, on May 4, 2010, authorized the formation of a subcommittee to investigate the above referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbott, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to CPM concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

- concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC)
- disturbing statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC
- a perception that SMC was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included:

- · a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context
- Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and SMC work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries
- his preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of SMC.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to SMC and Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and a later meeting at SMC.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and further planning.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at SMC.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011.

#### Central Issues

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### Recommendations

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

[This assessment will include asking Mr. Priest to present a report on what he has learned personally and professionally.

CPM requires Mr. Priest to subsequently undergo professional assessment through Midwest Career Counseling Center. CPM will furnish Midwest with the CPM Sub-Committee report and require that Midwest furnish their assessment to CPM.

Pastoral counseling may also be helpful in Mr. Priest's learning and healing through this process, and CPM encourages Mr. Priest to pursue that option.]

  examining Liz on her responses to Form 3, a motion was made to sustain her annual
  consultation. Seconded. Approved. Upon examining Liz on her statement of faith, her exegesis
  and her sermon, a motion was made and seconded to grant her final assessment and give her
  permission to circulate her PIF. Approved. Liz was dismissed with prayer.
- Group C met with Monlque Fube for Annual Consultation (CLP, Rice). A motion was made to
  continue her in the learning phase of CLP, while urging her to complete her field placement.
   Seconded. Approved. Although she submitted her exam after the due date, a recommendation
  is made to proceed to grade it. Jenny McDevitt and Judi McMillan agreed to help. Monique was
  dismissed with prayer.
- Group D met with Cynthia Rouse-Baird for Annual Consultation (CLP, Barbara Jackson). Group D does not recommend any action to be taken by CPM at the moment. They recommend that we not te-sustain her annual consultation, because her paperwork was late, incomplete and her written responses hard to evaluate. This is a time for discernment for her and the committee. She has yet to decide if she will retake the exam. The committee requests a follow-up assessment with Cynthia in two months. Tom raised concerns about the lack of appropriate care and nurture provided by the committee, lack of clear instructions, and constructive feedback. Cynthia was dismissed with prayer.

#### 10. Business:

- Report from Al Timm:
  - o Al reported on the clergy event in February. It was well received, and 8 candidates attended.
  - There will be a workshop on stewardship on March 26, at Ypsilanti. Robert Hunter is the presenter.
  - Al will offer a course on Polity at ETS in the Fall, depending on what the educators want, either Al or Ed Koster will teach it.
- Sub-committee Reports:
  - Lay Pastor Preparation Sub-Committee Report (formerly CLP report).
    - The committee will meet in April at 9:30 am, focusing on the issue of the final examination for the CLP candidates. Larry has collected other samples for the committee to compare and consider for the recommendation for the format of the examination.
  - Ordination Exams The exam results are due in about two weeks.
  - o Session Relations No new business.
  - CPM Retreat No new business to be reported.
- Coordinating Cabinet Operations requests us to describe what we would require in an
  associate executive presbyter. Richard Brownlee will attend in March. Betsy will attend in April.
- Liaison Reports:
  - c We need a new tlaison for David Ch, who is currently working in California.
  - c We thank David Abbott for his faithful service, and relieve him of any co-opt responsibilities.

- There are three other people who would like to be reassigned to a new liaison. We need to assess how assignments are made, rather than default to whoever raises their hand.
- We need to ensure appropriate liaison oversight. Larry suggests a half-day retreat to regroup for reorientation, Richard recommends that the covenant include clear responsibilities on the candidate's part.

There being no further business, CPM adjourned at 3:50 pm with prayer. The next gathering of CPM is scheduled for April 5, 2011 at 11:00 am at Drayton Plains Community Church, Waterford. Tom Hartley and Beth Downs will be our hosts, and Larry Gage will lead in prayer.

Trustees. Donald Morgan reported for the Trustees.

<u>Upon motion</u> of the Trustees, Presbytery voted to close Divine Word Presbyterian Church (formerly known as Dearborn Woods Presbyterian Church) November 1, 2011, and transfer its assets to First Presbyterian Church (USA) of Wyandotte, at the request of its session and congregation and pursuant to a plan of joining that has been reviewed by the Trustees.

The Trustees reported the following for the information of Presbytery:

- 1. In response to requests to release principal from the Ranney Balch Fund, the Trustees reviewed the matter at their October meeting. They noted that they have decided and announced that they will not release any capital in 2011. They decided that they would consider whether to release funds from the principal at its January 2012 meeting. The Trustees note that they have released \$42,131 of income for use in 2012, which is included in the 2012 Mission Budget before the Presbytery this evening.
- 2. The Trustees have reviewed and endorsed settlement proposal parameters from the Gratiot Avenue Administrative Commission that will be submitted to the Clark, Hill Law Firm (attorneys for the Gratiot AC) for such purposes as counsel may determine useful in the litigation.

#### Policy P-23 Policy on Special Committees for Local Church Matters

Local congregations sometimes seek to do things to further or end their ministries that require consideration or actions by the Presbytery. These include but are not limited to: closing; merger; consolidation (closing of one church and moving the members and assets to another); yoking parishes. The Presbytery responsibilities, authorities, and powers when these matters are proposed are very broad and cover a wide range of issues.

When churches contemplate such an action, they shall contact the Executive Presbyter. The Executive Presbyter shall prepare and submit to the Coordinating Cabinet a proposal for the creation by Presbytery of a special committee, along with suggested members. The minimum number of this special committee shall be three.

The duties of the special committee will be to ensure that the steps and actions cited below are properly taken. It shall have the authority to solicit appropriate committees, teams, and staff of the Presbytery to advise the committee, churches, sessions, staff and pastors, to take such acts as necessary for facilitation, and to conduct such activities as necessary. When all steps have been properly addressed, the special committee shall propose the consummating act to Presbytery for its approval, which resolution shall include a report that the necessary steps have been accomplished according to this policy.

The matters that the special committee shall address shall include the following (as appropriate to the specific issue):

#### 40 Organizational issues

- Configuration of session to ensure fairness, continuity and preservation of memories.

- Where more than one pastor is involved, determining the status of each pastor.

#### 60 Process

- Consultation with sessions and congregations individually and collectively.
- Creation and approval of the plan for union
- A rational sequence of meetings of sessions and congregations to ensure that all parties are sufficiently informed of all issues and freely agree to them.
- Approval by the sessions and then the congregations of each entity independently for approval of the plan of union, bylaws of the new church, and the corporate acts to create or dissolve.
- Proposing the final act to the Presbytery.

#### **Definitions**

Closing: The process by which a church dissolves as a congregation and a corporation. When a church closes, all its property reverts to the Presbytery. When a congregation shuts down, the session remains until the corporation affairs are fully concluded, frequently including the sale of the property. Members not transferred to other churches before closing are transferred to the Presbytery.

Consolidation: This is a term not found in the Book of Order. In a consolidation, a church closes but requests Presbytery to authorize the transfer of all property to a different Presbyterian Church. The church then closes using the ordinary procedures for closing. Before closing, the members who desire are transferred to the church with which they are consolidating. The transfer of the property to the new church requires approval of the congregation and Presbytery. Note: Under state corporation law, this process is called a merger. The transfer of the property

82 to the receiving church requires approval of the closing congregation and 83 Presbytery. If the transfer includes real property, the approval requires the vote of the congregation. Note: Under state corporation law, this process may be called a 84 85 merger. Merger: This is a term found in the Book of Order. In a merger, two congregations 86 87 become one. Their membership, assets and property are joined. Each individual church is dissolved and a new corporation is formed. The General Assembly 88 89 assigns a new PIN number to the new congregation. Note: Under state corporation 90 law, this process is called a consolidation. Plan of Union: When there is a yoking, consolidation or merger, the effect is to bring 91 two congregations together. This requires significant planning and agreement 92 93 about how it will happen: session configuration; use of endowments; worship 94 styles; pastoral relationships, and a myriad of other considerations. In order to ensure that there is full understanding and agreement for what will happen once 95 96 the voking/merger/consolidation occurs, the congregations of both churches must agree on a written Plan of Union. 97 Yoking: When two churches are of a size, configuration, geographical location, and 98 99 financial situation that make it difficult for both to support a pastor, they may yoke. When churches yoke, they agree to share a single called pastor. This 100

#### Activity:

The Global Village project at Howell Nature Camp and Conference Center. This project is connected To the Heifer Project. The Heifer Project is an educational project here in the United States. It is also a project that gives farm animals to people in third world countries so they and their communities can improve their standard of living. The Global Village educates children and adults as to the reality of life in poverty. There are three levels of involvement. A two hour program introduces

children to poverty throughout the world. The four hour program is more intense. The overnight program is a total emersion in the experience of poverty in several forms. This program educates about 3000 adults and children in a year.

The purpose of this letter is to request a cure to a delinquency that occurred at this past Presbytery meeting June 28, 2011. A letter addressed to me Clerk of Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church – Detroit from Ms. Ruth Azar was placed on the table at the Presbytery meeting. The letter expressed her disappointment with the investigating committee of Calvary Presbyterian Church deciding not to file charges against Thomas Priest. Now, according to the policies of the Presbytery of Detroit, the official and unofficial tables of the Presbytery meeting are the responsibilities of the Coordinating Cabinet. CC-1.1 states "There shall be two tables at presbytery meetings: one for business papers and one for papers of an informational nature... Placing of papers on the tables *must* be approved by the Stated Clerk, the Executive Presbyter or a presbytery unit. The Stated Clerk shall be informed in advance of all papers, which are to be distributed at a presbytery meeting." Either Ms. Ruth Azar was given permission to place this letter on the table in advance, or she took it upon herself to place this letter on the table. As a staff person of the Presbytery of Detroit, I'm certain, that she would be aware that this is improper. In any event, we allege that this is a delinquency since the coordinating cabinet did not follow proper procedure in verifying what documents were placed on the table and neither that Calvary Presbyterian Church nor its investigating committee was afforded the same opportunity if Ruth Azar was in fact given permission to place her letter on the table.

Ruth Azar's letter states that "after much prayer, being in the word and seeking God's face," she was electing not to appeal the decision of the investigating committee. This letter was only shared with the investigating committee, to see if they wanted to respond to her letter. The investigating committee felt it best to just let this matter lie in the interest of reconciliation and Christianity. The fact of the matter is however, that Ruth Azar tells some untruths in her letter.

For instance, she alleges that the investigating committee interviewed Sandra Addrow while her sister was in intensive care. The truth of the matter is that Ms. Addrow's sister was in fact having a "treatment" done, and she was asked if she wanted to reschedule the interview to which she responded no she wanted to "get it over with". It took the investigating committee approximately 3 – 4 hours to complete her interview because every time a health care professional came into the room, Ms. Addrow ended the conversation to hear what was said. Furthermore, Ms. Azar requested that this letter be read into the session minutes, but in light of the investigating committee deciding not to file charges, this was not proper. Nonetheless, once she decided not to petition the session or the PJC to review the decision of the investigating committee not to file charges that is where it should have ended. To our dismay, this letter ends up on a public table at a Presbytery wide meeting for everyone to see with only one side of the story. This is just a couple of instances where Ms. Azar isn't truthful. However, there was an avenue for Ms. Azar to avail herself of in order to have any questions regarding the investigation answered i.e. how the committee selected whom to interview and why. Again, she chose not to utilize the process.

This letter penned by Ruth Azar was inflammatory and slanderous. It shed a bad light on Calvary Presbyterian Church, and implied that our church's investigating committee did not fulfill the duties as specified by the Book of Order. It also implied that a predominantly African American church could not be impartial and carry out an investigation on an African American individual that was also a member of their congregation. This is simply not true. The members of the investigating committee did a very thorough job despite the fact that the person alleging a complaint ignored three calls, one to her cell phone and two to her office to her to hear her side of the story. Every other individual involved made themselves available regardless of any inconvenience that it may have caused them yet the person that claimed to be offended, oppressed and violated, simply chose not to return a phone call.

The cure that Calvary Presbyterian Church is demanding is a public apology from the Coordinating Cabinet to Calvary at the next Presbytery meeting, and an opportunity for Calvary to circulate a document(s) on the papers table likewise giving Calvary's response to Ruth Azar's letter.

Dear Ms. Favors,

Members of Presbytery's Coordinating Cabinet, by a unanimous action at Cabinet's October Stated Meeting, requested that an open letter be written to the Session of the Calvary Presbyterian Church. Cabinet wishes to extend to each member of the Calvary Session a most heartfelt corporate apology. We are profoundly apologetic that the Policies of the Presbytery of Detroit were violated and therefore you were offended.

The Coordinating Cabinet recognizes that when Ms. Azar's letter was placed on the table of Official Presbytery Documents at the June 2011 Stated Meeting of the Presbytery for distribution, it resulted in hurt and disappointment. We take your feelings seriously. The Cabinet believes this experience was unnecessary and unwarranted.

We want the Calvary Session to know that the Cabinet has taken several steps to respond to this matter. Cabinet reviewed this matter of its own volition at its August stated meeting. Ruth Azar issued an apology to the Cabinet during this review. The cabinet accepts her apology as a sincere and heartfelt gesture.

Cabinet reaffirms Presbytery policy and procedure for the distribution of documents and papers at Stated Meetings of the Presbytery. Additional steps are being considered and will be taken to further identify several issues for members, friends and visitors to Presbytery Stated Meetings. There is a distinction between official and unofficial documents. Appropriate distribution of documents will be spelled out in more careful and complete detail.

Finally, The Coordinating Cabinet of Presbytery further requests that the Session of Calvary, in the Spirit of reconciliation, not distribute any additional papers or documents at Presbytery on this matter. Cabinet believes further distribution of documents would not be helpful or graceful. The cause of reconciliation will be advanced if further distribution of documents on this sensitive matter cease.

Cabinet recognizes this dispute represents feelings which run deeper than this particular incident. The Cabinet is working together collectively to embrace additional wisdom. Our prayer is that we can learn the steps to take that will support and reflect a beloved community of grace and justice.

# PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT Respondent

#### STATEMENT OF CHALLENGE

On August 9, 2011 Thomas H. Priest, Jr. ("Thomas H. Priest or Mr. Priest" herein), as Complainant, instituted his Remedial Case in this Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod of the Covenant, complaining of irregularities in the action taken against him which began on March 1, 2011 and were completed on March 18, 2011 by the Presbytery of Detroit, by and through its agent, the Committee on Preparation for the Ministry ("CPM" herein). (A copy of his Complaint is attached as Exhibit A.) 1

In his Complaint Thomas Priest charges: (1) that the Presbytery, acting by and through its agent, its CPM, impermissibly conducted the equivalent of a disciplinary hearing against him without authority and without affording him the procedural and substantive due processes (fundamental fairness) guaranteed to every member of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) church whether in a properly filed disciplinary proceeding under D-10.010, et seq, of the Book of Order or in an administrative inquiry, where the

discipline of an individual is the result; (2) that the actions of the Stated Clerk in establishing, participating in and shaping the result of the investigation throughout by the Presbytery's agent, its CPM, was impermissible, especially when the Clerk knew that a separate disciplinary investigation was already underway in another of the Church's Courts; and, (3) that the Presbytery's actions, acting by and through its agent, its CPM, could and did constitute double jeopardy against Complainant.

The Officers of this Commission determined August 9, 2011 that the four jurisdictional grounds of D-6.0305 had not been met, namely that the SPJC lacked jurisdiction to consider Remedial Case 2011-04 because (a) complainant <u>lacked standing</u> to file the case, D-6.0305b; (b) the complaint was <u>not timely filed</u>, D-6.0305c; (c) the complaint <u>failed to state a claim</u> upon which relief could be granted, D-6.0305d, and, (d) the SPJC <u>lacked jurisdiction</u> to consider the complaint, D-6.0305a. While the officers of this Commission did not give reason for concluding the four jurisdictional grounds were missing, Complainant will explore each of the grounds using the Answer of the Respondent as basis for this challenge.

#### a. The Complainant lacks standing to file the case under D-6.0305b.

Thomas A. Priest was at all times pertinent to the events surrounding and related to the irregularities complained of herein enrolled as a Candidate under the care of the Presbytery for purposes of becoming a Minister of the Word and Sacrament.<sup>2</sup> As a Candidate he is subject to the control and oversight of the Presbytery's Committee for the Preparation for Ministry (COM), the Presbytery's designated agent for such oversight. However, simply saying CPM has been granted oversight, does not elevate CPM or its activities to the level of the Presbytery, except for those powers specifically granted to it. Being enrolled as a Candidate means Mr. Priest of necessity has to be a member of the

Presbytery and subject to its direct rule and control for the limited purposes of its constitutionally granted oversight, whether through its own actions or those granted its CPM. The Presbytery disagrees, saying Mr. Priest has standing to file a Complaint only for irregularities perpetrated upon him in the church of his membership, unless he is then enrolled as a member of Presbytery for a particular Presbytery meeting. Complainant disagrees. Under the reasoning of the Presbytery, there is no place Mr. Priest could go for relief from any disciplinary action taken against him by a Presbytery's CPM, because he was not then a member commissioned to a then designated presbytery meeting and the Presbytery was not then meeting. That was never the intention of the framers of our church's constitutional documents. The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has declared repeatedly, it is always to be guided by the twin pole stars of Decency and Order.

Under G-14.041d, an individual enrolled by a Presbytery as an Inquirer or a Candidate continues to be an active member of his or her particular church and subject to the concern and discipline of that particular church's Session, for most things, but, in matters relating to his preparation for ministry, once the individual is "enrolled" in the Presbytery he is thereafter also subject to the oversight, control and discipline of the presbytery through the Presbytery itself and through its constitutionally designated agents for specific purposes, such as its Committee on Preparation for Ministry or its PJC. G-11.0103e requires a CPM to submit the names of individuals to be voted on as Inquirers and Candidates for ministry to the Presbytery. Once approved, they are "enrolled" on the Presbytery's Rolls and thereafter afforded limited membership to the extent necessary to proceed toward Ordination. Once enrolled, all Inquirers and Candidates come under the control of the Presbytery in this limited part through its designated constitutional agent, its CPM.

If the oversight and enrollment of candidates and inquirers does not constitute enrollment sufficient to enable a candidate to invoke the jurisdiction of this Commission for remedial relief, when a CPM, acting as agent for the Presbytery, acts beyond its power, then the actions of every CPM acting for and on behalf of the Presbytery must be deemed a nullity and of no effect. That is not the way our system works. It is inconceivable that a CPM, acting for and on behalf of the Presbytery or acting under its own direction and control could maintain the equivalent of a judicial proceeding against an individual and escape scrutiny for what are of necessity ultra vires acts merely by saying the Complainant lacks standing because he is not a member of the Presbytery.

It was never the intention of the General Assembly to create an immediately disenfranchised class in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), which could be denied the rights of Fundamental Fairness without some right to redress, if one or more persons or committees of the church abused the powers given or mistakenly assumed powers not given or improperly took action when not authorized.

The reason the term "enrolled" is used in the Book of Order is to elevate the Covenantal relationship of Inquirers and Candidates (G-11.0103b) to a position where both sides to this new Covenant of special relationship will be provided all of the constitutional safeguards of Fundamental Fairness inherent in the constitutional documents of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Notwithstanding the suggestion of the Presbytery that Mr. Priest can not seek any redress unless it is at his Session, he could never subject his Presbytery to the jurisdiction of his Session for the improper acts of his Presbytery he here complains of. His avenue of relief must be a right to challenge the irregularity in an appropriate church court above the level of the one causing the irregularity.

#### b. The Complaint was not timely filed under D-6.0305c.

The Decision of the Presbytery, acting by and through its agent, its CPM, to discipline the Complainant, was purportedly reached March 1, 2011 but it was not then announced: A decision was actually mailed March 18, 2011 and received March 21, 2011 by Mr. Priest. The written decision was not announced or proffered to Mr. Priest or his counsel on March 1, 2011. The written decision is not even dated until March 10, 2011. It was not released on that date but held until March 18, 2011 in spite of inquiry and request by Mr. Priest and his counsel for it during the interim.

While a suggestion of the direction CPM might go was voiced before the hearing on March 1, 2011 and again on March 5, 2011 (see the email of Complainant's counsel of the same day attached to the Presbyter's Answer to the Complaint), it was not known then what the particular findings would be or the scope of what CPM intended to do. A finding of the equivalent of guilty on a charge of reverse racial discrimination and the imposition of punitive measures, while recommended by CPM's Investigating Committee and approved by the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, was argued against as an irregularity by Mr. Priest at the March 1, 2011 hearing. Mr. Priest did not expect the findings stated in the final decision. On March 5, 2011 Complainant's counsel was advised the Report was still not complete and its provisions could not then be released. The formal Report was not released until March 18, 2011 and it was not until its receipt three days later that Complainant first knew of the severity of the action CPM had taken against him and of the irregularity practiced against him.

The Complaint in the instant proceeding was filed within ninety (90) days of the release of the Report, as is admitted in the Presbytery of Detroit's Answer at page thirteen (13) where it acknowledges a filing date of June 9, 2011.

The actionable irregularity complained of here did not culminate at the March 1, 2011 hearing. Rather, the actionable date could not commence the running of the limitations period until formal announcement of the decision which occurred at its release. Under the Rules of Discipline in our Church's Constitution, PJC's are required to prepare a written decision (D-7.0402c) while still in session and to release it forthwith. The reason for such a requirement is to prevent the mischief that can occur when a delay of weeks is grafted onto the process. Here, CPM met March 1, 2011, heard a summary presentation from its Investigating Committee, that day heard Mr. Priest's argument in response to the summary, deliberated and thereafter reached a tentative but unannounced decision that day subject to reducing it to written form. CPM then withheld its decision from Complainant for eighteen (18) days. The day of the release of its decision completed the irregularities complained of herein. The ninety (90) day clock could not begin to run until then, whether there is a notice requirement or not. The Complaint in this case was timely filed when it was received by the Stated Clerk of the Synod on June 9, 2011 – the eighty-first (81<sup>st</sup>) day following the date of the end of the irregularities. Even if the date placed on the Report is deemed to be the actionable date (March 10, 2011), filing on June 9, 2011 is also within the ninety (90) days allowed for filing.

- c. The Complaint failed to state a claim upon which relief could be granted under D-6.0305d.
- 1. The proceeding against Mr. Priest was labeled an Investigation. It carried other headers and markers indicating its true nature was a disciplinary proceeding. <sup>3</sup>

  Whether an administrative proceeding or a judicial proceeding, fundamental fairness is required under our Church's Book of Order, as particularized in Gaba v. Presbytery of

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup>The Agenda for the Hearing provided for a Court Reporter, had a Hearing Stage, and allowed him an Advocate, while the Committee was called an Investigating Committee.

Eastern Virginia, Remedial Case 204-11, (2004), Wolfe vs. Presbytery of Winnebago, Remedial Case 219-04 (2009) and Lewis v. Presbytery of New York City, Remedial Case 207-13, (1995). The denial of fundamental fairness (procedural and substantive due process) in a proceeding in which the result is disciplinary in nature has always been deemed to generate a claim sufficient for which relief can be granted.

- 2. While a CPM has the right and the power to determine a candidate's fitness for ministry, it can not do so using an approach not permitted within its stated powers (Complainant equates the act of CPM in usurping an authorized power with this country's law's regarding ultra vires acts). Determining fitness in a disciplinary proceeding has never been an enumerated power granted a CPM under any circumstance. Investigating Committees exist only under the Rules of Discipline of the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). If used, or if a proceeding is undertaken which in its every attribute is essentially the same as the action of an Investigating Committee under a Disciplinary Action, any person hurt by the misuse of this power, of necessity, should have a right to ask an appropriate church court to remedy the misuse as an irregularity.
  - d. The Synod's PJC lacks jurisdiction to hear the Complaint under D-6.0305a.

The argument advanced in the Presbytery's Answer is that a CPM is not a governing body. In those functions which require Presbytery action, such as an approval of an Applicant to become an Inquirer or Candidate, it is not. In those functions where CPM, acting as agent for its Presbytery, has the right to make final "oversight" decisions as to "enrolled" members subject to its jurisdiction, it is. And, in those functions in which a CPM is to carry out directions and decisions already made by the governing body (G-9.0501a), its action is the action of the Presbytery.

In this case, where CPM either did not ask, for approval of its action against Mr. Priest or, at most, only reported the action it took as to Mr. Priest to the Presbytery as a completed action, it was acting as the Presbytery (G-9.0501a). Under the facts of this case, in taking final action against Mr. Priest based on its impermissible investigation of Mrs. Azar's letter statement, its action was disciplinary in nature. As such, CPM was either acting for and as the Presbytery or it was acting beyond the powers granted to it. Either way, its action was irregular.

The Presbytery responds to this argument with a Catch 22 defense. It says a CPM is not a governing body, so that no action can be brought against it. This action is not against the CPM, per se. The Presbytery goes on to argue the action taken was that of a committee, so, nothing can be charged against the Presbytery, thus the Catch 22.

#### CONCLUSION

Complainant asks as a part of his Challenge under D-6.0306b that this pleading be accepted as an appropriate and timely filed Challenge, that he be allowed to present evidence and argument on the findings in question, and that he and the Respondent be allowed to submit Briefs prior to any hearing on the jurisdictional deficiencies challenged herein under a schedule designated by the PJC.

Complainant makes this Challenge to the decision of the Officers of the PJC dated August 9, 2011 and mailed to him by letter form the Moderator of the Synod's PJC dated August 19, 2011. In that letter the Moderator of the SPJC advised that Complainant could challenge the decision under D-6.0306, which Complainant hereby does within the thirty (30) days permitted under D-6.0306a.

#### COMPLAINT

Thomas H. Priest, Jr., a member of Calvary Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan, and an enrolled Candidate of the Presbytery of Detroit complains to the Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod of the Covenant concerning certain irregularities committed against him by the Presbytery of Detroit, acting by and through its agent, the Committee on the Preparation For Ministry (CPM), in that on March 1, 2011 the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting by and for the Presbytery, conducted a "Hearing" against Thomas Priest on the, "Form 26, Accusation By Individual As Statement of Offense," of Ruth Azar dated April 21, 2010 and submitted under D-10.0102a of the Discipline of the Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) with letter attached. See Exhibit A attached. While the CPM labeled the March 1, 2011 proceeding a Hearing as to the Suitability for Ministry of Thomas Priest, the entire proceeding was instead a Disciplinary Hearing against Thomas H. Priest. On March 18, 2011 CPM mailed notice of its decision to Mr. Priest, saying in essence Mr. Priest had

abused his authority as Moderator of the Presbytery, had exhibited prejudice and bias against others, and had routinely used methods of confrontation and intimidation to get his way. See Exhibit B, the Notification of the CPM's decision, Exhibit C, the Report of the CPM Subcommittee dated January 18, 2011, which was adopted March 1, 2011. At the March 1, 2011 CPM Meeting Mr. Priest (1) objected to the hearing claiming a disciplinary hearing by CPM was ultra vires, (2) cited the lack of fundamental fairness (procedural and substantive due process) in the conduct of the hearing, and (3) objected to the impropriety of the proceeding because it subjected Mr. Priest to double jeopardy, since a separate PJC disciplinary investigation of the complaint of Mrs. Azar had already been held, following which that Investigative Committee declined to initiate Disciplinary proceedings against Mr. Priest. See Exhibit D attached.

The decision of CPM was mailed March 18, 2011, and was received on March 21, 2011 by Mr. Priest. See Exhibit E attached. It is from this decision that Mr. Priest brings this Remedial Complaint, since the actions complained of are final under the delegated authority of the Presbytery to CPM and since the decision of CPM has not and will not be subject to Presbytery approval or disapproval at any subsequent meeting of the Presbytery.

#### The Irregularities

Mr. Priest states the following as Irregularities in the Actions taken by CPM:

1. The CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting as agent for and on behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit, conducted a disciplinary hearing against Mr. Priest on March 1, 2011 in violation of D-10.0100, et seq., of the Book of Order which empowers only permanent judicial commissions to hear and decide disciplinary charges.

- 2. The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit improperly referred the Complaint to the CPM or the Presbytery of Detroit for investigation and action in contravention of D-10.0103 of the Book of Order.
- 3. The CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting as agent for and on behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit, formed an Investigative Committee to consider the disciplinary charges and present its conclusions at a formal hearing. At the time of the March 1, 2001 Hearing CPM was aware that the same charges had been referred to an Investigative Committee of the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church, which had investigated the charges and declined to initiate formal disciplinary charges against Mr. Priest.
- 4. The Hearing of March 1, 2011 was Irregularly conducted in that Mr. Priest was denied the fundamental fairness guaranteed throughout the Book of Order for such proceedings in that he was not allowed:
  - a. to confront his accuser;
  - b. to call any witnesses;
  - c. to cross examine the Investigators, the accusers or any of the other witnesses; and
  - d. to know what the accuser or any witnesses said or see what any witness might have provided to the Investigating Committee; and
- 5. The findings of CPM of March 1, 2011, while said not to be disciplinary in nature, were in fact disciplinary and, as such, were beyond the scope of authority of CPM (ultra vires).

#### FACTUAL BACKGROUND

- 1. During the calendar year 2009 Elder Thomas H. Priest of Calvary
  Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan, served as Moderator of the Presbytery of
  Detroit. During that year Mr. Priest was also a student at Ecumenical Theological
  Seminary in Detroit Michigan, working toward an M. Div. Degree, which he was
  awarded later that year. On June 23, 2009 the Presbytery, after examination, enrolled Mr.
  Priest as a Candidate for the Ministry of Word and Sacrament at its June Presbytery
  Meeting.
- 2. As a part of one of Mr. Priest's classes in 2009 at Seminary, Mr. Priest evaluated two urban ministry centers in Detroit (the Barnabas Mission and Second Mile Center) using Ronald Peters,' *Urban Ministry* and John M. Perkins' *Beyond Charity* as guides. Mr. Priest's conclusions were that the Barnabas Mission was a mission of reconciliation and empowerment, under the *Peters'* guidelines, while the Second Mile Center would only qualify as a charitable mission. Mr. Priest conducted his field evaluation at the Second Mile Center on February 18, 2009. After completing his evaluations, Mr. Priest shared his findings with his Seminary class on March 9, 2009, with the Presbytery's Metropolitan Urban Ministry Team on March 12, 2009, and with members of the two centers involved on March 16, 2009. (A copy of the Power Point Presentation used by Mr. Priest in all three presentations is attached as Exhibit F)
- 3. On March 2, 2009, Mr. Priest, while serving as a member of the Presbytery's Coordinating Cabinet, participated in the Cabinet's consideration and approval of a recommendation that the Presbytery call Ruth Azar as Executive Director of Second Mile Creek. There is nothing in the minutes of that meeting to suggest Mr.

Priest objected in any way to the call. See Exhibit G attached. On June 23, 2009 the Presbytery approved the call of Ms. Azar to the Second Mile Center after a spirited effort to postpone the vote. Mr. Priest Moderated the Presbytery Meeting where the call was ultimately approved and did not participate in the discussions about postponement. See Exhibit H attached.

- 4. At the end of 2009 Mr. Priest ended his term as Moderator of the Presbytery. In October 2009, just before Mr. Priest's term as Moderator ended, the Coordinating Cabinet received a Report from Ed Koster, Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, about the way the Presbytery had handled the call of Ms. Azar to be Executive Director of Second Mile Center. The report was intended as response to the questions raised by some within the Presbytery as to whether the decision of the Presbytery to call Ms. Azar in June 2009 was proper or not. See Exhibit I attached. The solution suggested was to discharge Ms. Azar and go through the call process again. No action was taken on the issue before the end of 2009.
- still a member of the Coordinating Cabinet, Mr. Priest on April 5, 2010 advised the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of his intent to file a Motion with the Presbytery asking it to rescind its earlier action regarding the called position at Second Mile Center. A copy of the Motion was to be a part of the Presbytery Packet sent to all commissioners and was to be voted on at the April 27, 2010 Presbytery Meeting. A copy is attached as Exhibit J. On April 12, 2010, the Presbytery Executive emailed a copy of Mr. Priest's Motion to Ms. Ruth Azar to give her a "heads up" that the Motion was coming. See Exhibit K attached. Two days later, on April 14, 2010, Ms. Azar and two others responded, asking the Presbytery Executive what "charges" could be brought against Mr. Priest for what

they perceived to be harassment by Mr. Priest. See Exhibit L attached. The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery responded the same day, saying that charges could be brought under the Discipline against Mr. Priest, if Ms. Azar wished and, because Mr. Priest was under the care of Presbytery, a complaint could be made to CPM. See Exhibit M attached.

6. On April 21, 2010 Ms. Azar submitted a "Form No. 26, Accusation By Individual As Statement of Offense against Mr. Priest, citing D-10.0102a with letter attached as basis for the accusation (together her written statement), thereby invoking the procedure to be used when initiating a Disciplinary Case against a person under the jurisdiction of a governing body. See Exhibit A attached. In the Disciplinary Accusation Ms. Azar claimed Mr. Priest committed the offenses of racism. discrimination, and division against her and others at the Second Mile Center. Interestingly, the accusations related to the one day visit of Mr. Priest on February 18. 2009 to the Second Mile Center. No explanation was given in the Written Statement of Ms. Azar why the accusation had lain dormant for fourteen months. The Disciplinary Accusation was addressed to Rhonda Favors, Clerk of Session of Mr. Priest's home church and to Edward Koster, Stated Clerk of the Presbytery. The Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church immediately appointed an Investigating Committee as required by D-10.0201. Edward Koster, the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery sent the Charge to Presbytery's CPM and advised CPM how it could proceed with its own investigation without having to defer to the Presbyter's Permanent Judicial Commission or the Session of Mr. Priest's home church. Mr. Koster did not refer the Disciplinary Accusation to an Investigating Committee of the Presbytery as required by D-10.0201 of the Book of Order

- 7. On April 27, 2010 Mr. Priest's Motion to Rescind was brought to the floor of Presbytery but was not voted upon as to its merits because of procedural rulings. Mr. Priest was not in attendance at the meeting.
- 8. Ms. Azar's disciplinary charges were the subject of an extensive investigation by Calvary Presbyterian Church's Investigative Committee, including a hearing where Mr. Priest was allowed to address and refute the charges. On February 10, 2011, the Investigative Committee of Calvary Presbyterian Church issued its Conclusion of Investigation, advising that "no charges would be filed." This information was provided Presbytery's CPM, before it began its hearing on March 1, 2011; however, CPM went ahead with its hearing related to the same Charges.
- 9. On May 4, 2010 CPM established its own Investigative Committee and was guided in its investigation by the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery. CPM asked the Investigating Committee it appointed to investigate the accusations of Ms. Azar. The Investigating Committee recognized that the approach of CPM could be viewed as violative of the powers granted a CPM by the Book of Order, so the Investigating Committee in its Report of January 18, 2011 took pains to label its actions as advisory only, saying its intended purpose was to advise CPM on issues of Mr. Priest's suitability and not to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC (USA) was violated. Unfortunately, the stated intent was subverted by a deliberate use of the discipline of the church in a manner not permitted by the Constitution of the PC (USA). The result was the Committee's Report of January 18, 2011. See Exhibit C attached. At no time during its investigation was Mr. Priest given a copy of Ms. Azar's written statement, nor advised what Ms. Azar had said in her presentations to the Committee, nor given any information about the investigation. Subsequently, Mr. Priest was called to an August 9, 2010

meeting with the Investigating Committee where he was asked to discuss his actions on February 18, 2009 in light of the written statement of Ms. Azar. Both before and after the August 9, 2010 meeting the Investigating Committee met with and obtained testimony from other witnesses, some of whom it has not even named to date. None of the materials collected by the Investigating Committee were made available to Mr. Priest. At the end of its work, the Investigative Committee submitted its report dated January 18, 2011 to CPM with conclusions about Mr. Priest's behavior and with recommendations of what he should do to continue under the care of the Presbytery. Among the conclusions the Investigative Committee stated were Mr. Priest's,

- 1. abuse of his authority as Moderator of the Presbytery;
- 2. deceit in the identification of himself to the Second Mile Center employees;
- 3. misuse of his Presbytery office to influence the actions of the Presbytery against Second Mile Center;
- 4. denial of due process to Second Mile Center in not allowing it be heard regarding his Motion of April 2010;
- 5. bias against the opinions and experiences of others;
- 6. racism in his treatment of other racial-ethnic individuals; and,
- 7. misuse of confrontation and intimidation to achieved his will.

Each of these conclusions has been cited by PJC's across the church as basis for the imposition of discipline upon other minister members of the church. Here, the conclusions were reached without affording Mr. Priest the rights of fundamental fairness. Simply by labeling the proceedings as something other than a disciplinary proceeding. Mr. Priest was called to a Hearing on March 1, 2011 before the whole of CPM, to hear the report and respond to it. CPM advised before the Meeting that it intended on March 1, 2011 to receive the Report of the Investigating Committee of CPM and to act upon it.

Mr. Priest was given a copy of the proposed Agenda for the Meeting before the Hearing. This Agenda was adopted as the Agenda for that Hearing. See Exhibit N attached. He was not given a copy of the Report until just before the original date of the Hearing. In the Agenda adopted, CPM advised Mr. Priest that a court reporter would be present, that Mr. Priest could have an advocate, if he wished, and that there would be a time in the Meeting called the "Hearing Stage." CPM advised at the onset of the Hearing that the Investigative Committee would present its findings and report on the evidence it had collected but could not be subjected to cross examination or direct questioning. CPM also advised that none of the witnesses examined by the Investigative Committee would be present or available for cross examination. The procedure for the day only allowed Mr. Priest to submit his testimony and to argue his defense. CPM advised it intended to vote to adopt the Report but wanted to hear from Mr. Priest before it finally ruled. Inexplicably, the Stated Clerk, who had engineered the way the charges were handled by CPM was allowed to sit in with CPM during its deliberations and to advise CPM as to its actions. Mr. Priest was given time to argue his defense, but it mattered not, because the evidential basis for CPM's action (the evidence behind the Report of January 18, 2011) was unavailable and not disclosed throughout the meeting. On March 11, 2011 Mr. Priest received Notice of the decision of CPM. See Exhibit E attached. Because of this Notice Mr. Priest submits this Complaint to the PJC of the Synod of the Covenant, asking this tribunal to correct the Irregularities listed above through this Remedial Action.

#### **STANDING**

Thomas Priest states this permanent judicial commission has jurisdiction over his Complaint filed under D-6.0202, et seq., of the Book of Order in that

- 1. Complainant has standing to file this Complaint, since he is an elder of Calvary Presbyterian Church (PCUSA), a graduate of Ecumenical Theological Seminary with a Master of Divinity Degree and is enrolled under the care of the Presbytery of Detroit as a Candidate to become a Minister of the Word and Sacrament. Because of his enrollment he qualifies as a member of the Presbytery. In addition, some of the actions complained of and the conclusions reached purportedly occurred when Mr. Priest served as Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit and related to his use or misuse of that office. And finally, he is aggrieved by the actions of the Presbytery, acting by and through its agent, the CPM.
- 2. The Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod has jurisdiction to hear this Complaint since it involves the decisions and final actions of the Presbytery, acting by and through its Committee for the Preparation of Ministry taken against a Candidate under the care of the Presbytery. The actions taken by CPM are final actions of the Presbytery because of the Presbytery's designation of CPM to act on its behalf in certain matters without further review or action by the Presbytery.
- 3. The Complaint is timely in that the Complainant seeks to remedy actions taken March 1, 2011, of which he was not notified until notice was mailed to him on March 10, 2011 and received by him on March 11, 2011.
- 4. The Complaint states a claim upon which relief can be granted in that it cites as irregularities four erroneous actions taken by the Presbytery, acting by and through its CPM, as relates to the decisions reached in the meeting of CPM of March 1, 2011, including the conduct of CPM both

before and during that meeting and one erroneous act taken by the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, which was continuing in nature, even to this date.

#### ARGUMENT

1. The decision of the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting for and on behalf of the Presbytery, to conduct a disciplinary investigation and hearing against Mr. Priest by (a) appointing an Investigative Committee, (b) authorizing it to investigate the disciplinary charges against Mr. Priest, and (c) holding a judicial hearing involving disciplinary charges against Mr. Priest was erroneous and not permitted under the Book of Order, and, as such, it is an Irregularity committed by the Presbytery.

The Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) D-10.0100, et seq. establishes those steps that are to be taken when a written statement of an alleged offense is submitted to one of the governing bodies of the church. In no instance is the power to investigate the accusations or to hear the charges ever delegated or extended to a Committee for the Preparation for the Ministry. Here, the CPM of the Presbytery usurped the power reserved to the Presbytery by investigating and hearing charges that were disciplinary in nature only and it acted beyond its authority in appointing an investigative committee, directing it to investigate disciplinary charges and holding a disciplinary hearing regarding those charges.

Section D-11.0100, et seq. provides that a disciplinary case can only be heard by a permanent judicial commission.

2. The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit improperly referred the Written Statement of Ms. Azar to the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit for investigation and action in contravention of D-10.0103 of the Book of Order.

The Book of Order requires the Stated Clerk, upon receipt of a written statement claiming a violation of the discipline of the church, to report to the governing body that an offense has been alleged and to turn the accusations over to an Investigative Committee designated by the Presbytery to investigate and determine whether to bring

charges or not. An Investigative Committee can bring charges or announce that it will not bring charges. If charges are brought, they are presented to the Permanent Judicial Commission of the governing body having jurisdiction. In no instance is the CPM of any governing body empowered to appoint an Investigating Committee or conduct a disciplinary hearing against anyone under the jurisdiction of the governing body. Here, the Stated Clerk referred the accusations against Mr. Priest set forth in the written statement of Ms. Azar against him, to CPM and assisted CPM in outlining a course of action that would allow CPM to circumvent the Discipline of the Church and to withhold those due process safeguards of the church called fundamental fairness due Mr. Priest.

3. The CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting as agent for the Presbytery of Detroit, subjected Mr. Priest to double jeopardy when it formed an Investigative Committee to consider the charges and present its conclusions in a formal hearing, knowing that the same charges had been submitted to the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church and were the subject of an investigation there.

CPM was specifically advised that Mr. Priest had been subjected to one investigation on the same charges by Calvary Presbyterian Church and that Calvary's Investigative Committee had declined to bring charges against Mr. Priest. This information was specifically communicated to CPM at the beginning of its March 1, 2011 Hearing, but disregarded when the Stated Clerk advised the Meeting that it was not double jeopardy, since charges had not been the subject of a hearing before the Church's Session sitting as a PJC.

- 4. The Hearing of March 1, 2011 was irregularly conducted (assuming it could be conducted) in that Mr. Priest was denied the fundamental fairness guaranteed throughout the Book of Order for such proceedings in that Mr. Priest was not allowed:
  - a. to confront his accuser or hear her testimony
  - b. to call any witnesses
  - c. to examine or cross examine the Investigators, the accusers, or any of the other witnesses
  - d. to know what the accuser or any of the witnesses said or to see what any of the witnesses might have provided to the Investigating Committee

The Discipline of the Book of Order (D-1.000) requires that all participants in church discipline are to be accorded procedural safeguards and due process, and it is the intention of the Rules of Discipline to provide them.

Section D-14.0100, et seq., sets forth the rules of evidence to be followed in a proceeding, which rules prohibit each of the denials of rights stated above.

Throughout the Form of Government Section of the Book of Order, due process safeguards are required in the conduct of any investigation, commission proceeding or hearing.

#### RELIEF REQUESTED

- 1. That the Permanent Judicial Commission rule that it was irregular and impermissible for the Presbytery, acting by and through its Committee for the Preparation for the Ministry, to conduct a disciplinary proceeding against Mr. Priest on March 1, 2011 under D-10.0100, et seq., of the Book of Order, and that the adoption of its Investigative Committee's Report and recommendations presented was in error and should be reversed.
- 2. That the Permanent Judicial Commission rule that the Presbytery, acting by and through its Stated Clerk improperly referred the Disciplinary Written Statement of

Ms. Azar to the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit for investigation and action in contravertion of D-10.0100 of the Book of Order.

- That the Permanent Judicial Commission rule that the Presbytery, acting by and through its Committee can not form an Investigative Committee to consider disciplinary charges or hold a hearing on those charges when those charges have already been subjected to investigation and been dismissed by another properly formed Investigative Committee, as such second action would constitute double jeopardy, and, as such, is impermissible under the Book of Order.
- 4. That the Permanent Judicial Commission rule that the Hearing of the Committee for the Preparation for the Ministry, held March 1, 2011, was improperly conducted for reason that Mr. Priest was not afforded fundamental fairness (procedural and substantive due process) required by the Book of Order.
- 5. That the Permanent Judicial Commission declare the proceedings of March 1, 2011 are null and void and of no further effect.

#### CERTIFICATION

This Complaint is signed by Complainant's attorney, Archibald Wallace, III and by the Complainant. Archibald Wallace, III is a Minister of the Word and Sacrament and a member of the Presbytery of the James. He is also a member of the Virginia and West Virginia Bars. In participating in this proceeding Rev. Wallace is not acting for or on behalf of the Presbytery of the James.

Complainant reserves the right to submit a Brief in Support of this Complaint after the officers of the Synod's Permanent Judicial Commission have made their decision regarding the jurisdictional questions related to this proceeding.

#### ARRIVAL STATEMENT

This is a Disciplinary case that has come before the Permanent Judicial Commission as a result of a complaint submitted against Rev. Ronald Vanderbeek, Teaching Elder and associate pastor of Garden City Presbyterian Church.

#### JURISDICTIONAL STATEMENT

The Permanent Judicial Commission finds that it has jurisdiction and that the charges against the Rev. Vanderbeek were filed with the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit within the required time limits.

#### APPEARANCES

Rev. Ronald Vanderbeek, the Accused, pro se. Rev. Bryan Smith, for the Prosecuting Committee

#### **HISTORY**

A three-person Investigating Committee was duly appointed pursuant to Presbytery policy. The Committee decided to file charges, which were dated September 27, 2011. The Committee also filed a Recommendation of Censure pursuant to D-10.0302, which was signed by all members of the Committee and the Rev. Vanderbeek. The following facts were agreed to at trial by the parties as accurate:

By his own admission in 2011, the Rev. Vanderbeek engaged in acts amounting to sexual misconduct approximately five times over several months with the victim, a member of his congregation for whom he had provided pastoral care. The Rev. Vanderbeek was aware that the victim suffered from bipolar disorder. Although the victim was being treated with medication, her condition was severe

enough to require hospitalization twice in the recent past. These facts establish that the victim may not have had sufficient mental capacity to give consent.

#### **CHARGE 1**

Violation of Rules of Discipline D-10.0401(c)(1) by engaging in sexual relationship with a person whose mental capacity may have been insufficient to give consent.

#### Verdict:

Guilty - the charge is sustained.

#### Rationale:

Rev. Vanderbeek pled guilty to this charge and the Commission voted unanimously to accept that plea. Prior to entry of the plea, Rev. Vanderbeek was duly reminded of the presumption of innocence in his favor, his right to a full trial, right to counsel, the right to remain silent, that a plea may impair any appeal, and the fact that the Commission was not bound to follow the censure recommendation of Investigating Committee.

#### **CHARGE 2**

Violation of Rules of Discipline D-10.0401(c)(2) by engaging in sexual relationship that misused your office.

#### Verdict:

Guilty - the charge is sustained.

#### Rationale:

Rev. Vanderbeek pled guilty to this charge and the Commission voted unanimously to accept that plea. Prior to entry of the plea, Rev. Vanderbeek was duly reminded of the presumption of innocence in his favor, his right to a full trial, right to counsel, the right to remain silent, that a plea may impair any appeal, and the fact that the Commission was not bound to follow the censure recommendation of Investigating Committee.

#### CENSURE AS TO CHARGES 1 AND 2 Temporary Exclusion (D-12.0104)

Whereas, you, Rev. Ronald Vanderbeek, have been found guilty of the offenses of Violation of Rules of Discipline D-10.0401(c)(1) and D-10.0401(c)(2), and by such offenses you have acted contrary to Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.); now, therefore, the Presbytery of Detroit, in the name and by the authority of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), does now declare

you temporarily excluded from ordered ministry for a period of two (2) years, and subject to the following additional terms: 1) Approval for reapplication to ordered ministry in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) shall be subject to the decision of the Committee on Ministry and following the recommendation of a counselor approved by the Committee on Ministry and who shall render a full report to the Committee on Ministry regarding your fitness for ministry; and 2) you shall abide by all Committee on Ministry requirements regarding contact with the Garden City congregation after October 25, 2011.

#### **ORDER**

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit report this decision to the Presbytery at its first meeting after receipt, and that the Presbytery enter the full decision upon its minutes.

<u>Upon motion</u> of Scott Miller, the Presbytery voted to amend the Sexual Misconduct Policy as follows (additions are in bold):

1. Section II.B. (on "Presumed Consent"):

Presumed consent is the assertion that a particular act is between consenting adults. It applies to relationships where there is <u>no</u> disparity of power, as between spouses or single adults who are peers or colleagues.

In this policy presumed consent does <u>not</u> apply to relationships between ministers and members or participants, supervisors and supervised, or with anyone involved with a performance review, compensation, promotion, or continued employment. Even when parties claim that a consensual agreement exists, there is an inherent imbalance of power between the two parties that undermines the assumed validity of such consent.

A relationship between a minister and a church member/participant is inherently unequal. Becoming involved in such a relationship has implications not only for the minister and church member/participant, but it may also have implications for the congregation, especially if the relationship is terminated unhappily. Such a relationship is not a personal matter because it impacts the whole system of the congregation. It is recommended that a minister and member/participant not pursue a romantic relationship while remaining in the same congregation. If a minister chooses to continue the relationship, one or the other shall change churches so that the minister is no longer in the pastoral role. The minister should initiate a serious, thoughtful conversation with a trusted, but unbiased, advisor who can assist the minister and the minister's romantic partner to explore all of the ramifications of the emerging relationship.

2. Section III.B. (on "Membership"):

The Pastoral Response Team should consist of at least nine persons to allow for the possibility that more than one allegation of misconduct will be pending at any particular time.

## Overture to Amend the Rules of Discipline to clarify the duties of an Investigating Committee

The Presbytery of Detroit overtures the 220th General Assembly to direct the Stated Clerk to send to the presbyteries the following overture amending the Rules of Discipline for their affirmative or negative votes:

Amend D-10.0101 by deleting the phrase crossed out:

Procedure preliminary to a disciplinary case is initiated by submitting to the clerk of session or the stated clerk of the presbytery having jurisdiction over the member (D-3.0101) a written statement of an alleged offense, together with any supporting information. The statement shall give a clear narrative and allege facts that, if proven true, would likely result in disciplinary action. Such allegations shall be referred to an investigating committee. (D-10.0201)

and

Amend D-10.0202 by adding a new paragraph **a** and renumbering the subsequent paragraphs as follows:

The investigating committee shall

- a. Review the statement alleging a violation to determine whether it alleges any facts that, if true, constitute an offense defined in D-2.0203b. If no violation is alleged, it shall end its inquiry and report that to the clerk of the body. If a violation of the Constitution is alleged, it shall proceed to the steps below.
- a b. provide the accused with a copy of the statement of alleged offense described in D-10.0101;
- b.c. provide the person making the accusation with a statement of the investigating committee's procedures;
- e.d. determine whether the accusation repeats allegations previously made against the accused, and if so, report to the council having jurisdiction over the accused that it will not file charges (D-10.0202j) unless the accusation contains new information warranting investigation or is the subject of an investigation that has not been concluded.
- d.e. make a thorough inquiry into the facts and circumstances of the alleged offense;
- e.f. examine all relevant papers, documents, and records available to it;
- f.g. ascertain all available witnesses and inquire of them;
- g.h. determine, in accordance with G-3.0102 and D-2.0203b, whether there are probable grounds or cause to believe that an offense was committed by the accused;
- h.i. decide whether the charge(s) filed on the basis of the papers, documents, records, testimony, or other evidence can reasonably be proved, having due regard for the character, availability, and credibility of the witnesses and evidence available;
- i-j. initiate, if it deems appropriate, alternative forms of resolution, ordinarily after the investigation has been completed, probable cause has been determined, but before the charges have been filed. The purpose of alternative forms of resolution will be to

determine if agreement can be reached between the investigating committee and the accused concerning any charges which may be filed.

- (1) Any mediation shall be completed within 120 days unless a continuance is allowed by the session or permanent judicial commission.
- (2) The investigating committee shall report any settlement agreement to the session or permanent judicial commission for its approval.
- (3) The session or permanent judicial commission shall convene to receive the settlement agreement; vote to approve it by at least two-thirds of the members eligible to vote; make a record of its proceedings according to the provisions of D-11.0601d, including thename of the accused, the substance of the charge(s), and censure; and transmit its decision to the clerk of session or the stated clerk, who shall report it according to the provisions of D-11.0701.
- (4) The investigating committee shall provide an advocate for the accused throughout settlement negotiations, and may provide an advocate for other interested persons at its own discretion.
- (5) If a settlement satisfactory to both the investigating committee and the accused in the alternative form of resolution is not reached, the investigating committee shall designate a prosecuting committee per D-10.0202j, and the case shall proceed on the charges filed.
- j.k report to the council having jurisdiction over the accused only whether or not it will file charges; and
- k.l. if charges are to be filed, prepare and file them in accordance with the provisions of D-10.0401-.0404, and designate one or more persons (to be known as the prosecuting committee) from among its membership to prosecute the case.

### Rationale

The wording of D-10.0101 states that the clerk of the body receiving the statement of allegations shall make an initial inquiry: whether "if proven true, would likely result in disciplinary action." The function of such a provision is to provide a way to screen out claims that may be true, but which are not violations of the Constitution. It is similar to a grand jury or preliminary hearing in criminal law, and is comparable to the initial consideration of remedial complaints found in D-6.0305.

When a statement is referred to the investigating committee, its first duty, after providing a copy to the accused, informing the accuser of the procedures, and determining whether the allegations have been made before (D-10.0202 a-c), is to "make a thorough inquiry into the facts and circumstances of the alleged offense." D-10-0202b. ("An offense is any act or omission by a member or officer of the church that is contrary to the Scriptures or the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).") This means that the investigating committee must proceed to an investigation of the facts.

In 1991, the General Assembly Permanent Judicial Commission ruled in *Hoy and McGlamery, Jr. v. Pby of Tropical Florida*, Remedial Case 203-1, that "a stated clerk has no constitutional authority to refuse to transmit to a permanent judicial commission a filing which on its face purports to be a complaint." This means that a clerk receiving a statement containing allegations must refer it to an investigating committee whether or not a violation of the

Constitution is alleged. D-10.0202d requires that investigating committee to investigate the facts, even if there is nothing alleged that could go to trial.

The Office of the General Assembly has recognized the problem in its Constitutional Musing 3. In a footnote to this Musing, it notes that paragraph g states the investigating shall "determine, in accordance with G-3.0102 and D-2.0203b, whether there are probable grounds or cause to believe that an offense was committed by the accused," suggesting that this can be an initial step. The problem with is that a Constitutional Musing has no authority behind it, and the notion of probable cause in this sequence of events is something that must be determined after thorough inquiry. Moreover, there may be some clerks of session of presbytery that have not read the Constitutional Musings of the Office of the General Assembly.

Because of the *Hoy and McGlamery* decision, the initial intent of the Rules of Discipline that allegations against members be screened by the clerk to ensure that the allegations against a member are in fact violations has been removed, and no other provision has been made for this initial step. The result is that a person can write allegations against another Presbyterian that cannot be tried even if true, but nonetheless an investigating committee must conduct a thorough inquiry into the facts. This amendment allows an investigating committee to review the allegations as a first item of business, and, if the allegations even if true do not constitute a violation, can close the investigation.

### ANSWER OF THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

The Committee of Counsel of The Presbytery of Detroit submits the following answer to the complaint of the irregularity alleged in the complaint of the Session of Cavalry Presbyterian Church, as follows:

1. Allegation: We, the Session of Cavalry Presbyterian Church of Detroit complain to the Synod of the Covenant against the Presbytery of Detroit concerning an irregularity of an action taken by the Committee on Preparation for Ministry (CPM).

Response: Respondent denies that an irregularity occurred in the discharge of duty within the work of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry ("COPM") of the Presbytery of Detroit for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated.

2. Allegation: In that in a letter dated March 10, 2011 the Committee on Preparation for Ministry did assert that they "adopted the report of the investigating committee".

Response: Respondent admits that the COPM formed a sub-committee to investigate allegation against a candidate for ministry under the care of COPM pursuant to COPM's duty to determine if the candidate was fit for ministry, and that COPM adopted a report of that sub-committee. Respondent denies for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated that the sub-committee was an investigating committee pursuant to the Rules of Discipline.

3. Allegation: This investigating committee was formed to look into the complaints lodged against Thomas H. Priest Jr. by another member of the Presbytery of Detroit.

Response: Respondent admits that certain allegations against Elder Priest were brought to the attention of the COPM by another member of the Presbytery. Respondent admits that the COPM formed a sub-committee to investigate those allegations pursuant to COPM's duty to determine if the Elder Priest was fit for ministry. Respondent denies for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated that COPM initiated an investigating process pursuant to the Rules of Discipline to investigate those allegations.

4. Allegation: Complainants believe that the action was irregular because CPM is not a governing body and therefore cannot form an Investigating Committee.

Response: Respondent admits that COPM is not a governing body. Respondent admits that a COPM may not organize an investigating committee pursuant to the Rules of Discipline (see D-10.0201; G-14.0411). Respondent denies for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated that COPM's sub-committee was an investigating committee pursuant to the Rules of Discipline.

5. Allegation: That said Elder, Thomas H. Priest Jr., was not an ordained pastor with a call and therefore falls under the jurisdiction of Session of the church in which he was a member, that church being Calvary Presbyterian Church.

Response: Respondent admits that Elder, Thomas H. Priest Jr., was (and is) not an ordained pastor with a call. Respondent admits that Elder, Thomas H. Priest Jr., falls under the jurisdiction of Complainant for purposes of disciplinary action in accordance with the Rules of Discipline. See G-14.0411. Respondent denies for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, any suggestion that COPM does not have jurisdiction over Elder, Thomas H. Priest Jr., a candidate for ministry under COPM's care, to provide guidance, care and oversight to Mr. Priest concerning his fitness for ministry. See id.

6. Allegation: Complainants have a right to complain because they are a Session of the Presbytery of Detroit, and because they are the only governing body having jurisdiction over this member to convene an investigating committee.

Response: Respondent admits that Complainant is the only governing body having jurisdiction over Mr. Priest to convene an investigating committee pursuant to the Rules of Discipline to investigate an offense, for which the minimum prescribed penalty rebuke. Respondent denies for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, any suggestion that COPM does not have jurisdiction over Elder, Thomas H. Priest Jr., a candidate for ministry under COPM's care, to provide guidance, care

and oversight to Mr. Priest concerning his fitness for ministry. See G-14.0411.

7. Allegation: The Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church Detroit did convene and empower an investigating committee to duly investigate the complaints of said member.

Response: Respondent does not have personal knowledge of the facts of this allegation and so denies the allegation and leaves Complainants to its proofs.

8. Allegation: The actions of the CPM were initiated and completely rendering a response to their own with the full implication that did not give credence to that of the investigating committee of Calvary Presbyterian Church in essence, rendering our finding null and void.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated. That Complainant exercised its rights to undertake a disciplinary investigation of Elder, Thomas H. Priest is a wholly separate matter from COPM's own Constitutional right to discern whether Mr. Priest is fit to be a Minister of Word and Sacrament.

9. Allegation: That this very instance undermines the integrity of the disciplinary process established in the Book of Order.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated. Respondent, for example, refers to G-14.0411, which states that during the phases of inquiry and candidacy, the individual continues to be an active member of his or her particular church and subject to the concern and discipline of the session. However, in matters relating to preparation for ministry, the individual is under the oversight of the presbytery through the committee on preparation for ministry.

10. Allegation: Complainant request that the Synod of the Covenant order the Presbytery of Detroit to order the Committee on Preparation for Ministry to rescind their recommendation to require Elder Priest to attend the Mennonite mediation training, and a Midwest Counseling Service (Columbus, Ohio) assessment of its effects.

Respondent requests that Complainant's request be denied.

11. Allegation: Complainants also request that all negative references with regard to the actions of the investigating committee be removed form all records, and that Elder Thomas H. Priest Jr. be made whole in all respects.

Respondent requests that Complainant's request be denied. Respondent further requests that Complainant be order to specifically identify all such "negative references".

12. Allegation: Complainants also request that all negative references with regard to the actions of the investigating committee be removed form all records, and that Elder Thomas H. Priest Jr. be made whole in all respects.

Respondent requests that Complainant's request be denied.

### OTHER FACTS THAT MAY EXPLAIN THE SITUATION IDENTIFIED AS AN IRREGULARITY OR DELINQUENCY - D-6.0303

- 1. Mr. Thomas M. Priest is a candidate under the care of Respondent. See Exhibit A January 18, 2011 Report of COPM Sub-Committee at pg. 1.
  - 2. Mr. Priest is also a former moderator of Respondent, Id at 2.
- 3. In 2010, a member of one of the churches of Presbytery wrote to Respondent's Committee on Ministry ("COM") and COPM complaining about remarks made by Mr. Priest when he visited a mission center of Respondent's known as the Second Mile Center. See Exhibit B Letter from Ruth Azar dated April 20, 2010.
- 4. Mr. Priest was then visiting the center in his capacity of a seminary student writing a paper. See Exhibit A.
  - 5. The accuser's letter alleged that Mr. Priest's remarks were racist. See Exhibit B.
- 6. Respondent's Stated Clerk informed the COM that COM had no jurisdiction over Mr. Priest, but that COPM would have jurisdiction over him in since he is a candidate for ministry. See also G-14.0411.
- 7. Respondent's Stated Clerk further informed the accuser who wrote the letter that the letter could not be considered a complaint under the Rules of Discipline, since such a complaint would need to be filed with the Complainant. See G-14.0411.
- 8. The letter was subsequently filed, and Complainant formed an investigating committee in accordance with the Rules of Discipline. See Complaint.
- 9. Complainant's investigating committee declined to bring charges against Mr. Priest. Id.
- 10. While the investigating committee of Complainant declined to file charges, Respondent's COPM had a separate duty pursuant to G-14.0412, including a duty to provide guidance and instruction to Mr. Priest in light of the allegations in the letter and determine his fitness for ministry. See Exhibit A.
- 11. The COPM formed a sub-committee, which it labeled an investigating committee. Id.
- 12. The sub-committee of COPM conducted interviews and wrote a report with recommendations to the COPM. *Id.*

- 13. Mr. Priest objected to the recommendations in the report, which would have required him to pursue training and further consultation. See Exhibit C Minutes of COPM dated March 1, 2011.
- 14.A COPM hearing on the report was scheduled for the February 2011 meeting of COPM, but was postponed to the March 2011 meeting at Mr. Priest's request; his counsel was not able to come to the February meeting. See Exhibits D and E hearing transcripts.
- 15. The COPM hearing on the report was conducted at the March 2011 meeting of COPM, where Mr. Priest was represented by attorney/minister Archibald Wallace III of Richmond, Va. See Exhibit E.
- 16. Following the public portion of the hearing, the COPM adjourned to executive session, where the COPM voted to adopt the report and an augmented set of recommendations. See Exhibits C and E.
- 17. Complainant has now filed the remedial suit against Respondent the focus of which is that the COPM did not have the right to form a sub-committee to evaluate a candidate under its care.

### ARGUMENTS RELATED TO D-6.0305 - EXAMINATION OF PAPERS

### a. Does the governing body has jurisdiction;

Respondent's comment: No

A remedial case is one in which an irregularity or a delinquency of a tower governing body ... may be corrected by a higher governing body. D-2.0202 (emphasis added). The complaint here did not allege any action by a lower governing body. The only action alleged was that of the COPM, which is not a governing body. Therefore, Respondent respectfully submits that this Commission does not have jurisdiction to hear the complaint.

There is absolutely no dispute that Respondent's COPM is not a governing body. See Allegation no. 4, *supra*. There is also no dispute that the complaint focused exclusively on actions taken by the COPM. This limited factual scope in the complaint is wholly attributable to that fact that Complainant never took its concerns regarding the COPM to the floor of the presbytery. As a result, Respondent has never had occasion to address or otherwise act on Complainant's concerns.

If Complainant had a problem with the COPM, and the procedure the COPM used to investigate Mr. Priest's fitness for ministry, then Complainant had a clear avenue of appeal to the floor of presbytery. Indeed, Complainant through its commissioner could have requested from Respondent (by way of a motion from the floor) the very remedies Complainant now demands from this Commission. Stated directly, Complainant could have made a motion on the floor of Presbytery that COPM

be instructed to meet with Complainant, remove any negative references, etc. Had Complainant taken even this basic step, and had Respondent then failed (in Complainant's mind) to act appropriately, Complainant would then be able to point to at least SOME action by a lower governing body with which to vest this Commission with jurisdiction. But that is not what happened here. What happened (and is happening) here is that Complainant is attempting to use this Commission and the judicial process to circumvent standard parliamentary procedure, Respondent's wide discretion in considering the worthiness of candidates for ministry, and the Constitution. Complainant's efforts should not be rewarded.

In addition, if at any time the Commission concludes that Respondent did not form a disciplinary committee in accordance with the Rules of Discipline then this case should be dismissed for lack of jurisdiction. The inappropriate formation of a disciplinary committee in violation of the Book of Order is the only Constitutional violation alleged in the complaint. Absent that allegation, all that remains is a question of policy. However, under prevailing caselaw, the Commission only has jurisdiction to hear violations of the Constitution, not violations of policy. See e.g., See 2004, 217-1 Hope v. Pby of San Francisco.

### b. the complainant has standing to file the case;

Respondent's comment: None.

### c. the complaint was timely filed; and

Respondent's comment: No.

The complaint was seven (7) days late. Complainant cannot rely on the March 10<sup>th</sup> date of the COPM's letter, the mailing date of that letter, or even the receipt date of that letter to determine whether its filing was timely. The only relevant date was March 1<sup>st</sup>, the date the COPM made its decision. And the complaint here was filed more than ninety days after that date.

D-6.0202 makes clear that "...a complaint of an irregularity shall be filed within ninety days after the alleged irregularity has occurred..." The phrase "after the irregularity has occurred" being the relevant point. This language makes clear that the clock starts to run on the date of the alleged irregular action, and not on the date an allegedly aggrieved party received notice. Where things otherwise, the deadline for filing would be never ending because a complaining party could secure more time merely by claiming that he or she was unaware of the Irregular action. The purpose of the filing deadlines in our Constitution "is to prevent controversies with the church from going on and on..." 1994, PJC 206-7, Bayley v. Pby of Minn. Valleys. A notice requirement would undermine this purpose.

The Stated Clerk of this Synod has confirmed that the complaint here was received by his office on June 6, 2011. Even giving Complainant the benefit of a March

2<sup>nd</sup> start date (omitting March 1<sup>st</sup>), the complaint was seven (7) days late. Indeed, the last day the complaint could have been filed by Respondent's count was May 31, 2011 (the actual 90<sup>th</sup> day having been Memorial Day).

The case of 2005, PJC 218-7, <u>Jackson v. Session of Cordova Presbyterian Church</u> is instructive. In <u>Jackson</u>, an investigating committee drafted and mailed out a decision memorandum. The memorandum was undated, which prevented the GAPJC from knowing the actual date of the committee's decision. So, the GAPJC inferred a decision date by concluding that the decision could have been no later than the day the memorandum was postmarked. The point is, in <u>Jackson</u> the GAPJC could have relied on the date Jackson received the decision. But it didn't. In fact, that date was not even mentioned. Instead, the GAPJC inferred a *decision* date based on the available evidence and it then counted out the relevant time period. Jackson's complaint was then found to have been untimely.

Two points distinguish this case from <u>Jackson</u>. Neither point favors Complainant. The first point is that, unlike the undated memorandum in <u>Jackson</u>, the March 10<sup>th</sup> letter relied on by Complainant clearly referenced the COPM's March 1<sup>st</sup> decision. Complainant, therefore, cannot claim that it was not aware of the decision date. The second point is that Complainant actually filed a complaint (see case 2011-1) within the 90-day period. That complaint is untimely for other reasons, but it still stands as indisputable evidence that Complainant could have filed timely filed the complaint in this case.

The complaint in this case is clearly untimely and it should be not accepted/dismissed on that basis.

### d. the complaint states a claim upon which relief can be granted.

Respondent answers: No.

The complaint confuses the separate duties and obligations of Complainant and Respondent's COPM concerning the oversight of a candidate – Mr. Priest. Paragraph G-14.0411 of our Constitution granted Complainant original jurisdiction to investigate the *disciplinary* complaint against Mr. Priest. However, that same paragraph also granted Respondent's COPM original jurisdiction to *administratively* determine Mr. Priest's fitness for ministry. It is well established that a COPM may appoint a task force to investigate allegations made against a candidate. See 2004, 217-1 Hope v. Pby of San Francisco. The Hope decision is particularly relevant because there, as here, the COPM "... appointed a task force to investigate concerns about the candidate's ability to resolve conflicts..." See also Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 10th ed. 480 (Cambridge, Mass.: Perseus Publishing, 2000)("A committee can appoint a subcommittee, which are responsible to and report to the committee and not to the assembly.")

Respondent's COPM did not need to resort to the Rules of Discipline to investigate and exercise oversight of Mr. Priest when considering his fitness for ministry,

because our Constitution and numerous GAPJC decisions make clear that the COPM inherently has that authority. See e.g. 1997, 210-2 <u>Bevensee v. Pby of New Brunswick</u> (upholding Presbytery removal of inquirer from roles for not complying with counseling requirement mandated by CPM). Therefore, even if the allegations in the complaint are taken as true, the complaint failed to state a claim. Respondent's COPM did investigate Mr. Priest, but that investigation was not a disciplinary investigation. Rather, the COPM conducted an *administrative* investigation of Mr. Priest in accordance with the COPM's constitutionally mandated duty to provide oversight of candidates under its care. See G-14.0412. Moreover, during that investigation and subsequent hearing, Mr. Priest was treated with fundamental fairness. He was supplied with copies of relevant documents. He was afforded the opportunity to speak on his behalf. And, he was granted a right to counsel.

Respondents assert that no relief can be granted because the complainant has stated no violation of the Book of Order, as required by *Hope*, et.al. v. Pby of San Francisco, 2006, 217-1, 455.

Furthermore, the Book of Order grants the COPM the full authority and discretion to decide matters of readiness before recommending Presbytery declare a person ready to receive a call. G-14.0401; G-14.0411; G-14.0412; G-14.0450. Since the COPM has this discretion, its decision cannot be overruled except in cases where there has been an abuse of discretion. Lightner v the Presbytery of Middle Tennessee, 1983; Jackson v. the Presbytery of Susquehanna Valley. 1996; Leslie v. Session, First Church, Manhattan, KS., 2002. Since no abuse of discretion has been alleged, no relief can be granted.

### **FURTHER CONSIDERATIONS**

Respondent reserves the right to file a motion to dismiss in the event the Commission decides to accept the case notwithstanding the arguments set forth above.

# CPM SUBCOMMITTEE CONVENED IN THE MATTER

### OF COMPLAINT BY RUTH AZAR

AGAINST CANDIDATE THOMAS H. PRIEST, JR.

Date of Report – January 18, 2011

### Introduction

After prayerful consideration, the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, on May 4, 2010, authorized the formation of a subcommittee to investigate the above referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbott, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to CPM concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

- concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC)
- disturbing statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC
- a perception that SMC was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included:

- a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context
- Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and SMC work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries
- his preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of SMC.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to SMC and Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and a later meeting at SMC.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and further planning.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at SMC.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011.

### Central Issues

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their

frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### Recommendations

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

#### Dear Reverends:

As an ordained elder of the PC (USA) it saddens me to have to request an investigation of Thomas H. Priest, Jr. due to the racist remarks made to me, my staff, and volunteers of The Second Mile Center. The intention of this document is to enlighten the Committee on Preparations for Ministry and the Committee on Ministry of the Racist behavior that we have document. I am concerned that this behavior would limit Mr. Priest ability to be an effective leader and pastor in our churches.

The comments listed below were made while Mr. Priest was under care of the Presbytery as an inquirer and also while he was the Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit. I have letters and emails that provide a written witness of these comments that I can provide to you if you would like to review them. After conversation with the National Middle Eastern Presbyterian Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CPM and COM of Mr. Priest's comments and behaviors. As a racial ethnic women I have been on the receiving end of racist comments all of my life as I know that any racial/ethnic persons are, that is why these comments are so troubling to me and why I am moved to bring this to your attention.

A sampling of the comments that Mr. Priest said to Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, Pam Whitaker Reid, Kari Gorman and I:

- 1). "You get the money from the churches because you are white they will not give it to Stan from Barnabas."
- "How many "Arabs" own the gas stations and party stores in the area?"
- 3. When Lawrence Lorkowski told Tom that I am a minority woman and of Arabic heritage, Tom's response was. "she is too white and the people only see white. Especially she is the head of the center and the power is with a white person it sends the wrong message."
- 4. "A black person needs to be running the center not a different race."
- 5. "A white person cannot teach the children about their culture."
- "Like Jesus he will be persecuted confronting the establishment showing that the Presbytery of Detroit is racist."

- 7. "You are too white to be here." (to Ruth Azar a racial ethnic person)
- 8. Tom demanded I meet with him so he could teach me about Urban Ministry in spite of me being at The Second Mile for almost 3 years. In a few hours he decided that I did not know anything about Urban Ministry because I am a Middle Eastern Woman.
- 9. "White men have all the power."
- 10. "Your assistant Lawrence is a white male he has the power."

Mr. Priest starting making these comments approximately one hour of being at the center, he had come to the center as part of his Urban Ministry Project at The Ecumenical Theological Seminary. Pam was so upset by his remarks that she left abruptly stating, "I ain't got time for this. He is racist as hell, and I'm not coming back to volunteer, you Presbyterians are a mess." Pam did not return for months. Sandra Addrow, issued a letter to Al Timm, Executive Presbyter informing him of Tom Priest prejudice (copy attached). I called Al Timm following Mr. Priest visit to inform him of the racist remarks in which he told me to call Rev. Marcia Foster Boyd, President of the Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Detroit since Tom came to the center for a class he was taking at the seminary. I called her immediately in which she directed me back to Al Timm since she said it was a Presbyterian issue not a seminary issue. I called Al Timm and he explained that I could file a complaint against Tom. I prayed about it for awhile however in conversation with the National Middle Eastern Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CMP and COM, which is why I am sending this letter to you now.

As a racial ethnic woman I am deeply offended by his remarks and feel oppressed. This behavior should not be ignored and certainly not from a potential pastor. I pray that you will review Mr. Priest and his call. Mr. Priest as a pastor in a racially mixed community I have concerns about his ability to service a church and not offend or oppress races that are not his own.

The investigative committee included David Abbott, Christine Bohn (COM), Elizabeth Rice, and Henry Johnson. Beth urged fairness and diligence in our task to assess the report, and to determine Tom's fitness for ministry, in accordance with the process outlined in the Book of Order, and the manual for CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit. We do not have function or power to determine disciplinary action, and this is not a legal or disciplinary hearing.

#### 5. Hearing Stage

- On February 1, 2011, a motion was made and seconded to adopt the Investigating Committee's
  report and recommendations. Having been postponed and not withdrawn, it was still on the floor.
  The Investigating Committee's report and recommendations were read
- Mr. Wallace acknowledged CPM's right and responsibility to evaluate suitability for ministry, but
  maintained that the style and tone of the report and process of the investigative committee are
  disciplinary in nature and therefore in excess of that right.
- Mr. Wallace responded to the Issues raised in the report, specifically: that Mr. Priest did not abuse
  his authority as Moderator of the Presbytery; and that Mr. Priest values justice and equity highly and
  never intended prejudice or malice in any interactions he had with Ms. Azar.
- Mr. Wallace submitted that Mr. Priest does not object to the recommendations of the sub-committee, but to the nature of the report, its conclusions, and the process by which this has been handled.
   They requested that the committee approve the recommendations, but not the report.
- Mr. Priest stated that he is committed to his call to ministry, and submits to the authority of this body
  and the recommendations for growth and training. He suggested that all parties involved should be
  offered the training as an opportunity to build community. He maintained that any conflict resolution
  should include all involved.
- Mr. Wallace submitted a narrative from Mr. Stan Edwards, elder, Calvary Presbyterian Church and director of Barnabas Center, about his participation in the meetings with Torn (copy attached).
- The committee went into executive session. Mr. Koster was asked to remain.

#### 6. Executive Session

 The approved minutes of this session are sealed and on file in the offices of the Presbytery of Detroit.

#### 7. Move to Open Session

- The Committee approved a motion to separate the January 18, 2011 report of the CPM Subcommittee, which was convened in the Matter of Complaint by Ruth Azar against Thomas H. Priest, Jr., from the recommendations
- The Committee adopted the report of the Subcommittee.
- The Committee adopted the recommendations of the Subcommittee, as amended.
- The report and the recommendations as amended and adopted are included below:

CPM SUBCOMMITTEE

Date of Report – January 18, 2011

#### Introduction

After prayerful consideration, the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, on May 4, 2010, authorized the formation of a subcommittee to investigate the above referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbott, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the Intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to CPM concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

- concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC)
- · disturbing statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC
- a perception that SMC was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included:

- a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context
- Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and SMC work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries
- · his preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of SMC.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to SMC and Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and a later meeting at SMC.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and further planning.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at SMC.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011.

#### Central Issues

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same Influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intlimidation.

#### Recommendations

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned-personally and professionally from the mediation-skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

[This assessment will include asking Mr. Priest to present a report on what he has learned personally and professionally.

CPM requires Mr. Priest to subsequently undergo professional assessment through Midwest Career Counseling Center. CPM will furnish Midwest with the CPM Sub-Committee report and require that Midwest furnish their assessment to CPM.

Pastoral counseling may also be helpful in Mr. Priest's learning and healing through this process, and CPM encourages Mr. Priest to pursue that option.]

At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he

actions against those subjects.

knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require

Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills

Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard

Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral

development in the areas identified above.

Then I received a copy from Beth about the agenda on I think January 27th, 28th, not sure what date, and then I sent that to him. He said, ch, no, this is a hearing in the form of a disciplinary proceeding, and because I had sent him an e-mail earlier to ask him is it proper to have a court reporter and all that. comments just now made reference to the fact that your attorney said, actually I should be present because this is a hearing of a disciplinary nature. And I would wonder from your perspective, because it is obviously your prerogative to have legal counsel, from your perspective what was the necessity for legal counsel based on what the purpose of this hearing was? What did you envision the legal counsel's role to be in requesting presence?

ELDER PRIEST: I trust his judgment, and initially it was, you go ahead to committee. It's, it's asking questions about your Fitness for Ministry and suitability, no problem. Go ahead, be there. You have my blessing. Just remember, hear the findings. Don't get off target. Stay succinct, all of that, the things he reminds me of most of the time. REV. DOWNS: I don't want us to get stymied by semantics. Hearing to me sounds disciplinary and in the function of the life of CPM and in your pursuit of ministry, to me, this is somewhat more formal consultation. It's not an annual consultation, but it's a discussion with you about next steps towards ordination. I think the hearing term is a distraction.

In any case where there is an adversarial, some type of event that could affect a person's ministry in the future, outside of judicial process, this is not a judicial case, that person has some rights. One is the right to fair notice, quick notice, and the right to present his or her defense to the allegations and to the matters before, the matters

presented before a fair body, and that is what this hearing is designed to do. That is to say, the allegations are going to be presented by the subcommittee before you as a committee as the bodies of assembly.

There are two other rights that are attached to this. One is the right to have an advocate. An advocate is an advisor, somebody to be with someone. What distinguishes between that and counsel, counsel is somebody who can speak for the person. A person has a right to counsel, period. And to deprive Mr. Priest of the right of a reasonable right to have counsel here would make it detrimental to this motion to fairness, fundamental fairness. He doesn't have to justify having counsel here. The requirement is counsel be Presbyterian, that's required. He does not have to be an attorney either. The reason he has to be Presbyterian, attorneys have been known to misbehave. So we have to have somebody watch over the attorney.

So those are the requirements of fundamental fairness that the Book of Order and various cases and interpretation lay out in a matter which affects a person's ministry.

 to know about my attorney being a pastor, very spiritual. And he is concerned about my theological health, my spiritual health, and fitness for being pastor. Believe me, with him, is pretty tough. And he is concerned, he more than me wants me to get moving on this process. He doesn't want to do anything to delay it. He's been through a second career, and he says, Tom, my role is to help you get through this, not to delay it in any way.

So the reason for this is even though it's not a legal stance, the wording of "hearing" and following that process sends an antenna up. Even though these are allegations, it's a report of committee and they are charging me with something, allegations, this happened and this happened and they're very serious. And as a result of these allegations in this report, a judgment can be rendered, either punitive or taking a class or some judgment can be done out of this. So when you look at that, his concern is me. So on top of that, the recommendation of these, if it's accepted, I will suffer something based on something that can be challenged, that some of these things can be challenged. And I think all he is looking out for my best interest, not only legal issues, but as Fitness for Ministry.

REV. HARTLEY: I think I want to speak more than the process. In fact at the table, we have legal and counsel

representation, Ed Koster, and the perception of fairness or equitability, it's reasonable on our part to acknowledge his desire safely to have legal representation and advocacy. It's better to proceed deliberately but fairly and delay, though this is already been warned for six months. Reasonable for us to be patient in the process.

Our authority, my view is only ministerial and declarative, not judicial, only Presbytery remains, we recommend. So as far as the need for legal representation, constitutionally and legally, isn't needed at this hearing I believe, but because of the recommendation by the committee at hand, there is an implicit if not explicit requirement or demand to admit responsibility with a tentative requirements. So I think it's reasonable that he recognize that, to even consent to these recommendations admits responsibility. That's where we are in the process. I think it's an unfortunate delay, but I understand.

REV. DOWNS: Any other comments of the committee or questions of the committee?

Issue number one, he knows of no provision in our constitutional documents that would allow a CPM to appoint an investigative committee to look into issues raised in a complaint or to conduct a hearing on its findings and recommendations in the nature of prosecution.

The agenda that has been provided uses words such as "hearing stage," "investigative committee's report," and "recommendation". As Mr. Priest's advocate, no opportunity for Mr. Priest to present testimony from others or right to face accusers or right to examine his accusers.

Issue number two that concerns him is the lack of sufficient notice. Being subjective to the equivalent of a disciplinary hearing, Mr. Priest should have received more notice and Mr. Priest should have afforded the right to have an advocate of his choosing present to represent him.

Issue number three, double jeopardy. The Ruth Azar Complaint is already before the Presbytery by her written complaint. An investigative committee appointed by Calvary Presbyterian Church has conducted numerous hearings and appears close to deciding whether to proceed or not. If CPM convicts in the meantime on the same written statement, will that not render the IC's work a nullity? Or if the IC decides not to press charges, can CPM convict from the same issues? The decision by CPM to go forward will be a violation of both Mr. Priest's substantive and procedural due process rights and

could lead to a one to two year court proceeding to prevent what waiting may cure otherwise.

That's his legal statement and he asked me to read. These are not my words. These are his words.

of the Presbytery. I've been asked to come as advisor on the process.

REV. DOWNS: Again, last month the motion was made to adopt the committee's report and recommendations, and then we postponed any discussion of that at Tom Priest's request so we are reconvening on this day.

 referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbot, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to the Committee on Preparation for Ministry concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

Concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC), disturbing

statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC, a perception that Second Mile Center was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included: a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context. Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and Second Mile work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries. His preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of Second Mile Center.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately

Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan

Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about
their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his
visits to Second Mile Ministries and Barnabas Youth
Opportunities Center and a later meeting at Second Mile.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at Second Mile Center.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011. CENTRAL ISSUES

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did

he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban

ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require

Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills

Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard

Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

I must submit as a student of the Book of Order, CPM, and I am a long-standing member of the CPM in Virginia, CPM's have the right and power and ability and directive to consider the suitability of persons seeking to be ordained. You have that right and you have the right to exercise that and you have the right to look in to matters. There's no question about that. But the issue as we, as I look at it and we look at it up front is what you are doing here is in excess of that right. And you're going to say, oh, no, I'm attacking the process, and you're going to be upset that I'm attacking your process, but I have to point out to you that Ms. Azar's original complaint was a disciplinary complaint. It is filed under D6 of the Book of Order. That is a disciplinary complaint. This committee had the right to look into those issues, but it could not do so as a second investigative committee or second judicial committee.

You will tell me, oh, no, there's plenty of language in what our report is that's been submitted. There's language in it that says we're not doing anything that's disciplinary when this is not a judicial proceeding, that's not within this committee's purview, I agree, and you have said that and remarkably so that is the purview of what's in the investigation.

Do CPM's appoint ad hoc committees? All the time.

Do they ask the seat to look into matters? All the time. Is

that within your purview and power? Yes, but there's a line.

And when you style your report as investigative "CPM Subcommittee Convened in the Matter of Complaint by Ruth Azar," the complaint is a disciplinary complaint. Now I would point out to you there's nothing in G14.0400 that authorizes you to act as a judicial commission or as an investigative committee appointed by a body such as a presbytery or a session or a general assembly. Just don't have that power. You may exercise it as you have done here informally, which you have gone about it and we been saying we're objecting to the approach you're taking getting to a result that you have a right to get to. We're objecting to the process, because we believe this is an irregularity under the Book of Order, and I advised Mr. Priest that it is such an irregularity and if carried to finality could form the basis for remedial action. That's my advice. That's not what Mr. Priest is doing.

Mr. Priest comes today to say to you that he's in submission to you. He wants to work with this committee. He seeks this committee's approval and endorsement and movement from candidate to readiness so he can move on with the process. He feels a deep spiritual call to serve as a minister of the word and sacrament in the presbytery church USA. He also says that he's listening to the Holy Spirit to

discern as to how he should respond to this. Also should tell you that he bears malice toward none and that he wishes that the process here today would be fully spelled out and spread out so that you, too, could see what many have seen, these actions either didn't occur or are not violative or are not as conclusions of the committee.

We're going back to the first point, we object to the proceedings in the way in which we're doing with a court reporter; with an agenda that spells out a number of places that this is a hearing; that the report itself has language that we're here to investigate yet takes Mr. Priest to task for any number of things; and, in fact, what has occurred here is a disciplinary hearing without all of the rights, all of the duties that are owed a person facing a disciplinary hearing. For example, Ms. Azar is not here today to be cross-examined. If you look at and hear all of the evidence, these statements were not made to her. They were supposedly made to others, yet when you examine them and look at the records, it did not happen in the context which they were reported.

So first thing is Ms. Azar's not here, can't be examined nor the other witnesses, not been confronted, not given the information which they presented, given this conclusion by this committee and this report by this committee.

He is charged in the complaint which she originally brought with racial discrimination. That is not Tom Priest. That is nothing about him. That's just not where he comes from. Is he an African-American? Sure. He will tell you he sees through the lens of presbyterian elder. He sees through the lens of being presbytery. Yes, he's concerned about issues of justice for African-Americans and for all and he's concerned about those kinds of things, but not inordinately to the point of saying or doing things.

Now, we also take issue not only with the process, and frankly, I have to say that process Mr. Priest is in a very difficult position, because if he challenges the process he may never get ordained. This committee has the power and the right to say whether he should ever be ordained. You can do it in a number of ways and you can say, no, he always has the right to go to presbytery and challenge their decision. But where does that get him if he does that, what is the taste in your mouth, what is the future, how are we working together if we go that route? So a more reasoned route and a route certainly recommended that he's willing to take is we have to be here, we have to participate. We object to it, because we believe it violates his rights and we have to participate and we are participating. We don't waive that, but there's no other way to go with this. We have to go ahead the way it is today.

Now, let me talk to you for a moment about the evidence that is in this case. On February 18, 2009, Mr. Priest went to Second Mile Center as part of a seminary project to look at urban ministries within the presbytery as opposed to the model being taught in the seminary. I don't know whether that model is good, bad, or otherwise. I just know that's the model the professors are teaching and that was a part of his courses to go in some center somewhere against the model. So he went to the two in the presbytery, the two centers in the presbytery, urban ministry centers, one on the 17th, one on the 18th.

He then presented on March 9th, he presented his report to the seminary, and we have all the slides and everything he said is on those slides and documents. I trust the committee had access to it and can see it. On March 12th he presented that again to the seminary, and on the 16th he shared the results in March of '09 with both centers meeting with Mr. Edwards who's here, one of the centers and meeting with Ms. Azar, the other head, and he shared results of his study of his visit there at both centers compared to the model. He believes in the model, rightly or wrong he believes in the model. As the committee reports he prefers that model. I don't see anything wrong with preferring a particular model with having to do urban ministry, but that's certainly a mistake.

But anyway, in March '09 he met with Ms. Azar and other folks from SMC, Second Mile, and Mr. Edwards, and presented his findings. They were all present together. He only ever spoke with Ms. Azar twice. Once was during his visit, once first visit; once during his presentation of his findings on March 16th. March 16, '09, onward he had no contact with Ms. Azar.

Now, hold that over here aside to deal with another factual setting that I'm sure the committee also went in to.

For a long time there was a question of Ms. Azar's and the center's reporting or oversight, reporting to or oversight by presbytery, and one of the issues was, how do we as a presbytery, how to raise benefits and who has oversight. So that needed to be cleaned up. Had nothing to do with Mr. Priest. Started long before he came on board. Mr. Priest was hired by a women's council, I may not be given exact right name, that oversaw Second Mile Center. But the question came up, how to make sure she's under the purview, control, and oversight of the presbytery. That was in the works before Mr. Priest ever went out there.

On March 2, '09, the coordinating cabinet of presbytery approved the Second Mile Center model that is with Ms. Azar at the head and approved it to come in under the oversight of the presbytery. June 23, '09 the presbytery approved the action of the coordinating cabinet of March 2,

'09, and said, yes, we will accept her, accept her as employees or technical employees of the presbytery. Again, this is not something that Mr. Priest was involved in directly. But I must tell you for the full year of 2009, he served as moderator of the presbytery and also a member of the coordinating cabinet. Why is that important? Because in September, October 2009, a lady named Rosy Lattimore submits a letter to stated clerk or to the coordinating cabinet and the stated clerk weighs in on it and deals with the question of, the question of can the presbytery approve a position and make a presbytery position without adhering to the rules of the presbytery procedure of the presbytery regarding open bidding and open advertising and that type of thing. Can we just allow somebody to come in to that position without having to go through the process the presbytery says this is our procedure when we have presbyteries all over.

Coordinating cabinet some time between October 5 and December 5 of '09 looked into the subject. Mr. Priest was on that committee, and they agreed on December 5 to send a letter to Ms. Lattimore that says, in the future we're not going to do this. We're not going to just take somebody in without advertising, promoting the position. But there are extenuating circumstances here, and so we're not going to undue this particular one, that's December 5, 2009.

Now Mr. Priest's term as moderator ends with the

January 2010 meeting. No action has been taken by anybody to do anything at that point in time except the committee that he's a member of has written back to Ms. Lattimore saying, you're right, it probably was a violation of our procedure but the extenuating circumstances we're going to leave it that way. Once he's no longer moderator in April 2010, he prepares and requests and submits to the presbytery a motion to rescind that action, that action of approval of the appointment and the adoption of Ms. Azar as that position. He was not at that presbytery meeting in 2010.

Another, Ms. Lattimore did offer the motion. There was a lot of exchange in that time frame April 2010 just before the presbytery meeting about six or seven days before. One part of the exchange that went on during that time frame was executive presbytery provided Mrs. Azar with a heads up, this motion is coming and I want you to know about it and stated clerk talked about e-mails talking about here's the way the parliamentary process and procedure we're going to use at that meeting, presbytery meeting.

One of the things this jumps out at that point in time is an e-mail at that point in time, now talking about April 2010, that Ms. Azar said to the presbytery, what can we do to bring charges against Mr. Priest and Ms. Lattimore, because this is just a wreck? And they are told and response, here's where you go to find out how to do a complaint. So a

complaint was filed.

Now, the timing, I submit to this committee, is a big issue, something I would really want to know about. Why Ms. Azar, why from March of '09 when he makes his report with Mr. Edwards present -- I'm not sure what Mr. Edwards remembers -- why was nothing taken until this motion came up by a member of presbytery? Any member of the presbytery has a right to make a motion, and there's nothing wrong with making motion. May not agree with it and you could certainly vote them down, but why did nothing go on until after the motion came forward over being deposed in April 2010, thirteen months later.

The presbytery at the April 27 meeting did not deal with that motion directly. The presbytery at that motion, at that meeting heard a motion by another who said, I move that we not hear that motion. I object to it and move we not hear it. So presbytery voted on that issue and that issue prevailed and the motion that Mr. Priest was offered was not heard, read, made, voted on per se.

I will submit to you in July 2010, Mr. Priest and Elder Dorothy Seabrooks and Ms. Lattimore filed a complaint with the Senate about that process, that is how can you deny a motion and rule it out of order before you ever had a motion made? Is that appropriate process, is there an issue here? That has since been dismissed for jurisdiction. Mr. Priest was not at the meeting so he did not have standing.

The other motion of the other two was a day late in being filed, so it was dismissed as not timely, that's all.

In the meantime, the complaint had been filed by Ms. Azar and Mr. Priest's sponsoring church along with investigative committee and began hearing. The presbytery did not form an investigative committee. This committee did and the Book of Order gives you the power to look into things, but not in the form of investigative committee. So we would submit to you that if you look at all of the facts and all of the documents and all of the records, and hear all of the witnesses -- for example, Mr. Edwards is given a statement saying I was there in March 2009 at the meeting with Mr. Priest and Ms. Azar and myself to figure out how the directors of the two urban ministries program of presbytery of Detroit can work together and share information and resources. There's nothing in this statement, nothing in this statement that says Mr. Priest made disparaging remarks, didn't listen. abused his authority or did anything racial or made any racial statements or acted in any way untoward toward Ms. Azar or the Second Mile. I have his statement here and submit it to be part of the record if there's no objection. But in essence, he's saying this is the one that was difficult when I read it. I received this yesterday.

CPM shared with me that Tom and Ruth had several meetings which I had not attended. Mr. Priest would tell you

that was his second meeting with her and all the meetings he ever had. And CPM representatives, I felt they already made up their minds before they come and meet with me since they waited so long to find out what happened. CPM representatives assured me they did not form an opinion. Time delay was due to them just getting information April 2010. So I read that particular paragraph to show again the time line that 13 months after the fact, 13 months after the last meeting, there are charges made by Mrs. Azar, charges that are disciplinary in nature which are very damaging to Mr. Priest, charges which accuse him of very serious offenses if true.

This committee says one of the concerns we have is with the use of authority. Nothing that Mr. Priest did in March of '09 was as moderator of the presbytery. In fact, there's no evidence that says he came in and said, I'm the moderator, I want to do this. The evidence is that he was there doing a study and he shared results of that study as a student with his school and with the two centers. Mr. Edwards will share that this is what I heard him say. So what authority is he exercising in '09? He is the moderator of the presbytery. He is on the coordinating cabinet. But while as a moderator, nothing came up at a presbytery meeting that he swayed, oversaw, or did, or any actions taken by him there against Second Mile. In fact, as a member of the coordinating cabinet he was part of the cabinet's discernment and

discussion when they responded to Ms. Lattimore's concern that, yes, we didn't follow procedure but you're correct, but this isn't the case to change it. We will leave it as is.

So that whole year '09 when he's in that position of moderator and member of that committee, where is any evidence that he used his authority against Second Mile Center or Ms. Azar? And we take strong exception to that inclusion, that he abused his authority, which is a very serious charge. But we will say this at this point too, if the conclusion of those listed in trying to discern as this sounds like that to us, certainly apologize and begs forgiveness because that's not who he is or what he was trying to do and that's a misperception of what actually happened on that occasion.

But you cannot point to any place in any record of the presbytery or in the coordinating cabinet, you cannot point to any evidence there that says here, here's when he abused his power, here's where he over-used his authority, here's where he took advantage of that authority. And the motion was made in April 2010 by him to look into the issue, not Ms. Azar, but look into the issue of, can we allow folks to be put in presbytery positions without following our process and procedure, and if not, what should we do about situations for that to occur. He has the right to make that motion as member of the presbytery. Is that an abuse of his authority? He disagreed and goodness knows I go to presbytery

meetings all the time, people disagree. Is that an abuse of authority? I submit that is not.

It says at that time, Mr. Priest did not notify
Second Mile he was taking his findings and interpretations of
findings to presbytery. There's no evidence he took them to
presbytery at the time that he was moderator or member of
coordinating cabinet. Now, did it come up at some later time
to the presbytery when he made the motion? Sure. But is that
wrong to at that point in time raise it in support of his
motion? He says he didn't use that same influence and
authority to provide opportunity to Second Mile and voice and
actions intended to dramatically affect him. He was not
moderator. He was not dysfunction if he filed a motion to
tell them this is the motion per se. The motion is not
directed at them per se, although certainly can be perceived
that way.

I submit to you the conclusion drawn about abuse of authority is, we submit, overreaching.

Now the committee also observed a consistent pattern of prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening. All of us need to be better listeners, and if he's not a good listener I think this committee ought to encourage him to be a better listener and encourage him to take training in being a better listener. Mediation skills, I don't know if he needs that. I'm a mediator. I certainly handle hundreds

and hundreds of mediations in my life time, does that train you to listen? Yes. So does counseling courses I took in seminary, they trained me to listen. So years of practice of law trained me to listen. Lots of places you can go to learn to listen. Not everybody's a good listener. The bible tells you over and over, hear, see. Always enjoy the line, God gave us two ears and one tongue, two eyes and one tongue, so suggests I need to hear twice as much as I talk. I know you want me to shut up now.

I think those are two serious things, abuse of authority and persistent pattern of prejudging. I think if you sat and listened to Mr. Priest, find out who he is. He's a man, middle age, hearing the call of God to serve, to be a minister of the word and sacrament. How easy it would be to say I'm too old, too many other things going on, but he's here and listening to the Holy Spirit. He cares about people. Is he an African-American concerned about issues of justice and fairness? Yes, but all of us are whether we're African-American, otherwise. We as Christians certainly heard the words of our Lord speaking to us and walk humbly before our God and seek justice and love mercy.

Tom Priest I know is that way. I think the gentleman here with us today, say the Tom Priest that they know is that way. Does that mean he's not to speak out on issues where he doesn't think it's right? If a job is going

to be offered in a minority area is it right not to have it advertised so it can be filled by someone who may not have gone through that process? I think that's fair to raise that question. Maybe in this case we wished he hadn't, but is it fair to raise it? I think there's folks here who raised questions about that before.

Now, the suggestion that there's something wrong being fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry, I don't know that that's objectionable, but if being fiercely devoted is a problem, we again beg forgiveness. I don't think that's really what the issue is here.

Seems to me in looking at the charges, concerns as they are called, dealing with authority and consistent patterns and assumptions of knowing more than others know. I think those are admonitions that he needs, fair to say them and tell him he needs to be concerned about those things, but not in the context of a disciplinary proceeding, not in a context where every word is being taken down and preserved for goodness knows what purpose, not in the context of investigating a complaint of this committee that doesn't have the authority to do them, investigating presbytery itself. Seems to me when we on CPM approach a candidate we're here for two functions. Gatekeeping surely and we have to do that. But nurturing too, and I commend you because I think your report does seek to provide, nurture, gatekeeping and nurture

and comes to the recommendation. Frankly, we're fine with the recommendation and perhaps would even say let's go with them but not with the conclusions and not with the report and not with the process.

So when we conclude all of this, what we ask you to do is not approve this report as it's written, because it makes a very strong statement about this man that could be damaging for the rest of his, potentially damaging for the rest of his career, but to adopt the recommendations and say we reviewed the report and we mark it as receive. We do not adopt the report but we do believe that the recommendations, we do accept the recommendations. As our moderator has said, Ms. Bohn said at the beginning, often CPM's do require additional steps not particularly spelled out in the Book of Order, but certainly in the purview of determining suitability and nurture. I think it would be appropriate to assure yourselves that, one, this man is ready to go forward at some point in time. I think you ought to do that, but to assign to him fault and to investigate him in this way and determine that he has violated certain steps and proceedings, I would encourage you not to do that.

I appreciate your listening to me and letting me go through this. I can take you through the evidence. I brought copies of all the documents I referred to that if you would like to have them. I got Mr. Priest here. I got Mr. Edwards

here. We can go through any or all of this, but we will ask you in the long run don't adopt this report as is stated but do seek to discern ways to assure that this man is ready at the appropriate time and he wants to continue in the process. He wants to be, to answer the call that he believes God is making to him to be ordained in word and sacrament and serve in that capacity. It would be very easy just to say, no, we hear that but our committee did this and they're good people and we're not going to budge. This is our committee and we're right. I submit to you if we considered every fact fully, you come to a different conclusion number one. And number two, I would submit to you in a court of law which my arena has been for 35 years before I became a lawyer on this side of the house, minister lawyer, this is a case evidentially Ms. Azar's case would not stand up, be dismissed and investigative committee heard the evidence that was their conclusion. They did not press charges. Obviously they're not a commission or a court. They have to decide whether there's probable cause. That's the lesser standard of necessity of guilt.

Thank you for listening to me, and if you want to hear anything from Mr. Priest he'll certainly speak if you'll let him to.

 Mr. Wallace said. I just want to give you an idea when I met with him I drove overnight to Richmond, Virginia, where he's stationed, where he lives. And I stayed at a hotel, he told me I should never stayed at, but I went to school in DC in that area so I knew the area. I stayed at the Days Inn and when I drove up to the exit at two in the morning I didn't see any lights, I didn't see anything. Where was I? Finally I drove up, somebody came out. Half the units were windows were knocked out and vacant. That's the only place I could afford. I drove to his office and next to his office was a nice hotel.

So we sit there for four hours and he said, look, you need to tell me everything. I never sat with a lawyer before. He said you need to tell me everything, everything. If you did tell me whatever I need for you to deny what you, what's true, what is not true, and stand up for what you said from the beginning. And we went through that. A very spiritual, a very open experience for me.

I'm going to add to what he has said. When I met with the committee, excuse me, the investigative committee for CPM, when I met with them we met for roughly two hours and my advocate Darrell, Darrell Reynolds was with me, and we did not complete the investigation. We just got through preliminaries where I was explaining the report, why I was there, and the time line. So as we were going through that, the chair of the committee said we need to reconvene because we ran out of

time. So we need to get back together, because we're not finished. So I said, I cannot commit to rescheduling until I meet with my attorney. Need to look at this, look at that, very open and up front as I have been. I sent an e-mail on September 26, Greetings, Betsy,
I pray all is well with you and your family. I am now able to
schedule a time to meet with the investigating committee. At
our last meeting I was unable to schedule a next meeting until
I consulted with my lawyer. Please let me know possible time
the investigative committee is available to meet.

I received a response back from Betsy. My prayers continue with you and all involved in investigation. Thank you for letting me know. The committee meets again tomorrow, and I will let you know.

I did not hear back from the committee until I got the report. So I felt at all that at least there should be some continuation to have an opportunity that there was some

I am very sensitive to conclusions that were drawn about me, because in fact that is not my behavior. Everything that has been said I have been up front and above board. Not all people agree with what I said, but I been always up front, honest, and above board with everything. Most members of my church, and Darrell and Stanley can talk to that, didn't even know I was moderator presbytery before. All they know is, we call Tom to teach Sunday school. He teaches Sunday school. Need him to come preach, he'll preach. Need Tom to come work the food ministry, Tom will work the food ministry. Whatever my church asks me to serve, that's what I did.

I'm not the type person that even uses titles or offices. You go into my office and work where I was working you didn't see any awards. You go in my office at home, no awards, no diplomas, no anything. I been like that my whole life.

So being led by the Holy Spirit, not one time during my discernment process I committed to this call. I put myself under the guidance of this committee. I feel like a fighter, a prize fighter call, one or two punches I have to take another one. I don't like it. I don't want to do it, but if that's what God is calling me to do and I put myself under the authority of this body, I have to do it. I understand what it means to walk humbly with God. It means you may have to do

things you don't want to do. Am I'm ready to go into ministry? Yes, I'm ready. I felt I been ready since I accepted the call. Is patience once of my virtues? No, but it's one of the things I'm learning to grow in to, but humbly to me is overriding patience. It means to, if I have to do this, I have to do what I have to do, and I'm willing to accept that. But as Mr. Wallace says, not under the conditions of being portrayed in this manner.

I mentioned to my lawyer and I want to mention this to you. If it's an issue of conflict, it takes more than one person to have conflict. If this training is offered to myself and to Ruth and Tim, Ed Koster, whoever, to me that would be a building and living community. We all go together. Let's all go do it and work together. I feel because I'm different or because I'm assessed to be different, I go out. you get right and come back to us. I've already submit myself to this authority, but in the building of community which is already built by God, we have to live in it. To go out together to work together on sensitivity training, conflict resolution training together with the people you have conflict with is a much better idea and I would be more than happy to do it, if it takes five years, ten years, whatever, I would not have a problem with that. But to send me out alone to come back under these conditions, I'm very concerned with that.

Again, I submit myself under the auspices and authority of this body to pray that you discern the Holy Spirit to do what is right based on the evidence and data.

REV. DOWNS: Either of you have anything else you like to add? Now you were writing down some of the issues I'm assuming in your notes, Marjorie, we want to be sure to bring up in our private discussion. I've written down a couple things, questions that I think I heard you wanting us to raise and let me run those by you so that, to see if I heard you right.

The third one was related to listening and consistent pattern so to speak of jumping to conclusions and prejudging and again ask us to look back at what the evidence is there for that.

I think that was, that's what I heard, that's what I jotted notes down. I don't know if anybody wrote anything else down.

ELDER CLARK: Did it come out in all the discussion that Mr. Edwards is the leader at Barnabas which is the other two centers?

REV. DOWNS: I think it was mentioned in the introductions, but thank you.

REV. DOWNS: Thank you.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: In listening to your eloquence, Mr. Wallace became quite aware that there's a suggestion that there was a subtext in all of this involving possible retribution by Mrs. Azar for the fact that Mr. Priest was involved in the issues concerning with how she came upon her position at Second Mile Center. This is not something that I'm aware has been suggested previously, and I'm anxious, Tom, to ask you if you feel this whole thing evolved as a result of the role you played with Mrs. Lattimore and Dorothy Seabrook in the concerns about how it came to be that she was named as the coordinator of Second Mile Center. Do you feel that you were in fact a target as a result of her feeling for your involvement in calling that in to question?

REV. WALLACE: May I answer that? The short answer's, yes.

Second thing I would add if I might, maybe little

UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: I'm having a hard time
hearing.

REV. WALLACE: Mrs. Lattimore initiated the action on her own. Subsequently, Mr. Priest believed that justice had not been done in allowing someone to be put in a position without going through advertising and discernment by the presbytery about, is this the right person. So he then took up that issue himself. But when he did the motion, in response to that motion, we even had it e-mailed from Mrs. Azar to the effect, what can we do to bring charges against him now that we know he's going to file this motion that's been filed and going to be brought to presbytery on the 27th of 2010. She writes on the 21st, what can we do to bring charges against him? There no charges, nothing, 13 months. So our submission is that this is retaliation and it's unfortunate and I think she was concerned about her job.

I would offer to you also, and I don't know if the committee, investigative committee has this, but trustees minutes for Second Mile Center from late '09 we have those.

If you don't, it shows where the problem is within Second Mile Center, the Clark Hill attorney's memorandum in December 2008 saying they really are not in keeping with presbytery procedure. The January 22, 2009 motion of the operations ministry team to the coordinating cabinet, and then a series

of e-mails about that, minutes of the coordinating cabinet of March 2009 showing where it was dealt with, the presbytery minutes, coordinating council minutes of March 2, '09, again showing where they're dealing with how do we reconcile that position not being filled properly. Then we have the slides that Mr. Priest used in his presentation both in the seminary and with Mrs. Azar and Mr. Edwards. The minutes of the Metropolitan Urban Ministry Team is March 12, 2009 where they dealt with an issue motion to rescind over in 2010, first put together April 5 and then it shows being sent out by e-mail showing it being sent out April 12 by moderator, I mean Executive Presbyter Timm and Stated Clerk Mr. Koster sending it out to responding to Ms. Azar's concerns.

And anyway then one of these e-mails if you like to have it, one of these e-mails, April 14, we would like to know what charges we can bring against Mr. Priest and Ms. Lattimore. We believe this is harassment. We want to move forward with charges. That's Paragraph 3 of that e-mail.

Mr. Koster then writes a response, very eloquent response the next day saying, you're fair to everybody here, here's the outline of the process. Anybody can do what they have to do. Here's how it works, spells it out with a whole series of e-mails and here's a complaint filed April 21.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: So as a follow-up, Tom, to that, is it your feeling that Ruth Azar fabricated these allegations

against you of harassment, sexual -- racial insensitivity, and I think some gender inequality, I was going there with that comment? What is then the motivation in your bottom line for what her actions were, the fact that she fabricated these allegations as retribution toward you for the role you saw yourself necessarily having to play in her appointment?

UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: What's your question, Larry?

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: My question is whether Tom feels
that the complainant fabricated the allegations as retribution
towards him?

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: I don't know if that would be appropriate to even answer.

REV. WALLACE: I was getting ready to say something close to that. We don't say whether she tells the truth or not. We do point to two things. One, we deny all these things, context changes all of these things. They weren't said to her and there was an issue before the house, the presbytery about re-advertising the job. What motivated her I don't think anybody would say.

ELDER PRIEST: Can I say something in my defense? I feel bad people talking for me. People aren't used to that from me. I will say this. It's very important to me what Mr. Wallace says about what was said to her, and I think that's a key piece of data what was said to each person individually, not summed up and said these are the comments

that were made. What was said to her, what was said to each person is a critical piece, and that's when you look at the context. And that's when you see things were not said to her and certain things were not said to others, and some were not even said at all.

REV. DOWNS: Any other questions addressing different issues, different aspects at this point? Okay, then what I will do is give us a 5 minute recess.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: I have an observation.

REV. DOWNS: Please do.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: I'm more concerned in the report about their observations of their interaction with Mr. Priest when he was with them, and I'm more concerned about their perception with him as a person they were talking with who was a potential candidate for ministry. The allegations, and I understand you be defensive in that situation, but the allegations have been dismissed for lack of evidence and I'm not concerned about the allegations, but I am concerned how he functions with relation to this committee.

REV. KOSTER: As a point of order, we don't know why the allegations were dismissed. The Book of Order says that an investigative committee must decide whether it has the evidence to prove it, whether they have considering the people who testified and evidence they have. They could say they didn't violate the constitution, we don't know. So your

## ANSWER OF THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT

The Committee of Counsel of The Presbytery of Detroit submits the following answer to the complaint of the irregularity alleged in the complaint of Thomas H. Priest, Jr., as follows:

1. Allegation: Thomas H. Priest, Jr., a member of Calvary Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan, and an enrolled Candidate of the Presbytery of Detroit complains to the Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod of the Covenant concerning certain irregularities committed against him by the Presbytery of Detroit, acting by and through its agent, the Committee on the Preparation For Ministry (CPM), in that on March 1, 2011 the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting by and for the Presbytery, conducted a "Hearing" against Thomas Priest on the, "Form 26, Accusation By Individual As Statement of Offense," of Ruth Azar dated April 21, 2010 and submitted under D-10.0102a of the Discipline of the Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) with letter attached.

Response: Respondent admits that Thomas H. Priest ("Priest") is a member of Calvary Presbyterian Church, Detroit. Respondent admits that Priest is an enrolled candidate with the Presbytery of Detroit. Respondent denies that an irregularity was committed against Priest for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated. Respondent denies that the Presbytery of Detroit has taken any action against Priest for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated.

Respondent denies that the Committee on the Preparation For Ministry "conducted a "Hearing" against Thomas Priest on the, "Form 26, Accusation By Individual As Statement of Offense," of Ruth Azar dated April 21, 2010 and submitted under D-10.0102a of the Discipline of the Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)" for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated.

Respondent further notes that the complaint omitted the letter of Ruth Azar dated April 20, 2010 and addressed to CPM and the Committee on Ministry, which letter included exactly the same allegations as Exhibit A of the complaint. The April 20<sup>th</sup> letter is attached as <u>Exhibit O</u> (Respondent is lettering its exhibits starting from where the Complaint left off)

2. Allegation: While the CPM labeled the March 1, 2011 proceeding a Hearing as to the Suitability for Ministry of Thomas Priest, the entire proceeding was instead a Disciplinary Hearing against Thomas H. Priest. On March 18, 2011 CPM mailed notice of its decision to Mr. Priest, saying in essence Mr. Priest had abused his authority as Moderator of the Presbytery, had exhibited prejudice and bias against others, and had routinely used methods of confrontation and intimidation to get his way.

Response: Respondent admits that the March 1<sup>st</sup> hearing was a hearing as to the suitability of Priest for ministry. Respondent denies as untrue or mistakenly stated that the March 1<sup>st</sup> hearing was a disciplinary hearing against Priest. Respondent admits that CPM mailed out a letter dated March 10<sup>th</sup> on or about March 18<sup>th</sup>. Respondent denies as untrue or mistakenly stated that it was a "notice of its decision" since Priest had received actual notice of the decision at least as early as March 2<sup>nd</sup>, and certainly no later than March 5, 2011. See e.g., <u>Exhibits P and Q</u>. Respondent notes that the March 10th letter speaks for itself, and otherwise denies as untrue or mistakenly stated the remainder of this allegation and leaved Complainant to his proofs.

3. Allegation: At the March 1, 2011 CPM Meeting Mr. Priest (1) objected to the hearing claiming a disciplinary hearing by CPM was ultra vires, (2) cited the lack of fundamental fairness (procedural and substantive due process) in the conduct of the hearing, and (3) objected to the impropriety of the proceeding because it subjected Mr. Priest to double jeopardy, since a separate PJC disciplinary investigation of the complaint of Mrs. Azar had already been held, following which that Investigative Committee declined to initiate Disciplinary proceedings against Mr. Priest.

Response: The hearing transcript, Exhibit R, speaks for itself regarding objections made by Complainant. Respondent denies that the objections and this allegation have any merit for the reason that they are untrue or mistakenly stated. Any objections, for example, ignored the unambiguous provisions of G-14.0411 that granted Complainant's Session jurisdiction over disciplinary matters, but also granted the CPM jurisdiction over Complainant to determine fitness for ministry.

4. Allegation: The decision of CPM was mailed March 18, 2011, and was received on March 21, 2011 by Mr. Priest.

Response: Respondent admits a summary of the CPM's March 1<sup>st</sup> decision was transmitted by letter dated March 10, 2011. Respondent does not have personal knowledge as to when Complainant received that letter, and so denies same as

untrue or mistakenly stated, and leaves Complainant to his proofs. Respondent notes that Complainant received actual notice of the decision at least as early as March 2, 2011 and certainly no later than March 5, 2011 (see Exhibits P and Q), and also that by virtue of the letter Complainant was aware that the CPM had made its decision on March 1, 2011. Furthermore, had Complainant remained at the meeting of the CPM until the decision was made rather than departing, he would have been notified of the decision immediately and in person.

5. Allegation: It is from this decision that Mr. Priest brings this Remedial Complaint, since the actions complained of are final under the delegated authority of the Presbytery to CPM and since the decision of CPM has not and will not be subject to Presbytery approval or disapproval at any subsequent meeting of the Presbytery.

Response: Respondent denies that the actions of CPM were final for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated. Complainant could have taken this matter to the floor of Presbytery and moved that the Presbytery direct that CPM withdraw its decision.

6. Allegation: Mr. Priest states the following as Irregularities in the Actions taken by CPM:

Response: Respondent answers the claims of Mr. Priest as follows:

7. Allegation: 1. The CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting as agent for and on behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit, conducted a disciplinary hearing against Mr. Priest on March 1, 2011 in violation of D-10.0100, et seq., of the Book of Order which empowers only permanent judicial commissions to hear and decide disciplinary charges.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and leaves Complainant to his proofs.

8. Allegation: 2. The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit improperly referred the Complaint to the CPM or the Presbytery of Detroit for investigation and action in contravention of D-10.0103 of the Book of Order.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue. The complaint referred to was addressed to the CPM and the Committee on Ministry. The Stated Clerk merely told the Committee on Ministry that it had no jurisdiction, and the CPM that it had jurisdiction over Mr. Priest for the purposes of deciding fitness for ministry.

9. Allegation: 3. The CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting as agent for and on behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit, formed an Investigative Committee to consider the disciplinary charges and present its conclusions at a formal hearing.

At the time of the March 1, 2001 Hearing CPM was aware that the same charges had been referred to an Investigative Committee of the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church, which had investigated the charges and declined to initiate formal disciplinary charges against Mr. Priest.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and leaves Complainant to his proofs.

- 9. Allegation: 4. The Hearing of March 1, 2011 was Irregularly conducted in that Mr. Priest was denied the fundamental fairness guaranteed throughout the Book of Order for such proceedings in that he was not allowed:
  - a. to confront his accuser;
  - b. to call any witnesses;
  - c. to cross examine the investigators, the accusers or any of the other witnesses: and
  - d. to know what the accuser or any witnesses said or see what any witness might have provided to the investigating Committee; and

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and leaves Complainant to his proofs. The hearing transcript, **Exhibit R,** speaks for itself concerning what Complainant was and was not allowed to do. Respondent submits, however, the CPM treated Complainant in a fundamentally fair manner.

10. Allegation: 5. The findings of CPM of March 1, 2011, while said not to be disciplinary in nature, were in fact disciplinary and, as such, were beyond the scope of authority of CPM (ultra vires).

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue.

### **FACTUAL BACKGROUND**

11. Allegation: 1. During the calendar year 2009 Elder Thomas H. Priest of Calvary Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan, served as Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit. During that year Mr. Priest was also a student at Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Detroit Michigan, working toward an M. Div. Degree, which he was awarded later that year. On June 23, 2009 the Presbytery, after examination, enrolled Mr. Priest as a Candidate for the Ministry of Word and Sacrament at its June Presbytery Meeting.

Response: Admitted.

12. Allegation: 2. As a part of one of Mr. Priest's classes in 2009 at Seminary, Mr. Priest evaluated two urban ministry centers in Detroit (the Barnabas Mission and Second Mile Center) using Ronald Peters,' *Urban Ministry* 

and John M. Perkins' Beyond Charity as guides. Mr. Priest's conclusions were that the Barnabas Mission was a mission of reconciliation and empowerment, under the Peters' guidelines, while the Second Mile Center would only qualify as a charitable mission. Mr. Priest conducted his field evaluation at the Second Mile Center on February 18, 2009. After completing his evaluations, Mr. Priest shared his findings with his Seminary class on March 9, 2009, with the Presbytery's Metropolitan Urban Ministry Team on March 12, 2009, and with members of the two centers involved on March 16, 2009.

Response: The cited documents speak for themselves. Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs. Further answering, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

13. Allegation: 3. On March 2, 2009, Mr. Priest, while serving as a member of the Presbytery's Coordinating Cabinet, participated in the Cabinet's consideration and approval of a recommendation that the Presbytery call Ruth Azar as Executive Director of Second Mile Creek. There is nothing in the minutes of that meeting to suggest Mr. Priest objected in any way to the call. On June 23, 2009 the Presbytery approved the call of Ms. Azar to the Second Mile Center after a spirited effort to postpone the vote. Mr. Priest Moderated the Presbytery Meeting where the call was ultimately approved and did not participate in the discussions about postponement.

Response: The cited documents speak for themselves. Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs. Moreover, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

14. Allegation: 4. At the end of 2009 Mr. Priest ended his term as Moderator of the Presbytery. In October 2009, just before Mr. Priest's term as Moderator ended, the Coordinating Cabinet received a Report from Ed Koster, Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, about the way the Presbytery had handled the call of Ms. Azar to be Executive Director of Second Mile Center. The report was intended as response to the questions raised by some within the Presbytery as to whether the decision of the Presbytery to call Ms. Azar in June 2009 was proper or not. The solution suggested was to discharge Ms. Azar and go through the call process again. No action was taken on the issue before the end of 2009.

Response: Admitted. The cited documents speak for themselves. Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs. Further answering, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

15. Allegation: 5. As an elder commissioner to the Presbytery but no longer Moderator and while still a member of the Coordinating Cabinet, Mr. Priest

on April 5, 2010 advised the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of his intent to file a Motion with the Presbytery asking it to rescind its earlier action regarding the called position at Second Mile Center. A copy of the Motion was to be a part of the Presbytery Packet sent to all commissioners and was to be voted on at the April 27, 2010 Presbytery Meeting. On April 12, 2010, the Presbytery Executive emailed a copy of Mr. Priest's Motion to Ms. Ruth Azar to give her a "heads up" that the Motion was coming. Two days later, on April 14, 2010, Ms. Azar and two others responded, asking the Presbytery Executive what "charges" could be brought against Mr. Priest for what they perceived to be harassment by Mr. Priest. The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery responded the same day, saying that charges could be brought under the Discipline against Mr. Priest, if Ms. Azar wished and, because Mr. Priest was under the care of Presbytery, a complaint could be made to CPM.

Response: The cited documents speak for themselves Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs. Further answering, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

Allegation: 6. On April 21, 2010 Ms. Azar submitted a "Form No. 26, Accusation By Individual As Statement of Offense against Mr. Priest, citing D-10.0102a with letter attached as basis for the accusation (together her written statement), thereby invoking the procedure to be used when initiating a Disciplinary Case against a person under the jurisdiction of a governing body. See Exhibit A attached. In the Disciplinary Accusation Ms. Azar claimed Mr. Priest committed the offenses of racism, discrimination, and division against her and others at the Second Mile Center. Interestingly, the accusations related to the one day visit of Mr. Priest on February 18, 2009 to the Second Mile Center. No explanation was given in the Written Statement of Ms. Azar why the accusation had lain dormant for fourteen months. The Disciplinary Accusation was addressed to Rhonda Favors, Clerk of Session of Mr. Priest's home church and to Edward Koster, Stated Clerk of the Presbytery. The Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church immediately appointed an Investigating Committee as required by D-10.0201. Edward Koster, the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery sent the Charge to Presbytery's CPM and advised CPM how it could proceed with its own investigation without having to defer to the Presbyter's Permanent Judicial Commission or the Session of Mr. Priest's home church. Mr. Koster did not refer the Disciplinary Accusation to an Investigating Committee of the Presbytery as required by D-10.0201 of the Book of Order

Response: Respondent observes that on April 20, 2010, Ms. Azar transmitted a letter address to the COM and CPM that included exactly the same accusations set forth in the Form No. 26, dated April 21, 2010. See Exhibit O. Respondent notes further that a copy of the April 20, 2011 letter was not attached to the complaint. Moreover, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

Respondent further denies this allegation as untrue or mistakenly stated - and frankly, patently misleading. The allegation makes a less than veiled allegation that the Stated Clerk conspired to lead the CPM in a process to avoid the Book of Order. Such unsupported and blanket allegations have no place in his church, or any church for that matter. See e.g., Exodus 23:1. The Book of Order is clear that Complainant's Session had jurisdiction over him in disciplinary cases. See G-14.0411. As such, there was no reason for the Stated Clerk to refer the matter to a presbytery investigating committee because the presbytery did not have disciplinary jurisdiction over Complainant. However, that same section, and the one that follows it (G-14.0412) gave the CPM wide discretion to determine (and investigate if necessary) the fitness of an inquirer or candidate for ministry. Indeed the CPM's discretion to investigate, order counseling, and even remove a candidate from the rolls (with the consent of Presbytery) has been supported time and time again by decisions of the GAPJC. See e.g., 2004, PJC 217-1 Hope v. Pby. of San Francisco; 1997, PJC 210-2 Bevensee v. Pby. of New Brunswick; 1993, PJC 205-4 LeTourneau v. Pby. of Twin Cites Area. Respondent notes that, for all of its length, the complaint failed to cite even one (1) decision supporting Complainant's position.

17. Allegation: 7. On April 27, 2010 Mr. Priest's Motion to Rescind was brought to the floor of Presbytery but was not voted upon as to its merits because of procedural rulings. Mr. Priest was not in attendance at the meeting.

Response: The cited documents speak for themselves. Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs. Further, Respondent questions how it could have been Complainant's motion, when he was not in attendance at the meeting? See <a href="Exhibit S">Exhibit S</a> - SPJC Letter of 9/23/2010 in 2010-2. Moreover, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

18. Allegation: 8. Ms. Azar's disciplinary charges were the subject of an extensive investigation by Calvary Presbyterian Church's Investigative Committee, including a hearing where Mr. Priest was allowed to address and refute the charges. On February 10, 2011, the Investigative Committee of Calvary Presbyterian Church issued its Conclusion of Investigation, advising that "no charges would be filed." This information was provided Presbytery's CPM, before it began its hearing on March 1, 2011; however, CPM went ahead with its hearing related to the same Charges.

Response: The cited documents speak for themselves. Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs. Still further, on information and belief, Calvary's "extensive" investigation did not include questioning Ms. Azar. Finally, Respondent states that even if true, the allegation is not material to the complaint.

On May 4, 2010 CPM established its own Investigative Allegation: 9. Committee and was guided in its investigation by the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery. CPM asked the Investigating Committee it appointed to investigate the accusations of Ms. Azar. The Investigating Committee recognized that the approach of CPM could be viewed as violative of the powers granted a CPM by the Book of Order, so the Investigating Committee in its Report of January 18, 2011 took pains to label its actions as advisory only, saying its intended purpose was to advise CPM on issues of Mr. Priest's suitability and not to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC (USA) was violated. Unfortunately, the stated intent was subverted by a deliberate use of the discipline of the church in a manner not permitted by the Constitution of the PC (USA). The result was the Committee's Report of January 18, 2011. See Exhibit C attached. At no time during its investigation was Mr. Priest given a copy of Ms. Azar's written statement, nor advised what Ms. Azar had said in her presentations to the Committee, nor given any information about the investigation. Subsequently, Mr. Priest was called to an August 9, 2010 meeting with the Investigating Committee where he was asked to discuss his actions on February 18, 2009 in light of the written statement of Ms. Azar. Both before and after the August 9, 2010 meeting the Investigating Committee met with and obtained testimony from other witnesses, some of whom it has not even named to date. None of the materials collected by the Investigating Committee were made available to Mr. Priest. At the end of its work, the investigative Committee submitted its report dated January 18, 2011 to CPM with conclusions about Mr. Priest's behavior and with recommendations of what he should do to continue under the care of the Presbytery. Among the conclusions the Investigative Committee stated were Mr. Priest's.

- 1. abuse of his authority as Moderator of the Presbytery;
- 2. deceit in the identification of himself to the Second Mile Center employees;
- 3. misuse of his Presbytery office to influence the actions of the Presbytery against Second Mile Center;
- 4. denial of due process to Second Mile Center in not allowing it be heard regarding his Motion of April 2010;
- bias against the opinions and experiences of others;
- racism in his treatment of other racial-ethnic individuals; and,
- 7. misuse of confrontation and intimidation to achieved his will.

Each of these conclusions has been cited by PJC's across the church as basis for the imposition of discipline upon other minister members of the church. Here, the conclusions were reached without affording Mr. Priest the rights of fundamental fairness. Simply by labeling the proceedings as something other than a disciplinary proceeding. Mr. Priest was called to a Hearing on March 1, 2011 before the whole of CPM, to hear the report and respond to it. CPM advised before the Meeting that it intended on March 1, 2011 to receive the Report of the Investigating Committee of CPM and to act upon it. Mr. Priest was given a copy of the proposed Agenda for the Meeting before the Hearing. This Agenda was

adopted as the Agenda for that Hearing. See Exhibit N attached. He was not given a copy of the Report until just before the original date of the Hearing<sup>1</sup>. In the Agenda adopted, CPM advised Mr. Priest that a court reporter would be present, that Mr. Priest could have an advocate, if he wished, and that there would be a time in the Meeting called the "Hearing Stage." CPM advised at the onset of the Hearing that the Investigative Committee would present its findings and report on the evidence it had collected but could not be subjected to cross examination or direct questioning. CPM also advised that none of the witnesses examined by the Investigative Committee would be present or available for cross examination. The procedure for the day only allowed Mr. Priest to submit his testimony and to argue his defense. CPM advised it intended to vote to adopt the Report but wanted to hear from Mr. Priest before it finally ruled. Inexplicably, the Stated Clerk, who had engineered the way the charges were handled by CPM was allowed to sit in with CPM during its deliberations and to advise CPM as to its actions. Mr. Priest was given time to argue his defense, but it mattered not, because the evidential basis for CPM's action (the evidence behind the Report of January 18, 2011) was unavailable and not disclosed throughout the meeting. On March 11, 2011 Mr. Priest received Notice of the decision of CPM. See Exhibit E attached. Because of this Notice Mr. Priest submits this Complaint to the PJC of the Synod of the Covenant, asking this tribunal to correct the Irregularities listed above through this Remedial Action.

Response: The cited documents speak for themselves. Further, Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs.

Further answering, Respondent notes that the Complainant first appeared before the CPM at the meeting on February 1, 2011 and requested an adjournment so that he could have counsel present. That adjournment was granted (in a showing of fairness), and he appeared again before the CPM on March 1, 2011 with counsel.

# RESPONDENT'S RESPONSE TO COMPLAINANT'S ARGUMENTS CONCERNING STANDING

Respondent denies that this Permanent Judicial Commission has jurisdiction to

hear this complaint for at least the following reason:

20. Allegation: 1. Complainant has standing to file this Complaint, since he is an elder of Calvary Presbyterian Church (PCUSA), a graduate of Ecumenical Theological Seminary with a Master of Divinity Degree and is enrolled under the care of the Presbytery of Detroit as a Candidate to become a Minister of the Word and Sacrament. Because of his enrollment he qualifies as a member of the

Presbytery. In addition, some of the actions complained of and the conclusions reached purportedly occurred when Mr. Priest served as Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit and related to his use or misuse of that office. And finally, he is aggrieved by the actions of the Presbytery, acting by and through its agent, the CPM.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs.

Complainant does not have standing. Complainant is only eligible to file his complaint if he qualifies under D-6.0202(a)(1)(Jurisdiction based on membership in the presbytery). Complainant, however, fails to qualify under that provision.

In this allegation, Complainant boldly claims that he is a member of presbytery because he is a candidate for ministry. This claim is a manifestly false. It is also expressly contradicted by other allegations in the complaint. Specifically, at paragraph 1, *supra*, Complainant avers that he a member of Calvary. And, at paragraph 18, *supra*, Complainant avers that he was subject (exclusively) to a disciplinary investigation by Calvary (pursuant to the Rules of Discipline). Thus, by his own admission, Complainant is a member of Calvary and not a member of the Presbytery.

Complainant also (noticeably) failed to cite to any authority to support his claim that his status as a candidate endowed him with the privilege of membership in the presbytery. Respondent cites to G-14.0411, which refutes Complainant's claim as that section clearly states that every candidate is subject to the jurisdiction of his or her session for purposes of discipline.

Complainant's status as a candidate does not grant him membership in the presbytery. Therefore, he is not eligible to file the complaint, and this Commission does not have jurisdiction to hear the complaint.

Also, in order for an individual to have standing to file a remedial case against the Presbytery, he or she must have been a commissioner to the meeting at which the alleged irregularity occurred. D-6.0202a.(1). Complainant claims the Committee on Preparation for Ministry, acting as the agent of Presbytery, committed the irregularity. Complainant was not a member of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry, and has no standing on his own right to file a remedial action against Committee on Preparation for Ministry or the Presbytery.

21. Allegation: 2. The Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod has jurisdiction to hear this Complaint since it involves the decisions and final actions of the Presbytery, acting by and through its Committee for the Preparation of Ministry taken against a Candidate under the care of the Presbytery. The actions taken by CPM are final actions of the Presbytery

because of the Presbytery's designation of CPM to act on its behalf in certain matters without further review or action by the Presbytery.

Response: Respondent denies this allegation for the reason that it is untrue or mistakenly stated, and so leaves Complainant to his proofs.

Respondent also notes that a remedial case is one in which an irregularity or a delinquency of a lower governing body ... may be corrected by a higher governing body. D-2.0202 (emphasis added). The complaint here did not allege any action by a lower governing body. The only action alleged was that of the CPM, which is not a governing body. Therefore, Respondent respectfully submits that this Commission does not have jurisdiction to hear the complaint.

There can be no dispute that the CPM is not a governing body. There is also no dispute that the complaint focused exclusively on actions taken by the CPM. This limited factual scope in the complaint is wholly attributable to that fact that Complainant never took his concerns regarding the CPM to the floor of the presbytery. As a result, Respondent has never had occasion to address or otherwise act on Complainant's concerns.

In addition, Respondent notes that the action taken by the CPM was not final. It was a decision made in the course of its responsibilities to guide the Complainant as he prepared for ordained ministry pursuant to G-14.0405 and G-14.0512. The action merely directed the Complainant to do additional things to prepare himself. A "final" action would be a decision to report to the Presbytery that the Complainant had passed his final assessment and was ready to receive a call. G-14.0450. Or make recommendation to Presbytery that be removed from the roll. G-14.0463. Since the supervision of a Committee on Preparation for Ministry over a candidate is a continuing process, its decisions regarding preparation for ministry in that process are not final and are not reviewable by a higher governing body.

If Complainant had a problem with the CPM, and the procedure the CPM used to investigate his fitness for ministry, then Complainant had a clear avenue of appeal to the floor of presbytery. Indeed, Complainant through Calvary's commissioner(s) could have requested from Respondent (by way of a motion from the floor) some, if not all, of the remedies Complainant now demands from this Commission. That, however, was clearly not something that Complainant wanted to do. See, e.g., Exhibit R at 22, wherein Complainant's counsel argued:

This committee has the power and the right to say whether he should ever be ordained. You can do it in a number of ways and you can say, no, he always has the right to go to presbytery and challenge their decision. But where does that get him if he does that, what is the taste in your mouth, what is the future, how are we working together if we go that route?

Exhibit R, at 22, In. 14 - 19 (emphasis added).

Had Complainant taken the basic step of appealing the CPM's decision to the floor of Presbtery, and had Respondent then failed (in Complainant's mind) to act appropriately, Complainant would then be able to point to at least SOME action by a lower governing body with which to vest this Commission with jurisdiction. But that is not what happened here. What happened (and is happening) here is that Complainant is attempting to use this Commission and the judicial process to circumvent standard parliamentary procedure, Respondent's wide discretion in considering the worthiness of candidates for ministry, and the Constitution. Complainant's efforts should not be rewarded.

Finally, if at any time the Commission concludes that Respondent did not form a disciplinary committee in accordance with the Rules of Discipline then this case should be dismissed for lack of jurisdiction. The inappropriate formation of a disciplinary committee in violation of the Book of Order is the only Constitutional violation alleged in the complaint. Absent that allegation, all that remains are questions of policy. However, under prevailing case law, this Judicial Commission only has jurisdiction to hear violations of the Constitution, not violations of policy. See e.g., See 2004, PJC 217-1 Hope v. Pby of San Francisco.

22. Allegation: 3. The Complaint is timely in that the Complainant seeks to remedy actions taken March 1, 2011, of which he was not notified until notice was mailed to him on March 10, 2011 and received by him on March 11, 2011.

Respondent denies this allegation as untrue. The complaint was ten (10) days late. Complainant cannot rely on the March 10<sup>th</sup> date of the CPM's letter, the mailing date of that letter, or even his receipt of that letter to determine whether the complaint was timely filed. The only relevant date was and is March 1<sup>st</sup>, the date the CPM made its decision. And the complaint here was filed more than ninety days after that date.

Under D-6.0202, "...a complaint of an irregularity shall be filed within ninety days after the alleged irregularity has occurred...". The phrase "after the irregularity has occurred" being the relevant point (and one left unreferenced by Complainant's pleading). This language makes clear that the clock starts running on the date of an alleged irregular action, and not on the date an allegedly aggrieved party received notice. Where things otherwise, the deadline for filing would be never ending because a complaining party could secure more time by claiming that he or she was unaware of the irregular action. The purpose of filing in our Constitution "is to prevent controversies with the church from going on and on..." 1994, PJC 206-7, Bayley v. Pby of Minn. Valleys. A notice requirement would undermine that purpose. Moreover, it must be pointed out that other (unrelated) provisions in the Book of Order do include a notice

requirement. D-6.0306, for example, allows for a challenge to the finding of a PJC clerk and moderator "... within thirty days after receipt of those findings...". Therefore, had the denomination desired to include a notice provision in D-6.0202, it would have done so.

The Stated Clerk of this Synod has confirmed that the complaint in this case was received by his office on June 9, 2011. Even giving Complainant the benefit of a March 2<sup>nd</sup> start date (omitting March 1<sup>st</sup>), the complaint was ten (10) days late. Indeed, the last day the complaint could have been filed by Respondent's count was May 31, 2011 (the actual 90<sup>th</sup> day having been Memorial Day).

But, let's say for sake of argument, that Complainant was entitled to a notice requirement. Even under that requirement the complaint was untimely because Complainant had actual notice of the CPM's decision by March 2, 2011. Specifically, on that date Complainant had an approximately 40 minute telephone conversation about the CPM decision with Sam Clark – a co-moderator of CPM. Then, on March 3, 2011, Complainant responded to an email from Elizabeth Downs – the other CPM co-moderator concerning the decision. See Exhibits P and Q. Then, on March 5, 2011, counsel for Complainant transmitted an email to Rev. Downs, the content of which makes clear that Complainant was fully aware of the CPM's decision. Id. (FYI – a March 6<sup>th</sup> notice date should have been filed by June 3, 2011).

In addition, Respondent notes the obvious problem with Complainant's allegations against Respondent's Stated Clerk – (i.e., the Second Irregularity). Complainant was clearly aware of the Stated Clerks actions as of the March 1<sup>st</sup> hearing, but never filed a complainant. As a result, Complainant's ninety-day window to take action as to that allegation expired a long time ago.

The case of 2005, PJC 218-7, <u>Jackson v. Session of Cordova Presbyterian Church</u> is instructive. In <u>Jackson</u>, an investigating committee drafted and mailed out a decision memorandum. The memorandum was undated, which prevented the GAPJC from knowing the actual date of the committee's decision. So, the GAPJC inferred a decision date by concluding that the decision could have been no later than the day the memorandum was postmarked. The point is, in <u>Jackson</u> the GAPJC could have relied on the date Jackson received the decision. But it didn't. In fact, that date was not even mentioned. Instead, the GAPJC inferred a *decision* date based on the available evidence and it then counted out the relevant time period. Jackson's complaint was then found to have been untimely.

Two points distinguish this case from <u>Jackson</u>. Neither point favors Complainant. The first point is that, unlike the undated memorandum in <u>Jackson</u>, the March 10<sup>th</sup> letter relied on by Complainant clearly referenced the CPM's March 1<sup>st</sup> decision. Complainant, therefore, cannot claim that it was not aware of the decision date when he received the letter. The second point is that Complainant's

own Session actually filed a complaint (see case 2011-1) within the 90-day period. The complaint in 2011-1 is untimely for other reasons, but it still stands as strong evidence that Complainant could have filed timely filed the complaint in this case.

The facts are clear. Complainant knew about the CPM's decision as early as March 2, 2011 and has missed the ninety-day deadline. As a result, he is now 1) ignoring his own actual notice of the CPM's decision and 2) attempting to construct an unconstitutional "written notice" requirement in an effort to gain standing. Complainant's efforts should not be rewarded. The complaint was clearly not timely filed and it should be not accepted.

23. Allegation: 4. The Complaint states a claim upon which relief can be granted in that it cites as irregularities four erroneous actions taken by the Presbytery, acting by and through its CPM, as relates to the decisions reached in the meeting of CPM of March 1, 2011, including the conduct of CPM both before and during that meeting and one erroneous act taken by the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, which was continuing in nature, even to this date.

The complaint confuses the separate duties and obligations of Complainant and Respondent's CPM concerning the oversight of a candidate – Mr. Priest. Paragraph G-14.0411 of our Constitution granted the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church original jurisdiction to investigate the *disciplinary* complaint against Mr. Priest. However, that same paragraph also granted Respondent's CPM original jurisdiction to *administratively* determine Mr. Priest's fitness for ministry. It is well established that a CPM may appoint a task force to investigate allegations made against a candidate. See 2004, 217-1 Hope v. Pbv of San Francisco. The Hope decision is particularly relevant because there, as here, the COPM "... appointed a task force to investigate concerns about the candidate's ability to resolve conflicts..." See also Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 10th ed. 480 (Cambridge, Mass.: Perseus Publishing, 2000)("A committee can appoint a subcommittee, which are responsible to and report to the committee and not to the assembly.")

Respondent's CPM did not need to resort to the Rules of Discipline to investigate and exercise oversight of Mr. Priest when considering his fitness for ministry, because our Constitution and numerous GAPJC decisions make clear that the CPM inherently has that authority. See e.g. 1997, 210-2 Bevensee v. Pby of New Brunswick (upholding Presbytery removal of inquirer from roles for not complying with counseling requirement mandated by CPM). Therefore, even if the allegations in the complaint are taken as true, the complaint failed to state a claim. Respondent's COPM did investigate Mr. Priest, but that investigation was not a disciplinary investigation. Rather, the CPM conducted an administrative investigation of Mr. Priest in accordance with the CPM's constitutionally mandated duty to provide oversight of candidates under its care. See G-14.0412. Moreover, during that investigation and subsequent hearing, Mr. Priest was

treated with fundamental fairness. He was supplied with copies of relevant documents. He was afforded the opportunity to speak on his behalf. And, he was granted a right to counsel.

Respondents assert that no relief can be granted because the complainant has stated no violation of the Book of Order, as required by 2006, PJC 217-1, <u>Hope v. Pby of San Francisco</u>.

Furthermore, the Book of Order grants the CPM the full authority and discretion to decide matters of readiness before recommending Presbytery declare a person ready to receive a call. G-14.0401; G-14.0411; G-14.0412; G-14.0450. Since the CPM has this discretion, its decision cannot be overruled except in cases where there has been an abuse of discretion. Lightner v the Presbytery of Middle Tennessee, 1983; Jackson v. the Presbytery of Susquehanna Valley. 1996; Leslie v. Session, First Church, Manhattan, KS., 2002. Since no abuse of discretion has been alleged, no relief can be granted.

### **RESPONSE TO ARGUMENT**

24. 1. behalf of the Presbytery, to conduct a disciplinary investigation and hearing against Mr. Priest by (a) appointing an Investigative Committee, (b) authorizing it to investigate the disciplinary charges against Mr. Priest, and (c) holding a judicial hearing involving disciplinary charges against Mr. Priest was erroneous and not permitted under the Book of Order, and, as such, it is an irregularity committed by the Presbytery.

Respondent points to the statement made by Complainant's counsel at the hearing on March 1, 2011:

"I must submit as a student of the Book of Order, CPM, and I am a long-standing member of the CPM in Virginia, CPM's have the right and power and ability and directive to consider the suitability of persons seeking to be ordained. You have that right and you have the right to exercise that and you have the right to look into matters. There's no question about that."

Exhibit R at 19, In. 3 – 9 (statements made by Counsel for Complainant at March 1<sup>st</sup> hearing).

Complainant admitted at the hearing, as he must, that the CPM had the right to determine his fitness for ministry. However, while conceding that CPM has a right to act, Complainant now attempts to reserve for himself the privilege of instructing the CPM how to exercise its rights. No candidate in this denomination is granted that ability, or that privilege.

Robert's Rules (and thus our own Book of Order) grants to every committee the right to appoint sub-committees. See RONR (10<sup>th</sup> ed.), p 480, i. 11 - 13. Therefore, implicit in the CPM's right to consider the suitability of persons seeking to be ordained was a right to appoint a sub-committee to determine the suitability of a particular candidate and report back to the full CPM. Complainant's argument then that the investigation by CPM sub-committee was disciplinary is a red herring.

Moreover, Complainant's argument that the CPM hearing was a disciplinary proceeding under the Rules of Discipline is simply without merit. fundamental characteristic of a disciplinary proceeding under our Rules of Discipline is the possibility that the party charged could be subject to a public censure before presbytery. At a minimum, the censure is a judgment of "guilt" followed by verbal rebuke before the assembled presbytery. See D-11.0403: D-12.000: D-12.0102. The worst possible censure is removal from office and/or membership. D-12.0105. Complainant was NEVER at risk of to even the lowest degree of censure by the CPM. Therefore, no matter how much Complainant might wish to characterize the CPM hearing as a disciplinary hearing - it simply was no such thing. To be sure, Complainant was admonished and "corrected" by the CPM as part of CPM's assessment for his fitness for ministry. But that is See e.g., 1997 PJC 210-2 Bevensee v. Pby of New CPM's right. Brunswick)(candidate required to receive counseling). The GAPJC has ruled time and time again in cases just like this - indeed more extreme than this - that a Presbytery has exceptionally wide discretion over candidates under its care. See e.g., Bevensee, supra, where the GAPJC noted that only mandatory requirement prior to REMOVING a candidate from the rolls is that the candidate be given an opportunity to be heard. Complaint here was granted that right, and much much more.

The CPM was well within its rights, and the record is clear that Mr. Priest was treated with fundamental fairness. The case should be dismissed.

25. 2. The Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Detroit improperly referred the Written Statement of Ms. Azar to the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit for investigation and action in contravention of D-10.0103 of the Book of Order.

The actions of the Stated Clerk, even if accepted as true, occurred more than 90 days before the Complaint was filed. As a result, the Commission clearly does not have jurisdiction over this alleged irregularity.

However, assuming jurisdiction exists, Respondent was and is astonished that the complainant did not include Ms. Azar's letter of April 20, 2010 to COM and CPM. See Exhibit O. The content of that letter was nearly identical to the Written Statement authored the next day. Why was the letter not provided in the complaint? Respondent doesn't know – at present. But the existence of the letter turns Complainant's narrative on its head. Without Ms. Azar's letter

Complainant is free to spin and weave a story of a conspiracy, in which Respondent's Stated Clerk is out to "get" Mr. Priest. But, with Ms. Azar's letter, what we have (at best) is a story of the Stated Clerk providing duplicate information to the CPM. Clearly, the latter is not as sexy, or supportive, of the alleged plight of Complainant.

This irregularity is nothing more than a red herring founded on the convenient omission of an exceptionally material fact. It should be dismissed.

26. 3. The CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, acting as agent for the Presbytery of Detroit, subjected Mr. Priest to double jeopardy when it formed an Investigative Committee to consider the charges and present its conclusions in a formal hearing, knowing that the same charges had been submitted to the Session of Calvary Presbyterian Church and were the subject of an investigation there.

This irregularly has no merit. Zero. It is directly refuted by the plain language of G-14.0411, which granted Complainant's home church jurisdiction over him in disciplinary matters but granted the CPM jurisdiction over determining his fitness for ministry.

One way to test a theory is to see how well it holds up at the extremes. In this case, suppose we have a candidate for ministry in presbytery X that commits a serious secular felony. Suppose further that the victim of the felony happened to also be Presbyterian and so files a disciplinary case against the candidate with the candidate's church. And, suppose further that the candidate is never charged by the church. Does Complainant really think that under those circumstance the CPM doesn't have the right to undertake is own investigation to determine the fitness of the candidate for ministry? The answer in the example, and also under the much less extreme circumstances at issue here, is the same — CPM clearly does the right to conduct its own investigation.

As mentioned supra, the CPM had and has every right to determine Complainant's fitness for ministry. That right is separate and distinct from the rights of the Session of Calvary Presbytery. And it includes the right to investigate charges against a candidate until the CPM is satisfied that the candidate is fit to be a minister of the Word and Sacrament.

- 27. 4. The Hearing of March 1, 2011 was irregularly conducted (assuming it could be conducted) in that Mr. Priest was denied the fundamental fairness guaranteed throughout the Book of Order for such proceedings in that Mr. Priest was not allowed:
  - a. to confront his accuser or hear her testimony
  - b. to call any witnesses
  - c. to examine or cross examine the Investigators, the accusers, or any of the other witnesses

 d. to know what the accuser or any of the witnesses said or to see what any of the witnesses might have provided to the Investigating Committee

The accused in a disciplinary case under the Rules of Discipline is entitled to full due process rights. The reason for that is simple. As explained *supra*, every accused in a disciplinary action is at risk of a formal public censure. Here, Complainant did not risk censure. He was not the subject of a disciplinary hearing under the rules of discipline. And, he was not entitled to full due process.

What Complainant was entitled to was fundamental fairness. Which is exactly what he got. Complainant had the opportunity to speak at the hearing. Complainant was allowed to have counsel present (and speaking) during the hearing. Complainant was also given copies of all relevant papers – and more than a month to review them before the March 1<sup>st</sup> hearing. And the matter was heard before a body different from the investigating body: It was heard before the CPM as a whole, which had full rights and authority to inquire of the subcommittee and to deny or add to its recommendations. Indeed, the CPM, after hearing the Complainant and his counsel, adopted requirements different from what was in the original report. See Exhibit T - Minutes of the CPM of March 1, 2011, pp 3f. It is then, simply not true that Complainant was denied fundamental fairness.

This irregularity too is a red herring and should be dismissed.

Respondent reserves the right to file a motion to dismiss in the event the Commission decides to accept the case notwithstanding the arguments set forth above.

### Dear Reverends:

As an ordained elder of the PC (USA) it saddens me to have to request an investigation of Thomas H. Priest, Jr. due to the racist remarks made to me, my staff, and volunteers of The Second Mile Center. The intention of this document is to enlighten the Committee on Preparations for Ministry and the Committee on Ministry of the Racist behavior that we have document. I am concerned that this behavior would limit Mr. Priest ability to be an effective leader and pastor in our churches.

The comments listed below were made while Mr. Priest was under care of the Presbytery as an inquirer and also while he was the Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit. I have letters and emails that provide a written witness of these comments that I can provide to you if you would like to review them. After conversation with the National Middle Eastern Presbyterian Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CPM and COM of Mr. Priest's comments and behaviors. As a racial ethnic women I have been on the receiving end of racist comments all of my life as I know that any racial/ethnic persons are, that is why these comments are so troubling to me and why I am moved to bring this to your attention.

A sampling of the comments that Mr. Priest said to Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, Pam Whitaker Reid, Kari Gorman and I:

- "You get the money from the churches because you are white they will not give it to Stan from Barnabas."
- 2. "How many "Arabs" own the gas stations and party stores in the area?"
- 3. When Lawrence Lorkowski told Tom that I am a minority woman and of Arabic heritage, Tom's response was, "she is too white and the people only see white. Especially she is the head of the center and the power is with a white person it sends the wrong message."
- 4. "A black person needs to be running the center not a different race."
- 5. "A white person cannot teach the children about their culture."
- 6. "Like Jesus he will be persecuted confronting the establishment showing that the Presbytery of Detroit is racist."

- 7. "You are too white to be here." (to Ruth Azar a racial ethnic person)
- Tom demanded I meet with him so he could teach me about Urban Ministry in spite of me being at The Second Mile for almost 3 years. In a few hours he decided that I did not know anything about Urban Ministry because I am a Middle Eastern Woman.
- 9. "White men have all the power."
- 10. "Your assistant Lawrence is a white male he has the power."

Mr. Priest starting making these comments approximately one hour of being at the center, he had come to the center as part of his Urban Ministry Project at The Ecumenical Theological Seminary. Pam was so upset by his remarks that she left abruptly stating, "I ain't got time for this. He is racist as hell, and I'm not coming back to volunteer, you Presbyterians are a mess." Pam did not return for months. Sandra Addrow, issued a letter to Al Timm, Executive Presbyter informing him of Tom Priest prejudice (copy attached). I called Al Timm following Mr. Priest visit to inform him of the racist remarks in which he told me to call Rev. Marcia Foster Boyd, President of the Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Detroit since Tom came to the center for a class he was taking at the seminary. I called her immediately in which she directed me back to Al Timm since she said it was a Presbyterian issue not a seminary issue. I called Al Timm and he explained that I could file a complaint against Tom. I prayed about it for awhile however in conversation with the National Middle Eastern Caucus I was encouraged to inform both CMP and COM, which is why I am sending this letter to you now.

As a racial ethnic woman I am deeply offended by his remarks and feel oppressed. This behavior should not be ignored and certainly not from a potential pastor. I pray that you will review Mr. Priest and his call. Mr. Priest as a pastor in a racially mixed community I have concerns about his ability to service a church and not offend or oppress races that are not his own.

referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbot, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk, Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to the Committee on Preparation for Ministry concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

Concerns about Mr. Priest's interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC), disturbing

statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC, a perception that Second Mile Center was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included: a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context. Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and Second Mile work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries. His preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of Second Mile Center.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately

Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan

Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about
their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his
visits to Second Mile Ministries and Barnabas Youth
Opportunities Center and a later meeting at Second Mile.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at Second Mile Center.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011. CENTRAL ISSUES

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did

he use that same influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban

ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require

Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills

Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard

Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

say or do the things with which Ms. Azar has written or charged. Now, this committee has appointed its own investigative committee. I must submit as a student of the Book of Order, CPM, and I am a long-standing member of the CPM in Virginia, CPM's have the right and power and ability and directive to consider the suitability of persons seeking to be ordained. You have that right and you have the right to exercise that and you have the right to look in to matters. There's no question about that. But the issue as we, as I look at it and we look at it up front is what you are doing here is in excess of that right. And you're going to say, oh, no, I'm attacking the process, and you're going to be upset that I'm attacking your process, but I have to point out to you that Ms. Azar's original complaint was a disciplinary complaint. It is filed under D6 of the Book of Order. That is a disciplinary complaint. This committee had the right to look into those issues, but it could not do so as a second investigative committee or second judicial committee.

You will tell me, oh, no, there's plenty of language in what our report is that's been submitted. There's language in it that says we're not doing anything that's disciplinary when this is not a judicial proceeding, that's not within this committee's purview, I agree, and you have said that and remarkably so that is the purview of what's in the investigation.

Do CPM's appoint ad hoc committees? All the time.

Do they ask the seat to look into matters? All the time. Is that within your purview and power? Yes, but there's a line.

And when you style your report as investigative "CPM Subcommittee Convened in the Matter of Complaint by Ruth Azar," the complaint is a disciplinary complaint. Now I would point out to you there's nothing in G14.0400 that authorizes you to act as a judicial commission or as an investigative committee appointed by a body such as a presbytery or a session or a general assembly. Just don't have that power. You may exercise it as you have done here informally, which you have gone about it and we been saying we're objecting to the approach you're taking getting to a result that you have a right to get to. We're objecting to the process, because we believe this is an irregularity under the Book of Order, and I advised Mr. Priest that it is such an irregularity and if carried to finality could form the basis for remedial action. That's my advice. That's not what Mr. Priest is doing.

Mr. Priest comes today to say to you that he's in submission to you. He wants to work with this committee. He seeks this committee's approval and endorsement and movement from candidate to readiness so he can move on with the process. He feels a deep spiritual call to serve as a minister of the word and sacrament in the presbytery church USA. He also says that he's listening to the Holy Spirit to

We're going back to the first point, we object to the proceedings in the way in which we're doing with a court reporter; with an agenda that spells out a number of places that this is a hearing; that the report itself has language that we're here to investigate yet takes Mr. Priest to task for any number of things; and, in fact, what has occurred here is a disciplinary hearing without all of the rights, all of the duties that are owed a person facing a disciplinary hearing. For example, Ms. Azar is not here today to be cross-examined. If you look at and hear all of the evidence, these statements were not made to her. He is charged in the complaint which she originally brought with racial discrimination. That is not Tom Priest. That is nothing about him. That's just not where he comes from. Is he an African-American? Sure. He will tell you he sees through the lens of presbyterian elder. He sees through the lens of being presbytery. Yes, he's concerned about issues of justice for African-Americans and for all and he's concerned about those kinds of things, but not inordinately to the point of saying or doing things.

Now, we also take issue not only with the process, and frankly, I have to say that process Mr. Priest is in a very difficult position, because if he challenges the process he may never get ordained. This committee has the power and the right to say whether he should ever be ordained. You can do it in a number of ways and you can say, no, he always has the right to go to presbytery and challenge their decision. But where does that get him if he does that, what is the taste in your mouth, what is the future, how are we working together if we go that route? So a more reasoned route and a route certainly recommended that he's willing to take is we have to be here, we have to participate. We object to it, because we believe it violates his rights and we have to participate and we are participating. We don't waive that, but there's no other way to go with this. We have to go ahead the way it is today.

Now, let me talk to you for a moment about the evidence that is in this case. On February 18, 2009, Mr. Priest went to Second Mile Center as part of a seminary project to look at urban ministries within the presbytery as opposed to the model being taught in the seminary. I don't know whether that model is good, bad, or otherwise. I just know that's the model the professors are teaching and that was a part of his courses to go in some center somewhere against the model. So he went to the two in the presbytery, the two centers in the presbytery, urban ministry centers, one on the 17th, one on the 18th.

He then presented on March 9th, he presented his report to the seminary, and we have all the slides and everything he said is on those slides and documents. I trust the committee had access to it and can see it. On March 12th he presented that again to the seminary, and on the 16th he shared the results in March of '09 with both centers meeting with Mr. Edwards who's here, one of the centers and meeting with Ms. Azar, the other head, and he shared results of his study of his visit there at both centers compared to the model. He believes in the model, rightly or wrong he believes in the model. As the committee reports he prefers that model. I don't see anything wrong with preferring a particular model with having to do urban ministry, but that's certainly a mistake.

But anyway, in March '09 he met with Ms. Azar and other folks from SMC, Second Mile, and Mr. Edwards, and presented his findings. They were all present together. He only ever spoke with Ms. Azar twice. Once was during his visit, once first visit; once during his presentation of his findings on March 16th. March 16, '09, onward he had no contact with Ms. Azar.

Now, hold that over here aside to deal with another factual setting that I'm sure the committee also went in to.

For a long time there was a question of Ms. Azar's and the center's reporting or oversight, reporting to or oversight by presbytery, and one of the issues was, how do we as a presbytery, how to raise benefits and who has oversight. So that needed to be cleaned up. Had nothing to do with Mr. Priest. Started long before he came on board. Mr. Priest was hired by a women's council, I may not be given exact right name, that oversaw Second Mile Center. But the question came up, how to make sure she's under the purview, control, and oversight of the presbytery. That was in the works before Mr. Priest ever went out there.

On March 2, '09, the coordinating cabinet of presbytery approved the Second Mile Center model that is with Ms. Azar at the head and approved it to come in under the oversight of the presbytery. June 23, '09 the presbytery approved the action of the coordinating cabinet of March 2,

'09, and said, yes, we will accept her, accept her as employees or technical employees of the presbytery. Again, this is not something that Mr. Priest was involved in directly. But I must tell you for the full year of 2009, he served as moderator of the presbytery and also a member of the coordinating cabinet. Why is that important? Because in September, October 2009, a lady named Rosy Lattimore submits a letter to stated clerk or to the coordinating cabinet and the stated clerk weighs in on it and deals with the question of, the question of can the presbytery approve a position and make a presbytery position without adhering to the rules of the presbytery procedure of the presbytery regarding open bidding and open advertising and that type of thing. Can we just allow somebody to come in to that position without having to go through the process the presbytery says this is our procedure when we have presbyteries all over.

Coordinating cabinet some time between October 5 and December 5 of '09 looked into the subject. Mr. Priest was on that committee, and they agreed on December 5 to send a letter to Ms. Lattimore that says, in the future we're not going to do this. We're not going to just take somebody in without advertising, promoting the position. But there are extenuating circumstances here, and so we're not going to undue this particular one, that's December 5, 2009.

Now Mr. Priest's term as moderator ends with the

January 2010 meeting. No action has been taken by anybody to do anything at that point in time except the committee that he's a member of has written back to Ms. Lattimore saying, you're right, it probably was a violation of our procedure but the extenuating circumstances we're going to leave it that way. Once he's no longer moderator in April 2010, he prepares and requests and submits to the presbytery a motion to rescind that action, that action of approval of the appointment and the adoption of Ms. Azar as that position. He was not at that presbytery meeting in 2010.

Another, Ms. Lattimore did offer the motion. There was a lot of exchange in that time frame April 2010 just before the presbytery meeting about six or seven days before. One part of the exchange that went on during that time frame was executive presbytery provided Mrs. Azar with a heads up, this motion is coming and I want you to know about it and stated clerk talked about e-mails talking about here's the way the parliamentary process and procedure we're going to use at that meeting, presbytery meeting.

One of the things this jumps out at that point in time is an e-mail at that point in time, now talking about April 2010, that Ms. Azar said to the presbytery, what can we do to bring charges against Mr. Priest and Ms. Lattimore, because this is just a wreck? And they are told and response, here's where you go to find out how to do a complaint. So a

complaint was filed.

 Now, the timing, I submit to this committee, is a big issue, something I would really want to know about. Why Ms. Azar, why from March of '09 when he makes his report with Mr. Edwards present -- I'm not sure what Mr. Edwards remembers -- why was nothing taken until this motion came up by a member of presbytery? Any member of the presbytery has a right to make a motion, and there's nothing wrong with making motion. May not agree with it and you could certainly vote them down, but why did nothing go on until after the motion came forward over being deposed in April 2010, thirteen months later.

The presbytery at the April 27 meeting did not deal with that motion directly. The presbytery at that motion, at that meeting heard a motion by another who said, I move that we not hear that motion. I object to it and move we not hear it. So presbytery voted on that issue and that issue prevailed and the motion that Mr. Priest was offered was not heard, read, made, voted on per se.

I will submit to you in July 2010, Mr. Priest and Elder Dorothy Seabrooks and Ms. Lattimore filed a complaint with the Senate about that process, that is how can you deny a motion and rule it out of order before you ever had a motion made? Is that appropriate process, is there an issue here? That has since been dismissed for jurisdiction. Mr. Priest was not at the meeting so he did not have standing.

The other motion of the other two was a day late in being filed, so it was dismissed as not timely, that's all.

In the meantime, the complaint had been filed by Ms. Azar and Mr. Priest's sponsoring church along with investigative committee and began hearing. The presbytery did not form an investigative committee. This committee did and the Book of Order gives you the power to look into things, but not in the form of investigative committee. So we would submit to you that if you look at all of the facts and all of the documents and all of the records, and hear all of the witnesses -- for example, Mr. Edwards is given a statement saying I was there in March 2009 at the meeting with Mr. Priest and Ms. Azar and myself to figure out how the directors of the two urban ministries program of presbytery of Detroit can work together and share information and resources. There's nothing in this statement, nothing in this statement that says Mr. Priest made disparaging remarks, didn't listen, abused his authority or did anything racial or made any racial statements or acted in any way untoward toward Ms. Azar or the Second Mile. I have his statement here and submit it to be part of the record if there's no objection. But in essence, he's saying this is the one that was difficult when I read it. I received this yesterday.

CPM shared with me that Tom and Ruth had several meetings which I had not attended. Mr. Priest would tell you

CPM representatives assured me they did not form an opinion. Time delay was due to them just getting information April 2010. So I read that particular paragraph to show again the time line that 13 months after the fact, 13 months after the last meeting, there are charges made by Mrs. Azar, charges that are disciplinary in nature which are very damaging to Mr. Priest, charges which accuse him of very serious offenses if true.

with the use of authority. Nothing that Mr. Priest did in March of '09 was as moderator of the presbytery. In fact, there's no evidence that says he came in and said, I'm the moderator, I want to do this. The evidence is that he was there doing a study and he shared results of that study as a student with his school and with the two centers. Mr. Edwards will share that this is what I heard him say. So what authority is he exercising in '09? He is the moderator of the presbytery. He is on the coordinating cabinet. But while as a moderator, nothing came up at a presbytery meeting that he swayed, oversaw, or did, or any actions taken by him there against Second Mile. In fact, as a member of the coordinating cabinet he was part of the cabinet's discernment and

discussion when they responded to Ms. Lattimore's concern that, yes, we didn't follow procedure but you're correct, but this isn't the case to change it. We will leave it as is.

So that whole year '09 when he's in that position of moderator and member of that committee, where is any evidence that he used his authority against Second Mile Center or Ms. Azar? And we take strong exception to that inclusion, that he abused his authority, which is a very serious charge. But we will say this at this point too, if the conclusion of those listed in trying to discern as this sounds like that to us, certainly apologize and begs forgiveness because that's not who he is or what he was trying to do and that's a misperception of what actually happened on that occasion.

But you cannot point to any place in any record of the presbytery or in the coordinating cabinet, you cannot point to any evidence there that says here, here's when he abused his power, here's where he over-used his authority, here's where he took advantage of that authority. And the motion was made in April 2010 by him to look into the issue, not Ms. Azar, but look into the issue of, can we allow folks to be put in presbytery positions without following our process and procedure, and if not, what should we do about situations for that to occur. He has the right to make that motion as member of the presbytery. Is that an abuse of his authority? He disagreed and goodness knows I go to presbytery

meetings all the time, people disagree. Is that an abuse of authority? I submit that is not.

It says at that time, Mr. Priest did not notify

Second Mile he was taking his findings and interpretations of
findings to presbytery. There's no evidence he took them to
presbytery at the time that he was moderator or member of
coordinating cabinet. Now, did it come up at some later time
to the presbytery when he made the motion? Sure. But is that
wrong to at that point in time raise it in support of his
motion? He says he didn't use that same influence and
authority to provide opportunity to Second Mile and voice and
actions intended to dramatically affect him. He was not
moderator. He was not dysfunction if he filed a motion to
tell them this is the motion per se. The motion is not
directed at them per se, although certainly can be perceived
that way.

I submit to you the conclusion drawn about abuse of authority is, we submit, overreaching.

Now the committee also observed a consistent pattern of prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening. All of us need to be better listeners, and if he's not a good listener I think this committee ought to encourage him to be a better listener and encourage him to take training in being a better listener. Mediation skills, I don't know if he needs that. I'm a mediator. I certainly handle hundreds

and hundreds of mediations in my life time, does that train you to listen? Yes. So does counseling courses I took in seminary, they trained me to listen. So years of practice of law trained me to listen. Lots of places you can go to learn to listen. Not everybody's a good listener. The bible tells you over and over, hear, see. Always enjoy the line, God gave us two ears and one tongue, two eyes and one tongue, so suggests I need to hear twice as much as I talk. I know you want me to shut up now.

I think those are two serious things, abuse of authority and persistent pattern of prejudging. I think if you sat and listened to Mr. Priest, find out who he is. He's a man, middle age, hearing the call of God to serve, to be a minister of the word and sacrament. How easy it would be to say I'm too old, too many other things going on, but he's here and listening to the Holy Spirit. He cares about people. Is he an African-American concerned about issues of justice and fairness? Yes, but all of us are whether we're African-American, otherwise. We as Christians certainly heard the words of our Lord speaking to us and walk humbly before our God and seek justice and love mercy.

Tom Priest I know is that way. I think the gentleman here with us today, say the Tom Priest that they know is that way. Does that mean he's not to speak out on issues where he doesn't think it's right? If a job is going

to be offered in a minority area is it right not to have it advertised so it can be filled by someone who may not have gone through that process? I think that's fair to raise that question. Maybe in this case we wished he hadn't, but is it fair to raise it? I think there's folks here who raised questions about that before.

Now, the suggestion that there's something wrong being fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry, I don't know that that's objectionable, but if being fiercely devoted is a problem, we again beg forgiveness. I don't think that's really what the issue is here.

Seems to me in looking at the charges, concerns as they are called, dealing with authority and consistent patterns and assumptions of knowing more than others know. I think those are admonitions that he needs, fair to say them and tell him he needs to be concerned about those things, but not in the context of a disciplinary proceeding, not in a context where every word is being taken down and preserved for goodness knows what purpose, not in the context of investigating a complaint of this committee that doesn't have the authority to do them, investigating presbytery itself.

Seems to me when we on CPM approach a candidate we're here for two functions. Gatekeeping surely and we have to do that.

But nurturing too, and I commend you because I think your report does seek to provide, nurture, gatekeeping and nurture

and comes to the recommendation. Frankly, we're fine with the recommendation and perhaps would even say let's go with them but not with the conclusions and not with the report and not with the process.

So when we conclude all of this, what we ask you to do is not approve this report as it's written, because it makes a very strong statement about this man that could be damaging for the rest of his, potentially damaging for the rest of his career, but to adopt the recommendations and say we reviewed the report and we mark it as receive. We do not adopt the report but we do believe that the recommendations, we do accept the recommendations. As our moderator has said, Ms. Bohn said at the beginning, often CPM's do require additional steps not particularly spelled out in the Book of Order, but certainly in the purview of determining suitability and nurture. I think it would be appropriate to assure yourselves that, one, this man is ready to go forward at some point in time. I think you ought to do that, but to assign to him fault and to investigate him in this way and determine that he has violated certain steps and proceedings, I would encourage you not to do that.

I appreciate your listening to me and letting me go through this. I can take you through the evidence. I brought copies of all the documents I referred to that if you would like to have them. I got Mr. Priest here. I got Mr. Edwards

And anyway then one of these e-mails if you like to have it, one of these e-mails, April 14, we would like to know what charges we can bring against Mr. Priest and Ms. Lattimore. We believe this is harassment. We want to move forward with charges. That's Paragraph 3 of that e-mail.

Mr. Koster then writes a response, very eloquent response the next day saying, you're fair to everybody here, here's the outline of the process. Anybody can do what they have to do. Here's how it works, spells it out with a whole series of e-mails and here's a complaint filed April 21.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: So as a follow-up, Tom, to that, is it your feeling that Ruth Azar fabricated these allegations

against you of harassment, sexual -- racial insensitivity, and I think some gender inequality, I was going there with that comment? What is then the mctivation in your bottom line for what her actions were, the fact that she fabricated these allegations as retribution toward you for the role you saw yourself necessarily having to play in her appointment?

UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: What's your question, Larry?

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: My question is whether Tom feels
that the complainant fabricated the allegations as retribution
towards him?

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: I don't know if that would be appropriate to even answer.

REV. WALLACE: I was getting ready to say something close to that. We don't say whether she tells the truth or not. We do point to two things. One, we deny all these things, context changes all of these things. They weren't said to her and there was an issue before the house, the presbytery about re-advertising the job. What motivated her I don't think anybody would say.

ELDER PRIEST: Can I say something in my defense? I feel bad people talking for me. People aren't used to that from me. I will say this. It's very important to me what Mr. Wallace says about what was said to her, and I think that's a key piece of data what was said to each person individually, not summed up and said these are the comments

REV. DOWNS: Any other questions addressing different issues, different aspects at this point? Okay, then what I will do is give us a 5 minute recess.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: I have an observation.

REV. DOWNS: Please do.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE: I'm more concerned in the report about their observations of their interaction with Mr. Priest when he was with them, and I'm more concerned about their perception with him as a person they were talking with who was a potential candidate for ministry. The allegations, and I understand you be defensive in that situation, but the allegations have been dismissed for lack of evidence and I'm not concerned about the allegations, but I am concerned how he functions with relation to this committee.

REV. KOSTER: As a point of order, we don't know why the allegations were dismissed. The Book of Order says that an investigative committee must decide whether it has the evidence to prove it, whether they have considering the people who testified and evidence they have. 

Doris Arnett Whitaker, Vice Clerk, of the Synod Permanent Judicial Commission met by conference call to examine documents provided by the Complainant and the Presbytery's Committee of Counsel for case Latimore et al v. The Presbytery of Detroit. (indexed as case # 2010-02) The Rev. George Baird, Stated Clerk for the Synod of the Covenant, joined the conference call in order to assist with questions of process, but did not participate in the examination of documents under the provisions of D-6.0305, or in the decision about them.

The purpose of this conference call was to determine whether the Preliminary Questions were answered according to D-6.0305.

D-6.0305a the governing body has jurisdiction
The answer is yes

D-6.0305b the complainant has standing to file the case

Elder Thomas Priest was not in attendance at the presbytery meeting at which the action in question was taken by the presbytery and therefore, does not have standing. Both Elder Rosy Latimore and Elder Dorothy Seabrooks were in attendance and enrolled as elder commissioners at this meeting so therefore, the answer is yes.

D-6.0305c the complaint was timely filed

The complaint was received by the Synod office on Tuesday, July 27, 2010 which is at least ninety-one days after the date of the presbytery meeting. The Synod office was open on Monday, July 26, 2010 on which the documents could have been delivered. Therefore, the answer is no.

D-6.0305d the complaint states a claim upon which relief can be granted.

According to Robert's Rules of Order (10<sup>th</sup> edition), the motion, *Objection to the Consideration of a Question*, is one of a category of motions known as incidental Motions. Incidental Motions relate to "pending" business or other business at hand. (RONR, page 66, ¶15). "The purpose of an Objection to the Consideration of a Question is to enable the assembly to avoid a particular original main motion altogether when it believes it would be strongly undesirable for the motion even to come before the assembly." (RONR, page 258, ¶ 25) This indicates that the procedures used during the Presbytery meeting of April 27, 2010, while unusual, were not out of order. Because the action of the presbytery in dealing with this matter was in order and because the SPJC cannot force a Presbytery to apologize to its own assembly, the SPJC cannot grant the relief requested. Therefore the answer is no.

Since two of the four Preliminary Questions have been answered in the negative, the officers of the Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod of the Covenant have determined that this case cannot be accepted. The request from the Presbytery Committee of Counsel to dismiss this case will not be considered since the case is not being accepted.

If any party to this case, or any member of the Synod Permanent Judicial Commission, wish to challenge the findings of the moderator and clerk of the PJC they may do so under the provisions of the Rules of Discipline D-6.0306. Such challenges should be sent to me at the synod office address.

#### 1. Call to Order:

CPM co-chair Beth Downs called the meeting to order at 9 am with prayer. The minutes were approved, as corrected.

#### 2. Introductions:

All members were introduced and the following were seated: Tom Priest, Stanley Edwards, elder Calvary Pres, Darryl Reynolds, elder Calvary, Rev. Archibald Wallace, attorney and advisor to Tom Priest, Mrs. Courter as court reporter, Christine Bohn as member of the Investigative Committee, and Ed Koster, Clerk of Presbytery.

#### 3. Motion to Approve Agenda:

The agenda was approved

#### 4. Explanation of Purpose and Process:

Beth Downs reminded the committee that we are reconvening the CPM hearing on the motion to adopt the report and recommendations of the investigative sub-committee regarding the complaint of Ruth Azar, of Second Mile Center, against Tom Priest, candidate. The investigative committee included David Abbott, Christine Bohn (COM), Elizabeth Rice, and Henry Johnson. Beth urged fairness and diligence in our task to assess the report, and to determine Tom's fitness for ministry, in accordance with the process outlined in the Book of Order, and the manual for CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit. We do not have function or power to determine disciplinary action, and this is not a legal or disciplinary hearing.

#### 5. Hearing Stage

- On February 1, 2011, a motion was made and seconded to adopt the Investigating Committee's
  report and recommendations. Having been postponed and not withdrawn, it was still on the floor.
  The Investigating Committee's report and recommendations were read. This report can be found on
  the POD Caucus website.
- Mr Wallace acknowledged CPM's right and responsibility to evaluate suitability for ministry, but
  maintained that the style and tone of the report and process of the Investigative committee are
  disciplinary in nature and therefore in excess of that right.
- Mr. Wallace responded to the issues raised in the report, specifically: that Mr. Priest did not abuse
  his authority as Moderator of the Presbytery; and that Mr. Priest values justice and equity highly and
  never intended prejudice or malice in any interactions he had with Ms. Azar.
- Mr. Wallace submitted that Mr. Priest does not object to the recommendations of the sub-committee, but to the nature of the report, its conclusions, and the process by which this has been handled.
   They requested that the committee approve the recommendations, but not the report.
- Mr. Priest stated that he is committed to his call to ministry, and submits to the authority of this body
  and the recommendations for growth and training. He suggested that all parties involved should be
  offered the training as an opportunity to build community. He maintained that any conflict resolution
  should include all involved.
- Mr. Wallace submitted a narrative from Mr. Stan Edwards, elder, Calvary Presbyterian Church and director of Barnabas Center, about his participation in the meetings with Tom (copy attached).
- The committee went into executive session. Mr. Koster was asked to remain.

#### 7. Executive Session

 The approved minutes of this session are sealed and on file in the offices of the Presbytery of Detroit.

#### 8. Move to Open Session

- The Committee returned to open session. While in executive session, the Committee adopted
  the report and recommendations of the CPM Subcommittee Convened in the Matter of Complaint
  by Ruth Azar against Thomas H. Priest, Jr, dated January 18, 2011, as follows.
- After considerable discussion, a motion is made to separate the report from the recommendations. Second. Votes to approve 10, to oppose 8. The motion passed.
- The motion to adopt the report is approved.
- A motion on the floor is to adopt the recommendations. A question was raised about including objective measurements of progress.
- A motion was made that in addition to the mediation training. Mr. Priest return to this committee to report on what he learned, and then as a follow-on he participate in a psychological assessment. Withdrawn.
- A motion was made to adopt the recommendations, amended as follows:

# CPM SUBCOMMITTEE CONVENED IN THE MATTER OF COMPLAINT BY RUTH AZAR AGAINST CANDIDATE THOMAS H. PRIEST, JR. Date of Report - January 18, 2011

#### Introduction

After prayerful consideration, the CPM of the Presbytery of Detroit, on May 4, 2010, authorized the formation of a subcommittee to investigate the above referenced complaint. The composition of the subcommittee was approved June 1: Reverend David Abbott, Reverend Christine Bohn, Elder Henry Johnson, and Reverend Elizabeth Rice.

The committee convened its first meeting on June 9, 2010, the intent being to determine its agenda and the process for achieving outcomes. The committee received guidance from the Stated Clerk. Ed Koster, concerning process and the parameters of its investigation.

The committee's task was to investigate and make a recommendation to CPM concerning Mr. Priest's suitability for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was not this committee's task to determine whether or not the Constitution of the PC(USA) was violated. This committee was advisory to CPM on matters of suitability and preparation for ministry; disciplinary or judicial proceedings were not this committee's purview.

We met again on June 22, 2010, to begin scheduling interviews and to clarify our approach to the investigation.

On July 15, 2010, we interviewed Ruth Azar. Key issues included:

- concerns about Mr. Priest's Interactions with staff and volunteers at Second Mile Center (SMC)
- · disturbing statements made by Mr. Priest during his visit to SMC
- a perception that SMC was being targeted by Mr. Priest and its ministry devalued and undermined.

On July 28, 2010, we met to discuss the interview with Ms. Azar and plan for the interview with Mr. Priest.

On August 9, 2010, we interviewed Mr. Priest, who was accompanied by his Advocate, Elder Darrell Reynolds. The committee found it notable that Mr. Priest gave lengthy responses to the questions and frequently redirected the conversation. Key issues included:

- · a denial of certain comments and insistence that others were taken out of context
- Mr. Priest's desire that Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and SMC work together, share resources, and visit other urban ministries
- his preferred model of urban ministry and his interpretations of his observations of SMC.

On August 13, 2010, we met to discuss and plan.

On September 28, 2010, we interviewed separately Sandra Addrow, Lawrence Lorkowski, and Elder Stan Edwards. We interviewed each person specifically about their personal interactions with Mr. Priest during his visits to SMC and Barnabas Youth Opportunities Center and a later meeting at SMC.

On November 19, 2010, we met for discussion and further planning.

On November 30, 2010, we met for further discussion and also to interview another witness, who was present at the later meeting at SMC.

On December 10, 2010, we met again for further discussion of past interviews and also to interview a final witness.

On January 11, 2011, we met again to draft a report and recommendation.

We finalized our report on January 18, 2011

#### Central Issues

Three primary areas of concern were identified by this committee.

One of these concerns has to do with use of authority. In arranging his first visit to Second Mile Center, Mr. Priest identified himself as a seminary student preparing a paper for a class. In subsequent activities, however, Mr. Priest regularly used his influence and authority as Moderator of Presbytery and former moderator of the Metropolitan Urban Ministries Team to lobby decision-making bodies within presbytery to share his view of work and structure of Second Mile Center. At the same time, Mr. Priest did not notify Second Mile that he was taking his findings and interpretation of those findings to presbytery, nor did he use that same Influence and authority to provide an opportunity for Second Mile to have voice in actions intended to affect dramatically the future of the Center. In other words, Mr. Priest represented himself as a student to the subjects of his investigation, but freely applied the authority of presbytery office to pursue actions against those subjects.

This committee also observed a consistent pattern of Mr. Priest prejudging the opinions and experiences of others without listening to what they had to say about their own opinions and experiences. People self-identifying with three different racial-ethnic groups (white, Arab-American, and African-American) indicated to the committee their frustration and discomfort when they perceived that Mr. Priest assumed he knew what they thought about certain issues (or what they should think) based on his perception of their racial-ethnic identity. At least in certain circumstances, it appears that Mr. Priest was unwilling to listen to what people had to say about their experience and opinions and was, instead, rather forceful verbally in attributing his experience and opinion to others.

It is evident to this committee that Mr. Priest is fiercely devoted to his preferred model of urban ministry. This committee is concerned that Mr. Priest is unwilling to acknowledge the legitimacy of alternative ministry styles and routinely uses methods of confrontation and intimidation.

#### Recommendations

It is the opinion of this committee that Candidate Priest's current pattern of confrontational behaviors would cause great difficulty in a congregation and in a presbytery.

Therefore, this committee moves that CPM require Mr. Priest to participate in the Mediation Skills Training Institute for Church Leaders led by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center.

Additionally, we move that at an appropriate future time CPM examine Mr. Priest to assess his pastoral development in the areas identified above.

This assessment might include such tools as asking Mr. Priest to write papers on what he has learned personally and professionally from the mediation skills training and his own sense of pastoral identity and authority.

[This assessment will include asking Mr. Priest to present a report on what he has learned personally and professionally.

CPM requires Mr. Priest to subsequently undergo professional assessment through Midwest Career Counseling Center. CPM will furnish Midwest with the CPM Sub-Committee report and require that Midwest furnish their assessment to CPM.

Pastoral counseling may also be helpful in Mr. Priest's learning and healing through this process, and CPM encourages Mr. Priest to pursue that option.]

  examining Liz on her responses to Form 3, a motion was made to sustain her annual
  consultation. Seconded. Approved. Upon examining Liz on her statement of faith, her exegesis
  and her sermon, a motion was made and seconded to grant her final assessment and give her
  permission to circulate her PIF. Approved. Liz was dismissed with prayer.
- Group C met with Monique Fube for Annual Consultation (CLP, Rice). A motion was made to
  continue her in the learning phase of CLP, while urging her to complete her field placement.
   Seconded. Approved. Although she submitted her exam after the due date, a recommendation
  is made to proceed to grade it. Jenny McDevitt and Judi McMillan agreed to help Monique was
  dismissed with prayer.
- Group D met with Cynthia Rouse-Baird for Annual Consultation (CLP, Barbara Jackson). Group D does not recommend any action to be taken by CPM at the moment. They recommend that we not to sustain her annual consultation, because her paperwork was late, incomplete and her written responses hard to evaluate. This is a time for discernment for her and the committee. She has yet to decide if she will retake the exam. The committee requests a follow-up assessment with Cynthia in two months. Tom raised concerns about the lack of appropriate care and nurture provided by the committee, lack of clear instructions, and constructive feedback. Cynthia was dismissed with prayer.

#### 10. Business:

- Report from Al Timm:
  - a Al reported on the clergy event in February. It was well received, and 8 candidates attended.
  - There will be a workshop on stewardship on March 26, at Ypsilanti. Robert Hunter is the presenter.
  - Al will offer a course on Polity at ETS in the Fall, depending on what the educators want, either Al or Ed Koster will teach it.
- Sub-committee Reports:
  - Lay Pastor Preparation Sub-Committee Report (formerly CLP report).
    - The committee will meet in April at 9:30 am, focusing on the issue of the final examination for the CLP candidates. Larry has collected other samples for the committee to compare and consider for the recommendation for the format of the examination.
  - c Ordination Exams The exam results are due in about two weeks.
  - Session Relations No new business.
  - c CPM Retreat No new business to be reported.
- Coordinating Cabinet Operations requests us to describe what we would require in an
  associate executive presbyter. Richard Brownlee will attend in March. Betsy will attend in April.
- Liaison Reports:
  - We need a new liaison for David Oh, who is currently working in California
  - o We thank David Abbott for his faithful service, and relieve him of any co-opt responsibilities.

- There are three other people who would like to be reassigned to a new liaison. We need to assess how assignments are made, rather than default to whoever raises their hand.
   We need to ensure appropriate liaison oversight. Larry suggests a half-day retreat to regroup
- We need to ensure appropriate liaison oversight. Larry suggests a half-day retreat to regroup for reorientation. Richard recommends that the covenant include clear responsibilities on the candidate's part.

There being no further business, CPM adjourned at 3:50 pm with prayer. The next gathering of CPM is scheduled for April 5, 2011 at 11:00 am at Drayton Plains Community Church, Waterford. Tom Hartley and Beth Downs will be our hosts, and Larry Gage will lead in prayer.

On Wednesday, August 9, 2011, I, as Moderator and the Rev. Doris Arnett Whitaker, Clerk, of the Synod Permanent Judicial Commission met by conference call to examine documents provided by the Complainant and the Presbytery's Committee of Counsel for the above-captioned matter.

Pursuant to Book of Order, Rules of Discipline, D-6.0305a, the SPJC lacks jurisdiction to consider Remedial Case 2011-04; Pursuant to Book of Order, Rules of Discipline, D-6.0305b, the complainant lacks standing to file the case; Pursuant to Book of Order, Rules of Discipline, D-6.0305c, the complaint was not timely filed; and pursuant to Book of Order, Rules of Discipline, D-6.0305d, the complaint fails to state a claim upon which relief can be granted.

Since all four Preliminary Questions have been answered in the negative, the officers of the Permanent Judicial Commission of the Synod of the Covenant have determined that this case cannot be accepted.

If any party to this case or any member of the Synod Permanent Judicial Commission wishes to challenge the findings of the moderator and clerk of the PJC they may do so under the provisions of the Rules of Discipline D-6.0306. Such challenges should be sent to me at the synod office address.
