A telegram was ordered sent to Senators Homer Ferguson and Arthur H. Vandenberg, members of the Foreign Relations Committee of the U.S. Senate, urging repeal of the Chinese Exclusion Act.

The morning session was closed with prayer by Rev. Samuel M. Zwemer, and Presbytery recessed for lunch.

During the luncheon period Rev. Shigeo Tanabe addressed Tanabe members of Presbytery and the Women's Presbyterial on the address Japanese- American residents in the Detroit area and the service we can render to these our fellow citizens.

The Rev. Arthur W. Ratz, presented Dr. DaleWelch, President of Alma College, who addressed Presbytery on the theme: "A Survey of Alma College."

The Rev. Leslie A. Dechtel introduced Colorel Edwin S. Col. George George who, in an address to Presbytery, announcing his gift to the Presbytery of the grounds and property to be known as gift the Kirk in the Hills, and presenting a deed therefore, stated that a dream he had long cherished was beginning to be fulfilled. On behalf of the Presbytery and on behalf of the Board of Church Extension, the Moderator, the Rev. Henry J. Walch and the Chair-man of the Board, Mr. J. Nelson Pyle, with moving words of appreciation and thanks, accepted the deed. Lake Shore dissolution The Presbytery concurred with the joint requests of the Rev. Lowell M. McConnell and the Lake Shore Church, for dissolution of the pastoral relations. Angerman of the Woodward Ave. Church, for examination as candidates for the ministry. They were examined as totheir Christian experience and their motives for entering the ministry. The examination was sustained and they were received under the care of the Presbytery by the customary service of recognition. Prayer was offered by the Rev.Wanzer Brunelle.

The Rev. Robert Braby urged each church to send representatives to the conference on Geneva Fellowship, to be held in October.

At the request of the Board of Directors of the Presbyterian Home, the personnel of the Board was changed to six ministers and fifteen laymen in place of tenemin-isters and eleven laymen.

The petition of the Winchester Village congregation, bearing eighty-four names, to organize it into a Presbyterian Church, was presented. A committee was appointed by the Moderator to examine the petition and, if the way be clear to proceed to the organization of the church on Sunday morning September 26th. The committee is as follows: Revs. Leslie A. Bechtel, Hugh Jack, Arthur Bily, and elders Merrill Chute and Ernest Upton of the Woodward Ave. Church.

The Rev. Arthur M. Stevenson, Jr., reporting for the Committee on Social Education and Action, mentioned pemphlets and information to be sent to all churches regarding need of clothing in Europe and Korea due to the hardships occasioned by war.

The following Resolution of the Chairman was also adopted: That the Presbytery of Detroit approve and urge passage of the Detroit Equal Opportunities in Employment and Human Ordinance; that each City Councilman be fficially notified immediately of Presbytery's action; that each church notify its members of the action of the Presbytery and letters be written supporting the ordinance and that the public Press be notified of the action of the Presbytery.

The rate total was shown in break-down form as follows - Stated Clerk's administration fund 10; Executive Office 20; Synod 8; General Assembly 22¢.

The Council's recommendation was also adopted that the December stated meeting on December 4th be changed to Dec. 6th to coincide with the date of the Moderator's visit, was also adopted. By unanimous vote the Presbytery waived the rule and adopted this temporary change.

The recommendation of the Council that a Capital Funds Committee for this financial campaign be set up, was adopted, and the Moderator Capital Fugds was granted authority to appoint such a committee.

Committee petition Presbytery to have the Moderator appoint a committee from Presbytery to see Senators Ferguson and Moody while on leave from Congress and express our convictions and wishes regarding both Universal military training and the Vatican appointment; and tat the Moderator be chairman of this committee.

4. That the Presbytery initiate a letter-writing campaign to Congressmen, both Senators and Representatives, regarding universal military training and the Vatican appointment.

All of the above recommendations were adopted.

Announcements were made regarding the arrangements for the meeting of December 6th and the Moderator's visit; also that tickets were on hand for the dinner.

The Presbytery took recess at 6:30 P.M. for dinner and the afternoon session closed with prayer offered by the Rev. Herbert B. Hudnut.

The Superintendent of Missions, E. W. Dunn, presented his annual report for the year from July 1, 1951. The report and its recommendations were adopted and are as follows:

"Report of the Committee of Missions

The Committee of Missions is happy to report that there are no vacancies in the Presbytery and that all phases of the work are proceeding well. In reference to Royal Oak we report the departure of Dr. D. L. McBride and the coming of Mr. Bernard Quick as Stated Supply. Mr. Quick, a recent graduate of Pittsburgh-Xenia Seminary, will be ordained on July 13. He has already assumed his responsibility and we feel confident that the work will prosper under his leadership. We are happy also to report that under the guidance of a very efficient provisional Session the Royal Oak Congregation has elected several members to the Session and Board of Trustees. This is a healthy sign of progress for which we are grateful.

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We offer our sincere prayers for the continued spirit of good-will and cooperation.

The work of St. Mark's Church continues to prosper under the leadership of Rev. Albert Cleage. A varied and energetic program has been responsible for a fine record of accessions to this youngest congregation.

We congratulate the Drayton Plains Minister and Session for the fine effort in establishing the Pontiac Lake Mission. At present this work is under the leadership of Mr. Frank Thom, who will be a senior in our Seminary this fall. This mission looks like a promising field and the committee hopes that it will grow to the extent of becoming a permanent work with a full time man in charge. In connection with this work during the summer the Committee of Missions has recommended that the salary by the Board of American Missions be supplemented by \$35.00 a month.

The Committee also recommended, and the recommendation has been carried out, that a sum of \$250 be given Miss Lois Copeland, Presbyterial Missionary, to help in the purchase of a car to be used in her work. This sum as well as the supplemental salary for Mr. Thom, comes out of the Home Mission Fund.

Your committee brings to your attention that the Board of American Missions has changed its fiscal year to coincide with the church year. Therefore it will be necessary to make new applications for aid at the October meeting of Presbytery.

The S.M. and Dr. Irvine, representing Presbytery in Comity, have been in consultation with Rev. Howard McCalmont concerning the re-location of First Church. At present a committee of Comity is seeking to work out some details which may result in a location on Beech Rd. and Six Mile. Another possibility is a proposed working agreement with the Presbyterian Church in which property on Six Mile, about a mile from the above site, in connection with a Presbyterian Old Folks Home, may be made available. It is our sincere hope that First Church may soon be re-located and a more permanent work begun.

The Committee recommends that reimbursement be made to Rev. Walter Teeuwissen for travel expenses in connection with the work at Pontiac Lake Mission.

The committee recommended that the Presbytery dissolve the Provisional Session of the St. Mark's Church with expression of thanks of Presbytery.

The call of the meeting was read, setting forth the business to be considered. The Rev. Kenneth G. Neigh, Executive Secretary of the Presbytery introduced the business and the considerations that led to the proposal of the contemplated action with reference to a certain portion of the land connected with the property of the Presbyterian Home.

Elder E. <sup>r</sup>. Down read the Resolution of the Presbyterian Home Board of Directors, as follows:

"WHEREAS- The Board of Directors of the Presbyterian Home of Detroit, Incorporated, believe it is to the best interest of the Home, as an improvement to the property in physical appearance and to the guests in the Home in spiritual service; and, HOME resolutions on proper ty resolutions

"WHEREAS- That section is developing very rapidly as a residential section; and,

"WHEREAS There is at present, no protestant church in that neighborhood to serve the people spiritually, and

"WHEREAS The Presbytery of Detroit has a number of churches which need assistance financially in building and is not in a financial position to assist in building a church on the Home property in the near furutre; and,

"WHEREAS- the First United Presbyterian Church of Detroit is unable to build a hurch on a site selected, due to objections, on the part of residents already living near by, resulting in litigations and a Supreme Court action in favor of plaintiff; and,

"WHEREAS- Said First United Presbyterian Church of Detroit did apply to the Comity Department of the Detroit Council of Churches to locate a church in that section near the Home; and,

"WHEREAS- The Board of Directors of the Presbyterian Home of Detroit Incorporated, not knowing of the action of the First United Presbyterian Church, did, at its regular meeting on April 17, 1952, pass the following resolution to wit: "That the Board of Directors of the Home offer to the Board of Church Extension of Presbytery, a suitable parcel of ground for a Presbyterian Church; we ask the Board of Church Extension to refer this matter to the Comity Committee at once"; and,

"WHEREAS- The Comity Department of the Detroit Council, realizing the immediate need of the First United Presbyterian Church for a location did give them first priority on locating in that section and the Presbyterian Church U.S.A., second place; Sand,

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"WHEREAS There is a strong feeling in favor of unification of the United Presbyterian Church and the Presbyterian Church U.S.A., which unification may become a reality in the next few years; and,

"WHEREAS: The Board of Directors of the Presbyterian Home of Detroit Incorporated, believe that such spirit of unity should be encouraged in true Christian fellowship,

### "THEREFORE be it resolved:

That the Board of Directors of the Presbyterian Home of Detroit Incorporated, at a regularly called and constituted meeting held July 7, 1952, will deed a certain portion of the property of the Home, to the Board of Church Extension of the Presbytery of Detroit, Synod of Michigan, of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. with the approval of said Presbytery of Detroit, on condition that said Board of Church Extension will deed said parcel of property, to the First United Presbyterian Church of Detroit, to be used exclusively for the erection thereon of a church, church appurtenances including parking facilities, and manse. Provided: that said property so deeded shall not exceed, in area, five acres, and, provided further, that a church building suitable for church services shall be built by said First United Presbyterian Church on said parcel so deeded within a period of three years from date.

"Provided further, that in case said property shall cease to be used for the purpose above set forth, that is, as a church of the United Presbyterian Church or, United Presbyterian Church and the Presbyterian Church U.S.A., then said land and buildings thereon shall revert immediately to the Presbyterian Home of Detroit Incorporated."

The above resolution was adopted and incorporated into these minutes.

Board action on transfer of HOME property to U.P. Church

The Rev. Donald E. Zimmerman, as Representative of the Board of Church Extension, presented the following Resolution: "WHEREAS the First U. P. Church of Detroit has concurred in points 1, 2, 3, 4, following, "RESOLVED, that the Presbytery of Detroit approve the action of the Board of Directors of the Presbyterian Home of Detroit, as presented in a resolution passed by the Board at a special meeting on Monday July 7, 1952, deeding to the Presbyterian Board of Church Extension Of Detroit a parcel of land from the property of the Home upon certain conditions and considerations; that the Presbytery, consistent with the resolution of the Board of Directors of the Presbyterian Home, hereby instruct the Presbyterian Board of Church Extension to deed the same parcel of land to the First United Presbyterian Church of Detroit upon the conditions named; and that the Presbytery approve the following Plan of Cooperation upon which the work projected at the site deeded to the First United Presbyterian Church shall proceed as a cooperative project between this Church and the Presbytery of Detroit U.S.A., to wit, that:

"1. The First United Presbyterian Church will endeavor to serve the families in the community and in the Home for the Aged who are receptive to a Presbyterian ministry.

"2. The Presbytery of Detroit, U.S.A., will promote the growth and welfare of the First United Presbyterian Church as it would one of its own congregations.

"3. The Presbytery of Detroit, U.S.A will welcome the Minister and Elders of the First United Presbyterian Church to, and they will undertake to attend, all its meetings as fraternal delegates.

"4. The Session and leadership of the First United Presbyterian Church will seek opportunity to promote the interests and participation of the congregation in Presbyterian missions and institutions."

This resolution was also adopted. In addition, the Board of Church Extension was instructed to see that a reversion clause is included in the final deed supplementing the closing paragraph of the resolution of the Presbyterian Home.

Prior to Presbytery adjournment the Presbytery welcomed the members present of the Presbytery of Detroit of the United Presbyterian Church, meeting at the same time. Representatives of both exchanged greetings and felicitations at the happy consummation of these resolutions and agreements. Chapter 5, verses 1 to 12, of the Gospel of St. John were read by our Moderator, and the assembly adjourned with a closing prayer and the Apostolical benediction pronounced by the Rev. William H. Molbon.

The above minutes, prior to adjournment, were read and approved.

"3. Any other details and arrangements that pertain thereto." It was moved and seconded that the Moderator's authority in calling this special meeting be confirmed. Motion carried.

The Presbytery proceeded to the business of the meeting.

Dr. H. D. McCalmont presented the information concerning First church seeking for a building site, giving a description of a piece of property on Beech Road that would have cost \$15,000, and showing a brief sketch and map of a tract of land 300 x 500 feet being offered by the Presbyterian Home of Detroit, as a building site for First church.

It was moved and seconded that the Presbytery grant permission to the First United Presbyterian Church of Detroit to relocate, and approval of the location on the property of the Presbyterian Home. The motion carried.

The proposed plan of cooperation between the First United Presbyterian Church and the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. was presented and is as follows:

"Proposed Plan of Cooperation - 1. The First United Presbyterian Church will endeavor to serve the families in the community and in the Home for the Aged who are receptive to a Presbyterian ministry.

"2. The Presbytery of Detroit, of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A., will promote the growth and welfare of the First United Presbyterian Church as it would one of its own congregations.

"3. The Presbytery of Detroit (U.S.A.) will welcome the minister and elders of the First U. P. Church to, and they will undertake to attend all its meetings as fraternal delegates.

"4. The session and leadership of First Church will seek opportunity to promote the interest and participation of the congregation in Presbyterian missions and institutions."

It was moved and seconded that Presbytery approve the proposed plan of cooperation with the Detroit Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. Motion carried.

# July 10, 1952

It was moved and seconded that Presbytery give approval to the general idea of cooperation with the Detroit Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. in establishing the First church on the property of the Presbyterian Home and that a Commission be appointed to act for Presbytery in all matters pertaining thereto. Motion carried.

The Moderator proceeded to appoint the following commission with Willard Wylie, D.D. as moderator, to meet following this meeting of Presbytery for organization, to deal with all matters pertaining to the relocation of the First church on the property of the Presbyterian Home: Rev. Willard Wylie, Rev. V. A. Barnes, Donald Quaife, Ralph Smallman.

Moved and seconded that Presbytery confirm the Moderator's appointment. Motion carried.

At this point the suggestion was offered that our Presbytery meet informally with the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. for its closing adjournment.

Moved and seconded that this special meeting of Presbytery be adjourned following the informal meeting with the Presbyterian Presbytery. Motion carried.

Our Presbytery then united with the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. and actions of both Presbyteries were discussed before the joint meeting. There was a general fine spirit of complete accord in this cooperative movement with the thought that real history was being made in this movement.

The meeting was closed with a devotional service and prayer by the Rev. William Molbon, moderator of Detroit Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church U. S. A.

That all churches be asked to continue the total amount of giving to local Presbyterian benevolences by subscribing to the Unified Budget that amount which shall be not less than 4½% of the current expense receipts for the last reported year of the said church, and where churches are giving an amount in excess of 4½% of the last reported year of the current expense receipts, that said church shall continue its giving at that proportion. In subsequent years the General <sup>C</sup>ouncil shall review and recommend to the <sup>P</sup>resbytery the percentage formula for the following year, not later than the June meeting.
- C. That the following budget of \$130,000.00 be adopted for the following named agencies and that any monies which come in over and above said budget, or if for any reason said monies shall fall short of said budget, That in either event, said monies shall be distributed in accordance with the percentage allocations set forth hereunder opposite each local benevolence;

Our village population reached 75 permanent and short-term guests this past summer when we were able to give medical and nursing care to six non-Residents who were referred to us by pastors in the Detroit Presbytery. Because of the continued good health of our sixty-six permanent Residents in Sterling Hall and Apartment Row Units, we have been able to provide short term vacation and convalescent conv care for sixteen different people during the months of June, July, August and September. Three of these are classifed as long-term care. This is a service we can render members of your church and we invite inquiries about convalescent care. Secondly, a word about our expansion program. A commitment has been received from the F.H.A. for an insured mortgage in the amount of \$799,100. Interim financing is being arranged with Citizens Mortgage Company of Detroit. It is our hope that A.N. Hickson Company, the successful bidder, will be in construction within the next 45 days when we believe our legal work will be finished. We do invite your groups to visit the Village and where this is not possible, we will be very happy to send a staff person to your church to talk about the Village and its program.

The Committee on Stewardship and Mission reported through the chairman, The Rev. Ralph C. Stribe, Jr., that a workshop on General Mission Interpretation will be held on May 16, 1963 at First Presbyterian Church, Detroit, for local church Stewardship Committees and Youth Stewardship Committees. The Pastor's Orientation for the 1964 General Mission program will be presented prior to the May and June meetings of Presbytery at 4:30 p.m. The chairman presented Mrs. Ethridge Donaldson, Acting Director of Protestant Community Services, who spoke regarding the work of that agency which is supported in part by Presbytery Causes.

The Committee on Radio and Television reported through the chairman, The Rev. W. Donald Pendell, who presented a check in the amount of \$4,000 to The Rev. Edward B. Willingham, Director of the Department of Radio and Television of the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches. This check represented the 1964 Matching Funds Grant of the General Assembly's Division of Radio and Television. By agreement, this is \$1,000 less than last year. 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery received the 1965 Legislative Principles Statement of the Michigan Council of Churches and asked each church to consider the principles therein contained. **BOASZ** 

3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery recognized the continuing need for, and reaffirmed its support of, the Detroit Commission on Community Relations; and further, Presbytery urged all of its constituents to consider the detrimental effect of signing any petitition circulated at any time, the purpose of which would be to eliminate or in any way hamper this splendid and necessary community agency which has done so very much to create good will and relieve tensions in Detroit. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery directed that this action be given wide publicity in the newspapers.

The Committee on National Missions reported through the chairman, The Rev. Edward D. Auchard. (see Paper B)

- 1. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the Village United Presbyterian Church permission to sell its manse located at 17678 Gaylord, Redford Township, Michigan on the open market in accord with the policies of Presbytery. The final terms and conditions of this sale are to be submitted to Presbytery for its approval.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery granted the Redford Presbyterian Church permission to purchase Lot 2 of the Alonzo P. Woodruff subdivision for ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) cash and Lot 4 of the same subdivision for sixteen thousand nine hundred dollars (\$16,900) cash. These two parcels of property adjoining the present church parking lot will be used to increase parking facilities.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the Church of Our Saviour permission to borrow up to ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000) for an addition to its present building for Christian Education purposes and for the improvement of its parking facilities. By this action Presbytery permitted the Church of Our Saviour to increase its mortgage indebtedness an additional \$5,000 beyond the amount authorized on March 23, 1965.
- 4. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the Milford Presbyterian Church permission to borrow up to two hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$225,000) for an addition to the church and alterations to its present building. By this action, Presbytery permitted the Milford Church to borrow an additional \$55,000 beyond the amount authorized on November 24, 1964.
- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery granted the Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church permission to borrow up to two hundred seventy-five thousand dollars (\$275,000) at five and one-quarter percent (5½%) interest from the Manufacturers National Bank, said loan to be paid back in fifteen years or less if the church so desires. This loan is for the construction of an all-purpose hall, additional classrooms, some remodeling of the present building, and the purchase of an organ.
- 6. Upon motion, Presbytery granted the Lake Shore Presbyterian Church permission to borrow up to two hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$225,000) for the erection of a Christian Education building; and further, the officers of the Lake Shore Presbyterian Church were granted permission to prepare a trust agreement to indenture the property of the Lake Shore Presbyterian Church for the purpose of issuing callable first mortgage bonds bearing interest at five and one-quarter percent ( $5\frac{1}{4}$ %), when sixty percent (60%) of the estimated cost of the construction of the proposed building has been indicated in bond purchase intent.
- 7. Upon motion, Presbytery received with appreciation the 1964 report of Presbyterian Village of Detroit, Incorporated. (see Paper C) Mrs. Harold Cutter, President, spoke to the report and introduced Elder Gerald C. Schroeder, Treasurer, and Elder Edwin F. Kirbert, Executive Director.

Upon motion, the report of the Committee on National Missions as a whole was received and approved.

The Committee on Ministerial Relations reported through the chairman, The Rev. MacKay Taylor. (see Paper D)

The Committee on Christian Education reported through Mrs. Ralph C. Stribe, Jr. regarding the need for additional camp and conference staff. Presbytery recessed for ten minutes and reconvened.

The Committee on National Missions reported through the chairman, The Rev. Edward D. Auchard. (see Paper D)

- 1. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the Grandale Presbyterian Church permission to increase its present mortgage indebtedness by six thousand dollars (\$6,000) for the purpose of renovating the manse at 11300 Mettetal Avenue, Detroit, Michigan.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the Oakland Avenue Church of Pontiac permission to purchase a parcel of property adjacent to the church from the Pontiac Tent and Awning Company for twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000). The terms of purchase are \$8,000 cash and the assumption of a \$12,000 obligation against the property by the Oakland Avenue Church. This property will be used for building expansion and parking.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the St. Mark's Community Church permission to enter into negotiations to borrow up to one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars \$125,000) to erect additional Christian Education space and renovate some of its present building. The church will submit its mortgage arrangements to the Committee on National Missions for approval.
- 4. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the Sashabaw Presbyterian Church permission to sell thirty-three (33) acres of the property owned by the Committee on National Missions and reserved for the Sashabaw Presbyterian Church for thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000); and further Presbytery authorized any two of the five officers of the Committee on National Missions to sign the necessary papers in connection with said sale. This action supersedes the action of March 23, 1965 (Page 126).
- 5. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the Village United Presbyterian Church permission to enter into negotiations for a mortgage not to exceed three hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$350,000) for a new sanctuary. The church will submit the details of its mortgage arrangements to the Committee on National Missions for approval. (See Page165)
- 6. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the First Presbyterian Church of Mt. Clemens permission to increase its mortgage indebtedness by eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) for parking facilities.
- 7. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted <u>Presbyterian Village</u> permission to erect eight studio apartments for a cost of one hundred sixty-six thousand five hundred dollars (\$166,500).
- The Rev. Harry W. Wright presented a report on the Summer Student Program of Presbyterian Neighborhood Services.
   <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted Miss Marie Thompson and Mr. Douglas Searles permission to address Presbytery concerning this program.

The Committee on Session Records reported through the chairman, Elder C. Clark Swick. Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following records:

- 2. Church registers of Grosse Ile and Wyandotte.

The Committee on Candidates reported through the chairman, The Rev. Frank C. Williams, and The Rev. Donald R. Candy. The committee introduced Mr. Douglas J. Searles and recommended that he be taken under the care of Presbytery. Mr. Searles is a member of the Grosse Pointe Memorial Church and a senior at Wayne State University. He addressed Presbytery regarding his Christian experience, present activites, and reasons for entering the ministry.

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6. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the Committee on National Missions permission to grant an easement to the City of Livonia along the property it owns on Newburgh Road, this being the site of St. Timothy Church, and that its officer be authorized to sign the necessary papers to effect this transaction.

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- 7. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the <u>Presbyterian Village</u> Board permission to erect a greenhouse on its property at a cost of six thousand seven hundred fifty dollars (\$6,750). The money for the greenhouse is a gift designated for this purpose.
- 8. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery received with gratitude and approved in principle the plans of the Presbyterian Village, Inc. to construct a new residence hall in 1968 at an approximate cost of nine hundred thirty-eight thousand dollars
- (\$938,000), with the understanding that six hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$650,000) is a designated gift for this project and the remaining three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000), will come from an undesignated gift or gifts. This new residence hall will be comparable to Down Hall and will provide space for fifty more residents.
- 9. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the application of <u>Presbyterian Village</u>, Inc. to the Metropolitan Detroit Building Fund for a grant of one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000) for the erection of two buildings. One building would be a residence hall and the other a central kitchen, laundry and storage.
- 10. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery took note of the leaving of Elder Joseph E. Reynolds, Executive Director of Presbyterian Neighborhood Services, to accept a position in the Presbytery of Chicago, and expressed its appreciation to Mr. Reynolds for the excellent leadership he has provided that agency.

<u>Upon motion</u>, The Rev. Basil Brown was invited to address Presbytery regarding the work and witness of the free churches which comprise the Christian Council of South Africa. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery asked Mr. Brown to convey to the Christian Council of South Africa our love and our gratitude for their witness. <u>Upon motion</u>, the report as a whole was received.

The General Assembly Report on Regional Synods and Church Administration was introduced by the Stated Clerk for discussion and action.

Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the following resolution:

- 1. The Presbytery of Detroit registers its opposition to the Report of the Special Committee on Regional Synods and Church Administration as presented to the 177th General Assembly (1965);

The Committee on Nominations reported through the chairman, The Rev. James M. Campbell.

- The Committee reported the death of Elder Rudd Scott (Birmingham, First) of the Presbyterian Village Board. The Committee placed in nomination the name of Mr. Owen R. Pinkerman (Birmingham, First). Upon motion, Presbytery directed that a unanimous ballot be cast for the nominee.
- <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery accepted with deep regret the resignation of Elder Henry I. Armstrong, Jr. from the Trustees of Presbytery, and directed the Stated Clerk to communicate to Mr. Armstrong Presbytery's deep appreciation for his decades of faithful and competent service.
- 3. The Stated Clerk reported on Act 29 of the Public Acts of 1966 of the State of Michigan which permits the Presbytery to increase the number of Trustees and to elect the Trustees in rotating classes. (see Paper C)

### June 28, 1966

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- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized the Dearborn Woods Church to increase its mortgage indebtedness by one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) by means of a loan from the National Bank of Detroit at six percent (6%) interest for a period not to exceed fifteen years.
  - 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized the Southminster Church of Taylor to increase its mortgage indebtedness to a total of one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000) by means of a one hundred thousand dollar (\$100,000) first-mortgage loan from the National Bank of Detroit at six percent (6%) interest for five years, and a twentyfive thousand dollar (\$25,000) second-mortgage loan from the Board of National Missions at five and one-half (5½) percent interest for fifteen years.

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- 4. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the South Lyon Church permission to extend the period of its mortgage loan from ten to fifteen years; the lending institution is to be either the National Bank of Detroit or the Church Finance Company of Detroit; the choice of lending institution to be made in consultation with the Committee on National Missions which was given the power to act for Presbytery in authorizing the choice of lending institution.
- 5. The Committee reported a request from the Redford Church to sell its manse property at 15550 Auburn Avenue, Detroit for thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000). A number of unsolicited bids from members and friends of the Redford Church resulted in a firm offer to purchase the manse before it was placed for sale on the open market. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery ordered that this matter be sent back to the Real Estate and Construction subcommittee of the Committee on National Missions, which is to direct that the said manse be sold according to the established policy of Presbytery requiring sale of residential property on the open market; the subcommittee was empowered to act for Presbytery in authorizing completion of the sale.
- 6. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the Littlefield Boulevard Church permission to borrow up to twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) either from the Bank of Dearborn at six percent (6%) interest, contingent upon that bank's response to the Commission on Religion and Race regarding equal opportunity employment, or from the Bank of the Commonwealth at six and one-half percent (6½%) interest.
- 7. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted First Church, Birmingham permission to purchase a manse at 4804 Tullamore, Bloomfield Hills Township, for thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) and to mortgage said manse for nineteen thousand dollars (\$19,000) with the Equitable Life Assurance Society at four and three-quarter percent (4-3/4%) interest.
- 8. The Committee reported on new directions of ministry in southwest Detroit. Implementing actions for a new strategy in that area will be initiated by the Administrative Commission on Trinity Church.
- 9. Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the following recommendations of the Committee:
  - a. That the Hamtramck United Presbyterian Church be closed and that an Administrative Commission be appointed to provide for the orderly termination of congregational activity and to counsel with members of the congregation regarding the transfer of their membership to other churches; and
  - b. That the National Missions Staff of Presbytery work with the Administrative Commission.
- 10. The Committee gave a progress report on its Special Committee on Aging.
- 11. The Presbyterian Village Board reported through The Rev. Richard C. Dunkelberger and Elder Edwin F. Kirbert, Executive Director of Presbyterian Village, who presented a review of facilities, residents, staff, and program of the Village, as well as a financial report for 1965. (see Paper N) <u>Upon motion</u>, the report of the Board of Directors of Presbyterian Village of Detroit, Inc. was received and approved with commendation to its officers for its excellent record of nondiscriminatory employment.
- 12. <u>A motion prevailed</u> to reconsider Presbytery's action on Item 9 above. Discussion took place on the recommendation of the Committee.

<u>Upon motion</u>, the original action of Presbytery on Item 9 was reaffirmed. <u>Upon motion</u>, the report as a whole was received and approved.

- 1. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized the Oakland Avenue Church in Pontiac to mortgage its property up to two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) with the Pontiac State Bank at six and three-quarter percent (6-3/4%) interest for fifteen (15) years for the purpose of erecting a Christian education building.
- <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery adopted the following policy statement: The Presbytery of Detroit is committed to a society in which all men have equal opportunity. We believe that equal opportunity should apply SEE to the purchase of goods and services and, therefore, make the following recomm
  - to the purchase of goods and services and, therefore, make the following recommendations: 1. That all real property of the Presbytery of Detroit and the congregations

- and agencies thereof, when offered for sale, shall be sold only on the open market. An open market is one in which every qualified prospective buyer has equal opportunity to make an offer to buy, and where the seller makes his decision to accept or reject such an offer on the same criteria applied to all prospective buyers. To this end, the sale of all real property shall be advertised in one of the major Detroit daily newspapers willing to include the phrase "equal opportunity seller", for five successive days, including one weekend.
  - 2. If a realtor is employed, he must agree to list the property, show the property, and transmit all offers to the seller without regard for race, creed, color, or national origin.
  - 3. Consideration should be given to using the listing service offered through the Metropolitan Detroit Committee on Fair Housing Practices, 705 Fine Arts Building, Detroit, 48226.
  - 4. The seller in considering any offer to purchase shall not consider any factor of race, creed, color, religion or national origin of the prospective buyer, nor the current composition of the neighborhood in which the property is located.
  - 5. The Presbytery is encouraged to consult with the Committee on National Missions regarding the implementation of this policy.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery overtured General Assembly to amend the Form of Government, Chapter XXXVI to broaden the authorization of union churches to include the United Church of Christ.
- 4. The Committee reported that a Special Committee on Housing has been formed for the purpose of recommending to Presbytery policies and programs for Presbytery's response to the problem of housing. The Rev. Stanley M. Tozer is chairman of the Special Committee.
- 5. The Committee reported that the National Presbyterian Health and Welfare Association will hold its biennial meeting in Detroit, February 14-17, at the Pick-Fort Shelby Hotel. The Moderator of General Assembly will speak at a special banquet meeting on February 14. Information concerning the conference and banquet can be otained from Mr. Kirbert at Presbyterian Village or from Mr. Bauer at Presbytery Headquarters.
- Mr. Robert Maynard, chairman of the Building Committee of St. John's Church, announced that dedication of the new building will be held on January 15, 1967.
   <u>Upon motion</u>, the report as a whole was received and approved.

Upon motion, Presbytery received the report as a whole. The Committee on National Missions reported through The Rev. Richard H. Williams. (see Paper E)

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- <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized the Trenton Church to revise the terms of its one hundred seventy-five thousand dollar (\$175,000) mortgage with the Trenton State Bank to a twelve-year term at six percent (6%) interest. (see Minutes, 1/24/67)
- 2. Anderson, both of the Grosse Ile Church; Corresponding - The Rev. F. William Clemenson, Presbytery of Indianapolis.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was received and approved.

The Committee on Ecumenical Relations reported through the chairman, The Rev. Henry D. Jones, calling attention to the celebration of Reformation Sunday on October 29. The Rev. George O. Mehaffey reported on joint Protestant-Roman Catholic Services involving Evergreen Village Church.

The Committee on National Missions reported through the chairman, Elder Gordon H. Robertson. (see Paper T)

- <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized the Committee on National Missions to extend the Board of National Missions church mortgage grant #254 in the amount of twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500) for an additional five (5) years; and authorized any two officers of theCommittee to sign the necessary papers. This grant was made to the Committee on National Missions as part of the initial financing of the Covenant Church of East Detroit.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized <u>Presbyterian Village</u> to spend up to one million one hundred thousand dollars (\$1,100,000) cash for its new residence hall and central services facility.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery authorized the Southfield United Presbyterian Church to increase its mortgage indebtedness by nineteen thousand dollars (\$19,000) by means of a five and one-quarter percent (5½%) mortgage from the Detroit Mortgage and Realty Company, and to borrow seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) on a six percent (6%) unsecured note, for the purpose of purchasing the house at 23860 Edinburgh, Southfield.
- 4. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized the Crossroads Church of Walled Lake, Michigan to increase its mortgage indebtedness by five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to a total of one hundred thirty-five thousand dollars (\$135,000) by increasing its first mortgage to sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000).
- 5. The Committee reported that it has changed its regular meeting date to the first Thursday of each month because of the revised schedule of the General Council.

1. The Committee reported that The Rev. Willis C. THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS continued its report.

- 1. The Committee reported that because the Southwest Community Organization has been unable to develop sufficient funding to continue the operation of its program, the Board of Directors of SCO dissolved the organization as of May 15, 1970, with the concurrence of the Committee.
- Presbyterian Village of Detroit, Inc. gave its annual report through Mr. Edwin F. Kirbert, Executive Director and Mr. Gerald C. Schroeder, Treasurer. Upon motion, the report was received.

<u>Upon motion</u>, the docketed hour of adjournment having arrived, Presbytery adjourned with prayer and benediction by the Vice Moderator, at 9:30 p.m.

a. General Council received a communication from the session of the St. James Church, Detroit, objecting to the skit presented to Presbytery April 28, 1970 by White Presbyterians for Black Self-Determination and approved the Secretary's responding letter for inclusion in the General Council's report to Presbytery, as follows:

> "I have received your letter of May 19, 1970 expressing the concern of your session relative to the drama skit presented at Presbytery April 28.

"I will be glad to present this to the General Council of Presbytery.

"I think it would be well, however, to correct the misimpression. This was not presented as a part of the report of the Committee on National Missions. In fact it has no connection with National Missions. The situation is this. The Constitution of the Church provides for Presbyterians to associate together in voluntary organizations. This is true in the local church, and this is the basis upon which they are responsible to report to your session annually. The Constitution provides for other organizations, and where the membership is broader than one congregation, the Constitution requires that such associations report annually to the judicatory of jurisdiction, in this case the Presbytery. The Presbytery really has no authority over such groups but does have the responsibility of hearing a report from them annually. In this instance the group chose to 'dramatize' their concerns, and the reception was mixed. The Presbytery action was simply to 'receive' the report, and that word applies neither approval or disapproval.

"I hope that this word of explanation will allay some of the concerns of the session. The organization in question, White Presbyterians for Black Self-Determination, is not a part of the offical structure of Presbytery and receives no funds from the Presbytery. It is an association of Presbyterians who share a common concern and common views."

- b. General Council requested the Secretary and the Chairman of the Committee on Session Records to prepare an amendment to the Structure and Bylaws of Presbytery which would change the title of the committee and include within its responsibilities annual reports from voluntary unofficial associations of Presbyterians.
- c. General Council received a letter from The Rev. David King Kerr expressing concern about House Bills 4112 and 4113 which would further legalize betting in Michigan, sent a letter to appropriate members of the Senate expressing opposition to the bills, and sent a letter to the Governor urging a veto of the bills if they should be passed.
- d. General Council accepted the resignation of The Rev. Galen Hershey from the Board of Presbyterian Village and referred the vacancy to the Committee on Nominations.
- e. General Council referred to the Committee on National Missions a communication from The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman concerning the Southwest Community Organization and requested the committee to answer the questions directly to him and report the facts in the matter to Presbytery.
- f. The General Council approved the Guidelines for the Selection of Nominees for General Assembly Commissioners.

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- 4. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery divested The Rev. Peter Pillsbury of the office of ordained minister and erased his name from the roll according to the Book of Order 87.022, effective October 27, 1970, having received a letter renouncing the jurisdiction of the Church.
- 5. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery received and enrolled The Rev. Lawrence Cater, General Motors Technological Institute, as a member of the Presbytery of Detroit upon receipt of his certificate from the Presbytery of New Albany, and granted him permission to labor outside the bounds until the next annual meeting.

- <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery heard Elder Joseph Hadley speak on behalf of the Wyandotte Church; approved the call of the Wyandotte Church to The Rev. Gerald Cobleigh to become pastor, effective January 1, 1971, with the following terms: salary \$8,500; manse; car allowance \$1,000; 15% pension, two weeks study leave; one month vacation; annual review; and placed the call in Mr. Cobleigh's hands. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery empowered the following administrative commission to install Mr. Cobleigh on January 3, 1971 at 7:00 p.m.: Elder George Bushnell, Jr., Moderator, Rev. Gene Stone, Rev. William Colwell, Elder Herbert Funston (Wyandotte), Elder Idah Kiefer (Wyandotte), Rev. Thomas Bailey.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted permission to Rev. Henry Jones to labor outside the bounds as interim pastor at Saginaw First Church effective December 1, 1970 contingent upon satisfactory terms of contract.
- 3. Mr. Geissinger read a letter from the session of the Outer Drive Church commending Rev. Paul Gillis.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS reported through the chairman, Rev. MacKay Taylor.

- <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted permission to the Southwest Community Church to sell the Olivet Church building for \$32,000 cash to the Seventh Church of Christ Scientist; with the understanding that the money received from the sale would be put into some form of savings for future program use by Southwest Community Church.
- <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted permission to the First Presbyterian Church of Mt. Clemens, Michigan, to purchase a manse at 145 Lodewyck, Mt. Clemens, for \$29,000; and authorized the church to increase its present mortgage with the Mt. Clemens Savings Bank to \$34,500 at an interest rate of 7%.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized the Committee to secure \$9,000 for repairs to the St. Stephen's Church building by means of a 15-year second mortgage loan from the Synod of Michigan at a 3% interest with a 5-year renewable silent period on principal payments; and authorized any two officers of the Committee to execute the necessary papers.
- 4. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted permission to the Orchard Lake Community Church to purchase a manse at 8659 Palomino, Union Lake. Michigan for \$31,500, and authorized the church to assume a land contract on the property in the amount of \$15,800 at 7% with monthly payments of \$12.
- 5. The Committee presented a request from Presbyterian Village that the Presbytery concur with proposed changes in the Articles of Incorporation of Presbyterian Village of Detroit, Inc.

Article VI would be amended to list the currenttrustees. This addition would serve to clarify that the trustees are the current "members" of the Presbyterian Village Corporation, who in turn elect the Corporation officers.

Article VIII of the present Articles of Incorporation makes the following statement regarding the corporation's members:

"The membership of this corporation shall be such persons as are from time to time designated or appointed by the Presbytery of Detroit." Article VIII as amended would read as follows:

"The Trustees shall be the members of the Corporation. Trustees and members shall be subject to approval by The Presbytery of Detroit, a presbytery of The United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America. At least two-thirds of the members of the Corporation shall be either members of The Presbytery of Detroit or a member of a church thereof. Except for filling vacancies, Trustees and members shall be designated for a three year term and one-third, as near may be, of the

total number of Trustee-Members shall be designated each year. The number of Trustees and members shall be as from time to time determined by the Trustees and members. Membership shall not be assignable and shall cease upon death, resignation or removal by appropriate action of the members. Membership shall not confer upon the member any interest in the assets of the Corporation."

The basic changes in the proposal would be to make the Village corporation more autonomous than it has been. However, the composition of the Board of Trustees would continue to be subject to approval by Presbytery.

If Presbytery concurs with the request, the Committee will prepare appropriate amendments in the Bylaws of the Presbytery to bring the Bylaws into accord with such action.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the Certificate of Amendments to the Articles of Incorporation of the Presbyterian Village of Detroit, Inc., relating to Articles VI and VIII with the following additions:

- 1. In Article VI the names and addresses of current Board of Trustees be amended to show Classes for 1971, 1972 and 1973;
- In Article VIII the sentence "At least two-thirds of the members of the Corporation shall be either members of the Presbytery of Detroit or a member of a church thereof" be amended to indicate that said members are "in good standing";
- 3. The Certificate of Amendments reflect in all instances the date of approval by the Presbytery of Detroit, as well as the date of approval by the Corporation of Presbyterian Village.

#### PROGRAM REPORTS

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THE COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL MISSIONS continued its report, with Rev. Henry Stenner, chairman of the Special Advisory Task Force on St. Mark's Church, Dearborn Heights, describing progress made by that church in the past two years. Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery requested churches which elected additional elders as commissioners to Presbytery in 1970 to continue doing so in 1971 until Presbytery adopts a revised procedure.

The Vice-Moderator took the chair.

THE COMMITTEE ON ECUMENICAL RELATIONS reported through the chairman, Rev. Richard C. Smith.

- 1. Rev. Moody B. W. Yap spoke concerning the Reformed Church of America ministry to oriental people in Detroit.
- 2. Rev. Keith Hueftle introduced Tom Rand, Richard Macon, and Tom Perkins, who described the Cursillo Movement in Detroit.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was received.

The Moderator resumed the chair.

UNITED PRESBYTERIAN MEN reported through Thomas Harrell, who called attention to the Men's Winter Retreat, February 5-6, with Rev. Donald Black, General Secretary of the Commission on Ecumenical Mission and Relations, as speaker.

6. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery voted to develop liaison with Presbyterian Village by adding the President of the Board of Trustees to the stated members of General Council, and approved for first reading the following amendment to the Structure and Bylaws:

The Stated Clerk advised that such an appeal can be made only at the time the ruling is made.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery requested the Validating Committee for Detroit Presbytery's Fund for Self-Development of People to consult the Trade Union Leadership Council and Mr. Kara Coates State Office AFL-CIO on the need for Proposal No. 7 (International Black Appeal).

Upon motion, Presbytery adjourned with prayer and benediction by the Moderator at 9:10 p.m.

The Presbytery of Detroit met on Tuesday, February 23, 1971, at 6:30 p.m. in the Westminster Church, Detroit.

The Moderator convened the meeting with prayer.

The roll was taken and the Stated Clerk announced that a quorum was present.

THE COMMITTEE ON BILLS AND OVERTURES postponed its report until the March meeting of Presbytery.

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From the floor, Rev. Joe K. Bury <u>moved</u> that Presbytery overture the General Assembly for an addition to the Form of Government; creating a new office of the ministry of service in the Church, to be known as a LICENSED PRESBYTERY EVANGELIST; such ministry to be related to the presbytery level as to qualification, training, and assignment; such ministry to be open to any professed Christian member, lay or clerical, young or old, male or female; such office to be a part-time, nominally remunerated service reaching out beyond normal institutional patterns; such office to be filled, sponsored and underwritten by a specific congregation. The Moderator, with Mr. Bury's consent, referred the motion to the Committee on Bills and Overtures for report at the March meeting of Presbytery.

THE GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, Rev. Robert L. Moreland.

- 1. The General Council presented for information the following:
  - a. General Council referred to the Committee on Evangelism an announcement of a "Celebration of Evangelism" to be held September 20-24, 1971 in Cincinnati, Ohio.
  - b. General Council referred to the Special Committee on the Theology of the Call an overture to the 183rd General Assembly (1971) from the Presbytery of Solomon, concerning the creation of an office of "Lay Minister."
  - c. General Council received a communication from the Committee on National Missions, reporting the appointment of The Rev. Margaret Scabich and The Rev. Willis C. Tabor as Presbytery's representatives to the Equal Justice Council.
  - d. General Council received a communication from The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman, acknowledging receipt of the General Council's response, which was prepared by the Special Nominating Committee.
  - e. General Council received a communication from the Presbytery of Maumee, concerning endorsement of The Rev. John Thompson Peters as Moderator of the 183rd General Assembly (1971).
  - f. General Council requested that The Rev. James Kesler, and others as may be helpful, meet with the Committee on Religion and Race to answer the Committee's concerns regarding the Fund for the Self-Development of People.
  - g. General Council continued the General Council's Special Committee on the Theology of the Call.
  - h. The Secretary reported that the Presbytery will lose one minister and one elder commissioners to General Assembly because the number of communicant members within Presbytery has decreased. On December 31, 1970, there were 79,582 ministerial and communicant members, while 80,751 are required to maintain 10 minister and elder commissioners.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery discharged the following administrative commission: Installation of The Rev. George Bretz at Outer Drive Church, January 31, 1971.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery broke the tie between the elders (9 and 10) who received a tie vote in the November 24, 1970 election of commissioners to the 183rd General Assembly (1971) by lot drawn by the Vice-Moderator on the floor of Presbytery, which determined Carolyn Quinn to be the ninth principal commissioner and Kenneth Blyth to be the first alternate.

McConnell, Jr., who spoke concerning a display on lay visitation evangelism which will be presented at the April meeting of Presbytery, teams from the Committee which will assist local churches with lay visitation evangelism, and the recommendation of the Committee that churches send their pastors and key leaders to the Celebration of Evangelism in Cincinnati on September 20-24, 1971.

<u>Upon motion</u> from the floor, Presbytery requested the Stated Clerk, in a manner suitable to him, to take a final roll call at the conclusion of Presbytery meetings, beginning with the April meeting.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY reported through the chairman, Rev. Russell W. Durler, Jr., concerning ten Outreach Projects, a joint retreat for the Committees on Evangelism and Church and Society, and the availability of teams to assist the local churches.

The Presbytery would no longer elect trustees, corporation members or the Chairman of Presbyterian Village, but would retain the right to approve trustee nominees.

Subsequently, the Corporate Division of the State of Michigan ruled that the amended Articles of Incorporation of Presbyterian Village, specifically Article VII, could not include the statement that "trustees and members shall be subject to approval by the Presbytery of Detroit..." since the State of Michigan takes the position that as a matter of law, no outside body can have a say in the selection of trustees. However, the Bylaws of the Village are permitted to provide that the selection of the trustees and corporation members be subject to approval by the Presbytery. Thus the Presbytery will retain an indirect say in the selection of the Village trustees.

- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the final building and finance plans of the First United Presbyterian Church of Troy; authorized the church to borrow a first mortgage loan up to \$105,000 from the Wayne Oakland Bank which is to be repaid over ten years at a 7% rate of interest; and further authorized the church to borrow a twenty-year second mortgage loan of \$75,000 from the Board of National Missions which is to be repaid as follows: 2% interest only during the first ten years, 5% interest plus principal during the final ten years.

#### VALIDATED SPECIAL OPPORTUNITIES

The following programs are "Validated Special Opportunities", which while not included in the basic Presbytery Mission Budget, are nevertheless considered as "approved programs" of the Presbytery to be supported by special "Designated Giving" by the Congregations. The following assumptions are made with reference to these Validated Special Opportunities:

- While these are important needs, it has been impossible to include them in the Basic Budget -- therefore if these needs are to be met, it will happen only if a sufficient number of incividuals and Sessions are willing to underwrite them.
- 2. These programs represent "Extra-giving", above and beyond the present level of undesignated and designated giving to Presbytery Causes. It is, therefore, assumed that Sessions will not make designations at the sacrifice of support for the Basic Mission Budget and its programs. These are programs and needs which we will have to "stretch" to meet!
- 3. These Validated Special Opportunities may be underwritten for "Credit" as Validated Causes, (and will be so reported to the General Assembly); but only to the extent of the dollar amounts indicated.
- 4. If programs are "over-subscribed" Sessions will be asked to redesignate their Special Designated Giving.

7. Upon motion, Presbytery authorized the First Presbyterian Church, Plymouth, Michigan, to list for sale on the open real estate market a parcel of property consisting of 25.923 acres located on Beck Road near North Territorial Road, with the proviso that \$25,000 or 25% whichever is greater from the receipt of such sale be given to the Presbyterian Village to fulfill a stipulation in the letter of instruction by which the property was conveyed to the First Presbyterian Church, Plymouth, Michigan.

Upon motion, the report was approved as a whole.

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THE TELLERS FOR ELECTION OF ASSOCIATE EXECUTIVE reported through the Moderator. Two hundred and forty-four ballots were cast: 233 were affirmative, nine were negative, and two were abstentions. The Rev. Harry H. Maghakian, having received more than the two-thirds affirmative votes required, was declared elected Associate for Parish Development of the Presbytery of Detroit and welcomed to the Presbytery. Mr. Maghakian was introduced to the Presbytery by Elder Harry Kirk and addressed the Presbytery briefly.

THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON REORGANIZATION reported through The Rev. Eldon F. Beery, Chairman, who presented for Presbytery's consideration and action the plan for reorganization of Presbytery, called the Plan for Mission. (Papers J, K, L, M) Mr. Beery proceeded to review a summary of some of the final adjustments made in the Plan at the suggestion of Presbyters and then called on Elder Jack Callam, The Rev. Chase Hunt, and The Rev. John B. Quick, who spoke to specific aspects of the Plan. Mr. Beery further spoke to the comprehensive motion of the Reorganization Schedule and to the goal of having the Plan in effect January 1, 1975. Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the "Plan for Mission" until December 31, 1976, with the amendment that one of the At-Large members of General Council shall be a representative from the Detroit Council of United Presbyterian Men. Lost, was a motion that the report be placed on file, that the committee be dismissed with thanks and that a new committee be appointed to study and propose an evolutionary plan of reorganization if necessary. Upon motion, Presbyteryby a vote of 194 to 35 suspended conflicting bylaws until Dec. 31, 1976. Lost, was a motion to postpone suspension of the Bylaws until a specific list was prepared and presented to the next meeting of Presbytery. The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman entered a protest and stated that he would file a complaint against the action of Presbytery in suspending the Bylaws of Presbytery without publishing the specific Bylaws suspended. (Paper S) Upon motion, Presbytery authorized the General Council to elect, upon nomination by the Executive Committee of General Council, a special Administrative Commission composed of ten persons, both Elders and Ministers, a majority of which shall not have been members of the Special Committee on Reorganization, with power to: a. Implement the "Plan for Mission" Interpret and decide questions arising from implementation of the Ъ.

- "Plan for Mission" (subject to majority vote of Presbytery) c. Formulate temporary bylaws from time to time as necessary to effect the "Plan for Mission" (to be adopted by majority vote of Presbytery)
- d. Organize areas according to the "Plan for Mission"
- e. Nominate or cause to be nominated officers and other personnel necessary to implement the "Plan for Mission"
- f. After "Plan for Mission" is in operation, serve as advisory committee to Presbytery Council during the life of the "Plan for Mission"
- g. After the "Plan for Mission" is in operation, shall recommend an administrative commission for election by the Presbytery with power to effect the merger of the Committee on National Missions, a Michigan Corporation (formerly Presbyterian Board of Church Extension of Detroit), and the Trustees of the Presbytery of Detroit, a Michigan Corporation.

Synod; and their action in caucus to set up a Synod level Task Force to meet August 2 and 3 to determine what the needs are for youth ministry, how to deal with them, what programs are already in existence, and how to make use of them.

- The Moderator directed attention to the written report on the meeting of Synod as distributed to Presbytery. (Paper W)
- Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report of the commissioners to Synod.
  3. The Moderator called the commissioners to General Assembly forward and introduced Youth Advisory Delegate, Miss Jill Mills, who reported her impressions and spoke to the action of the General Assembly regarding amnesty. The Moderator further expressed his own feeling that the meeting of the General Assembly is breaking down because it tries to do too much, with the result that it does very little of it well and much of it poorly. He stated that the time has come for the church to think through the adequacy of the present system of General Assembly to deal with all of the problems of organization and structure and operation of the church, while at the same time speaking on matters of faith and doctrine and addressing the world and its problems. Opportunity was given for Presbytery to direct questions to the commissioners to General Assembly.

Upon motion, the Presbytery approved the report of the commissioners to the General Assembly.

THE COMMITTEE ON RECORDS AND REPORTS, through its chairman, The Rev. Frank C. Marvin, Jr., presented Mrs. JoAnna Vicklund, Chairman, to give the annual report of the Greater Detroit Chapter of the Presbyterian Lay Committee. Mrs. Vicklund reviewed the formation and activities of the Chapter since its beginning and stated the Committee's objectives and goals as it works within the church. (Paper X) Upon motion, the report was received and approved.

PRESBYTERIAN VILLAGE OF DETROIT reported through The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman, Jr., President of the Board, who urged completion and return of a survey questionnaire mailed to each pastor, designed to gather information essential to making decisions on expansion needs.

THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM reported through The Rev. John McCreight, who called attention to the continued down-trend in membership in the United Presbyterian Church, with 1973 showing a loss of almost 100,000 members, or 3.5% of the gross membership, suggesting that the matter raises questions of the spiritual health of the church; directed the concern of the Presbytery to the final report on the Evangelism Associate Program with its recommendations (Paper Y); and introduced The Rev. Loren M. Scribner, who reported the experience of the Kirk of Our Saviour as one of the pilot churches in the Evangelism Associate Program. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the report which contained the following recommendations:

- The still to be filled full-time Presbytery Staff Associate for Presbytery Ministries with special responsibilities to work with Sessions of local churches in the area of Evangelism and Interpretation and Stewardship needs to be filled immediately.
- The churches of the Presbytery should avail themselves of the experiences of the ten churches, their pastors and members or their Committees on Evangelism, and use them as resource persons in setting up programs in Evangelism in their own churches.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery expressed gratitude to The Rev. Henry D. Jones and Maureen for their years of dedicated and devoted service to the cause of Christ in the Presbytery of Detroit.

Upon motion, Presbytery adjourned at 10:38 p.m. with prayer and the benediction by the Moderator, The Rev. L. J. Peterson.

Dr. Dunkelberger presented the annual report of that body to the Presbytery. 24 apartments are occupied in Presbyterian Village East and all systems are "go" for the new Presbyterian Village North.
  - c. The Committee on Corporate Responsibility reported through Elder Arthur Sherman, Chairperson of the Division of Business Affairs, as follows:

Upon motion, Presbytery extended the Docket five minutes.

- 1. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery directed the Committee on Corporate Responsibility to vote its proxy at the American Home Products meeting supporting a resolution to set up an infant formula review committee, monitor distribution, use of samples, and set a time table for change in the entire area of infant formula use.
- 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery directed the Committee on Corporate Responsibility to vote its proxy at the Bristol-Nyers meeting supporting a resolution calling for the corporation to adopt certain policies along with actions similar to those called for in the American Home Products resolution.

THE DEPARTMENT OF LOCAL CHURCH DEVELOPMENT reported through Elder Calvin Strom, Chairperson, as follows: (Paper E-2) loan

1. None of our local churches have delinquent/accounts. The Financial Management Committee, headed by Elder Wilma Dellinger, with the cooperation of Presbytery's staff, has had great success in bringing all accounts up-to-date.

- 4. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted permission to Faith Community United Presbyterian Church in Novi to retain the services of an architect. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery gave a grant-mortgage of \$120,000 toward the building program of the Novi, Faith Church. That said funds come from Presbytery resources. That said grant-mortgage be silent for 15 years, and then, in negotiation with the Trustees of Presbytery, develop a repayment plan in real dollars at that time. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery stated that this grant-mortgage be the first of an Indexed Revolving New Church Development Fund established for capital needs of new church development. This revolving fund also to be indexed on the Cost of Living from time of grant mortgage to time of repayment.
- 5. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the Village Presbyterian Church permission to sell their manse to Presbyterian Village and waived the requirement to list on the open market since <u>Presbyterian</u> Village initially gave the site to the church to build a manse.
- 6. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery stated that it expects no further per capita from Military Avenue Church for 1978. (Amount of \$104.28 per capita apportionment was overstated due to roll reduction received by Presbytery office after the deadline.
- 7. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to the Dearborn, Dearborn Woods Church to secure loans up to \$30,000 for roof repairs and improvements.
- 8. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery formed an Administrative Commission to make inquiry into the Warren, Saint Luke Church's life and to recommend reorganization or dissolution of the congregation and report to Presbytery at its December, 1979 meeting.
- Upon motion, Presbytery extended the Docket for a period of five minutes.
  - 9. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery returned to the Department of Local Church Development the recommendation of the Strategy Committee of said Department that the Gratiot Avenue Presbyterian Church be dissolved. Recommendation returned for further consideration.
  - 2. <u>THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS</u> continued its report which had been arrested. Chairperson Beery reported as follows:
    - Upon motion, Presbyteryapproved the employment of The Rev. v. Benjamin M. H. Wu as organizing pastor of the Taiwanese Fellowship Ann Arbor, under the direction of Presbytery's Local Church Development Department. He will also work part-time for the Ecumenical Campus Center in Ann Arbor in International Student Ministry. The terms of the contract are: \$12,050 salary, \$3,000 housing, \$1,500 auto allowance, full pension, 2 weeks' study leave, \$300 study allowance, 1 month vacation and moving expenses. Mr. Wu's employment was approved, effective August 15, 1979, and upon receipt of a letter of dismission from the Presbytery of Philadelphia and evidence of his ordination as a minister in good standing in the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., and the Clerk was instructed to enroll him upon receipt of this documentation. The provisions of the Form of Government (Sections 50.01, 57.044 and 57.046) for calling of a pastor have not been fulfilled inasmuch as the particular ministry required unique qualifications. ₩. Upon motion, Presbytery received and approved the entire report
      - of the Committee on Ministerial Relations.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PRESBYTERY MINISTRIES reported through The Rev. William Baker, Chairperson, as follows: (Paper E-6)

1. The Rev. Roger Shoup, Chairperson of the "110 Ways to Support Our City" program to be held October 5 at Cobo Hall.

B. That the Bylaws of Presbytery be amended on Page 3, Chapter IV, Section 2, Stated Clerk, B-5 by adding after the words "Stated Clerk" the following wording:

".... and periodically to request reports on all referrals made by the Stated Clerk."

- so that the entire article shall read: "To receive all overtures, memorials and miscellaneous papers; to keep record of the same; to report them to Presbytery Council and to Presbytery; to deliver those not otherwise disposed of to appropriate persons or to dispose of them at the discretion of the Stated Clerk; and periodically to request reports on all referrals made by the Stated Clerk."
- C. That the Bylaws of Presbytery be amended on Page 14, Chapter XII, Section 1 by adding two new articles to be numbered "E" and "F" which shall read as follows:
  - "E. Program Agencies of the Presbytery of Detroit consist of the following organizations: United Presbyterian Women, also known as The Detroit Presbyterial Society, the Detroit Presbytery Chapter of United Presbyterian Men and The Mariners."
  - "F. Chapter XXVIII Organizations of the Presbytery of Detroit consist of the Asian Presbyterian Caucus, Black Presbyterians United, and the Greater Detroit Chapter of the Presbyterian Lay Committee."

Beery, under the following terms: sale price \$60,000, with \$10,000 down, the balance to be financed on a land contract, with interest at 7% per annum, the balance to be fully paid within fifteen (15) years from the date of sale, with monthly payments on principal and interest of \$450; and that the Warren, Celtic Cross Church be granted exemption from the requirement of the Presbytery that the property be listed for sale on the open market.
- K. That Presbytery grant permission for the Pontiac, Oakland Avenue Church to purchase property adjacent to the present church property, measuring fifty by 150 feet, with a house on the property, for the purchase price of \$28,000; and that the Trustees of the Pontiac, Oakland Avenue Church be granted permission to borrow from a commercial bank an amount not to exceed \$26,000, for a period not to exceed 10 years.
- II. Presbytery Council presents for Presbytery's <u>APPROVAL</u> the following actions already taken by Council in its March 11, 1980 meeting:
  - A. Presbytery Council acted as follows:
    - 1. Authorized disbursement of Major Mission Funds received under the New Church Development Project, Redevelopment of Churches, to the Novi, Faith Church and Livonia, Saint Timothy Church building programs.
    - 2. Approved the second allocation of the Detroit, Calvin West Church Major Mission Outreach Project for \$5,000 for 1980 and notified the Church that the total allocation for the project will be less than the original \$15,000 requested.
    - 3. Authorized the continuation of the disbursement of Major Mission Capital funds project "D" for Presbyterian Village East, as designated money is received.
    - 4. Arranged for an afternoon and evening session of the Presbytery meeting of June 24, 1980 in order to accomodate the large amount of Candidates' business.
    - 5. Issued an invitation to Bishop Thomas Gumbleton of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Detroit, to speak in a Pre-Presbytery event and during the dinner hour at the April 22, 1980 Presbytery meeting.

- C. That the following applications to the Support Agency be approved: Southwest Community Church, a loan of \$15,000.00 for 15 years at 3% interest for energy conservation; Christ Memorial Church of Royal Oak, a loan of \$10,000.00 for 10 years at 3% interest, to construct a ramp for handicapped persons; Church of Our Saviour in West Bloomfield, a loan of \$15,000.00 for 15 years at 3% interest, for energy conservation.
- D. That permission be given to the Session of Redford Church to place on the open market for sale a manse located at 16720 Warwick in Detroit and valued at approximately \$97,000.00.
- F. That the Grosse Ile Church be given permission to receive the gift of a house and land, valued at \$115,000.00, on which there is a mortgage of \$57,799.41.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery concurred with Presbytery Council's endorsement of the Capital Funds Campaign of Presbyterian Village East for 1980-1981 as described by The Rev.Carl Howie at the June 10, 1980 Presbytery Council Meeting and requested Presbyterian Village to consider how Presbytery and Presbyterian Village can be supportative of each other in light of the developing Special Mission Challenge following up the Major Mission Fund.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved as amended, Presbytery Council's recommendation that the Stated Clerk's Office respond with a form letter of acknowledgement to congregations which have made inquiry concerning Church Property Ownership.

Upon motion, Presbytery deferred approval of loan by Livonia, St. Timothy Church until Department of Local Church Development reports later at this meeting.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved that the Presbytery loan to the Detroit, Grandale Church in the amount of \$8,000 from its Capital Fund, that a \$23,000.00 Money Market Certificate be used as collateral, that interest on the land be the same amount that the church is receiving on its Certificate, with principal and interest payable on September 25, 1980 when the Certificate matures.

Upon motion, Presbytery extended the docket 10 minutes.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved as amended a divergence from usual practice and granted the Grosse Pointe Woods Church permission to borrow \$125,000.00 to continue its ministry to the community from a commercial institution, at 11% to 15% interest, which is secured by congregational pledges already made and which are payable during the next three years. This money is to be used for essential building repairs and replacements.

Presbytery recessed at 5:00 p.m.

Presbytery reconvened at 7:00 with prayer by Moderator Cannon.

### SYNOD COMMISSIONERS

Rodney Beal reported for Synod Commissioners. He reported on suggested changes of Synod boundaries. Most Synod negotiations deal with financial matters. ### ALMA COLLEGE CENTENNIAL FUND

Charles McCloskey reported for Alma College Centennial Fund. They are in final phase of drive for \$26,000,000. At the end of March they had reached the \$21,900,000 mark. Committee members have made visits to all presbyteries in Michigan, including Maumee Valley. 198 of 386 churches have voted to participate. 2,600 elders and ministers have participated in hearing the presentations, not including Presbytery meetings.

### COMMITTEE ON BILLS AND OVERTURES

George Bousquette reported for the Committee on Bills and Overtures.

1. On the recommendation of the Committee, Presbytery voted in the negative on Proposed Amendment E on Establishing the Office of Church Educators.

2. On the recommendation of the Committee, Presbytery directed the Council to appoint a Task Force to consider ways of addressing the needs and concerns of those who work as church educators. The Task Force shall include representatives of the Committee on Ministry and the Committee on Candidates, and at least one person working as a church educator. The Task Force may include representatives of the Committee on Bills and Overtures and the Department of Program and Resource Development among others. Issues to be addressed include accountability, recognition, support, compensation, certification, commissioning/ordination, oversight, participation in Presbytery. The Task Force may bring recommendations for policies, procedures, and/or overtures to the General Assembly.

### PRESBYTERIAN VILLAGE

Richard C. Dunkelberger reported for Presbyterian Village. He reported that the age of those applying at the village is close to 80. Average age at the village is 86. More people eating in the dining room are over 90 than under 80. Three residents are over 100 - one still lives in a room by herself and walks to the dining room and entertainment. The endowment fund, thanks to generosity of Presbyterians, exceeds \$1,500,000, but cannot rest until it reaches 5 or 6 million because by the turn of the century, they may need that much. With income from the endowment fund and contributions from churches, they can support those who have exhausted their funds. That toal now runs over a quarter of a million dollars. Presbyterian Village East became self-supporting. Looking for funds to build a medical center there. Auburn Heights Church has conducted a special ministry to Presbyterian Village North. Income over expenditures last year was \$2,000.

RESOLVED, that the Presbytery of Detroit, meeting at Detroit, Michigan, on April 28, 1987, respectfully overture the 199th General Assembly (1987) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to direct representatives of its Vocation Agency, Board of Pensions and the Stated Clerk to study this question, consult with appropriate tax consultants, attorneys and United States Internal Revenue officials, and report back to the next meeting of the General Assembly, any recommendations and desirable and appropriate changes in this church's description of the employment status of its ministers, so that there may be clarity and consistency in the way Presbyterian ministers report their income for tax purposes.



### IV. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

Executive Presbyter Gehres reported to the presbytery on some of the many celebrations which have recently occurred.

The Black Presbyterian Caucus celebrated the 25th Anniversary (1968) of the organization. Four members of the organization who were part of the founding of BPC were honored for the leadership that they have provided over the last 25 years. They are Rev. Dr. Lawrence Glenn, pastor Broadstreet, Detroit; Rev. Dr. Virgil Jones, Campus Minister at Wayne State University; Rev. Willis Tabor, H.R.; and Elder James Shirley, clerk of session, St. John's, Detroit. First Presbyterian Church, Detroit, celebrated the 175th

First Presbyterian Church, Detroit, celebrated the 175th Anniversary of the First Protestant Society, the first protestant church in Detroit founded in 1818. It is the mother church of Protestantism in Detroit and it was the first protestant congregation founded in Detroit by John Monteith who was brought from Princeton by Governor Cass and others in the early days of the history of Detroit.

Grandale Church of the Master, Detroit, celebrated a rededication of their ministry in the city with the official opening of the reconstructed part of their building one year after the fire.

### V. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY

A. MISSION INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE Fran Anderson reported for the committee, reminding presbyters to order the Mission Yearbook for Prayer and Study and to request a mission speaker during the upcoming Month of Mission.

### B. PRESBYTERIAN VILLAGE

Roger Meyers reported that there are now five Presbyterian Villages in Metropolitan Detroit and invited the presbyters to visit them. Mr. Meyers will tell more about the system at the September stated meeting of Presbytery. Executive Presbyter Gehres reported that the process of scheduling introductory meetings for pastors to become acquainted with Associate Executive Piecuch and for her to meet them has already begun. Parish pastors have been invited to attend meetings scheduled for November and December. Other pastors on the roll will be invited to meet her at times sensitive to their needs.

#### VII. REFLECTIONS ON MINISTRIES OF PRESBYTERY A. EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

Craig Aue reported for the committee. Applications for 1994 grants will be sent to churches. The deadline for return is January 30.

Mr. Aue presented Vernita Storehouse, Greenfield Church, Berkley, who reported how Greenfield Church used and benefited from the grant from presbytery. Ms. Storehouse thanked the presbytery for the grant and reported that the projects funded have helped church attendance to double and that 80 people have joined the church since 1990.

### **B. METROPOLITAN MISSION**

James Beates reported for the Social Justice and Peacemaking Focus Group of Metropolitan Mission. He alerted presbyters to watch for an overture calling for changes in the Directory for Worship on services of healing and wholeness at the January meeting of presbytery.

He reported that 44 of the 90 persons attending the Synod Retreat for people living with HIV/AIDS were from our presbytery. He thanked the Presbytery of Detroit and the churches for supporting the event.

As Peace Enabler, Mr. Beates reported that Wayne, First; Sterling Heights, Utica; Grosse Pointe Woods, and Fort Gratiot, Lakeshore have signed the Commitment to Peacemaking and that he has certificates from the General Assembly for each church.

### C. MISSION INTERPRETATION AND STEWARDSHIP

Francile Anderson reported for Mission Interpretation and Stewardship. She reported that the Mission Yearbook for Prayer and Study is being printed and will be distributed upon arrival.

### D. RACIAL ETHNIC CONCERNS

William Gepford and Anthony Patrick reported on the Racial Ethnic Convocation held in San Antonio, Texas, and on the work of the committee. We need to sensitize our congregations and aid them in becoming culturally sensitive. Our congregational growth depends on how we accept new persons into our congregations.

### E. PRESBYTERIAN VILLAGE

Roger Myers reported for Presbyterian Villages of Michigan. He reported that there are five Presbyterian Village retirement communities, each operated by its own Board of Trustees: Presbyterian Village Redford, Presbyterian Village East, Presbyterian Village North, Presbyterian Village Westland, and Presbyterian Village Holly. There are over 1200 residents in the villages and that the average age is 82, 2/3 of which are presbyterians or presbyterian family members. 30% receive financial support. He wishes to renew and redefine the presbyterian relationship between the villages and the Presbytery of Detroit. Mr. Myers highlighted several events that are upcoming at the villages.

### F. EDUCATION AND NURTURE

Gordon Mikoski, Nancy Mikoski and Steven Melde reported on the Motor-City Mission Mania ecumenical mission project sponsored by the Presbytery of Detroit. Slides and narration gave presbyters a close-up look at the event which took place in June 1993. There were 135 youth and their adult sponsors from Michigan, Virginia, New York,

The Villages covenant that it will:

- keep the Presbytery informed of ongoing plans, developments and activities through various means, including an annual written report to Presbytery Council and periodic verbal reports to Presbytery meetings;
- advise the Presbytery of its strategic planning efforts and solicit active participation, involvement and input;
- provide for priority admission status in the Villages for members of Presbyterian (U.S.A.) Churches;
- promote diverse volunteer service opportunities for members of churches in the Presbytery;
- inform the Presbytery regarding its Board leadership needs and encourage the submission of candidate names to the Villages' Board Development Committee;

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- whenever possible, make its physical and human resources availabl to assist the Presbytery (e.g. meeting/conference space, staff resources);
- be available to consult with local churches that desire to provide non-institutional outreach senior services;
- provide periodic educational, leadership and advocacy programming concerning aging related issues, and;
- consult with and seek the agreement of the Presbytery regarding fund-raising initiatives as follows:
  - a. seek the agreement of the Presbytery Council prior to any solicitation of direct congregational support beyond that authorized by the VSO;
  - consult with, and obtain the agreement of, the Presbytery Council prior to engaging in non-recurring major fund-raising efforts through churches of the Presbytery;
  - c. report annually to the Presbytery Council the totals of gifts received from:
    - 1) congregations of the Presbytery; and from
    - individual donors from congregations within the Presbytery who may be approached by the Villages without prior consultation or agreement by the Presbytery.
- keep Presbyterian churches informed of potential facility developments in their local communities.

Moderator Morrison resumed moderating the meeting.

A motion was sustained to allow the addition of a report from the Barnabas Youth Opportunity Center to the docket.

B. METROPOLITAN MISSION: BARNABAS YOUTH OPPORTUNITY CENTER Stanley Edwards, Director, Barnabas Youth Opportunity Center, reported on the work of the center. He stated that the project is 12 years old and that it affords an opportunity for young people to learn skills that will enable them to secure gainful employment. He asked the churches to call him so that he might present Minute-for-Mission talks to congregations that they may learn more about the work of the Center.

## VI. MOMENTS OF CELEBRATION AND REMEMBRANCE

Eldon Beery, Interim Pastor, at Dearborn First Presbyterian Church, shared good news about the significant progress they have made in the process of seeking an installed pastor.

Anthony Patrick, Pastor of Trinity Presbyterian Church, and Hank Borchardt, Co-Pastor of Northminister in Troy, shared the joy of having their partnership churches working together over the Lenten season when they had 4 sessions of Christian Education together.

Gus Nussdorfer from the Hartland New Church Development, shared the joy of being a pastor in a new church development as they are growing and building a Christian community.

Phyllis Hunt, Elder from Cherry Hill in Dearborn, asked for prayers for our missionaries in Nairobi/Kenya, Tim and Sher Emercaton and their brother-in-law, a missionary in Zaire whose wife and children are in Nairobi.

Howard Soehl, Pastor, First Presbyterian Church in Howell, told of the sudden death of their part-time music director on 2/28/97, asked for prayers for his wife and four children, church members, and friends.

Jim Beates, member at large, raised the concern of many of the gay/lesbian and their families in the wake of the passage of Amendment B and asked the presbyters to visit and pray with them.

John Sefcik, announced that a great achievement and honor has come to Presbyterian Village East and Presbyterian Village Redford. They have achieved national accreditation as a continuing care facility. There are only between 5 and 7 other facilities in the state that have received national accreditation.

Ed Gehres, Executive Presbyter, shared several pastoral concerns.

Synod has reduced it's giving to Presbyterian Colleges and has urged the Presbyteries to allow the Colleges to raise funds within their bounds.

## **B. PRESBYTERIAN DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION**

Patrick Thompson reviewed the history of the Presbyterian Development Corporation, which began in this Presbytery a little over 2 years ago. They have now joined with the Jefferson East Business Association to create a joint venture that would set up a Business Development Project using the bank building the Presbytery owns on East Jefferson.

## C. PRESBYTERIAN YOUTH CONNECTION

The Education and Nurture Committee and youth and adults from 3 different churches reported on the Presbyterian Youth Connection meeting in Toledo.

## **III. EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER**

The Reverend Ed Gehres, Executive Presbyter reported he has discovered that 170 years ago this month the General Assembly, when it was meeting in May of 1827, took the following action in Overture #8,

An application from certain ministers and churches in the Territory of Michigan to be constituted a Presbytery. Resolved that the application be granted and a Presbytery is hereby constituted to be called the Presbytery of Detroit and to consist of the following ministers: The Reverends Owen N. Wells, Huey Prince, Isaac W. Ruffles, William M. Perry and William Page, and the churches of: Detroit, Farmington, Monroe, Pontiac, and Mackinaw. Resolved that this Presbytery thus constituted hold their first meeting in the City of Detroit, on the first Wednesday in September next, at 3 o'clock p.m. to be opened by the Reverend Owen N. Wells or in his absence by the senior minister present.

There are no minutes of that first meeting in existence. Mr. Gehres suggested that we celebrate 170 years of continuous Presbyterian witness and ministry not only in Detroit, but in southeastern Michigan and all of the Michigan Territories, starting in September 1997 and concluding in September 1998.

The Committee on Local Arrangements for the 209th General Assembly would like to bring our denomination together in prayerful preparation as our commissioners and others join to serve and worship together at the General Assembly in Syracuse New York this June. Mr. Gehres suggested that we pray on the first two Sundays in June, and on the third Sunday, as well, for our commissioners and youth delegate and for all who are attending the Assembly.

## IV. MOMENTS OF CELEBRATION AND REMEMBRANCE

Kevin Johnson commended Presbyterian Villages of Michigan for their mission to render compassionate care to the aging segment of our population. In fulfillment of this task they have targeted the City of Detroit and are to open a residential care facility known as Bethany Presbyterian Manor. He introduced the Administrator, Ms. Jamie Scott. Ms. Scott announced that the dedication and ribbon cutting ceremony will be held on June 8th at 2 p.m.

## MINUTES OF THE JUNE 24, 1997, STATED MEETING PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT GATHERED AS THE BODY OF CHRIST FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, FARMINGTON, MI

## I. GATHERED AS THE PEOPLE OF GOD

## A. THE MODERATOR

A quorum being present the Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was convened in stated session on Tuesday, June 24, 1997, at 5:32 p.m., at the First Presbyterian Church, Farmington, Mi. The meeting was opened with prayer by Moderator Winslow.

Rudy Sell was appointed Assistant to the Stated Clerk.

New Commissioners and ministers were introduced and welcomed by Moderator Winslow.

## **B. THE STATED CLERK**

Stated Clerk, Edward Koster, presented Part I of his report which was adopted by motion.

- 1. DOCKET: Adopt the docket as presented.
- 2. EXCUSES: Excuse all continuing members of Presbytery and elder members of Council who have asked to be excused.
- 3. CORRESPONDING MEMBERS: Without further motions, seat as corresponding members all eligible persons who are presented to the Presbytery and who register on the enrollment sheet for corresponding members.

## C. WELCOME FROM THE HOST CHURCH

The Reverend Brewster Gere welcomed the presbyters to the Church for the first time. Mr. Gere stated that the congregation is 43 years old, and was chartered on the floor of General Assembly when it met in Detroit in 1954.

## D. ANNUAL REPORT OF PRESBYTERIAN VILLAGES OF MICHIGAN

Roger Myers reported there are nearly 1,400 older persons who make Presbyterian Villages their home.

Early this year the Covenant Advisory Council was formed. This is a group of 20 individuals from the Presbytery of Detroit and the Presbytery of Lake Huron who meet twice a year to deliberate on critical issues affecting the future of Presbyterian Villages as well as building stronger linkage with the church. The Advisory Council has 3 main areas of responsibility: Communication and Advocacy; Planning and Leadership; Spirituality and Ethics. There are also 106 individuals from 37 different churches within the Presbytery serving on Boards with Presbyterian Villages of Michigan.

There are many facility developments that are on-going:

- Bethany Manor in Detroit will be dedicated on Wednesday, July 23rd at noon;
- In October, Presbyterian Village in Holly will be opening the second phase, an additional 51 apartments;
- Presbyterian Village East, in Chesterfield Township, will be opening East Harbor Hall, a memory loss unit, in October;
- Warren Glen Presbyterian Village will commence construction this fall;
- Over the next 12 to 18 months, approximately 4 1/2 million dollars will be spent to modernize and improve Presbyterian Village Redford;

- There is involvement in 2 facilities out-state, one in Walker, a suburb of Grand Rapids which will open this fall, and the other, Hillside Apartments, the second phase of a senior housing facility located in Harbor Springs;
- In Westland and Holly, an Assisted Living Facilities are being opened in conjunction with Affiliated Living Services.

There are some unfunded plans on the drawing board. The major one is in Brush Park near First Presbyterian Church on Woodward. An application is being made for 8 million dollars to build 113 senior apartments in that area. In Grand Rapids, along with Porter Hills Presbyterian Village, a grant is being applied for to build Sonora Woods Retirement Community. There are several other areas being explored at the request of communities and congregations.

Program Development presents a great opportunity at this time. Presbyterian Village has been involved in implementing the Parish Nurse Program at First Presbyterian Church Birmingham and Peach Presbyterian in Clinton Township. They are involved with other congregations considering Parish Nursing and other Health Ministries. They are also involved in the development of Adult Day Care Centers, intergenerational programs, expanding rehabilitation services to the broader community, a personal emergency response system for the broader community.

Presbyterian Village is constantly looking at quality enhancement in the care that is delivered and the services provided. In March the Redford and East Villages went through an exhaustive accreditation process and in March they received 5 year accreditation from the Continuing Care Accreditation Commission.

There is still a great need for benevolence. No resident has ever been asked to leave a Village Facility due to the inability to pay. At the present time there is about \$600,000 per year used to assist residents who have exhausted their funds.

### **II. SHARING OUR MINISTRIES**

Carol Hylkema was a delegate to the Presbyterian Women Triennial Global Exchange which focused on the issues of the sexual exploitation of children and sex tourism. She reported that last fall in southeast Asia they saw the red light district in Bangkok with young girls, 15 to 20 years old, dressed in shocking pink bathing suits, dancing and mingling with the patrons of a bar. None of these girls looked happy to be there. Young girls are sold into prostitution by families to satisfy alcohol, drug, and other needs. They visited the New Home Project, similar to our Alternative for Girls, that specializes in teaching young girls the skills for living to prevent them from becoming involved in prostitution. About 120 miles from Bangkok, they visited the Child Prostitution Project, which works with child prostitutes, both boys and girls, as young as 8 years old. They saw white Caucasian men walking down the street holding the hands of young children, buying them snacks, ice cream cones, and/or dinner. They learned that this was their reward after the sex act had been completed.

In Manila they went to the Street Children's project located in a small house that houses about 50 children trying to keep them off the streets. Near the old military base the child prostitutes are getting younger and business is booming with tourists.

In this country, they went to San Francisco Network Ministries, a 20 year ministry of the Presbyterian Church, to prostitutes. In 1992, the Presbyterian Women gave \$475,000 to the Network Ministries and it has now parlayed into all of the money to build a \$7.5 million building

that houses 30 some families. They also visited Donaldena Cameron House in San Francisco's China Town. Donaldena Cameron was a young Scot woman who found that many Chinese women were brought to this country into white slavery mostly for the purpose of prostitution. She personally would go the doors of places where she saw or suspected that someone was being held against their will and she would knock down the doors and rescue the women. Her ministry continues today.

Last August there was a World Congress held in Stockholm against the commercial, sexual exploitation of children. The following statistics were provided:

- In the Philippines it is estimated that there are between 60,000 and 100,000 children under the age of 18 who are involved in prostitution;
- In Thailand it is estimated that there are 800,000 under the age of 16;
- Here in our own country, our government says that there are 100,000 under 18 although most non governmental agencies say that that figure is closer to 300,000 children.

Who are these sex-tourists? In southeast Asia, they are nearly one-quarter Americans --Doctors, Lawyers, Ministers, Teachers, Social Workers, Executive Business Persons -- people just like us.

## **III. EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER**

Ed Gehres, Executive Presbyter, thanked Presbyterian Village for the use of their satellite dish and hosting the first denominational National Teleconference.

Mr. Gehres reminded the presbyters of the Mission Challenge that was issued when the 1997 budget was adopted. The budget contained a challenge of \$19,535. So far one congregation has responded by increasing their giving this year. Some statistics for Mission Giving and Pledging for 1997:

- 18 churches will remain the same as 1996;
- 12 have indicated they will drop their Mission support;
- 26 churches have increased their Mission support in 1997 over 1996;
- 38 churches have not made any pledge or commitment;
- In 1996, 14 congregations made no contribution to the shared Mission of the denomination through Presbytery, Synod and the General Assembly.

Mr. Gehres urged the presbyters to go back to their churches and see if there are additional moneys that can be used to meet the Mission Challenge of 1997.

In answer to a question about how Presbyterian Layman gets names for their mailing list, Mr. Gehres, reminded the Presbytery that their Sessions are the custodians of the congregation's mailing lists. There should be a statement in the front of your directory indicating that the mailing list contained in the directory is for the express and sole use of the membership and should not be used for solicitation, for mailings, or for publications.

Lastly, Mr. Gehres shared an exciting new development in the Presbyterian Church, a new publication entitled "Presbyterians Being Faithful to Jesus Christ." This is a free newsletter in tabloid format and is for every member of the Presbyterian Church (USA).

## IV. MOMENTS OF CELEBRATION AND REMEMBRANCE

Ken Smith shared his concern for Jack Seitz, member of Southfield Presbyterian Church, is currently undergoing radiation treatment for a cancerous growth on his spine.

Colorado. She then introduced Natalie Brothers and Jim Faile, who reported to Presbytery on the conferences..

## 2. International Peacemaker

Judy Borchardt, reminded the Presbytery the Peacemaking Offering also is used to allow itinerant peacemakers to travel throughout the United States. She introduced Robert Schminkey, an International Peacemaker, here in the Detroit Presbytery, from South Africa. Mr. Schminkey reported on apartheid in South Africa, particularly on the church's role as apartheid ended.

## **C. Ecumenical Parish Associates**

Neeta Nichols noted that every year the Synod of the Covenant brings in Parish Associates from various parts of the world to be with churches in our Synod. This year the Detroit Presbytery is privileged to have two Ecumenical Parish Associates in our geographic bounds. One is serving at Ann Arbor First Church and, due to another commitment, is unable to be with us tonight. Fort Street Church has the other Parish Associate. She introduced Ingrid Astudillo, who is a member of the Presbyterian Church in Venezuela, and is a Deacon in her local congregation.

## **D.** Campus Ministry

The Reverend Diane Smalley, Campus Minister at Eastern Michigan University reported to the Presbytery about the students, graduate and undergraduate, of Eastern Michigan University, and her activities as campus pastor.

## **III. EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER**

Mr. Gehres presented Mr. Ahwring with a Presbyterian neck-tie.

In his report, Mr. Gehres shared some reflections on some reading he has done in the Scriptures and some reflections on this season of Stewardship into which we are entering. He pointed out that the Presbytery is in many, many places in this metropolitan area.

## IV. MOMENTS OF CELEBRATION AND REMEMBRANCE

Louise Westfall, First Church, Birmingham, shared a tremendous joy this summer that was the Presbyterian participation and witness with the Habitat for Humanity Blitz-Build 1997. ### GATHERED AS THE PEOPLE OF GOD

A quorum being present, the Presbytery of Detroit, of the Presbyterian Church (USA) was convened in stated session on Tuesday, May 25, 1995, at 5:35 p.m. at St. James Presbyterian Church, Redford, MI. The meeting was opened with a service of evening worship.

### **OPENING FORMALITIES**

### The Moderator

Moderator Seabrooks appointed the Mel Stockwell as Assistant to the Stated Clerk. New Commissioners and ministers were welcomed by the Moderator.

### The Stated Clerk

Upon motion of the Stated Clerk, Edward Koster, Presbytery:

### Welcome from the Host Church

Paul Bousquette welcomed Presbytery to St. James Church and Roger Myers of Presbyterian Village welcomed the Presbytery with a recollection of the covenant between the Presbytery and Presbyterian Villages signed five years ago and an extensive update of activities of Presbyterian Villages of Michigan. camp—for a cluster of renewing activities such as enabling work-service groups, promoting partnerships between urban and suburban congregations, conducting spirituality for city life conferences, collaborating with Ecumenical Seminary faculty, coordinating church involvement in hunger programs and mentoring projects. To start such an effort, a mature seminary intern with previous experience and skills might be secured to serve as a coordinator.

11. <u>Focus on Culturally Appropriate Evangelism</u>. A number of churches asked for the Presbytery to help congregations better understand their neighborhoods in order to create more culturally appropriate outreach, promote positive identity formation, and foster greater inclusiveness. The need for a variety of culturally sensitive evangelism models was affirmed. A number of persons asked the Presbytery to provide some leadership in this important arena.

12. <u>Children's Aid Society</u>. Several persons spoke of the urgent need to reach out to children in our church communities. It was noted that the Moderator of the General Assembly this year had challenged the churches of our denomination to each do at least one new thing to help children at risk. It was suggested that the Detroit Children's Aid Society has long experience in reaching out to children and that it is ready, willing and able to cooperate with local churches in creating neighborhood centers to serve children and their families in the city of Detroit. The Detroit Children's Aid Society can provide on-site services in churches.

13. <u>Educational Support.</u> Presbytery mission needs to lift up, encourage and support the importance of the family in the church and the school. St. John's Presbyterian Church has a program to help families provide school supplies, prepare children for school, and promote parent participation to improve the public schools. This cooperation with parents provides a way for families to come into the ongoing life of the church. The Presbytery should be actively supporting the improvement of the public schools.

14. <u>Senior Citizen Housing</u>. Detroit has a high percentage of elderly people and there is a great need for affordable senior citizen housing, with supportive programming attached, that enables seniors to continue to live at home in their chosen community. Hope Presbyterian Church is especially interested in this challenge. The potential partnership with Presbyterian Villages as an experienced, skilled, and knowledgeable ally was noted as an important resource. Presbyterian Villages is currently constructing new senior housing in downtown Detroit at Brush Park, two blocks from First Presbyterian Church.

15. <u>Health Care Needs.</u> A volunteer chaplain at Detroit Grace Hospital spoke of great needs for health care services in the city. It was indicated that Sinai Hospital will probably be closed in the near future. This will have deep impact on people. There are many families without any health insurance and essentially without any primary health care. Beyond this is the profound need for a spiritual and wholistic understanding of health and healing. Further, there is the need for preventive health education and guidance, which enables people to take charge of their own health with a positive attitude and constructive behavior. The questions were raised, "Are there any health centers or health clinics currently operating in Presbyterian churches? Are there any specific healing ministries in our churches?"

### TRUSTEES

Donald Brownell reported for the Trustees.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the following resolution:

Whereas the Outdoor Ministries of the Detroit Presbytery provides opportunities for congregations and other groups, including youth groups, to meet, meditate, and grow in Christ it is appropriate to encourage and support the expansion and improvement of these programs.

Whereas the Outdoor Ministries program has demonstrated the ability through program revenue and existing support to not only fund program, operating, and facility maintenance expenses, but also the repayment with interest of capital loans to create the facilities it is reasonable and prudent to loan money to assist in the expansion of the facility to permit an increase in the number of people that can benefit from programs at overestimate of income they budgeted. The present need is for \$30,000 to maintain them until June 30, 2001. Council voted to recommend an amendment to the MLK budget to Presbytery. (The money has actually been allocated by authority granted Council.) Council also set up a committee to review the matter and report back in May. The intent is to work with MLK to bring Council a plan that can be realistically achieved. Council will review it in May and ask for revisions, and if by the June meeting there is no realistic plan, then Council may decline to consider any further financial assistance beyond what is already budgeted.

- In March, Council required the committee on Process and Structure, which it had already appointed to continue their work but to have an initial consultation with Mr. Leas and Ms. Lewis-Tillman. In April Council heard a report on contacts with Leas and Lewis-Tillman and discussions continue with Leas and Lewis-Tillman concerning this consultation.
- 3. Council approved establishment of a Christian Education Work Group Budget of \$10,000 for 2001, to be funded from dollars freed up through the rolling revision of the 2001 budget.
- 4. Council recommended to the Trustees that any dollars exceeding \$50,000 in Urban Ministry Bicentennial Funds (Fund 23157) to be made available for Urban Ministry training expenses in 2001 (approximately \$4000 presently).

Minutes - Approved with exceptions Registers - Approved curing such default; provided that the Presbytery of Detroit shall not under any circumstances provide financial assistance to any member congregation to satisfy loan obligations unless the current appraised market value of the real estate and other assets securing the loan exceeds 115% of the outstanding principal balance and accumulated interest and any penalties or other liabilities related to such loan, together with the principal balance, accumulated interest and any penalties respecting any other loans secured by all or any part of the same collateral that secures the loan that is in default. This policy shall be carried out without regard to the effect of default on any reversionary interest of the Presbytery of Detroit in any real property or other assets that are collateral securing the loan.

This policy is recommended because current auditing standards suggest that the loans of all the churches of the Presbytery constitute a contingent liability for the Presbytery. (The total of all the loans is far greater than the assets of the Presbytery.) The Book of Order is very clear about ownership of church property: Church property is ordinarily held by the local church corporation. (If there be an exception to this, e.g. when there has been a specific agreement between the church and the Presbytery, it would be found in the title work (deed) of the church property.)

If a church dissolves, is closed, or tries to leave the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), title to all church property automatically goes to the Presbytery, following the trust provision in Chapter VIII of the Book of Order. If a church with a mortgage held by a bank dissolves, the Presbytery would not be required to assume title to the property and the outstanding mortgage <u>unless</u> Presbytery has voted to guarantee the loan. Presbytery guarantees loans only when money comes from the GA or Synod, which they require; otherwise Presbytery has not co-signed or guaranteed any church loan in memory.

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#### A Brief History of Kenjockety

#### 1904 - 2004

Mary C. Barkley, wife of James M. Barkley, Pastor of Forest Avenue Presbyterian Church, Detroit, Michigan, thought of the idea of starting a club for ministers' wives and enlisted the aid of her friend Caroline Cooper, wife of Dr. David Cooper. This was about 1900 or 1901.

Since 1904, the lives of many ministers' spouses of the Presbytery of Detroit have been involved, entertained, shared, and perhaps inspired by an organization called "Kenjockety" (from an old Indian name) which means "Apart from the Multitude". The organizing meeting was held at the home of Mrs. E. H. Pence (Jessie) of Fort Street Church on November 17, 1904. She hurriedly found a gavel (a chair leg), for the new president, Mary C. Barkley, and a constitution was formed.

Article 1 - The society shall be called the Kenjockety Club.

Article 2 - All wives of Presbyterian preachers who are in good and regular standing and who are willing to meet the heavy expenses of the annual dues are eligible for membership (dues 25 cents/year)

Article 3 - Meetings are to be held each month for luncheon or refreshments in members' homes or churches.

Article 4 – The object of this society shall be a means of relaxation from over-wrought enthusiasm, a tonic for unstrung nerves, and a time for fun and frolic.

The group early voted to "annex" their spouses for a Christmas party and a summer family picnic. From then on. spouses were affectionately termed the "Annex".

Through World War 1 years, the Roaring Twenties, the Great Depression of the 1930s, political and church upheavals, the miracle of Kenjockety held. Each member felt the love by the others, whether in joy or sorrow. Perhaps no one then would realize how important Kenjockety was to family morale during those hard times when it was so difficult to "Keep the Faith".

A few years of relative calm preceded World War II. After Pearl Harbor was bombed, we listened to the nightly news on the 9 radio and shared in the grief of the death of a son, relative or church member. Kenjockety's response was to carry on as usual with our monthly meetings, in spite of shortages and rationing and busy lives of volunteer service. When the General Assembly met in Detroit in 1943, we sacrificed our sugar to make cookies, and served a beautiful tea for visiting wives of ministers.

Then came the fabulous fifties with its affluence and new life. Church membership increased. Many new names were added to our roll. Again in 1954. General Assembly came to Detroit. Kenjockety provided a hospitality booth at the assembly hall where invitations were issued for a tea at First Church downtown Detroit for all visiting wives of ministers.

The Golden Anniversary of Keniockety was celebrated on November 29, 1954 at the new Detroit Westminster Church during the annual Christmas party. A beautiful birthday cake made with ice cream and decorated with roses was served.

The merger of the United Presbyterian Church of North America and the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. found Kenjockety eager to invite all the wives of the uniting churches to the November 1957 meeting at First Church, Royal Oak.

The troubled 60s were upon us. The world became our neighborhood. Yet, Kenjockety was felt still to be a place apart where we could be revitalized. Retreats were begun, held at Drake House, Howell Conference Center, Y.W.C.A and other places. Topics for study and reflection included devotional life, the role of ministers' wives and our changing world.

On December 6, 1974, again at Detroit Westminster Church, a pageant celebrating "70 Years of Kenjockety" was presented by the members. The three episodes, I - Apart from the Multitude (1904-1930); II – The Good Old Days? (1930-1950; III – You've Come a Long Way Baby (1950-1974), were enthusiastically portrayed and enjoyed by everyone. A copy of the pageant and four volumes of Kenjockety minutes (1904-1958) were placed in the Bentley Historical Library, Michigan Historical Collection, at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. Copies of our minutes after 1958 are kept in the Presbytery of Detroit office. The last twenty-five years have seen many changes. Life

styles, energy problems, inflation, terrorists attacks, more wives 10

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working, more women being ordained to the ministry, all have raised challenges for Kenjockety.

Some of the more interesting happenings during Kenjockety's last twenty-five years are listed below.

In 1980, our constitution was changed to ministers' spouses instead of wives, since more and more women were being ordained as Presbyterian ministers

In 1988, ministers' spouses' names were included in the Presbytery Directory

In 1989, Kenjockety gave two banners in memory of Lydia Hoot to the Presbytery of Detroit, one represented the Presbytery and the other the Synod of the Covenant and the General Assembly

In 1992, our policy was established for Memorials of members and spouses to be \$25.00.

In December 1994, Kenjockety's 90<sup>th</sup> Anniversary was at Starr Presbyterian Church with a function, only members this time

1996, Kenjockety contributed the Communion plates to be used in the new chapel at Presbyterian Village, Redford

In 1999, Kenjockety celebrated our 95<sup>th</sup> anniversary with a luncheon with spouses invited

Christmas parties with spouses and up to 90 people were held and for many recent years at Redford Presbyterian Church where beautiful Christmas trees representing many countries and occasions were enjoyed.

Kenjockety for several years enjoyed outings to the Coffee Concert at Orchestra Hall.

Kenjockety attended Presbytery meetings for many years as a group, had snacks before dinner, joined Presbytery for dinner and the worship service, and then returned to the parlor for our own business meetings.

For 100 years, this amazing segment of our extended church has held together. Duties and cares, programming, family and spouses were forgotten each month as we met. Today, after 100 years of continuous support to and with the many spouses, past and present, Kenjockety is still be a place apart for rest, comfort, fun, fellowship and love!

#### **Kenjockety** Artifacts

Kenjockety has two artifacts from years' past.

The Kenjockety pin, only one is now in existence, was worn by the members beginning about 1905 or 1906. It resembles a waving pennant, royal blue background with the word Kenjockety written in silver.

The Kenjockety gavel is still in use today, when we have a serious meeting. The following information was recorded on December 16, 1907. "The head was a piece of southern pine from the floor of the battleship "Texas" commanded by Captain Phillip at the Battle of Santiago. The piece of wood was brought from the Brooklyn Navy Yard by Dr. Barkley. The handle, a piece of black ebony, was brought from Cuba by Dr. Earl Barkley."

#### State of the Presbytery - January, 2015

#### The Rev. Dr. Allen D. Timm, Executive Presbyter

Every year I look at the statistics of the presbytery. In 2013, the presbytery lost 2,144 members, which is the number of congregants on which 2014 per capita was assessed. However, while we had that decline, 19 congregations reported growth in worship attendance and 14 congregations grew in membership. While it is easy to say decline is in the wind for congregations, truly there are examples to the contrary.

It is important to note that growth did not only occur in our large churches. A church does not have to be large to do significant mission. Take South Lyon, for example, and the new projects started by a congregation of 129 members, guided by a new pastor who believes that a congregation is called to be a mission station for Jesus Christ. South Lyon has established itself in the community through presence at community events, health clinics, and youth programs for the community. These needs arose as they studied their community and talked to residents. The church collaborates with other community churches to lift community. Congregations of any size can be forces for change in their community. The study Holy Conversations gives excellent pointers on how to reconnect with the community.

When I reflected on the congregations that grew, I noted that each had some combination of the following items: vital worship, intentional outreach, education that helps disciples to grow, an atmosphere of hospitality, a prophetic lifestyle, and a dynamic youth ministry. I have picked up one other theme: the churches that are growing in worship and membership are intentional about reaching people who are not in church and seek to make disciples who will extend the kingdom of Jesus Christ.

Over the past ten years the presbytery has lost almost 10,000 members, and over that time giving by members to the per capita of the presbytery and shared mission has dropped by about 450,000 per year. To respond to that, the Teams have reduced staff and office space. Much mission has shifted to congregations who support and send volunteers to their own missions. Presbytery still supports some missions directly with giving: two youth ministries in the City (Second Mile Center and Barnabas Youth Opportunities, Inc.), campus ministries, and new ministry initiatives by congregations in the community. Outreach activities include those who suffer domestic violence and hunger ministries. Beyond that, the Ranney-Balch Fund provided direct support to ministries that reached out to minorities.

The highlight of last year for me was the hosting of General Assembly. Upwards of 1600 church members volunteered to extend hospitality to commissioners, delegates, and guests. My heartfelt thanks go out to the Executive Committee who included Peter Smith, Sue Melrose, Budge Gere, and Diane Agnew, who was also the Executive Coordinator. Committee Chairs and their Vice Chairs included Peter Henry and Mary Beth Jones, Adrienne Adams and Martha Nelson, Dianne Bostic Robinson and Peg Carpenter, Harold Ellis and David Bunch, and Charlotte Fischer. I want to thank the congregations and individuals who gave funds and effort. These also included Alma College, Presbyterian Villages of Michigan, and the Presbyteries of Lake Huron and Lake Michigan.

We have strong Teams and Committees whose aim is to strengthen congregations to be missional, pastoral and prophetic. The budget for 2015 reflects diligent efforts to predict the impact spending of dollars will make. To receive budget dollars teams and committees define the difference that will be made because a training event was held, or members of a team attended a workshop. The ask, what change will occur that strengthens congregations?

The Presbytery of Detroit is fortunate that endowment funds were left to support the administration of the Presbytery. That takes some of the burden for per capita off the backs of members. Beyond that, congregations support the mission program of the Presbytery in what is called Shared Mission. All the funds that have been contributed and sent for Shared Mission and Per Capita are much appreciated by your teams and committees, who do their best to be good stewards of the dollars congregations provide, as well as to support the mission of the wider church.

Someone commented on how many clergy new to the presbytery have already made contributions of leadership and have become strong colleagues in ministry. The Pastors in Transition Workgroup still has the aim of making Detroit Presbytery a "destination presbytery." That is my hope as well as the presbytery becomes one that is known for strengthening them as they serve Christ in ways that are missional, pastoral, and prophetic.

I would like you to know that I do my best to support church officer training, the transition of pastors into the presbytery, the placement and support of pastors, and the development of hands on mission opportunities. Last year two of our congregations were led by graduate students from the Ford School of Public Policy at the University of Michigan in a study of their neighborhood. I have supported the efforts to engage in Holy Conversations, and all these efforts attempt to engage the neighborhood around the church.

I also do my part to learn and grow. I am part of an Executive Presbyter learning group. Last year I joined a second learning group which focuses on Urban Ministry. Like every other pastor, I try to continue to grow in my faith and my skills.

As your Executive Presbyter I continue to feel honored to be your leader. I continue to engage members in ministry and to help people with a similar call find each other. My prayer is that the Presbytery will continue to strengthen its congregations so they can provide a word of hope to their neighborhood, and be a catalyst for change. May our love and justice show a way of life that others emulate. I hope that as we Presbyterians in this metropolitan area "lift high the cross, that all the world may adore Christ's sacred name."

byterian Church in the U.S.A., and the Presbytery of Detroit of the Synod of Ohio of the United Presbyterian Church of North America to form the Presbytery of Detroit in the Synod of Michigan of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and

WHEREAS, the Special Administration Commission of the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. voted on November 25,1958 to approve the overture form the Synod of Michigan to merge the former United Presbyterian Presbytery of Detroit with the former Presbytery of Detroit of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., the former Presbytery of Detroit to become the Presbytery of Detroit of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., effective January 1, 1959,

THEREFORE, be it declared that the two presbyteries are now constituted as one body,

AND BE IT FURTHER DECLARED that the union preserves as one presbytery the offical records, property and interests of the two presbyteries, constituting the union now consummated,

AND BE IT FURTHER DECLARED that the two presbyteries are known as the Presbytery of Detroit of the Synod of Michigan of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America to the Glory of God through Jesus Christ our Lord."

The Presbytery of Detroit, the United Presbyterian <sup>C</sup>hurch in the United States of America was constituted with Prayer by the Rev. Dr. Wilfred E. Simpson.

Upon motion, the Recommended General Rules for Judicatories of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America; and the Rulesof Order of the Presbytery of Detroit, were adopted. (Note: the Moderator shall appoint a special committee to review the Rules of Order, during 1959, and to submit these recommended Rules of Order for adoption.)

The Chairman of the Joint Nominating Committee, Elder J. Lamar Newberry, Visser presented the name of the Reverend Dr.John Arthur Visser to be the Moderator Elected of the Presbytery. There being no further nominations, upon motion, Dr. Moderator Visser was unanimously elected. The Rev. Mr. Roy F. Lambert, former Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit of the former United Presbyterian Church of North America, and the Rev. Dr. Wilfred E. Simpson, acting Moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit of the former Presbyterian Church in the United States of America left the Pulpit to greet the newly eclected Moderator. After assisting him into his gown they escorted him to the Pulpit as the Presbytery stood. The Moderator acknowledged his election with a few remarks.

The Chairman of the Joint Nominating Committee, Elder J. Lamar Newberry, presented the following named persons to be the officers of the Presbytery of Detroit: Dr. Frank J. Irvine, Vice-Moderator; Dr. Harold F. Fredsell, Stated Clerk; the Rev. R.A.N. Wilson, Jr., Permanent Clerk. Upon motion, the report was received, the nominations were closed, and a unanimous ballot was cast for the above named officers. The Moderator then declared that they were duly elected.

The Chairman of the Joint Nominating Committee, Elder J. Lamar Newberry, presented the report of the Committee with the following nominations to the Committees of Presbytery. Upon motion, the report was received. There being no other nominations, upon motion, all the nominees were declared elected.

  - a. That it would be valuable for churches across the Synod to study the Regional Synods Proposal;

General Council reported that it had appointed a Special Committee on the Regional Synods Proposal as follows: The Rev. William F. Whitledge (Chairman), The Rev. Albert R. Juterbock, The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman, Jr., The Rev. LeRoy J. Peterson, Elder Gordon H. Robertson (Kirk in the Hills). The Special Committee to Review CORAR reported through the chairman, The Rev. Ralph C. Stribe, Jr., who introduced the members of the committee and described the procedures they had followed. (see Paper D) Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report and adopted its recommendations as follows: 1. Change from Commission to Committee: That the Presbytery of Detroit form a new program committee, the Committee on Religion and Race, which shall continue the work of the Commission on Religion and Race, beginning on January 1, 1967. The change from a commission to a program committee is to indicate the ongoing concern of Presbytery in this field. In no way shall this change be construed to negate the mobility and responsiveness in crisis situations which has characterized the Commission on Religion and Race. 2. Current Concerns: That the new Committee on Religion and Race should be particularly conscious at this time of the following needs: a. The urgent need to develop tools of communication and interpretation to fill the gap between what the Commission has been learning and doing in the civil rights struggle and what the layman knows about it. Ъ. The need to assist local church officers and members toward an appreciation of the variety of meanings, both personal and social, which emerge in conflict situations; and to assist them toward creative responses to their opportunities for Christian witness. c. The urgent need to coordinate strategy and program with the various committees and agencies of Presbytery. The need for more consistent execution of the policies and decisions of Presbytery d. through its committees and agencies. The continuing need to confront the established structures of society with their e. responsibility to follow through on civil rights laws already on the books, and

- with their obligation to respond constructively to the real needs of the community. f. The need for trained task forces, beyond the Committee membership but responsible to the Committee, to carry out programs developed by the Committee.
- g. The critical need for Church leadership in other Michigan communities that are facing problems similar to those of metropolitan Detroit.
- 3. <u>Structure and Duties</u>: That the following proposed addition to the Structure and Bylaws of Presbytery be received and docketed for action at the November 22, 1966 meeting of Presbytery:

ARTICLE IV: THE COMMITTEES OF PRESBYTERY

Section 3: Program Committees - I. The Committee on Religion and Race

- (1) <u>Membership</u>: There shall be nine members of this committee, of whom five shall be ministers and four shall be elders or members of churches of Presbytery.
- (2) Duties:
  - (a) To implement the pronouncements of the General Agsembly and of this Presbytery relative to race relations by mobilizing the full resources of Presbytery for effective action.
  - (b) To work with the congregations and agencies of Presbytery to eliminate any policies, practices, or attitudes of racism within the United Presbyterian Church.
  - (c) To review all Presbytery actions to see that they comply with established policies relative to race, and to recommend new policies by which Presbytery may forward the realization of an integrated Church and society with equal social, economic, and civil rights for all.
  - (d) To represent Presbytery in cooperating with the policy and program of the General Assembly Commission on Religion and Race.

- <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery adopted the following policy statement: The Presbytery of Detroit is committed to a society in which all men have equal opportunity. We believe that equal opportunity should apply SEE to the purchase of goods and services and, therefore, make the following recomm
  - to the purchase of goods and services and, therefore, make the following recommendations: 1. That all real property of the Presbytery of Detroit and the congregations

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- and agencies thereof, when offered for sale, shall be sold only on the open market. An open market is one in which every qualified prospective buyer has equal opportunity to make an offer to buy, and where the seller makes his decision to accept or reject such an offer on the same criteria applied to all prospective buyers. To this end, the sale of all real property shall be advertised in one of the major Detroit daily newspapers willing to include the phrase "equal opportunity seller", for five successive days, including one weekend.
  - 2. If a realtor is employed, he must agree to list the property, show the property, and transmit all offers to the seller without regard for race, creed, color, or national origin.
  - 3. Consideration should be given to using the listing service offered through the Metropolitan Detroit Committee on Fair Housing Practices, 705 Fine Arts Building, Detroit, 48226.
  - 4. The seller in considering any offer to purchase shall not consider any factor of race, creed, color, religion or national origin of the prospective buyer, nor the current composition of the neighborhood in which the property is located.
  - 5. The Presbytery is encouraged to consult with the Committee on National Missions regarding the implementation of this policy.
- 3. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery overtured General Assembly to amend the Form of Government, Chapter XXXVI to broaden the authorization of union churches to include the United Church of Christ.

Whereas the Committee on the Book of Common Worship has recognized this by providing a current rendering of the Nicene Creed in <u>The Book</u> of Common Worship, Provisional Services;

- 4. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery expressed its intention to organize the Livonia portion of the membership of the Ward Memorial Presbyterian Church.
- 5. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized the Welsh Church to sell is property at 2504 Monterey Ave., Detroit, to St. Peter's Holiness Church of Jesus Christ for twenty-nine thousand dollars (\$29,000) cash.
- 6. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized First Church, Wayne, to increase its mortgage indebtedness by four thousand one hundred and thirty dollars (\$4,130) to a total of forty-four thousand one hundred and thirty dollars (\$44,130) by means of a seven percent (7%) first mortgage with the National Bank of Detroit for the purpose of completing its remodeling program.
- 7. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery authorized First Church, Birmingham, to place on the open market, in accord with Presbytery policy, its manse located at 1017 Pilgrim Street, Birmingham; granted the Committee on National Missions the power to act in behalf of Presbytery to approve this sale, if necessary, prior to the September meeting of Presbytery; and directed that the final terms of the sale be reported to Presbytery at a subsequent meeting.

- Provisional boundary lines for Regional Synods be drawn as quickly as possible according to the procedures outlined for "The Special Committee on Synod Boundaries." (Page 522 Part I Journal, Minutes of the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, 1969)
- 2. When these provisional boundaries have been established, and prior to formal organization of the new Regional Synods; an Organizationas Commission be established in each provisional Regional Synod with fair representation chosen by each of the existing Synods to:
  - a. develop recommendations concerning policy, strategy, program and staff for the new Regional Synod and its Presbyteries and propose a Plan for Organizing the new Regional Synod;

- b. consult with appropriate General Assembly agencies and committees;
- c. refer the Plan for Organizing to the existing Synods for implementation;
- d. recommend to the new Regional Synod its proposals concerning policy, strategy, program and staff for the Synod and its Presbyteries.
- 3. New Regional Synods are to be constituted no sooner than one (1) year or later than two (2) years after establishment of provisional Regional Synod boundaries, thus providing organization of the new Regional Synods after the planning for policy, strategy, program, and staff is well established.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery arrested and sustained the ordination examination of Frank N. Gready, III, subject to his graduation from Pittsburgh Theological Seminary and the receipt of a call.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery arrested and sustained the ordination examination of Lydia Sarandan.

The Moderator reported the action of Presbytery to the candidates and offered prayer.

THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through the chairman, The Rev. Harry L. Geissinger.

 Upon motion, Presbytery approved the request from The Rev. George D. Colman and the Synod of Michigan for termination of the contractual agreement existing between them effective April 30, 1970, pending action by Synod General Council on May 5, 1970 so that Mr. Colman may be free to accept a contract as Associate Director of Detroit Industrial Mission effective May 1, 1970. The Rev. Robert H. Yolton, Executive, spoke in appreciation of Mr. Colman's work. 2. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery recommended to the Synod of Michigan that the Hebrew language requirement for Craig Dykstra be waived for the following reasons:

> Craig Dykstra, a member of Grosse Pointe Memorial Church and under the care of this Presbytery since June of 1969, is now a middler at Princeton Theological Seminary. He has completed the requirements for proficiency in the Greek language. Mr. Dykstra requests the waiver of the Hebrew language requirement due to the fact that he must work full-time this summer, in order to support his wife and two children. Until the birth of their second son, Mr. Dykstra had thoughthis wife would be able to work and that he could work part-time and also study Hebrew this summer.

The Hebrew language will also be offered next fall. However, if he were to take the language at that time it would not allow him to complete the required Greek sequence or to complete the necessary senior thesis.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

THE GENERAL COUNCIL reported through the Stated Clerk, The Rev. Robert L. Moreland.

- 1. The General Council reported for information the following actions:
  - a. The General Council received a communication from the General Council of the General Assembly, calling the attention of Presbytery to the special responsibilities of presbyteries and sessions in "The Design for Mission" as set forth in the Form of Government 41.06 and 42.07: "The session is to lead the congregation in participation in the mission of the Church in the world. It may consult the presbytery through the appropriate committees or the presbytery through its committees may consult with the session."

"The presbytery shall assist and guide particular churches in their ministries and shall itself be a basic unit of mission with responsibilities for particular ministries."

- b. The General Council referred to the Special Nominating Committee a communication from the chairman of the Organizing Commission of the Synod of the Covenant, asking Presbytery to appoint one elder to serve on the Special Committee to Nominate the Synol Executive, as provided in the Book of Order 69.12.
- c. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures overtures to the 184th General Assembly (1972) from the Presbytery of Columbus, concerning a committee to study the Holy Spirit in the World Today, and from the Presbytery of New York City, concerning a national study of salary standards and benefits of the non-ordained staff of local congregations in order to recommend salary and benefit policies for those non-ordained staff members, particularly directors of religious education, secretaries, sextons and church musicians.
- d. The General Council referred to the Presbytery's Validating Committee a communication from the session of the Plymouth Church stating that its self-development fund would be sent to the General Assembly program because of the unavailability of information relative to Presbytery programs for 1972.
- e. The General Council accepted The Rev. Arthur Beumler's offer to carry greetings from the Presbytery of the church and its mission in Korea.
- f. The General Council accepted the resignation of Key Phillips from the Committee on Ministerial Relations and referred the vacancy to the Committee on Nominations. 19

- g. The General Council received for report to Presbytery the Treasurer's financial reports for the Benevolence Fund and the Per Capita Administrative Fund for the quarter ending March 31, 1972, which are appended.

Two motions concerning support of Detroit ordinance 659-G, chapter 39, article 1 and of the Detroit News' policy for X-rated movie advertising were defeated.
- 1. The General Council did not approve a proposed overture from the Committee on Church and Society concerning an Indian Day of Prayer by a vote of 8 to 9.
- m. The General Council heard a report that the Committee on Candidates plans to contact those churches which have reported they have funds available to assist candidates under care, in order to supplement its Financial Aid Program (cf. Presbytery minutes 9/23/69) in the 1972-73 school year.
- <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery discharged the following administrative commissions:

#### POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

The report of the General Council continued.

4. The Rev. Richard Dempsey, chairman of the <u>Special Committee to Study COCU</u>, presented the recommendations of the Committee. The Presbytery became confused in parliamentary procedures. The Moderator resolved the issues by consent ruling that motions and actions related to the recommendations would be dropped and actions on the recommendations would be renewed. No appeal of her ruling was made

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery heard the report of the Special Committee to Study COCU, approved the report and forwarded it to the General Assembly's

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Committee on COCU, and discharged the Special Committee with thanks. Upon motion, the report of the General Council as a whole was approved.

- 1. The General Council reported for information the following:
  - a. The General Council heard, read and received a communication from the session of the First United Presbyterian Church, Royal Oak, expressing deep concern relative to the action of the General Council of Synod in responding to the Kalamazoo Gay Liberation Movement.
  - b. The General Council received a communication from The Rev. Robert L. Kincheloe, Executive Director of the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches, reporting that the Council of Churches has asked The Rev. Carl Howie and George Bushnell, Jr. to serve on a representative planning committee to explore the formation of a more inclusive ecumenical organization than now exists.
  - c. The General Council referred to the Committee on National Missions a communication from Focus Hope, asking for financial support.
  - d. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures and the Committee on National Missions an overture to the 184th General Assembly from the Presbytery of San Fernando, on the subject of increased emphasis on new congregation development and congregation re-development.
  - e. The General Council referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures and the Committee on Ministerial Relations an overture to the 184th General Assembly from the Presbytery of Genesee Valley, on recommending that a high priority for the Vocation Agency of the General Assembly be the creation on a regional basis of therapeutic Christian communities.

The Presbytery of Detroit has no strict seniority or "point" system for determining nominees, feeling that it is better to maintain some flexibility in this matter. Certain guidelines, however, will be employed to identify potential nominees.

Guidelines for Ministers: Consideration will be given--

- Ministers who are engaged in an active ministry, who are serving as an interim or stated supply, or who are serving on Presbytery committees. 21

Philip Bellappeared for his ordination examination, spoke concerning his personal faith, and was questioned by Presbytery. The Committee presented the following statement concerning Mr. Bell's examination by the Committee: Mr. Bell has satisfactorily completed the Standard Examinations in Bible

Exegesis and in Theology. He has wrriten the Standard Examinations in Bible Polity and in Worship, but has not written them satisfactorily.

The Committee on Candidates has followed the "Suggested Guidelines for Presbyteries and Synods on Evaluation of Reasons for Exceptions" for waiving particular Standard Examinations as approved by the 182nd General Assembly (cf. pp. 377-380, <u>Minutes</u>, 1970). The following paragraph is applicable in this case:

"6. d. An exception is reponsible if the presbytery, through examination or evaluation of its own choosing, satisfies itself that the candidate is capable of making <u>practical application</u> of his knowledge in the area(s) of his failure in the Cooperative Examinations. Presbyteries should note in the referral the content and extent of presbytery's re-examination." (<u>Minutes</u>, 1970, p.379)

Your committee has spent many hours in consultation with Mr. Bell regarding failures in the above two examinations. We have arranged special tutoring in these areas. And finally we have re-examined Mr. Bell in these areas during a meeting of the committee. We are sorry that Mr. Bell has been unable to complete these exams satisfactorily. However, we are satisfied that his problem is with the written presentation of material on examinations, and <u>not</u> with his "practical knowledge" of the areas involved. We feel, as a committee, that Mr. Bell has adequate practical knowledge of the areas of Presbyterian

Polity and Worship, as evidenced by oral examination by the committee. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery arrested and sustained the examination and requested the appropriate committee of the Synod of Michigan to waive the requirement of the Standard Examinations in the areas of "Worship" and "Polity and Program" for Mr. Bell so that the Presbytery may proceed with his ordination at the earliest possible date. . Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the following resolution:

Whereas the Synod of the Covenant is in the early stages of reorganization, and it is not known how and to what extent services may be provided the Presbytery;

Whereas staff services during the coming months may be uncertain and so make the initiation of any reorganization difficult;

(Papers G, I) Upon motion, Presbytery adopted the attached Concerns for 1975, as amended to add the word "Synod" to item 11,, Goal:, so, that the phrase reads,

"to the specific concerns of the Synod, Presbytery and its sessions". Upon motion, the report of the General Council was approved as a whole.

- e. Presbytery Council heard a report that the Department of Local Church Development has named a Cabinet as follows: The Rev. James A. Cannon, Vice-Chairman; The Rev. Alfred T. Davies, Secretary; Mary Brown, Area I; Elder Ralph MacKenzie, Area II; The Rev. Michael Dunkelberger, Area III; The Rev. Theodore Taylor, Area IV; Elder Wilma Dellinger, Area V.

- 1. Presbytery Council heard the Executive Presbyter report Elder Eleanor Leigh to be in Oakwood Hospital, Dearborn; and The Rev. James A. Crawford in St. Mary's Hospital, Livonia.
- m. Presbytery Council approved the action of the Executive Presbyter in mailing General Mission pledge forms to local churches and referred follow-up to the Department on Presbytery Ministries.
- n. Presbytery Council referred to the Department on Personnel the matter of developing a plan to effectively inform Presbytery and to seek and endorse nominees to vacancies in General Assembly agencies and offices.
- o. Presbytery Council referred to the Administrative Commission on Reorganization the chairperson vacancy on the Division of Budget and Finance.
- p. Presbytery Council approved the Treasurer's Preliminary Statement of Financial Condition and 1974 Unified Budget for the period ending December 31, 1974.
- q. Presbytery Council authorized payment of one-sixth (1/6) of Detroit Presbytery Extended Experience Education (EEE) apportionment (1418) and referred review and recommendation regarding further payments to the Division on Business and Finance.
- r. Presbytery Council authorized the Executive Presbyter to service all Areas as requested by the Areas regarding mailings for the January meetings; and referred the matter of future servicing through the office to the next meeting of Area Chairpersons for discussion and recommendation.

- April 29, 1975
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery confirmed the action of the Presbytery Council approving the sale of the Church of the Open Door property, Detroit, to St. Stephen's Missionary Baptist Church for \$185,000 with a cash down of \$25,000, the balance to be carried in a land contract by the Presbytery of Detroit, payable at \$1,100 per month for 36 months, then \$1,500 or more per month for the next 12 years, with the unpaid balance all due and payable by May 1, 1990; payments shall include interest at 7½%; the St. Steph n's Church permitted to occupy the building before Easter; the monies from the sale to be under the direction of the Department of Local Church Development in conjunction with the Division of Business Affairs and to be used to retire present indebtedness on the property.
- 3. Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to the five Area Assemblies to serve Communion up to two times each year, using ministers and ruling elders from the areas.
- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery amended the 1975 Unified Budget \$20,000 on the expenditure side, for the moving and equipping of Presbytery's Office at Westminster Church, Detroit, and increased the income side \$20,000 from unspent monies of the 1974 Budget. The Executive Presbyter, The Rev. Donald G. Lester, reported that the Presby-

tery Office Building has been sold by the Synod of the Covenant who held title to the building.

- 5. Upon motion, Presbytery granted the Orchard Lake Church permission to increase its mortgage for its new sanctuary from \$250,000 to \$300,000 during the construction phase.
- 6. Upon motion, Presbytery elected an Ecclesiastical Commission to the Westminster Church, Port Huron, consisting of: The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman, The Rev. Carl G. Howie, The Rev. Larry L. Lewis, The Rev. Kenneth V. Kettlewell, Elder Donald White (Park Church) and Elder John Hamilton (Ward Memorial Church) to confer with said church regarding its disaffection and to report back to Presbytery, with the understanding that this commission is appointed on friendly terms.

Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

## POLICY APPROVALS

THE DEPARTMENT OF LOCAL CHURCH DEVELOPMENT reported through Vice Chairman, The Rev. James A. Cannon, on the need of funds for the successful development of hew churches. Specifically, \$50,000 is needed for Geneva and also \$50,000 for Saint Thomas Church. Both churches have conducted Building Fund campaigns. Geneva Church has pledges of \$43,000 and Saint Thomas has pledges of \$55,000. (Paper Q) Upon motion, Presbytery granted to Geneva Church and Saint Thomas Church \$50,000 each, from Presbytery resources as an advance against Presbytery Capital Fund Drive. Elder Christopher Washington reported on the Summer Service Project to be held in 12 churches. (Paper R)

#### PROGRAM REPORTS

THE DEPARTMENT OF PRESBYTERY MINISTRIES reported through the Chairman, The Rev. Paul R. Dotson, on the pre-Presbytery meeting on Hunger. He called attention to the papers distributed on this subject. (Papers S 1, 2, 3, 4) The Rev. Warren Day of the Presbytery of Grand River presented an audio-visual report on Hunger in Bangledesh.

THE TASK FORCE ON EXTENDED EXPERIENCE EDUCATION reported through the Chairman, The Rev. Edward E. Craxton, calling attention to the mailing to all churches describing the curriculums to be used at Camp Grindley and Bear Lake. Pictures of the Directors Jeff Doane, Camp Grindley, and Steve and Connie Phail, Bear Lake, were included in the mailing. Mr. Craxton called attention to the registrations received for camp and conference activities and asked the churches to promote the activities. (Paper T) 27 Upon motion, the report as a whole was received.

## June 24, 1975

- aa. Presbytery Council approved the request that a questionnaire regarding the first six months' operation of the new Presbytery structure be included in the pre-Presbytery mailing to commissioners to the June 24th meeting of Presbytery.
- bb. Presbytery Council discharged the Special Administrative Commission to ordain Mr. Charles Holm at Evergreen Village Church.
- cc. Presbytery Council instructed the Moderator of Presbytery to appoint a special committee to study the possibility of a Validated Special Opportunity Project on a faculty position at the University of Michigan in "Studies in Christianity from a Protestant Perspective."
- dd. Presbytery Council authorized the Executive Presbyter and the Stated Clerk to convene the Special Task Force on Planning a Committee on Capital Funds Campaign.
- ee. Presbytery Council, in light of the reported schedule for the General Assembly's Major Mission Funding Campaign, authorized the Special Committee on Capital Funds to proceed immediately to raise \$100,000 from the Presbytery of Detroit to underwrite the capital needs of the Geneva and Saint Thomas new church developments.
- Iff. Presbytery Council interpreted the standing rules of Presbytery regarding the salary of the Assistant Recording Clerk that he be paid at the rate of \$25.00 per meeting, plus expenses, retroactive to January 1, 1975, and authorized the Moderator and the Executive Presbyter to review the salary of the Recording Clerk in the light of the hours of work required and the changed Presbytery meeting schedule.
- ✓gg. Presbytery Council interpreted the role of the Stated Clerk in relation to Presbytery's special committees and commission that the Stated Clerk shall normally resource ecclesiastical and administrative commissions, but may, when need arises, employ the aid of the Recording Clerk for such assignments.
  - hh. Presbytery Council granted the Committee on Aging permission to hold a pre-Presbytery workshop on "Care of the Aging" at the September meeting of Presbytery.
  - ii. Presbytery Council approved a revised docket for the Presbytery>meeting of June 24, as presented by the Stated Clerk.
  - jj. Presbytery Council authorized the Division of Budget and Finance to present the Proposed 1976 Unified Budget to the Presbytery of Detroit on June 24, for information only, with the understanding that the report will come before the Presbytery at its September meeting for approval.
  - kk. Presbytery Council granted permission to the Department of Presbytery Ministries to hold a pre-Presbytery meeting at 4:30 p.m. on June 24th.
  - 11. (Action in following motion)
  - mm. Presbytery Council authorized the Stated Clerk to negotiate a change in meeting place of the December, 1975, meeting of Presbytery to Westminster Church of Detroit, the home church of the retiring Moderator, Walter Greene.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted permission to Detroit Presbyterial to hold Communion at its annual fall retreat, October 11, 1975, at Mercy Center and Presbytery invited The Rev. Carol Allen of Cincinnati Presbytery to preside at the Service of Communion. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the report as a whole.

THE DIVISION OF BUDGET AND FINANCE reported through its Chairman, The Rev. Charles E. McCloskey, who presented a Proposed 1976 Budget as information for the Presbytery to act upon at its September meeting. (Paper F) The paper included the 1976 projected income of \$549,030.00, a description of each item for the Proposed Budget, a sheet showing the fixed items set by negotiation, and a list of Validated Special Opportunities. Upon motion, Presbytery confirmed the agreements reached in the Synodwide Budget Consultation/Negotiation of March 14-15, 1975, which included the percentage division of the General Mission dollar for 1976 which was proposed by Presbytery in the amounts of 41 per cent for General Assembly, 26 per cent for Synod and 33 per cent for Presbytery. (Paper G)

THE DIVISION OF BUSINESS AFFAIRS reported through its Chairman, The Rev. Thomas W. Kirkman, as follows: (Paper H)

a. Division representatives are in negotiation with the Synod for a division of the "equipment reserve funds" formerly held gaintly by the Synod of Michigan and the Presbytery of Detroit.

b. The Presbytery of Detroit, as successor to the Welsh Presbyterian Church of Detroit, is beneficiary of the estate of Mary Jones, deceased.

c. The Division, with the consent of the chairperson of the Special Committee on Apportionments Due, authorized that a letter be sent to each of the churches having per capita apportionments due, requesting cooperation with Presbytery, that churches indicate their intentions regarding payment, and that a schedule of such payments be listed with the Presbytery.

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- d. The Division is negotiating with the Synod and General Assembly in behalf of the Church of the Covenant, Detroit, for the forgiveness of its loan of \$5,500 from the Fifty Million Fund.
- e. The Presbytery Office relocation is now complete; the lease for space in Westminster Church has been signed, remodeling is nearing completion, with total expenditures to date at \$25,724.58.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved \$7,000 additional expenditures for Presbytery Office relocation over and above the amount (\$20,000) allocated by Presbytery for this purpose. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the Drayton Plains Community Church permission to deed 10 feet of its parking lot to Mr. John Hazlett in fulfillment of a 1947 agreement. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted the Clarkston, Sashabaw Church permission to sell back to the Cemetery Association a lot formerly purchased by the church from the Cemetery Association.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the granting of a utility easement on the Drake House property of Presbytery to the Michigan Bell Telephone Company in consideration of \$575. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the request of the Auburn Heights Church for permission to purchase a lot for \$4,000 cash, for future use as a parking lot.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted Garden City Church a moratorium on the repayment of its loan for a period of one year beginning July 1, 1975; and granted an additional shortterm loan of \$5,000 for a period of 6 months for the repair or construction of a new roof on the church, conditioned upon the church providing to the Division by October 1, 1975, an effectual plan for repaying this loan by the due date December 31, 1975. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted permission to the Korean Church to purchase property on 9 Mile Road from the Trumbull Avenue Church for \$140,000. The Rev. T. Andrew Kim, Pastor of the Korean Church, spoke to the motion.

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery approved the financial plan of Saint Thomas Church for the financing of its building construction, and granted permission for the church to borrow as follows: \$117,000 from the General Assembly Office of Capital Resources, up to \$42,000 for up to 5 years at up to 11% interest from local commercial financial sources. (After granting \$50,000 each to Saint Thomas and Geneva Churches, available resources of Presbytery for such purposes will be reduced to \$24,000.)

<u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery granted permission to the Milan Church to hire an architect and develop building plans and to make application for a mortgage loan in the amount of \$35,000 with the General Assembly Office of Capital Resources.

Upon motion, Presbytery granted the request of the Greater St. Stephens Baptist Church for deferment of its loan payments for six months until December 31, 1975. Upon motion, Presbytery granted a temporary loan in the amount of \$6,300 for a period of six months until December 31, 1975, to St. Luke's Church until it can secure a second-mortgage loan from the General Assembly Office of Capital Resources, for the purchase of a new home at \$39,000 for the pastor-elect.

Upon motion, Presbytery granted permission to Knox Church to deed 20 feet of the northeast portion of its property adjacent to Crocker Boulevard to Macomb County for the considerations listed in a letter of June 4, 1975. (Paper I) Upon motion, the report as a whole was approved.

THE TRUSTEES reported through its Chairman, Elder Thomas Turner, actions of the Trustees for the year 1974. (Paper J) The Trustees continued shifting their portfolio to bonds and other fixed income investments which now comprise 60% of their portfolio. Even though the total market value of the assets declined 20%, most of this represents a temporary "Paper" loss which will ultimately be restored to full face value. The James Joy Fund represents 75% of the total funds administered by the Trustees. In spite of

- 16. Council received and remembered in prayer special concerns for ministers who are, or have been, ill, including The Rev. Ralph Hawley, Presbytery Staff, The Rev. James Mitcham, The Rev. John Sefcik, The Rev. Sven Anderson, and The Rev. Dickson Forsyth.
- 17. A report of the Validating Committee for Self-Development of People was received for information.
- 18. Invitations for meetings of Presbytery from the following churches were accepted: September 28, Drayton Avenue, Ferndale; October 26, St. Paul's, Livonia; December 28, Grosse Pointe Woods.
- 19. Authorized the Chairman of the Administrative Commission on Westminster Church, Port Huron, to appoint three to five members, or consultants, to serve as Presbytery's "Committee of Defense" in the per capita hearing before General Assembly's Permanent Judicial Commission in Chicago on January 30, 1976, at 8 p.m., and authorized expenses to be paid by Presbytery Council.

Upon motion, Presbytery received the above nineteen items as information. b. Presbytery Council recommended actions disposed of as follows:

Presbytery approved the agreement regotiated with the Synod of the Covenant whereby the proceeds of the sale of the Puritan Avenue property would be divided 70% for the Presbytery of Detroit, 30% for the Synod of the Covenant, based primarily on equity interest at the time of the purchase of the property.

- 3. Upon metica, Presbytery approved an agreement negotiated with the Synod of the Covenant whereby the building repair reserve fund for the Puritan Avenue property in the amount of \$13,250.46 be divided equally between the Presbytery of Detroit and the Synod of the Covenant.
- 4. Upon motion, Presbytery established a position of Hunger Action Fnabler to work in an agreed job description for the two Presbyteries of Detroit and Lake Michigan and to adopt a budget for 1976 as follows: \$6,000 salary (half-time), \$1,000 expenses, \$1,000 task force expenses. Action subject to agreement by Lake Michigan Presbytery.

Upon motion, Presbytery approved the report of the Presbytery Council as a whole.

THE BUDGET AND FINANCE DIVISION reported through The Rev. Charles E. McCloskey, Chairperson, who spoke in detail of the 1977 budget development process and timeline.

PRESBYTERIAN VILLAGE FAST FOURTERS COMMITTEE reported through its chairperson, Mr. Gerald C. Schroeder. He told of progress of Phase I in its effort to raise one million dollars for this project. Although major emphasis is concentrated among churches of Arca I, all others are invited to share in this endeavor. (Paper B2)

THE EXECUTIVE PRESENTER, The Rev. Donald G. Lester, shared good news of many advances in the life of churches and ministers of Detroit Presbytery.

#### DEPARTMENT REPORTS

THE DEPARTMENT OF PERSONNEL

THE SUB-COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELATIONS reported through the Chairperson, The Rev. William F. Whitledge, as follows: (Paper C1)

- 1. <u>Upon motion</u>, Presbytery heard Elder Commissioners Ms. Pat Arner and George Mack and dissolved the pastoral relation between The Rev. Alfred T. Davies and the University Church, Rochester; approved the call of the Mt. Washington Church, Cincinnati, Ohio to The Rev. Alfred T. Davies; placed the call in Mr. Davies' hands; dismissed Mr. Davies to the Presbytery of Cincinnati, effective February 16, 1976; and authorized the session to fill the pulpit during the pastoral vacancy.
- 2. Upon motion, Presbytery heard Dr. John Aldrich, a representative of the church, and approved the call of the First Presbyterian Church, Dearborn,
