<u>The motion was made</u> by the Coordinating Cabinet to concur with Overture 011 *On Amending W-4.9000 Concerning the Church's Role in Legal Marriage and Services of Christian Covenant—From the Presbytery of Lehigh* and rationale submitted by Lehigh Presbytery, with the following additional rationale.

In the proposals to issue an Authoritative Interpretation and to amend the Directory of Worship, there are serious <u>procedural</u> difficulties. An AI would bypass the presbyteries entirely. Amending the Directory of Worship to allow same-sex marriages without amending the Confessions would raise a significant problem about whether the GA can ignore the Confessions at will.

The motion was not approved. The vote was 33 yes, 55 no.

Re: The matter of Ronald Vanderbeek

Ronald Vanderbeek pled guilty and was convicted by the Permanent Judicial Commission on October 10, 2011 of the offenses of sexual abuse of another person and engaging in a sexual relationship that misused his office. The Permanent Judicial Commission suspended him from the ordered ministry of teaching elder for a period of two years, with the provision that approval of restoration would be subject to the decision of the Committee on Ministry on recommendation of a therapist, and that he comply with all instructions of the Committee on Ministry regarding contact with the members of Garden City church while under suspension. Mr Vanderbeek applied to the Committee on Ministry for reinstatement, and the Committee on Ministry at the October 26, 2013 meeting that under the authority granted it, the Committee on Ministry had denied Mr. Ronald Vanderbeek's request to be reinstated to ministry.

Mr Vanderbeek has asked how he can appeal the decision of the Committee on Ministry. The Rules of Discipline state that a decision as to whether a person may be returned to active service is at the discretion of the Presbytery. D-12.0200.

<u>Upon motion</u> of the Stated Clerk, the Presbytery voted establish an Administration Commission to hear the matter of Ronald Vanderbeek in his petition to be reinstated after suspension from the ordered ministry of teaching elder, and that it be given the following responsibilities and authorities:

1. It shall review the case decided by the Permanent Judicial Commission.

- 2. It shall review the behavior of Ronald Vanderbeek while under suspension.
- 3. It shall inquire of the Committee on Ministry the reasons it declined to restore Mr Vanderbeek.
- 4. It shall grant Mr Vanderbeek all rights of fundamental fairness afforded in administrative hearings. These rights shall include at least:
 - a. Informing Mr Vanderbeek of all the issues that he must address.
 - b. Giving Mr Vanderbeek time and opportunity to respond to the issues.
- 5. Determining on behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit whether he shall be restored to the ordered ministry of teaching elder, and if not to be restored at this time, to set criteria and procedures for his restoration within one year. This shall include the body that shall supervise his compliance, and the consequences of his failure to satisfactorily complete the requirements. One of the consequences of his failure after one year to satisfy the requirements as reported by the supervising body may be that he will be declared to have renounced the jurisdiction of this church pursuant to G-2.0509.
 - 6. Reporting its decision to Presbytery at the next meeting.

- Receipts from all sources are **Green**. Income from Per capita is off by 20% but Shared Mission, Investment & Property income is up versus the budget. Note \$100,000 Gift will be offset with qual disbursement.

• Expenditures and disbursements are **Yellow**. Some Expenses are forecasted to be over budget & will reflect higher disbursement due to increased Endowment & Shared mission dollars. Plus Per Capita will be paid to General Assembly and Synod at budgeted levels.

RED / Yellow / Green

• I will use these indicators to communicate the Financial Health of the Organization

RED indicates a significant decline or loss which will result in failure to meet budget requirements. Greater than 10% variance is RED YELLOW indicates a short term or minor loss, decline or excess versus the approved budget. From 5% to 10% variance is YELLOW

Green indicates stable or increasing revenue and or Assets that will benefit the organization. 0% to 5% variance to the Budget is GREEN

Definitions of Accounting terms;

The Presbytery of Detroit uses Generally Accepted Accounting Practices and accounts for all income and expenditures across the following multiple fund categories or groups;

- Fund **100** is the general **operating fund** similar to your check book at home or at your home Church
- Fund **200** is the **capital fund**, where loans and lines of credit are provided along with costs for property.
- Fund 300 is closed & inactive
- Fund 400 is where the endowment / investment transactions are recorded
- Fund **510** is where the **Designated** funds are recorded, similar to Saving accounts set up for specific use
- Fund 600 is where all the Mission fund transactions including GA & Synod are recorded and maintained.
- Fund 700 Closed & inactive
- Fund 800 Closed & inactive

The combined funds report is directly aligned with the approved Budget and includes all the funds. We will continue to report on the combined funds basis and the operating fund versus the approved budget.

Committee on Local Arrangements

Peter Smith reported for the Committee its work, and the expectations and needs for the 2015 General Assembly. There will be 1500-2000 opportunities to volunteer for work at the Assembly, including such things as greeters at the various hotels and COBO Center, assisting in arrangements for the daily worship services (which will be communion for the entire Assembly), manning various stations and service areas. Turner Thompson, Program Assistant, 313-340-7380, turner@gadetroit@gmail.com. Finances. Cola reported that the cost of hosting the assembly will be roughly \$259,750. We will receive \$50,000 from the General Assembly, and contributions from the Synod of the Covenant, Alma College, and the presbyteries of Lake Huron and Lake Michigan. This will leave the need to raise an additional \$175,000 from churches and individuals in the Presbytery. Costs will include \$44,700 for worship; \$57,750 for special events (including the Moderator's reception and mission and cultural tours); \$4800 for hospitality; \$12,950 for supplies and support of volunteers; \$35,100 for media and communications; \$44,800 for costs incurred by the leadership team for things such as gifts for moderators, commissioners and advisory delegates, and other miscellaneous costs;

\$34,500 for COLA office expenses and administration. **Still needed**: Outstanding pledges from 19 churches of \$8,200; plus an additional \$62,100 from individuals, churches and other sources. There are 23 churches in the Presbytery that have neither pledged nor given.

Reports

The Trustees reported:

- 1. The Trustees voted to establish a 510 account requested by the Social Justice Team for the "Embracing the Vision, Prayer and Protest Event" to be held at the Charles H. Wright African American Museum, scheduled for June 17, 2014. The Trustees directed that funds shall not be disbursed from this account beyond what is received, and that the Trustees have no responsibility for any expenditure for this purpose or from this account.
- 2. Trustees voted to make amendments to the Volunteer Driver Guidelines as follow (Additions are <u>underlined</u>. Deletions are struck through.):

T-13 Volunteer Driver Guidelines

Background and Need for a Policy

Volunteer drivers are being recruited to drive children, youth and adults to Presbytery sponsored events. The guidelines that follow are intended to assure that proper measures are taken for the safety and well being of those being transported. **Volunteer.**

A volunteer is an unpaid person providing transportation on behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit. The volunteer might be serving on an advisory or governance board; a committee member; participating in a one-time project; or in a support group function. It is the responsibility of the leader/organizer to assure these guidelines are followed.

Voluntary Background and Driving Checks.

Volunteers who are working with children and adults will be asked to undergo criminal record checks and other appropriate screening before assignment(s). **Insurance Coverage.**

- Accident, liability and automobile insurance coverage are the responsibility of the volunteer.
- Insurance must be in effect and meet the minimum standards of the State of Michigan.
- You are encouraged to consult with your insurance agent regarding your personal insurance coverage relative to Presbytery related volunteer work. The volunteer should have the State of Michigan required minimum-being driven.
- It is a violation of Michigan automobile insurance regulations for an insurance company to raise your rates based on volunteer-related driving.

Additional requirements.

• All volunteer drivers must be at least twenty five (25) years of age.

- All volunteer drivers must undergo a driving license history check <u>as part of</u> <u>the Presbytery criminal background</u> check prior to serving as a volunteer driver for the Presbytery of Detroit.
- All volunteer drivers must have good driving records, <u>with no record of</u> <u>careless, reckless, or alcohol-related violations on their driving record, and</u> <u>no more than 3 points within the last 2 years</u>, and current proof of insurance. Any and all traffic violations are to be reported to the event leader.
- Any volunteer can drive unrelated children if his or her child is in the car.
- Copies of the volunteer driver's insurance and license should shall be given to the event leader.
- <u>In the event of any moving violation or accident during the transport of any</u> youth or adult to Presbytery sponsored events, the driver shall file a written report with a factual description of the incident to the Detroit Presbytery. The event leader shall file the report at the Presbytery office immediately following the event.

COLA

Peter Smith reported for the Committee on Local Arrangements for the General Assembly. We are filling 1500-2000 volunteer opportunities. Most churches have appointed coordinators. There will be 2 trainings. March 15 was GA Sunday.

Sue Melrose reported: There will be Communion every day. The communion ware will be available for purchase. Special events include: The moderator reception (Cobo Hall); mission and cultural tours. Specific tasks: hospitality (airport, Cobo, hotels); refreshments; uniform for volunteers; gifts to moderators; 24/7 presence; office expenses. The total cost is budgeted at \$234,000; \$50,000 from the GA; \$26,000 from presbyteries, alma, etc. We need to raise \$150,000—We are well on our way, but we need more.

For Transfer into the PC(USA) from another Christian Denomination:

- 1. Rev. Thomas Pettus March 4, 2014
 - a. Rev. Pettus, a Baptist minister, is currently serving as pulpit supply with Gratiot Avenue Presbyterian Church and was referred to the CPM by the Committee on Ministry when he expressed a desire to transfer his credentials to the PC(USA) and become a teaching elder within it. The CPM met with Rev. Pettus, inquired as to his motivations for requesting such a transfer, and explained the educational requirements of the Presbytery of Detroit (and the PC(USA). Additionally, the CPM conveyed the requirement for him to take, and pass, all five of the Standard Ordination Examinations of the PC(USA). It was not understood at this initial meeting whether or not Rev. Pettus is a member of a Christian denomination with a judicatory higher than a congregation (a necessity for transfer). If he is, then educational requirements and ordination exams still must be completed for a transfer to occur. If he is not, then the CPM recommended Rev. Pettus would have to begin the ordination process from inquiry just as any other inquirer within the PCUSA. The latter track would also necessitate a renunciation of jurisdiction of his current denomination and membership in a PC(USA) congregation for a minimum of six months before the inquiry process could begin.
 - b. At its April 1 meeting, the CPM was informed that Rev. Pettus was not a member of a Christian denomination with a judicatory higher than a congregation (thus making a "transfer" of credentials impossible). And because of the committee's many concerns regarding the preparedness of this individual for ministry within

the PC(USA) and the number of waivers that may need to be granted, the committee voted unanimously to proceed with Rev. Pettus as it would with any other individual seeking ordination within the PC(USA).

The result of the March and April meetings (and their discussions) was the realization that the CPM is ill-equipped for handling such requests from individuals outside of our denomination or "Formula of Agreement" partner denominations. A "Covenant of Transfer" (its working title) is currently being created for such occasions, so as to protect the integrity of the care and ordination process of the POD and PC(USA), and will be presented at a future meeting for critique and adoption into our procedures and policies manual.

Additionally:

Susan Thomas

Ms. Thomas, a candidate finally assessed by the Presbytery of Detroit until 2008 when she withdrew from the member of the PCUSA as well as the process of ordination to the ministry of Teaching Elder (Minister of Word and Sacrament), has received and accepted a call to a yoked parish ministry (in Maine) of the Presbytery of Northern New England. After 13 years of being withdrawn from the PC(USA) and the ordination process, and by a ³/₄ majority vote of the Presbytery of Northern New England, Ms. Thomas was granted the exemptions necessary to have her membership in the PC(USA).

In recent communication with Ms. Thomas, she expressed her desire to share this news with both the CPM and the Presbytery of Detroit, conveying her gratitude to the congregations in which she has held membership in the POD: Westminster in Detroit, Faith Community in Novi, Northside in Ann Arbor, and Greenfield in Berkeley.

WE RESPONDED TO CHRIST'S CALL TO MISSION AND MINISTRY

Executive Presbyter's Report—Rev. Dr. Allen D. Timm (10)

Mr Timm lifted up ordination anniversaries for celebration: Young Chul Kim (10); Lawrence Glenn (60); Harry Capps (45); Richard Peters (45); Lawrence Cater (55); Lois Colon (30); J Scott Miller (30); Paul Thwaite (30); William Dunifon (45); Gus Nussdorder (45); John Jeffrey (50); Robert Crilley (55); David Krehbiel (55); David Owen (55).

He thanked COLA for all its efforts in preparing for the General Assembly. He noted the work of Shared Mission, and the folks who traveled to Thika Presbytery.

Harold Ellis resumed moderating the meeting.

The Moderator offered a prayer for openness.

Treasurer's Report. Timothy Ngare reported.

Mr Ngare asked for suggestions on what should be reported. His report is appended to the minutes. He wants to schedule a Presbytery-wide church treasurer's training. He is at the Presbytery office every Thursday from 10-1 for office hours.

Coordinating Cabinet. Judy Shipman reported for the Coordinating Cabinet.

Upon motion of the Coordinating Cabinet, Presbytery voted to:

1. Approve what is now Trustees Policy T-13 as a Presbytery policy as follows:

Volunteer Driver Guidelines

Voluntary Background and Driving Checks.

Volunteers who are working with children and adults will be asked to undergo criminal record checks and other appropriate screening before assignment(s). *Insurance Coverage.*

- Accident, liability and automobile insurance coverage are the responsibility of the volunteer.
- Insurance must be in effect and meet the minimum standards of the State of Michigan.
- You are encouraged to consult with your insurance agent regarding your personal insurance coverage relative to Presbytery related volunteer work. The volunteer should have the State of Michigan required minimum.
- It is a violation of Michigan automobile insurance regulations for an insurance company to raise your rates based on volunteer-related driving.

Additional requirements.

- All volunteer drivers must be at least twenty five (25) years of age.
- All volunteer drivers must undergo a driving license history check as part of the Presbytery criminal background check prior to serving as a volunteer driver for the Presbytery of Detroit.
- All volunteer drivers must have good driving records, with no record of careless, reckless, or alcohol-related violations on their driving record, and no more than 3 points within the last 2 years, and current proof of insurance. Any and all traffic violations are to be reported to the event leader.
- Any volunteer can drive unrelated children if his or her child is in the car.
- There must always be 2 adults in the vehicle with minors not related to the driver.
- Copies of the volunteer driver's insurance and license shall be given to the event leader.
- In the event of any moving violation or accident during the transport of any youth or adult to Presbytery sponsored events, the driver shall file a written report with a factual description of the incident to the Detroit Presbytery. The event leader shall file the report at the Presbytery office immediately following the event.
- 2. Delete current policy Presbytery P-16 and insert the following policy:

When the Presbytery desires to seek candidates for employment as members of the Presbytery staff, the following procedures shall be followed:

- There shall be attempts to locate and consider for employment persons without regard to race, sex, age, disability, or marital status;
- The selection process shall consider past patterns of discrimination on the basis of race, sex, age, or disability;
- Position descriptions shall be realistic and based upon job related qualifications and standards to ensure that the description does not contain qualifications or selection criteria based on race, sex, age, or disability.
- 3. Amend the 2014 Budget to add the following Extra Commitment Opportunities:

- Social Justice and Peacemaking: A Place of Refuge, Helping Hand Fund, Hunger Program, 2 Cents A Meal, Hagar's Fund (formerly Michigan Presbytery Black Charitable Org)
- Mission Interpretation: Campus Ministry, Ecumenical Theological Seminary, Habitat for Humanity, Hands-On Mission, Howell Nature Center, Month of Mission, Thika Partnership
- New Church Development: Far West NCD
- Barnabas Center
- Second Mile Center
- 4. Approve the amendment to the Sexual Misconduct Policy by adding the following provision to the acknowledgement of training and knowledge of the policy now signed by members, staff, inquires, candidates, and volunteers (amendment is underlined):

I agree to abide by the standards of the Presbytery of Detroit Sexual Misconduct Policy and Procedures as long as I remain a teaching elder, ministerial candidate or inquirer, employee, volunteer, or work in a position carrying out the programs of the Presbytery of Detroit.

I acknowledge that any amendments to this Sexual Misconduct Policy require approval of the Presbytery, and thus will appear in Presbytery papers before the meeting and will be in the minutes of that meeting. Those papers and minutes are posted on line on the Presbytery web site. Moreover, I acknowledge that this Sexual Misconduct Policy is included on the Policies and Procedures Manual, which is posted on the Presbytery web site. I accept that it is my responsibility to review all changes to the policy as they are posted, and that I will abide by the Sexual Misconduct Policy as amended subsequent to the date of my signature.

6. Approve the overture to the 221st General Assembly submitted by Presbyterian Woman as follows:

The Presbytery of Detroit petitions the 221st General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) to adopt the following resolution:

The 221st General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) advocates legislation to regulate ammunition and urges federal and state governments to enact such legislation. **Patienale**:

Rationale:

- In one year on average more than 100,000 people in America are shot in murders, assaults, suicides and suicide attempts, accidents, or by police intervention.*
 *Statistics from the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence
- 2. Nearly 3,000 children in the United States are killed by guns each year.

*Children's Defense Fund, "Protect Children, Not Guns, 2012 (Washington, D.C.)

3. In one given year guns murdered 17 people in Finland, 35 in Australia, 39 in England and Wales, 60 in Spain, 194 in Germany, 200 in Canada, and 9,484 in the United States.*

*Statistics from the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence

- 4. The gun murder rate in America is 20 times higher than any other developed country.
- 5. In December 2012 20 first graders and six of their teachers in an elementary school in Connecticut were killed by a crazed gunman with an assault rifle.
- 6. After the tragic shooting in Aurora, CO, Mayor Bloomberg of NYC lamented that showing sympathy to the victims is fine but what is needed in action to address the crisis.
- 7. Finally, President Obama has called for an action agenda to prevent further gun violence.
- 8. At this time legal and illegal gun owners can easily buy ammunition for those guns on line, at a superstore, or at a gun show.
- 9. The Justice and Peace Committee of the Presbyterian Women of Detroit in past polls of our membership found that gun violence was one of their top concerns.
- 10. In studying the issue, the Justice & Peace Committee believes that regulating Ammunition would prevent further gun violence. Not really banning bullets but making it a lot harder to get the ammunition to shoot those guns.
- 11. Ammunition would only be sold by licensed dealers and the buyer would have to show proof that he or she has had a background check.
- 12. This proposal does not take away the rights of what the National Rifle Association and gun owners say is their constitutional right to bear arms.*
 *Second amendment: "A well-regulated militia, being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to bear arms shall not be infringed."
- 13. Other countries with strong gun regulation laws don't have the mind-blowing statistics of people killed and wounded by guns as we do in America. We MUST assure peace and tranquility to the people of the United States of America.
- 14. This proposal has been approved by the Coordinating Team of the PWPD and the Social Justice and Peacemaking Committee of the Presbytery of Detroit.
- Concur with Overture 060 proposed by the Synod of the Covenant as follows: The Presbytery of Detroit concurs with Overture 060 On a Study of End of Life Issues submitted by the Synod of the Covenant to the 221st General Assembly. The Session of First Presbyterian Church, Birmingham, has also endorsed the overture. (The overture appended to the minutes.)

The Coordinating Cabinet reported the following for the information of Presbytery:

- 1. The Coordinating Cabinet and the Planning and Visioning Team are in process of incorporating more video into the Presbytery meeting. They are looking into how to have dockets, papers and such projected during the meeting, and relying on video presentation for many announcements.
- 2. In January, the Coordinating Cabinet had a retreat in which the question was posed about what Presbytery can do to help churches become more "missional." The Coordinating Cabinet continues to work on this issue.
- 3. The Coordinating Cabinet will not meet in June or July.

Trustees. Lou Prues reported for the Trustees.

Upon motion of the Trustees, Presbytery voted to:

 Approve the sale by Garden City Presbyterian Church of the property described as Located in the City of Wayne, County of Wayne, State of Michigan, to-wit: Lot 46, Jackson Heights Subdivision No.2 of part of the Northwest 1/4 of Section 34, Town 2 South, Range 9 East, City of Wayne, Wayne County, Michigan, more commonly known as 32921 Franklin Street, tax number 55-022-05-0046-000.

to Ronald Vanderbeek for \$35,000.00. No broker's commission is involved.

2. Appoint an Administrative Commission for Macomb Church of the Covenant.

Commission Powers:

Further Trustees ask Presbytery to assign the following responsibilities, authorities, and powers to the above Administrative Commission:

- 1. To consult with the session and members of the church to determine the will of the congregation about closing the church;
- 2. To consult with the various committees, teams, and personnel of the Presbytery to determine whether the Presbytery's strategic needs call for preserving a congregation in that area or starting a new church development in that area;
- 3. To advise the Committee on Ministry whether it believes it is in the best interests of Presbytery to transfer Mr Huff to the Evangelical Presbyterian Church;
- 4. To return to the Presbytery with recommendations about steps necessary to keep the congregation alive and viable, if the AC determines that there is sufficient interest in the congregation to continue in that presence and that, given the full facts and circumstances around its viability, as well as the plans and wishes of the teams and committees of the Presbytery, that it is in the Presbytery's interest not to close the church,;
- 5. To seek funding from the Trustees for up to \$25,000 before December 31, 2014 to cover costs and expenses for continuing the church;
- 6. To close the church if the AC determines that the congregation is unlikely to become a viable church in the near future and that there is no plan to continue the congregation in that location;
- 7. If the AC decides to close the church, it shall set the date for closing and:
 - a. Assist session and the congregation in planning its closing and celebrating its ministry;
 - b. Upon closing, take control of all property in the name of the Presbytery of Detroit, which includes all real and personal property, and all financial accounts;
 - c. Take all necessary steps to wind down and close the corporation;
 - d. Pay all outstanding obligations with the assets of the congregation;
 - e. In consultation and coordination with the Trustees, list the real property for sale, and, when appropriate, petition Presbytery for approval of the sale;
 - f. Sell the personal property of the church at fair prices, or to distribute it to other churches or organizations of the Presbytery of Detroit upon request;
 - g. Account for all the funds of the church, including bank accounts, stock holdings, endowments, or any other funds owned or controlled by the church, and deliver them to the Trustees of the Presbytery;

- h. Deliver the minutes and registers of the church to the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery;
- i. Create, sign, and file any legal documents necessary for the closing of the church.
- 8. To create a budget of \$10,000 for the work of this AC through the end of 2015, to be funded by the 200 Fund controlled by the Trustees.
- 9. To report to the Presbytery at least quarterly on the progress and status of its work.

Rationale:

- 1. The pastor of the Macomb Church of the Covenant has written a letter stating that the session of the Macomb Church of the Covenant has voted to request the church be closed after the worship service on June 1, 2014 by action of presbytery.
- 2. The Session of Macomb Church of the Covenant has called a congregational meeting for April 27, 2014 to vote on the dissolution of the pastoral relationship between it and Jason Huff effective after the worship service on June 1, 2014.
- 3. Mr. Huff has declared his intention to seek transfer to the Evangelical Presbyterian Church so he can accept a call to begin a new church development in the area.
- 3. Elect the following to the Macomb Covenant Administrative Commission:

Teaching Elder James Porter (Moderator) Teaching Elder Louis Prues

Ruling Elder Elizabeth Baergen

The Trustees reported the following for the information of Presbytery:

- 1. They have approved the renegotiation of the interest rates between PILP and Sterling Heights New Life.
- 2. The Trustees have approved the lease between the New Church Development Team and the Hispanic New Church Development for the former Southwest Church property.
- 3. The Trustees have set reserves to cover loans of \$56,847.
- 4. The Trustees have written off the loan made to Barnabas in the amount of \$20,424.73.
- 5. The Trustees have increased the line of credit for the Howell Center from \$100,000 to \$150,000. This line of credit is used to cover costs for those yearly cycles with low income, and are paid back in the year of use. The Trustees will charge interest for the amounts over \$100,000.
- 6. The Trustees are in discussions with the Howell Nature Center about its corporate status.
- 7. The Trustees thank those congregations who have paid their full 2013 *per capita*. They note that \$34,684.91 in *per capita* was not paid by congregations of the Presbytery. A small portion involved churches unable to pay. Most of it comes from churches that refuse to pay. The \$34,684.91 was paid from the general mission income (contributions for the work of the Presbytery) to the Presbytery.
- 8. The Trustees declined the request of Roseville Erin church to waive their *per capita* assessments.
- 9. The Trustees have voted to release Ranney-Balch funds requested by the Social Justice Team.

Committee on Ministry. Philip Reed reported for the Committee.

Upon motion of the Committee, Presbytery voted to:

1. Appoint an Administrative Commission to be placed in Fort Street Presbyterian Church, Detroit, to settle the disorder as per the Book of Order. The time frame would be 24 months that could be extended at the request of the Administrative Commission. The Administrative Commission should report back to Presbytery in a regular and timely fashion.

The Administrative Commission shall have the following duties and powers:

1. To call congregational meetings for appropriate purposes as necessary.

2. If, after a full investigation in which Session is afforded full opportunity to be heard, theAdministrative Commission determines that the Session cannot exercise its authority, or is unable or unwilling to manage wisely the affairs of the church, to assume original jurisdiction over any or all functions of the Session, pursuant to G-3.0303e. This shall include assuming control over any Session committee or task force.

3. If, after the pastor, Session, and congregation have been given notice and given full opportunity to be heard, it (the AC) determines that the church's mission under the word imperatively demands it, the Administrative Commission may recommend the dissolution of the pastoral relationship to Presbytery, pursuant to G-2.0904.

3. Elect the following to the Fortstreet AC

Beth Downs Dixie Elam Harold Ellis Jean Loup Lou Prues. Don Wright. Authorize the AC to select their own chair.

On a Study of End of Life Issues—From the Synod of the Covenant.

In view of the legalization of physician-assisted suicide in five states and several nations, and increases in the technological choices facing patients and their families in end-of-life circumstances, the Synod of the Covenant respectfully overtures the 221st General Assembly (2014) to:

1. direct the Advisory Committee on Social Witness Policy to convene a 7-8 person team of Presbyterian ethicists and physicians, including one or more drafters, to produce a pastoral and educational booklet giving guidance on:

a. Physician-assisted Suicide (PAS);

b. Palliative and terminal sedation, withholding/withdrawing nutrition and hydration and other endof-life treatments;

c. The role of medical professionals, hospital and hospice chaplains, hospital ethics committees and relevant medical regulation;

- d. Pastoral support of dying persons and their families;
- e. Special circumstances of dying children and the dying pregnant woman;
- f. Special circumstances of chronically and/or severely disabled persons in end-of-life planning and care;
 - g. Organ donation in relation to determinations of death and methods of prolonging body functions;
 - h. Talking with the faithful about end-of-life planning and advance directives;

i. Appropriate governmental and institutional policy recommendations to support the faithful exercise of Christian conscience on these matters.

2. recommend that this balanced study team meet primarily by video-phone and once in person, and that it consult with the Theology and Worship Office; be guided by prior General Assembly policy; examine any comparable denominational or ecumenical resources; test the booklet with experienced pastors and chaplains, hospital and hospice physicians and nurses; and report back to the 222nd General Assembly (2016);

3. recommend the booklet requested be printed for purchase and be posted on-line with updated templates of living wills, authorizations of durable powers of attorney for medical care, and references to relevant theological, ethical, and medical studies and resources for pastoral care;

4. recommend that copies of this booklet and any related policy recommendations be sent to appropriate regulatory and certifying bodies (including those for thanatology and Clinical Pastoral Education), and Presbyterian seminaries, colleges, and universities.

Rationale

The Brief Statement of Faith added to *The Book of Confessions* in 1991 echoes the Heidelberg Confession when it states, "In life and death we belong to God." A Presbyterian study document with that title was produced in 1995, following guidance from prior General Assemblies policies such as The Nature and Value of Human Life (PCUS, 1981) and The Covenant of Life and the Caring Community & Covenant and Creation (UPC, 1988). These documents stressed the relational, covenantal character of life before God which puts moral limits on the practice of medicine and provides a distinctive source of moral insight which conditions patient autonomy. Since these earlier reports, matters have become even more complex than they were, as scientific and technological developments have increased the capacity to prolong human life and laws have expanded the legal choices for those facing terminal illness.

In light of these new possibilities and the moral challenges they entail, Presbyterian witness to the covenantal character of human life in creation, sustenance, and redemption needs to be renewed and clarified. Presbyterian ethicists have written significant work since the 1990's, and some would be willing to contribute to a concise

consensus statement for the church, identifying theological concerns and Christian values at stake. This effort, as proposed, would depend primarily on their volunteer commitment and possible funds for a writer/editor's honorarium, a single meeting, and some printing, using existing staff for coordination. The plan for producing the report primarily in the form of a booklet is to enhance its usefulness to the church.

EQUALIZATION OF ELDER COMMISSIONERS PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT MAY, 2014-APRIL, 2015

The Book of Order requires the Presbytery to establish a plan to ensure there is parity at Presbytery meetings between teaching and ruling elders. The intention is to ensure that the number of ministers and elders is equal. G-3.0301

The Book of Order authorizes Presbyteries to assign certain representation according to the size of the church. By policy, the Presbytery of Detroit has given precedence to churches that have a majority of members who are an ethnic minority.

The number of ministers reported last year was 161. I report the number of active ministers this year as 166. I count the number of active ministers as those on the active roll who are resident in the area, plus those on the retired roll who are active in the life of Presbytery. I measured the latter by counting those retired ministers who are on a Presbytery committee, who have a position of some kind in a local congregation, or who attended a meeting last year.

The far-right column represents the number of commissioners a church should elect for the period May 1, 2014 to April 30, 2015. Commissioners should report this new figure to Session so the proper number will come to the June meeting.

The Presbytery of Detroit convened with prayer in a stated meeting at First Presbyterian Church, Ann Arbor on August 26, 2014 at 4:01 p.m. Harold Ellis moderated the meeting.

The Moderator declared the presence of a quorum.

The Moderator appointed Anna Cooke the Assistant to the Stated Clerk.

The Moderator welcomed new commissioners and teaching elders.

Upon motion of the Stated Clerk, Presbytery approved the docket as amended.

<u>Upon motion</u> of the Stated Clerk, Presbytery excused those who have requested to be excused.

Fairfax Fair welcomed Presbytery to Ann Arbor First.

Reports from Other Governing Bodies

COLA

Peter Smith reported for the Committee on Local Arrangements. He thanked the members of the Leadership Committee for their efforts and leadership, Presbytery, and the 1600 individuals who volunteered. Mr Timm thanked Mr Smith, and presented the commemorative plate given Presbytery by the Office of the General Assembly.

Synod Commissioners

Raphael Francis reported on the Synod meeting at Muskingum University on August 8 & 9.

Novi Outreach Reported on the campus ministry here. Presbyterian Campus Ministry at the UofM Fundraising breakfast.
Planning and Visioning Team Working group to begin thinking and dreaming about the future of the Presbytery.

Reports

Presbytery heard a report on activities of the Hands-on Mission Workgroup; the Food bank; Health festivals. Grant writing workshops; Calvin east; food collected at the General Assembly.

Coordinating Cabinet

The Coordinating Cabinet reported the following for the information of Presbytery:

- 1. The Coordinating Cabinet is continuing its study of "Holy Currencies," the book by Eric Law.
- The Coordinating Cabinet heard a report on the Month of Mission, which will be October. Four mission workers from the General Assembly will be her for the period September 27-October 5, and will be available for preaching. The Month of Mission Breakfast will be October 4 at Redford St James.
- 3. The Coordinating Cabinet heard from the Communications Workgroup on the use of the website, and trainings for it. It also reported its plans for projecting information during the Presbytery meetings.
- 4. The Coordinating Cabinet heard a report from the Stated Clerk on the fate of our 2 overtures to the General Assembly: the Presbyterian Women overture on the control of ammunition was eventually approved by the General Assembly and incorporated into a resolution with other gun violence measures; the *per capita* overture was defeated. Mr Koster reported he is looking at another means to accomplish our purpose.
- 5. The Coordinating Cabinet heard a report by the Stated Clerk on his article "This is not a drill," to be published in the Outlook. This will be heavily critical of the General Assembly vote to approve the authoritative interpretation to permit teaching elders to perform same-sex marriages. Mr Koster reported that the process was so alarming that it has motivated him to solicit support from sessions to file a remedial case against the Advisory Committee on the Constitution. Mr Koster reported he is doing neither in his capacity as Stated Clerk.
- 6. The Coordinating Cabinet approved a proposal that the Stated Clerk present a class *Palestine from the Beginning: The Land of Palestine in the Course of History.* The intention of the class is to provide a deep background in the history of Palestine, beginning with earliest references, so that people may a better understanding of what is happening there today. It was proposed to him as pastors discussed the divestment resolution by the General Assembly in June. The class will not discuss divestment *per se* until the very last class. The class was assigned to the Social Justice Team for sponsorship.

WE RESPONDED TO CHRIST'S CALL TO MISSION AND MINISTRY

Executive Presbyter's Report. Allen Timm reported.

Mr Timm celebrated ordination anniverseries: Thomas James (10), Jason Pittman (10), Sharon Mook (35), William Zambon (35), Allen Timm (40), Robert Agnew (45), Douglas Carter (50), Kevin Johnson (30), Breanne Ryan (5), and Paul Sutton (70). He noted that Carol Tate received her DMin from Austin Seminary. He thanked the office staff, and particularly Sandy Jensen for their assistance in hosting the General Assembly. He noted that the flooding caused damage to a number of churches, and asked for volunteers to assist in the cleanup. Hands-on Mission has been involved, and we have received a Presbyterian Disaster Assistance grant.

The Moderator offered a prayer for openness.

Vanderbeek Administrative Commission Lawrence Gage reported for the AC

Lawrence Gage presented the report of the Commission. (The report is appended to the minutes.) <u>Upon motion</u> of the AC, Presbytery voted to accept the report.

Trustees. Tom Neal reported for the Trustees.

<u>Upon motion</u> of the Trustees, Presbytery voted to:

- 1. Grant the Trustees authority to approve the sale of a parcel of the Ann Arbor Northside Church property at the appraised value.
- 2. Approve offerings at this at the next 2 meetings to contribute toward the burial expenses of those in the Wayne County Morgue for whom there are no funds available.

The Trustees reported the following for the information of Presbytery:

- 1. The Trustees have voted to renew the PILP certificate of deposit in the amount of \$200,000 for 12 months
- 2. The Trustees voted to release the automobile insurance refund for a vehicle they have covered with their own insurance to the 2nd Mile Center.
- 3. The Trustees voted to release the insurance check for a stolen vehicle to the 2^{nd} Mile Center.

- 2. I have received a letter from G. Patrick Thompson renouncing the jurisdiction of the church. He has been stricken from the roll pursuant to G-2.0509. It was effective upon receipt, 8/7/14.
- 3. I have received a complaint against a member of the Presbytery. The Moderator and I have appointed the following members to IC 2014-01:

- 4. Investigating Committee 2012-02 has reported it will not file charges.
- 5. At the April meeting, Presbytery approved an overture to the General Assembly that would request that the General Assembly advocate for limitations on the sale of ammunition. The General Assembly received the overture but has not accepted it for action because the required concurrence has not been received by the deadline. It was submitted as a commissioner's resolution, and approved by incorporation into a more comprehensive resolution on gun violence.

6. I report activities in which I am engaged. I do not do these things as Stated Clerk but as a private Presbyterian.

I was very distressed when the General Assembly approved the authoritative interpretation of W-4.9000 (which states that marriage is a civil contract between a man and a woman) to allow pastors to conduct same-sex marriage. I am not opposed to allowing pastors to conduct same-sex marriages, but I believe the process by which that was approved seriously damages the church. I wrote a letter to the Outlook before the GA adjourned from that session.

After the Assembly, I was approached by members of a church in the Presbytery asking what can be done about the AI. I advised that the only way would be by filing a remedial case against the Advisory Committee on the Constitution. When I reviewed the tapes of the GA session, I concluded that the process was so egregious a violation of our procedures that it needs to be corrected. I then decided to solicit a remedial case against the ACC, which I continue to do. I also wrote out my concerns as a way to persuade people and sessions to sign on. That writing eventually became an article "This is not a drill," which will be published by the Presbyterian Outlook.

- 9. Added Rev. Nancy Carle and Rev. Dr. Sue Ellis Melrose to the Pulpit Supply List.
- 10. Appointed Rev. Dr. Bill Davis to moderate the Session at Ft. Gratiot, effective September 1, 2014.
- 11. **Asked** Executive Presbyter Rev. Dr. Al Timm to **request** an exception from the Board of Pensions for one of our pastors to collect pension benefits while remaining in a current Interim Pastor position.

- **12.** An amended motion to raise the Minimum Cash Compensation (Salary, Housing Allowance, and Deferred Compensation) to \$43,000 failed.
- **13.** Following Presbytery's action on the 2015 Minimum Terms of Call at the August meeting, Credentials and Consultations will send a letter to each church's Session/Clerk outlining the changes and rationale used to make the decision.

THE PRESBYTERY OF DETROIT REPORT AND DECISION OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSION IN THE MATTER OF RONALD VANDERBEEK

I. Background

In October 2011, the Rev. Ronald Vanderbeek ("Vanderbeek") appeared before the Permanent Judicial Commission of the Presbytery of Detroit ("PPJC") and pled guilty to: 1) engaging in a sexual relationship with a person whose mental capacity may have been insufficient to give consent; and 2) engaging in a sexual relationship that misused his office. See Minutes of Presbytery of Detroit of October 25, 2011, PPJC Decision 2011-02 ("PJC Decision"). Before pleading guilty, Vanderbeek was reminded of the presumption of innocence in his favor, his right to a full trial, his right to counsel, his right to remain silent, and the fact that a plea may impair any appeal. *Id.* The PPJC accepted Vanderbeek's plea and entered an order that in relevant part stated that Vanderbeek was:

...temporarily excluded from ordered ministry for a period of (2) years, and subject to the following additional terms: 1) Approval for reapplication to ordered ministry in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) *shall be subject to the decision of the Committee on Ministry* and following the recommendation of a counselor approved by the Committee on Ministry and who shall render a full report to the Committee on Ministry regarding your fitness for ministry...

Id. (emphasis added).

In September 2013, Vanderbeek applied for reinstatement to ordered ministry with the Committee on Ministry ("the COM"). By letter dated October 16, 2013, the COM informed Vanderbeek that his application had "...been discussed at length during the COM meetings for the last two months", but it was the decision of the COM that his application be denied.

On October 26, 2013, Vanderbeek appealed the decision of the COM on his application for reinstatement to the Presbytery.

On January 28, 2014, the Presbytery created this Administrative Commission ("AC") for the purpose of hearing Vanderbeek's appeal from the decision of the COM, and it granted to the AC the following responsibilities and authorities:

1) It shall review the case decided by the Permanent Judicial Commission.

2) It shall review the behavior of Ronald Vanderbeek while under suspension.

3) It shall inquire of the Committee on Ministry the reasons it declined to restore Mr. Vanderbeek.

4) It shall grant Mr. Vanderbeek all rights of fundamental fairness afforded in administrative hearings. These rights shall include at least:

a) Informing Mr. Vanderbeek of all the issues that he must address.

b) Giving Mr. Vanderbeek time and opportunity to respond to the issues.

5) Determining on behalf of the Presbytery of Detroit whether he shall be restored to the ordered ministry of teaching elder, and if not to be restored at this time, to set criteria and procedures for his restoration within one year. This shall include the body that shall supervise his compliance, and the consequences of his failure to satisfactorily complete the requirements. One of the consequences of his failure after one year to satisfy the requirements as reported by the supervising body may be that he will be declared to have renounced the jurisdiction of this church pursuant to G-2.0509.

6) Reporting its decision to Presbytery at the next meeting.

In furtherance of its responsibilities, the AC held two informal organizational meetings to review the decision of the PJC, certain email correspondence, and notes relevant to Vanderbeek's suspension. A formal hearing held July 19, 2014 followed the two informal meetings. By letter dated May 7, 2014, the AC informed Vanderbeek and the COM that they were invited to attend the July 19th hearing and address the following issues:

1) The factual and legal reasons that form the basis for Rev. Vanderbeek's application to be reinstated to ordered ministry dated October 26, 2013;

2) The factual and legal reasons Rev. Vanderbeek contends the Committee on Ministry erred when it refused to restate him to active ministry;

3) The factual and legal reasons the Committee on Ministry declined to reinstate Rev. Vanderbeek.

4) Whether Rev. Vanderbeek has fully complied with the Decision and Order dated October 10, 2011, in Presbytery of Detroit v. Rev. Ronald Vanderbeek, PPJC 2011-02, including, but not limited to, the question of whether Rev. Vanderbeek obtained the recommendation of a counselor approved by the Committee on Ministry;

5) The relevance, if any, of the subsequent and related lawsuit in the civil courts, including, but not limited to, the fact that the case was dismissed without prejudice and could be refiled on or before October 26, 2014.

6) The impact any reinstatement of Rev. Vanderbeek could have on the members of Garden City Presbyterian Church, the Presbytery of Detroit, and/or the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.);

7) The responsibilities and authorities of this Commission;

8) Such other issues that Rev. Vanderbeek and/or the Committee on Ministry consider relevant to this matter, including any issues or disputes concerning procedure and the fundamental fairness of the Committee's decision or this hearing;

9) If Rev. Vanderbeek is not be to reinstated, the appropriate criteria for the reinstatement of Rev. Vanderbeek; and

10) The reason(s) Rev. Vanderbeek pled guilty in Presbytery of Detroit v. Rev. Ronald Vanderbeek.

Vanderbeek and representatives of the COM attended the July 19th hearing and were given the opportunity to object to any facet of that hearing and/or the responsibilities and authorities of the AC. Neither party raised any objection. Vanderbeek and his representatives, and the representatives of the COM, were then each given 30 minutes to speak. This was followed by time for questions by the AC, and an opportunity for closing statements. A representative of the Garden City congregation was also questioned by the AC in closed session concerning the possible effect that the reinstatement of Vanderbeek could have on life and health of that congregation.

II. Decision of the Administrative Commission

Our Book of Order is clear that "[t]he council that imposed the censure shall approve the restoration when the time of exclusion has expired or when the council is *fully satisfied* that the supervised rehabilitation pronounced has been completed". See D-12.0104h (*emphasis added*). The COM was not fully satisfied with Vanderbeek's rehabilitation and so it denied his application for reinstatement. The AC is also not fully satisfied with Vanderbeek's rehabilitation. Therefore, the decision of the COM to deny the application of Vanderbeek for reinstatement is **SUSTAINED**. However, Vanderbeek shall be automatically reinstated subject to the completion of the following criteria and procedures.

A. <u>Rationale and Conclusions</u>

Vanderbeek was excluded from ordered ministry for a period of (2) years and subject to other conditions, but during the hearing he admitted that he did not comply with the terms of that exclusion. The Book of Order is clear that "[d]uring the period of temporary exclusion from ordered ministry, the person found guilty shall refrain from the exercise of any function of ordered ministry." *See* D-12.0104d. Vanderbeek conceded at the July 19th hearing that preaching of the Word was a function of ordered ministry. He also conceded that he preached a number of sermons in a church of another denomination. And, for this reason alone the COM was on solid ground in not accepting Vanderbeek's application for reinstatement at the time it was submitted. Other factors, such as questions concerning the adequacy of Vanderbeek's counseling, his engagement with the COM, and his reliance on his own (often incorrect) assumptions concerning his status, also lend considerable support our decision.

Having found that Vanderbeek should not be reinstated at this time, the AC is required to set criteria and procedures for his restoration. The criteria must identify the body that shall supervise his compliance, and the consequences of his failure to satisfactorily complete the requirements. To that end, the AC **ORDERS** the following:

1) It is the decision of the AC that the body that will supervise Vanderbeek's compliance shall be the COM.

2) The AC sets the following criteria for Vanderbeek's reinstatement:

2A) Vanderbeek shall provide to the COM a written statement of remorse for his conduct that is acceptable to the COM and that demonstrates recognition by Vanderbeek of the significant pain and injury his actions inflicted on the Garden City congregation. The COM shall insure that the statement is distributed to the Garden City congregation and other parties that the COM thinks appropriate.

Even if the AC assumed that the sexual conduct that resulted in the PPJC decision was normal, and the actions of two healthy adults, that assumption would be completely irrelevant. Our denomination, and indeed our Presbytery, has drawn a very bright line on the issue of sexual contact (even dating) involving a Pastor and a member of that Pastor's congregation. Indeed, it's not just a bright line, it's a bright line with flashing lights and a flag. It is not enough for Vanderbeek to apologize to the PPJC, the COM or even the AC for "having to meet" or for having to go to "all this trouble". The remorse that needs to be acknowledged and understood by Vanderbeek is that the conduct to which he plead guilty is simply not tolerated by this Presbytery or this denomination. Yes, 20 year ago this matter would probably have been handled differently. But this is not 20 years ago. One reason conduct such as we have in this case is not tolerated is because it always results a real rift and substantive hurt in the affected congregation. Once created, such congregational rifts can take decades to heal even under the best of circumstances. Vanderbeek must acknowledge that fact, and also convince the COM (via his written statement) that he understands the harm he has caused to others through his actions. THE FAILURE OF VANDERBEEK TO ISSUE THE REQUIRED STATEMENT WITHIN ONE YEAR OF THE DATE OF THIS REPORT SHALL BE DEEMED A RENUNCIATION BY HIM OF THE JURISDICTION OF THIS CHURCH PURSUANT TO G-2.0509.

2B) Vanderbeek shall continue to refrain from the exercise of any function of ordered ministry until such time as he is reinstated. As interpreted by the AC, the term "ordered ministry" includes the administration of the Sacraments, the preaching of the Word, and serving the governing bodies of the church. Vanderbeek also may not take part in the meetings of Presbytery (except on issues that directly concern him personally), vote, hold office, or serve on any Presbytery committees. As interpreted by the AC, the term "ordered ministry" does not include teaching Sunday school, participation in prayer groups, or playing the organ or other instruments in worship. This restriction extends not only to the churches of our denomination, but also to ALL churches of any denomination. THE FAILURE OF VANDERBEEK TO ABIDE BY THESE RESTRICTIONS FOR ANY REASON PRIOR TO BEING REINSTATE SHALL BE DEEMED A RENUNCIATION OF THE JURISDICTION OF THIS CHURCH PURSUANT TO G-2.0509.

2C) Vanderbeek and the COM shall jointly develop a plan to ensure that Vanderbeek does not repeat his offenses. In developing this plan, the COM may not use the development process as a means to an end to prevent the reinstatement of Vanderbeek. The censure imposed in this matter was one of temporary exclusion. The AC concludes that Vanderbeek has met the requirement of the PPJC to provide a counselor report concerning his fitness for ministry. Therefore, the plan should focus on behavioral goals and other steps to be taken by Vanderbeek to ensure that his reinstatement does not result in a repeat offense and that the COM is otherwise fully satisfied in this fitness. Further, while that plan must be a joint work of Vanderbeek and the COM, the responsibility for ensuring that it is developed, and that it meets with the COM is approval, is entirely on Vanderbeek – he must be the driver of the discussion (but the COM may not respond by dragging it's collective feet). IF A PLAN IS NOT DEVELOPED, AND APPROVED, BY THE COM WITHIN ONE YEAR OF THIS REPORT THAT FAILURE SHALL BE DEEMED A RENUNCIATION BY VANDERBEEK OF THE JURISDICTION OF THIS CHURCH PURSUANT TO G-2.0509.

Finally, the AC reminds both Vanderbeek and the COM that the details of any plan should be clearly spelled out. A significant problem that arose in this matter was that both Vanderbeek and the COM made numerous assumptions about what a certain term meant, or whether certain facts were or were not correct. Any plan must be devoid of such assumptions. The AC shall appoint an arbiter in this matter for the purpose of deciding whether, in the case of dispute, the propose plan, or a particular provision of that plan is, or is not, clear or fair. The arbiter's compensation, if any, is to be paid by the COM. The AC retains jurisdiction of this matter for the purpose of hearing further disputes. However, the parties are on notice that an arbiter's decisions will only be overruled on a showing of clear error – an exceptionally very high standard of review.

Summary Report The Erin Presbyterian Church Administrative Commission August 26, 2014

The Committee on Ministry having inquired into the work of Erin Presbyterian Church upon being invited into the church by the Session, found problems regarding finances, specific ministries, significant loss of membership, inability to function fully within the parameters of the Book of Order, and disaffection with the Pastor. It therefore recommended to the Presbytery the formation of an Administrative Commission.

On April 27, 2013, pursuant with G-3.0108 and G-3.0109 of the Book of Order, the Presbytery approved its formation for the purpose of conducting an administrative review of the Erin Presbyterian Church's:

- Ministry and mission;
- Its financial affairs; and

• Addressing difficulties and discord within the congregation, the session, and with its pastor. In this regard the Administrative Commission was accorded the following authority:

- To call congregational meetings for appropriate purposes as it finds necessary;
- To assume any or all powers and authorities of session under G-3.02 it deems necessary.

Proceedings of the Erin Presbyterian Church Administrative Commission

The commission assumed its responsibilities on May 23, 2013 with an orientation to its task conducted by Elder Dixie Elam, Committee on Ministry (COM) Chairperson and Rev. Edward Koster, Stated Clerk of the Presbytery. It soon determined that the difficulties described in a 2009 Healthy Congregations Work Group evaluation regarding the congregation-pastoral relations, finances, membership reduction, and impediments to lay leadership had deteriorated significantly. Although recommended in the report, the AC found no evidence that COM provided follow-up or assistance to the congregation to address these concerns.

1. Congregation-Pastoral Relations.

The perception that leadership in the church was Pastor-centered had persisted along with an absence of pastoral availability to the congregation both physically and emotionally. This seemed further strained by the pastor's reduction to part-time status in 2010 due to church financial deficits.

A central concern was also the initiation of a program called "Erin's Feeding the Need" (FTN) that was invited to the church by the Pastor in January 2012. It operated for six months without Session approval. The program created significantly increased utility costs, produced modification of facilities, paid no rental fees, and had no insurance to protect the church from liability. In addition, the Pastor had opened a bank account for FTN using the church's tax identification number without the knowledge or permission of the Session. Tension also existed because members of the congregation expressed concern about the unsupervised/unregulated use of the property by some of the clients as well as some suspected levels of substance abuse by them. Many on the Session and in the congregation were conflicted over FTN because they felt called to serve the hungry. However, the ill-will created by the actions of the FTN leadership and the Pastor proved insurmountable to enable the program to continue.

Commission Actions: Congregation-Pastoral Relations

- On May 28, 2013 the commission initiated steps to facilitate the request of the Pastor to resign and dissolve the pastoral relationship with Erin Presbyterian Church.
- A congregational meeting moderated by the commission June 10, 2013 resulted in unanimous approval by written ballot of the pastoral dissolution and severance agreement
- The commission facilitated arrangements for the Session to consider candidates and on August 15 the Rev. Don Wright was selected to be the Temporary Supply Pastor effective September 2013.
- Following investigation of the FTN program and consultation with the Session and the Rev. Don Wright, the AC assumed original jurisdiction of the building, voting to remove FTN from the church by September 22, 2014.
- A congregational meeting was held after worship on August 25 to inform the congregation of recent commission activities concerning:
 - Termination of the FTN program
 - Importance of the pastoral leadership of Rev. Don Wright
 - Plans to assist the Session with 2013 programs and activities
 - Provide resources for detailed analysis of church finances
 - Plan listening sessions with the congregation

2. Church Financial Situation

An assessment of the financial status of Erin Presbyterian Church began May 30, 2013 and it was immediately apparent that there were problems with record-keeping and accountability. Rental arrangements existed with outside groups with sketchy evidence of formal contracts and payments. The prior year's session minutes indicated a consistent pattern of monthly deficits and reduction of the church's diminishing reserves to offset reduced income. The annual report for 2012- 2013 indicated a deficit of \$29,275. The fall 2013 stewardship effort produced 32 pledges totaling \$47,096 with a proposed budget for 2014 of \$94,376. By December 2014 the church's total remaining reserves are projected to be \$3,317.81.

Commission Actions: Church Finances

- Dissolution of FTN and its resultant drain on church resources was completed.
- Consultation with a Certified Public Accountant occurred to assess inadequacies in the church's financial documentation.
- An ongoing dialogue with the Personnel and Finance Committee was initiated to address improvements in the financial reporting process.
- Sample rental contracts were provided to the Session to facilitate proper rental use guidelines, fees, and insurance guidelines.

- Recommendations were made to include regular reporting of the financial crisis in the worship bulletin and other church publications to raise awareness of the congregation.
- The consideration of adjustments in personnel costs were proposed to reduce monthly expenses.
- The imperative of a stewardship campaign was emphasized that stressed the immediacy of the church's financial crisis.
- A presence by commission members was initiated at Session meetings, fundraising efforts, and worship to demonstrate commitment to assist and support the church.
- Discussion of alternatives were suggested to the Session should projected deficits finally exhaust the church's ability to continue operating.
- Information meetings were held with the congregation to dispel rumors that the Presbytery intended to close Erin Presbyterian Church and sell its property or that the Presbytery would provide financial resources to alleviate the financial crisis.

3. Ministry and Mission of the Church

The appointment of Rev. Don Wright in September 2013 as the part-time Temporary Supply Pastor produced an immediate revitalization of the spiritual life at Erin Presbyterian Church. Attendance at worship began to increase and his leadership as Moderator of the Session in the ensuing months resulted in increasing the Session from five to its full complement of nine Elders and the Board of Deacons from two members to eight.

The lay leadership, previously limited by the absence of pastoral support, began to demonstrate active involvement in the life of the church as membership has declined. A forty percent membership loss in the prior five years had resulted in a membership of 104 active members in December 2013 which included the addition of eight new members.

Commission Actions: Ministry and Mission of the Church

- Members of the commission made an effort to attend as many Session meetings and events in the life of the church as possible.
- Frequent dialogue was maintained with the Pastor, the chairs of committees, and at every opportunity with members of the congregation.
- The commission requested and received copies of all written communication distributed by the church Administrative Secretary and all Session documents.
- A listening session with the congregation was held following worship October 21, 2013
 - A written survey was distributed to collect demographic information and responses to why each participated in the life of the church, what the strengths of the congregation were, what concerns they had about the church, and three wishes for its future

o Breakout sessions were then conducted to discuss the last three survey items

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- o A summary of the result was shared with the Session and Temporary Supply Pastor
- The commission emphasized to the Session that the congregation still seems to struggle with the reality of what the future holds, that it has a diminishing and aging membership, that the area demographic is not conducive to church growth, and that the financial burden appears insurmountable.

In the past year the Administrative Commission has had the privilege of sharing the concerns and hopes of the Erin Presbyterian Church family. It is clear that from the dedication of its current pastoral and resurgent lay leadership and the spirituality of the congregation that it is indeed the Body of Christ. It is also however a community of faith that struggles to accept the reality of the dire circumstances that now confront it after its more than one hundred and fifty years of dedication to doing God's work.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. The Session should immediately consider having a retreat, preferably off-site, to identify various options should maintaining the church property no longer be possible. The Committee on Ministry should be requested to provide a facilitator to assist in these deliberations.

2. Consultation by the Session with a representative of the Presbytery Trustees and/or the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery should occur to understand the legalities involved in the disposition of church assets should it become necessary.

3. The Session should begin discussions with the congregation to share the available options if there continues to be depletion of the church's financial resources if they wish to continue as a vibrant congregation.

4. It is imperative that the congregation be assisted to understand that all church property in the Presbytery of Detroit is held in trust by the Presbytery and its disposition requires Presbytery permission. In addition, the Presbytery has no resources available to alleviate the church's financial challenges.

5. In preparation for the conclusion of the contract of the Temporary Supply Pastor at the end of December 2014, the Session needs to determine what resources might exist to support present or future Temporary Supply Pastors, Commissioned Ruling Elders, or other forms of pastoral leadership.

6. The congregation must be assisted to understand that its spiritual life as the Body of Christ is not dependent upon its building and property and to explore the options to continue to be a church family in another setting.

7. The Committee on Ministry and the Presbytery Trustees should provide continuing oversight and mentoring of the Erin church during the next twelve months (August 2014 to August 2015).

8. The Session needs to continue to give hope to the congregation to be a vibrant faith community, whether it be in its present location or in some other location or ministry form.

9. That the administrative commission for Erin Church be discharged.

ADDITION TO THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSION REPORT For the Presbytery Meeting on August 26, 2014

On June 2, 2014, the Erin Presbyterian Church Administrative Commission (AC) recommended to the Committee on Ministry that Rev. G. Patrick Thompson not be allowed the privilege of serving in any positions of ordered ministry. This included positions of pulpit supply, eligibility for assignment to temporary pastoral appointments, or any other positions as a teaching elder. The Administrative Commission made this recommendation because we saw and heard credible evidence that gave us reasonable cause to believe that during his tenure Rev. Thompson engaged in conduct that was severely damaging to individuals and the congregational life of Erin Presbyterian Church.

This recommendation and its reasons were also sent to Rev. Patrick Thompson. The Committee On Ministry (COM) told Rev. Thompson that they concurred with the recommendation of the Erin AC. Rev. Thompson would not be allowed the privilege of serving in any position of ordered ministry in the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. The Stated Clerk and representatives of the COM met with Rev. Thompson and told him of his rights and his options.

The Erin Administrative Commission also sent a full set of allegations to the office of the Stated Clerk; whereby the Stated Clerk proceeded to appoint an investigating committee.

On August 7, 2014 the Stated Clerk received a letter from Rev. Thompson renouncing the jurisdiction of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. On that day Rev. Thompson was removed from the rolls of the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. effective immediately.

Administrative Commission Church of the Covenant Status Report to Presbytery of Detroit July 31, 2014

This is the first report of the Administrative Commission on Church of the Covenant concerning its activities. The report is laid out with responses in order of the elements of the charge to the AC:

1. To consult with the session and members of the church to determine the will of the congregation about closing the church:

<u>Status</u>: The AC met with the Session of Church of the Covenant ("COTC") and various members of COTC on May 13, 2014 to determine the will of the congregation about closing the church. Congregational members were also invited to attend after the Session meeting to speak with the AC. It was clear to the AC that the Session and church members were resolved on closing the church and moving to other worshipping bodies. No one indicated a desire to continue the church as P.C.(U.S.A.) congregation in that location.

2. To consult with the various committees, teams, and personnel of the Presbytery to determine whether the Presbytery's strategic needs call for preserving a congregation in that area or starting a new church development in that area:

<u>Status:</u> The AC consulted with the chair of the New Church Development Ministry Team, the Executive Presbyter of the Presbytery of Detroit, the pastors of First Church, Mt. Clemens, and St. Thomas Church (Shelby Township), and the former pastors of First Church, Mt. Clemens. No strategic need or plan for preserving a congregation at that location or in that area was revealed.

3. To advise the Committee on Ministry whether it believes it is in the best interests of Presbytery to transfer Mr Huff to the Evangelical Presbyterian Church:

<u>Status:</u>: The AC met with Jason Huff, former pastor of COTC, and Jason indicated that he now felt called to begin a New Church Development with the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. He has already begun that process with the EPC. The AC advised the Committee on Ministry that it believes it is in the best interest of POD to transfer Rev. Huff to EPC.

4. To return to the Presbytery with recommendations about steps necessary to keep the congregation alive and viable, if the AC determines that there is sufficient interest in the congregation to continue in that presence and that, given the full facts and circumstances around its viability, as well as the plans and wishes of the teams and committees of the Presbytery, that it is in the Presbytery's interest not to close the church:

<u>Status</u>: The AC has determined that there is not interest in keeping this congregation given the location and the closeness of Mt. Clemens First to the East, St. Thomas (Shelby Township) to the West, and New Life Church (Utica/Clinton Twp.) to the South. Various COTC church members stated that the current location was not conducive to church growth.

5. To seek funding from the Trustees for up to \$25,000 before December 31, 2014 to cover costs and expenses for continuing the church:

<u>Status</u>: The church is not continuing so the AC has not sought additional funding to continue the church.

6. To close the church if the AC determines that the congregation is unlikely to become a viable church in the near future and that there is no plan to continue the congregation in that location:

<u>Status</u>: The AC found no desire in the members of COTC to continue the church, and found no strategic plan or desire in the Presbytery to continue a congregation in this location.

7. If the AC decides to close the church, it shall set the date for closing:

<u>Status</u>: The AC concurred with COTC in closing the church. COTC set the final worship date as June 1, 2014.

a. Assist session and the congregation in planning its closing and celebrating its ministry:

<u>Status</u>: The last Sunday of worship was June 1, 2014. Rev. Jim Porter, as chair of the AC, forwarded a letter expressing regret over the closing of the church, but also celebrating the years of ministry to the congregation to be read at the closing worship.

b. Upon closing, take control of all property in the name of the Presbytery of Detroit, which includes all real and personal property, and all financial accounts:

Status: The AC has received keys to the property, has re-keyed the exterior doors of the property, and has received the financial accounts of COTC.

c. Take all necessary steps to wind down and close the corporation:

Status: In progress.

d. Pay all outstanding obligations with the assets of the congregation:

Status: In progress.

e. In consultation and coordination with the Trustees, list the real property for sale, and, when appropriate, petition Presbytery for approval of the sale;

- a. <u>Status</u>: In progress. The AC is recommending to Trustees that the real property be listed for sale as soon as the commissioned appraisal is received (estimated date for the appraisal is 6/17/14), and will petition Presbytery for approval of the sale when appropriate.
- f. Sell the personal property of the church at fair prices, or to distribute it to other churches or organizations of the Presbytery of Detroit upon request;

Status: In progress.

g. Account for all the funds of the church, including bank accounts, stock holdings, endowments, or any other funds owned or controlled by the church, and deliver them to the Trustees of the Presbytery;

Status: In progress.

h. Deliver the minutes and registers of the church to the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery;

Status: In progress.

i. Create, sign, and file any legal documents necessary for the closing of the church.

Status: In progress.

8. To create a budget of \$10,000 for the work of this AC through the end of 2015, to be funded by the 200 Fund controlled by the Trustees.

Status: In progress.

9. To report to the Presbytery at least quarterly on the progress and status of its work.

Status: This is the first such report.

Final Report of the Gratiot Avenue Administrative Commission October 25, 2014

On August 26, 2008, the Presbytery of Detroit voted to form an Administrative Commission for Gratiot Avenue Presbyterian Church with the following purpose:

" to ensure that the pastor is paid, that payments are made in a timely manner to the Board of Pensions, and that all church finances are properly supervised and accounted for. To this end, the Administrative Commission shall have the following powers:

- To inquire into and assume control, if necessary, over any or all financial, trust, or other accounts held by or for the benefit of the church;
- · If the Commission deems it necessary, to assume all or any powers of Session;
- To make recommendation to Presbytery as to future viability of ministry in the Gratiot Avenue area."

Members of the Gratiot Avenue Administrative Commission included Kenneth Hollowell, Chair, Marva Banks, Doug Blaikie, Stefanie Lewis, Dan Michalek, Teresa Peterson, and Paul Winslow. Teresa Peterson subsequently relocated out of the jurisdiction of the Detroit Presbytery, and was replaced by James Chambers. Doug Blaikie resigned and was replaced by Fran Hayes.

Upon its first meeting with the Gratiot Avenue Session (Session), the Administrative Commission (AC) determined that the Session was not whole or functional. Of the 9 members, only 3 were in active terms. The terms of the rest had expired, one Session member had relocated out of state, and one had resigned. There was no clerk of Session. In addition, the church had no active nominating committee. There was a commitment to have a whole Session with appropriate training by January.

The AC also requested church financial records and accounts. The Session was unable or unwilling to provide this information. The AC learned of at least 3 accounts: an operating account, a separate account established to manage a Transformation grant obtained from PCUSA, and a trust account established based on the will of a member. The current treasurer only had access to the accounts and records since his acceptance of this position. The AC scheduled several meetings with the past treasurer to ensure transfer of the signatures on these and any other church accounts to jurisdiction of the Session, and to learn about any past due billings for church operating expenses, pastor's salary, pastor's pension, and pastor's housing.

The past treasurer was unwilling or unable to provide financial records of the church to the AC. The past treasurer refused to provide copies of the will establishing the trust fund and a complete accounting of the monies in that fund. Through its own research, the AC determined the will was filed and probated in the state of Indiana, and obtained the necessary documentation to obtain a copy of said will. In addition, based on the lack of cooperation of the past treasurer, on August 24, 2009, the AC assumed limited power of the Session and filed a motion in probate court to freeze all monies in the trust fund until such accounting has been provided. Upon execution of this motion, the signatories for the trust account were transferred to the chair and secretary of the AC. The past treasurer responded and appealed several times to the court, but did not provide an acceptable accounting of funds. These actions added an additional 3 months to the resolution of the motion.

In addition, the pastor had not been paid for a disputed amount of time, her health insurance had been cancelled, and pension had been suspended as of April 2009. Discrepancies revolved around the, amount owed the Board of Pensions; the amount owed the pastor in salary, benefits, and housing; and the execution of a Transformation grant from PCUSA. Under PCUSA, such a grant requires the call of

a full-time pastor. The grant also assumes that over time, the church begins to grow in such a way that it can gradually assume the costs associated with a healthy church. Therefore, the transformation grant is distributed in reduced amounts until the grant is exhausted. Gratiot Avenue was unable to incur growth sufficient to subsidize the financial requirements of this grant, including the cost of a full-time pastor, and the grant eventually depleted without funds being available to fulfill its commitment. The fact that the grant was held in a separate account with insufficient reporting to the Session or the PCUSA contributed to growing conflict between the pastor and the Session. The Session made repeated requests to the Board of Trustees of the Detroit Presbytery for assistance in meeting its operational obligations. The Board of Trustees had "loaned" the church some funds, but ultimately refused to provide any more.

On August 2009, the Session voted to dissolve the relationship with the pastor because of the inability of the church to support a full-time pastor. The Session approached the Committee on Ministry to assist in this effort. The Committee on Ministry (COM) appointed 2 people to negotiate the severance terms between the pastor and the Session. The negotiations failed.

At the November 2009 Presbytery meeting, 2 pastors were approved to co-moderate a congregational meeting with the Gratiot congregation to vote on the dissolution of the call. In preparation for this meeting, after becoming aware of possible agenda items deemed inappropriate for the congregational meeting, the AC assumed limited power of the Session to set the agenda for this meeting, and limit the agenda to the question of dissolution of the call and termination date without a vote on the terms of separation, as no terms had been agreed to by both parties.

On November 27, 2009, the congregation of Gratiot Avenue Church voted to dissolve the relationship between its pastor and the church, effective November 30, 2009, with terms of separation to be negotiated and presented to the congregation at a later date. Several procedural irregularities were raised from this meeting, which were submitted to the Stated Clerk for action, but which did not follow the process for addressing these types of concerns. No remedial case was filed. On December 1, a moderator was appointed for the Gratiot Avenue Session.

The Gratiot Session and pastor agreed to mediation, with the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery as a certified mediator, who performed this task gratis. The mediation failed.

In March 2010, the pastor filed a breach of contract and defamation of character suit against Gratiot Presbyterian Church. Depositions included officers of the Presbytery, COM, and AC members. The court required the Session and pastor to participate in mediation, the mediators being court-appointed, in an effort to resolve the dispute. All parties did not participate in the mediation, and the proposal brought forth by the mediation team was rejected. As a result, the court appointed a receiver to identify all assets of Gratiot Avenue Presbyterian Church and determine appropriate settlement for the suit. Attorney for the Presbytery of Detroit then submitted rationale for rescinding the appointment of a receiver and limiting the information and assets over which he had jurisdiction. In addition, since the filing of the suit, the pastor incurred several illnesses, resulting in medical bills (since there was no health insurance).

Prior to the appointment of the receiver, the lawyer for the Session terminated his involvement due to lack of payment. The Session then retained another counsel, who agreed to work to settle the suit.

The receiver facilitated a partial settlement between the Session, pastor, and Board of Pensions, and held conferences with the Session, pastor, and the judge, but wanted the settlement to include compensation for his appointment as receiver.

The trust fund under Probate control plus the operating accounts of the church were insufficient to cover all of the mounting costs and settlement proposals.

Finally, in March 2012, a settlement was reached and filed with the Circuit Court ending the breach of contract suit against Gratiot Avenue Presbyterian Church. This agreement specified the order in which funds were to be distributed. Upon execution of this settlement, the AC requested dispersion of funds of the trust fund from Probate Court. The hearing and dispersion approval was obtained June 21, 2012. The following summary shows the beginning balance, disbursements, and final balance to Gratiot Avenue Presbyterian Church.

In addition, as part of the settlement, all parties (Session, past treasurer, pastor, Presbytery, AC, Receiver) agreed that no further legal action would be taken related to this case.

Learnings

In retrospect, there were situations and actions that contributed to the formation of the Administrative Commission and subsequent actions leading to resolutions of the concerns being addressed.

Gratiot Avenue

- The Session was neither whole nor functional.
- The Session was not trained in nor followed Presbytery polity
- The Session was not accountable for or completely knowledgeable in the financial documentation and/or status of Gratiot Avenue Church

Pastor

- There was confusion as to the responsibilities between the Session and the pastor regarding:
 - Registration of the pastor with the Board of Pensions
 - o Status reporting for the PCUSA's Transformational Grant
 - Failure to report pastor payment concerns to COM in a timely manner
- The pastor did not ensure proper training for the Session
- The pastor did not ensure proper and timely election of church officers and/or appointment of treasurer and other staff by Session.
- The pastor could not or had difficulty producing documentation in support of her financial claims against Gratiot Avenue Church.

Committee on Ministry

- The COM did not follow its policy #1 concerning the process for negotiating the Dissolution of Relations between the pastor and congregation that was in effect during the period of this dispute.
- The COM did not follow its policy # 6 regarding the Guarantee of Pension Dues. This policy was
 deleted in 2010.

Administrative Commission

- The Administrative Commission was not well trained or experienced in processes surrounding the carrying out of its charges.
- The approach that the Administrative Commission followed was to work with the Session and pastor as much as possible rather than dictate edicts or assume full and complete powers of the Session. The intent was to guide the parties to mutual conclusions and only assume powers when it was absolutely necessary to move forward toward resolution. The concern was that the congregation would reject any solution for dissolution that was not supported by the Session. While this approach probably elongated the proceedings, we believe it to be a fair and pastoral approach to resolution of problems. The AC probably underestimated the depth of dissention between the parties and their lack of understanding of the role of Presbytery in these matters.

Concerning the Viability of Gratiot Avenue Presbyterian Church

After the settlement of the legal actions, members of the AC paid unannounced visits to Gratiot Avenue Church on two separate occasions. The AC also met with the Session and its moderator to understand the culture of the church and whether progress has been made in governance, finance, and ministry.

Gratiot Avenue had engaged the services of a regular pulpit supply pastor, who presided over the services we attended. Although the attendance was small at these services, we understand that it was a great improvement over the attendance during the times of unrest. Everyone was made to feel warm and welcome. The congregation was receptive to the message delivered, and we felt a strong sense of love and faith. We all joined hands and formed a prayer circle as part of the close of the service, which brought us all closer together.

The meeting with the Session also proved to be inspiring. Under the direction of the moderator, the Session is learning its roles, responsibilities, and accountabilities. While the pulpit supply pastor encouraged them with ideas on the development of community outreach ministries, the Session recognized that responsibility for these ministries falls with them, and that Session approval and oversight is fundamental and absolutely required. Also, while finances were still small, the Session is hopeful that the continued growth in attendance (and thus offerings) would help to meet operational expenses. The Session had developed a realistic budget and was working to implement it

We feel that this church has a long and difficult road ahead of it to health, but has demonstrated faith and commitment toward that goal. We also believe strongly that this neighborhood is in dire need of help, and that opportunities for ministry are plentiful. To close the doors to these opportunities to show God's love would be tantamount to going against Christ's instruction to reach out to those needing His love. We believe that with the continued guidance of the moderator, pastoral leadership, and close watch by the Presbytery, this church can become a healthy and vibrant congregation.

Report of Adminstrative Commission Re. FPC Wyandotte October 1, 2014

The Administrative Commission (AC) was created in February 2013 by The Presbytery of Detroit to:

1) Inquire into all responsibilities of the committees, teams, and staff.

2) Consult with the members, ruling elders, and teaching elders involved with the ministry.

3) Account for all property owned by the church.

4) Require an accounting of all financial records and bank accounts in the church's name.

5) Make a final report to the presbytery with findings and recommendations.

The AC was given the power to assume original jurisdiction of the session with all the powers and authorities given to session in the Book of Order and to take control of all the church's financial accounts.

AC's APPRAISAL OF CONGREGATIONAL WELL BEING

In the 20 months since the AC was formed, a number of positive steps have occurred at FPC Wyandotte. These include:

1) The congregation is no longer in financial jeopardy for the foreseeable future. Two buildings that were part of the Divine Word congregation (which merged with FPC Wyandotte) have been sold, with the proceeds being approximately \$220,000. Additionally, one of the manses belonging to FPC has been rented to a family with a monthly rent of \$850. The second manse is being renovated so that it too can be leased to a family with an expected rent around \$1200.

2) These assets are supplementing the giving of the congregation and providing an opportunity for programs and initiatives to be developed. The session is now working with a team of consultants from the presbytery as they engage in the Holy Conversations process. The hope is that this process will lead to the congregation to implement a couple of new endeavors where the congregation can connect more deeply to the surrounding community.

3) The emotional and spiritual climate of the church has improved dramatically. At the September 2014 session meeting, several elders and the pastor remarked on how the rampant negativity that had been in the church has dissipated.

4) Many of the procedures and policies have been upgraded to help foster greater understanding within the congregation of the church functions administratively. A manual of operations is near completion and a process for reviewing the pastor and other staff members is also close to being finalized.

CONCLUSION

The AC believes that the church is no longer in an immediate crisis. All of what has been accomplished over the past 20 months has allowed the congregation a chance to be a healthy and vital congregation. While the congregation is small, with an average of 30 people in worship, the enhanced spiritual and financial climate, combined with a determination amongst the leadership to be the church God has in mind, has created a window of possibility. Whether that possibility morphs into reality is the question to be embraced, lived, and answered. The answer to that question will make it clear whether or not the congregation can continue to function with the large campus it currently occupies. The AC expects that answer will become self-evident in the next two to three years.

Believing our work will be complete by the end of 2014, the AC respectfully requests that the AC be released from the work assigned to it by the presbytery, effective January 1, 2015.

Note 1 - Nature of Operations and Significant Accounting Policies:

The Presbytery of Detroit, Inc. (the "Presbytery") is one of the presbyteries that comprise the Synod of the Covenant, which is a member of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The Presbytery consolidation policy is to include all entities under its common control. These consolidated financial statements include: the "Presbytery", and "Howell Conference and Nature Center". These consolidated financial statements exclude the following related entity: "The Presbytery Women". The effect on the consolidated report as of December 31, 2013 has not been determined.

In addition to starting and sustaining new churches in southeastern Michigan, the Presbytery provides program leadership and resources to help meet the educational needs of the churches and also participates in the operation of outdoor ministries (Howell Conference and Nature Center) in southeastern Michigan for use by church groups, school, businesses, and individuals. Funds are expended to develop and support ministries to meet the needs of people served by the Presbytery.

Significant accounting policies are as follows:

The financial statements of the Presbytery have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. The Presbytery records transactions based on the nature of the activity as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted.

Unrestricted Assets - Unrestricted net assets of the Presbytery consist of general operations and programs. Unrestricted designated funds consist of amounts received or receivable that the Presbytery, Council, or Trustees have earmarked for a specific purpose. Unrestricted property and equipment consist of the Presbytery's investment in tangible property.

Gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets initially are reported as restricted support. Absent donor stipulations about how long these long-lived assets must be maintained, the Presbytery reports expirations of donor restrictions when the acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Temporarily Restricted Assets - Temporarily restricted assets of the Presbytery consist of amounts received from donors who have specified the time and purpose for which the funds are to be spent. When a donor restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are released to unrestricted net assets.

Permanently Restricted Assets - Permanently restricted assets of the Presbytery consist of amounts received from donors who have specified that the principal of the donation is to remain intact for investment purposes. Realized and unrealized gains on these assets are also permanently restricted. Annual earnings on these assets are released to unrestricted or temporarily restricted net assets.

Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses and changes in net assets during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash Equivalents – The Presbytery considers all highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Functional Basis and Allocation – Indirect cost have been allocated between the program and support services based on activity-based costing methods. Although the methods of allocation used are considered appropriate other methods could be used that would produce different amounts.

Note 1 - Nature of Operations and Significant Accounting Policies: (Continued)

Concentration of Credit Risk Arising From Deposit – The Presbytery maintains cash balances with different banks. Accounts at each institution are insured by Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). The Presbytery evaluates the financial institutions with which it deposits funds; however, it may not be practical to insure all cash deposits.

Risks and Uncertainties – The Presbytery invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that change in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the balance sheet.

Notes Receivable and Payable - The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) makes loans to various churches within The Presbytery of Detroit, Inc.'s jurisdiction, and the Presbytery cosigns for these loans. Included in notes receivable balance from Presbytery churches is \$4,159,555 and \$3,305,459 at December 31, 2013 and 2012. Of this amount \$3,839,788 for December 31, 2013 and \$2,977,426 for December 31, 2012 is due on Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) loans, and \$34,000 and \$34,000 for December 31, 2013 and 2012 is due on Synod of the Covenant loans. Principal and interest payments on these loans are made directly by the churches to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), and include interest rates from 3 percent to 5 percent due at various maturity dates through 2021. Notes receivable are reviewed periodically throughout the year and assessed for collectibility. An allowance for doubful accounts is set-up once a receivable collectibility is in doubt. The allowance (shown net) is \$36,423 for the year ended December 31, 2013 and \$55,310 as of December 31, 2012.

Other Receivables - This amount represents receivables from participants in the outdoor ministries program and other miscellaneous receivables. The outdoor ministries receivables are stated at their net invoice amounts. An allowance for doubtful accounts is established based on specific assessment of all invoices that remain unpaid following normal payment periods. All amounts deemed to be uncollectible are charged against the allowance for doubtful accounts in the period the determination is made.

Property, Building, and Equipment - Buildings, furniture and fixtures, and equipment are depreciated over their estimated useful lives using the straight-line method. Buildings are depreciated over a 20-year life and furniture and fixtures and equipment are depreciated over lives ranging from 3 to 10 years.

Investment Fees - The investment management fee is allocated pro rata between income and principal activity. The fee related to principal is paid by a reduction in trust principal. The fee related to income is allocated pro rata to the beneficiaries of the income.

Income Tax Status - The Presbytery is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code and did not conduct any unrelated business activities during the calendar year. Therefore, The Presbytery has no provision for federal income taxes in the accompanying financial statements.

Donated Property and Services – The Presbytery records donated property at its estimated market value only. Additionally, the Presbytery members provided volunteer services in many activities of the entity. These volunteers have a significant impact on making the ministry effective. However, the value of those services are not reflected herein inasmuch as the amount of services provided in indeterminable.

Note 1 - Nature of Operations and Significant Accounting Policies: (Continued)

Subsequent Events - The Presbytery management has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through the date of the auditor's report July 21, 2014, which is the same date the financial statements were available to be issued. See Note 14 for Subsequent Event.

Pension Plan - Certain members of the Presbytery's staff are participants in a pension plan that is administered by the Board of Pensions, which is governed by the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The Presbytery's contributions are calculated as a percentage of eligible wages and are funded as accrued. Pension expense was approximately \$14,372 and \$13,051 for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012. While contributions are based on fixed rates, federal laws impose certain contingent liabilities on contributors to multiemployer plans. In the event of withdrawal from the plan and under certain other conditions, a contributor to a multiemployer pension plan may be liable to the plan in accordance with formulas established by law.

Trustee Expenses - These expenses represent non-salaried expenses used to run the day-to-day operation of the Presbytery office.

Note 2 - Investment Loan Program

At December 31, 2013 and 2012, the Presbytery has \$524,566 and \$522,500 in a money market fund with the Presbytery Church (U.S.A.) Investment Program. Under this program, loans are made to churches for capital investments or improvements. The investments are available for allocation to reduce interest charged on loans to local churches participating in the program. Under, this program the Presbytery is required to maintain a balance of twenty-five percent (25%) of the outstanding balance in liquid assets. The Presbytery is contingently liable for the full amount of the loan outstanding should an individual church default on its loan and the proceeds from the liquidation of the collateral is insufficient to satisfy the outstanding balance. Periodic assessments are made to determine the exposure to the Presbytery for this contingency.

Note 3 - Fair Value Measurement (Continued)

The Presbytery adopted the Fair Value Measurements of its Investments. This accounting standard establishes a fair value hierarchy that measures the difference market participant assumptions developed based on market data obtained from sources independent of the Presbytery (observable inputs) and the reporting Presbytery's own assumptions about market participant assumptions developed based on the best information available in the circumstances (unobservable inputs). The Fair Value measurement also include an adjustment for risk if market participants would include one in pricing the related asset or liability, even if the adjustment is difficult to determine. Fair Value further reports and discloses its results on one of the three levels:

Level 1 - Quoted market prices in an active market for the same assets or liabilities.

Level 2 – Observable market based inputs or unobservable inputs that are corroborated by market data.

Level 3 - Unobservable inputs that are not corroborated by market data.

The Presbytery holds investments in corporate stock and bonds, U.S. government obligations, and Money Market Securities. These investments are based upon quoted prices and determined to be Level 1's for the year ended December 31, 2013.

As further discussed in Note 6, certain capital expenditures are not recorded as assets by the Presbytery.

Note 6 - Depreciation of Assets

During 1989, Accounting Standards "Accounting For Depreciation of Assets" became effective for all not-forprofit organizations. This statement required the Presbytery to record as assets all capital expenditures since inception, and record depreciation charges each year over their estimated useful lives. Prior to 2010 the Presbytery recorded, as assets, all expenditures of a capital nature since 1983 and was recognizing their cost over the estimated useful lives through depreciation charges. In 2010 the Presbytery removed all of their assets from their books, the remaining properties reported reflects the Camp assets only.

Note 7 - Leases

The Presbytery rents its office facility from a member church under a thirty-six month lease commencing January 1, 2010 and expiring August 31, 2015. Rent expense, including costs of security, was \$38,646 for 2013 and \$36,791 for 2012. The Presbytery also leases photocopier equipment under an operating lease agreement expiring October, 2018. The lease expense for the year ended December 31, 2013 amounted to \$27,312.

Note 8 - Net Assets (Endowment Funds)

As described in Notes 9 and 10, the Presbytery has temporarily and permanently restricted net assets. These funds are invested in a common account managed by Comerica Bank according to investment policies determined by the Presbytery. The primary objective of these policies is to outline the investment objective of the Presbytery so that a maximum total rate of return will be realized given a level of risk consistent with the preservation of capital and anticipated future cash flow requirements. This objective is accomplished utilizing a balanced strategy of equities, fixed income securities and cash equivalents in a mix which is conducive to participation in rising markets while allowing for adequate protection in falling markets. Certain investments commonly known as alternatives are generally not allowed in the portfolio.

All of the temporarily and permanently restricted net assets are restricted by the donor whereby only the income may be spent for the purpose stipulated by the donor. The principal of the permanently restricted fund may not be spent below its original amount. The Presbytery has also followed the guideline that the principal amount of the temporarily restricted fund may also not be spent below its original amount.

Expenditures from the funds are dictated by the donor for the stated purpose and amount. Amounts are determined based on the investment performance of the managed Comerica account.

Temporarily restricted net assets are available for the following purposes:

Presbytery of Detroit – Ranney-Balch Fund are available to provide aid to the aged, poor, and/or for the benefit of Christian work among Italian, Negro, and other underprivileged groups within the boundaries specified in this fund.

Howell Conference and Nature's Center – This represents funds contributed by various donors to the Nature Center to help nurture nature creations.

Presbytery of Detroit - Mission Fund represents funds (per capita, shared and directed missions, offerings, etc.) collected from the various church entities on behalf of General Assembly and the Synod. The fund balances as of December 31, 2013 and 2012 reflects excess dollars paid out during this time period than collected. The excess represents a temporary timing difference.

The Presbytery has loans and guarantees outstanding totaling \$594,958 from a member church which has been determined as distressed debt due to a split in the church ministry. The estimated loss on the sale of the property is approximately \$55,000 which hasn't been reflected in the 2013 financial statements.

SYNOD CORRESPONDENCE ON EXEC II – Sec. 5 STAFFING

Memorandum of Understanding

Between the Synod of the Covenant and Member Presbyteries

In Times of Executive / General Staff Transition

Synod of the Covenant Assembly - August 8, 2014

Rationale:

"Synod is responsible for the life and mission of the church throughout its region and for congregations to the end that the church throughout its region becomes a community of faith, hope, love, and witness". (G-3.0401) In G-30401 (c) under "*nurture the covenant community of disciples of Christ*" words like "leadership development" and "responsible administration", and "reviewing the work of its presbyteries" are included.

To this end, in times of transition in presbytery executive staff, it is assumed that that Synod will be fully informed and involved. Hence, the Synod Executive shall work with the Presbytery as soon as the need arises to debrief, consult with, and advise the council or leadership team to discern a plan of action in an ex-officio capacity representing the synod. This is similar to the function of the Committee of Ministry, or its equivalent, in relation to congregations.

Synod Expectations of Presbyteries and the Role of the Synod Executive:

The Synod Executive shall staff and resource the Presbytery, Council, and Search Committee/Team throughout the transition and search process to provide leadership and professional expertise, including but not limited to, debriefing the needs of the Presbytery, discerning with the Council future direction, designing a plan for the transition and for the search process. Depending on the circumstances and availability of the Synod Executive, this will include consulting with the leadership of the Presbytery, working with the assigned committee to help in calling an Interim or Installed Executive (or the equivalent); support in the formulation of the purpose, job description, terms of call, and other related needs or goals. In addition, the Synod Executive will assist with related functions such as training the search committee, participate in interviews, conduct reference and background checks, and review the work of the mission of the Presbytery, and assist the incoming EP/GP during their transition and the duration of the call.

The Presbytery council or personnel committee shall inform the Synod Executive as early as possible in advance of any anticipated changes regarding executive staff employment in order that the Synod Executive become available and prepare for such a vital task to the health and development of the Presbytery and by extension the Synod.

SYNOD OF THE COVENANT

Synod/Presbytery Relationship During Presbytery Executive Leadership Transitions

Rationale:

Whereas the "Synod is responsible for the life and mission of the church throughout its region and for supporting the ministry and mission of its presbyteries as they seek to support the witness of congregations, to the end that the church throughout its region becomes a community of faith, hope, love, and witness. As it leads and guides the witness of the church throughout its region, it shall keep before it the marks of the Church (F-1.0302), the notes by which Presbyterian and Reformed communities have identified themselves through history (F-1.0303) and the six Great Ends of the Church (F-1.0304)." (G-3.0401),

Whereas in G-30401 (c) under "nurture the covenant community of disciples of Christ" words like "leadership development" and "responsible administration", and "reviewing the work of its presbyteries" are included.

Whereas "The synod has responsibility for supporting the work of the presbyteries within its bounds and as such is charged with: a. developing, in conjunction with its presbyteries, joint plans and objectives for the fulfillment of mission, providing encouragement and guidance to its presbyteries and overseeing their work..." (G-3.0403)

On behalf of the synod, the Synod Executive, is mandated by his/her job description to resource presbyteries as soon as the need arises to debrief, consult with, and advise the council or leadership team to discern next steps and plans in an ex-officio capacity. This is similar to the resourcing function of the presbytery's committee of ministry, or its equivalent, in relation to congregations, but only in an advisory capacity and without the powers to mandate or overrule.

Expectations of Presbyteries and the Role of the Synod Executive:

The Presbytery council, or its personnel committee, will initiate contact with and invite the Synod Executive as early as possible in advance of any anticipated change in employment of the Executive/General Presbyter/Head. The Synod Executive is expected to resource the presbytery, presbytery council (or its equivalent), and the search committee/team throughout the transition and search process in order to provide leadership and professional expertise. This ordinarily includes debriefing the needs of the Presbytery, discerning with its council future direction, designing a plan for the transition and for the search process. In addition, the Synod Executive will be available to assist with related functions, resource the search committee, participate in interviews, conduct reference and background checks, and help review the work of the mission of the Presbytery, and assist the incoming EP/GP during their transition and duration of the call.

Dear Raafat:

The Leadership Council of the Presbytery of the Miami Valley has requested that I write to you the summation of our discussion concerning the proposal by the Synod of the Covenant to adopt a policy concerning its role in the calling of an executive or general presbyter. In short, this presbytery opposes any policy mandating such a role for the Synod of the Covenant (or any synod for that matter). Our reasoning follows.

We find the presumption that the *Book of Order* invests the synod with the authority of mandated participation in the presbytery's process to discern and call its Executive or General Presbyter (or leader of any of other title) to be erroneous.

While the Synod of the Covenant's new document to this effect (replacing the previous *Memorandum of Understanding*, which was written as a unilateral undertaking, reflecting no *understanding* per se) presents a rationale that appears to be grounded in the *Book of Order* (*G*-3.04 *THE SYNOD*), there are clear issues of context which seem to have been sidestepped. For instance:

Whereas in G-30401 (c) under "nurture the covenant community of disciples of Christ" words like "leadership development" and "responsible administration", and "reviewing the work of its presbyteries" are included.

That all of the quoted words are included in the paragraph, the historical contextual understanding of these and the others listed within *G*-3.0401c is that "leadership development" relates to developing so-called lay leadership, and that "responsible administration" and "reviewing the work of its presbyteries" relate to proper overview of polity issues (i.e., administrative review). While the synod (currently) has an important and essential function concerning a presbytery's fidelity to polity, it must be fully understood that neither of these latter two phrases have the same meaning as "supervision."

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Continuing in the rationale:

Whereas "The synod has responsibility for supporting the work of the presbyteries within its bounds and as such is charged with: a. developing, in conjunction with its presbyteries, joint plans and objectives for the fulfillment of mission, providing encouragement and guidance to its presbyteries and overseeing their work..." (G-3.0403)

This paragraph states that the "joint plans and objectives" are "for the fulfillment of mission." Note that mission is not specified, there is no genitive modifier such as "its" or "the presbytery's" because the reference is, of course, to Christ's mission, which denominationally we relate to the *Great Ends of the Church*. To see a *mandated* synod role in the calling of an EP or GP as part of a plan or objective to develop mission seems a stretch. In addition, as in the earlier vein, the words "overseeing their work" are not the same as *supervising their work*.

Perhaps just as importantly, the *Book of Order* is written in a way that binds all subsections in numerical order, so that each paragraph is responsible to an antecedent. Therefore all parts of the authority of a synod as related to its presbyteries must be considered in light of *G*-3.0401, which provides the *first* responsibility as "*responsible for the life and mission of the church throughout its region*" and the *second* as "*supporting the ministry and mission of its presbyteries as they seek to support the witness of congregations*." If everything that flows forth from this paragraph is considered in this hierarchical light, then the critical role of a synod is a *supporting* one, not a leading one. To vest this synod with specific authority in the process calling an EP or GP runs counter to this, and seems contrary to the "spirit" of the *Book of Order*.

Rather than having asked presbytery councils for their thoughts on "whether there might be a useful role for the synod" in the calling of an EP or GP, this proposed policy has been a top-down procedure driven entirely by the Synod of the Covenant. This is especially troubling here where relationships between many of the presbyteries and the synod have been difficult and strained for more than a decade. In light of this, this unilateral action by the synod feels like a power grab, even if such was not the intent. In a context of distrust, it is completely logical and foreseeable that a presbytery might be suspicious of the synod's motives in all this, viewing these efforts as nothing more a self-justification for existence.

It would also seem that *before* such a policy might be proposed it would be better that relations with presbyteries be nurtured to a place of good health, out of which might come good collaborative efforts to define the synod's role in assisting the calling process. But this exercise now, with presbyteries reacting and responding to the synod's *fiat*, only provides more strain to our collegiality.

All of this aside, it is logical that the Synod have a role in the process, but one in which they are *invited*, based upon a presbytery's particular need, in a manner consistent with other phrases in *G*-3.04 such as "may require" or "when requested."

We would be happy to discuss this, based upon our experience with our last call process eight years ago, as a separate matter, **but only after this attempt by the Synod of the Coyénant for a mandate has been set aside**.
